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"Therefore Brethren We Are Debtors"



AS THIS Issue of the Gem goes out from our office, it is going into 30 states and to the Panama Canal Zone. It goes into 16 states west of the Mississippi river, and 14 states east of the river; forming an unbroken chain from the Pacific to the Atlantic oceans, and from the Gulf to Canada. This issue is mailed 10 379 post offices, with a range from 1 to 104 papers to the post office. Our home post office, Monett, scores the highest with 104 Gems. The Gem has been growing steadily for the past few years, and we are endeavoring to help it grow still bigger and better.

Our growth in the future is on Condition, that is, before we can grow, there are certain conditions which must be met, of which support in the capacity of subscriptions is only a part. Another and greater condition is CO-OPERATION in every way that is for the advancement and up-building of the Cause. The whole truth

in a nut-shell is that the Free. Will Baptist Gem will be only what Free Will Baptist people make it — and I do not speak irrespectably of some of our Gem Family who are not Free Will Baptist, but I am saying that the Gem can only be what the writers make it.

We are depending upon voluntary contributions, except on special subjects which the editor may solicit. This is the way the Gem has been composed for more than ten years. It is very remarkable how the Gem can be measured with this three-fold yard-stick:

1. The Gem is educational and instructive in deep theological subjects produced in the spiritually inspired original writings of our ministers and laymen.

2. The Gem is inspirational and interesting in sermon, letter and report.

3. The Gem is informative in the reports of the activities and progress in the realms of the church.

Your editor's desire is to see this standard strengthened. Toward this end, therefore, I would make a few suggestions, hoping that my position will be thoroughly understood and well taken: The sermons and articles are fine, and we want to continue printing them, so please continue to be original, masterful, and thorough in your exposition of Biblical topics and articles of an educational nature. I have no criticism, but I do want to encourage — boys, do your best!

The reports are vitally necessary, so keep them coming. That means, keep in action for you cannot report progress unless you are making progress.

That calls to my mind a story of a testimony meeting once. 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Progress of the Educational Campaign

Only a few reports have come in since the opening of the Campaign on May 15th. I am encouraged, however, to be able to report that twelve minister's names are now recorded on the honor roll of ministerial donors, all of which pledge their full support in this great cause. But when we take into account the fact that there are hundreds more who should have already reported, it is a bit depressing. Still I shall not raise the white flag and call off. If only these twelve will fully co-operate, we will do something, and finally convince the rest of you that it can be done.

Here is the list of those noble ministers: J. R. Davidson, Texas; Melvin Bingham, Oklahoma; Clarence Bowen, North Carolina; N. P. Gates, Michigan; R. C. Wiggs, Texas; Aston Peguese, Texas; John Swanwick, Texas; William Reeves, Missouri; Robert Crawford, Alabama; H. M. McAdams, Texas; Lizzie McAdams, Texas; and J. K. Warkentin, Texas.

Note the fact that seven of these are Texas preachers, while five are from all the other states combined. Wake up, ministers, everywhere, and let us hear from you! If you are in favor, let us know, and if you are not, let us know. We have received only one negative letter so far. No, I was not shocked.

I have received reports of interest in this campaign from Georgia, Florida, Ohio, Alabama, Tennessee, Michigan, Oklahoma, Missouri, North Carolina, and Texas, also from New Mexico, where we have no church organization. I appeal to every minister again to line up to make this campaign the greatest of success.

Interesting letters of an encouraging nature have been received lately. Rev. Gates of Michigan, Rev. Reeves of Missouri, Rev. Crawford of Alabama, Rev. Bowen of N. C., Revs. H. M. and Lizzie McAdams of Texas and Rev. Warkentin of Texas send a note of thanks and appreciation, with enthusiastic pledges. They seem to think the plan should afford convenience for our people everywhere, if only they care to do anything about the matter. I should have mentioned Rev Bingham of Oklahoma who is always on the firing line. Rev. Dunbar of Tennessee writes quite often, and he now feels that his state should give some good co-operation, since they have their

orphanage going. But there is one letter of unusual interest which comes from Mrs. Verna G. Edson of La Mesa, New Mexico. She writes that she is of our faith, originally located in Oklohoma, though now in the Rio Grand Valley, where there is no Free Will Baptist church. She reports that there are nine Free Will Baptist over a distance of two hundred miles up and down this valley. They have a Sunday school going, and are looking forward to the time that our school will be sending out ministers to this and other needy territory. She was prompted by an article which she read

in the Gem, and sat down and sent all the money she had on hand for this school work, pledging to send more later. She thinks that most any Free Will Baptist could easily give one dollar each month for this great cause. What do you think? How do you respond when you do think?

Only two reports have been made of self-denial offerings for the first week of our campaign. The Bryan church realized \$10.00 and Rev. and Mrs. R. C. Wiggs turned in \$1.00, making a total of \$11.00 so far in self-denial money. Did you co-operate? If so, report as early as possible. Some Concrete Facts as to the Value of a Musical Education

Most parents admit that they would like to have their children play the piano, but they don't fully appreciate that it goes much farther than that, and that it is an important part in a broad program of education — and why?

THE STUDY OF MUSIC ACTUALLY TRAINS THE MIND AND STIMU-LATES IT SO THAT IT FUNCTIONS BETTER IN OTHER STUDIES.

That is a general statement, but fully proved in this way: "Positive proof that music is the best mindtrainer has come from Magdalen College, where all the musical instruction at Oxford University is given. Only 10% of the students take music — yet this 10% takes 85% of all prizes and scholarships, leaving only 15% for the other 90% of the students."

(Quoted from Golden Age of Music by Henry C. Finck).

Now listen to this, when W. F. Wenster was superintendent of the school in Minneapolis, he reported that "The instructor in harmony in our high schools took all the pupils in the music courses for two years, 700 of them, and an equal number of pupils as they came in other courses. The Music students had 18% of all their marks "A" and only 3% of their marks "F". The other group, the non-musical student group, ran only 10% "A" and 7% "F".

Dr. Eliot, president Emeritus, of Harvard University, said, "If every subject in the school curriculum had to be dropped except one, I would retain music as the most indispensible."

To make a general statement that music is a mind trainer does not particularly impress a parent — but back it up with concrete facts as stated above, and it will set parents to thinking immediately for *their children* are involved.

There are scores of music teachers who tell us how they are building up larger classes than they have ever had before. They do this by going directly to the parents, and presenting their, case with the help of concrete facts just as I have above outlined.

There is such a vast store of material, as it is told to me by successful music teachers from all over the States, where they are going to the parents first, in order to get the children started in music. Without a musical education, no child would have a complete education, which means that these teachers are doing the public a wonderful service by getting children started on the road to success and happiness through the study of music.

Most parents will say, "If my son shows any musical inclinations, I will give him musical lessons, but if he does not, I will not bother with him." Now if the same parent who would say a thing like that were to say the same thing after due observation about

arithmetic or writing or geography. most of the boys of America would grow up illiterate. Boys are healthy little animals who willingly will dodge any kind of work that interferes with what they consider play. To be told that it is good for them does just about as much good as telling them that castor oil is good for them, and expecting them to take it of their own volition. Not that music is a disagreeable dose like castor oil, but practice even with the delightful modern methods of study which appeal to the child's own imagination so strongly, takes just that much time from play; so that it is only very rarely that it is welcomed at first.

This means that the boy must come under the direction and authority of his parents. There is a great hue and cry in these days about children growing up wild. Some of this is unfortunately true. Parents, either through ignorance, indifference, selfish absorption in their own pleasures, or more often through lack of "spine," deliberately neglect the most important obligation of parenthood - intelligent, loving, but firm and persistent direction. There are thousands of young people who in later life exclaim, "Oh, if my parents had only made me do it." Neglect of the children's opportunities for study at the right time is often responsible for some of the heart-aches which come to parents in later life. Parents often make the mistake of saying, "This boy is impossible, there is no music in him!" If they would only persist, they would find that after a certain age, or more often after a certain point of study, his musical possibilities would blossom out marvelously.

To me, turning off music would be like turning out a light equal in power, brightness and splendor, to that of the sun. It would be depriving me of a certain incentive and inspiration of mental and spiritual refreshment, which after all makes life worth while.

I will admit however, that undisciplined and unsupervised indulgence in music may produce emotional convictions which result in temperamental excesses that in the past have unfortunately given some practical people an entirely wrong idea as to the value of music. They see here and there some musical freak with all sorts of conceits and eccentricities and come to the conclusion that this is the natural result of music and therefore music is of little consequence in the world. Such freaks, one must understand are only the result of over selfindulgence, and deserve no more conDIN TIOT GEM

sideration than does the miser, the san glutton or the inebriate. One must as remember without the slightest doubt, me that temperate and sensible study of a h music is one of the greatest blessings one could ever hope to have in life. ult

There is a critical time in every child's musical education that must be passed before he gets to the position where he is recompenced for his preparatory work. It is at this time that the student in inclined to lose interest and will want to stop. Here the judgment of the parent must come to the front and thus help the child over this difficult period when he might otherwise lose a great life of rich inspiration. Unquestionably, vast sums of money have been wasted in the past, because parents have not understood this. Many boys start music study and stop before they have anything more than a smattering --which is really a complete aggravation to say the least.

Every normal child can be coaxed over a crisis. I am told that thousands of children stop in what is known as the third grade of study. This, to me, is like laying the foundation of a beautiful church, building the walls, and leaving off the roof, resulting ultimately in a useless structure. A little more money, time and effort would have finished the edifice.

In the case of the child, it is usually not the lack of money or time, but rather the failure of the parent to carry the child past this critical point. Some parents do not want to be bothered and so they just let their children drift. Just a little recognition of the great benefits of music, and determination that these shall be enjoyed, combinded with a little tact and diplomacy in helping the child persist, would result in saving many a juvenile for music.

How much I should love to just go on and on with this, but must close. Please, may I say that if there would be anyone at all who might like to correspond with me regarding the above subject, please feel free to do so.

A Last Message to the Church

TEXT: "Seeing then that all these things shall be disolved, what manner of persons ought ye to be in all holy conversation and godliness.

"Wherefore, beloved, seeing that ye look for such things, be diligent that ye may be found of him in peace, without spot, and blameless.

"Ye therefore, beloved, seeing ye know these things, beware, lest ye also, being led away with the error of the wicked, fall from your own steadfastness." 2 Peter 3:11, 14, 17.

THE APOSTLE is here giving his last and most important message to the church. When a man is about to be crucified with his head downward, he will not use idle words. What he says will be to the point and worth



remembering, and repeating. Peter was a very practical preacher and put first things first. Perhaps he is sitting on an eminence—the Mount of Olives, or at least in spirit was peering out into the future, for here in a few verses he uses "seeing" and "looking" six times. He now proceeds to give three admonitions: Be holy, be diligent, and beware.

"Seeing that these things shall be disolved"- BE HOLY! Holiness does not mean a profession of holiness, or mingling with a group of holiness people. There never was a greater need for holy living than now. Holy means pure at heart. Churches are made up of individuals. Let us contrast two cases, say two preachers. Here is Brother A, who is gifted, well dressed and can pass in any society. He is tactful, popular, and in constant demand. He is "safe and sane" and knows how to preach so as to give no offence. We hear it said he will soon fill an important place in the church. Here is Brother B, just the opposite. He does not have any special natural gift. He is not recognized as "one of our representative men." He does not stand in with the church bosses, or politicians. He is not sought after to deliver spicy, after-flinner speeches,

or baccalaureate sermons. But one thing we can say, he has more than a profession. He never acts important on the one hand, or miffed on the other. He always keeps sweet in spirit whether noticed or unnoticed. Now history and observation have proven that this second young man will stand the wear and tear better and longer than the first. He will tower in strength and influence long after his bright colleague has landed on the scrap heaps of broken down popularity. Brother A will remain as long as he is fondled and noticed, but when reverses come he will fail.

"Seeing ye look for such things, BE DILIGENT!" Be active! Be aggressive! The Apostle knew that we were lop-sided and the tendency was to swing from one extreme to another. Hence, he felt inspired to say that while holy living is the paramount issue, diligence is so closely related that they are inseparable. In other words, do not magnify the one and minimize the other. Peter is trying to drive home the thought of purity, then activity. After Pentacost, the saints settled down in Jerusalem to enjoy themselves. This was not the divine plan and God permitted "a great persecution" to arise which scattered them. And "they that were scattered abroad went every where preaching the Word." PURITY, then ACTIVITY.

Yes it is too bad that we as individuals and churches are lop-sided. We stress one truth out of proportion with another of equal importance. We denounce some things bitterly, then later, adopt and fight for them.

"Seeing ye know these things before, BEWARE!" Beware of a contentious spirit. This is an age of contention and strife. It is not only to be found in politics and commercial life, but among the people of God. This is what occasioned the schism at Corinth. One said, "I am of Paul - I like deep theological truths. I enjoy masterful reasoning. Give me Paul and you can have all the rest." Another said, "I like emotion-Appollis is the man for me." A third one speaks up and says, "I take to practical things. I want a preacher to get down to where we live. Give me Cephas." Another one says, "I know no man after the fiesh. The Bible is my discipline; away with man made organizations, I am of Christ"-A no sect. There is plenty of that today — "If my preacher comes, I will walk or get there." That is what I call preachers religion. I never saw the preacher that I thought was big enough to take me to heaven.

Beware of compromise. This is a policy age, an age when people can easily set aside former convictions in order to receive recognition and avoid ostracism. Thousands of preachers are not as plain and humble as they were. They have gone back on past light and "built again the things which they once destroyed." Paul said that he who does this makes himself a "transgressor." It is too bad that now-a-days many ministers look and act so much like worldlings that it is hard to distinguish the difference.

Beware of covetousness. This is a subtle foe and especially now. Brother, you may be affected with the disease of covetousness. More than likely you call it "economy" or "precaution" or "against a rainy day." But are you not continually scheming, sometimes on Sunday, how you can save here or make a little there? Instead of having precious seasons with your Bible, morning, noon and night, do you not find more delight in thinking about finance? You will not get credit for a single penny that has passed through your hands except that which has been used directly or in-

directly for the futherance of the gospel. Moreover, every penny found in your possession which has not been thus used will be a swift witness against you in that day. O, Brethren, don't argue, or justify yourselves, but take these words to heart. We wonder why it is so hard to hold revivals as in former years, when there are those sitting in the front rows worth from ten to twenty thousand and who never pay one tenth (the tithe). Many times poor washer women give more to the cause of Christ than these mizers. I have noticed that the children of this kind of people are not only unsaved, but don't want to associate with religious people. No wonder, the curse of God is upon them. God's word says in Jer. 5:31 "The prophets prophesy falsely, the priests bear rule by their means; and my people love to have it so: and what will ye do in the end thereof?"

"For this ye know that no whoremonger nor unclean person, nor covetous man who is an idolator, hath any inheritance in the kingdom of Christ and of God." Eph. 5:5.

A Test of Christian Fidelity

TEXT: Malachi 3:7-12.

Malachi (My Messenger) seems to have fitted into a place of warning to Israel concerning her manner of dealing with the Lord. Among the things of which they were warned was their failure to deal honestly with the Lord in their stewardship of means. They had offered things polluted to the Lord, while reserving the best for themselves. They offered such as was inferior, torn, and diseased. Besides this, the Levitical priesthood in general was being profaned by the priests, while the people were engaging themselves in worldly entanglements, hence Malachi's warning of the wrath of God in the on-coming judgment.

Robbery is the term which Malachi preferred to use in speaking with Israel concerning her dishonesty in the stewardship of substance. The same sin was responsible for the Lord's work lagging in Nehemiah's day. Note what he found and how he dealt with the problem, as recorded in Neh. 13:10-12, "And I perceive that the portion of the Levites had not been given them: for the Levites and singers, that did the work, were fled every one to his field. Then contended I with the rulers and said, Why is the house of God forsaken? And I gathered them together, and set them in their place. Then brought all Judah the tithe of the corn and the new wine and the oil unto the treasuries."

Too many Christians look upon life as something that gives to them, but "Life is not getting, life is giving," as Nathan Howard Gist said. He further states, "Life begins when we find the spirit of adventure, drive our thought into new channels, revise our philosophy, and no longer are afraid to adopt something new."

Life begins when unfinished tasks are accepted as a challenge, and they give us strength because they are beyond us. But we adopt them, accept the challenge, and put all that we have of mind and soul, brain and brawn into them because they are difficult. We are living life in full when we ever are engaged in a mansized task that is appealing, constructive, helpful, because they build us, and through us build a better, saner, more servicable world. How true these words are in their application

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to us in our stewardship with the Lord. Hence, our loyalty to Christ is attested in our stewardship of giving for His cause.

Israel's Peculiar Backsliding.

"Even from the days of your fathers ye are gone away from mine ordinances, and have not kept them" Mal. 3:7a. Israel had practiced a gradual slipping away from the commandments of the Lord's concerning their offerings for the furtherance of His cause. Neither could they find justification, inasmuch as they had been called to honesty in the matter. "Return unto me, and I will return unto you, saith the Lord of Hosts" verse 7b. May we discern the greatest factor in this backsliding? As they progressed in their wanderings from the Lord, they were steadily developing a numbed conscience. Note their position, verse 7c, "But ye say, Wherein shall we return?" How much like Israel we have come to be. That is, we have withheld from the Lord that which He has demanded we should give, and yet we cry out, "I have done my share." No one has done his share until he has given at least a tenth part of all his income. Neither has any one a right to claim he is honest, if he has done less.

Note God's charge in verses 8 and 9. "Will a man rob God? Yet we have robbed me. But ye say wherein have we robbed thee? In tithes and offerings. Ye are cursed with a curse: for ye have robbed me, even this whole nation." Now if Israel as a nation had robbed God, What have we as a church done? Will the words, "Ye are cursed with a curse," apply to us, Brother, make an examination of your business record with the Lord, and see wherein ye have robbed Him.

God's Appeasement Offer

In this proposition is a most definite command to be noted, "Bring ye all." To me two applications are legal here. First, we are to bring all the tithes. that is, the tenth part of all with which we have been blessed. And second, all are to bring the tithes, not just a few of us, but every one who has named the name of the Lord. It does not matter whether your income is great or small, banked or used to meet current expenses, you are directly bound to the Lord for at least ten cents out of every dollar with which you are blessed.

What purpose did God have in making this offer? "That there may be meat (provisions with which to carry on) in mine house" v.10b. In Nehemiah's experience with Judah, previously mentioned, he also charged them with the sin of with-holding the tithe. He set forth to put things in order, and commanded that the Levites and singers be placed back in position in the house of the Lord, for they had been compelled to take to their fields to gain a livelihood. Do we find such conditions among our beloved churches and ministers? After the return of those who were supposed to be stationed in the house of the Lord, the people returned to bringing in the tithe, thus went on their way rejoicing. Too many of this day are pouring their time, talents, and energy into secular vocations, whom the Lord would have give themselves "wholly to prayer and the ministry of the Brethren, this, and many Word." other things, could be done if only we would bring all the tithe into God's service. We shall never be at our best until we return from this backsliding.

There is a great challenge in the proposition, "Prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of host, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it." We are not to prove man in this matter, but prove the Lord; the One who keeps every promise. Let us believe that He will do as He says, and yield in obedience to this command. When shall We prove Him? He says "prove me now." How shall we prove Him? "Herewith" (with this), that is with the tithe.

His Guarantee of Protection And Prosperity

"And I will rebuke the devourer for your sakes, and he shall not destroy the fruits of your ground; neither shall your vine cast her fruit before the time in the field, saith the Lord of hosts. And all nations shall call you blessed: for ye shall be a delightsome land, saith the Lord of hosts."

Our God obligates Himself for our protection and prosperity, as is seen in these verses, but only on the condition of our obedience to His command in bringing in all the tithes. He faithfully promises to prehibit the devastating work of enemies, and to mediate for peace — if only we will obey. What a wonderful feeling might be ours, if only we were willing to try the Lord. Let's cut loose from old self and put Him to the test. The world, upon seeing His blessings lavished upon us would really say, "What shall we do?" What a privilege then would be ours to, legitimately, preach obedience for the blessings of the Lord.

Conclusion

Someone has already said, "But tithing is a product of the old Mosaic Law, and we are under grace, hence this does not apply to the Christian Church." Very interesting it is to hear you say so, but I only ask you to turn to Genesis 14:18-23 and convince yourself. Here Abraham is seen to be giving tithes to Melchisedec, both of whom are known to have lived many, many years before the time of the giving of the Law of Moses. Wa also learn in the book of Hebrews that Christ has His priesthood forever after the order of Melchisedec. How can we claim to have carried on in the given order if we fail to give into Christ's Kingdom as Abraham gave into Melchisedec's?

Let us hear Christ Himself, Matt. 23:23, "Woe unto you, scribes and pharisees, hypocrites, for ye pay tithe of mint and anise and cummin, and have omitted the weightier matters of the law, judgment, mercy, and faith: These ought ye to have done, and not to leave the other undone." Note the fact that Christ did not disapprove tithing in any word which He spoke, but rather commended them for having gone thus far in obedience. Should we do less under grace than these, who were commanded, did under the letter of the Law? I tell you, Nay, but we should live after Christ's example referred to in 2 Cor. 8:9, "For ye know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though He was rich, yet for your sakes He became poor, that ye through His poverty might be rich."

Justice in the subject would not be dealt without hearing the apostle Paul. Take note of his plan in meeting the needs of the poor saints, 1 Cor. 16:1-4. The second verse reads as follows: "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store, as God has prospered him, that there be no gathering (collection) when I come." How are we to base our giving according to prosperity if not by the tithe? He further admonishes that we should abound in this grace of giving, 2 Cor. 8:7, "Therefore, as ye abound in everything, in faith, and utterance, and knowledge, and in diligence, and in your love to us, see that ye abound in this grace also." Now get what Paul says concerning the proper attitude, purpose and spirit in giving by reading 2 Cor. 8:8-12. How do you stand when your love for

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Christ is put to the test by your giving? Below is a copy of a plan for your convenience and blessing. Read it, pray, sign it and turn it in to your church treasurer:

Jonah, A Type of the Jewish Nation

"And he shall set up an ensign for the nations, and shall assemble the outcasts of Israel, and gather together the dispersed of Judah from the four corners of the earth" Isaiah 11:12.

The book of Jonah contains only four short chapters, but there is no reading more interesting when we study it with a prophetic application. However, we must not get away from the fact that Jonah was an individual who ran from the call of God, and refused to carry the message to the Ninevites. And we must believe that God prepared a large fish to swallow him up when he was thrown overboard the ship, and after three days the whale threw him upon the dry land and he then went to Nineveh. Now let us believe that the Bible is filled with types and shadows of real and notable things that shall happen



to the people of the world in general. This story of Jonah is one that is outstanding.

Jonah is a type of the Jewish nation, he refused the call of God; just as the Jews refused the Son of God. We know that there were only a very few of the Jews who believed Christ; as a nation, they said "No. He is not the Messiah," and would not accept Him as such.

Just as Jonah was punished for his sin, the Jewish nation has been and is being punished for its sin. Jonah was thrown overboard, helpless within himself, to be swallowed up by the whale. In like manner, the Jewish nation was overthrown, and helplessly they landed scattered in the different countries of the world among the Gentiles. So the whale that received Jonah is like the Gentile countries that received the Jews.

There is a peculiarity about the whale swallowing Jonah. He was swallowed whole, and could not be digested. There is the same peculiarity about the Jew. The Gentile world has swallowed the whole nation of the Jews 1900 years ago, and has not and will not be able to digest them. Wherever you see a Jew, you know him to be a Jew. Very seldom does a Jew marry out of his own race. Even if he does, statistics show, that in four generations there are no male children born. What could be more significant. It just helps to prove that the Jew is going to remain a pure Jewish race; and will not be digested or done away with through the Gentile world. Though they have been swallowed up for these many years, and made helpless as far as their own rule and government is concerned. Yet they have not been destroyed.

At the proper time, when Jonah was ready to accept the call of God and deal with it as he should, the whale vomitted him out upon his own land. He had suffered enough to cause him to say yes to God. Now notice the Jews today, how they are suffering and have been for so long. What will be the result, The time is ripe, the Jews are getting ready to accept the Son of God as their Messiah. They are being thrown, as it were, out of the mouth of the Gentile countries, and landing upon their own lands.

Just as Jonah said yes to God, at the second opportunity, the Jews will say yes to His Son at His second coming.





Organization of Kentucky State Association

I will report the organization of our Kentucky State Association of Free Will Baptist.

- Motion carried to discontinue our part in the Tri-State Association.

Committee on By-Lays appointed: F. S. Van Hoose, L. E. Colliver, C. Z. Cavin, L. H. Winchell, and John Dills.

Adjourned for church.

Met for business at 1:45 p. m. and after a regular devotional, Eld. Johnnie Van Hoose delivered a wonderful sermon on the "Organization of the Church Which was Built Upon the Apostles and Prophets, Jesus Christ Being the Chief Cornerstone and Head." God manifested Himself by an outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon His children.

A short recess.

Called back for business and the Constitution and By-Laws were read.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

The Design of the Association is to comprise all the Quarterly Meetings in the state of Kentucky belonging to the Free Fill Baptist denomination and to unify more completely the **cnurch** work.

The Kentuckey State Association sustains the same relation to the Quarterly Meetings as the Quarterly Meetings to the churches. The body was organized May 6, 1939, and adopted the following Constitution and By-Laws to govern its mission and work.

This organization shall be known as the Kentucky State Association of the Free Will Baptist.

The object of this organization shall be to unify that work of the various Quarterly Meetings in the aforesaid state, and to devise means for the extention of Christ's Kingdom in the state.

Each Quarterly Meeting composing

this Association shall be entitled to five delegates from the Quarterly Meeting and one additional delegate for every three hundred members or major portion thereof, together with all ordained ministers in good standing.

This Association shall have the right to settle any question of discipline or doctrine or government usuage coming before it properly from any of the bodies composing this organization, or act upon any repeal that may be made from any body belonging to the Association.

The officers of the Association shall consist of the following, who shall be elected at each regular session and serve until their successor is elected and qualified: A Moderator and an assistant, a Clerk and an assistant, a Treasurer who shall serve at the will of the Association. He shall furnish such bond as the Body requires. Duties of the Moderator: He shall preside at all Association meetings, and have general supervision of all church work, during his term. He is to appoint all committees for the Association, that the business be properly brought before the body. His assistant accepts his responsibilities in his absence.

The above named officers shall act as an Executive Board.

The duties of the Clerk: He shall keep a correct record of all meetings, and read them for approval at each session. He shall keep a record of all finances coming into the treasurer. and settle with him at each session for comparison.

The duties of the Executive Board: To this Board power is given to act on any and all legal business coming properly before it between sessions. They shall have power to collect from its members as is needed for the work and employ and superintend such workers for the Association as may be needed.

The meeting time of the Association shall be each year, beginning on the third Friday in June at 10:30 a.m. and continueing until Sunday night.

Alteration: The Constitution and By-Laws may be altered or amended at a regular session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of those present, provided that notice shall have been filed with the Clerk at the preceding session, showing that it is desired.

Each Quarterly Meeting shall make a report of its work before the Regular Session of the State Association with delegates and contribution of \$10.00 or more; the State Association to issue recommendation cards to all ministers in good standing who are recommended by their church and Quarterly Meeting.

Motion carried that Clerk prepare a letter and send \$20.00 with letter by delegates to National Association.

Motion carried to receive Eld. F. S. Van Hoose's report and \$10.00 from Johnson County Conference.

Motion carried that all money on hands of the Tri-State Association and Yearly Meeting be turned over to Ervin Rice, Treasurer.

Motion carried to receive Wm. W. Moore's report and \$5.00 from the Lawrence County Conference.

Eld. Scott Castle was appointed with Eld. F. S. Van Hoose to see Eld. Charley Pennington to collect Kentucky's part of money from him as Treasurer of the Tri-State Association, and make a settlement.

Motion carried that Clerk be furnished with funds to purchase a book to keep the records of the Kentucky State Association.

My Visit to Hillsdale College

During my recent revival in Michigan, a long cherished hope came to be my privilege. I promised myself before I left home that if I ever went back to the state of Michigan, I was going to make a special effort to visit Hillsdale College. Hillsdale College, as many of you know, was originally a Free Will Baptist College. That, of course, was before the merger of our work with the Northern Baptist. I have a picture of the school at home and so of course wanted to see for myself.

One day, during the revival, some friends and I drove over to Hillsdale which is about 120 miles southwest of Flint. (The pastor, Bro. Mince, and I went back another day; but I will make the report of both days together).

When we drove up to the campus, the scene looked very much like the picture I have at home. The buildings, and there are some four or five of them, are of brick construction, and while they show signs of age, yet they are kept in very good repair. The campus is beautifully covered with large trees that look as though they had been there for many years. Some large boulders, typical of the rock formation of the state of Michigan, have been carefully placed on the campus, and I remember on one of them is inscribed "Class of 1860," and on another one is inscribed the class of 1873.

You see, this school was established in 1853. That is, we ought to say the property was deeded in that year. I went to the court house, Hillsdale being the county seat of Hillsdale County, and looked up the deed, and saw for myself. While I am on that point, I might tell you that the Free Will Baptist Yearly Meeting of the state of Michigan is mentioned in the original deed. It has been redeeded twice since that time. I didn't recall any of the names of the 15 trustees of the original deed through any annals of literature, but in the second deed. I found the names of George H. Ball and Ransom Dunn. I recall reading a book on baptism written by George H. Ball, who was then pastor of the Free Will Baptist church in Buffalo, New York, and of course, I was familjar with the name of Ransom Dunn through the Butler-Dunn Theology.

I went in to the manager of public



relations, Dr. Myers. 1 told him I was a minister of the original Free Will Baptist church, and that I live in southwest Missouri. About the first thing he said was, "Do you know anything of the whereabouts of John H. Wolfe?" I told him that he lived in Pawnee City, Nebraska. Dr. Myers showed me around the different buildings, took me to the library, made me acquainted with the president, Professor Mauck, with the librarian, Miss Hawkes (Miss Hawkes at one time, so I found out, was a member of the General Baptist church at Oakland City, Indiana), who gave me some very interesting literature on the management, plan, and carrying on of the school, etc. He expressed his regret that I must needs be in a hurry and thereby preventing him from showing me around more. In looking through the library, I found several of the old Free Will Baptist books. Five copies of the original Butler-Dunn Theology, and three copies of Butler's Theology were among the number. I left in the library a copy of the Free Will Baptist Gem with a promise to send more, informed them of our new publishing house in Monett, and of our National Associational work composed of the southern states, etc. This information seemed to be to them an agreeable surprise. I was treated with all courtesy and kindheartedness.

Now here is something else that proved to be of intense interest to me. Dr. Myers pointed down southwest of the campus and said, "Right down there about four houses is the old home of Ransom Dunn." Stating that some of his grandchildren still live there. So nothing would do me but that I must go down there. As we walked up to the door, we noticed on the door a metal plate with the inscription "R. Dunn." One of the grandchildren of R. Dunn, Miss Helen E.

Slayton, who is rather an elderly lady. met us at the door. We were received very cordially; especially so after she found out who we were and our mission. She showed us the library of her grandfather, Dr. Dunn, his old writing desk, a number of his old note books, and a lot of things of historical interest, as they have a room practically taken up with his old library, etc. She also presented me with a book on his life which Miss Slayton's sister had written, and had published. For the book I was very thankful. Miss Slayton's mother, who was the daughter of R. Dunn, passed away a few years ago; but the son-in-law, Miss Slayton's father is still living there with the children, and is 92 years of age. The visit in this home was indeed a pleasure.

The College is now known only as a non-sectarian school, has an enrollment of 428, and has the appearance of being a splendid school. There are 25 acres of ground in all and is called in the books in the recorder's office, "College Square."

I could not tell how much I enjoyed this visit, and I felt it would be of interest if I passed it on to you.

Malachi, The Messenger

"Behold, I will send my messenger, and he shall prepare the way before me: and the Lord, whom ye seek, shall suddenly come to his temple, even the messenger of the covenant, whom ye delight in: behold, he shall come, saith the Lord of hosts."

I love to read the messenges of the last prophets of the Old Testament, and his name means messenger, and he was ceartainly true to his name he says nothing about himself.
