Bethlehem, the House of Bread

The picture on this page is a view of the City of Bethlehem, and was taken from the bell-tower of Bethlehem's famous Church of Saint Mary. It was taken by Rev. Gerald Winrod, and appeared on the front page of The Defender Magazine, of which Rev. Winrod is editor. We had a new plate made of it, that it might appear on the front page of the Gem.

Bethlehem is situated about

six miles south of Jerusalem, it stands on a fruitful ridge over looking the Valley of the Kedron on the north, and the deep chasm of the Dead Sea on the east, to the Christian one of the holiest places on earth.

Bethlehem is one of the oldest towns in Palestine, and is associated with some of the most important events in the religious history of the world. Here it was that Ruth gleaned after the reapers of Boaz; here was the home of David the shepherd boy who was anointed King of Israel; it was here that Jeremiah, after telling of

God's terrible judgments upon the people foretold the coming of "THE LORD OUR RIGHTEOUSNESS" (Jer. 23:6); and it was here our Lord was born, and the angels came singing, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men."

The name signifies House of Bread, and here, in a manger, the "Bread of Truly it Life" became incarnate. may be said, Bethlehem has given to our perishing race the Bread of Eternal Life.

It was probably along the road that leads from Bethlehem to Jerusalem that Abraham journeyed on his way to the Mount of God, leading his only son as a lamb to the slaughter (Gen. 22); along this same road came the

Virgin and her husband to the "City of David, which is called Bethlehem; ' then along the same road came the "Wise Men," with costly gifts and to worship the new-born King; and long before all this, when the Jebusites held the old "Castle of Zion," Jacob, as he journeyed back to Hebron, traveled over this same road; and it was here that Rachel, Jacob's beloved

a Christian church over the place where Christ was born. This church, which has been repaired and kept up until now, is called the Church of the Nativity. It is the oldest Christian church in the world.

We learn from the second chapter of St. Luke, that, when Jesus was born, Mary took him, "and wrapped" him in swaddling clothes, and laid

> him in a manger; because there was no room for them in the inn." Now, an Oriental inn, or khan, is merely a place of shelter from the weather, or protection from robbers, where men and their beasts can safely lodge, prepare and eat their meals; but they must furnish their own bedding, food, and so on. Part of the inn was for the people, and part for beasts, and those coming in late might find the inn full, and have to make their beds in the manger with the horses and camels, as Joseph and Mary were forced to do.

Tradition locates the inn of Joseph and Mary at Beth-

lehem on a portion of the estate of Boaz-the old homestead of Obed and Jesse-so that the birthplace of David was identical with the birthplace of Jesus, his illustrous successor and King eternal.

In the little Book of Ruth we have an account of Elimelech and Naomi, and their two sons, leaving their home at Bethlehem the House of Bread, and going to Moab, because of the famine. And when Naomi was bereft of her husband and two sons, she returned to Bethlehem and Ruth, her daughterin-law accompanied her. Boaz, her nearest of kin, redeemed Naomi's inheritance and married Ruth of whom was born Obed the father of Jesse who was the father of David.



wife, died as she gave birth to her second son, Benjamin. How sad and touching the narative, "And Rachel died, and was buried in the way to Ephrath, which is Bethlehem. And Jacob set a pillar upon her grave" (Gen. 35:19, 20). Nearly 4,000 years have gone by since this mother in Israel died, and Jacob set up a stone of memorial over her grave; but the tomb of Rachel is still there by the road-side, and Jews, Christians and Mohammedans all protect it as one of the most sacred spots in the Holy Land.

The spot where our Lord was born was well known by people of the early centuries of the Christian era, and about the year 325 A. D. the Empress Helena (Constantine's mother) built Moderator

Received too late for February issue

A little snow Friday night slowed things down Saturdaymorning, Dec. 28th, but after hoofing about two and a halt miles, I met Bro. Lee Clark of Shiloh church, and we trudged the remaining five miles to Cotton Creek to attend our second fifth Sunday meeting. Others were also slowed, only a few being there when we began business.

Singing, reading of 19th Psa. and prayer by Eld. H. C. Crase was followed by his election as moderator, as neither that officer nor the assistant were present.

Brothers Luther Sutton and Lee Clark were appointed as the pulpit committee.

Delegates from seven churches were there -less than halt Bro. Crase preached, reading Micah 6 as the lesson, with Mal. 3:1, 2 for a text.

Many are running to and fro; knowledge is being increased in temporal affairs, while evil men and seducers are waxing worse and worse, deceiving and being deceived, as we sadly know: yet every one who has hearing ears will know the truth that makes them free, because the eternal God is their refuge, and underneath are the everlasting arms to keep us from falling.

A bountiful dinner was followed by a business session. Moderator made a stirring appeal to contribute something toward home missions every week—even one cent would be over a half dollar per year, or over \$250.00 for Cave Spring members.

Mill Creek church, at Myrtle, was chosen as next place of meeting, on March 28, 1936, the pastor, Eld. H. H. Beatty, to preach the introductory sermon.

With only 12 delegates and three preachers (Brothers H. C. Crase, Billy Rogers and J. E. Rolan), and most of them speeding homeward, the Minjsters' meeting might seem slim, yet with our one minister, Bro. Rolen, and 21 auditors, we were given a true and glorious account of "Why There is No Depression in Palestine," Sunday p. m. Seemed like a ministerial dictator, but Bro. Rolen did well.

Preaching Saturday night, Rev. 1.1-8 being the lesson, and the seventh verse the text: "Jesus is coming with a reward for every one who is ready and looking for Him, but He must judge every one according as his work may be," a warm loving message to the ready ones, and faithful warning to those as yet away from the tender Shepherd's care.

As we went home with our hosts, snow was falling plentifully, and the bright sunshine of Sunday morning showed about four inches of it. "Though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow;" and have you ever seen anything whiter than fresh-fallen snow?

Most folks seemed rooted to their firesides; as very few of them went up to the house of God. Bro. Rolen preached on the Four Calls that come to every one: Repentance, Service, Death and Judgment. We may not heed the first two calls, but every one of us must meet death and judgment—and the *way* will he easy, the *burden* light, and the end eternal glory, if we now *do* heed the first two.

Another feast for the outer man was followed by the glorious things now on in Palestine, because God's people are finally going back home. Bro. Rolen read what the Lord told Ezekiel to write about it over 2500 years ago, and, now as always, the prophecy is fulfilling exactly.

Isn't it wonderful that God never makes any mistakes, knows just what we should do and will tell us if we are willing to hear? *Continued on page cleven* 2)

THE WATERS OF ELIM

"And they came to Elim, where were twelve wells of water, and three score and ten palm trees: and they encamped there by the waters" (Exodus 15:27).

When Moses and the Israelites were traveling in the wilderness, we find that for a period of three days they were without water.

And when they did find some water at Marah, they must have been sorely disappointed, for the water was bitter, and they could not drink it.

The people murmured against Moses. finding fault with him, in the same manner that they did when they saw the Red Sea before them, and Pharaoh's army behind them, they were not depending on the One who has supreme power in Heaven and in earth. They did not realize that the God who had the power to divide the waters of the sea, also had the power to make the bitter waters at Marah sweet. But Moses the loyal servant of the most high God knew that they would not be forsaken, so he cried out unto God, and his cry was heard. The Lord told him to cast a certain tree into the water and the water would become sweet, and good to drink.

Then we find that they traveled on until they came to Elim where there were twelve wells and seventy palm trees. We can hardly imagine their delight at finding such a beautiful place, supplied with water and shade, where they might camp and rest in the shelter of the trees.

We might compare the bitter waters of Marah to the bitterness and folly of a wasted life, of some one who has failed to heed the warning, but has heedlessly passed on down the mile stones of life, having become bitter and fault-finding at the world.

We believe that St. Peter had such people in mind when he said, "These are wells without water, clouds that are carried with a tempest; to whom the mist of darkness is reserved for ever." But I thank God, that through the blood of His Son, we can have access to the Holy Spirit, that will remove the bitter, and leave a sweet, deep settled peace in our soul, that will cause us to rejoice, because we are promised a haven of rest, that will far outshine any earthly existence, that will be to us a fountain that will not run dry, where no bitterness will enter in, but we can rest in the arms of Jesus.

HELL! Where Are The Dead? Did Christ Go To Hell When He Died?

Some men argue and postulate— Philosophers ponder—many believe not—Infidels criticise—honest men, in ignorance, earnestly inquire—The Bible answers!

We find one word in the language of the Bible that presents the whole issue. That one word, by the Hebrew tongue, is *sheol* (sheh'ole) which means *world of the dead*; the invisible world, or place of departed spirits, in the intermediate state, prior to the resurrection. The word is derived from the root *shac* (shaw'al) which means to ask or seek; demand, inquire—signifying a place with respect to which it may be asked, "Man giveth up the ghost, and *where is hei*" (Job). The corresponding word in Greek is *ades* (hades) meaning not to be seen with the idea of an *unsecn world*. Both *sheol* and *hades* are employed to express the state of the dead in its most comprehensive point of view. They are very often improperly rendered *hell* in our common versions.

Sheol, or hades, is divided into two parts. Deuteronomy, chapter 32, verse 22, is an expression of that division. God spoke through Moses, "For a fire is kindled in mine anger, and shall hurn unto the *lowest hell* (sheol), and shall consume the earth with her increase." There could not be a "lowest" part of sheol unless there was some kind of a division. The lowest hell contains fire. In the 26th chapter of the Gospel by St. Luke, we have another expression of that division into two distinct parts of the world of departed spirits. Two men had dicd, and their spirits entered hades the unseen world-world of the dead. The one went into the "lowest" portion of hades where the fire of God's anger is kindled, for he was tormented in flames. When he had "lifted up his eyes," literally looked up, he saw across a great gulf fixed between and saw the departed spirit of the beggar in the better portion of hades which by a Talmudic expression, is called "Paradise" or "Abraham's bosom." The latter signifies "with Abraham."

When man dies, his spirit enters the world of the dead—shcol, or the unseen world of departed spirits hades. If his spirit departs with faith in God, it goes immediately into Paradise, where Abraham is, which we might rudely classify as the upper part of hades." If his spirit departs with no hope in God, it goes immediately into the "lowest part of hades" which is a place of fire. The spirits of good and evil men await the resurrection in their respective portions of hades.

The words shcol and hades are sometimes rendered grave which is entirely too narrow and it has given rise to such corrupt doctrines as "No hell" and "Hell is just the grave." If the grave has any connection with sheel, the world of spirits, it is only with the idea of a waiting place for the body until the resurrection, since there is to be a literal resurrection when the spirit shall return from sheol or hades and reunite with a glorified resurrected body. The Hebrews understood something beyond the grave by the term "sheol" which is evident from the fact that the common name for that recepticle of the dead body is kehber. In Greek it is mnema or mnemcior which is literally remembrance and so tomb. It was not in kehber (grave), but in sheol (world of departed spirits) that the aged Patriarch expected to meet his deceased son (Gen. 37:35), into which the fathers had entered and whither their sons were removed at death to join their society (Gen. 25:8; 35:29; 49:29; Deut. 32:50). In all these passages, the being "gathered to his people" is spoken of as something distinct from mere burial. In the case of Abraham and Moses, the sense of kchber is very incongruous since the former had no "people" in the cave of Machpelah, and of the grave

No doubt you have received a card by this time from Mr. H. B. Terry of Verona, Missouri, as he mailed one to each Gem subscriber, asking for \$1.00 or more to finance a series of broadcasts from Springfield. I wish to give some more detailed information.

Mr. Terry, and also many others have approached me numbers of times about getting a period each week over KWTO. So a few days back, I visited the station, and asked them for some time; but was unable to obtain any free time. However they said I could use some afternoon time, somewhere between 2:00 and 5:00. They said they would make it to me at half price. In a day or so I saw Mr. Terry, and told him what they said, and his words were, "Well, I will see that the money is raised.'

He mailed the cards and a nice amount has been received from them already, not enough to secure the time yet; but enough to make us feel that there is most certain to be a sufficient amount come in. I could go ahead and start the program, but I don't want to be risky. I would rather the money would all be in first. But if, and when, it does come in I will start immediately. Now, it is just up to you folks. I will be making nothing at all out of it; but will gladly give my time, and render the very best service within my limited ability.

I feel I can keep the financial part of it going after I get started. But the station sells time only on a 13, 26, or 52 weeks basis.

But there in that little room alone, away out there in the Mississippi bottom pest house, eight hundred miles from home, I promised God, if He would let me live, I would live a different life. As soon as I was able I came back to Nashville where my people lived.

Then I began to go to church and some of the young folks asked me to join the league. I did and became interested in the work and also in the President, as Miss Martha Hopkins was the first President. Ha, ha, now Mrs. Martha Boyte.

After the war was over and I had finished at Old Hickory Munition Plant, I went back to work at Singer Sewing Machine Company. I had worked up to assistant manager's place that was bringing me one hundred and fifty dollars per month. I had bought me a new car and the League President and I were getting on quite well.

Three hundred thousand Jews are now "back home," and doing things. In 1929 Jerusalem depended on candles and oil lamps after sundown, now 43 miles of gas mains make daylight out of darkness.

Modern down-to-the-minute buildings and equipment on every hand land selling for a small amount four years ago now brings ten times as much: always subject to scarcity of water, now one of the greatest feats of modern engineering brings pure spring water nearly thirty miles in wonderful abundance.

All the chemical elements coming down from the mountains into the Dead Sea for thousands of years are there, for you know the Sea has no outlet. Potash is being evaporated from the water in a 1000 acre plant and there's enough potash to supply the world for 2000 years.

On the bank of the Dead Sea is a mountain of salt, 98% pure, 6 miles long, 3 miles wide and 1090 feet high, with only a few feet of earth covering it. Maybe Lot's wife?

Five acres now sustains a family, formerly it took 60. Down to date experiment stations instruct in correct cropping; an extensive swamp will soon be drained, and, as God said so long ago, "It shall be as the garden of Eden."

As a worth while experiment, don't you suppose our own depression would lift if we, starting *here* and *now*, would follow the will of our Lord as far as we knew?

May the Lord help us to be ready for every call when it comes.

of the latter, the people of Israel remained profoundly ignorant. The phrase cannot be kehber for neither were buried in their family graves. David had said something about his soul not remaining in hell (sheol) and the Holy One not seeing corruption (Psa. 16:10). Peter, preaching on the day of Pentecost, told the Jews that David was not speaking of himself, but being a prophet, "he spake of the resurrection of Christ, that his (Christ's) soul would not remain in hell (hades) neither his flesh did see corruption" (Acts 2:25-31). Christ said in His dying hour, "Today" He would enter "Paradise." He entered that portion of hades (called hell). which contained the comforted spirits of the departed spirits.

Hades was, at that time, spoken of as being downward, for Christ descendcd into it. While there, "He preached to the spirits in prison" -1 Pet. :18-20, who seem to have lived during the days of Noah while the ark was being According to Rev. 1:18, prepared. Christ must have obtained the keys of hell (hades) and of death when He descended to it. He then ascended, leading captivity captive (Eph. 4:8-10; Psa. 68:18), that is, taking with Him the imprisoned spirits who were literally "being held" in Paradise. Thus Christ moved the "upper hell' (hades) and took it with Himself to the very throne of God. The "great gulf fixed" between "lower hell' and "Paradise"

of Luke 16 is widened with a far greater gulf. The fact that Christ moved the "upper hell" (called Paradise) to the immediate presence of God on His throne is further proved by the fact that Christ is on the right hand of God. and Paul said that he had "rather to be absent from the body, and present with the Lord" (2 Cor. 5:8). Paul knew that if he died, his spirit would leave his body and go to Christ and would bask in the sunlight of God's presence.

"Lowest hell" is left with no change by the ascension of Christ. It is still a place of the kindled fire of God's anger, it is still the torment of the "rich man" and of every other man who goes there after death. At the end of the thousand years of Christ's personal reign on earth, called Millennium, death and hell (lowest hell) shall deliver up the spirits which are in them, and the sea (the earthly) shall deliver up the dead that are in it, or shall give up the bodies by the power of the second resurrection, which is unto damnation. Death and hell shall be judged and cast into the "lake of fire which burneth with brimstone." The reunited spirit and body shall be judged and cast into the same "lake of fire." Notice: Lowest Hell-a place of fire, is cast into the Second Death, which burns with fire and brimstone.

GILEAD'S By Rev. Otto Freeman, Malden, Mo. PHYSICIAN

"Is there no balm in Gilead? is there no physician there? why then is not the health of the daughter of my people recovered?" (Jer, 8:22)

Gilead is the name given to a ridge of mountains which extends from Lebanon southward on the east of Palestine, and gave this name to the whole district of country east of the Sea of Galilee. This name was given in the ancient compact made between Jacob and his Uncle Laban (Gen. 31:48). This country seems to have been in great repute, even in the days of Joseph, for yielding a sort of balm, which was very celebrated for its healing medicinal qualities, hence, we read that Joseph was sold to a company of Ishmaelites who came from Gilead, bearing spices, balm and myrrh

(Gen. 37:25). The prophet, after contemplating the morally diseased condition of the people, inquired, "Is there no balm in Gilead?" Let us then answer the three important questions in the text.

There is balm for the diseased soul of man, the Word of God is the recipe given. Hence it is said, "He sent his word and healed them' (Psa. 107:26). No other book apart from the word of God, in the whole world, can answer the question, "What must I do to be saved?" The Word of God reveals to man the danger he is in and the remedy for his guilt and misery. The Word of God converts men from sin and makes them know they are lost, and tells them how to be saved. The blood of Jesus is the healing balm;

all blessings connected with salvation are ascribed to the blood of Christ; we are redeemed by His blood, reconciled to God by His blood, sanctified and cleansed from all sin by His blood, He is the fountain opened for sin and uncleanness; Christ was nailed to the Cross, and shed His blood for the sin-sick soul. Yes, there is balm in Gilead, enough to heal every one that will believe; as in all cases, just coming into possession of a recipe, or even the remedy itself is not enough without the application, so also with The sinner must have the sinner. the blood of Jesus applied to his soul before it can be cleansed from sin; in this way its virtue will be felt and a certain cure effected-none ever trusted in the blood of atonement without obtaining salvation. It makes no difference how deep the sin stain has gone, however hopeless in man's esti-

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mation. A dying thief was saved; the blood of Jesus applied will blot out all sin.

But, notice the second question, "Is there no physician there?"

There is a Physician for the afflicted souls of men, this Physician is Jesus. In the days of His flesh He went about healing the diseases, both of the bodies and the minds of men. As a physician He possesses unbounded knowledge, He knows all about the soul of man, He knows every disease of the soul. Not only does He know the diseases of the soul, but He knows the necessary application for its restoration, He is also in deep sympathy with the sin-sick soul, He is full of pity and tenderness, and He displays it to all who seek His aid. He is also accessible at all times and places; He is the Physician for the whole world; His practice is as wide as the earth, and as universal as the family of man. Then you do not have to go afar to hunt for Him; He is ever near and ready for service when you call on him.

Physicians of the body often err; their remedies fail and patients dic. But not so with Jesus, all diseases are alike to Him: The spiritually deaf, the blind, the dumb, the lame, the paralytic, and the leprous, and does He stop there? No, He even raises souls dead in trespasses and sin, and He never fails to apply the balm in the right place at the right time when called upon. His terms are of the easiest kind-without money and without price; you read of no fee demanded or given in the days of His flesh or since, it has ever been so, and will be so for ever; so all may have access to the healing, and whosoever will may come and drink of the water of life freely, the poor as well as the rich. Such then is the Physician to whom the sin-sick soul can have access.

Then observe the last question in the text: Why then are not the diseases of the soul of man removed?

We have spoken of a balm, which is a certain remedy, and of a Physician who infallibly cures; and let it be added, that this remedy is sufficient to cure the whole body—this Physician is willing to save every soul: "Why then is not the health of the daughters of mypeople recovered?" All the reasons must be with the sick themselves, and not with the Physician; if the sinner is not saved, it is his own fault.

Jesus said, "Whosoever will." But many fancy themselves to be well, and need no physician, when their soul is suffering with some loathsome disease. The Pharisees were suffering with self-righteousness, yet they thought they needed no physician. Many conclude that their diseases are not dangerous, and are therefore indifferent, their conversation and way of living say, There is no danger, therefore they live carelessly and die so. Many will not submit to Christ's remedy, it is too humble; they want a more exact way; they will not attend to His advice and exercise faith, and get under the drippings of the Cross. Some put it off until their dying hour, never dreaming of dying in sin. These are a few of the reasons why there are not more souls saved. If the sinner would come to the Physician, which is Jesus, and get the balm applied, which is the blood of Jesus shed on the Cross, then the health of the daughters of my people would be recovered, or rather the sins of the soul of man would be removed.

SELF EXAMINATION--2 Cor. 13:5

The beginning of the New Year is the time for our annual moral house cleaning, the time when we take an invoice of good deeds done, and selfrighteousness, brush off some bad habits and undesirable traits of character.
