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THE NEW KINGDOM

Part 4. The Great Image of Iron and Clay.

The historical facts of the fulfillment, up to the present time of the second chapter of Daniel, as we can see it now in these closing days, ought to convince the most skeptical mind of the truth of God's Word. Four great world empires are to rule until the time the "Stone cut out of the mountain without hands" (Dan. 2:45) smites the image and grinds it to powder, and no place is found for it (Dan. 2:35), and the smiting Stone becomes a great mountain and fills the whole earth. This will

surely be a wonderful time on earth.

This vision is all very strange to us, because of the fact, it was revealed to a Gentile king. doubt God had raised him up for no other purpose than to punish Israel for their sins. Gentile king became great, it came into his mind, what was to happen to his kingdom in the 'latter days" (Dan. 2:29), and so God gave him a very startling vision, which his mind could not retain, and after so much was shown to him, it yet remained for the much beloved Daniel to go before God in prayer for a revelation of the forgotten I am sure if there had been any earthly power to reveal such secrets the wise men of Babylon would have had that power to reveal to Nebuchadnezzar his dream, for their lives were at stake It is sure today as well as then, if they failed. the secrets of the Lord can only be revealed and understood by men who are led by the Spirit. And so in answer to prayer, Daniel did not only reveal the future and fall of the four great world powers, but also told the forgotten dream. History today shows how accurate the interpretation was.

The wise men of Babylon consisted of the greatest minds of the day, also men of power in the art of magic, or in touch with evil spirits, or witcheraft. No possible chance was overlooked to solve any dark or hidden mystery that might come up in so great a kingdom as Babylon. No doubt there were those who would like to overthrow the kingdom and usurp it for themselves; any conspiracy might prove fatal to the security of the crown, and so groups of wise men, masters in their various lines, were chosen and kept in readiness, to be called by the king at any time, in case of emergency. These groups consisted of Magicians, Astrologers, Sorcerers and Chaldeans.

After Nebuchadnezzar had seen the vision of this great image, and it was terrible to him, it had left his mind, and only dread remained, and his greatest desire was to know the meaning of a dream that

No doubt he could cause him so much concernknew that it had much to do with himself and his kingdom, for such thoughts had been coming to him, and now the possibility of missing the very thing he wanted to know, when it was seemingly so near, and yet how far. Only God could reveal this secret, and Nebuchadnezzar did not know Him. How could he get in touch with such an one as only the Hebrew captives knew? For a king to call for his prisoners to make known such a dream was not once in his mind. So he called in at once those whom he hoped could reveal this very important secret, but all in vain, there was no power in the wisdom of men, nor in magic, and evil spirits did not know the future that God held in His own hand. So all the wise men failed, and only one thing was left for them to do, and that was to try and save their own lives, and proceded to put off the king's matter until he would forget it, or it wore off. Daniel and But not so, they must tell it or die. his fellow prisoners were sought to be slain with the wise men of Babylon, although they were not of the same group or class as those called by the When this was made known to Daniel, he desired a little time to reveal the secret to the king. "For he that believeth shall not make haste" (Isa. So Daniel and his companions waited upon God in prayer; and the secret was revealed to Daniel the prophet, and why not? "Surely the Lord God will do nothing, but he revealeth his secret unto his servants the prophets" (Amos 3:7). Hallelujah, again the Word of God proves itself in a time of need.

Daniel answered in the presence of the king and said, "The secret which the king hath demanded cannot the wise men, the astrologers, the magicians, the soothsayers, shew unto the king; but there is a God in Heaven that revealeth secrets, and maketh known to the king Nebuchadnezzar what shall be in the latter days. Thy dream, and the visions of thy head upon thy bed, are these" (Dan. 2:27, 28).

Notice here, "The latter days," or the closing up of this great image age, lasting from the days of Babylon until the beginning of the New Kingdom, set up on the earth, and all the kingdoms represented by the different divisions of the image are done away with. They are: (1) Head of gold, Babylon, the great rich kingdom; (2) breast and arms of silver, a dual kingdom, Medes and Persians; (3) belly and thighs of brass, the Grecian Empire, with Alexander the Great as the first king; (4) legs of iron, his feet part of iron and part of clay, or Rome. No one will question that these four kingdoms have come and gone as predicted. We will deal more fully with each of them when we come to Dan. VII.

Daniel does not say much about the first three

of Daniel, but he does say much about the fourth kingdom, because it will continue in some form until the "Smiting Stone," which is Jesus Christ, comes Then notice, after the smiting of this great image, and it is ground to powder and driven away by the wind (v. 35), that the "Smiting Stone" becomes a great mountain and fills the whole earth. Notice here, this Stone was cut out of a mountain, which I think must be the Kingdom of God, and that the Stone becomes a mountain or kingdom filling the whole earth, or the kingdom of Christ reigning in the earth, upon the throne of His Father The redeemed saints of all nations rejoice, that they are to reign as kings and priests unto God, on the earth (Rev. 5:10). This surely is not the new heaven and new earth that is to come, so must precede it and will be the reign of Christ during the one thousand years when He is King of the Jews.

"In the days of these kings shall the God of heaven set up a kingdom, which shall never be destroyed; and the kingdom shall not be left to other people, but it shall break in pieces and consume all these kingdoms, and it shall stand forever" (Dan. 2:44). Days of these kings, seems to me, these kingdoms represented by the image in the vision, and the Kingdom God has set up is that kingdom into which men enter by the new birth, and become heirs with Christ, and will rule with Him while He is the King in Israel. As these kingdoms fell one after another, they have been taken by other people and not by the Jews, and the Jews have never come into their possessions, but when the Stone smites the image they will come into their own with Christ their own King. Some writers seem to think there will be ten kings ruling in the revived Roman Empire, represented by the ten toes mixed with iron and clay It seems to me that the iron would have to prevail if it was a revival of the Roman Empire, but it cannot do this, because it is mingled with clay. I think that all that is left of the power of the Iron Kingdom at the final end will be located in the scarlet woman of Rev. XVII, and that the Smiting Stone is the same event as we find in Zech. XIV and Rev. XIX:11-21 and Rev. XVI:13-16, namely, the battle of Armageddon. The 18th chapter of Rev. is wholly given to the final destruction of this iron or fourth kingdom, under the name Babylon the Great, etc. (Rev. 17:5).

Babylon, "the head of gold," fell by the hands of the Medes and Persians, B. C. 538, and was never to be rebuilt as the first city (Isa, 13:17-22). overthrow is fully recorded in the fifth chapter of We will devote our next article to this God calls cities and kingdoms by names befitting their time and character. In a recent article we noted He called Germany "Chaldean" (Hab. 1:6). Also Jerusalem, during the reign of the Antichrist, He calls Egypt and Sodom, where also our Lord was crucified (Rev. 11:8), now we know He was crucified in Jerusalem. When Imperial Babylon fell their headquarters were moved to Pergamos, thence to Rome where they remain until this day, hence the name, "Babylon the Great." After the edict of Constantine, abolishing idolatry in Rome in A. D. 331, Rome weds pagan ceremonies to Christian doctrine; so as we study the fall of Babylon the Great, in Revelation and Daniel, we

kingdoms in either the second or seventh chapters must see the fall of the city that sits on "seven hills."

The Lord's dealing with Babylon and Tyre are subjects of such nature that they should be deeply impressed upon the mind of every Bible reader, as they will prove a wonderful source of faith in prophecy. We are living in a time of history making, so many facts of what God has said He would do to these cities has been unearthed, and found to be true. It seems, when men began to doubt God's Word, the very stones and ruins of ancient cities cried out the truth of the awful fate the prophets had cried out against these God-rejecting cities and their If men would only believe God's Word, and not try to twist it to suit their own minds, but even if they do it will not change the Word of God, nor cause any part of it to fail, yet it may blind those so doing, that they will not be able to see the signs of the speedy coming of the last great day. We have no means of judging the returning of the King to earth but by signs and conditions set forth in God's Word.

The ten toes of the Iron Kingdom seems to be the scripture upon which the revival of the Roman Empire is based. It is true there will be ten kings, which have received no power as kings, but will receive such power with the Beast or Antichrist (Rev. 17:12). It is sure the Beast, or Antichrist, or Man of Sin, as he is called, does not revive Rome, or Babylon the Great, the city on seven hills, all these names apply to the same city, and the Beast is against her, and so are the ten kings that reign If the ten toes do represent ten kings, they will surely be with the clay and not cleave to the iron, for John makes it clear that they rule only with the Beast. If they are kings at all they are dormant until the coming of Antichrist, and would be kings only in name. Number ten seems to be associated with world kingdoms so much, and shows that the spirit of iniquity, the spirit that now worketh in the children of disobedience, could have in readiness ten kingdoms, or a league of nations, over which these ten kings might reign with the Antichrist, who is not a kingdom, but a "king of fierce countenance understanding dark sentences" (Dan. 8:23). Surely the world is now crying for a man of this type, who is sure to come by popular demand. To forget God is to deify man, and that man will be the Man of Sin, or in place of Christ, truly anti-To reject Christ was, by kingly decree, to release Barabbas.

Fragments of the Roman Empire still exist, but as an Imperial Monarchy, it has long since ceased to function, but took up the only means left to her, by which she hoped to perpetuate herself, and that by the doctrine of "direct appostolic succession," Millions believe that doctrine until this day. this form the iron will meet her final ruin during the reign of the Man of Sin, Antichrist, whom Christ will destroy with the brightness of His coming (2 Thess. 2:8). That this is yet future is sure, but how far future no one knows, and that the reign of Christ will follow the fall of "Babylon the Great" and His kingdom will cover the whole earth, for the "Stone becomes a great mountain and fills the whole earth." This is not the New Heaven and the new earth, for that will be turned back to the Father, and Christ himself will be in subjection to the Father as at the first (1 Cor. 15:24-28). Surely the New Kingdom is in sight now.

YOUR CHURCH BUDGET

I have always been a stickler for our State Budget System, because I believe 't is the easiest and most impartial way of financing the work. It is such a small amount per capita, so that anyone can pay it, and it is so distributed that it is equal among all, and the appropriation of the money derived from it is so restricted that there is no danger whatever of it being wasted; so in what way could the budget system be objected to? Only ten cents per resident member from each church is asked, half to go to the clerk of your local association for your associational expenses, and half to the state clerk for State expenses; and remember that, ac-

cording to a vote of the State Association the state's part can't be used only as ordered by the State Association, or the State board.

Now if your church budget has not been paid in for your delegates to take to your coming association, then get busy at once and raise it in some way. It doesn't just have to come from each member, but an amount equal to ten cents per resident member is asked for: and there are different ways to raise it, the amount according to your membership is the object. Of course it is nice when each member will pay the dime, but you know there are always some in every church who, from neglect or lack of interest, will not pay.

Why not every pastor make an earnest effort to get a full budget from each of your churches? I am sure if we pastors would boost budget system more the this churches would take hold of it more readily; but there is one thing sure, we are neglecting this budget system to our hurt in that it is holding back the progress of the work. Let us not just be interested around our own doorstep only, but let's be interested over all the state and even outside the state. Let's be awake, God demands lively stones.
