Natural Consequences of Violation

THE TEN Commandments of the Old Testament are the divine precepts for moral government. They were given approximately 1500 years before Christ, and they have never been repealed - in fact every civilized government has copied and based their civil laws upon the basic precepts of the Commandments. Every person is duty bound to observe the principle of these commandments if he is to be morally pure. These precepts do not mention or infer salvation, for the New Covenant of Grace is "not of works lest any man should boast," but is a free gift from God. Even so, the keeping of the ten commandments will not bring salvation to the soul, yet they are still in effect and are highly obligatory upon the lives of men for a standard of moral God has established laws whose benefits we shall enjoy if we conform to them; and which cannot be violated without paying the penalty in punishments, sufferings and loss. Much of the sufferings, disease, and premature deaths come in consequences of the conduct of the sufferer, which is the natural consequence of their mistakes, sins, and violation of God's moral laws.

I have observed that some men prosper, financially, even when they are living very wicked lives. I have often wondered about this, but now it is clear to my mind. They are careful to observe certain "laws" which go to make up a sane and safe use of finance. When these laws are violated in the capacity of unwise and careless spending, the very best of men, even Christian men, will suffer embarrassment or even bankruptcy. If these laws are observed, even the most un-Godly men may enjoy their blessings, but it is only the reward of life and gives no assurance of Eternal Life.

The same is true of the ten commandments—observe them and enjoy the reward of living; violate them and suffer the consequences.

The observance of the commandments is important because of the resultant blessings; the violation of them is serious because of the drastic penalty which must necessarily follow. For instance:

"For I the Lord thy God am a jealous God, visiting the iniquity of

the fathers upon the children unto the third and fourth generation of THEM THAT HATE ME; and shewing mercy unto thousands of them that LOVE ME and keep my commandments" Exo. 20: 5-6.

Is this statement a fact? Does God do this? Can it be proved? Here are records of two families of men which have found their way into print and I pass them on to you as hard facts. Figures don't lie—but liars figure.

Max Jukes was born in New York state in 1720. Of his 903 descendants that have been traced, 300 died prematurely; 200 were theives and were criminally inclined, of whom 3 paid the death penalty and more that 100 were imprisoned on an average of 13 years each; 145 were drunkards; 90 were prostitutes; 91 illegitimately



born; and 480 were sufferers of venereal diseases. The various members of the Jukes family cost the state of New York more than a million dollars.

In contrast to this terrible record, let us look at the record of Jonathan Edwards to illustrate the Gospel side of heredity. He was born in 1703. Of the 1394 of his descendants whose records were studied, 13 were presidents of leading colleges and universities, 65 were professors in colleges and universities, 60 were doctors, 100 were ministers, 60 were prominent authors, 100 were lawyers, and 30 were judges. A number were senators, congressmen, mayors of cities, and ministers to foreign countries. far as we can learn, only one of this famous family ever left a blot upon the family record, and that was Aaron

Burr who fought a duel and killed a fellow citizen.

The Edwards family is in existence today. They are generally upright and honorable. The Jukes family went out of existence in the "third and fourth generation." God has ordained that no FIFTH generation be born of these degenerates, and that is an expression of His infinite mercy and love for the unborn millions who would be blighted with degeneracy and suffering. With such a law in existence, and with God having reduced the longevity of man from several hundred years to three score and ten, and by us doing our very best — yet we are rapidly approaching a day of violence such as prevailed before the flood when "God saw that the wickedness of man was great in the earth, and every imagination of the thoughts of his heart was only evil continually" Gen. 6:5. See also Matt. 24: 37-40 with references.

Max Jukes was an idle, shiftless hunter, a hard drinker and licentious, who married into a family of five sisters, several of whom were illegit; mate and three of whom were known to be unchaste - hence a terrible record of crime and vileness until they went out of existence in the third and fourth generations. Jonathan Edwards and his wife were both well born, and were converted in childhood - Dr. Edwards was converted at the age of seven. They were both refined and well educated, insisting upon the strictest family discipline in the rearing of their own children, and they became a striking illustration of the fulfillment of the last sentence of the second commandment, "And shewing mercy unto thousands of them (that is, generations) that love me, and keep my commandments." Therefore their generations are still in evidence and will go on until the end of time.

It is only a natural consequence—
"Behold therefore the goodness and severity of God: on them which fell, severity; but toward thee, goodness, if thou continue in his goodness: otherwise thou also shalt be cut off" Romans 11:22.

God's "Creation" and "Formation" of Man

Paul is speaking of the possibility of all, both Jew and Greek, bond or free, and both male and female coming to the Lord, believing and being baptized, and putting on Christ. With God there is no line drawn as for nationatily, race or sex. He looks upon all with the same degree of love. He desires one to be saved just as He does the other. With God there is no respect as for race or sex. So the spirit that He created is for both male and female.

Genesis 2:7 records the formation of the natural man; made from the dust of the ground. "And the Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground. and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living soul." Included in this verse is recorded the placing together of the created man and the formed man.

We know there is a difference in creation and formation. To create, something is made from nothing. To form, something is made from a substance that already exists. We know the ground was in existence for some time before the formation of man. "In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth." Gen. 1:1

Someone has said the two Scriptures which we refer to are only two accounts of the same work of God, but let us see. One is spoken of as a creation and the other a formation; and the breathing of one into the other. The body is only a house for the Spirit to live in. Open your Bible to 1 Corinthians 3:16, and you will read, "Know ye not that ye are the temple of God, and that the Spirit of God dwelleth in you?" Or in other words, the likeness of God, which is the spiritual man, dwelleth in you. In 1 Corinthians 6:19 we read, "Know

ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost which is in you?"

We should keep the temple clean and pure, for it is the formation and work of God, into which He has breathed His likeness. So many people fail to realize the truth about these sayings of our Lord. They go on in their careless ways of living, indulging in the filthy things of the world. With unclean habits, they defile the temple that contains the spirit,



God has trusted His handiwork into our care; and in our caring for it rightly, He receives glory and we receive blessings. On the other hand, if we fail to do our part, God is grieved and we suffer. "If any man defile the temple of God, him shall God destroy; for the temple of God is holy, which temple ye are" (1 Cor. 3:17). We ought to be glad we have the power of choice, then choose to do right. If we will care for the temple and keep it pure, and undefiled, it will be a fit place in which the spirit may dwell, but to neglect the temple, we drift into unclean habits and our bodies are abused, bringing about weakness and a wrecked temple. If we come to the grave in bad repair, we have it all to regret.

God expects us to care for the spirit which is in the temple. Our poor spirits become very hungry and weak sometimes. We never fail to feed our bodies. When our appetite is aroused, we think of the dinner table. Three times a day we are listening, and we never fail to hear the call from the kitchen, "Come and eat." People are going to manage to feed their natural bodies. If they fail, they become hungry, weak and even sick. People have been starved to death when they failed to get food.

Why people cannot see the same need of feeding their spiritual being, I can't understand. It becomes hungry but we go on unheeding its need. The call is given, "Come and dine," but we refuse to take our spirits to the Lord's table. And oh, there is such a need for it to feast upon the things the Father has set out for us. And here we are holding a hungry spirit away from the table. Our souls are hungry and weak, even sick. If we are not careful, we will starve them to death. And of course, the death of the soul leads to the land in the "lake that burns with fire and brimstone." (Rev. 20). There the soul will be separated from God forever.

Feed your soul by reading God's Word and by praying to Him. Go to the services with His people and worship. Live a real devoted life for God and you will grow in His work and be strong and able to carry great loads of responsibility.

Now, let's not starve the created man, nor defile the formed man, for they are both God's. (1 Cor. 6:20).

They seemed to think when the feast was ready the Master, Himself, would come and tell them, for they felt that they were quite important persons. Besides, they had other things to do without listening to a lot of "sanctimonious fools" and their big stories of a Son of God who had been on earth in human flesh and was killed and in three days came to life again! Now, anybody with a half grain of sense would know that story wasn't true! And so it goes on even today among all nations, tongues and kindreds of the earth. Now let's see what happened to the Jews and to you when you refused to come. When the Jews refused to come, God sent his sevants to the Gentiles who were poor, because they were without God and without hope; maimed, because of their dissatisfaction with these idols and false gods but knew not where to turn; blind because they had not the Light, Jesus Christ.

The servants went to the Gentiles, and "preached unto them Jesus," and they left their idols and false gods and came to the Light by the thousands

till today there are millions feasting on the good things of heaven. They are no longer poor, for they have eternal life; they are no longer maimed for they worship the true and living God; no longer halt, for the love of God satisfies that longing in their hearts for truth and knowledge and understanding love; no longer are they blind for they have the Light to show them the way and it is even in their hearts. But the Jews who refused to come to the feast are left in outer darkness, just as we were and as you will be if you refuse to accept this invitation while life is yours, for "in the place where the tree falleth, there it shall be." After all those came who had been invited, first and last, still there was room for more, and the man sent his servants into the highways and hedges with orders to compell them to come in. Does God ever compell anyone to come to Him? Yes, He really does. How does He compell them? Through fear of what will happen to them if they do not come. Paul was one of those who was compelled to come.

I dearly love to hear Christ preached in the pulpit, and the love of God, the beauties of heaven, righteousness, and "love thy neighbor as thyself." I do hate to ever hear hell and damnation preached, but it has to be done, for the Master said to compell them to come in.

A Sure Foundation

Free Will Baptist Historical Department

Taken from the Free Baptist Cyclopædia, published in 1889 in the interests of the rise of the Free Will Baptist Convention, and in honor of our Free Will Baptist Fathers. By Rev. A. G. Burgess A. M. and Rev. J. T. Ward A. M.

Printing Establishments

The Free Will Baptist, was an outgrowth of the book concern. In 1826 the Morning Star was issued at Limerick, Me., by Hobbs, Woodman, and Co., with Rev's J. Buzzell and S. Burbank as editors. In 1830 Wm. Burr wrote an article in the Star calling attention to the importance of a denominational book establishment. Subsequently he employed Samuel Beede to write a series of articles, published in the Star, attracted the attention of several ministers and brethren, among whom was Rev. David Marks. As a result at the General Conference held in Wilton, Me., in October, 1831, a Book Concern was established, of which David Marks was chosen agent, and Henry Hobbs, Samuel Beede and Wm. Burr were chosen publishing and advisory committee. The agent become personally responsible for all contracts in the publication and sale of books. and during the first year published 2,500 copies of the minutes of the last Conference, 7,000 copies of the Christain Melody, 5,000 copies of the Register, 1,000 copies of Caverno's Address on Temperance, and 2,000 copies of the Character of Christ, by J. G. Pike, at a total expense of \$4,000. At the next Conference all were pleased with the success of David Marks as book agent, and he continued to be reappointed till 1835, when he resigned. He had received in the four years less than \$900 in all for his personal services, and had assumed risks of \$14,000.

In 1832 the proprietors consented to sell the Morning Star to the denomination, and the General Conference at Meredith, N. H., "agreed that the book agent and the publishing committee be advised to purchase the establishment of the Morning Star on the terms the proprietors had proposed," and added in case the purchase be made, "to them shall belong the whole management of the establishment for the ensuing year." Accordingly, David Marks, the book agent, and Henry Hobbs, Samuel Beede, Wm. Burr, Hosea Quinby, Silas Curtis and Daniel P. Cilly, the publishing committee, asumed the entire responsibility of paying \$3,700 for the property. No change was made in the editorial or financial management of the Star. but the paper received a new impetus from the transfer, and during the year the subscription list increased from 1600 to 2700. In 1833 on the resignation of Samuel Burbank, Samuel Beede, who had been in the employ of the Book Concern, became his successor. The General Conference in Strafford, Vt., recommended that the Star be removed to Dover, N. H., and the change was soon effected. In March following Beede died, and Wm. Burr became the acting editor as well as office agent.

On the resignation of Marks in 1835 the Star and Book Concern were united. Wm. Burr was still financial agent and residence editor. Eleven men were appointed as trustees to take charge of the property. They were Wm. Burr, Silas Curtis, Daniel P. Cilly, Jacob Davis, Enoch Place, Joseph M. Harper, Samuel Burbank, Freeman Carey, Elias Hutchins, Seth C. Parker and Charles Morse. The property was valued at \$10,246.60, but there was a debt of \$6,222.48 with no money on hand to meet it. The trustees sought to raise a loan of \$5,000 by giving their personal bonds. They sought to place 100 shares of \$50, each. After three years but about half the sum was raised. Then came the financial crash and the other half of the loan could not be had. Cruel pressure was brought against the Star on account of its outspoken position concerning slavery. The Legislature refused to grant a charter. But the denomination generally, and the Lord especially, sustained and endorsed the management, so that in 1843 the trustees of the establishment united with the Washingon Street church in buying a lot and erecting a building, which was completed in 1844 at a cost to the Book Concern of \$2,000. The lower story for its use, and the second story for the church. The net valuation of its property was \$14,000.00 Then commenced those large appropriations of \$1,500 anually to benevolent purposes, as well as some larger and many smaller donations. In 1846 the charter was granted by the New Hampshire Legislature and the name was changed to the "Free Will Baptist Establishment." The board of corporators was the same, with the addition of two members.

The establishment now entered upon

an era of great prosperity. At the General Conference held at Mainville Ohio, in October, 1856, it was reported that \$21,006.71 had been appropriated to benevolent objects in the denomination, and the assets were then estimated at \$43,129.77. In 1867 the property of the church in the building and lot was purchased by the establish. ment. The building was remodeled and fitted for a publishing house with two stores and a hall to rent. The total expenses of repairs and equipment was \$26,994.13. The building was occupied till the removal to Boston, and then sold for \$16.500.00.

In November, 1866, Wm. Burr was suddenly removed by death. About the same time The Christian Freeman, devoted to the interest of our denomination in the West, began to be issued in Chicago. In 1868 its managers applied to the General Conference for an appropriation from the funds for publications to assist this western paper, claiming that some of its constituency had assisted in the earnings of the Establishment. \$12,009. was apportioned and \$10,000.00 more were to be appropriated to the brethren in New York, on condition that they should establish a Free Will Baptist paper, with certain conditions to be filled. The appropriation to the Western paper was promptly paid. The Conference relinquished further control of the Printing Establishment. For the future the board of corporators should direct the use of the surplus for the benefit of the denomination. In order to avoid having three papers, efforts were made to move the Star office to New York City. Through mistakes or misunderstandings, the efforts did not succeed. But in January, 1870, a financial and editoral office was opened in New York, occupied by G. H. Ball, D. D. The intention was to make it "a permanent arrangement and a practical success"; but not proving satisfactory, at the suggestion of the New York brethren it was discontinued at the end of one year. The patronage of the Christian Freeman had not met the expense of publication. In the fall of 1870 its managers proposed to the trustees having the project of a paper in New York in charge, to unite the two interest, and issue the paper in New York, with an office in Chicago. The plan was to

enlist all liberal Baptists in the movement, and the name agreed upon was The Baptist Union. But the General Conference did not consider that the conditions imposed on the division of the funds of the Printing Establishment were fully met, so the \$10,000 was never paid; but in 1887 a satisfactory arrangement was made by which the subscription . list The Baptist Union was transfered to the Printing Establishment, and the New York brethren were represented. and the Board of Corporators. In 1874 a western Star office was opened in Chicago, but failing of success, it was abandoned.

In 1870 the Printing Establishment united with D. Lothrop and Co., of Boston, in publishing Sunday-school books. More than forty volumes of a high order were issued under the supervision of a committee, of which Rev. G. T. Day, D. D., was a member. This arrangement was not financially

profitable, and was discontinued, though the vote to establish a Boston office was not abandonced. At the annual meeting of the establishment in 1883 the subject came up anew, and after much deliberation a plan was adopted which has furnished the establishment with convenient office and rooms for printing facities in Boston, and aided the Boston church in securing a commodious house of worship. In 1885 the removal was completed, and the Printing Establishment was occupying its new building, with additional facilities, at 457 Shawmut Avenue, Boston, Mass. Although the establishment has appropriated more than \$80,000 in money, or its equivalent, for the benevolent work of the denomination, yet in January, 1887. it still had a capital of over \$75,000.00.

The Battle of Armageddon

Armageddon is a word stated but once in the Bible. The event at Armageddon is alluded to in many places; but the word is stated only once which is to be found in Revelation 16:16, "And he gathered them together into a place called in the Hebrew tongue Armageddon." statement is made just after the record of John's vision of three unclean spirits like frogs coming out of the mouth of the dragon, the beast, and the false prophet. These spirits, we are told, are the spirits of devils working miracles, and we are told that their purpose is to gather the kings of the earth and of the whole world together to the battle of that great day of God Almighty. As this part of the Book of Revelation, together with all the chapters from 4 to 19 inclusive, is to be fulfilled during the last period of the age, or the Tribulation period. Therefore, I say these unclean spirits which are the spirits of devils are three "isms" of this day: namely, Communism, Fascism and Modernism. Certainly these three spirits, in the political and religious world, are gathering the rulers of the earth together in fury for some great purpose. The terminal of it all will result in the Armageddon battle on the plain of Esdraleon where the

nations of the world will have concentrated their armies; there warring over the wealth of the Dead Sea. which is valued at several times more than that of the entire world, we are told. The plain of Esdraleon has been the battle ground of the ages past. We are told in Rev. 14:20 that at this time blood will run to the horse bridles by the space of a thousand six hundred furlongs; or upwards of 200 miles. But the very event of Armageddon itself is to be a conflict be-



tween the Christ, followed by the armies of heaven and the Ar ichrist followed by the armies of earth.

"And I saw Heaven opened, and behold a white horse; and he that sat on him was called Faithful and True, and in righteousness he doth judge and make war. His eyes were of fire, and on his head were many crowns;

and he had a name written which no man knew but himself. And he was clothed in a vesture dipped in blood; and his name is called the Word of God. And the armies of heaven followed him upon white horses clothed in fine linen white and clean. And out of his mouth goeth a sharp sword, that with it he should smite the nations and he shall rule them with a rod of iron; and he treadeth the winepress of the fierceness and wrath of almighty God. And he hath on his vesture and on his thigh a name written KING OF KINGS AND LORD OF LORDS. And I saw an angel standing in the sun; and he cried with a loud voice saying to all the fowls that fly in the midst of heaven, come and gather yourselves together to the supper of the great God; That ye may eat the flesh of kings, and the flesh of captains, and the flesh of mighty men, and the flesh of horses, and them that sit on them, and the flesh of all men, both free and bond, both small and great. I saw the beast, (antrichrist) and the kings of the earth, and their armies, gathered together to make war against him that sat on the horse (Christ), and against his army. And the beast was taken, and with him the fals? prephet that wrought mircles before him, with which he deceived them that had received the mark of the beast, and them that worshipped his image. These both were cast alive into a lake of fire burning with brimstone. And the remnant were slain with the sword of him that sat upon the horse. which sword proceeded out or his mouth: and all the fowls were fille: with their flesh." Rev. 19:11-21 (this beast and false prophet are the same as the two beasts of Rev. 13th chapter.)

Notice how 2 Thess. 2:8 corresponds with this: "And then shall that Wicked be revealed, whom the Lord shall consume with the spirit of his mouth, and shall destroy with the brightness of his coming." Preceeding this Paul was telling the Thessalonians that the day (of His coming) would not come except there be a falling away first, and that man of sin be revealed the son of perdition, (the Antichrist).

The sword that proceeds out out His mouth is not to be understood as a carnal weapon of course; but simply means his word of authority and power. The foregoing Scriptures refer directly to the terrible Armegoddon which of course is the last battle of this age. Not the last battle however; but he last battle of this age. The battle of Gog and Magog is to be fought at the close of the kingdom age; but the battle of Armageddon is the last battle of this age.

This age is to close with the return of Christ in glory, when He shail put down all rule and authority and power.

The battle of David and Goliath is a true type of this last battle. Goliath and the Philistines represent the antichrist and his armies, and David and Israel respresents Christ and His armies. Just as David won by the power of God so Christ will win by Divine power.

Certainly the stage is rapidly being set for this last great end time drama. If ever the nations of earth were in a turmoil, it is now. And what is causing it? These three unclean

"isms" that are at work the world over today. How heartless and cruel rulers are getting. This spirit of one man rule will help so much in ushering in and introducing to the world their great superman or world dictator, the Antichrist. But thank God the Christ will come and put an end to it all. We that have faith in Him are positively on the winning side. So may our hearts not fail us for fear and for looking after the things that are coming on the earth, as is true with many today; but may we be sober and look up for our redemption draweth nigh.

Many other scriptures might be sighted on this wonderful subject; but I must not take up too much space. So I will just leave the subject as thus briefly dealt with.

Latest Foreign Mission News

Yes, we have good news concerning the fine work that is being done, and what we hope to do in the great cause of foreign missions. The progress that the Free Will Baptist people have made in this great field of service for the last nine years, together with the plans that have been laid to extend the work in the immediate future, can be no less than some of the best news that might come to our people. No longer can we, or our critics say that the Free Will Baptist Church does not sponsor foreign mission work. Not that there was ever a time when our people did not believe in this great work, but in the South in particular we have been rather careless until a few years ago. Today, however, interest in foreign missions is fine and is growing rapidly. In evidence of the interest our people have in giving the Gospel to the . whole world let us note the following facts and figures:

Within the last four years three missionaries have been sent to the foreign fields and another is ready to go now and is hoping to sail for Venezeula in August. Besides those who have either already gone to the fields or are ready to go, others are hoping to go as soon as they are prepared to go.

Miss Laura Belle Barnard, who is making tireless efforts to establish a Free Will Baptist mission in India, is asking for a helper or helpers as quickly as we can supply them. Also, she reminds us of the fact that more workers and more work mean more funds with which to carry on the work. Miss Barnard would like to come home for a season after another year, but unless a helper is supplied to carry on the work while she is away, it will greatly suffer in her absence. So let

us all earnestly pray the Lord of the harvest that He will send more laborers into the harvest.

On the other hand, Brother and Sister Willey are calling for helpers down in Nicaragua. As many of you know, the Willeys were forced to leave Panama the first of July because of an intolerant government. When they left Panama, Bro. Willey took the little boy and went to Nicaragua, but Sister Willey took the little girl and came to the States. Those who attended the recent session of the National Association in Bryan, Texas, were doubtless convicted, convinced, and inspired by the message Sister Willey gave on Thursday evening of the meeting. And though they had to leave their work in Panama, we were happy to learn that they left thorsands of tracts and New Testaments in hundreds of native Indian homes of that needy country. Moreover, they hope to be able to return to Panama after a year. when the present governmental administration will be changed. In the meantime, they are going to work among the native Indians in Nicaragua who are probably more numerous and equally as greatly in need of the Gospel as those in Panama. Therefore, let us hope and believe that God is giving us two fields instead of one, both Panama and Nicaragua.

Miss Bessie Yeley of Sciotoville, Ohio was approved by the Board and accepted as our missionary to Venezuela last November, but primarily because of her health, she has been detained and has not yet gone to the field. In the meantime, however, she has been dismissed by the physician, secured her passport and is ready to go soon.

Regarding our missionaries and their work, the Board made the following

recommendations to the Association during its recent session in Bryan:

First, we recommend the approval of the change of the field of labor of Brother and Sister Willey, namely, from Panama to Nicaragua. We further recommend that Brother and Sisters Willey's salary and allowance for mission work in Nicaragua be continued in the amount of \$150.00 per month. Morever, that we supply them with needed helpers as early as possible

Second, we recommend that we continue Miss Barnard's salary at \$50.00 per month. Also, we recommend the approval of Miss Barnard's efforts to establish a Free Will Baptist mission in India, and that we supply her with funds and helpers with which to extend the work as rapidly as possible.

Third, we recommend that Miss Bessie Yeley be given \$250.00, \$200.00 of which is for her transporation to Venezuela, and \$50.00 of which as her salary for the first month on the field. She, too, is to receive \$50.00 per month as a salary, and she is to sail as early as possible.

Concerning finances the Treasurer reported a total of \$1730.97 received from November 1, 1938 to July 1, 1939, in which contributors from ten different states had part. Also, a balance of \$619.24 was reported on July 1, 1939. But it was the suggestion of the Board that a balance of not less than \$300.09 should be reserved in the treasury at all times in order that emergencies may be met without delay. Therefore our people are urged to respond to our financial needs to the extent that our missionaries may not go lacking and that your Board may not be embarrassed.

Finally, we recommend the following mission budget, which extends from July 1, 1939 to July 1, 1940. The budget is not made on the basis of numbers in the different states, but rather on the basis of what has been

done for foreign missions in the past. We sincerely urge each state to make its apportionment the minimum for this great work, and unless we realize this financial goal our mission work cannot go forward as it should:

Our Bus Trip to the National Association

Being elected by the bus crowd to write about our bus trip to Bryan Texas, I shall endeavor to tell you about our wonderful and enjoyable trip.

We left Neosho, Mo. on Monday the 10th of July about 9:00 a. m. We drove through Oklahoma and arrived in Sherman, Texas about 7 o'clock. After getting permission from the chief of police we camped in the city's beautiful park. Nearly all of the passengers had cots so we slept out under the open sky. Some got their night's rest disturbed by getting their cots turned bottom side up, with the occupant lying beneath; but that was just a part of the trip. The next morning we ate our break as in a restaurant in Sherman.

Our next stop was in Dallas where we saw many tall buildings, and some bought souvenirs of the city.

We arrived in Bryan, Texas, Tuesday evening about 4 o'clock. We were then assigned to our places to stay. We had a wonderful association. But as I am not reporting the association I will confine my remarks to the trip only.

We left Bryan about 10 o'clock Friday morning. We drove to Houston where we visited the Mel Morris Bible Cyclorama. This was one of the grandest experiences of our entire trip. Our tour manager, Eld. Kenneth Turner, had already made arrangements ahead so therefore Mrs. Morris was expecting us. She certainly proved herself altogether competant in explaining the marvlous Bible pictures portrayed on the large dome ceiling. The painting is a continous canvas 28 feet in width and 200 feet in length covering an unbroken area of 5,600 square feet, not including the dome. It took four artists two years to paint the art work at a cost of nearly \$11,200.00 The entire Cyclorama building represents an investment of \$60,000,00.

We then drove on to Galveston, Texas, arriving there about 5 o'clcok. Of course the first thing was to take a plunge in the Gulf of Mexico, which proved to be a very enjoyable experience. That night we slept on the beach close to the roaring waves and breakers. This gives a thrill that cannot be found anywhere else.

On Saturday morning we started on our way toward home, travelling along the Gulf coast to Port Arthur, Texas; a distance of nearly 100 miles. The bus roce across the Galveston Bay on a large ferry; a distance of 3 miles. We were all on deck seeing what we could, and there was plenty of sights to see. One of the sights we saw was a large shark jump up out of the water. When we arrived at Port Arthur we saw several large ships.

That night we slept near De Ridder, Louisiana. The next morning we drove on to Shreveport for breakfast, where we also shaved and cleaned up.

When Sunday school time came Sunday morning, the bus crowd became serious minded, and elected John B. Rollins to teach the Sunday school lesson. After singing and prayer, we had a very enjoyable discussion of the lesson. Our Sunday school collection amounted to \$1.50 which was put into the Foreign Missionary Fund.

When Sunday school was over, Bro. Rollins; announced that all who did not want to stay for church could pass out quietly. However no one left for which we were very thankful because we were traveling down the

road about 50 miles per hour all the time we were having services.

Short sermons were delivered by Rev. G. W. Sturdevant of Buffalo, Mo. and Rev. Mrs. Mary Welbaum of Kansas City and Rev. Miss Melba White of Plattsburg, Mo. All preached interesting sermons.

We slept that night in Fort Smith, Arkansas in a large lawn. We came home the next day, riding over the Boston Mountains, arriving in Neosho about one o'clock Monday afternoon.

We traveled a distance of 1477 miles, and had good fortune all the way, with no mishap. We ate part of our meals in restaurants, and sometimes we ate picnic style as we had an elected committee and bus fund to buy our eats. We also had a can of ice water along, so we had a cold drink anytime we wanted one. We all enjoyed talking to some little negro boys and girls we saw at places where we were stopped.

Our bus drivers, Mr. Bert Thompson and his son, James, were very efficient drivers. We enjoyed their courtesy very much.

We appreciate the work of Rev. Kenneth Turner in getting up and managing this trip. We also want to thank the people of Bryan for their courtesy. We all enjoyed the trip and Association very much, for we were working in the service of the Lord.

The above figures may look small to the world, but they look good to me, for they tell me that we can accomplish that for which our hearts are longing. Should there be an error discovered by anyone, I would highly appreciate your writing in to offer the needed correction.

Enthusiasm is increasing greatly for the past few weeks in our educational program, for which we wish to praise the Lord. Quite a number pledged at the National Association who were unable to say how much; among this number is Dr. Leonard Earl Harris of Chicago. He has pledged substantial support during the next twelve months, as did many others; so we are looking to hear from all of these, with many of their friends who will naturally be added to the list of donors.

Doubtless, there were several who pledged definite amounts at the National Association, whose names were not taken; and if you are in this group, will you please forward your name and address to me? I would like to get you on my record.

In addition to the above report of definite things which were done to assure us that our people want a National Institution of learning; delegates from several of the states called meetings and set goals for their states to reach in this field of endeavor. I am not sure of any of the plans save for the state of Texas. Our folk agreed to try to raise 25 cents per capita during the next twelve months. Half of this to be raised by January 1st, 1940, and the other half by the sitting of the next National Association in July, 1940.

I feel sure that any state is able to raise as much per capita as Texas is. Our people, for the most part, are laboring people, with limited means but we are challenging the states where our people are wealthier than we. "We are laborers together with God." "Together we stand, divided we fall." Let's stand together, and labor together.

We wish to assure all concerned that we will not relinquish our efforts for Home and Foreign Missions, Superannuation and Orphanage work, but we will do as we have heretofore: give to all of these.

The National Board of Education will be in session together the week following the first Sunday in August. We shall strive to open school work at the earliest possible moment, and if any of you have any suggestions to offer, we are open to receive and consider them. Write to me and be perfectly free to express yourself.

The recent annual session of the National Association was in our opinion one among the greatest if not indeed superior to all previous sessions. More than a dozen states represented with a grand delegation of approximately 300. To say that at least forty ministers were present would not be too liberal, we had rather put the number at fifty and be safe.

Nothing would afford us more pleasure at this time than to write a detailed article of the many wonderful things done at the association, but since others will no doubt do that, and since I am to give statistics, I will forego that pleasure. We trust the following figures will inspire and thoroughly encourage you as you see in "black and white" just how we as a denomination really stand. One thing must be remembered, however, as you read this table: this is not

altogether accurate. Many associations failed to respond to this office's request for statistics, but a great improvement is seen over last year's report.

The Free Will Baptist denomination claims 1,250 churches, (You will remember, now, that this is as the statistician received it; there are more to be sure.) Enrolled on the ledgers of these churches are 101,500 members. A total of 2,500 new members were received during the past year by baptism, letter, restoration, etc. 832 were lost during the year by death, dismission, etc. We can see here that we have an increase of 1,668. That's not at all bad, is it? Who says that preaching the true gospel as true Free Will Baptists do does not bring results?

Personally it is a pleasure for me to report that we have on roll 1,154 ordained ministers. In the hands of these anointed ones lie, in an extremely large measure, the future successes or failures of the various projects of our church. Right? Also inscribed on our ledgers are 50 licensed ministers—who some day will also fill in an official way the pulpits of our churches.

Perhaps a word of the financial status of our church will be appreciated. Our total church property is valued at \$1,234,700.00 We have denominational property valued at \$161, 835.00. This includes the Orphanage at Middlesex, N. C., \$81,500; the Orphanage at Greenville, Tennessee, The Free Will Baptist \$39,335; Press, Ayden, North Carolina, \$39,000.; Dothan School property, Dothan, Ala., \$5,500; Zion Bible School, Blakely, Ga., \$1,000; and the Free Will Baptist Gem at Monett, Mo., \$4,500. This brings the grand total of all property

to \$1,471,535.00.

For building and repairs \$20,473.02 was spent during the past year. (We're moving somewhere.) The past year was in many respects a banner one, relatively to the various contributions made for Christian Education, Missions, Orphanage, etc. The total raised and paid by our people, including pastor's salaries and evanelists expenses, was \$151,928.42. If it were possible to report all that was given during the year, we are sure the figure would exceed a quarter of a million dollars.

There is much more we could say, but perhaps these dry figures do not thrill you as they do me, yet, all true Free Will Baptists should welcome any intimation of advance or progress, and we are sure that you appreciate these numbers despite their inaccuracy. Thank you.
