"Brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended; but this one thing I do, forgetting those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus." (Phil. 3:13-14).

A soldier is not expected to retreat or look to the right or left; but straight ahead. We are expected, as children of God, to keep our eyes centered on Christ, heaven and heavenly things. There is nothing to be gained and all to be lost by retreat. Peter, for instance, got along fine as long as he looked toward Christ; but as soon as he began to look back, or at the waves, he began to sink. When we begin to look back, we lose confidence and be-Come unworthy. "No man, having put his hand to the plow, and looking back is fit for the Kingdom of God." The road is not wide enough to turn around on!

"Brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended...." Paul says, in effect, I don't count myself to have gained the victory, yet; but I can forget the things which are behind and just press on towards the prize.

We notice that in order to press on successfully it was necessary to "forget those things which are behind" If we sin, come short of our duty, become condemned of a mistake, etc., confess it then and there to God; pray it through and forget it. "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." (1John 1:9)

Then, we must forget our victories, as well as our shortcomings. Paul Was not always referring to his past victories, in fact, he seldom referred to them. His attitude toward his past accomplishments may be summed up in this statement, "God forbid that I should glory, save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ." (Gal. 6:14)

Quite often Christian workers are

successful for awhile, and as they look back over past blessings and victories, become self-satisfied and lose their further usefulness. "Bighead," will kill a horse! God gives the victories, anyway. It doesn't matter how great a blessing you have received in the past, it won't suffice for today. There is always a greater one just ahead. "Launch out into the deep" (Luke 5:4). But, in order to do that one must cut the shore lines, and pull in the anchors, and lay aside the besetting sin and just "Launch out."

Nominal Christians often try to stay too close to the place where they waded in. There are a great many "Ankleites" in our churches, people who never get more than ankle deep in God's grace and won't stay in long enough to get their feet wet. Are you an "Ankleite?" Let's do like Ezekiel, just wade out about shoulder deep and take a big drink, it'll be free of wiggletails and tadpoles (Ezek. 47). Get the "Second Blessing," and the ninety-second. The sky is the limit. Press On Toward the Prize!

Then, too, we must pray without ceasing (1 Thes. 5:17). It is true that one cannot always be on their knees before God, when at work or play, or traveling from one place to another; but one can keep themselves on their spiritual knees, and the heart in an attitude of prayer. The Devil cannot enter a praying heart. Jesus said, "Watch and pray, that ye enter not into temptation. The spirit, indeed, is willing, but the flesh is weak" (Mt. 26:41).

In this great task of pressing on, one may well ask, "How often shall we pray?" There isn't any definite, inflexible rule regarding the number of times, or the minutes, or hours one shall pray each day. But, it seems that David and Daniel have left us some good examples in that respect.

"Evening, morning, and at noon will I pray and cry aloud, and he shal! hear my voice" (Psa. 55:17). David, a man after God's own heart, prayed three times a day!

"Now when Daniel knew that the writing was signed, he went into his house; and his windows being open in his chamber toward Jerusalem, he kneeled upon his knees three times a day, and prayed, and gave thanks before his God, as he did afore time" (Dan. 6:10).

We notice in this verse that Daniel tells us how to pray, and how often to pray, and in what position to do the praying, and the direction to look, while we are at it!

If we are familiar with Dan, 6, we know that the leaders of the kingdom under Darius had the decree signed to destroy Daniel; because, he was preferred by Darius and the Spirit of God was in him. Brother, the Devil will try to stop you, too! Daniel served a King that was able to set decrees aside, and Daniel offered up the best Devil Chaser the world ever heard of-prayer. He didn't go home and hide in the clothes closet. or under a stack of quilts! He did not even close his windows! I don't believe he even took the trouble to whisper his prayers!

He kneeled down upon his knees and looked toward Jerusalem, "The Holy City," and prayed three times a day as he did aforetime. He didn't just pray when in great trouble. It was a habit of his!

He had his windows open toward Jerusalem. No wonder he was able to stand uninjured in the lions' den! If we will get the windows of our soul open toward The New Jerusalem (heaven), and our minds off the world and worldly cares. He'll give us grace to stand, too.

Let us keep PRESSING ON, "till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ" (Eph. 4:13).

EASTER AND THE RESURRECTION By the Editor

On the first Sunday after the first full moon after the 21st of March, each year, we celebrate the resurrection of our Lord and Savior, and we call the day Easter. There is no greater fact in history than the resurrection of Christ; and it is a fact that should mean much to all of us: for His resurrection guarantees the resurrection of every born again person who walks "not after the flesh, but after the Spirit." "Christ the first fruits; afterward they that are Christ's at His coming" (1 Cor. 15:23).

The word Easter is found in the Bible only once (Acts 12:4), and there it means, or should be translated Passover. East and Easter come from the same source, and mean a rising or coming forth—Easter suggests the spring time when all nature is coming forth in renewed life. East suggests the rising sun: Easter points back to the empty tomb, and reminds us that Christ is risen, and ever liveth.

The sun rises and brings light and heat, without which nothing could live; and the Lord says, "But unto you that fear my name shall the Sun of righteousness arise with healing in his wings" (Mal. 4:2); and His rising brings life to all that are His.

We think of our bodies as being composed of flesh and blood, and bones, and that is true; and Paul says that "Flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God." The human body was made of dust: "And the Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living soul" (Gen. 2:7). And God said unto Adam, "For dust thou art, and unto dust shalt thou return" (Gen. 3:19).

All the above is quite true of the body, yet there are great and precious promises concerning the body after death, given to them that love God.

Paul said (1 Cor. 15:44), "It is sown a natural body; it is raised a spiritual body."

"And as we have borne the image of the earthy, we shall also bear the image of the heavenly" (1 Cor 15:49).

"But if the Spirit of him that raised up Jesus from the dead dwell in you, he that raised up Christ from the dead shall also quicken your mortal bodies by his Spirit that dwelleth in you" (Rom. 8:11).

Man is a triune being, composed of body, soul and spirit. At death the body returns to the earth as it was; and the spirit returns to God who gave it (Eccl. 12:7). The soul also goes to God at death: for John the



Revelator said (Rev. 20:4), "And I saw the souls of them that were beheaded for the witness of Jesus." And when the fifth seal was opened (Rev. 6:9), John "saw under the altar the souls of them that were slain for the word of God"

These Scriptures plainly show us that only the body goes to the grave; and it returns to dust, yet the body shall be raised up, its redemption is promised (Rom. 8:11, 23). There is mystery here, there are things we cannot understand: but we know that we have a natural body, and we shall have a spiritual body: for God says we shall be like Jesus.

"God is light," and "God created all things from Himself;" so our human bodies, in their final state, must consist of light. At death, our bodies, being made of atoms of light, which may be separated and scattered: but these atoms of light, being indestructible, remain in the knowledge of God, and He will fashion them into a glorious spiritual body.

The particles or atoms which form the bodies of them that believe are to be glorified: for God shall change our vile bodies and fashion them like unto the glorious body of Jesus (Phil. 3:21). In fact the process is already begun. Paul, in speaking of spiritual glory, said, "But we all, with open face beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, are changed into the same image from glory to glory, even

as by the Spirit of the Lord" (2 Cor. 3:18)

Paul has a great deal to say about the resurrection in the 15th chapter of First Corinthians. He says in verse 35, "But some man will say, How are the dead raised up? and with what body do they come?" With glorified bodies, bodies of light, bodies the natural eye cannot see, bodies of flesh and bones, just like the Lord's resurrection body-our natural bodies are flesh and blood, and bones; and our spiritual bodies will be flesh and Spirit, and bones. Our present natural life is in the blood: our future spiritual life will be in the Spirit-instead of blood we shall have the Spirit toursing through our bodies.

And Paul said (1 Cor. 15:41-43), "There is one glory of the sun, and another glory of the moon, and another glory of the stars: for one star differeth from another star in glory. So also is the resurrection of the dead It is sown in corruption; it is raised in incorruption: it is sown in dishonour; it is raised in glory: it is sown in weakness; it is raised in power." So then

What is sown is mortal, What is raised is immortal.

We, who are Christians, now have eternal life abiding in us; but our bodies are mortal. Paul said (2 Cor 4:7), "But we have this treasure in earthen vessels." Yes, we have life now in mortal bodies that are subject to death; but we are to have immortality in immortal bodies that are not subject to death (1 Cor. 15:53).

As we finish this life; so will the resurrection find us—we will find life or death in the resurrection; and we are to decide now which it shall be.

"For He is Risen, as He Said"
Matthew 28:6.

Christ hath risen! Hallelujah! Blessed morn of life and light; Lo, the grave is rent asunder, Death is conquered thro' His might.

Christ hath risen! Hallelujah! Friends of Jesus, dry your tears; Thro' the vail of gloom and darkness, Lo, the Son of God appears.

Christ hath risen! Hallelujah! He hath risen, as He said; He is now the King of glory, And our great exalted Head.

Our loud speaker is proving a great blessing. We had two open aid meetings Saturday, and in the second service we made an altar call and a number came forward, and three men were saved, and one woman reclaimed.

We have received several dollars on the speaker as follows:

We want all to pray as you read this. We came on this trip by faith, with no money in the treasury for the home missionary, and until we get a system to support the home work, we can't get very far with foreign work. So we ask all to pray with us, and each society sending \$1.00 could soon help us pay for the speaker, which is a wonderful thing, to advertise our work, and help get to thousands of souls in the open air that never darken a church door; so if any individual feels like helping it will be greatly appreciated. Those that tithe, pray,

perhaps God will allow you the privilege of helping in this missionary tour in the east. Money is very scarce in this part of the country, and many of the churches are weak, almost all in the rural districts.

God bless you all, and pray very earnestly for us, that God will use us to His glory and the salvation of souls

Dear Editor and Gem readers:

While I am feeling so bad, and it is raining so I can't get out to work at anything, I will try to write a few lines, it has been so long since I have written.

I have been reporting the Union Q. M., but they have been so weak lately that I was ashamed to report, but I will try to send in a little report of the March meeting which was held with Young's Chapel on Bridge Creek in Putnam County, W. Va. I was there Friday night.

The introductory sermon was preached by Eld. Frank Lovejoy and Eld. Berry of the Brotherhood Q. M. Met back Saturday at nine o'clock a. m. Opened by the new clerk, Bro. Hobert Jorden.

Eld. R. L. Stanley was elected moderator.

Committees appointed.

Letters called for, four churches reported by delegates and letter, one by letter by mail, no delegates, three gave no report at all.

Adjourned until two o'clock p. m. Eld. Charley Harper was called to the stand to preach, and he sure did preach a fine sermon.

We went to dinner and enjoyed ourselves in the homes of the good folks with their families and ate a good dinner.

Met back at two o'clock p. m. Opened by singing and prayer.

Committee's report on next session. Sent the next Q. M. to Good Hope on Turkey Creek.

All business was transacted in regular form and in love and fellowship.

The Union Q. M. only has five or six preachers now, and only three were present, and two or three deacons and four delegates. There were three preachers from the Brotherhood Conference, that helped them out a lot. Pray for the Union Q. M. that they may grow and build so they can hold a conference without the help from the other quarterly meetings. I am so sorry they have become so weak.

The Union Conference was my home for over 40 years. We have had lots of preachers and lots of churches. Preachers and delegates and deacons would go for 25, or sometimes 50 miles through mud and snow on foot or horse-back and when they got back home it would take a week to tell their folks about the good meeting and the brothers and sisters shouting,

singing and praying. People then had old time religion, yes, salvation in the good old way. O may the time come when people will stop and look where they are going. They have good roads. cars, and good chances to go, only they don't have the time, and they can't miss a nickle they can make. In this part of the country, in the last few years, they can't get enough out on Saturday night to transact any business for the church.. Right here at home, the last three meetings there wasn't enough to appoint a delegate to the Q. M., had to do that Sunday; it seems that they are altogether looking after the things of this world. I think there are some where in 4θ names on the church book here and only four or five attend regularly. I cry and pray till I can't sleep at night. There is a lot more I would like to say if it would do any good, but it seems like nothing I can say or do does any good. Some educated man or woman will come along and tell the farmer to reduce his crops, and they will pay him for what he doesn't raise; but he must sign something. They say they would rather have the money than the work for it, and we know that is against the Bible and the Constitution. If they had come to me with that stuff, I would have said, "Get behind me, Satan," that was what Christ said when he was tempted by Satan in the wilderness. I don't know of but one church here but what has signed up that thing. I don't know what you call it, but I call it the mark of the Beast: for after they sign up they have to take a card; if he doesn't have the card or the mark of the Beast, they will take half of his crop. So the man who works and attends to his own business and wants to abide by the law and be free can't raise anything to sell. If he does, they will take half of it and give to the man that signs up to not work, and he cannot help the honest man in any way, but must do all he can to keep him from having anything. Well, you may think I had better send this to the Yellow Jacket, but this is not political, or I don't mean it that way. But it is spiritual, the good and evil spirit, the inner man and the outer man, and I don't think that God or a real God-loving Christian would endorse any item of the New Deal: for it is all evil, and the works of Satan. and is causing envy and strife among the people, and will bring war if not stopped; and I fear it is too late now. If this is printed, I hope all who read

it will take time to read their Bibles and see if I am not right, but don't get offended: for I mean good. I don't mean to offend, but to make peace.

ON THE RIO SAMBU

I am writing this article under rather primitive conditions, my desk consists of an Indian paddle, the gift of a good Cholo friend. Just below the hut in which I am staying the Sambu flows steadily on its muddy race to the Pacific. I was poled down here in a dugout canoe by one of our Indians to wait for some means of getting back to civilization. The house in which I am staying is in good shape, but apparently abandoned. It is made like all jungle houses, of reed and palm laced together, open on all sides to catch the breeze.

I have been sometime now among the Indians, and am happy to say that I have been received gladly by those I met last year, and by new groups. I carried in some pictures taken of them last year and observe, with no small amount of amusement, their reaction as they studied their likeness on paper. They insisted on me taking more pictures of them. I visited a large village called Sabalo. It was necessary to walk through the iungle over a fair trail for two hours, and, as I walked and studied the land. it seemed ideal for a station back in there. I am praying that God will give us the hearts of the owners, so that we might get a gift of land. After steadily walking for two hours, I arrived at the village, meeting with large groups of Indians and talking with them; then later, I returned to the Sambu, and still later, with a native, walked from my present location to the nearest Indian home. After some time, talking with him and explaining my mission at length, I persuaded him to pole up to the next group of homes. I had visited with

these last year, and was greeted heartily by the old chief who laughed as I addressed him in his own dialect. This old Indian is remarkably noble in his bearing, both of face and body. His features are softened, probably by age, and with long locks of soft hair, he truly is a noble fellow. I love to think of him as the "Grand Old Man" of the Sambu. He has a large family of fine sons, and he and his son's families live in a group.

As soon as I placed my baggage, I was put to work with medical kit. First there were children with fevers to care for, then one fellow had a tooth to pull, another had a large sore on his leg, then they came with back aches and rheumatism. medical work over, they brought me food which consisted of roasted banana and parts of an "Iguana," which is a large lizard. This was the second time I have been called on to eat this reptile, which is delicious, much better than chicken. You say, "Give me chicken." After supper, I began to study their language. The grand old man got real close to me and, pointing to different articles, he carefully pronounced the words. He is a fine teacher. I asked him if they had a word for God. He said, "Yes." Do you pray to him? "No." One thing that greatly pleases these people is to show an interest in the tribe, and in the study of their dialect. Then I asked them to sing for me; but they do not sing, so I had to do the singing. I sang "Carry Me Back to Old Virginia" and "My Old Kentucky Home." Then some hymns in Spanish. I wish it were possible to capture the thoughtful look on

their faces as we sat on the floor; it might have been rather an amusing scene to look in on a white man sitting on the floor of a thatched hut surrounded by a group of naked Indians, and the white man singing in another language. None of this was of much interest to the women, as the women and children can speak no Spanish. The old chief could not understand all of it. Then I showed them the Bible, the first Bible they I told them of its had ever seen. message to all men of all races. And I read at some length from the Gospel of Luke, but darkness came on and I had to conclude and get my Mosquito net ready for the night, but before turning in I talked to them about a school and a station. One man said: "No, we do not want our children to be 'ignoranties.'" It is rather an interesting sight to see row after row of mosquito tents pitched in those large dwellings. They are wise in sleeping under nets, as fever comes from the bite of the mosquito. It might be of interest to know that the mesquito must first bite some one that has the fever before it can carry it. I must say that my bed was not soft by any means, as it consisted of a piece of canvas stretched on the hard floor.. The following morning and its events would have well repaid you who gave of beads and trinkets, could you have looked in on that group of eager faced Indians as they crowded around to look at the beautiful beads I had for them, and heard their exclamations of wonder and delight. How my heart yearned to tell them how trifling these were compared to the eternal gift of God's own Son, His love gift to them, and of the value of their souls in His sight! Do pray that nothing shall hinder as we labor among them. I am sure that many of you are praying as we seek to reach

the neglected of Panama; they are here, priceless jewels that must be salvaged and cut to sparkle in the diadem of our living Lord.

I have no idea how I shall get out this time, I can but labor in the glorious task of publishing glad tidings from Indian home to Indian home, seeing this scene repeated day after day as we move among them.

My food must come from the jungle now, as I am out of supplies. I shot a duck this morning and then bought another bird from an Indian. I am supremely happy in the will of God, as I prepare for my bed in this lonely jungle hut.

Early the following morning, I heard voices and arose to see a banana beat, a sail, coming up the Sambu, calling out to them if they had any sugar, I was invited aboard to eat breakfast, then arranged to go back again up to the mouth of the Sabalo where there were some Indians loading a large canoe with bananas. Arriving there, I saw a negro coming down river in a dugout in which he had tied in a pole crate a large hog, I made arrangements with him to go out to Garachine, thinking that I might get a sail out from there to Panama City. We paddled all that night. I connot give you any idea of the feeling that comes to one as he paddles down these jungle rivers in the moon light as the call of loons comes from those high trees. It is like getting religion—you must experience it. At midnight, we arrived on the muddy flats of Garachine. The tide was down so we had to wade through mud to my knees with an eighty pound pack on my back, I fell so many times that I was literally covered with mud, and one time I fell so hard that my leg cracked, so that I feared that it was broken. Paul said, "I glory in my infirmatives and sufferings for Christ sake," and in times like this we can rejoice, for He giveth us the victory. Arriving in the village which is all negro, a dirty shiftless and lazy company of people, we found them yelling, drinking and singing, keeping watch for the dead; four souls had died that night. This was worse, by far, than Indian huts, and there was no rest as I made my bed on the floor, open to all this, and tried to rest.

The next day I went about with gospels and tracts, from house to house and giving them the gospels. I suppose the priest will have fits when he learns that a heretic of a "protes-

tant" has moved among his flock. He comes once a year baptizing all who are willing to pay him a dollar, marrying those who have already been living together, and saying prayers for the dead. I found hearts open to the Gospel and took advantage of it, and one home in which I am writing this article (which has proven to be the cleanest I have found) was open to me to spend tonight. Here is a town in which there are 2,000 souls with no knowledge of the Gospel, and no doctor. Again the medical kit came into service, as I treated those with large open sores and ulcers, with an interesting group of spectators looking on.

I am completing this article surrounded by the comforts of our home here in Colon, and the happy voices of my children. Sunday night I went aboard a 29-foot sail boat, and at midnight we lifted sail and pushed slowly along. The deck of the boat was flat and one needed to hang on, even in his sleep. Fortunately, I discovered a small opening in the deck, just room for me to lower my body into the hatch, and by shifting a few sacks of rice I could get in on my back, but I found that once in the hole I could not turn over nor get in any other position. I breathed an earnest prayer that the tarantala, a large banana spider, might leave me alone and that rats and cockroaches might keep off my person. I had many occasions to be thankful for this warm bed. The crew was not by any means pleasant company, a group of loud-mouthed, ragged fellows, but before the journey was over,I found them thoughtful of the "Gringo Americano." Our food I will not mention, as the memory of it is not altogether pleasant. This journey of eighty miles took us fortyeight hours. Sometimes we would lie with flapping sails in the path of a silver sheen from the moon, this for hours, then a stiff breeze would blow and we would be driven, standing on our keels while water dashed up over the deck and sprayed us; again we would drift with idling sails in the scorching heat, while the skin would blister and lips crack open. Again it would blow cold and spray us till those poor fellows in their wet rags would shiver. Oh, how I thank God for His goodness! I had a blanket, and I am sure those of the crew had reason to look at my good, though rough clothes, and my heavy army blanket with envy.

My heart breathed a prayer of deep-

est thanks, when I came home and read Sister Griffin's letter stating that the ladies of North Carolina have decided to raise the money for a motor boat. With a motor, we need not suffer these hours of torture going into Garachine. We can get a fruit boat out of Colon or Panama, and drop off in the bay at the mouth of the Sambu, traveling by motor, and within fifteen hours we can be there, having fair food and a bunk to sleep in. Thank God for our good women! You might have a contribution to make to this fund. If so, send it to Bro. Blackwelder stating what it is for,

At noon Tuesday, we got a stift breeze, and rode with it till six that night, then within twenty miles of Panama City it died. Then I began to pray for a breeze and God answered, first by a quiet swell in the sail, then as I prayed, by a steady blow. For hours we could see the lights of Panama City. At one o'clock we dropped sail in the harbor, and I went to the Methodist Sea Wall Mission, imposing on the grace and Christian brotherhood of the Superintendent there to put me up over night. I can assure you I looked a fright, but a shower and a shave put me right and now I am home to recover somewhat.

After this trip, I am convinced that we can never do our work without proper equipment. No interior country of the world is much harder to reach than our field.

Is The Sino--Japanese Conflict A Fulfillment Of Prophecy?

I don't swallow everything I hear and read, of course not, but the Holy Spirit somehow tells us and guides us as to what is right and acceptable. Many times when we preach or write certain things, some will say that we have been reading after So-and-so. Sure, we read. We compare. We study. Everyone should do that The fellow in the ministry who never reads need never expect to get very far, that is certain.

Back to the subject. Now those who have delved into the original languages have found the above stated words in Scripture to mean as follows: Gog means Russia, Magog the land of Russia, Meshech and Tubal, large cities in Russia today by the names of Moscow and Tobolsk; Gomer means Germany, Togarmah Turkey, Tarshish and the young lions thereof means England and the offspring of England which, of course, would be United States, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, etc. You know "The merchant ships of Tarshish" is a familiar Bible statement, and any one knows that England has been the mistress of the sea for ages. Now the 37th chapter of Ezekiel, which is the account of the vision given to the prophet of the valley of dry bones, means nothing

else than that which is going on now, the restoration of national Israel. There has been a great shaking going on in the valley, so to speak, ever since 1917; or ever since the English general secured Palestine from the hand of the cruel Turk, and Great Britain gave the land back to the



Jews, and hence has started the great Zionist movement. So much for the 37th chapter.

Then in the 38th chapter, we find that at the same time there is a shaking taking place in the valley of dry bones, there is also a great confederacy being formed in the north; or north of Palestine. We also notice that as Israel gets established in her home land again, and is called here a people of unwalled villages, settled there, of course, with all her wealth (which they are taking back with them as they go), that this Northern Confederacy begins to look upon them with lustful eyes and will say, "I will go up to the land of unwalled villages....to take a spoil, and to take a prey" (Ezek. 38:11-12). So this great northern power, headed up by Russia, no doubt, will march down over the Caucasian mountains, God having put hooks in their jaws-verse 4, and will attempt to devour the restful, quiet people of Israel. But at that time, the western world, led by the revived Roman Empire, no doubt, will come to the rescue of Israel. Israel having already made a covenant with the Roman Prince or dictator for a period of seven years, in which he promises them protection (Daniel 9:27). And the 39th chapter of Ezekiel gives the account of the almost complete wiping out of this northern power by the opposing power that comes to rescue Israel. Please read

these chapters carefully.

Now with reference to the Sino-Japanese struggle where this is fulfilling prophecy is that it is paving the way for, or helping to form this great Northern Confederacy. No one knows what will be the result of this war No one knows what nations will be subdued and what great arisings and awakenings will take place. Some believe that Japan will miserably lose in her attempt. And that she may do. One thing she is most certain to do, and that is to cause China to become military minded, and to thoroughly realize her need of present day modernization so as to be able te withstand the savagery that seems to be so prevalent in many modern nations today. China is a power and a real power if she ever comes to know herself or to realize her strength. Napoleon once pointed to China on the map, and said, "There is a lion asleep. Let her sleep." China with her six hundred million. Think of it! Five times as many as we have in the United States. Some one has said that one out of every four babies born in the world is a Chinese

Now Germany is destined to have a place in this great Northern union also. That at the present time might not seem probable, but in this day of rapid change, how quickly that could come about! Hitler and Mussolini seem to be on very friendly terms at the present time; but that cannot last; because in this great end time drama of events Germany must take her place according to Ezckiel, with the nations of the North. Hitler made an astonishing threat at Russia not many months back, in which he showed his covetous desire for Russian Ukrane, which is known as the granery of the world, and for the mineral wealth of the Ural mountains, and the timber wealth of Siberia. That whole country is just like a great embedded charge of dynamite with the fuse already lit and slowly but surely burning, which is bound to terminate in & gigantic explosion. Every one expects Russia and Japan to clash any moment.

Now here is something else to think about. We all know that Russia has been a bitter enemy and persecutor of Christianity, Atheistics to the core. Where-ever you find Communism you find Atheism. Russia has everything, but tried to tear God out of the sky. We have wondered how God has let her stand as long as He has. Never

mind, her doom is coming. prophesied of in Ezekiel 39. Germany has been a persecutor of the Jewish people; a thing no nation can do under God and get by with it. Very well. She too, will come to a bitter end. No doubt the main reason why the favor of God has been so wonderfully with the nations of Great Britain and the United States is because their doors have always been open to the Jews. Centuries past God said to Abraham, the father of Israel, "I will bless them that bless thee, and curse them that curse you." That promise helds good today. Also Japan need not expect to carry on as she is and be blessed of the Lord; her destruction will come sooner or later.

Three great, and outstanding, movements are in progress today, which mean so much, yes, so very much, in the light of Scriptural prophecy. They are: The revival of the Roman Empire, the formation of the great Northern confederacy, and the restoration of national Israel.

The great march of events of this present day is certainly worth noticing. And, remember what Jesus said, 'What I say unto you, I say unto all; Watch!"

It lingers beneath the glare of the white lights where dissipating throngs drink and dance and revel in lust; it is evident in the crowded business parts of the world, it takes its hideous millions in suicides each year, it mocks the swindler and gambler in his losses each year, it cast the shadows of fear across the path of the dictator in his power and glory.

There must be something in the Gospel we preach, and we must give our hearers the meats of truth to carry home, instead of the dry bones of theory. Christian preachers, let us reach the multitudes of our age with the Gospel, and when we reach them be able to say with the apostle Paul, "I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth."

The call of God to Christian service is not limited to ministers and missionaries that are over seas. The New Testament commandment is, "Let him that heareth say, come." This places the call to work for the salvation of men upon everyone who has heard and received the Gospel. And how marvelous would be the growth of God's Kingdom if all who claim to love Him would become soul winners.

And just think how much more successful would be the work of worldwide evangelism, if all of God's people would enlist in effective Christian service of some kind. And surely nothing short of this will ever please God. Then, too, I believe that if the life and passion of the Christian worker is what it should be, no type of evangelism is so forceful and certain of definite results as a personal evangelism.

Every Christian has felt, at some time, the call to win a soul for Christ, and the one who will respond to this call is the one who gets the most joy out of religious life.

The call to a Christian may come amid the glow and promise of the morning hours of youth, or it may come in the age of noon-day, or it may be heard amid the gathering of life's evening shade. But no greater joy can come to the follower of the meek and lowly Nazarene than that joy which he will experience when he is giving out in the service of God, such as he may have in the name of Jesus

But some one just enlisting in the service may ask, "Where do the paths of Christian service lead, and what may I expect in return for my work?" Listen to what the Master said, "The foxes have holes, and the birds of the air have nests, but the Son of Man hath not where to lay his head."

Oh, Christian, if we would serve Christ, we cannot choose a path of ease. To follow Christ in service will take us to human paths of sorrow and woe. Yes, the work of a true soldier of Jesus Christ will often lead to human paths of sorrow and woe, and into common tasks and walks of life, up the steep hills of sacrifice and self-denial; and often over stormy seas and beneath clouded skies. But, Glory to God, I'm so glad this way will lead at last to a victor's erown; and His "well done, thou good and faithful servant," will outweigh every hardship endured.

The servant of the Lord can truly be happy, if when called upon to lay the armour down, he can say with the apostle Paul, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith. Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness which the Lord, the righteous Judge, shall give me at that day." Glory to God, I'm going to work for Him, aren't you?

drunken, which, most emphatically is sinful and leads to more sin.

"Many excuse themselves for indulgence in alcoholic drinks on the pretext that it is beneficial to their health. The Biblical quotation (2 Tim. 5:23), *Drink no longer water, but use a little wine for thy stomach's sake and thine oft infirmitives,' is abused. This would not be intoxicating wine that Paul advised Timothy to use; and if it were intoxicating no well-informed, Spiritfilled Free Will Bantist would ever use it as a tenic or as a beverage. The brewers would recommend wine, beer, and other lieguous to balance the Met and to flavor foods, to make them more palatable; but they are only trying to increase their income through their sales, and know very well that they are lying, that every ounce of the accursed stuff that is taken into the human stomach ministers to weakness, poor health, general debility, and an early death."

Nominalism Versus The Church

We hear much these days from Nominal Christians, about "Our denomination" and about "My church," being torn to shreds and persecuted by the "Tribe of Christ;" so we have somewhat investigated why they howl, and we find that nominal denominationalism is not the church, nor is the worship denominationalism Christianity; neither does numerical numbers make up the church, which is the body of Christ, and the members of that body are the bride of Christ, and that Christ is the Head of it and the body that constitutes the church (not my or our denominationalism-, which consists of men and women who individually have been born of the Spirit of God by repentance through faith unto salvation and justification, and that God said through Isaiah the prophet, "Let the wicked forsake his way and the unrighteous man his thoughts; and let him return unto the Lord, and unto our God, for he will abundantly pardon." Also God said He would blot out your past sins from the book

of His remembrance and remember them against you no more for ever, if you do these things.

Nominal denominationalism—falely so called a part of the body of Christ—does not recognize that true statement of Bible fact, for it is a collection of individual sinners into a body of the same name, who probably have a zeal for God, but have no knowledge of God, for the reason that they have been deceived, beguiled and blinded by following after the philosophies of men, and not after Christ.

Its nominal howl and wail about some one always wanting to tear up "my church," or "our denomination" sounds as pitiful as the bleating of a young lamb—left alone—on the banks of Panther creek, but too silly to be loolish, as it has no church to tear up: for "Nominal Christian" is just a high sounding name that has no meaning but its nakedness before God and the church: for nominal means pertaining to names; existing in name only; not real: and anything that is not real

cannot be justified (defended) as pertaining to Christ, the church, nor to Christianity; and Jesus told the Pharisees, "Ye are of your father the devil."

Just imagine, if you can, how utterly impossible it would be for puny man to tear up anything spiritual that was foreordained by the foreknowledge of God before the foundation of the world, that was established at Pentecost; that is built upon the Solid Rock of faith in Jesus Christ, the Immaculate Son of God—protected from the gates of hell, that shall not prevail against it.

It takes real genuine determination, tenacity, bull dog grit and courage for the young convert and babes in Christ in this Christian warfare, not to be shaken like a reed by nominalisms, camouflage of devilution which is being painted upon the screen of their minds by workers of iniquity and peddled by ungodly brothers of those who crucified man's Redeemer upon Golgotha's skull shaped dome that crowns

its rugged height.

Do not let the howl and pitiful sounding wail of wolves in sheep's clothing alarm nor make you afraid: but keep your eyes on the Christian's Goal-the New Jerusalem-never forget to pray earnestly from the sincere desire of your hearts, that God will give you a clearer understanding and knowledge of discernment, that you may be able to distinguish between truth and a seeming resemblance of the truth. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Dear Christian Women:

I feel reasonably sure that you have not, in any state where the Free Will Baptist women carry on auxiliary work, been entirely inactive concerning Christian education. The North Carolina women have been actively engaged, for the past year, in creating an Educational Loan Fund for worthy young men and women which we trust will prove a great blessing to many. The South Carolina and Tennessee women, and maybe others that we have no information about, have also been at work. Although we have no definite building program in the Eastern states at this time for which to work, we should be very actively engaged in creating such funds in the largest amounts possible for use at such time as may be presented in the future, or funds for use as loans or gifts to our young men and women who desire to prepare themselves for work with us.

At the present we have a Bible School which has, for several years been doing a small but definitely a good work for our denomination. If you are doubtful, just recall some of the young men that the Zion Bible School has turned out. This school is located in Southwestern Georgia. It is a worthy cause which deserves more support than we, as a whole, have given it. As Director of Chris-

tian education in the National Women's Auxiliary Convention, I am appealing to you in the behalf of the Zion Bible School, and am submitting a plan for every local womens' auxiliary in every state to work. I am asking that every Ladies' Aid Society raise the amount of ten cents per member in your society between the fifteenth of March and the thirtieth of April, and hold this as a separate fund in your treasury, until you are notified by me sometime in May through the Baptist, and the Gem where you are to send it. This is a very small amount to ask for, but it will mean quite a substantial help to this deserving Bible School, and I do hope that every single Ladies Aid society will respond to this request. It is an evident fact, in order for our church even to hold its own, we as a whole must do something quickly about encouraging and helping our young men and women.

Our auxiliary work has been generally accepted by the church proper as a substantial help, and I feel that we owe our best efforts to our church in any work we are able to do. At this time let us feel indebted to this, our only Bible School, and heed its worthy call. Later I am sure there will be other channels open to us to help our church in a definite educational program.

Spoiled Egyptians

God told Moses to command the children of Israel to "borrow" the Egyptian's jewelry. The Israelites did not "pay back," but instead, left Egypt; thus spoiling the Egyptians. The atheists and high (?) critics have attacked this fact in the Bible with great ardor; charging that this is a plain case of stealing, and that God authorized it or Moses was a liar and an impostor! With either being true, there is sufficient ground to warrant a general unbelief in any part of the Bible, for God is the acclaimed Author through such fanatics as Moses. Because such God-defiant unbelievers are so out of harmony with God, the precept upon precept of God's Word becomes a stumbling block to them, an incomprehencible jargon. that they might go (just let them go), and fall backward, and be broken, and snared, and taken (Isa. 28:9-14).

I began to study the case of stolen jewelry, and to study it properly, I went to the original language of the Old Testament. I opened into the Hebrew and scanned along until, in Exodus 11:2, I stopped upon the word SHA'AL, then I shouted for joy! I have been long acquainted with this word, it being among the first that I learned in the Jew's language. I saw this word often in my studies of future abodes (after death), and it carried a clear ringing definition. "To ask, to inquire, to demand," in the sense of Job's statement, "Man giveth up the ghost, and where is he?" Job 14:10. Upon a second study, I found the word SHA'AL to be translated as follows in the Old Testament:

ASK—107 times (my careful counting). "I ask one petition of thee." 1 Kings 2:16.

ENQUIRE—22 times. "And the king said, enquire thou whose son the stripling is." 1 Sam. 17:56.

DESIRE—9 times. "Behold the king whom ye have chosen, and whom ye have desired." 1 Sam. 12:13. The Israelites, in Palestine, desired a king—that isn't any proof that they stole one.

"And he (Rehoboam) desired many wives." 2Chron. 11:23. I would hate to go before a Sanhedrim Court and try to convict him of stealing wives, if I had to limit myself to this lang-

uage for proof. He forsook the law of the Lord and may have stolen some of them, but we cannot prove him guilty with this language.

DEMAND—4 times, "For I will demand of thee, and answer thou me." Job 38:3.

BEG—2 times. "Let his children be continually vagabonds, and beg." Psalms 109:10.

BORROW—7 times. "Let every man borrow of his neighbor....jewels of silver, and jewels of gold." Ex. 11:2.



In neither of the derivatives of the word SHA'AL is there any hint of stealing. There isn't so much as a pretense to pay back in the minor derivative borrow. There is no hook or crook about it. It is a plain case —the Israelites literally asked for the riches of Egypt, and the Egyptians literally gave their wealth away! Egypt did not ask for a note of security, for she did not want it, she did not expect a return of her jewels —she had given them away.

"And the Lord gave the people favor in the sight of the Egyptians, so that they lent unto them such things as they required. And they spoiled the Egyptians." Exo. 12:36. The Hebrew word for lent in this verse is the same word, and in the same grammatical sense, as the word lent in 1 Sam. 1:28 where that sainted mother, Hannah, lent her son, Samuel, to the Lord, as long as he liveth! Hannah did not demand a note of security from the Lord, she did not

expect a settlement when the Lord should give him back to her. The Lord took Samuel when but a child and gloriously used him all the days of his life. In like manner, the Egyptians lent their jewelry which is a plain case of give-away.

There are severe objections to this conclusion in the face of the teachings of Jesus Christ concerning those who have riches and trust in them—rich men will lose their souls before they will give up their wealth. I recognize this truth, and I know it isn't natural for men who have intelligence to accumulate great wealth to become regular bone-heads and give it all away—and yet that is exactly what Egypt did! There is a very great reason for this action!

God, in one way or another, "lighteth every man that cometh into the world." The Spirit of God reproves the world of sin, often against the will of the sinner. That's what happened in Egypt. God was making Himself manifest and known as the All-mighty, All-wise, just, personal God, Creator and Governor of the universe. He does not force men to repent, accept, love and serve Him, but He does force upon them the knowledge that He is God and that they are out of harmony with God. Egypt, like men of today, resented and despised this knowledge, she had rather do anything rather than to repent, recognize and reverence God. In view of their hurting conscience because of their mistreatment of the Israelites, they deliberately gave all their jewelry to the object of their injustice and oppression in a vain attempt to appease the anger of a just God, and thus "get by" without repenting. They would go to the limit, even to the giving away of all their jewelry; anything besides to repent.

They loved darkness rather than light, because their deeds were evil. They hated the light that exposed their wickedness. And the light was forced upon them. No man can seriously reflect upon his conscious experience without finding a reason for his natural dislike of God; he finds an evidence of his own personal guilt: he is self-convinced and self-condemned at the bar of his own consience; he remembers with shame the actual transgressions in which he resisted the dictates of reason, and resigned himself to the dominion of evil passions. When one, with these

convictions, is asked to conceive of God as a living, personal Being, every where present, beholding the good and the evil, whose "eyes are as a flame of fire," and who knows the "thoughts and intents of the heart;" who is the Lawgiver, Governor, and Judge, who demands the homage of the heart and the obedience of the life, and who has the power to enforce His rightful claims by the sanction of rewards and punishments; to the fears, remorse, and forebodings of an uneasy conscience, the thought of such a Being causes one to instinctively recoil and try to forget and deny God's claims. As the idea of God becomes more vivid in its unavoidable intrusion into the mind of every individual, one of three general courses is taken: One is to fall before the Eternal Being and cry for mercy, the second is the

opposite extreme of becoming intolerant of the idea of God and banishing the subject altogether, so that "God is not in all his thoughts," and thus plunge into blatant infidelity; and the third course is to alter and modify his views of the Divine character so as to have a God according to his own wishes, like unto himseif, indulgent to sin, a God who is not strict to notice and punish sin. In this case, he "remembers God and is troubled." This uneasy well-being leads to the doing of penance, mortification, painful sacrifices in an effort to conciliate an offended Diety. Egypt took this latter course and sacrificed all her jewelry, but it failed to bring the results she wanted. Egypt became a "vessel of wrath fitted to destruction." -Cf. Romans 9:14-23.

CIVIL WAR IN ISRAEL

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
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
