The pastor of this church is the Rev. E. Sterl Phinney who has lately moved there from the East. The building at the side is the Sunday School annex, with five Sunday school rooms. The church building also has five Sunday school rooms, besides the main auditorium. The auditorium seats about 200 and there is room on the rostrum for a choir of thirty-five people. The church owns a furnished parsonage, has two active ladies' mission circles, a league with an average attendance of about fifty-five, a Sunday school with an average attendance of 119, and quoting from the words of the pastor, "The church is growing in spiritual things, and I feel that the Lord has better things in store for us yet."

PROPHECY

Second Article

Dear Readers of the Gem:

With the geratest of pleasure I continue my discourse on prophecy. Micah 4.1 But in the last days, it shall come to pass, That the mountain of the house of the Lord shall be established in the top of the mountaions, and it shall be exalted above the hills, and people shall flow unto it.

Since that blessed day when God put his law in the minds of his people, and written it in their hearts, The church of God have tought war no more. The nations that have been in war since, they have been mext with saint and sinner; And this will continue on and on; But many of the old soldiers of the cross died before they would give up their faith in the lord, the power of Rome ruled and many lives were taken, But the church of God tought war no more.

And they shall beat their swords in to plowshares, and their spears into prunninghooks. We who read the Bible know the children of Israel fought with swords and spears.

But at the fullfillment of this prophecy, The war tools were beaten into plowshears and prunninghooks; This scripture means just what it says. The Israelites learn war no more they had no more use for speras and swords. So they were beaten into plowshares and prunninghooks. Virse 4 But they shall set every man under his vine, and under his fig tree; and none shall make them afraid; for the mouth of the lord hath spoken it.

Numbers. 21. 21 22; And Israel sent messengers unto Zihon, king of the amorites saying let me pass through thy land, we will not turn into the fields, or into the vine-yards, we will not drink of waters of the well, but we will go along the king high way; untell we pass the borders. Virse 23 Sihon would not suffer Israel to pass through his border, Sihon gethered all his people together, and went out against Israel into the wilderness: and he came

to Johaz, and fought against Israel. Virse 24 And Israel smote him with the edge of the sword, and possessed his land from arnon unto jobbok even unto the children of ammon: for the border of children of ammon was strong. Here we see Israel fought with the sword. Dose Israel now use the sword? No not as in that age. The children of God now use the Sword of the spirit which is the word of God. Yes the Swords and spears have long since been beaten into plowshares and prunninghooks: and were and are Used to till the soil, and prunning the Vineyards; Yes the time come when the childern of Israel were freed from their enemies.

Every man shall set under his Vine, and fig tree: and none shall make them afraid. Let us read Luke. 1. 74-75 That he would grant unto us, that we being delivered out of the hand of our enemies, might serve him without fear in holness and rightness before him all the days of our life. This scripture teach the freedom of the childern of God, they bought land, they put out Vineyards. They was delivered from their enemies, the power of Rom lost her grip; Isa. 40. 3 The voice of him that cryeth in the wilderness prepare ye the way of the lord, make straight in the desert a high way for our God: Virse 4 Every valley shall be exalted, and every mountain and hill shall be made low: and the crooked shall be make straight, and the rough places plain.

Some of our friends think these things are yet to be fullfilled: But we will read from Luke. 3. 4-5: As it is written in the Book of the words of Esaies the prophet, saying the voice of one crying in the wilderness prepare ye the way of the lord make his paths straight: Every valley shall be filled, and every mountain and hill shall be brought low; and the rough ways shall be made smooth: Virse. 6 And all flesh shall see the Salvation of God.

Explanition on the above mentioned scripture. This dosent mean these mountains and hills we now see: Peter Tell us the lord will come as a thief in the Night; In the which the Heavens shall pass away with a great noise, and the elements shall melt with fervent heat, the Earth also and the works therein shall be burned up. Then if the Earth burnes up it will not be the home of the saints: The mountaions was the exalted jews: The valleys was the Gentiles: And Jesus came and delivered the Israelites from under the law, and from their enemies that they could servise him with out fear in holyness all the days their life. Brother Wilson spoke of the first stage of christ returning, dear friends we do not read in God Book of the Stages of our lord comeing: WE read in S T John. 14. Let not ye hearts be trubled belive in God belive also in me, in my father house are many mansions if it were not so I would have told you, I go to prepare a place for you, and if I go and preapare a place for you I will come again and receved you unto my self, that where I am ye may be also.

Rev. 1. 7, Behold he cometh with clouds and every eye shall see him; and they also which pirced him; and all kinders of the earth shall wail because of him even so Amen.

In the above mentioned scripture we find that at the return of our lord every Eye shall see him: which thing could not be if he should come to Jerusalem and reign with only the jews.

Matt. 24. 26 27, Wherefore if they shall say unto you, behold he is in the desert go not forth; belive it not. Any doctrine that teach the return of our lord to any part of the Earth and not be seen by all men is the very doctrine jesus said not belive. Virse 27 As the lighning com-

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EARTH'S PROPHETIC WEEK

By Elder B. F. Brown Continued from last month

In studying the Bible we find that, among the divisions of its great body of truth, seven themes or subjects with seven parts each are prominent, and that by closely following these themes through the Bible, we are able to see the Bible as one Book, of which the one true and living God is the Author, and that the one great theme is the person and work of the Lord Jesus Christ: and at the same time, following these themes will greatly help us in understanding and rightly dividing the word of truth.

THE SEVEN SEVENS

I. The Seven Days of Creation Week—No doubt these were twenty-four hour days, but evidently they are typical of the prophetical week of seven days of one thousand years each, making a total of seven thousand years, the total span of time to be covered by the history of the earth.

Notice that with each of these days except the seventh, it says, "And the evening and the morning were the first (second, third, fourth, fifth, sixth) day." So God called these periods of time "days," and we learn from 2 Peter 3:8, that "one day is with the Lord as a thousand years, and a thousand years as one day;" so each of these days must represent one thousand years of earth's history. Then these seven days of creation week are a pattern of the Hebrew week, also of the week in this dispensation, except that the day of worship and rest has been changed from the seventh day to the first day.

The seventh day was the Sabbath Day, a day of rest (Gen. 2:2, 3), and is typical of the seventh one thousand year day, the thousand years reign of Christ on earth, as described in Revelation 20.

The first six days of both creation week and earth's prophetic week constitute man's work day; and the sixth day of prophetic week is now near its close; what man does, he must do before the day closes, for he will have no time to buy oil after his day closes. This is the sixth day; the seventh day will dawn soon, and will be the Kingdom age.

II. The Seven Dispensations:

1. Intocence (Gen. 1:28). In this dispensation man was innocent, his invironment was perfect, and he was required to be obedient unto God; but man failed under the test and the dispensation closed with his expulsion from the garden of Eden.

2. Conscience (Gen. 3:23). Under this dispensation man must gain his living by the sweat of his face, battling with the earth under a curse. He now had an experimental knowledge of good and evil; and was required to choose good and reject evil, and to worship God through sacrifice. The result of this test is stated in Gen. 6:5, "And God saw that the wickedness of man was great in the earth, and that every imagination of the thoughts of his heart was only evil continually." The dispensation ended in the Judgment of the Flood, 1656 years after the creation of Adam.

3. Human Government (Gen. 8:20-22). This was the government of man by man. Man was responsible to govern the world for God, and the

I am still thinking, and seriously meditating about the happy by-gone days when our fathers and loved ones were here with us, and folks had old time religion; and I thank God that some folks have it yet, and it will still be here when Jesus comes.

"Search the scriptures, for in them ye think ye have eternal life; and they are they which testify of me" (John 5:39). Search! We all seem to be busy searching, some for one thing, some for another; some for some office, some for money, some for pleasure, some for beauty, and almost innumerable things; can we say as David said, "Search me, O God, and know my heart: try me, and know my thoughts; and see if there be any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting" (Psalm 139:23, 24). Prosperity will return just as soon as fifty-one ner cent of the people go right spiritually. thinking of an old minister that pastored our little church one year at Mt. Olive. He had old time religion. He rode over these Ozark hills on horse back and carried his Bible and hymn book in his saddleriders. There were many, many revivals conducted by him and the Lord blessed his work. When he started a song, most everybody sang; when he prayed, the Christians knelt on their knees with him; then when he gave an invitation to the sinners, he would walk down the aisle singing, "The old ship of Zion, it has landed many thousands and can land as many more; oh glory hallelujah!" Once all that had come to the altar were saved, and he said, "Brethren, the Lord has cleaned up the altar; we will have to sow some more seed." His name was Larkin Jones, and some of you remember him as well as I, but if time lasts much longer he will be remembered no more. He would sing, "Oh, give me the old time religion; O, come, let us kneel before the Lord our Maker, for he is our God: and we are the people of his pasture, and the sheep of his hand. Today if you will hear his voice, harden not your heart: Oh, I wish you would! I am so glad that our Father in Heaven tells of his love in the Book he has given. Wonderful things in the Bible I see; O, what a wonder that Jesus loves me!" The old people could have a part in the worship and be happy, but they don't want to sing these dancing tunes, that they who follow dancing sing. "God is a Spirit and seeketh such to worship him as worship him in Spirit and in truth."

Again he said, "The prayer of a righteous man availeth much." Have you ever stopped to think how seriously the work of God's church is blocked by the dead Christians who are not willing to stop long enough to get power from God to him acceptably? When General Gordon was in Africa, he was very busy; but he found time to pray every morning. There was spread outside of his tent a handkerchief to remind the soldiers that their General was having an interview with the great Geteral of heaven and earth. He was on his knees praying, and before him lay an open Bible. Mr. Potts, a Quaker, followed George Washington on one occasion at Valley Forge, and saw him on his knees in prayer. He returned and told his family he was sure the American cause would prevail, because he had seen the American Commander in prayer. Never was prayer needed more than it is needed just now! the great people of the earth today are the people who pray: these are the people who put prayer first. These are the people today who are doing the most for God in winning souls. We hear a great deal said these days about the Old Age pension, which would be right and good, so far as I know, but nothing to compare with the Old Age

STEWARDSHIP

"The earth is the Lords, and the fulness thereof; the world and they that dwell therein."

God's Word can speak louder and contain more than all that man can ever tell; and in writing on Stewardship, it will be wise to let God's Word speak as often as possible. We see by the introduction, that everything is in God's hands. John tells us that everything was made by Him, and David says He posesses all.

Everything must have a beginning, and the beginning of stewardship is what we want just now, in order to have a foundation to build on.

Genesis 1:26 contains more than we will be able to explain. With God the owner of all things, He has power and authority to appoint the first steward. Stewardship is as old as God's first creatures that were placed upon the face of the earth. No doubt, when Adam was given such a high position as steward over all God had made, he felt very humble, and yet rejoiced to know his Maker had entrusted such great treasures into his hands.

Adam, like many today, didn't prove a good steward, but drifted away from his first love and confidence. We can't go into details to explain Adam's failure, and why he failed, But we must place before you the different stewards mentioned in God's word. We will refer you to a passage by the Apostle Paul, 2 Cor. 8:5. "And this they did, not as we hoped, but first gave their own selves to the Lord." A steward must first acknowledge his Creator, then make a full surrender of self to Him; and then God will entrust him with a field to work in, and talents to work with. Then it is our privilege to be a wise steward or a foolish one.

When we begin to speak of stewardship, some will say, "No one can livelike that, and besides, all that was done away with back under the law."

responsibility rested upon the whole human race. lan again proved a failure, and the testing ended in the confusion of tongues at the tower of Babel, but the dispensation continued under the Noahic Covenant until the call of Abraham, B. C. 1917, or

2083 years after the creation of Adam.

4. Promise. (Gen. 12:1-3). This dispensation began with the call of Abraham, 2083 years after the creation of Adam, and lasted 430 years (Gal. 3:17), half of which time (about 215 years) was spent in Egyptian bondage. The dispensation ended at Sinai, but the Covenant of Promise made with Abraham, being unconditional, is still in force.

5. Law (Exo. 19:8). This dispensation extended from Sinai to Calvary-from the Exodus to the Cross, a period of 1520 years. The testing of Israel under Law continued for about 900 years, and ended in the judgment of the Captivities, but the dispen-sation itself continued under the Mosaic or Law Covenant to the Cross, when it was suspended.

- 6. Grace (John 1:17). Here law, which was connected with Moses and works, ends: and grace connected with Christ and faith begins. The law demands righteousness, but cannot give it (Rom. 8:3): under grace God gives righteousness. The test under grace is acceptance or rejection of Christ, with right living and fruits unto righteousness following. This dispensation has now lasted about 1900 years, and we must be near the close of this sixth dispensation, this sixth day, for we see practically all the signs the prophets and our Lord and Savior said would be maifested at the end of this age. This dispensation or age will end with the coming of the Lord at the Rapture (1 Thess. 4:15-18).
- 7. Dispensation of the Fulness of Times, or the Kingdom Age (Eph. 1:10, 11). This dispensation covers the seventh and last day or age of the span of time allotted to earth's history; it will continue for one thousand years This means more than the "fulness of time" (Gal. 4:4), when Christ came in His first advent. It includes all the Gospel times: "The ends of the ages" (1 Cor. 10:11); "the times of the Gentiles" (Luke 21:24); "the times the Father hath put in His own power" (Acts 1:7); "the times of refreshing" (Acts 3:19); "the times of restitution of all things" (Acts 3:21); all these and many other "times" God will "gather together in one all things in Christ.'

God's purpose to have a people and a church on earth existed in the mind of God from the beginning, long before they existed in creation; and God before ordained, or predestinated, that all who by faith and obedience become His children shall be led by the Spirit; and being children, they shall be heirs of God, equal with Christ as heirs; "if so be that We suffer with him, that we may be also glorified together" (Rom. 8:14-17).

Yes, the Lord's obedient children have an inheritance in Him, being "sealed with that Holy Spirit of promise which is the earnest (first payment) of our inheritance" (Eph. 1:13, 14), and the Lord's inheritance is in His saints (Eph. 1:18). This will be fully realized when the kingdoms of this world become the kingdoms of our Christ (Rev. 11:15).

III. The Seven Sacrifices or Offerings (Lev. 1:

1 to 7:38). Under the Law of Moses God's people (Israel) had to approach God in their worship by or through sacrifices and offerings; and in the sacrifices they had a cover for their sins. These sacrifices could not take away sins, but were types of Christ, and were offered in anticipation of the Cross (Heb. 5:1-10 and Heb. 10:10-18). So what the bloody sacrifices typified is realized in Christ. The Hebrews who offered these sacrifices, looking forward to the coming of the Lamb of God, with faith in Him whose sacrifice of Himself would take away sin, were saved. They looked forward, and we look back to the Cross. To be continued

CONDITIONS OF TODAY By Elder Winford Davis

"Watchman, what of the night?" (Isaiah 21:11).

In studying the watchmen of Israel, their position, obligations, responsibilities, etc., we see a striking likeness relative to our ministry of today. The Gospel minister is, or should be, as a watchman upon the wall to warn people of approaching danger.

Surely no alert God called minister would deny the fact that God's hand is undertaking in a powerful way the world over at this time, and that we are being punished for our sins.

If I were asked to give my honest opinion of the main cause of our chaotic condition today I would be obliged to say, though with shame, "An apostate and compromising ministry." Some might say, "The church;" but brother, sister, the ministers are the leaders of the church, and no stream ever gets higher than its fountain head. You are largely right when you mention the church, but just go a little farther and mention the leaders. When you find that a one time fundamental church has gone modernistic, if you will trace the matter out you will usually find that some modern (which as used in this connection means faithless and powerless) minister has led them away from their spiritual life. How applicable would be the words of Jeremiah today as we hear the weeping prophet say in the last two verses of his 5th chapter, "A wonderful and horrible thing is committed in the land. The prophets prophesy falsely, and the priests bear rule by their means; and my people love to have it so; and what will ye do in the end thereof?" Isn't that exactly the condition today? Did you notice that statement, "My people love to have it so?" Paul's prophecy is being fulfilled when he said, "They will heap to themselves teachers having itching ears."

As we look out upon this night of sin, we see great and approaching dangers, and already we can see enemies within our gates. The populace of any nation have reason to cause them to tremble when they see their government ignoring God. To ignore God is but to invoke wrath. Never before in the history of this nation was God so ignored and His counsel so unsought as it is today. Only past history and the Word of God have to be considered to determine the outcome except there be a quick returning to God and the Bible. Immediately after the World War the words of that Christian statesman and defender of the faith, William Jennings Bryan, were well spoken as follows: "Conditions will never be any better until there is a general returning to God." How our nation is suffering today for the need of such God fearing men as we have had in the past. Communism is being turned loose upon our country like a flood, and how could we expect anything else when the flood gates have been lifted? In my mind, one of the greatest mistakes that has lately been made was the establishing of negotiations with the Soviet Union of Russia; and that, in spite of opposition, authorities tell us, by such organizations as The American Legion, The U.S. Chamber of Commerce, The American Federation of Labor, etc., and when thirtyfive other nations had refused to do so. It is an evident fact that Russia wants to make this country "Red," and considering our internal conditions we are getting well enough ripe for the picking too.

Then we have in our country chartered Atheistic organizations which until a few years ago were not known, especially as legally chartered organizations.

Then we have whisky back in a worse way than ever. We were promised that the old saloon would not come back, but instead we got something worse. Our young girls are practically made bar tenders, and our youth loyal buyers. In the language of one recent note, "We are not going to sink, we are sinking now."

War is imminent; we might well expect a break anywhere any time. Lloyd George of England recently said, "The world is in a jangle. The nations are prowling, snarling and baring their teeth at each other. They are licking their wounds now and refilling their veins. Any moment a mistaken gesture or misunderstood arrangement may make them spring again at each others throats."

The nations are crying peace, yet

preparing for war more than ever before. God's word says, "When they say peace and safety sudden destruction cometh upon them." The same conditions we are told were true just before the outbreak of the World War. Even early in the spring of 1914 the U. S. and Great Britian were carrying on negotiations relative to matters of world peace, and then like a thunderbolt out of a clear sky, the entire world, practically, was thrown into a holocaust of hell. How ready conditions are for something like that today!

Yet in all this that is so alarming to many, and so much more dangerous than multitudes stop to think, we can see the direct fulfillment of our Bible. Does this unusual uprising of dictators mean anything? It surely does. Does this setting forth of so many national works mean anything? Certainly it does. Even in our own country there has been the granting of dictatorial powers and the mark was set forth. According to God's word we are soon to see the uprising of a super world man, and conditions ere surely getting ripe and ready and the way being paved for his on coming. I recently picked up the February issue of the Cosmopolitan Magazine and was reading an article by Arthur Brisbane. The staff of that magazine asked him to write an article on the outlook for 1935. Some of his statements were as follows: "The events of 1935 depend almost entirely upon the actions of no more than a half dozen men of the world." He mentioned Mussolini of Italy, Stalin of Russia, Hitler of Germany, our own President, etc. He further said: "Though these men seem to be antagonistic one toward another, and irrecencilable, yet they are working with the same idea in mind, that is, that one man must rule; some one must find the solution to the present world problems and then force it." I wonder if Arthur Brisbane knew he was traiking God's Word.

This certainly is a time when we need to know our bearings, spiritually speaking, for there is a storm at sea, and many light houses are gone out. If you are not certain of your bearings, you had better stop and check up, for the winds are rough and very uncertain; but let us not forget that the one great Beacon Light, which is Christ, will ever be shining. In June, 1933, we were driving in the Ohio river bottom on the Kentucky side about midnight. Being confronted with great difficulties in crossing the river so late at night, we were thrown off and were not so certain about our way. I said to Rev. Shahan who was with me, "Let me out, I will find the north star and see which way we are going." We stopped and got our bearings, and made sure we were right before risking our way farther in the dark. So it is on this pathway of life, it is necessary to stop, dear reader, and, as the poet says in song, "Think on thy way."

Alright, we will call Abraham on the stand, and see what he says about the matter. After Abraham had gained a great victory and met Melchisedec, he gave him a tenth of all (Gen. 14:20). When we give a tenth of all, it not only means money, but it means our time, talents, goods, money and all. Now trace Abraham's life and you will find that God blessed him all through his life.

Next we will hear Jacob's testimony on stewardship (Gen. 28:22). He made a vow, and said he would give God a tenth of all. Many say they would tithe, if they only knew what part was God's. No need in being confused, when these great men gave

tithes of all. Every one knows what he has in his hands that he calls his own; and God requires the tenth to take away selfishness from His children. He doesn't need the tenth, it all belongs to Him.

Hag. 2:8—"The silver is mine, and the gold is mine."

Psalm 50:10—"For every beast of the forest is mine, and the cattle upon a thousand hills."

God's plan for financing His kingdom work has always been the tithing system; and a simple way to express it is: We pay tithes and give freewill offerings.

The great depression of these last seven years is just a repetition of the times mentioned in the book of Amos, when the people were three years behind with their tithes and offerings.

Then it would be well to read the third chapter of Malachi, and see what God says to His people concerning the tithe: "Will a man rob God?" If a curse came upon the nation in Malachi's day, why wouldn't it be the same with the United States of America, if God has been robbed? The Pharisees were making tithing the first thing in their religious program and Jesus rebuked them. He said, Love and mercy should come first, but the other they should not leave undone. Some are leaving it all off. When the church of today gets back to God's plan of financing His work, we can have schools, churches, parsonages, and money to send missionaries to all parts of the God lays down both a challenge and a promise: "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts, if I will not open you the widows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it."
