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

## The Joint-Meeting of Missouri Boards

C. B. Dees, Secretary Executive Board, Desloge, Missouri

The Executive Board and the Publication Committee of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists met in a joint-session at the Gem Office in Monett at 2:30 p.m., May 13, 1941. Rev. James F. Miller, who is Moderator of the Missouri State Association and Chairman when these two Boards are in session together, was present to call the meeting to order by reading a Scripture lesson from Ephesians 3rd chapter and calling for prayer, which was led by Rev. Cecil Campbell.

Members of the Executive Board present were: B. F. Brown, Arlie Hoover, Cecil Campbell, and C. B. Dees.

Members of the Publication Committee present were: James F. Miller, Winford Davis, B. F. Brown, H. H. Filkins as proxy for John Peterson, and O. T. Allred as proxy for Frank Mikel.

John B. Rollins was elected as a member of the Publication Committee to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Rev. E. T. House.

The purpose of the meeting was outlined by John B. Rollins as envolving two major items of business—Incorporation of the State Association, and the increasing business of publication.

The matter of incorporating the State Association has been hanging fire since the state meeting last fall. The matter was throughly discussed by the brethren, after which, Attorney J. M. Sater was called in council with us and he gave valuable legal advice. After hearing Mr. Sater, the Committee agreed to have him start the proceedings again and incorporate according to Article IV. of the Constitution of the State Association which provides that the Board of Trustees shall be the corporate name and business agency of the State Association.

The discussion of Publication and the Editor's report revealed that the business of the Gem Office has increased, and is still increasing in such proportions that the equipment is in adequate to meet the demand.

After discussing these matters until it was getting late, a committee was appointed to present written proposals at 6:30 p.m. The committee was John B. Rollins, Winford Davis, and Cecil Campbell. The committee reported as follows:

Be it Resolved, That we give the Woman's Auxiliary four pages of the Gem for three months following the National Association, during which

time we will expect support from the Auxiliary to the amount of 500 additional subscribers to the Gem. Thereafter, if the prospect for their continued support is hopeful, we authorize that four pages be added to allow them space in excess of the present size of our Gem.

Furthurmore, we authorize our Editor to come to terms with the Auxiliary, within the limits of these precepts, with whatever other considerations may be wise in his sight.

Due to the increase in business in the Gem Office, and the inadequate equipment to care for the same, we recommend that steps be taken to raise funds to buy new and better equipment.

Be it Resolved, That the publication Committee submit to the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists the following plan for raising the much needed funds:

Fund be set at \$2,500.00 To be raised as follows:

By \$10.00 donations by interested parties to be paid by the time of the State Association.

By \$5.00 donations to be paid by the same time.

By \$1.00 donations to be paid by the same time.

All funds are to be used to purchase equipment as received by the State Secretary.

A number of the Board members stayed and enjoyed, with the Monett Church, a good sermon by James F. Miller.

# Better Equipment for the Gem Office

We rejoice to announce again, as we have announced all along through the past few years, that the Gem is growing! The business of the Gem Office has grown to such proportions that the present equipment is inadequate to care for the business and operate with a profit. We must have NEW and BETTER equipment.

The people of Missouri were encouraged, a few years ago, to contribute to a fund that was to be used to build a new publishing house and to buy the former Editor's interest in the equipment used to print the Gem. This was very graciously done, and the fund contributed amounted to about \$2,800.

During the two years we have operated in the new building, the people have heard the present Editor blast away at the gates of success by contending that we rally for more support and put the Gem Office on a paying basis.

Last fall, we asked our people for 500 new subscribers. Within two months, 400 new subscribers were secured, and now we are surging forward then backward, but all the while nearing the 500 mark. We offer heart-felt thanks to the people, praise to God, and honor to whom honor is due. This leaves our subscription list standing at 1700.

Prospects are brighter now than ever before. The circulation of the *Gem* is promising, and we are facing the greatest season of production we ever saw. Our last season forced us to operate two shifts (16 hours) a day, and with all the assistance I could employ, our equipment just isn't labor-

saving enough to allow any profits.

We cannot continue to advance with our present equipment. We must have something else.

If the Gem Office was self-supporting enough, we would buy the needed equipment and say nothing about it. We cannot quite do that, but as an incenative to Missouri people and all others who may wish to contribute, the Gem Office is able to contribute \$240.00 a year toward buying new and better equipment. This is evidence that the Gem is climbing toward a self supporting position. We need just a little more help and co-operation toward reaching that goal. Will you help us?

We may be beggars, but we are a little choicy. If there should be any who would give grudgingly after high-pressure is used, we have just this to say: We don't want your old money, stick it in your pocket and go somewhere else with it. We are going to do this with gifts from those who give cheerfully, as unto the Lord, who keep sweet about it and are able to receive the blessings of God for it.

One day, Jim Miller took up a collection, in Missouri, that amounted to \$1,500.00 then he called for a song, and, my, how God did bless hearts and how the people did shout His praises. They gave CHEERFULLY, and that is the kind God accepts, and we don't want anything He won't accept.

# "State" Controls "Church" by Incorporations

## **Special Editorial Article**

A CORPORATION is a society authorized by the law of the State to act as one individual. To incorporate, therefore, simply means "to form into a body," and that formation authorized and recognized by the laws of the land

A Christian Church is an organized body of believers in Christ, and that body is One Body, the body of Christ, so authorized by heaven and is recognized and governed by the law of the Lord which is perfect, converting the soul.

It seems increditable that a body with such divine origin and heavenly authority, as the Church, would stoop to the lower realms of the State to receive a "pat on the shoulder," and be formed into another body which is not the Body of Christ.

It is a fact that we are IN the world, though we do not have to be OF the world, but while we are in the world and acquire property which is real estate and belongs to the world and will perish with the world, then the Church seeks protection of the State for its worldly goods. When this becomes necessary, there are varied and conflicting terms offered, and the wise may choose wisely and avoid many pitfalls. Christian institutions - colleges, publishing houses, hospitals, orphanages, mission stations, libraries, etc. - must have sufficient worldly property in which to operate. It is considered advisable, in this case, for the Church to seek property protection by the State while it serves the spiritual welfare of the public.

The most lamentable day in the history of that part of the Church of God, known as Free Will Baptists, was in the year 1892 when The General Conference incorporated. The General Conference was the national organization of Free Will Baptists, and the incorporation enveloped the WHOLE denomination. THAT was the secret to our downfall in 1910.

There are two major policies in the science of incorporating; two schools of thought regarding corporations:

Baptist polity is to incorporate institutions, as such, and their controling boards, but not the denomination as a whole.

Methodist polity is to incorporate the denomination, as such.

There are advantages and disadvantages in both policies. The in-

corporated denomination has tremendous borrowing power that the denomination with incorporated institutions does not have. Denominations with incorporated institutions avoid a terrible pitfall to which the incorporated denomination is exposed and endangered.

The most fundamental law of a corporation is that the majority rules. It is right to be democratic, but to have a democracy with the legislative and executive branches only is to have an unbalanced government—the fudical branch is needed. It is right for a locomotive to have drivers on the wheels, but they cannot drive smoothly without the counterbalances on the wheels also.

By certain politicing, an incorporated denomination can vote a condition into existance, and with one stroke of a pen the thing be forever settled. In Ocean Park, Maine, in 1910, the General Conference of Free Will Baptists (an incorporated denomination) voted to give ourselves away to the Northern Baptists. Majority vote carried. The Nebraska Yearly Meeting of Free Will Baptists were 100% in opposition to the merger, but she was a minor part of an incorporated denomination and she was subject, by law, to the majority. This explains why Nebraska could not save her property even after engaging in three major court battles. Nebraska didn't want to, but she suffered a 100% loss, and now, withdrawn from that scene these thirty years, there is not a dime's worth of Free Will Baptist property in Nebraska. It is a fact, that with one stroke of a pen, every institution and many churches were struck off the Free Will Baptist map.

The same is true of the Missouri

Conference of Methodist Protestants. The Missouri Conference did not want to merge with the big Methodists in the recent merger, but she was a minor part of an incorporated denomination which said, "Merge," therefore, the Missouri Conference is forced to lose her identity and every dime's worth of property she holds.

For what purpose is this incorporation idea, anyhow? Of late years, our resurrected denomination is becoming corporation-minded, and to what purpose? We ought to know, by this time, that fire burns. With respect to our Methodist brethren, and in the face of history, I declare that a denomination has no business to incorporate.

The Missouri State Association voted, last fall, to incorporate. The idea was to secure protection for our one institutional property—The Gem Publishing House. The recent board meeting in Monett changed the course—a judical duty in our Free Will Baptist DEMOCRACY: praise God for democracy;

It is wise to incorporate institutional boards only when institutional property is involved. Then should the Missouri State Association vote overwhelmingly to join the Methodists, only those churches who wished would join and those who did not wish would not be forced to join. Furthermore, five churches (an insignificant minority) could say, "No, we will remain the Missouri State Association" and they could retain and control our one institutional property — The Free Will Baptist Gem.

For fear that some of my brethren may misunderstand my purpose, I wish to set forth my real ambition. The history of Free Will Baptists is, more or less, lying dormant in the hearts and lives of the new and present generation of Free Will Baptists. A generation of younger men and women has risen and are carrying on nobly.

I do not resurrect the history of our past glorious achievements, and the memory of our terrible downsittings, without a purpose. These are examples!

We can steer clear of the pitfalls that ensnared our fathers and attain unto the same high and glorious position in spiritual administration — and even surpass it. I am progressive! We are moving forward with a most wonderful leadership of consecrated, devoted, righteous men and women and the Holy Spirit in their lives and ours.

### Our Denominational Papers Luxuries or Necessities

AS I am so vitally interested in the promotion of our Woman's work along the various avenues through which we have access for service, I have given some serious thought relative to our Church papers.

I am convinced that without these, our denominational life would not be at all in as prosperous condition as it is today. The fact that there are yet many hundreds of families without either the Free Will Baptist paper, or the Gem, or other religious literature, for that matter, is a thing that should concern all active, progressive Free Will Baptists everywhere, especially is this true in regards to our Woman's work. There may be some who will say that these papers are luxuries, that they cannot afford to have them in their homes—the thing I am concerned about is, how they can afford NOT to have them. The most of us subscribe to, and read our news papers, that cost far more than the small amount asked for our denominational papers.

To my mind, we cannot hope to educate our people properly, relative to the denominational program of our church, without the constant use of our Church papers. I am sure this is not an exaggeration regarding our

Auxiliary activities. One of the great hindrances to our Cause has been the need of a greater number of our women becoming so interested in the work, that they will realize the importance of good reading matter, that they may learn more of our church life, of God's will concerning us and of doing everything possible to improve themselves to that extent that may become better workers in the Lord's vineyard. Our duty, as I see it, is that each woman who is a member of any branch of our Auxiliary work, subscribe to our church papers and study the program of our church, and so familiarize herself with its plans and its aims, that she may be called an "approved worker".

As June is to be our National Educational month, at which time this important phase of our program is to be stressed, it becomes very necessary for our women to thoroughly acquaint themselves with all the facts concerning it, and I know of no better way than through the pages of our Church papers. Our papers are therefore a real NECESSITY in each home, where each member can learn more about the on-going of the kingdom work of our Lord through the plans and efforts being put forth by our people everywhere. My earnest desire is that we put forth a greater effort than ever before, to convince our women of the great need of their becoming better equipped to fill the places assigned them in a careful and prayerful study of each phase of our work, by reading our papers. We want our Educational Drive to be a success - if we KNOW what is required of us, we will be in position to render good service.

We need trained leaders, as never before --we realize this more and more, the farther we go in the program of our church life. Topic: "Teaching Children Obedience to God"

HYMNS:

Take Time to Be Holy: Faith of Our Fathers. PRAYER:

Eternal Father, I must confess my sin and that of other Christians for our indifference toward that old standard of discipline which did much to give our country its rugged, stalwart honesty of purpose. Forgive us, I pray thee. Cause thy people to turn resolutely back to the Bible, to make their homes centers of worship and training centers of righteousness. Arouse them to action against the sapient belief that an immature mind can be granted utter freedom of action without disastrous results. Help me and all who take part in this program to "abstain from all appearances of evil" and "to come out from among them" of such opinions and to "be a separate people" if necessary to resurrect this former standard of discipline for ourselves and our children. Make this program a means of bringing us to repentance and rededication. For thy name's sake, we ask it. Amen. PROGRAM CHARIMAN:

This lesson today is a vital message to parents, teachers, and all Christian workers. Hear it. Heed it. We have asked three people to read our Scripture lesson to us. SCRIPTURE LESSON:

Deut. 6:4-9; Psalm 78:1-7; Prov. 22:6. (Assign the Scripture reading to three persons.)

SENTENCE PRAYERS:

TOPIC DISCUSSION:

Program Chairman—Thomas Dunlap says there were three elements in his father's Christianity by which his religion was most impressively stamped in his memory. They were: the blessing he asked at meals, his family worship, and his church-going.

Today we want to call your attention to three things in our text, Prov. 22:6.

TOPIC 1.

The Reason for Training—
"Train Up a Child."

Students of home life tell us that the modern home is lax in discipline. Paul wrote to the Ephesians: "Children, obey your parents in the Lord: for this is right." Yet many parents regard this admonition as old-fashioned. But a child is helpless. It is needy. It is wholly dependent on

others for everything in life. Train the child because it is the heir of the past, the happiness of the present, and the hope of the future. Your child is your opportunity and responsibility from the Lord.

This same may be said of spiritual children. Even though they may be fifty years old when they are born into the Kingdom, they need training for service in His Kingdom just as surely as the child of physical birth needs training. How foolish to think just because one is born into the Kingdom, that one is fully prepared to serve in any capacity in the churchpulpit or pew. God calls us to service but He expects us to prepare for that service, What are we doing to help these spiritual children of our church who are called to serve as ministers, missionaries, or to other places of leadership in their church, who need to be trained up in the way they should go?

June is the month when Auxiliaries and churches throughout our National Association are asked to re-emphasize training and Christian education. Our National Board of Education is anxious to establish, in September 1941, a place where Christian workers can be trained to live and teach God's Word more effectively in a world that sadly needs Christ and Christian lives.

By my failure to co-operate with my Church in its training program, am I not refusing to accept my opportunity and responsibility from the Lord, and just as surely failing my God and His children called into service?

TOPIC II.

The Rule for Training — "In the way he should go."

The training of a child should be upward. The child has the right to have access to noble ideals, pure purposes, ambitious aims, and only the best surroundings. The little life should be guided always in the path of right living in the sight of men and God. The child should be led to salvation of the soul, service of the life, and safety for eternity. Is not such admonition just as applicable to the spiritual children of our church?

Thou "shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way" Deut. 6:7. Talk of the love of God, the goodness of God, the mercy of God, the majesty of God, man's dependence upon God, man's duty to God, God's Son, Jesus Christ. The right kind of conversation at the

table, in the family circle, and privately with different members of the family will reveal the attitude of parents toward religion, the church, etc., and will help to develop similar attitudes on the part of children. Put Bibles in our children's hands and give them even moderate encouragement and they will attend the sabbath school and, under proper guidance, study the only text-book which points the way to life.

If we really care about the spiritual growth of our children—those in our churches as well as in our homes—we will enter whole-heartedly and prayerfully into the training school plan which our educational leaders are striving so hard to launch next September. Have you, has your church sent in its contribution toward the \$15,000 our National Association asked us all to raise before July 1941?

The Results of Training—"When he is old, he will not depart from it."

The course of life is fixed in early days. The goal to be gained is given in youth. Abiding habits of life are fixed while children are young. If the right course is fixed, the ideal goal is given, and the righteous habits are formed in childhood, the same will be pursued in long years to come. Is there any reward greater than that which comes to Christian parents who have nurtured their children in the fear of the Lord?

Parents can render no greater service to the world than to rear children, by instruction and by example, who will grow to be useful citizens and devoted, church-going Christians.

The Church can render no greater service to the world than to rear her children, by instruction and by example, so that they will grow to be useful, devoted Christ-like ministers, missionaries, teachers, treasurers, secretaries, etc. How can they be useful in a marvelously educated world unless they are thoroughly qualified in mind and heart and are adequately prepared to serve this age? How can they teach unless they are given knowledge to import? How can they be devoted loyal church workers unless they know the history, creed, etc. of the church to which they owe loyal devotions?

You and your Church's financial response to these qustions will answer them for ourselves and our youth now and for years to come.

### Going Deeper

Going deeper in training our Christian workers until it becomes crystallized in action, was an utterance made at a recent meeting of Free Will Baptists. There is much in it. Our lives are not usually influenced greatly by mere superficial contact. It is only when we live with them day by day that deep impressions are made.

The boy that becomes "air minded" studies aviation in every leaflet, illustration and book he can find. He dreams aviation by day and by night. He lives in the atmosphere of the aeroplane.

So with every other favorite objective in life. We are transformed only as we sink into the depth. A casual reading of "Study to show thyself an approved workman" will not make any great impression until we really study.

With the coming of summer our hearts turn toward study classes, summer assemblies, institutes, training camp, etc. Every Woman's Auxiliary should sponsor a Christian training camp where missions and stewardship classes are held, inspirational talks given by our leaders and missionaries, and, above all, an underlying desire on the part of every teacher and leader to enlist everyone present in active Christian service. Then as our people go from such places of Christian training, they would go with a determination to begin a new auxiliary organization; to raise the standard of each organization; to pray day by day for our missionaries; to dedicate their lives to the carrying and sending of the Gospel message everywhere, to support every phase of our national program unselfishly.

May we plan for and conduct training classes during this summer!

### Responsibility for Others

Are Christians responsible for themselves only? Will a real Christian be satisfied to say, "I am saved. Let the rest of the world go by"? Will he say as Cain said concerning his brother, Abel, "Am I my brother's keeper, or, I cannot take everyone's burdens upon my shoulder. It is all I can do to look after my own affairs"? Again I say, "Will a Christian take such an attitude toward others?" My answer is "No". When one becomes really saved he is interested in the salvation

of others. It is this desire to win souls to Christ that causes a Christian to seek for more effective methods of personal soul-winning.

It does not take education to make anyone a Christian. We must admit that some of our most devout soldiers of the cross are those silver-haired mothers and fathers who have taught us the true principles of Christianity upon which we are ever building for the Kingdom of God. Many of these have very little, if any, academical training, but I dare say that in their earlier days of activity, they coped with the demands of that day. Those who can look back over the accomplishments of their past life with pride. are those who have had progressive ideas and a desire to see the work of the Master go forward. We, of today, owe it to them as well as to our Father in Heaven to labor ardently and to press forward, "toward the mark of the high calling of God which is in Christ Jesus."

Are we as Free Will Baptists pressing forward today as we should? If Twe had a revolving arrow circling the entire circumference of all the activities of our church and it was to stop on our most vital need (the paramount reason for our denomination not pressing forward as it should) at just which phase of our work would the arrow point, if we are not moving as we should. Dear Free Will Baptists, stop for a moment and watch this arrow revolve in your imagination. Study carefully the needs of our church. Our needs are many; but there is one paramount need that, if supplied, will play a wonderful part in supplying all the subordinate needs, and that need is Christian education. Where is your arrow stopping?

When you have reached your conclusion ask yourselves this question, "Am I interested enough in the salvation of others to pledge my support to my church and to my God that the great program that is now being introduced in our denomination shall be the ultimate means of winning thousands of souls to Christ?"

# A More Consecrated and a Better Educated Denomination

This is the title of the educational program found in the Auxiliary Year Book for June, 1941. We trust each Auxiliary will see that this program is put across in your Auxiliary. Then

too, there is a playlet which is suggested for a special program in the interest of our proposed school. See that this playlet is put on in your church and every member urged to make an offering to Christian education. There are several thousand of us, and if every woman who is a member of our Woman's Auxiliary would give \$1.00 and solicit one dollar from every person whose name appears on her church roll, you can see what our women could do toward the establishment of our school in September, 1941. Because you want to equip some one, or maybe yourself, to teach and live God's Word more effectively and efficiently, you will want to contribute at least one dollar to Christian education and use your influence to get every member in your church to do likewise. The second vice-president in your Auxiliary is chairman of such fund. Raiso this money so that we can have a school in September where inspiring leadership, sound, consecrated training for Christian living and service in a world that sadly needs Christ and Christian lives, is offered to ministerial students, and all others desirous of being a Christian in all areas of life.

Ministers, we beg your co-operation in this great campaign. "I beseech you that ye walk worthy of the vocation wherewith ye are called."


NASMUCH as June has been designated as National Educational Month during the past two years, and inasmuch as certain business propositions are to be presented to the 1941 session of the National Association, which, if approved, will necessitate the use of quite a bit of cash, be it therefor resolved:

That June of 1941 be observed by Free Will Baptists of the United States of America as National Educational Month.

Be it further resolved that all of our denominational papers publish such matter during said month as to acquaint our people with the right-eousness and urgency of this cause, and that every pastor and all church leaders be asked to present this cause intelligently, earnestly and in an unbiased way to our various congregations over the nation; such leaders themselves having become worthy examples in giving.

Does not the above strike you as having the proper complexion of typical Free Will Baptist strategy? Thank God it is not true of us as a whole, but it is true with too large a percentage. We have used much paper and ink in drawing our resolutions, and passing our motions in assemblies, but the needed working order has been seriously lacking on the field, except in comparatively few cases. Some have gone forth with determination to effect the cure, while others have driven home with a view of forgetting the whole proposition until the time for the next assembly; and. sadder still, some have burned energy in an endeavor to sow seeds of discord and dissension. Others have stood to say, "My pledge in dollars is so much," only to go home and repudiate as a whole, or at least in part.

But despite all of this we have made wonderful progress during the past two years, but, brethern, we must progress unitedly, as a whole, if we are to be found busily engaged in executing Christ's will at His coming again. Would we be willing for Him to come and find us squabbling over suspicion toward each other? Such as are, usually fruits of misapprehensions. "Let us lay aside every weight, and the sin that doth so easily beset us" from now until we meet in Drumright, and, thereby be able to rejoice together because of the fruits of a really united people.

It having been sometime since I reported, I feel that I should let you know of the progress of our educational plan here. Suppose we just quiet ourselves, hear, and obey His voice.

I am asking every one who reads this to make our educational cause a matter of definite daily prayer from now until the National Association convenes. All who will do this please drop me a postal card, and just state the fact that you are going to daily pray for this cause. I shall keep a list of all names sent in.

# Santa Samana-Holy Week, in Cuba

In these Latin countries, much is made over Easter week, called in Spanish Santa Semana, "Holy Week". We, of the Evangelicals, also take advantage of our opportunity to preach special messages on the trial, crucifixion and victorious resurrection of our Lord. So all over the field of the Cuban Evangelization Association, missionaries and native pastors went forth with the message of a risen Lord.

Tommy and I packed our little kit and caught the train at Hershey. After a brief ride, we arrived at Caldiron, where one of the native pastors was waiting with two horses. After plodding over the hills for about an hour, we arrived at Brother Pablo Sanchas' house where a number of Christians received us joyfully. Pablo and his family are devout Christians, having prayer and the reading of the Word twice each day; all things stop for the prayer hour. These native Christians are not like many of our own folk at home, time does not mean so much to them, possibly because their means of transportation is a team of oxen and a great high wheeled cart, or on horseback.

We spent the first afternoon talking over the Gospel. When night came on and the carbide lights were gotten out, the people began to arrive on horseback, very often a man in the saddle and his wife or sweetheart holding on the back. In a very short time seventy-five people had gathered, many of them had come miles across the hills either afoot or mounted. What a joy it was to preach to this hungry hearted people and how easy to preach when often some one would call out Gloria a Dios, "Glory to God!" Fifteen hands were raised for prayer and consecration.

The next night, mounted again, we rode across the hills visiting the homes of the Christians, and as we came in one of the children at the house would call across the hills, "T-O-M-A-S W E-E-E-L-E-E E". That meant the visiting preacher was there, so drop everything and come running for prayer. What a joy to pray with these humble Cuban-cane-farmers. That night there was a beautiful full moon bathing those spacious hills with its soft light. As we came into the church yard it was full of men and horses standing about, and as we went in to start the service, they packed in until the house was full: then hung in the windows and about the doors. Someone counted seventy-two people. Again with great liberty, the dear Lord





used the message. The Christians would voice their praise as we lifted high a victorious Saviour. It was like an old time camp meeting sure enough.

After the service I counted forty people, men and women, on horseback riding homeward over those beautiful moon bathed hills. I rode with a party of fifteen men and women, cantering over the hills and trails, calling back and forth, with here and there a snatch of a hymn. One could not soon forget those earnest Christians going home to their buts in the cane fields rejoicing in the knowledge of a mighty Saviour. Their homes are indeed the most humble "bajarecues" houses made from the bark of the reyal palm tree, a roof of the palm leaf, the floor of mud, and with none of the comforts for the average American home. The next day we had our long trip riding all the afternoon on down to as far as the coast, and while in a prayer meeting, Brother Hugh Pain came riding in with a sad message to me saying that my mother was seriously ill. Hugh had ridden most of the afternoon to reach us. The cable had come from my sister in Miami, Florida. Mother had been given up by the doctors. One doctor did not have any hope of her living an hour. But the matter was put in the hands of a Doctor who never fooses a case, Jesus. Our friends in Miami went to prayer and though she had gone into a state of coma, in answer to believing prayer, God raised her up. Taking a plane out of Havana, within two hours I was in Miami, and within another half hour at the bedside of my dear mother. She continued to revive so that when I left she was her same happy self. How grateful I was to once more see my precious mother whose consecrated life was the means of convincing me of the reality of a Christian experience.

Feeling the need here in Cuba, I hurried back to Havana, by boat, and again on to Jaruco and our responsibilities in the school and the campo, country. We are praising God for

the contacts He is leading us to and the joy of ministering His Word.

Last night, Saturday, I went on horseback to fill an appointment in the country and stopped to talk the Gospel to the workers in the field plowing with teams of oxen. Every one I met, when questioned if they knew of the Gospel said, "No Senor". This book that has been in the world so many centuries has been a closed book to them. What a joy while riding back homeward in the pitch darkness of the night, dead tired from hours in the saddle, I could honestly say, "Dear Lord, thank you for the opportunity of at least testifying, humbly, and often stumbling in the language, to a people with hungry hearts."

During this week Mrs. Willey and Barbara stayed in Jaruco and witnessed the observance of Easter in a new way. It is the religious week of the year-a time in which meat is not to be eaten, unless the priest is paid forty cents indulgence. God is supposed to be dead from Wednesday until Saturday at ten o'clock. Friday is strictly a holy day. Mrs. Willey said she wished that every day was Holy Friday, not a radio was played, not a person sang, the stores were closed, all business stopped, the children did not play on the streets, all voices were even lowered, which is almost a miracle here. Tommy was hammering something in the back yard, the little neighbor boy hastened over and warned him to stop as it was Holy Friday. A feeling of keen sadness prevailes. At six o'clock was the funeral for Jesus. The whole town turned out in their very best. After leaving the church the possession went down the two main streets of the town carrying the image of Jesus in a coffin: the Marys preceded the casket, all were dressed in white. One's reputation is almost at stake if they do not take part in the procession, hence there were very few to stand on the side lines. This is carried on in all the towns and cities of any size in Cuba. Some years ago a little boy was sitting on the curb crying and when asked why he cried (on this day) he replied, "God is dead". To them God is literally dead this day.

But everything changes on Saturday. The deathly stillness prevailes till ten o'clock, then God comes alive, the church bells begin to clang, pistols are shot, firecrackers explode, and everywhere radios blare forth again and the children rush back to play—God is come alive.

But it is believed that its great magnitude admits, nevertheless, of such condensation as to justify its presentation in a Christian Worker's Institute.

# Music Department

# The Choister and his Music

NEVER in the history of the church has there been such a divided opinion as to the part music may fill in the church. There are many people who contend that music of any kind should not be allowed in the program of the church, while others believe it to be one of the most important factors in the devotional service of the church.

Well does the writer realize that this article will register many criticisms among our people, but we shall endeavor to discuss our subject in the hope that it will serve to help as realize the importance of correcting or improving this phase of our worship, as the case may be.

Music is a field of science of its own, and those who would be placed in the important position as director of music in their respective churches should be carefully selected. A man may not be successfully chosen for the position simply because he is fully qualified in rudiments, or because he may have a clear or prominent voice. This procedure, without other necessary qualifications, most likely will miltimately fail to reach the desired objective of the church.

Let us now consider the necessary qualifications of the Choister:

First, he must have a personal knowledge of Christ. Only those who are in personal touch with God are able to discern the proper course in this important phase of the church worship. By having such an experience, he is able to choose such music that will enhance the sweetness of worship of the church.

Second, he is able to reject such music that may be confusing to the very Spirit of God.

Third, he must be able to properly interpret the hymn by the same spirit which the composer breathed into it, therefore, renewing the inspiration of the composer and all sharing alike the loveliness of the devotion.

There, perhaps, are several reasons why the situation of poorly conducted song services are prevalent in so many of our churches today, and for the lack of space we shall mention only a few. Music (and to be sure we refer to the vocal music of the church), can only be classified as secondary in

the general worship program of the church. But can we think of such an important phase of worship as may be clasified as secondary, and give it over into hands of unqualified people? Unqualified? Yes, because he is filling a post whereby he is not being financially compensated. Therefore few choose to make the rather expensive and drawn out sacrifice.

Let us now consider the type of music the church should use in its worship program. There is much confusión among church people as to the type of music that should be used in the worship and devotional program of the church, and often the church becomes divided over the question which sometimes results in the complete disorganization of the church. These disasters can be avoided and will, if the chorister is capable of his position.

Music is devided into three groups: SACRED, SECULAR and DANCE. Two of these may be appreciated by the Christian, and still two of the same group may appeal to the non-Christian. The human being was created with three properties, namely, body, soul, and spirit. It is obvious that many song writers have forgotten the fact or else never knew that sacred music for church worship should never be associated with either of the other groups. "God is a Spirit, and they that worship him must worship him in spirit and in truth" John 4:24. The sweetness and beauty of the melody of a good hymn calms the soul while the lyric is being breathed as a prayer by the spirit of man. This is not true of many modern songs of the present times. There seems to be a sort of compromise in the mind of the composer as well as many church singers, and a great number of songs have been published as novelties and have found their way into the church worship programs. This is a condition that can well be classed as serious. The Christian religion is not a novelity and all that makes up the program of worship should be wholly sacred.

Music is sometimes used in churches by choirs and congregations that can only be classed as secular and is used as a substitute for sacred. This type cannot be classed as worldly or

sinful but it only satisfies one of the properties of the human being, that is the soul, and is often noticed to stir the emotion of the people. Many people think they are enjoying their religion when this effect takes place. The song may not even have Christ's name associated with it. Mother, or the old home, or some other precious memory may be called to mind. This however, may be their religion. Some do, perhaps, worship the things of this world out of the past, but we are speaking of the Christian's worship. Should it be mother, father, home, or

Then there is the third in the group which is dance music. If I were to ask the average church member if he thought dance music or swing music should be used in the church worship. I am sure the answer in every case would be "no". But this thing is being practiced in many of our rural churches and some of our better trained city churches. We are allowing ourselves in some cases to compromise with satan and we use sacred or secular poems with dance or swing music and try to satisfy all three of the creative properties at the same time. Let us remember that there are three types of music, SACRED, SECULAR, and DANCE or SWING, and there are three properties of man, SPIRIT, SOUL, and BODY. "If we sow to the flesh, we shall of the flesh reap corruption, but if we sow to the Spirit we shall of the Spirit reap life ever lasting."

# Here Am I, Send Me

What a thrilling experience was alloted to Isaiah! He was included in the few to whom was granted the most glorious privilege of seeing the inside of heaven from this side of eternity. I say he was one of the few. In order to confirm this statement, may we site a few of the other most wonderful phenomena.

Stephen, the first one to die a death of martyrdom after that Jesus was crucified, risen, and ascended into heaven, saw this marvelous reality of heaven: "But he, being full of the Holy Ghost, looked up stedfastly into heaven, and saw the glory of God, and Jesus standing on the right hand of God. And said, Behold, I see the heavens opened, and the Son of man standing on the right hand of God" Acts 7:55, 56.

Undoubtedly it was Paul (who was kept from recording his own identity) who enjoyed an actual parenthetic translation in a most mysterious way: "I knew a man in Christ above fourteen, years ago, (whether in the body, I cannot tell; or whether out of the body, 1 cannot tell: God knoweth;) such an one caught up to the third heaven. And I knew such a man. (whether in the body, or out of the body, I cannot tell: God knoweth;) how that he was caught up into paradise, and heard unspeakable words, which it is not lawful for a man to utter" 2 Cor. 12:2-4.

And then John saw and heard so Finally, after the revelation of the close of time, John wrote, "And I saw a new heaven and a new earth: for the first heaven and the first earth were passed away; and there was no more sea. And I John saw the holy city, new Jerusalem, coming down from God out of heaven, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband" Rev. 21:1, 2. Who is that Husband? That Husband is JESUS. It was the story of the coming Messiah as well as of the coming Lord of lords and King of kings that Isaiah wanted to proclaim when he saw and heard the splendor of heaven, "And I heard the voice of the Lord, saying, Whom shall .... I send, and who will go for us? .. Then said I, Here am I; send me" Isa. 6:8.

But I must look at the preceding words also. When this prophet of the

Gospel of the Old Testament beheld the majesty of God, he said, "Woe is me! for I am undone; because I am a man of unclean lips, ......" If Isaiah needed to say this, how much more must I feel blameworthiness. My continual prayer has been for some long time to be found worthy to pray, "Here am I send me." I readily say that I have contemplated on certain things in reference to laboring for the Lord that has not emerged. Not always does God speak to us affirmatively to grant unto us satisfactory evidence concerning His will. # God's Time Piece

The Israelite Nation

"But thou, Israel, art my servant, Jacob whom I have chosen, the seed of Abraham my friend" Isaiah 41:8.

At all times, through the different ages, all people everywhere have had some means of determining the time of day. Some have depended upon the sun, some upon the moon and stars, some have used an instrument known as the sun dial, while others have used the hour glass. But now-a-days everybody is acquainted

with the watch and clock. And in this line of thought we want to include the fact that God has a means of reckoning time, which is known sometimes as the Fig Tree, or God's chosen people, the Israelite nation, who is referred to as His servant. No where in the Scripture do we find the title "God's Clock" but the term has been used by some Bible students, when referring to the Israelite nation, because in this nation of people there is a perfect application of a time-

keeping instrument. Just as a watch serves us, so were the Israelites to be God's servant.

Time has been reckoned by this people ever since Abram was called out to head the nation, 2,000 years B. C., recorded in Genesis 12th chapter. We say this date marks the time the wlock starts ticking and counts time for God. This is not an eight-day wlock but rather a three-day clock when we look at it from a Scriptural viewpoint, based on 2 Peter 3:8, where Be says, "...., one day is with the Lord as a thousand years, and a thousand year as one day." continued only to keep time for approximately two days (2,000 years) or until the crucifixion of Christ; when the nation was scattered.

There is much pleasure and advantage in owning a good watch, and we all take great pride in looking at the instrument and listening to its clear clean ring as it ticks away. A dependable watch is valuable and affords much company to its owner. So did God find much pride in His people while they were walking according to His command and as iong as he could put dependance in them.

As it is true that a clock is made up of a number of different parts, likewise is the nation of God's people made up of a number of tribes; twelve in all; carrying the names of the twelve sons of Jacob, Genesis 49:

It is a significant fact that a clock has two hands, corresponding to the two divisions of the Israelite nation known as the kingdom of Israel and the kingdom of Juda.

This particular clock was set in amotion 2,000 years B. C. when Abram was called out, as we have previously said. Up to that time the earth had Deen standing 2,000 years. But little is recorded of the happening that took place during all that period. A brief sketch of the geneology from Adam to Abram, with the story of Eden and an account of the flood, is about call. In fact, it is all sumed up in eleven chapters, and it covers 2,000 years. But notice the remaining bulk of the Bible is made up of the records and happenings that took place and were to take place during the 3,000 years that were alloted to the house of Israel. Things are recorded more In detail about this people of God. In fact, we see the clock ticking the hours and the minutes more distinct. Even the seconds, as it might be said, are brought out in vivid happenings.

As the clock started, we fancy its hands directly together, in an upright position; as it must be said of Abram who was living the up-right life for God. And in Abram the kingdom had not been divided. But the clock ran wonly for a short while when two king-

doms appeared, headed by Reholoam and Jeroboam, recorded in the 12th chapter of 1 Kings. Then the two hands stood out seperately and distinctly, and seldom did they ever live together in peace and harmony.

When our watch fails and no dependance is to be found in it, we loose our patience and soon lay it on the shelf and there it lays for the time. So God found by the time His clock had continued for the 2,000 years (or two days), He had lost patience with them. They had failed to abide in His commandments, they forgot the teachings of the law. "Who gave Jacob for a spoil, and Israel to the robbers? did not the Lord, he against whom we have sinned? for they would not walk in his ways, neither were they obedient unto his law" Isa. 12:24. They failed to accept Christ as their messiah, and led Him away to his erucifixion. At this point the clock stopped and has been laid

aside for the past 2,000 years. The Israelite people have been driven from their land into all countries. They have no flag of their own. They have thus, been laying on the shelf these many years. But, thank the Lord, He will reach out and gather up all parts of the clock and place them together as a jeweler does the valuable parts of a discorded watch. The gathering together of the tribes are referred to in the seventh chapter of Revelation.

When this is accomplished, as we see it shapening up even now, the pendelum will start swinging onco more. Just imagine how it would be, after a room had been silent for so long, to have the stillness broken by the sudden sound of a clear tlcking, perfect runing clock. Here, God will be glorified and once more be proud of His servants as they count time for Him throughout this last day, known as the kingdom age.

# Working in the Vineyard

# **CHOOSING**

Hebrews 11:24-27, "By faith Moses, when he was come to years, refused to be called the son of Pharoah's daughter:

Choosing rather to suffer affliction with the people of God, than to enjoy the pleasures of sin for a season;

Esteeming the reproach of Christ greater riches than the treasures in Egypt: For he had respect unto the recompense of reward.

By faith he forsook Egypt, not fearing the wrath of the king: for he endured, as seeing Him who is invisible."

Our Lord did not make man as a machine with no capacity of feeling, or as an animal with no soul with which to commune with his Creator. God gave to him intellectual. physical and spiritual power; gave him a mind and a will independent of God's will, with which he can make his own choice. In the inspired Word we read; "I have set before you good and evil." There is a broad way and a narrow way: there is a heaven to gain and a hell to shun in eternity. But man must choose for himself which road he will take; which place in eternity he will make his destina-

Some Characters in the Bible are outstanding because of the choice they made. Abraham stood one day at the cross roads of decision. Either he would stay in Ur of the Chaldees or he would obey God and go on a long journey to a land unknown to him. He made his decision, and I turn the pages and view him years later, as he stands on the wind-swept slopes of Mt. Hebron, and he hears the familiar voice of God speaking to him.

"Lift up now thine eyes.....and look.....for all the land that thou seest, to thee will I give it, and to thy seed forever,.....and in thee shall all the nations of the world be blest."

In God's great account book in Heaven I think there is written along side Abraham's name, "He believed God, made his choice, and it is counted to him for righteousness."

Ruth chose Naomi's fellowship, Naimi's people, Naomi's land, and above all clse Naomi's God; and so pleased was our Lord by Ruth's choice that one of the books of the Bible bears her name; the most beautiful love story of all history is recorded in Holy Writ, and in the geneology of Jesus Christ, Ruth's name is listed in the line through which the Savior was given to the world.

Saul of Tarsus, a Pharisee; a Hebrew of the Hebrews educated in all the law of Israel, having sat at the feet of Gamalial; he had attained a high place of authority in the Sanhedrin. He had become such a menace to the Christian religion that every follower of Christ feared him.

One day as he journeyed toward Damascus, the Oriental sun was shining in all its noon-day strength. But a light brighter than the noon-day shone around him and pierced into his already spirit-convicted heart. The hour of choice had come. "Which road will you take, Saul of Tarsus? One means earthly power, wealth, favor with both Roman and Jew; the plaudits of the people.....the other; the way of the Cross, poverty, suffering, imprisonment, stripes, stones, heartaches," but Paul's earth blinded, but spiritually opened, eyes had seen a great vision. He says, "For we know that if the earthly house of this tabernacle were dissolved we have a building of God; an house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens."

After years of walking in the way he had chosen, this is his testimony, "I take pleasure in infirmities, in reproaches, in necessities, in persecutions, in distress for Christ's sake." And like a bugle note of victory, ringing out a challenge to every indolent, sleepy, indifferent, half-hearted church member comes Paul's last message before his head rolled from the martyr's block, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith: and henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness." Paul seems to have not regretted his choice made that day on the Damascus road.

Moses chose rather to identify himself with a people in slavery than to sit upon the throne of the Pharoah's. The honor of being called the son of Pharoah's daughter was offered him. He refused it, why? Because "he had respect unto the recompense of reward." He could have said in the words of the song writer "Mine eyes have caught the vision of the glory of the Lord."

He forsook Egypt—a type of sin. Brother, I have watched some wonderful processions, great parades, bands playing, flags flying while hundreds of uniformed soldiers marched by. My heart always thrills with pride of country at the sound of the strains

of "My Country 'tis of Thee" and the sound of marching feet. But the grandest procession, the most triumphant march I have ever had the privilege of watching is the march of Israel's hosts out of Egypt toward the land of Canaan. # Gleanings From Southern Baptist Convention K. V. Shutes, Cardova, Alabama

The convention met in Birmingham, Alabama last week. I only had the privilege of attending one day. Most

of the facts I give to you come out of the Birmingham News.

These facts prove to me where we should have, and could have been, If we had not been swallowed by a whale and spent so much time in the wilderness of carelessness without a vision.

The Educational Committee gave the following report: "We have five types of schools; 65 institutions in all, 1714 teachers, 26,684 pupils." This is why they have been able to preserve their faith, and it's the reason we have failed to preserve ours.

Report of Sunday School Board: "Fifty years ago there were 8,882 Sunday schools with 492,775 pupils and 49,277 teachers. Now there are 24,222 Sunday schools with 3,590,374 pupils and 352,385 teachers."

During these fifty years, the Southern Baptists have grown from 16,091 churches with 1,235.763 members to 25,259 churches and 5,104,227 members.

Report of W. M. Union: "In 18 southern states they have 40,614 societies with 758,151 members. In 1940 they had 651 churches with every resident member giving to missions. They paid for local work last year, \$33,591, 411; and for missions, \$6,787,626."

The convention was organized in Augusta, Georgia, in 1845 with 325 members from eight states. Now they have 25,239 churches, and they registered over 5,000 delegates at this convention.
