

THE NEW KINGDOM

Part 7. The Four Horsemen. By Elder Everett Wilson

Most of the following articles on the New Kingdom will be taken from Revelation. So many have written upon this book, and no two writers seem to agree. We will only try to draw a partial picture of the visions of John while on the Isle of Patmos, and be content to wait further fulfillment of what he saw while banished for the witness of Jesus the Christ.

The Revelation of Jesus Christ must surely mean "something revealed," and if so, ought to be understood by "him that readeth," and no doubt can be, if taken as it was showed and explained by the angel unto the servant John, so we will try to stay by the visions as they are recorded

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In the fifth chapter we see John weeping because no one was able to open and read the seven sealed book in the angel's hand, but is told by one of the elders to, "weep not," as the Lion of the tribe of Judah had prevailed to open the book and loose the seven seals. First, before becoming the Lion to bring judgment upon the world, He must suffer as the Lamb. Having borne the sins of the world, He is now able to judge the world. He did not come to condemn, but to save the world, and every demon power was turned loose upon Him, and He bore every insult, and defeated every cunning device of Satan, until all hell had spent her fury in trying to bring out some kind of retaliation, but the prince of this world could find nothing in Jesus so as to bring a charge against Him, for He was holy and just and good. "He was tempted in all points like as we are, yet without sin." Having withstood all

that was heaped upon Him, He is now able to take the book and tear off the seals, so that all the world can see the Lion of Judah as He rolls back the curtains and shows to the church things that must shortly come to pass, many of which may already be history to some extent, and may also have a future view of a more literal fulfillment. So we say, "Watch and pray."

As the curtain lifts upon the opening of the first seal, we see a white horse, and his rider, also in This rider is given a white. crown, he is armed with a bow, but no quiver filled with arrows is in evidence, and he goes forth conquering and to conquer. Some writers make this horseman the coming Antichrist, claiming him an imitater of the Christ as scen in Rev. 19:11. My objection to this view is this. White is never connected with the Antichrist. And he never conquers. While he overcomes the saints, it is only for a short time and they rise to appear with Christ as the Antichrist is overcome and conquered. The fact that the saints do not take his number or name or mark shows they could not be conquercd, but are themselves overcomers. Compare Rev. 2:26 and Rev. 12:11 God has never yet allowed a judgment to come upon the world but what He has warned His people first. Noah was warned of the flood, and prepared an ark to the Lot was saving of his house. warned to flee from Sodom. Even Rahab was warned of the overthrow of Jericho, and put the scarlet line in her window to the saving of her house. I feel sure that we can see in the white horse and his rider the Spirit of God going forth conquering and to conquer and warning the people to get ready for the coming of the white horse rider of Rev. 19:11 God grant that we may all obey that warning. The reader will against the Bible and Christians

see this view more clearly as the next seals are opened.

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At the opening of the second seal in verse 4, a red horse and rider comes out. He is armed with a great sword, and power is given him to take peace from the earth, and that they should kill one another. If you will recall to mind now the article on the World War you will see that in 1914 peace was taken from the earth and has never as yet been. restored. An armistice was signcd, and how we rejoiced over that, but no terms of peace have yet The League of been reached. Nations has failed to bring in an agreement by which the waring nations could settle satisfactorily, and all nations are far more ready for war than they were in 1914. It is said that of the 1,711,011,000 people in the world at the time of the World War, 1,575,135,000 were in the conflict, leaving only 135,876,000 out of it. Out of this war has sprung up the great, and dreaded Red Movement, which in time will put their king, the Antichrist on the throne ruling the whole world (Rev. 13:8, 11). The very country where this great. army is rising from is named in your Bible, and will be the same land from which the vast hoards. will come to fight the battle of Gog and Magog at the close of the 1,000 years reign of Christ when Satan is loosed for a little season. Read here the entire 20th chapter of Revelation. Two battles are to be fought on the same field, the first with the sword that proceeds from the mouth of the Lord (Rev. 19:11-21), and the second with fire that comes down from heaven (Rev. 20:7-9), also Isaiah 66:15, 16) speaks of the Lord pleading with sword and fire. Two battles are clearly in sight and 1,000 years apart, and both are future as yet. No wonder so many countries are rising up and Jews, and as they do they fling their gates wide open for the coming in of the Antichrist and his vast host that he will lead to defeat in the field of Armageddon. That this red horse and rider has every requirement to

rider has every requirement to meet the description of the coming man of sin, no one can doubt, and the stage is fully set for the final act of the coming king of fierce countenance to take up his short but bloody reign just before the coming of the King of kings to rule.

As the third seal is opened, a black horse comes out, and the rider has a pair of balances in his hand. No sooner had the red horse and rider taken peace away from the earth, than the black horse and rider appeared on the scene. Two powerful movements are now in the world. The Reds of Russia and the Black Shirts of Italy. In 1918 and 1922 Mussolini took Fascism into Rome. No one ever dreamed of such powerful movements under the leadership of dictators, but they are here and gaining favor and power every day, and will until the time comes for the Black to give way to the Red, which will in time rule the earth. Christians, as you read this, lay down your party and doctrinal lines, and pray that we may all escape the terrible things that will develop out of the conflict of these two powerful movements. You can see the work of the rider on the black horse with his balances. Balaneing the production of cotton, wheat. corn, cattle, hogs, and most all produce, balancing the prices in business of many kinds, balancing the expenses of government. Just another step in taking the control of production out of the hands of God and giving it to man. God has promised that for a tithe of the increase He would send abundant harvest times, and see that there would be no lack of rain, and under His blessing devouring insects could not thrive Surely something is out of place somewhere in the handling of these things, and all the blame cannot be laid upon the world, for all Christendom is far short in its promises to God, and so we can expect violence of all kinds in the earth and the elements. Pestilence, earthquakes and famines follow the black horse and his rider, just as Jesus said would

come in the last days (Mt. 24:6-7).

Now as the fourth seal is broken we see a pale horse and his rider "death" followed hard in the wake of the red and black horses, and filling hell with the countless thousands who are falling at his feet as the poor victims of these two powerful horsemen are swept down to death in a vain struggle against the coming rider on His white horse (Rev. 19:11-16 and 2 Thess. 2:8). There is no eye to pity, no hand to save, for they have followed their leader, "the prince of the power of the air, the spirit that now worketh in the children of disobedience" (Eph. 2:2). Because the Lamb would not use force and compel men to follow Him or obey His pleadings, He is now coming the "Lion" to tear and to trample and slay with the "sword of His mouth," until the hearts of His enemies have seen all the bloodshed and battle that they had longed for, but did not know that "no weapon formed against the godly could prosper, and that no tongue could rise against them in judgment" (Isaiah 54:17).

No wonder there will be a time of silence in heaven if all these things coming to pass are revealed to the angels. It seems to me that both heaven and earth will stand in awe until the blood of the wicked has been shed and covered, and the last bone buried, after the great battle of Armageddon, and then the earth will spring forth in new beauty, grass will cover barren ground, and the trees bear their fruit, the vine bring forth grapes, and the olive oil flow freely, the fig tree and pomegranate shall flourish, and the desert shall blossom as the rose. "The wolf also shall dwell with the lamb, and the leopard shall lie down with the kid; and the calf and the young lion and the fatling together; and a little child shall lead them" (Isa. 11:6). Truly this will be the glories of the New Kingdom, and may God hasten the day when we shall see the King in His beauty.

A different scene takes place when the fifth seal is opened. Souls are seen under the altar and are crying to God to know how long before they will be revenged for their death upon the earth. They are told to wait the coming of the next group that should be killed as they were, and

should live and reign with Christ a thousand years. This second group were on earth during the reign of Antichrist, but would not take his name, number or mark. This is clearly future as yet, and shows a reign of a personal Antichrist, or "beast out of the pit" (Rev. 11:7; 17:8). This group comes out of "great tribulation" or tribulation the great (Rev. 7:9-17).

THE CALL TO THE MINISTRY A Sermon By Elder W. C. Hill

"Now Moses kept the flock of Jethro his father-in-law, the priest of Midian: and he led the flock to the back side of the desert, and came to the mount of God, even Horeb, and the angel of the Lord appeared unto him in a flame of fire out the midst of a bush: and he looked, and behold, the bush was not burned. When the Lord saw that he turned aside to see, He called to him out of the bush, and said, Moses, Moses, and Moses said, "Here am I." God said, "1 have surely seen the affliction of my people which are in Egypt, and heard their cry by reason of their taskmasters: for I know

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ECHOES FROM OUR MO. STATE ASSOCIATION By the Editor

Our State Meeting convened on Monday night, October 15th this year. Monday night and Tuesday was given to the Mission and League workers. The introductory sermon on Monday night was delivered by Sister Lizzie McAdams, and was on the line of Missions and Leagues. The business of the Missions and Leagues was transacted on Tuesday and officers were elected for ensuing year.

Elder Homer Smith delivered the introductory sermon for the Association on Tuesday night to a very large and attentive congregation.

A tent with a seating capacity of about 600 people was used this year. It was fine but not large enough.

Wednesday morning, after a spirited devotional service, letters were read and delegates were seated, then followed the election of officers. Elder Jas. F. Miller of Flat River, Mo. was re-elected as moderator; Elder Selph Jones of Mansfield, Mo. was elected assistant moderator; Elder Winford Davis of Monett, Mo. was re-elected clerktreasurer, with Elder Noel Turner of Granby, Mo. ass't clerk, all of them elected by acclamation. Bro. M. H. White of Plattsburg, Mo. and Elder Harry Beatty of Thayer, Mo. were clected on the Executive Board.

Every business session and every devotional service from the first to the last on Friday night, seemed to be entirely under the leadership of the Holy Spirit; for there wasn't the slightest jar or disagreement in all the proceedings and transactions.

Not having the records I am not able to give the number of ministers, deacons, delegates and visitors present, but the delegation was larger, much larger than it used to be. We have no church building large enough to accommodate the delegation that attends our State Association. Steps were taken this year to build a large tabernacle at some appropriate, centrally located place that is to be selected, where our annual State meeting will be held.

A large number of preachers were present this year, and only one preacher was appointed for each service, but it proved a success and every preaching service was a spiritual feast. Spiritual truths were impressed upon the hearts and minds of those who heard that can never be erased; the words spoken may be forgotten, but the impressions made will never be forgotten.

Not only did those who were responsible for the success of the business and devotional services of the Association fill their places and do their part, but those who had charge of the entertainment, feeding the multitude and providing for their comfort at night, did their part in an excellent way. It is no small matter to properly care for 200 or 300 people who come all at once into a country place, but the Jones Chapel people cared for them so that no one had any complaint to make. Three meals a day were cooked and served on the church grounds, and that took careful planning and many willing helpers, but it was all satisfactorilly accomplished.

From year to year our State Association is growing in numbers, and our denominational interest is growing too; but the most gratifying of all is the greater spiritual blessings we enjoy, which seem to increase with each annual session. We are even now, with much pleasure and anticipation, looking forward to our meeting next year at Flat River, and that principally because of the spiritual blessings we hope to enjoy there.

Professor C. M. Robinson Quotes Isaiah, Micah and Amos

In our Free Will Baptist League Rally of Indian Creek Association, held with Jones Chapel church, September 30th, many interesting numbers, songs, readings and talks were rendered. The Mission sermon was delivered at eleven o'clock by Elder Cecil Campbell, from text in Acts 16:9, "Come over into Macedonia and help us." God gave us a wonderful message on missions thru Bro. Campbell,

One of the outstanding numbers in the afternoon program was a talk by Prof. C. M. Robinson, Superintendent of Midway High School. He quoted from the prophets, and plainly showed, School. that the conditions of which the people were warned, were the same as we have today. He advocated a return to God as the only way to prosperity and relief, both temporally and spiritually.

Mr. Robinson quoted Mieah 6:8, "He hath shewed thee, O man, what is good; and what doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with thy God?" Moses said unto God, "Who am I that I should go unto Pharaoh, and that I should bring forth the children of Israel out of Egypt?" (v. 11). God said, "Certainly I will be with thee" Then God instructed (v. 12). Moses, telling him just what to do and say.

Moses Makes Excuses

(P)

"The people will not believe me, neither will they hearken unto my word: they will say, The Lord hath not appeared unto thee'' (Ex. 4:1). And the Lord said unto unto him, "What is that in thine hand?" And he said, "A rod." God said, "Cast it on the ground." Moses threw it down and it became a serpent. (v. 3). Then the Lord said, "Put forth your hand and take it by the tail," and he did so, and it became a rod again (v. 4). This was proof positive that God would be with him.

Excuse No. 2-Moses said unto the Lord, "I am not eloquent. I am slow of speech" (v. 10). And the Lord said, "Now therefore go, and I will be with thy mouth, and teach thee what to say'' (v. 12). Then Moses asked that his brother Aaron might be permitted to accompany him, to do the talking for him. God granted his request, and so the two brothers went, and God blessed them and gave them success.

What We Have Learned

1. God called Moses to an important work.

2. He gave him his message.

3. He gave Moses power to deliver the message.

4. Moses made a success of his work, because God was with him.

Isaiah's Call

In the year that king Uzziah died, I saw also the Lord sitting upon a throne, high and lifted up, and his train filled the temple. Above it stood the scraphim : each one had six wings; with twain he covered his face, and with twain he covered his feet, and with twain he did fly. And one cried unto another, and said, Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts: the whole earth is full of his glory. And the posts of the door moved at the voice of him that cried, and the house was filled with smoke'' (Isa. 6:1-4).

This indeed was a wonderful vision. It had more to do with Isaiah's life from then on than all of the varied experiences of his life in the past.

The Effects of this Vision

1. Isaiah was smitten with conviction; he saw himself as a sinful man (v. 5).

2. He confessed his sins, and said, "Woe is me! for I am undone: because I am a man of unclean lips, and I dwell in the midst of a people of unclean lips: for mine eyes have seen the King the Lord of hosts." He saw, he believed, he confessed.

The Results

So one of the seraphim flew to him with a live coal which he had taken off the altar, and laid it on Isaiah's lips, and said, "Lo, this hath touched thy lips; and thine iniquity is taken away, and thy sin is purged." Then Isaiah heard a voice saying, ''Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" Isaiah answered, "Here am I, send me'' (v. 8).

Lesson Learned

1. That God eleansed Isaiah from his sins and then

2. Called him to be the bearer of His message, and then

3. Gave him the message, and

4. That Isaiah went in obedience to God's call and made a success out of his work-

So

"The godly man alone is blest, With solid peace, and lasting rest;

'Tis good for soul and body too, In paths of holiness to go."

(2 Timothy 4:8).

For

"How many fears oppress the breast, And rob the soul of peace and rest!

But those who truly fear the Lord. May trust upon his faithful word."

(Isaiah 43: 1, 2).

Jeremiah's Call

"Then the word of the Lord came unto me, saying, Before I formed thee in the belly, I knew thee; and before thou camest forth out of the womb, I sanctified and ordained thee a prophet unto the nations" (Jer. 1:4-6).

What is the Lesson Learned?

That God knows the past, the present, and that He knows the future before it comes to pass. He is therefore the all-wise God.

2. That Jeremiah was called and set apart to be a prophet even before he was born.

Jeremiah's Excuse

"Then said I, Ah, Lord God! behold, I cannot speak; for I am a child'' (v. 6).

Moses said, "They will not believe that thou hast appeared unto me." When God drove him from that position, he said, "I cannot speak eloquently." Jeremiah said, "I am a child, I cannot Jeremiali speak." Why did these men It was because make_excusés? they realized that "God is all, and in all," and they themselves as nothing. I had much rather see men make excuses than to plunge headlong into the ministry without any consideration as to its importance.

The Promised Help

"But the Lord said unto me, say not, I am a child: for thou shalt go to all that I send thee, and whatsoever I command thee thou shalt speak. Be not afraid of their faces: for I am with thee to deliver thee, saith the Lord. Then the Lord put forth his hand and touched my mouth, and the Lord said unto me, Behold, I have put my words in thy mouth" Now we learn (Jer. 11:7-10).

1. That when God calls us, that we should not try to excuse ourselves, but go.

2. That when we are called we are the Lord's messengers (Matt. 28:19).

3. That we have His protection. He is with us (Matt. 28:20).

4. That God sets the boundary of our work (v. 10). He is there fore our all-sufficient helper in every time of need.
