# The Closing of the Gentile Age

"And they shall fall by the edge of the sword, and shall be led away captive into all nations: and Jerusalem shall be trodden down of the Gentiles, until the times of the Gentiles be fulfilled' (Luke 21:24).

Where is the observer of today who is not made to know we are living in strange times, and who will not confess that many of the events which are transpiring today are significant when viewed through the prophetic telescope? The economic, moral, and spiritual condition of the Gentile nations today, together with the late activities of the Jewish people in their present returning back to Palestine, are some of the outstanding signs of the times, and when studied in the light of God's Word, are some of the most striking evidences of the soon return of our Lord.

In order to determine or know the closing of the Gentile age, we must needs know something of the beginning of their age, and also of the length of time God said He would take in punishing Israel upon the condition that they should fail Him. In Lev., the 26th chapter God told Israel four different times in this one chapter that if they failed to keep His commandments and statutes, He would punish them "seven times" for their sins. Now in studying the numerology of the Bible, we find that a "time" is 360; the length of a Jewish year. We have our solar year of 365 days, then there is the lunar year of 354 days, 8 hours, 48 minutes and 34 seconds, and the Jewish year of 360 days. But the time as spoken of in Lev. 26, and elsewhere in the Bible, means 360, because it is spoken of directly in connection with the Jews.

Now a "time" does not always mean 360 days. Sometimes it means 360 years, and such is the case in the 26th chapter of Lev., while in Dan, 1:25 and in Rev. 12:14, it means 360 day years, or 3½ years, which Scriptures refer to the last half of the seven years of tribulation just preceding the return of Christ to earth. In order to determine if the Scriptures in question mean 360 years or one Jewish year of 360 days, they must be studied in their relative position; which is true of any Scripture if one would arrive at its true meaning. We cannot take Scriptures from their context and build up a substantial doctrine. "No scripture is of any private interpretation." So the seven times punishment of the Jews in Lev. 26, means seven times 360 years or 2520 years. We are bound to know this is true as we consider the long dipersion of Israel in which they received their punishment, and which dispersion or breaking off of the natural olive branches because of unbelief, occasioned the grafting in of the wild branches or the Gentiles (Rom. 11). And further, if we try to make the seven times of Lev. 26 mean 360 day years; well, it just would not work, for even the 70 years of Babylonish captivity within itself lasted much longer than that.

Now, that we have it settled as to the meaning of "a time," let's now determine when the Gentile age had its beginning. All students of Bible prophecy are agreed that it had its beginning at the time of the first raid and the carrying away captive of the Jews by Nebuchadnezzar in 607

(some say 604) B. C. But let us term it this way: This was just the commencement of the beginning of the Gentile age. Later, in 585 B. C., Nebuchadnezzar made a final raid, or finishing up of the job in which the beautiful temple was burned, etc. This date marked the definite beginning of the Gentile age. Though the Jews were permitted to return under the leadership of Ezra and Nehemiah and resume their temple worship, yet they never held any mandate over their country any more. They were always under the overlordship of some Gentile power. Even our Savior Himself paid tribute to Caesar.

Now let us take the "seven times" measuring rod of 2520 years and lay one end of it down at 607 B. C. Reading down thru the ages, lo and behold, to our astonishment we arrive at the date of exactly the year of our Lord 1914. The very mention of which date takes our minds like a flash to the outbreak of that most horrible of all wars. Yes, it was called the World War because practically every nation on earth was dragged into it. The Gentile nations of earth went into a holocaust of hell.

Then if we lay our measuring rod down at 604 B. C. (time of Nebuchadnezzar's second raid on Jerusalem), again we find something just as striking because it takes us to the year 1917 A. D. Those who kept close watch on the transpiring events during the anxiety of those days will remember that 1917 was the year in which the British armies gained control of Jerusalem and Palestine under the leadership of General Allanby; taking it from the

The Temperance cause is just as real, just as important, and just as much, yea far more needed than ever before. Since our Government has gone into the liquor business, our country is flooded with beer, wine, ale, rum, and the various hard liquors wheresoever one may go, there being many, many more saloons than in preprohibition days.

Many people seem to feel that the liquor business is here and there is nothing we can do about it; but the drys are doing something about it in many places over the nation; and we can do something, if we think we can and will really try. Of course the wets are many and they have plenty of money and a determination to not only keep what they have, but to gain more advantage for their dirty business: but many people are coming to realize the great mistake they made when they voted for repeal, and are turning against the demoralizing, destructive liquor traffic. Prohibition is coming back; and the sooner the people who want prohibition believe it, the sooner it will be realized. Towns, cities, counties and states can petition for an election and vote the stuff out, and many are doing it; why can't we?

The wets are getting scared, and are asking for laws to protect them. And too, they have many well known men of great influence in their employ at salaries as high as \$300,000.00 per year.

The wets are trying to 'purge' our children's text books of statements about alcohol. They say "These statements are misleading and designed to sway the child's mind definitely against all alcoholic beverages." I should hope so. An ungodly clique of unbelivers got the Bible ruled out of our public schools; now this lawless bunch of wets are trying to fix our children's text books so as to admit the free use of booze by the

children; what can we do about it?

One of the worst features of the whole liquor question is the very friendly attitude and the support given to it by our Government, especially by President Roosevelt and his advisors; and with the death dealing, demoralizing stuff which now floods our nation, they are killing thousands. Every friend and supporter of the liquor traffic, even those who voted for repeal are guilty of murder in every death caused by alcoholic drinks, and there have been many thousand such deaths since church members helped the Devil's crowd to kill the 18th Amendment.

GOVERNMENT RUM from the "Virgin Islands Government Corporation" is now being placed on sale in U.S.A. Through Secretary Ickes of the Department of the Interior, millions or dollars of the financially distressed American taxpayers' money have been spent on St. Croix and other Virgin Islands in preparation for making Government rum; and now, according to official figures, more than 600,000 gallons of St. Croix rum is in Government storage. This rum bears Government guarantee that it is 90 proof-it is a very dangerous beverage.

Some of this rum is being sent to President and Mrs. Roosevelt, and to cabinet officers. It is said that more alcohol is now used about the White House than for many years—now St. Croix rum is added.

Our First Lady is reported to have said a few years ago, that girls should learn how much drink they can carry; so it will be interesting to see how this new rum ration works out, under official patronage.

"All we like sheep have gone astray" (Isaiah 53:6)

We have a lot of people that have their names on the Free Will Baptist church roll, that are more like children than anything I know. Anything can come along and jump up and down a time or two, and say they have religion that is different from any body else's, and there are a lot of our people who will take in after them.

Let us look into the word sheep for a little while—SHEEP.

S.—Strayed. Sheep are not like other animals, they cannot fight and protect themselves, and they are noted for getting lost. Horses and dogs easily find their way back home: but a number of our people are like sheep, they have gone astray, and can't find their way back. David said, "I have gone astray like a lost sheep" (Psalm 119:176).

The lost sheep H.—Helpless. is helpless and must be rescued. Will we be like them? Will we listen to the Shepherd's call and return? "Co sheep, co sheep, co sheep," I hear the shepherd

"Co sheep." I see him calling, standing out there on a cliff calling for them to come. I see him telling his dogs to bring them back. I see one of the old sheep leap off down the hill, and there are a lot of lambs that take after him or her, as the case may be. I see the poor shepherd doing his best, but they keep going until at the edge of a great cliff, but they are too far gone to stop; and they go plunging down to their death. And then I see the poor shepherd at the corral, weeping because he could not rescue them. times we pastors are made to weep when our people take off after something we know will ruin them. We do our best to rescue them, but they will not listen, and just go on and plunge down to their destruction.

E.—Empty. When a sheep is lost, it won't eat, so it becomes empty, and death is the result. So it is with us, when we leave the way God intended for us to travel. We begin to get hungry, and spiritual death is the result. "Man dreameth and, behold, he eateth; but he awaketh, and his soul is empty" (Isaiah 29:8).

E.—Err. Even the poor sheep does wrong, it errs. It cannot bite or kick, but can go wrong by not following the Shepherd.

P.—Perishing. Away on the mountain wild and bare, away from the Shepherd's tender care. Are you a lost sheep? Listen to the call: "Co sheep."

# FREE WILL BAPTIST BOARD OF EDUCATION SCHOOL NEWS

I feel that no explanation should be made regarding the reasons why the Board of Education thought best not to begin school as we announced last September in Nashville, Tenn. But I will state that many of our people came out open minded and said they would not support such an institution located at the prescribed place. we thought best to change location, and had an investigation made regarding the old Weaver College property at Weaverville, N. C. This we did, but as we stated in a recent issue of the Free Will Baptist, the property was sold for cash to other parties. This left the board without a location site until they can have another 'meeting. Now, since the board is scattered throughout the entire denominational area, we will not meet until it is convenient for us to do so.

Will say that another location can be located where buildings are already s'anding, but we are without funds to purchase upon a cash basis, and we think it fruitless to begin another investigation until we can have ready cash, or sufficient to make a stable and reasonable cash payment.

So far I have received \$4.50 on the \$150,000.00 goal we set last summer while in session at Glennville; Ga., at the Eastern General Association. This with what was raised for initiating a beginning has been more than half spent for the efforts put forth last summer and fall. Thus, apparently, no efforts are being put forth by the bodies composing the members of the National F. W. Baptist Association for the raising of the funds. If the mdney is being raised and placed in their respective local treasury it is not being communicated to me. Therefore, I take it for granted that no effort is being made.

A stipulated sum was asked for from each state, and each state was requested to set up its own organization for raising the money. Now, I am asking for volunteer organizations to be set up throughout our denomination for the raising of the money. Such organizations to be known as COLLEGE CLUB or EDUCATION SOCIETY with rules according as are outlined by the director of the Board of Education, or as the club or society may adopt.

I am asking for volunteer workers who are interested in a college that will serve humanity based upon sound Bible teachings, and who love the cause of our beloved denomination and the Kingdom of Christ. Brother minister, will you enlist as a volunteer worker and have a club organized in your churches? Please read the outline of program and fee charge for membership. The money is to be kept in the local treasury until it is voted to be paid into the treasury of the National Board of Education.

May I urge that you talk this at your next quarterly, or union meeting? By all means let's get busy and be able to report more by next session of the Eastern General Association. Will not all our people take part? When you organize communicate with me. Please keep me posted as to membership and money raised that I may make a report that will be well pleasing and far reaching toward our goal.

### CONSTITUTION and BY-LAWS

PREAMBLE. For the purpose of making suitable preparation for the organizing and building a college that will serve the youth of our land and give glory to God these By-Laws are outlined for the organizing of clubs and societies who volunteer as a-unit working under auspices of the Board of Education of the National Association of Free Will Baptist, and the Board's director for raising funds to be used as herein directed, and as the local unit will be governed.

SECTION I. Agreement. Article 1. We, the undersigned members, agree to subscribe as volunteer workers to work together as a unit for the purpose of raising money to be used for the building and maintaining of a college in accordance with the plans of the National Board of

Education of the Free Will Baptist Church.

Article 2. We also agree to be governed by these rules or to formulate rules that will be approved by the director of the Board of Education.

Article 3. We agree further to work and endeavor to follow a plan whereby we may be able to raise funds as herein prescribed, and to pay dues accordingly into the treasury of the unit, and ten per cent of all dues to the treasurer of the Board of Education to be used for all necessary expense that may be incurred by the secretary-treasurer in pursuance of these plans in effecting the work.

Article 4. We also agree not to withdraw from the unit without first giving due notice by writing, or by word of mouth to the regular officers of the unit.

SECTION III. Officers. Article 1. Each club or socity will have a president, vice president, and secretay and treasurer.

Article 2. Each unit will consist of ten members, more or less. If ten members can be found who will volunteer together to constitute the unit, then as many as can be found who will join. If as many as 20 members join, then two units will be constituted.

Article 3. If thought best a unit and a second unit may be constituted where as many as fiften may wish to join, and if more than 25 members join, then three units may be constituted in the same local church, etc.

Article 4. Dues. Each member will pay into the treasury of local unit as per the agreement agreed upon by the local unit monthly, or quarterly dues. Said dues will be no less than 10c per month, and they may pay as much above that as they may agree upon. Said money shall be kept in the hands of the local treasurer except as stated in article 2 of Section 1. Dues may be 10c, 25c, or 50c for each member per month.

Article 5. When a Club or Society shall be constituted the Club or Society shall communicate to the secretary-treasurer of the Board of Education a \$1.00 fee to be used in the furtherance of the cause of Christian Education. This is additional to the 10 per cent dues collected monthly or quarterly as stated in article 2 of section I.

SECTION IV. Duties of Officers. Article 1. It shall be the duty of the president to preside at each meeting, and to see that disciplinary order will be maintained. He shall assist the unit in any and all undertakings as the unit may wish by majority to perform, or he shall endeavor to have performed the directions of the director of the Board of Education. It being understood that his request shall be reasonable.

Article 2. It shall be the duty of the vice president to act in the absence of the president, and to assist the president in all duties and obligations; and to serve as may be assigned him on any duties.

Article 3. It shall be the duty of the secretary-treasurer to keep a correct record of all transactions of the unit, and a record of all dues collected and paid out; also all money that may be raised by any special plan in helping the goal of the Board of Education. He shall, also, keep subject to the rules herein prescribed all money and pay out same as voted by the unit, or as is stated in article 2 of section 1, and article 5 of section 3. Too, the secretary-treasurer shall communicate with the director and secretary-treasurer of the Board of Education of the local unit's transactions, and initiatives to help in the educational program of the Free Will Baptist Church.

SECTION V. State and National Volunteer Oganizations. Article1. When ten or more clubs have been instituted in each state, a state organization may be set up having its own officers, and regulation according to the direction of the Board of Education.

Article 2. When it shall seem good to the director of the Board of Education of the Free Will Baptist Church a National Educational Association may be set up.

SECTION VI. Discipline of Members. Art. 1. Any member or officer of any local unit may be disciplined and expelled from the local unit by a majority vote of the members present for non-support of the Club or Society, or for any non-Christian conduct.

trouble in this case, I only came to the conclusion that the subject used, indicates, "Too Many Idlers in the Market Place."

Let us compare the church to a city that has a market place, and highways leading into it. In reading about the cities mentioned in the Bible, we find that they had walls built around them, which made it necessary for 'them to have gates to enter into the city. So we find that the market of the city is held in an open square at the gate, which was the appointed place for buying and selling.

Now we know that the strength or very life of the city or town depends on its markets. That is, a city's market is its support or maintenance of power. Our dictionary says that the gates of a place, figuratively speaking, mean the power or dominion of that place; such as, the gates of hell, are the power and dominion of the Devil, and his instruments (Matt. 16:18).

Therefore the gates or the market place represents the power or strength of the city. So, when we see the merchants in the market place standing idle, if we see the market place full of idle merchantmen, then we say the strength or the power of that city is decreasing, and the city is not growing. And the merchants say they are not doing good business or they are not progressing. It is then that they become "idlers in the market place;" and we, in our modern slang, would call them "loafers."

We know that the road or highway that leads into the gate of the city is a great public road for people to travel from other cities and to enter into the city. Surely this is what we call the Highways. So, again the dictionary says, a highway is a great public road open to all classes of people.

Now, today, as then, our busiest merchants use our great highways to gain business. And, also, our highways are used by "all classes" of people, the busy the idle, the good, the bad, the rich and the poor.

Now, in the parable of the laborers in the twentieth chapter of Matthew, there is a question put directly to the idlers in the market place, a question we should apply to ourselves, "Why stand ye here all the day idle?" Can you give a legal reason why you are standing idle in the church? Are you answering the eall, "Go ye, also, into the vineyard?"

Matt. 20:4, says, "And they went their way." This, to my weak way of thinking, meant that they went on, not heeding the call.

I fear, when this call comes to us (as it surely does), that if we should just go our own way, we would eventually be led out the gates onto the great highway, as we have already said, opened to all classes of people. Then, if you have become a "loafer" in the church, or an idle trader in the traffic of the kingdom please stop before you enter into that company of all classes of people on the great broad road; and remember that loving exhortation in Christ's sermon on the mount (Matt. 7:13, 14): "Enter ye in at the strait gate, for wide is the gate and broad is the way that leadeth to destruction, and many there be which go in thereat: because strait is the gate, and narrow is the way, which leadeth unto life, and few there be that find it."

But I feel that, if you are of the good, busy and rich in Spirit class, it is permissable for you to use the great broadway only to gain business for your Master

The Lord says (Luke 14:23), "Go out into the highways and hedges, and compel them to come in, that my house may be filled."

And Paul says (2 Cor. 5:2), "For we are ambassadors for Christ."

But remember, if the land along the highway looks good, don't make the mistake Lot made. He made a good choice so far as the land itself was concerned, but the men of Sodom were wicked. And Peter speaking of Lot says (2 Pet. 2:8), "For that righteous man dwelling among them, in seeing and hearing, vexed his righteous soul from day to day with their unlawful deeds."

We find this same condition prevalent today among men. Some do not care how poor the church is, if the land is good. When they go to look for a farm to buy for a home to raise their children in, they look at the good land first, and some never think of the spiritual environment of the community in which the farm is located. Then, when the children grow up and are led off into the company of all classes of people on the broad road which leads to destruction, they can realize their mistake.

So let's all try to keep busy in our church as co-workers with God. As in the parable of the ten talents, the nobleman said to his servants, "Occupy till I come."

Let us make a choice like Abraham, and do as he did, intercede for those on the highway of destruction

James 5:16—"The effectual fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much."

'Tis not for man to trifle,

Life is brief, and sin is here.

Our age is but the falling of a leaf, A dropping of a tear.

We have no time to sport away the hours;

All must be earnest in a world like ours.

Not many lives, but only one have we, One, only one;

How sacred should that life ever be, that narrow span.

### Light As Darkness

He was led away by the love of strange women, to the extent that he kept a harem of three hundred

concubines, besides his seven hundred wives. Some of his wives were worshippers of idols, and here he added insult to injury by building costly and beautiful temples to other gods, thereby embracing idolatry as well as adultery and poligamy. Therefore God was not pleased with Solomon; and this man looked back over his past life and saw the hideous mockery he had made of the great gifts God had given him. No wonder he said, "All is vanity and vexation of the spirit."

In order to complete his great building program, it was necessary to place heavy taxes on the people, that were burdensome and grievious to be borne. But the saddest part is yet to come: In order to save, Solomon forced about thirty thousand men, women and children from the shelter of their homes to slave in the rock quarries, and to hew cedars of Lebanon, to provide the material for the buildings to please his idolatrous wives.

Also we find the Psalmist David the sweet singer of Israel sinned, and was groping in darkness; and he prayed that the joys of his salvation be restored to him.

And, dear reader, as we see the conditions in our own country, we are forced to the conclusion that darkness has invaded our homes, our churches, and our communities with malice and strife between neighbors and church members, with beer joints, road houses, clubs, and houses of prostitution, scattered the length and breadth of our land.

What a miserable future awaits our boys and girls, unless we the professed Christian people awake to our duty, and demonstrate to the world that the light within us has not been dimmed, and that we are willing to join hearts and hands in a mighty move to erase some of the ungodly things from our country; and this can be done with the ministers fearlessly denouncing sin, and the membership giving their support; then will the light begin to appear, and the angels in heaven will be made to rejoice because of men and women being born into the kingdom of God.

### In Answer to Prayer

We had a remarkable incident to happen on the trip up the Sambu River in the interior of Panama. The second day up we found quite a number of Indians down with fever and, unfortunately, we had nothing except aspirins. The American soldier who accompanied me was to have secured the most important medicines, but did not do so; so when we had need of quinine there was none. I had carried a large supply of aspirins with me from the states which if given at the proper time, will assist in breaking a fever. I counted out a supply then was in a dilema as to how I might instruct them to take their medicine. If you leave a supply of pills and tell them to take them at stated times, they are apt to conclude that, if taking one at a time would help, why not take them all at once and find a cure? Here was a people without a time piece or hour glass, but happily I thought of the sun, and measuring the time by it; so with the canoe boy interpreting, I pointed to the sun, saying, "When the sun comes above the jungle, take one; then when halfway between the jungle and the top of the head, take another; then when the sun is on top of the head, another, and so on, giving the angles of the sun's course through the day.

One of those sick was a lad about ten years of age. They had painted him black from head to foot and cut his hair close to his head. The little fellow was too sick to move, having a burning fever. Four days later as we returned, coming down river, my

mind was full of thoughts of the little lad; so, when we arrived at the bank of the river, I hurried to the hut. I must confess that my heart sank as I climbed up to where a large group of the Indians were gathered. Praying I moved among them, that the child might not be dead, it looked like he was. They had constructed a clever little house of palm leaves, it was an elevation about four feet high, four feet wide, and about five feet long, and over the elevation was a canopy of palm leaves of oval shape. I hurried to the little house with the eyes of all upon me. Then I discovered he was not dead, but still with a raging fever, and helpless. I called our canoe boy and through him told the mother and those around that I was going to talk to the great God of heaven and earth about her boy; I would ask that God would heal him. With the greatest of reverence they bowed their heads as the strange white man laid his hands upon the child and prayed earnestly in a language strange to them. As we prayed the fever abated, so that when we were through the mother came to her child with eyes full of gratitude. She assisted him down from his queer little house, prepared probably for him to die in. When we left, the lad was sitting on the floor looking about.

Little do we realize what fruit this simple incident might bear in the future, but we do know that God desires to prove His power, and never so much as when we are in a situation like the missionary meets daily. The missionaries of the early church had many experiences of supernatural deliverances through prayer. Acts 28 records one in which Paul laid his hands upon the father of a ruler, Publius, and

he was healed of a fever.

Probably this child will never forget the strange experience of the hands of a big white man being laid upon him, and with his face turned to the heavens, talked to an unseen Presence, and his recovery as a result. and again God has marvelously healed in answer to the prayer of faith in these darkened lands. Nothing has a greater effect on primitive people than to observe the healing hand of the Lord laid on the sick. The medicine man prays for the sick in these tribes and they die; but thank God, as we go among them, there is a stronger medicine than that of the witch doctor. "The prayer of faith shall heal the sick, and the Lord shall raise them up,"

hand of the cruel Turk. This was indeed a bright day for Israel.. But during the World War, and since that time, the Gentile nations have disinherited themselves with God by their disregard for Him and His Christ of love, and it is plain to be seen, the stubborn fact lies before us, that the anger of Almighty God is waxed hot against the Gentile nations, and He is once more with kind favor turning to the Jew.

The reason we say the victory of General Allanby at Jerusalem in 1917 was such a bright day for the Jew, we want to explain as follows: The British Government had exhausted their supply of a very necessary chemical needed in making high explosives. the mean time a Jew discovered that the chemical could be made from snow and hail, which, let us state just here, was a fulfillment of Job 38:22, 23, "Hast thou entered into the treasures of the snow? or hast thou seen the treasures of the hail, which I have reserved against the time of trouble, against the day of battle and war?" The British government, of course, wanted to deal for his new findings. The Jew proposed to present it to them upon condition that the government of Great Britain would secure the land of Palestine for the Jews, and give it back to them; and as the British government has always been a friend to the Jew, consequently this was done.

If you will notice, not so long after this the terrible war began to come to a close. It seems the great eternal purpose had largely been secured. Since the beginning of the return of the Jews, which is known as the great Zionist movement, there has been a great shaking in the valley of dry bones. As recorded in Ezekiel 37, Bone has been coming to his bone, and flesh is coming upon them. God is breathing new national life into Israel. Soon we will hear Him say, as He did to Ezekiel of old, "This is the whole house of Israel." Authorities tell us there is no depression in Palestine. A great modern building and improvement program is going on there and has been all during the terrible economic distress of the Gentile nations. The Jews are returning, taking their wealth with them. While at the same time, before our very eyes, we see the Gentile nations going bankrupt, cracking, crumbling, and falling to pieces. Such moral and spiritual breakdown we have never seen as we are witnessing throughout the Gentile world of today, and our own nation is certainly no exception.

Yes, I say the Gentile age began to close in 1914. I cannot accept a lot of the wild scriptural speculation that was made during and since the days of the Great War, such as, "It was the battle of Armageddon;" "Christ came and is now here invisibly, judging the nations," etc. But I do believe it marked the beginning of the close of the Gentile age. Ask any genuine Gospel minister who was preaching a pure Gospel during the World War, and has continued to do so; and he will tell you it was tremendously hard to have a revival during the war, and has been getting harder ever since .. Why is that true? Simply because the Holy Spirit is being lifted from the Gentile people. Could we reasonably expect the clean, pure Holy Spirit of God to remain so brightly among the Gentile nations, and they conducting themselves as they are, and as they have been ever since the outbreak of the Great War? say we cannot expect it, for sin is what drives the Spirit away.

Now back for another brief mention of our 2520 year measuring rod. Remember 585-586 B. C. marked the definite beginning of the Gentile age; so measuring from that date we arrive at the year 1935-1936. As 1914 marked the commencement of the close of the Gentile age, and 1917 brought us another great outstanding event in that direction; how do we know 1937 will not bring us something else of striking importance? How do we know but what it will mean practically the complete closing of our Gentile age? The measuring rod undeniably worked out exactly on the other two dates; therefore, could we reasonably think it would work just the same on this third one? This year may mark the date of the making of the seven year covenant between the Jews in Pales, tine and their prophetic proteetorate as recorded in Dan. 9:27 It may bring the complete rising up on their part of "the whole house of Israel' (Ezek. 37). Or it could mean the catching away of the bride of Christ, delivering them from the Great Tribulation which is to come, which privilege we are promised if we keep oil in our vessels. And who can question the fact that we are in the foot-hills of the mountain peaks of the tribulation period now?

But regardless of what may or may not come, my advice to every Gentile is, If you expect to find Christ as your Savior, you had better be in a hurry. The Gentile age is closing. This, the church age, known as the new thing in the earth, is coming to its climax. We are in the extreme close days of the sixth dispensation, or the Dispensation of Grace. We are experiencing a dispensational change, which is something new to the people of this age. The ministers of today are preaching under conditions much like it was in the days of John the Baptist and the ministry of Jesus. They preached during the days of a dispensational change. Such a time always brings the extremes, both pro and con. Such a time is always characterized by strange happenings in both religious and civil affairs. And let me say the closing of this, the sixth dispensation and the ushering in of the next. the seventh and last dispensation, will be characterized by the glorious return of the Christ. "Even so, come, Lord Jesus."
