

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### **REVERENCE FOR THE HOUSE OF GO**

How does the Lord regard the things that have  $\mathbf{t}^{\text{Perf}}$  devoted, or dedicated to His service?

"Every devoted thing is most holy unto the Lord" ( $I^{et.}$  27:28).

Did Christ exhibit regard for the sanctity of  $G_{t}^{di}$  house? "And they come to Jerusalem; and Jesus w<sup>th</sup> into the temple, and began to cast out them that s<sup>old</sup> and bought in the temple, and overthrew the tables <sup>di</sup> the money changers, and the seats of them that s<sup>old</sup> doves; and would not suffer that any man should ca<sup>TI</sup> any vessel through the temple. And he taught, say<sup>BI</sup> unto them, Is it not written, My house shall be called <sup>di</sup> all nations the house of prayer? but ye have made it <sup>i</sup> den of thieves" (Mark 11:15-17).

How should we conduct ourselves in the house of Gd<sup>!</sup> "But as for me, I will come into thy house in the  $m^{\mu}$ titude of thy mercy; and in thy fear will I worship toward thy holy temple" (Psa. 5:7).

Christ has given us an inducement to worship in Lis house. "For where two or three are gathered togetler in my name, there am I in the midst of them" (Mat. 18:24).

"Keep thy foot when thou goest to the house of Gol" (Eccl. 5:1).

"Guard thy steps when thou goest to the house of the Lord, that thou mayest enter it with sacred composule, and carefully avoid everything that would interfere with thy devotion"—Lange.

Reverence is becoming in the house of God, yet the are those who do not seem to appreciate this. In  $\operatorname{son}_{\ell}$ places it is customary for the worshippers to enter  $tl_{\ell}$ house of prayer noisily, and to move about, talking  $at_d$ laughing immoderately. Children too are sometimis allowed to run wildly about the house before and between the times of worship, playing and laughing aloud. Th<sub>s</sub> is a scandal to the house of God wherever it is permitten

There are some extreme cases in which even the men  $c_{0}^{2}$ not remove their hats, but stand in knots discussing th weather, and its effects upon the crops, while some of the women engage in visiting, and lively conversation about D common place things. At times, the discussion of variou topics becomes so animated that the participants forge the hour, and when the time for opening the service arrives, the minister, if one is present, steps into th sacred stand, and calls the meeting to order; sometimes after waiting a season, he is obliged to call again, raising his voice above the din in order to command attention and perhaps even then a portion of the opening hymn is read while some of the congregation are taking thei: any church that such things can be recorded of its mem seats with more or less confusion. It seems a shame to bers. -- "Ye shall keep by sabbaths, and reverence my sanctuary; I am the Lord" (Lev. 19:30).

Why this injunction to reverence the sanctuary, which was made only of earthly materials? Because it was the house in which God chose to place His name and in which He would be manifested by the symbol of His presence. It was therefore a holy place and, as such, should receive the reverence of His people.

Where only two or three are met in His name, He has promised to be in their midst. Were people to step into the actual presence of Jehovah, it is probable that none would there engage in levity. On the other hand, they would most likely feel at once to bow in awe and reverence, to adore their Creator.

But if God is really present in the person of His representative, in the convocation of His people, why should they treat His Holy Spirit with any less consideration?

"Serve God acceptably, with reverence and Godly fear" (Heb. 12:28).

God is the same in every age, and though inhabiting eternity, He still dwells with those who are of a contrite and humble spirit. When this class come together for worship, the Lord comes with them.

God has deigned to accept the earthly houses dedicated to Him, and they should therefore be reverenced, because He has thus honored them.

"But, as for me, I will come into thy house in the multitude of thy mercy; and in thy fear will I worship toward thy holy temple"-Ps. 5:7.

God is greatly to be feared in the assembly of the saints, and to be had in reverence of all them that are about him" (Psa. 89:7).

It is a solemn thing to go into the presence of God. May we have grace to do so with reverence.

"Our God is a consuming fire."

I do not believe any performance which does not relate to the service of God should be conducted in a house dedicated to His service.

# BROTHER WILLEY SAILS

On September 30, 1936, at 2:40 p. m., Rev. T. H. Willey sailed for Panama, South America. Our missionary is on his way to open a mission field for us as Free Will Baptists. He is God's man and our man. He is the channel through whom we can obey the supreme commission of taking the Gospel to those who have never heard. How are we to obey? By putting ourselves wholeheartedly behind this missionary program with our prayers and our money.

Brother Willey sailed from the port at Houston, Texas, on the S. S. Ruth Lykes. This ship is a freight steamer with accommodations for a limited number of passengers. He will arrive in Cristobal, Canal Zone on Oct. 8th, the Lord willing, and can be reached by mail, for the present, at the following address: Rev. T. H. Willey, Cristobal, Canal Zone, % American Bible Society, Bible House.

Yes, the time to which we have been looking is here, for Bro. Willey has sailed. But it is with grief in my heart that I now recount the conditions under which he sailed. Might I here say, that as one who helped Brother Willey get ready to sail, and who was with him until the ship sailed out of sight, I am not exaggerating anything which I shall say. I am going to try by the Lord's help to state facts as they are. The conditions under which our missionary sailed are a disgrace to our church and to: God. We, as a church, covenanted with him to put him across the water, and to support his family, while he as our ambassador and God's ambassador carried the Gospel. Bv faith he has stepped out, trusting God and us, and has faithfully fulfilled his part. But we have sent him into a foreign country with NO MEDICAL

NO CONCENTRATED SUPPLIES. FOOD SUPPLIES. INSUFFICIENT PHOTO SUPPLIES. VERY INADE-QUATE CLOTHING, as well as a number of other things not quite so important, but necessary supplied AND WITH ONLY HALF THE NECESSARY FUNDS. And on top of all this he had to leave without having anything with which to support his family. It seems as though we thought he could get his necessary supplies by performing some miracle, for we made absolutely no provision for his obtaining them. Brother Willey started for Texas from North Carolina to be here to sail on scheduled time, without enough funds to hardly get out of the state. But the Lord intervened, and with the help of one of our churches, and the help of some others than Free Will Baptists, he was enabled to get here.

Are we going to let things stand as they are? Here is his family without a thing, and they must have funds NOW. We agreed to give them \$20,00 a week while Bro. Willey was gone, in order that they might not suffer. I for one cannot stand by and see them suffer. Bro. Willey must have more funds within two months. We lack \$450.00 of giving him the stipulated amount. In the countries to which he is going the rate of exchange is so high that, it takes about \$1.50 of our American money to make \$1.00 of their money, thus making the money that he does have, worth about half as much. Some of the countries require a deposit of \$200.00 to \$250.00 when you enter, thus making it necessary to have more money. This deposit is returned on leaving the country, but he must have money to travel within its borders.

Some, in making claim to the greatness of our Free Will Baptist, say that we have 300.000 members. But others say we have 200,000. Then let us take a case of supposition. Supposing we only have 50,000 from whom we could expect any help-If these gave only 10 cents a piece per year. we would have \$5,000.00 for Foreign Missions. May God have mercy on us for giving so little as this amount. If this same 50,000 would give \$1.00 a piece per year we would have \$50,000. with which to start our college. Tf every pastor would take an offering monthly in his church or churches, we would have the necessary funds. With shouting and tears we voted for this missionary program. It takes more than shouting to put a thing 'over, it takes hard work. Resolutions and laws are all right if you work them, but they will not work themselves. They are not worth the paper they are written on unless we put these resolutions into effect. What have we done in Texas? We have done our best by the Lord's help, and have raised approximately \$500.00 CASH in six months' time for Foreign Missions. And this amount from only solven churches. Are we boasting about it? No! We feel that we are still far behind what God is expecting of us. "But," you say. "you talk too much about money." Jesus said more about giving than He did about repentance and regeneration. He knew if He had a man's pocket book, He had his heart. I have no confidence in any man's Christian experience that does not reach down into his pocket book.

Beloved, we cannot let this missionary program fail! We must not retrench! Our church is at the zero hour! Are we going to go over the top, or are we going to settle back into the trenches AND DIE? We need \$5,000.00 for Foreign Missions by one year from now. We must have the necessary funds to send workers into our new field and properly man it. We must have funds now to take care of Brother Willey's family, and to send him the rest of his funds. Bro. Willey is counting on us, God is also counting on us; and I believe you will not fail at this hour. But we must get busy NOW!

# About the College Property or the Weaverville Proposition

The Board of Education of the National Association of The Free Will Baptist Church met in called session at Weaverville, N. C. on Wednesday, October 7. 1936. The following members were present, namely: T. B. Mellette, J. W. Alford, Selph Jones, and I. J. Blackwelder appointed by J. L. Welch as his proxy. Absent were Melvin Bingham and E. E. Morris.

In view of the proposition made the Board by H. C. Sprinkle, Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Brevard College, and Judge Weaver also a member of the same Board of Trustees, the following was adopted,—We, the undersigned, hereby offer the sum of fifteen thousand dollars for all of the Weaverville College property, Weaverville, North Carolina; not including the twenty-two acres more or less, lake tract.

We agree to pay the fifteen thousand as follows:

(1) We assume the \$10,000 deed of trust, now on the property and being held by Ottis Green.

(2) We will pay the sum of \$1,000 cash upon receipt of deed conveying a good fee simple title to said property.

(3) We will pay \$1,000 November 1, 1937.

(4) We will pay \$1,009 November 1, 1938.

(5) We will pay \$1,000 November 1, 1939.

(6) We will pay \$1,000 November 1, 1940.

We hand you herewith a Cashier's Check in the sum of \$100.00 to be held in good faith money and if the offer is accepted it is to be credited on the \$1,000 cash payment to be made on receipt of deed.

In case the offer is rejected, the money is to be returned to us.

We reserve the right to pay any or all of the \$4,000 deferred payment at any interest payment date. It is understood that the payments of the \$4,000 is to draw interest at 6% per annum from date.

Brother Moretz is to make the above offer, and a representative citizen of Weaverville, N. C. is to accompany him.

As Secretary of the Board of Education I will state that the Board was informed that the National Association Executive Committee passed a resolution rescinding the former resolution of the National Association ond the Eastern General Association act making Nashville, Tennessee the home of a centralized college, and that the matter of establishing a home site for a college is now at the discretion of the Board of Education.

It is well to state that the Chairman of the Brevard College Board of Ð

Trustees. Brevard, N. C., made a different proposition to the one presented to the Board when in session at Nashville, Tenn. on Aug. 18, 1936. The proposition submitted by the said Board is as follows:

The Free Will Baptist Board of Education pay \$2,600.00 cash; assume a \$10,000 deed of trust now on the property, held by Ottis Green; and pay Brevard College \$12,400.00. The last may be had upon terms. Thus, \$10,000 difference exists between the offers. But our Board made the offer which was first submitted to us at Nashville, Tenn. on August 18, 1936.

The secretary of the Board of Education invites any of the visitors or other members of the Board who were present to make comment on the offers and the property as an opportunity being presented to us. Several visitors were present to view the property and the lay of the land. These were: Mr. and Mrs. Covile, Mr. and Mrs. Smith, Rev. and Mrs. I. J. Blackwelder of East Nashville, Tenn., Rev. and Mrs. J. R. Davidson of Glennville, Ga., Rev. E. B. Joyner, Lake Butler, Fla., Rev. F. E. Crosby, Hazelhurst, Ga., Rev. and Mrs. G. C. Vause, Timmonsville, S. C., Rev. M. H. Mellette, Mr. and Mrs. Creighton Gibbons. Mr. Fred Mims, Turbeville, S. C., Rev. and Mrs. W. L. Moretz, Swannanoa, N. C. Other visitors were present, but I do not remember all. Brother Selph Jones and his brother were the only ones from west of the Mississippi.

The Board feels that the property is well worth the price asked for, and we also feel that the offer first presented to us should be sustained.

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### "Ye Ought" By John B. Rollins, Purdy, Missouri

The great cardinal doctrines of the Christian faith are set forth in "Ye Ought," which contains the majestic do's" and "don'ts" as infallible guides for our conduct in that faith. One of the first principles involved in a Christian experience is "prayer." The penitent one prays—his whole soul is a prayer. Also the secret to a successful Christian life is a devoted, consecrated prayer life. Jesus said, "Men ought always to pray, and not to faint" (Luke 18:1).

The construction that is oftentimes placed on the word "ought" renders it of none effect. It is accepted that prayer is good and men are better if they pray and faint not; but to contend that there is nothing definite, nothing binding, no necessity involved, or nothing commanded in "Ye Ought," is to contend that we don't just have to if we don't want to. To contend thus is to contend in error and to the destruction of Christian The language of the Bible faith. commands more attention than that; The New Testament Greek word dei is the third person (men ought) of the primative verb deo which means "to bind." Thus men are bound by obligation to pray and faint not. Also deon, a derivative from, and a neuter active participle to the primative verb, means "it has been, it was, and it is necessary (as binding). It includes "behoove, must needs. be needful, ought, and should." My friends, you cannot live a Christian life if you fail to pray!

Our Lord prayed! He taught His disciples to pray, then commanded them to pray. We hear Him say, "Watch and pray, that ye enter not into temptation" (Matt. 26:41).

"Watch ye therefore, and pray always, that ye may be accounted worthy to escape all these things

### CHRISTIANS, STAND FOR THE RIGHT.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

How many today, in general over our land, are standing for the right? Not sinners, but Christians. We can't expect sinners to stand for the right; but sinners do expect Christians to stand for the right.

The Bible says, "Hold fast the faith which was once delivered unto the (see context) and to stand before the Son of man" (Luke 21:36).

In the same capacity of "ought" as explained above, the following Christian doctrines are set forth. Please see the context of each:

1. "Ought not Christ to have suff-



John B. Rollins, ered these things?" (Luke 24:26). 2. "These ought ye to have done,

and not to leave the other undone" (Luke 11:42).

3. "We ought to obey God rather than men" (Acts 5:29).

4. "To every man that is among you, not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think" (Romans 12:3).

There is another phase to the word "ought," that carries a yet greater weight than that translated from *deo*. The greater "ought" in the Greek is *opheileo*, which means "to owe (pecuniarily); figuratively, to be under obligation, behoove, be bound, be in debt, be due, duty, must, must needs, needful." It is translated "ought,"

saints." What was that faith? Does that mean for Christians to just go on and live like the people of the world? No! Christians ought to always to try to do their best to be on the right side.

At present all minds are on the coming election, for the right of the people to rule the nation. Folks, can you find inside the lids of the Bible, where God told us to vote for any certain political party? No, but He

"must." Opheilea "should and (ought) is an imperative command. authoratative and obligatory, that is. it is a command from one who has the authority to give it, and the one to whom it is given is under an emphatic obligation to do the commandment. The word, in its full force of meaning, is found in 1 John 3:16 and 4:11, "If God so loved us, we ought. to love one another." My friends, to prove that we have not translated amiss, we shall substantiate the foregoing concepts by the English version of the Bible. We ought to love one another. The test of discipleship is love, for Jesus said, "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples. if ye have love one to another" (John 13:35). The test of fellowship with God is love: "We know that we have passed from death unto life, because we love the brethren." And moreover. "He that loveth not his brother abideth in death;" and more forcefully yet, "Whosoever hateth his brother is a murderer: and ye know that no murderer hath eternal life abiding in him" (1 John 14:15). Yea! The murderer shall have his part in the lake of fire and brimstone. which is the second death. This is proof that "we ought to love." "Ye Ought" is not some insignificant, loosely composed, hap-hazard statement. It is an imperative command.

The word "opheileo" is used with all its command of authority, and its obligation is imposed upon man who is in debt to do the commandment, and that debt is now due. Such is the language of St. John 13:14, "Ye also ought to wash one another's feet." Jesus continued His commandment: "For I have given you an example, that ye should do as I have done to you." Then He promised, "If ye know these things, happy are ye if ye do them."

Thus "Ye Ought" carries a great message to man and will lead him into happiness, love, peace, and joy in the Holy Ghost, if he will only submit to God and follow Him.

Take them to church and Sunday school, and see that they stay in the church house, and keep quiet. Give them good books and papers to read; bad reading is a great harm: but good reading helps a child to develop a love for God and good things. Let us at least take as much interest in our children's welfare as we do in our crops.

Pray for us, that we may always work for the right in God's way. —Mrs. Edith Bagwell.

### REPORT OF OUR MISSIONARY *By Rev. T. H. Willey, Our Missionary to South America. Address: % American Bible Society, Panama Canal Zone.*

I have been on the Isthmus of Panama just four days, during which time I have discovered a few things of fundamental importance. I have stood appalled and amazed at the extent to which fanatically narrow sectarianism will stretch its influence. Here men of authority stand with a mandate in the form of a constitution that forbids a white missionary of the Protestant faith to work among the 25,000 Indians on the Isthmus. I had not been in Panama one hour when I saw a San Blass Indian, many of whom speak both English and Spanish. I stopped him and began investigation, hoping to discover the whereabouts of an Indian friend, one of their own chiefs, Iglesias. This young fellow led me through the streets of Cristobal, on through Colon to the English speaking Union church. I did not find Iglesias, but came face to face with an old class mate who is pastor of the Union Church of Colon. How the Lord does lead when we commit it all to Him; He has always made His promise good! Here I was with a friend of great influence, and already during my brief stay I have been enabled to make some wonderful, contacts.

Another discovery I made is, that one day's journey by freight boat from Cristobal, on an island out from the main land live the San Blass Indians, 15,000 of them, with them now is this young chief educated at the Missionary Training Institute at Niack, N. Y., and his wife, a fine well prepared sacrificial young woman. This young couple is the answer to the above mentioned mandate, he is one of them they would not date to

do anything with. One man informs me that he gives them \$60.00 a year, showing his' confidence in them. Then today in Panama City, I met an explorer who makes a business of taking tourists, that are a little more daring than the average, back into the interior by aeroplane and motor boat among the Valiente Indians. It is estimated on authority that there are 8,000 of them in a scope of territory sixty by thirty miles. When questioned if he had ever encountered a missionary among them, he answered "Never." To the north of the San Blass Islands, living in what is known as El Boco del Toro, the mouth of the bull, are the Talmanche Indians, numbering over a thousand. These all are naked savages, wearing nothing but a loin cloth, and using long javelins made of palm boll, and bow and arrows. How our hearts are burdened as we think of them. I am planning on going among them possibly within six weeks, God willing.

We will still think of Panama, with an army of Americans within beck and call. There is one district here, a congested section with 50,000 people. One denomination has talked for five years about entering, but nothing has been done. These people still wait with no messsenger of light. Brothers and sisters of the fair land of the United States of America, do you long for lots of room where we need not step on each other's denominational toes? Just think with me, will you, of this field just about eight hours drive from Tiami, Florida, by aeroplane of course.

Now go with me in figures as I went with one of the greatest author-

ities today on Latin America, Mr. Greggory of the American Bible Society. We took three districts or departments as they are called; beginning along the coast of Northern Colombia, South America.

. In those three divisions there are no missionaries. We start with Magdalena with a population of 302,000, three of her cities located fairly close have a large enough population to make a good sized congregation for any preacher: Santa Marta with her 22,067, Barranquilla with 139,974, Cartagena with 86,467. These are all scaport cities. The next department is Atlantico with a population of 242,000, then further down is the department of Bolivia with 457,000, then we move on down the winding river to the department of Santender del Norte with its 329,000, but the place that interests us most is Santender with her population of 595,000, a congested section with a leading city of importance, having a population of 44,000, and the following cities in less than one hundred miles: Giron 8,000, Rionegro 16,000, Lebrija 11,000, Piedecuesta 10,000, Guaca 8,000, Zapaloca 12,000, Galan 6,000, Simacota 6,000.

I am here with a burning desire to go into this virgin field, truly it is not all roses, neither will it be free of cost, but I say to you: What shall we do with this? It is left for us to answer. We can as well say, "What will ye do then with Jesus which is called the Christ?" Do we know Him as the mighty Savior, One altogether lovely? Would we share this knowledge with those who have never heard? If we fail here, we declaim Him by our actions. Along with a few others, I am saying, "As for me and my house, we shall do our best."

Subject: "GOD. THE FATHER."

Text: "But as the days of Noe were, so shall also the coming of the Son of man be" (Matt. 24:37).

for your home. Society needs some agency or influence to keep it clean and wholesome. The natural tendency of people is to do the things that bring reproach upon society. If the average young man 'or young woman were to allow their conduct to agree with their natural desires and inclinations, society would be corrupt in the extreme, but there is a better influence that tends to raise people's desires to things higher and better, and set a goal of idealism ahead. Where is the source of that influence? It is in the Lord, and it reaches to us through the touch of Jesus. You will notice that in all His social activities He never stooped to anything that was low, but all His acts were those of the highest standard of morality and Christianity. Ilis was a life that would lift people higher and help them to better things; a life of humble service to help people with their cares and burdens and sorrows and troubles.

Then would we be thinking of Him as a real living and loving God? or a real living Father? No, we would not be thinking of anything that is living, nor of anything that is loving. nor of anything that is REAL.

In Him, who is the center of the spiritual order, "we live and move and have our being." Then if we are real "living beings, and really move," He is real and His life is communicable, as is ours.

So, now, if you are thinking of a god that is like unto gold, or silver, or stone graven by art or man's device, you are thinking, too much, along the line of idolatry to be thinking about my God. because my God is the real, loving, and living Father who sends us "bread" out of His own home and from His own table.

Our Savior said once, "If a son ask his father for bread, will he give him a stone? or if he ask a fish, will he for a fish give him a serpent? If ye then, being evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more shall your heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to them that ask him?"

Well, well, this is such a wonderful subject to study on that we could go on and on with it, but will not try to take up so much room this time, and will look forwad to another good subject for next month, the Lord being willing to send us one. So, pray for us, that we might be led by Him alone in this work for Him.
