PROPHECY

Dear Readers of the Gem, we are happy to continue our discourse on Prophecy. Prophecy means foretelling future events. Among the last things we discussed in Article 2 were the distrustion of this Earth, Peter, says seeing then that all these things shall be dissolved, what manner of persons ought ye to be in all holy conversation and Godliness, looking for and hasting to the comeing of the Day of God where in the Heavens being on fire shall be .disolved and the elements shall melt with fervent heat; 2. Peter. 3.11 12 keep in mind dear readers peter was writing by Inspiration and we must belive his writings. and he said the Earth would burn up, verse 13 speaks of a new heaven and a new earth; we will discuss this later. The earth on which we live is the theme now we are discussing. We quote Zechariah 14. 4, And his feet shall stand in that day upon the mount of olives which is before Jerusalem on the East, I just use the words in each verse that is touching on the subject in view, and if the readers choose they may read all the verse or verses, I do this to save space. Bethany was siturated on the mount of Olive. Mark tells us, And when they come nigh to Jerusalem unto bethphage and bethany at the mount of Olives, he sendeth forth his disciples. Mark 11. 1, other proff, Luke. 19. 29, S T John. 11. 18;

I quote from Acts. 1. 6, When they therefore were come together they asked of him lord will thou at this time restore again the kingdom to Israel? it seemed as the disciples were looking for the kingdom to be restored to Israel as they once had it: Verse 7 of the above mentioned chapter; And he said unto them, it is not for you to know the times or the seasons which the father hath put in his own power.: In fact the Israelites had no promise of a political king as they once had.

Proff. Ezekiel. 21. 25, This saith the lord God; Remove the diadem and take off the crown; this shall not be the same"; exalt him that is low, and abase him that is high,: all Bible readers know they had earthly kings untell Jesus came and set up that which men had loward.

Yes, he set it up; Jesus was Born King and ever element of the kingdom exested in the days of christ, he were their king, He is our king. The prophecy says it shall not be the same, keep in mind dear readers that after the prophecy of Daniel was fullfilled we have had one king; you may read again Daniel 2. 44, Christ Jesus is our king we are his subjects in his kingdom, some folks and some preachers teach the church and the kingdom the same; The Church are made up of the members of christ and they are the subjects of the kingdom But not the kingdom.

The word tell or untell means a limited time, so christ must reign tell all enemies is put under his feet, and then cometh the end when he shall deliver up the kingdom to God.

Luke 22.16, For I say unto you I will not any more eat thereoff untell it be fulfilled in the kingdom of God; Matt. 26. 29, But I say unto you I will not drink hence forth of this fruit of the Vine, untell that day when I drink it new with you in my fathers kingdom. Oh Yes, we will eat and drink with christ in the kingdom of God: This eating will take place after christ has delivered up the kingdom to God: At that time God will wipe all tears from our eyes, and there shall be no death, nether sorrow nor crying, Nether shall be any more pain, for former things are passed away. Rev. 19. 7, Let us be glad and rejoice and give honor to him; For the marriage of the lamb is come, and his wife hath made herself ready.

I would like to ask my friends will these things take place in the New kingdom that Brother Wilson says will be setup in Jerusalem? Will there be no pain, No sorrow, No tears, No-death, No crying, No dieing, in the New Kingdom?

I dont find nowhere in the Bible where Christ will set up a new kingdom. Christ is king over the kingdom that John the Baptist preached at hand, Yes, John the Baptist, The twelve apostles, and the seventy sent out, all preached the kingdom of heaven at hand. So the kingdom have long been set up.

And at the second comeing of our lord instead of setting up a new kingdom he will deliver up the kingdom he is now king over; And God the Father will take charge and we will eat and drink in the kingdom of God; There we will walk the golden streets of the Heavenly Home, there we will meet our love ones who have gone on and are at rest now with God.

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EARTH'S PROPHETIC WEEK

IV. The Seven Feasts of Jehovah (Lev. 23:4-44). These were seven great religious feasts which the Jews were required to keep every year unto the first coming of Christ .These were given in the Law of Moses, and continued in force from the giving of the Law at Sinai to the Cross, about 1487 years, beginning about the middle of the third thousand year day and ending early in the fifth thousand Since the observance of these feasts covers about 2,500 years of earth's history, we are giving a brief explanation of each of them:

The Passover (vs. 4, 5). The Passover is to Israel a memorial of their deliverance from Egyptian bondage: it is typical of "Christ our Passover, sacrificed for us' (1 Cor. 5:7). This Feast was kept on the 14th day of the first month (Nisan), at evening, until the Lamb of God (slain from the foundation of the world) should be offered for the sins of whole world.

The Passover fortold the crucifixion of Christ.

The Feast of Unleavened Bread (vs. 6-8) When Israel kept This Feast in also memorial. this Feast, they were reminded, or should have been reminded of the sufferings and death of Him who should be crucified for the sins of the world, for the Passover lamb was a type of the Lamb of God. When Christians cat unleavened bread in the Communion service, discerning the Lord's body, they do it in remembrance of Him who died to redeem them from sin (1 Cor. 11:23-26). And none but unleavened bread should ever be used in the Communion service, for leaven represents evil.

3. Feast of First Fruits (vs. 10-14). This Feast is typical of the resurrection-Christ first, then they that are Christ's at His coming (1 Cor. 15:23; 1 Thess. 1:13-18). By this Feast the Jews understood that they should have part in the resurrection at the "last day" (John 11:24); and Martha was made to understand that Jesus is the "resurrection and the life;" so they that live for Him in this life

will live with Him in Glory.

4. The Feast of Weeks or Pentecost (vs. 15-22). The wave-loaves, two of them, baked with leaven, were offered (waved) at Pentecost, fifty days after The wave-sheaf typified the risen the wave-sheaf. Christ and those that should rise with Him, and was offered without leaven, which represents evil, for there is no evil in Christ: but the wave-loaves, which typified the church, were baked with leaven, for there is still some evil in the church. The descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost united the many individual disciples into one body, the church; so the wave-loaves, many particles united into one body or loaf, represented the church, which should be endued with the Holy Spirit and power (Acts 1:8) fifty days after the resurrection typified by the Feast of First Fruits on the first day of the week of Passover week.

Of these four feasts, three of them came in the first month (Nisan) of the Hebrew sacred year and the fourth feast in the third month (Tammuz), then there are four months without any feasts. Jesus, as He sat on the curb at Jacob's well, said unto

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His disciples, "Say not ye, There are yet four months, and then cometh harvest?" (John 4:35), He meant these four months. They represent the church period, from the Cross to the Crown, the time between the sufferings of Christ and His glory. It is the Dispensation of Grace.

The Feast of Trumpets (vs. 24, 25). Feast is prophetic and refers to the regathering of Israel after the church age ends. Perhaps the Rapture will take place at the Feast of Trumpets; for this feast celebrated a finished harvest, a time of rejoicing, a delightful time; hence the word "Rapture" signifies an ineffable joy and delight. This Feast comes in our month of September; then will begin the seventieth week (seven years) of Daniel's prophecy (Dan. 9:24-27). During this seven years the Gospel of the Kingdom will be preached (Mt. 24:14). The Antichrist will be reigning, and all the things set forth in Revelation, chapters six to the end of chapter nineteen will take place on the earth. One reason why Bible readers have such difficulty in understanding the Book of Revelation is, that they fail to use the key to the book given in Rev. 1:19, together with Rev. 4:1. "The things which thou hast seen" are written in the first chapter; the "things which are" are written in chapters two and three; and the "things which shall be hereafter" begin with chapter four and continue through the book. The "things which are," mean the church and the things considered with it, and the "things which are" are still here, for the church is still here. After all the members of the true church are taken in the Rapture, then the "things which shall be hereafter" will be in manifestation on the earth. From the beginning of chapter four of the Revelation, the word "church' does not appear again until all is fulfilled; and I believe that Rev. 4:1 is the fulfillment of 1 Thess. 4:14-17. For seven years following the Rapture Satan will be unhindered, for the Holy Spirit will go with the church; it will be the "time of trouble," a time of "great tribulation." See Mt. 24:21; 2 Thess. 2:1-12.

The Day of Atonement (vs. 26-32). This Feast shows Israel, first gathered back to Palestine in their sins, but afterward they repent and are blessed. For forty-two months (3½ years), or for the first half of the seven years' reign of Antichrist, the Jews will serve him as their Messiah, worshipping at their temple at Jerusalem, which will be rebuilt; and it is reported that the material for this new temple is all cut out, prepared, and ready, that the temple may be put up quickly without the sound of a hammer. It is now stored somewhere in Italy, waiting for the proper time to build, when it will be transported to Palestine and the temple erected. after three and one-half years he (Antichrist) will take away their sacrifice and oblation, and will show his real character, then will begin Jacob's trouble. which will continue three and one-half years, but they will repent and be saved out of it (Jer. 39:7). The first three and one-half years we call, The Tribulation, the second or last three and one-half years we call, The Great Tribulation.

The Day of Atonement typifies Israel's repentance and restoration. Just as Moses, who was a type of Christ the great Deliverer, when he attempted to deliver his people, the Israelites from Egyptian bondage (Exo. 2:1-15; Acts 7:20-28): so was Christ rejected when He came to deliver His people, the Jews (See John 1:11; Acts 7:51-53; Mt. 23:37-38; Mt. 27:25). Yes, the Jews rejected their Messiah, He did not deliver them, but they crucified Him, saying, "Let His blood be on us, and on our children." That blood is still on the Jews, and they are still "without a king, and without a prince, and without a sacrifice," etc. (Hosea 3:4). Instead of accepting their Deliverer and being delivered by Him, they rejected Him and crucified Him; and their house is left unto them desolate (Mt. 23:38).

While Moses was in rejection he married a Gentile bride (Exo. 2:16-21). Likewise, Christ, after His rejection, "as a noblemon, went into a far country to receive for himself a kingdom, and to return" (Luke 19:12). And He delivered unto His servants things which they are responsible to keep and use while He is away; and He said unto them, "Occupy till I come." Christ is still away, and while He is away (in rejection by the Jews), His Gentile bride, the true church, is being made ready (2 Cor. 11:2; Eph. 5:25-32), and for her He is soon coming.

After forty years Moses appeared again to Israel as their deliverer and was accepted (Ex. 4:29-31); likewise will Christ come again as Israel's Deliverer and will be accepted, and rule over them in righteousness in His Kingdom. Long after Israel's deliverance from Egyptian bondage, because of their sins, they were cut off and sent into captivity, and God had said, "I will punish you seven times (2520 years) for your sins" (Lev. 26:18, 21, 24, 28). Yes, the Jews (natural branches) were broken off, and the Gentiles (wild olive branches) were graffed in "until the fulness of the Gentiles be come in" (Rom. 11:13-25). The times of the Gentiles (Luke 21:24) is nearly full, will be full at the end of this Dispensation of Grace, which is near its close; and the next thing on God's program is the coming of the Lord into the air to call His children unto Himself; then will begin the seventieth week (the last seven years) of Daniel's prophecy (Dan. 9:24-27). During this seven years the Gospel of the Kingdom will be preached by Jews (Matt. 24:14), the Antichrist will be reigning, and all the things set forth in Revelation, chapter six to end of nineteenth chapter will take place on the earth. Jesus says in Matt. 24:14 that the end (of this age) will come when the "Gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations." This is the Gospel that John the Baptist, the Lord Himself, and His disciples preached, but it was suspended when the Lord was rejected by the Jews; but they will hear this Gospel at that time, and many will be converted; and they will be ready to accept their King when He comes in glory to set up His kingdom here on earth, at the end of the seven years of the tribulation (Hosea 6:1-3; Matt. 23:39; Isaiah25:9).

But the young man knew there was no need of sitting up to watch in a cabin that was hallowed by the Word of God and consecrated by the voice of prayer. So, if by chance you are in the old path, and stop at a home where they read the Bible and pray, and sing old time religion, you perhaps will see one of these old song books, that to my own knowledge have been in use sixty years, and the first song I ever learned to sing with the music is the first song in the book, "Awake and sing the song of Moses and the Lamb, Awake every heart and every tongue, to praise the Savior's name.'

I think of Brother Jackson Barnett, one of the old pioneer preachers, that once rode over these Ozark hills on horseback. He witnessed hundreds of conversions, went through the heat and cold; and "Old Time Religion" was one of his favorite songs. Bro. Jim Miller heard the old singers here in this part of the country, and he knows the half has never been told. He said he never felt better in life.

Isaiah said, "And a highway shall be there, and a way, and it shall be called The way of holiness. . . . No lion shall be there, nor any ravenous beast shall go up thereon, it shall not be found there; but the redeemed shall walk there: and the ransomed of the Lord shall return, and come to Zion with songs and everlasting joy upon their heads: they shall obtain

joy and gladness, and sorrow and sighing shall flee away" (Isa. 35:8-10)

"Sing praises unto his name: for it is pleasant." We know this is true by experience. When we had our little children at home with us, we had an organ, and there were two neighbor men in the community that led singing, Jim Bolen and Willie Thornhill. They would have singing in our home; and it was home, sweet home, be it ever so humble, there's no place like it to me.

Well, Easter Sunday is forever past for 1935, but Jesus is alive for ever more. I used to hear father and mother sing, "Mary to the Savior's Tomb." I did not understand it at that time, but it means Jesus rose from the dead and is alive for ever more." This is the greatest blessing that ever came to humanity; and then to know we can worship Him by singing songs of praise to His holy name!

I think just now of my dear old father, how he did sing, "What a Friend We Have in Jesus," and another, "I Am So Glad Our Father In Heaven, Tells of His Love in the Book He has Given." Although he has been gone to the Glory land 41 years, I remember them well.

David said, "Serve the Lord with gladness: come before his presence with singing" (Psa. 100:2).

"I will sing unto the Lord as long as I live: I will sing praises to my God while I have my being" (Psalm 104: 33).

Oh, there is so much said in the Word of God about song: John the Revelator said, "I heard the voice of harpers, harping with their harps and they sang as it were a new song before the throne, and no man could learn that song but the hundred forty and four thousand which were redeemed from the earth."

"He is risen." This why we can worship Him in song, praise His holy name! "And at midnight Paul and Silas prayed and sang praises to God, and suddenly there was a great earthquake, so that the foundations of the prison were shaken: and immediately all the doors were opened, and every ones bands were loosed."

"He is risen." If it were not so our preaching and singing would all be in vain.

Jesus said to Martha, "I am the resurrection and the life: he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live: and whosoever liveth and believeth in me shall never die." When we all get to Heaven, and when we all see Jesus, we'll sing and shout the victory.

This is the inscription we often see written on the doorpost of the shop in which medicines are sold.

Some of us have had our experiences with night bells when sudden illness has overtaken some member of the household. When the sick have rapidly grown worse, how have we hurried through the silent street when only here and there a light glimmered from some chamber window; how eagerly have we pulled the night bell at our physician's door, and then with prescription in hand, have sounded the alarm at the place where the remedy was to be procured. Those of us who have had these lonely midnight walks, and have given quick relief. know the meaning of that Bible text. "Arise, cry out in the night seasons of trouble and distress," so often spoken of in God's word.

Under the simile of night, the word vididly pictures those times when the the skies are darkness, and apprehensions gather like fancied spectres to make us uneasy or afraid.

If prosperity be likened to the noon-day, the seasons of perplexity or distress may be likened to the night time. Perhaps some of the readers of this paragraph may be in a gloomy night season of poverty or bereavement, or of spiritual doubt and depression; each heart knoweth its own bitterness.

Friend, arise and pull the night bell of prayer; God your Father says to you: "Call upon me in the time of trouble, I will deliver thee and thou shalt glorify me." Centuries ago it was said of certain people, "They cried unto the Lord in their trouble, and He delivered them out of their distresses."

There are different kinds of prayer: there is the calm communion of the soul with God; there is the affectionate converse of the believer with Him in

There are many varieties of night calls for relief, from the sudden cry of little ones in their cribs, to the shout for help in the street, or the eager call under the physician's window. These are all types of the prayer which you are to pour out into the

ear of God in seasons of difficulty, or distress, or danger.

THE LORD'S SUPPER

Dear Editor and Gem Readers:

. We begin with the 12th chapter of Exodus, how God commanded Moses to make ready for the Passover. This was about 1500 years before Jesus was born of the Virgin Mary.

"And God said unto Moses, this day shall be unto you for a memorial; and ye shall keep it a feast to the Lord throughout your generations; ye shall keep it a feast by an ordinance for ever." Space will not allow us to take up every point of the Passover, but it was for a memorial of the deliverance of the children of Israel from Egypt. This continued until Christ instituted the Lord's Supper.

God commanded Moses to make ready the Passover: Christ commanded Peter and John to prepare the Passover, and He (Christ) sat down and the twelve apostles with Him. Christ and the twelve apostles ate the Passover supper and as they did eat Christ "took bread, and gave thanks, and brake it, and gave unto them, saying, This is my body which is given for you: this do in remembrance of me. Likewise also the cup after supper, saying This cup is the New Testament in my blood, which is shed for you. But, behold, the hand of him that betrayeth me is with me on the table" (Luke 22:19, 21).

Some one has said that Judas Iscariot was not there when Christ instituted the Lord's Supper. I don't like to have confusion, for the Lord said, "My house shall be a house of prayer," but I would have you notice Matt. 26:17-30; Mark 14:12-26; Luke 22; and John 13. I say that Christ and the twelve apostles were present at the Passover; Christ and the twelve were present when the Lord's Supper was instituted; and Christ and the twelve apostles were there when Christ washed the apostle's feet; and all of this took place the same night.

All right now, who should partake of the Lord's Supper? Bro. Paul tells us (1 Cor. 11:28), "But let a man examine himself, and so let him eat of that bread and drink of that cup. For he that eateth and drinketh unworthily, eateth and drinketh damnation to himself, not discerning the Lord's body." But I would have you notice that word unworthily—it is not worthy. If I waited until I felt worthy to preach a sermon, I would never preach one: if we wait until we feel worthy to eat the Lord's Supper, it might be a long time. If you are worthy to have your name on a church book, you ought to eat the bread and drink the cup, for Christ said by this we show forth His death till He comes. We should do this in remembrance of His death; if we take it any other way we have not done as He said. If we fail to remember Christ's suffering for our sins, and it is not memorial

of His death, then we have taken the emblems unworthily, for it is to refresh our minds back to the time He died for our sins. Paul tells us not to come together for a jubilee, or for a big time with our friends, but to eat the Lord's Supper. So this supper belongs to the Lord, and all Christians belong to Him. I have no right to invite any one, or exclude any one: I say that if you are a Christian, you belong to the Lord, and it is your duty to partake to show Chrict's death to the world. Don't forget that I believe God has some people in all the churches-I mean in local, visible, organized bodies. Just because the government is different in different churches doesn't cause me to think that all people that don't helong to the Free Will Baptist church are going to hell. We have 48 states in the United States, and I live in Arkansas, and Arkansas has its law making body; they make our laws and we abide by them, or pay the penalty for breaking them. So the other states have their law making bodies, that make their laws, and the people that live in the other states are under their laws, not under Arkansas laws, but we don't say they don't belong to the Union of the 48 states. If we as Free Will Baptist would not let other people that belong to different churches commune with us, then we would have a Free Will Baptist supper, and not the Lord's Supper. Don't think I love other church government as well as I do the Free Will Baptist, but I don't say they are all going to hell because they don't belong to our church.

SET THINE HOUSE IN ORDER

Much has been said about being ready at the appearance of the King, and there is nothing of more importance just now than to be ready, but today we have our message on arranging our affairs for taking our long journey from which there is no return.

It seems to me as I study the importance of this voyage, that the world at large should take more pains to leave the estate in good sound condition. As a rule people think less of this trip than any other in their life time, and make less preparation for this one than any other. We don't seem to realize the importance of that great voyage. There are people who are sitting right here who are not making any preparations at all. One these days some of us will be called around their bedside, and while they groan under the disease that is carrying them lower and lower into the valley of death, they will have to say, "I haven't set my house in order; I am not ready to make the trip."

"Prepare to meet thy God" (Amos 4:12). "Set thine house in order: for thou shalt die and not live" (Isa. 38:1).

Son of man cometh at an hour when ye think not" (Luke 12:40). We brush shoulders with eternity when we obtain salvation, in fact salvation has its base on eternity

"Now is the accepted time."

"When ye hear His voice harden not your heart." One of these terms is as momentary as the other, and both are of vital importance. When ye hear His voice harden not your hearts, which means at the same time ye hear His voice. At the time of the voice, set your house in order, then don't delay, for this is the accepted time with God. The accepted time is when God will accept, not when you will accept.

Now comes the question: What is His voice, and how may we know it?

Psychology teaches us that the mind is something similar to the system of telegraphy. I believe a part of that, but there is the sending of the message that I do not agree with. The mind gathers thought, and if it is not acceptable, discharges it.

The atmosphere is filled with two kinds of messengers, and they are continually furnishing the mind with thought, with all the thousands of thoughts you have through the day. They are classified into only two varieties: the one is GOOD, the other is EVIL; and all matter for thought is in one of these two classes.

"For as he thinketh in his heart so is he: Eat and drink saith he to thee; but his heart is not with thee" (Prov. 23:7). Thought is to the mind what the legs are to the body, it carries the soul to the glorious heights of heaven, or perhaps the next moment to the sweltering depths of hell, and then into the morbid sway of the wounded conscience; "as a man thinketh in his heart so is he."

Christian Science went to the very extreme of this idea, and taught that the thought controlled the body. It does not control the body any more than the compass controls the great ship that ploughs the deep, in fact the only direct connection the mind has with the body is to direct it or point out paths for the body to follow.

Now we have learned that thought is the most useful instrument of the mind, and that from a spiritual standpoint it maps out the way for the soul to follow. We find in Rom. 12:2, that we must have our minds renewed, changed: "Be ye transformed by the renewing of your minds."

Paul gives instruction, Phil. 2:5, "Let this mind be in you, which was "Be ye therefore ready also: for the also in Christ Jesus."

Now, Paul came back to the Corinthians, and said, "We have the mind of Christ" (1 Cor. 2:16).

However, with all this change, we are not completely shut out from the devil, he still makes his appeal, but we have by the renewing act the power of resistance: "Resist the devil and he will flee from you." The unsaved cannot resist the devil, for they have not the mind of Christ.

Now let us come to the concluding thought. Where does the mind go after death? It either ascends ,or it descends, whichever the case may be, and people have the same mind after death that they had before death. As proof of this, the rich man retained his mind after death: "Let Lazarus come and dip the tip of his finger in water, and cool my tongue." He thought it would be nice to have Lazarus come and minister to him. Abraham had the right exercise of his mind after death: for he remembered that they had Moses and the prophets as messengers of truth, and that all the people were supposed to hear them

SET THINE HOUSE IN ORDER! What is my house? The place where I live and house the Spirit of God. "Know ye not that ye are the temple of God, and that the Spirit of God dwelleth in you?" (1 Cor. 3:16).

"For we know that, if our earthly house of this tabernacle were disolved, we have a building of God, an house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens" (2 Cor. 5:1).

I have reached the conclusion now, that the house that I am required to set in order is my spiritual house.

"If any man defile the temple of God, him shall God destroy; for the temple of God is holy, which temple ye are" (1 Cor. 3:17).

Now, how can I set my house in order? First by having the old mind renewed, being born again, exchanging the carnal mind for the mind of Christ. The rich man failed to set his house in order. He had worked hard and gathered much goods together; his barns were filled with feed, his granaries were bulging out with food stuff. Then he said, "Soul (mind), take thine ease, I have much goods laid up. My mind has been much in labor gathering all this stuff together; but now you can have a long rest."

But! footsteps are heard approaching, the pale face of a tireless rider is seen coming into view, his features seem to be chiseled into his face, his cold unfriendly look is enough to send a chill through the most confidential spirit: here comes the grim reaper,

on his pale mount, he dismounts, approaches the farmer with a cheerless message, and as he raises his hand to make the last fatal blow, he says, "Thou fool, this night is thy soul required of thee."

"Hold off," says the farmer, "I want a few days to set my house in order."

"NO. NO!" said the reaper, "you have had all these years and all you got ready, and set in order, was your farm house. You neglected your soul; now come, your soul is required; time waits on no man."

When I leave this tabernacle of clay, I want to leave it in order, not in disorder.

Just to make clear to the minds of our readers, the regenerating power of this "fountain" at the present time, we want to use as an illustration, a family in deep poverty and sin, who came to this king's gate for help. The man's name was Mr. Indifference, and, as his name suggests, he was not only careless in his dress and manner of living, but had also fallen into many hurtful habits, which under such adverse times as we are having, he could not afford to indulge in, without taking away from his family such things as they needed for their every day living, but to do without these things that were constantly gnawing away at his weakened nature, and demanding that they be satisfied, caused such despondency within him, that he became very irritable, and to say the least, could not bear to hear the cries of his children as they would ask for the things their childish nature longed for. He would stay out late at night to avoid, as much as possible, their presence, and when he was at home, how he would scold and threaten, so, that at times they would run to hide from him. They could not run to their mother at such times, for she had long since lest all the charm she had at one time possessed for her husband and children. Before her marriage her name was Miss Prim, and, as you can readily see, she was a very worldly young lady, with a good college education, and was a firm believer in modern theories, namely, that man came from a lower order of animal life. For her, the future held no hope, and the present was dark indeed. She had two lovely children, who of late were grieving her mother's heart as she saw their growing indifference to the things that she was beginning to realize made life worth living. Bobby Indifference Jr., a lad of fourteen years, spending his time at the movies as often as he could get enough money from his news route, and by running errands of different kinds for the neighbors. Let us all look and be at our best, as we too are to represent those who have been washed in the "Fountain that was opened in the house of David for sin and uncleanliness," and as our little story closes we find this happy born family gathered each day at the family altar, where they all partake of the good things of the Spirit, and on Sunday morning, neat and clean, on their way to church, they all feel they are a "Royal line of kings and priests unto God," not proud and "stuck up," but to show respect to Him who opened up the way to glory for them. All harmful habits formed in the days of serving the flesh have gone now, and they have the "high cost of low living" to use in the work of the Master they love so much.

My friend, if you do not think this

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THE BAPTISM OF DEATH

Before we discuss this I wish you would get your Bible and read the sixth chapter of Romans, for it is principally that chapter that we want to consider.

It isn't every time the word baptism is found in the Bible that it means in water, and I am not trying to minimize on water haptism either, for I believe in water baptism in its place as much as any one. I believe, as was said by one of our early ministers, Rev. Geo. H. Ball, in his book on baptism, as follows: "Immersion is not a mode of baptism, it is baptism." But there is one fact we should never forget, that the water baptism, or any other ceremonial rite. will never cleanse the creature from If it would, I know a lot of folks who need a real good soaking. A lot of folks resort to Rom. sixth chapter to prove immersion for baptism, but it cannot be done, as to the meaning of this chapter, though the fact is true in type, for baptism is baptism so far as the meaning of the term is concerned, whether it be in death, water, or the Holy Ghost. for it means complete, or to submerge. A better scripture to prove that water baptism is a type of the burial and resurrection of Christ is to be found in 1 Cor. 15:29, "Else what shall they do which are baptized for the dead, if the dead rise not at all? Why are they then baptized for the dead?"

Now then, let us see, can such a doctrine as the baptism of death be established upon God's word, Read Luke 12:50, "But I have a baptism to be baptized with; and how am I straitened (pained) till it be accomplished!" This is the language of Jesus referring to His approaching death, and calling it a "baptism." Turn to Matthew 20:20-23, The mother of Zebedee's children asks that her two sons may sit, the one on the right and the other on the left of Jesus in His kingdom. Jesus said, "Ye know not what ye ask . . . are ye able to be baptized with the baptism that I am

baptized with? They say unto Him, We are able. And He saith unto them . . . Ye shall be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with." Here again He is referring to His death and to the martyrdom of the apostles. They all died the martyr's death except the Apostle John, and he suffered worse than martyrdom, then finally died a natural death. So we see that death is called a baptism in more than one place.

Now, back to the sixth chapter of Romans: "What shall we say then?" After law and grace have been clearly treated upon in the previous chapters; also it has been clearly stated that we are justified by faith, and not by any ceremonial rite. So now, what shall we say? "Shall we continue in sin, that grace may abound? God forbid: How shall we that are dead to sin live any longer therein?"

Notice that it says, Dead TO sin, not dead IN sin. Death means a complete separation, regardless of what it is referring to. We can't live in sin and be dead to sin at the same time, though some seem to think so. A minister once said, "There are two kinds of Christians-Christians and sinning Christians." A Mr. Patrick once visited a zoo and saw a giraffe for the first time. Directly he walked away, shaking his head and muttering, "Bedad, there ain't no such an animal." So we say as to the sinning Christian, "There ain't no such an animal."

Verse 3. "Know ye not, that so many of us as were baptized into Jesus Christ were baptized into His death?"

V. 4. "Therefore we are buried with Him by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we should walk in newness of life." Now, how are we baptized into Jesus Christ? We certainly do not believe it is by water. Then it must be, and can only be by the power of the Holy Ghost. The 5th verse holds out a planting and a resurrection. For the grain to be planted is to die; and there can be no resurrection without first a death. When we are baptized into Christ's death, it is the crucifixion of the old man, the destroying of the body of sin; and he that is dead is freed from sin. Sin has no dominion over a dead man. So with the Christian, he may be tempted, but there is a vast difference in temptation and

V. 16. "Know ye not, that to whom ye yield yourselves servants to obey, his servants ye are to whom ye obey;

whether of sin unto death, or of obedience unto righteousness?" We will naturally serve the one we are sold out to. If we have received the baptism of death by the power of the Holy Ghost, to the killing of the old man of sin, then we are certainly going to naturally show it by walking in newness of life. But it takes a complete death as is held out in the very meaning of the term Maptism. Water baptism is but an outward sign of an inward cleansing, a type not only of the burial and rising again of our Lord, but also of that spiritual death and resurrection, which the applicant is to have previously experienced, and should never be administered until sufficient evidence is given by the believer that he has first experienced the baptism of death to sin. A baptized church member, without a spiritual experience is no better than before the ordinance was administered; but, if anything, worse, because a mockery has been made. One of the greatest curses to the cause of Christ today, is people trying to get by on ceremonial rites and performances, or works only, without yielding their lives to God and being saved by grace through faith in Christ.

"All that pass by clap their hands at thee; they hiss and wag their heads at the daughter of Jerusalem, saying, Is this the city that men call The perfection of beauty, The joy of the whole earth?" (Lam. 2:15).

NATURE AND BLESSINGS OF ADOPTION

.. Text, "But when the fulness of the time was come, God sent forth his Son, made of a woman, made under the law, to redeem them that were under the law, that we might receive the adoption of sons" (Gal. 4, 5).

First we come to the privilege of adoption. There are some people in the world that seem to think that God never gave us, as a people, any freedom of choice, but the apostle in Eph. 1:4-14, said, "According as he has chosen us in him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame before him in love: having predestinated us unto the adoption of children by Jesus Christ to himself, according to the good pleasure of his will."

Notice the apostle used the word predestination, and also before the foundation of the world, but God

never said anywhere in his word that our adoption was not according to the freedom of choice. The privilege of adoption which God ordained before the foundation of the world was purchased by the Son: "For as much as ye know that ye were not redeemed with corruptible things, as silver and gold, from your vain conversation received by tradition of your fathers: but with the precious blood of Christ. as a lamb without blemish and without spot: who verily was forcordained before the foundation of the world. but was manifest in these last times for you, who by him do believe in God, that raised him up from the dead, and gave him glory; that your faith and hope might be in God" (1st Peter 1:18-21).

So we see that it was not our adoption that was purchased before the foundation of the world, but the atonement that Christ purchased, and also our freedom of choice.

In John 3:5, we read that the Lord told Nicodemus that he must be born again, and in this statement we see that there was something for Nicodemus to do. Also read 1 Pet. 1:22-23. "Seeing you have purified your souls in obeying the truth through the Spirit unto unfeigned love of the brethren, see that ye love one another with a pure heart fervently: being born again, not of corruptible seed. but of incorruptible, by the word of God, which liveth and abideth forever."

Notice that Peter says, "It is by the incorruptible word of God, which liveth and abideth forever."

John says this Word was in the beginning with God, and that it was. made flesh and was here among men.

In John 3:5, the Lord used the words "Spirit and water:" in 1 Peter. we find the words, Corruptible and incorruptible seed;" and James 1:18 says, "Of his own will begat he us: with the word of truth, that we should be the first fruits of his creatures."

After the Lord had accomplished his work here and made his ascension back to the Father, and the apostles began to carry the Gospel toall nations, as the Lord had commanded, we see the fruits of their labors. as the Apostle Peter on the day of Pentecost preached to those people after the descent of the Holy Ghost: and the ones that had crucified the Lord were pricked in their hearts. We see according to the words of the apostle that they cried out. We see the first fruits of and the commencing of the church to all nations.

The conditions of adoption are: 1. Repentance-Mat. 4:17; Acts 2:38: Faith—Heb. 11:6. 2 Cor. 1:24
 Copfession—Romans 10:10.

Next we come to the blessings of adoption:

1. Change of nature—Rom. 8:9-14. 2. Change of relationship—Eph. 2: 19-22; Heb. 12:22-24.

3. A new name— Isa.62:2; 65:15; Acts 11:26; 1 Peter 4:16.

4. Well provided for—Matt. 6:25-33.
5. Fatherly correction—Heb. 12:5-11.
6. Fatherly protection—2 Peter 2:9;
Psalm 34:15-18.

7. A new home—John 14:1-3; Rev. 20:1-2.

8. A new body—1 Cor. 15:51-53.
 9. Ap inheritance—1 Peter 1:3-5.

So this represents the whole scheme of adoption, as outlined by the Lord and the apostles.

Will close by quoting Rom. 8:28, "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose."
