

The site of this church building is New Durham Ridge, where the first Free Will Baptist church building was erected at the beginning of the Randallian period, in 1780.

EARTH'S PROPHETIC WEEK

By Elder B. F. Brown Continued from last month

We will begin our study with a brief study of the third chapter of the Second Epistle of St. Peter.

The Apostle Peter is the writer, not only of this Second Epistle of Peter, but also of the First Epistle of Peter (1 Peter 1:1; 2 Peter 1:1).

The Apostle was writing to "strangers and pilgrims," who had "obtained like precious faith" with the apostles.

In this third chapter of Second Peter, the writer's theme is the Second Coming of Christ and the Day of the Lord. He was not telling his beloved brethren something new, but says, "I stir up your pure (sincere) minds by way of remembrance:" and it was said in the same spirit of trustful confidence in his brethren that he expressed in 1 Peter 1:13, when he said, "Wherefore gird up the loins of your mind, be sober, and hope to the end for the grace that is to be brought unto you at the revelation of Jesus Christ" (at the second coming of Christ). A mind thus braced looks onward and forward to the glorious appearing of the Lord Jesus Christ and His kingdom (2 Tim. 4:1), and looks for every token that the time of His coming is drawing nigh. People having such hope can think soberly of the Lord's coming, because they are preparing

effort possible to be pure in heart (1 John 3:3). "That ye may be mindful of the words which were spoken before by the holy prophets" (v. 2). Fully two-thirds of the Bible is prophecy, and it is the inspired word of God: "Holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost" (2Peter 1:21). They not only spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost, but received the words they spoke, being taught by the Holy Ghost (1 Cor.

In a very large measure the thought and theme of the prophets was concerning the Lord Jesus Christ and His kingdom. When Jesus said, as it is recorded in John 5: 39, "Search the scriptures; for in them ye think ye have eternal life: and they are they which testify of me," He was asking that people read the words which the Holy Ghost had moved godly men to write concerning Him. From Genesis to Malachi much is written about the first coming of Christ; but much more is written about His second coming in the same books of the Bible. All the prophets fortold the first coming of Christ; and all the phophets tell us He is coming again.

And how important that we, in this year of our Lord 1935, should give earnest heed to the words of the prophets! But, alas! many of us, because of our indifference, inaction, or even unbelief, have merited the Lord's rebuke, like as He spake to the two on the way to Emmaus: "O fools, and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken."

accomplish this he would go below and reeling that he was not making satisfactory prayer unless it was audible, he made it a point always to pray aloud. This brought terrible persecution upon him from the sailors. They tried to get him to desist praying but he would not. They sang and danced around him while he was engaged in his devotion, but he would pray. They threw wood upon him and bruised him and poured buckets of water upon him, but could not put out the fire in his soul. Then they tied him to the mast and laid thirty-nine stripes upon his back, the marks of which he carries today, but still he prayed. Finally, they tied a rope around his body under his arms and threw him overboard. He struggled and swam as best he could, and when he would take hold of the side of the ship to climb up they would push him off with a long pole. At last his strength gave way and supposing they really meant to kill him, he made a final effort, prayed that God would forgive them and called to the sailors: "Send my body to my mother and tell her I died for Jesus." He then sank into the deep and the water poured over him, but he was pulled out and up on the deck and after being worked with for some time he came to. Conviction then began to seize hold upon those sailors. Before night two of them were gloriously converted, and while they were praying down below with the young martyr, the others thought they were up to their persecutions again and called to them to desist, saying they had persecuted the boy enough. Inside of a week everyone on board the vessel, including the Captain, was blessedly saved.

In a little while the vessel put into Provincetown Harbor, near Cape Cod, on account of an approaching storm. Other vessels gathered in to the amount of nearly three hundred. The boy had been conducting religious services every Sunday on board the ship. Unbeknown to him, when the vessels were lying at anchor, the Captain sent word around that at 10 o'clock Sunday there would be services on his ship and a boy would give his experience of how he was persecuted and nearly killed for Jesus' sake. While the boy was down below preparing

something to say in the meeting as usual, the people began to gather in. They filled the ship's deck, climbed into the rigging, filled every available space and also sat in boats all around the ship. When the young preacher came on deck this was the sight that met him. The crew formed a ring around him and they sang. and he prayed and then took for his text, "Except ye repent ye shall all likewise perish." The Holy Ghost began to work and after the message, an invitation was given for all who wanted to be prayed for to manifest it. In every direction came the response to be prayed for. The work of grace broke out and people began to get saved until, after as careful a count as could be made, there was estimated one hundred conversions that afternoon. And it did not stop there, for after that while the vessels lay in the harbor and out on the ocean, vessels would come to us and those on board tell us of someone being saved. They had us keep our colors at the masthead to distinguish us from the other vessels. People were getting saved and word kent coming in that on such and such a vessel they had a meeting and someone was saved. So it continned for weeks.

This shows what our God is able and willing to do. Let us all be cliannels for the Holy Ghost to work through to the saving of men. Certainly there lies before us mighty possibilities. Shall we have them? Shall we be at our best for the Lord? God make us soul-winners."—Selected.

hand and help them over the difficult place.

"My son hear the instructions of thy father, and forsake not the law of thy mother" (Prov. 1:8).

I want to tell you just now, about a young man about sixteen years old who is going to High school here at Hartville. He came in for a short visit, and while my husband and he had a little conversation about tobacco, he said he began to smoke, and his father told him he didn't want him to smoke; and he just quit; but he he was glad his father forbade him smoking, for there were other boys in school that were not making the grades they should, because they smoked so much of the time.

When he went out of the house, he had his cap in his hand, and remarked, "I didn't want to wear my cap this morning, but mother said I should wear it for I already had a bad cold." This will not only make his father and mother love him, but all that love God will love him for his obedience. You know it is the fashion now for boys to go bareheaded.

Another duty enjoined upon young people is, "Remember now thy Creator, in the days of thy youth, while the evil days come not, nor the years draw nigh, when thou shalt say, I have no pleasure in them" (Eccl. 12:1).

It is good for a man that he bear the yoke in his youth" (Lam. 3:27).

"Young men likewise exhort to be sober-minded" (Titus 2:6).

Examples — "Likewise, ye younger, submit yourselves unto the elder. Yea, all of you be subject one to another, and be clothed with humility: for God resisteth the proud, and giveth grace to the humble. Casting all your care on upon him; for he careth for you" (1 Peter 5:5-7).

"And it came to pass that after three days they found him (Jesus) in the temple, sitting in the midst of the doctors, both hearing them, and asking them questions; and all that heard him were astonished at his understanding and answers." (Luke 2:46, 47). He was then twelve years old.

"Hearken unto thy father that begat thee, and despise not thy mother when she is old" (Prov. 23:22). These are just a few of the duties of young people that came to my mind: Now we will mention some things concerning the duties of older people:

Solomon said, "Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old he will not depart from it" (Prov. 2:6).

"And, ye fathers, provoke not your children to wrath: but bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord" (Eph. 6:4)

"But speak thou the things which become sound doetrine:

"That the aged men be sober, grave, temperate, sound in faith, in charity, in patience.

"The aged women likewise, that they be in behavior as becometh holiness, . . . teachers of good things,

"That they may teach the young women to be sober, to love their husbands, to love their children,

"To be discreet, chaste, keepers at home, good, obedient to their-husbands, that the word of God be not blasphemed" (Titus 2:1-5)

Oh, there is such great responsibility on us mothers, and grand-mothers; the example we set, and what we teach the little children.

We note what love Paul had for Timothy, and the unfeigned faith was in Timothy himself, his mother, Eunice, and his grandmother, Lois (2 Tim. 1:1-5).

THE NEW KINGDOM

Part 11. The Final Battle. Armageddon.

As the champion of the Philistines, Goliath, defied the armies of Israel, and was met and defeated by the son of Jesse, and the glory of God was revealed in David, so the Son of David is to meet the champion man of sin, in the final struggle of the Gentile nations. This man of sin is known in Revelation as the Beast, but in the book of Daniel as the little horn, with eyes and mouth as a man, and is the Antiehrist.

It seems strange that such should be the case, but it is true; and when the children of Israel were weakened by sin among them, and God had departed from their midst, and a sinful nation was making war against them, and King Saul and all his army feared as a champion of the enemy, in his pride and strength, defied the armies of the living God. was then that the shepherd king went out in the name of the God of Israel, to give the flesh of the giant, and the bodies of the Philistine army to the fowls of the air and to the beasts of the field (See 1 Sam. 17:45-47). Just so will the son of David leave the dead bodies of the soldiers of the God defying beast king for the fowls of heaven to feed upon, and the Beast will be taken alive and cast into the lake of fire (Rev. 19:20, 21).

Already the world is preparing for war on a far greater scale than has been done before. Navies are being increased, and so many machines are bemg added to the air forces. Boys and men are being trained for service in every branch of the army, every effort at limitation seems to be failing, and as it looks now the whole earth will be ready to fall into line with the man of sin when he comes to muster the armies of the world against the Christ. The Pope, in an article in the papers of this country, has warned his people against the coming Red movement, and seems to realize the time is not far away when a red king will be placed upon the throne. and when he is, he will soon appoint the ten kings over the different nations of the earth, and all who are Christian, or claim to follow the teaching of Christ, whether Catholic, Protestant, or Jew, will be the objects of the Antichrist and his armies, and to all these nations so well prepared for war will the devil spirits that John saw coming out of the mouth of the Dragon, and out of the mouth of the Beast, and out of the mouth of the false Prophet, be sent to gather them together to battle against Christ and His armies (Rev. 16:13-16'.

I am glad this red champion, the master man of sin of all time, the beast out of the pit, endued with lower from the dragon, the Devil, and Satan, will have to meet the Master of righteousness, who has conquered even death and hell, and the beast with all his host will not be able to stand against Him and His faithful army, pictured to us, coming on white horses. No matter if the beast does come up out of the pit and is the crowning act of the power of Satan, he must meet his doom at the hands of the Champion of the Cross. For all the fury of hell was turned loose on Jesus as He hung' upon the cross, it only tore away the veil, or natural, and released the supernatural with all power given unto

Him in heaven and in earth. Full well may the angels and all earth sing, "Glory to God in the highest."

The church must arise to meet the needs of the day, just as David met the demands in his time. It will take the whole armour of God to be able to stand. Only people who drink freely of the waters of life can ever hope to overcome the awful spirit of indifference toward the church and its Christ, and the growing hatred for all righteousness. No use to overlook the proplecy of Paul which says,

'.This know also, that in the last days perilous times shall come.

"For men shall be lovers of their own selves, covetous, boasters, proud, blasphemers, disobedient to parents, unthankful, unholy,

"Without natural affection, trucebreakers, falseaccusers, incontinent, fierce, despisers of those that are good,

"Traitors, heady, highminded, lovers of pleasure

more than lovers of God;

"Having a form of godliness, but denying the power thereof: from such turn away" (2 Tim. 31-5.

Also remember the words of Jesus when He said, "They shall put you out of the synagogues: yea, the time cometh, that whosoever killeth you will think that he doeth God service" (John 16:2). We are seeing these words fulfilled more and more, and the time is now here when we ought to be faithful unto death, that we may receive a crown of life (Revelation 2:10).

"And he took his staff in his hand, and chose him five smooth stones out of the brook, and put them in a shepherd's bag which he had, even in a scrip: and his sling was in his hand: and he drew near to the Philistine" (1 Sam. 17:40). This brook was David's place of preparation, his upper room, his place of enduement with power, and he drank deeply until he was fully ready for the conflict, he needed just five smooth stones and he found them there, all of which would just fit his trusted and tried sling. Oh, that the churches would get down before God and wait before Him until they were endued with power from on high, not just a testimony, but a life that is above sin, overcoming the world, a faith in God that will defeat the lions and bears of sin of this time, and fit us to stand in our place against the spirit of the Man of sin, that is now spreading over all the earth. It is the privilege of every Christian in this day to be ready to join the King of kings when He comes to meet the Red champion.

How the world needs a revelation of Jesus Christ! Sin is increasing on every hand. People are in bondage as in the days of Moses, but such a different bondage! Society is demanding so much, and furnishes no means by which this demand can be met. A few years ago, one could live an entire life time in one county, a full flour bin, a barrel with plenty of meat for the family the whole year round, a few home-spun clothes, a good wholesome Christian atmosphere and society was satisfied and people were happy, but now the demand is such that these conditions are inadequate and looked upon as too old-fashioned and out of place. People scorn the old time Gospel. The Bible is an out of date Book, at best only a history of the Jews." Man is no longer the crowning act of God's creation, but is the outcome of evolution, a mere development of some kind of an animal, beginning away back in the dark past, and going into a future just as dark and uncertain, and according to this doctrine, all of life that there is to be had is here and now. This creates a demand for a man who can cause "craft to prosper" (Dan. 8:25). Such a man will become the object of worship, especially when no born again experience is needed, and only the demands of the carnal mind to satisfy (So the anti-God crowd reasons).

No doubt in my mind, that as God looked down upon the earth He saw these awful days coming, and the people living in open defiance of God and His Holy Word, and declaring war upon the Bible. Such an act is to challenge the Lord to battle, for He most surely will defend the Book, "For thou hast magnified thy WORD above all thy name" (Psalm 138:2). As we realize this awful condition, we can see in the Word of God where John got a glimpse of the angel God sent to answer the challenge of the world (Rev. 19:17-19), calling the fowls of the air to come and fill themselves on the flesh of the army of the Beast, and their horses. Such an answer to the Goliath of this time! and as John still looked upon the vision he saw the three unclean spirits like frogs coming out of the mouth of the Beast, and out of the mouth of the Dragon, and out of the mouth of the false Prophet, for they are the spirits of devils working miracles, going forth to the kings of the whole earth, to gather them together to the battle of Armageddon (Rev. 16:13-16). All the preparation going on in the world for war, and no chance to get them to lay down their arms; a common foe must be found upon which to train their implements of death. The remnant of the church, the residue, or that which was left after part was taken out (Dan. 7:19, also 7:7), and answering to the woman who brought forth the man child who was caught up to God and His throne, and she fled into the wilderness where she was cared for and protected from the face of the dragon for three and one-half years (Rev. 12:5, 6), and also who knows but the five foolish virgins may at least foreshadow this group that will make up that number the armies of the Antichrist and his ten appointed kings will seek to destroy because they will not take his number, name, or mark? All these may be that common foe upon which to center the minds and hatred of the whole world, and Christ being the head of all these will be the main one against whom they will come and He will meet them and conquer.

Already in this country men are saying, "The preachers have too much power, and must be stopped. The church is hindering the progress of the world, and also that people are mistaken when they think the days of persecution of Christians is past, for it is not." This no doubt is a thought foreshadowing the awful days of tribulation coming upon the whole world. Preachers, you dare not give too little time and attention to such statements, coming as they do from men of influence in the world. Your flocks are in danger, over whom God has made you the overseer, to give them their portion of His Word in due season. I am persuaded that in the church, there are faithful men and women who would be willing, if the case demanded, to lay down their lives for the Gospel and the people they love. I love to think I am a member of an organization that has in it people of this kind. Praise God! the Antichrist can never overcome such people as these; but some day in the near future must look upon saints like these coming dressed in robes of purest white, and waving the victors' palms, and he must see his red banner fall into the dust to rise no more, and his vast army fall before the sword of the Lord, and the banner of Love lifted over the whole world.

The man of sin, it is written, will break his covenant with the Jews in the middle of the week, and take away the sacrifice (Dan. 9:27 and 12:11). That the temple will be rebuilt in Jerusalem is sure, for we read in 2 Thess. 2:3-5, "Let no man deceive you by any means: for that day shall not come, except there come a falling away first, and that man of sin be revealed, the son of perdition;

"Who opposeth and exalteth himself above all that is called God, or that is worshipped; so that he as God sitteth in the temple of God, shewing himself that he is God.

"Remember ye not, when I was yet with you, I told you these things?"

Paul was preaching the coming of the Antichrist when he was here, and when he comes and convinces. his followers that he is God, they will see no need of any more sacrifices, but will fall down and worship the Beast or his image. But as the three Hebrew children refused to bow before the image Nebuchadnezzar had set up in the plain of Dura, so will the Jews who have returned to Jerusalem. refuse to worship the Beast king or his image to which the false prophet has given life, and causes it to speak, and also causes all, both small and great. to fall down and worship, and also receive his number, name, or mark, and all who do not must be put to death. It is then that the Jews will turn to God and call for His Son from Heaven, and God will answer this prayer and Jesus will appear upon the Mount of Olives east of Jerusalem, and the mountain will divide in the midst; and the children of Israel will say, "Blessed is He that cometh in the name of the Lord." And this will be the second stage of the Second Coming of Jesus, and the battle of Armageddon will be fought, and Christ will be King over the whole earth (Zech. 14). And so will begin the one thousand years of peace on the earth. Truly this is the New Kingdom.

This is not Heaven on earth, but is the fulfillment of the promises of God to the Jews.

CAN A MAN FALL AFTER HE IS SAVED?

I am a reader of the Gem, though I do not take the paper. But as so many are writing on subjects of the Bible, if it will not take up too much room in the Gem, I would like to give a few quotations on a subject that is being taught and preached by many of our preachers and churches, not that I am-

any smarter on this subject, but I do want to say that unless we can back our statements up by the Bible, they are worthless; it is not what man says about it, it's what the Bible teaches: for Paul said, "Let all men be liars and God be true."

Our subject is, "Can a Man Fall After He Is Saved?" "I am the true vine, and my Father is the husbandman. Every branch in me that beareth not fruit he taketh away: and every branch that beareth fruit, he purgeth it, that it may bring forth more fruit" (John 15:1, 2).

"Abide in me, and I in you. As the branch can not bear fruit of itself, except it abide in the vine; no more can ye, except ye abide in me'' (John 15:4).

Now Christ says that we must abide in the vine, if we bear fruit. If do not bear fruit, He will take us away; but many people get mixed up on 1 John 3:9, "Whosoever is born of God doth not commit sin; for his seed remaineth in him; and he cannot sin, because he is born of God." The second word of this verse explains it; "Whosoever is." means at the present time, for the 8th verse of the same chapter says, "He that committeth sin is of the devil." We all know that God created Adam and Eve, a perfect man and woman, gave them just laws to abide by, but they did not abide in them (Gen. 3rd chapter). Now these first two, perfect offsprings of God, backslid; and God gave the very Jewel of Heaven to redeem them.

"For if God spared not the angels that sinned, but east them down to hell, and delivered them into chains of darkness, to be reserved unto judgment"

(2 Peter 2:4).

And the angels which kept not their first estate, but left their own habitation, he hath reserved in everlasting chains under darkness unto judgment of the great day" (Jude 6).

Also the ten virgins: "And the foolish said unto

the wise, Give us of your oil; for our lamps are gone out" (Matt. 25:8).

And the Lord said to the church in Ephesus, Nevertheless I have somewhat against thee, because thou hast left thy first love" (Rev. 2:4).

And to the Laodicean church, He said, "Because thou art lukewarm, and neither cold nor hot, I will

spew thee out of my mouth" (Rev. 3:16).

"Now the Spirit speaketh expressly, that in the latter times some shall depart from the faith, giving heed to seducing spirits, and doctrines of devils" (1 Timothy 4:1).

I have given book, chapter and verse for my sub-Ject. Much more could be given, but I will close.

As I think of this quotation from the Psalmist, and as I look upon the glistening upturned branches of a beautiful tree, I think of the poem:

TREES

By Joyce Kilmer

"I think that I shall never see

A poem lovely as a tree,

A tree whose hungry mouth is pressed Against the earth's sweet flowing breast,

A tree that looks at God all day, And lifts her leafy arms to pray.

A tree that may in summer wear A nest of robins in her hair, Upon whose bosom snow has lain; Who intimately lives with rain. Poems are made by fools like me, But only God can make a tree."

Then I think, how typical of a great forest is human life. In the forest are found the beautiful and the undesired, the strong and the weak, the giant oaks and the pygmies.

The beasts of prey find hiding places in the thick shadows of the forest, and the winged songsters are sheltered by its foliage. The flowers, with bright colors of nature, lift their faces, give fragrance to the shade for a time, and pass away.

The vine, supported by some great monarch-climbs toward the sun. Like man, the woodland dwellers, differing in stature are diverse in design and varied in color, yet depending upon the same mother earth for life. The oak and the violet draw substance from the same source: the birch tree with its paper-like bark must get its material from the same ground as the rough-coated elm.

A cluster of sturdy trees, linking limb in limb, may be able to stand against the tempest that hurls itself upon them, while beneath, the less strong are protected and shielded from its force. One of these cannot fall without its neighbor feeling the shock and sustaining injury. Yet, over the spot where life has ended for the one, the neighbors spread a little wider their branches, to shelter the weak and tender shoots struggling for existence, until they shall be able to stand with their fellows and meet the storms of life.

When the storm strikes the tree, standing alone, no friendly branch or companion reaches out to touch and join in resistance, and when it falls there is none to regret. So is man.

He may feel his independence and think his own strength is sufficient. He may not feel, for a time, the need of human sympathy and fellowship.

But when adversity comes, when sorrow blights, how sweet the companionship of loving friends. As individuals we differ as much as the trees of the forest. In religious beliefs, in mind and temperament, in physical strength and mental equipment we may be unlike, but the church offers an opportunity for a unity that challenges the world, in harmony and devotion to one another.

Let us be deeply sensible of the dreadful consequences that come to ourselves and others by a division in principle, spirit or practice. Let us live this life, that we may be able to possess the life that Paul speaks of in Romans 6:23, "For the wages of sin is death; but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." One has recently said, "While codes regulate almost every other industry, nothing has yet been done about the wages of sin."

SIN

The Bible is the one comprehensive treatise on the subject of sin, dealing, not only with the sinfulness of sin, but with the cure for sin.

Each reader of the Bible should read carefully the first three chapters of Genesis as this gives the first account of sin in the world. First John 3-4 teaches that sin is lawlessness, and that God gave Adam and Eve his law and forbade them to break it under penalty of death. But they wilfully violated it at the subtile suggestion of Satan.

And as Satan came with his tempting allurements, he deceived Adam and Eve, and caused them to commit that awful thing the Lord calls sin, which is causing so much wee and misery in the world today. It should be noticed here that the temptation was not sin, but yielding to the temptation is what brought the curse of sin on man. God placed man in the garden and put him to a test, but it must not be regarded as an evidence of God's disfavor, for James 1:12, says, "Blessed is the man that endureth temptation: for when he is tried, he shall receive the crown of life, which the Lord hath promised to them that love him." Also James 1:2-4.

Sin is a voluntary act. While one may suffer from the sins of others, yet he must give an account for his own sins (Rom. 2:6).

Sin separates from God (Isaiah 59:2).

Sin finds out (Numbers 32:23).

The wages of sin is death (Romans 6:23).

And after this cometh the judgment (Heb. 9:27). It can only be set aside by accepting Jesus as the Savior from sin.

Jesus Himself bore our sins in His own body upon the tree, that we, having died to sin, might live unto

righteousness (1 Peter 2:24).

Notice the word sin. The first letter is "S," and that stands for serpent who brought sin into the world. The last letter is "N," and that stands for nothing, for sin is emptiness; there is nothing in it worth while. But between its beginning and its ending is the big capital letter "I." The only thing to do with this heart center of sin is to let it be crucified with Christ, so that it's not I that live, but Christ liveth in me (Gal. 2:20).

For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son for the sins of the world, and by so doing mani-

fested his great love he had for man.

Because sin is so great in the world, it behooves God's entire force, the army of the Lord, to do all we can to fight the monster to the end of this life. Then as Paul the Apostle has said, There is a crown of righteousness at the end of this Christian warfare.

CHRIST REJECTORS

I am happy to have the opportunity of writing to the Gem, and I hope to be able to say something

to advace the Great Cause.

I wonder "what the end will be?" when I think of Christ rejectors. When dealing with the thought of the rejectors of the Son of God, we face a sad story as old as history. Thanks to our good Brother, Everett Wilson, who speaks a marvelous truth concering the Bible as a "Three in one unit." It being first, a Common Bible, or the Bible we ordinarily read; second, a Numerical Bible, which tells so much Gospel truth in the numbers used in the Bible; and third, a Bible of Proper Names. To the Jews, every proper name means something, so in the name Judas Iscariot, the one whom we may call the chief of Christ's rejectors, we find his history and character, which is proof within itself that God's word is infallible. In studying the Bible concerning the twelve disciples, we find that Judas was the only one from the tribe of Judah. His very name seals the truth that he was of Judah. The great significance of this is the fact that Jesus our Lord was also of the tribe of Judah (Heb. 7:14). In connection with this, I remember hearing a Jew say that ish means man, whereupon-I learn that Kerioth is a city in the inheritance of Therefore, we have the name Judah in Palestine. Judas Iscariot (ish-Kerioth), the man from the cityof Kerioth of Judah, the name of Christ's betrayer. It is a great truth that Christ "came unto his own, and his own received him not."

Upon learning the bitter experience of the man from Kerioth of Judah, we face a stern, vehement, and emphatic rejection of Christ in these days of the fulfillment of the Times of the Gentiles-in the closing days of this age—the End Time of this age. Gentile rejectors of Christ are waxing worse and worse in their continued rejection. I remember hearing Bro. Morris Kullman, a converted Hebrew, preaching in Picher, Oklahoma; and what a powerful, soul-stirring message he delivered! He made an altar call and not a move was made, nor any interest manifested. Whereupon Bro. Kullman spoke with all the earnestness of his soul, saying in part, "Gentiles are quick to hurl defiance in the face of the Jews, calling them 'Christ rejectors' Christ haters, Christ killers,' and at the same time they are rejecting Christ as much as the vilest Jew ever has." His statement is true. Gentiles, our time is fast being fulfilled; how is it going to be with us in
