Our state organization is ignored when contributions are sent directly to the National Treasurer, and Bro. Davis is unable to give a complete annual report.

Let's keep our state organization going strong, for the National Association cannot exist without state organizations. We do not boast, but Missouri has one of the best, if not the best state organization in the National Association.

Winford Davis is honest and is active and alive and is also under a bond, so you need not fear to send him money, but be sure you tell him the cause for which you are sending him money.

NEW EQUIPMENT NEEDS

The Gem Office needs some new equipment, and the Missouri State Association is striving to supply that need. A little less than \$300.00 is now in the treasury, with about \$1,000.00 more in sight which will be in within thirty days.

For a matter of information, we give our readers an idea of what is needed in the line of equipment:

- 1. An automatic cylinder press, something like a Miehle, two revolution, with a variable speed motor. We can get one of these machines for \$2,000.00 and one for \$3,000.00.
- 2. A 30 inch paper cutter, about \$350.00
- 3. A power stitcher, \$200.00 to \$400.00
 - 4. A folding machine, about \$500.00

We are expecting to grace our office with these machines during December and January. May the Lord help us that we may better serve Him.

GIFT FOR NEW PRESS

We received an out-of-state gift for the purchasing of new equipment for the Gem Office. It was \$5.00 given by A. J. Lamar and sent in by W. D. ABOUT THE HISTORY

In this issue, we have the third in a series of historical articles, and this third article gives Free Will Baptist history in the state of Ohio. We do not know who are reading these historical articles nor who may be able to appreciate them.

We are now giving our readers the



privilege of requesting us to give the history in your state. Ohio is the first state history we have attempted. Which state will be next?

Please bear in mind that my source of information in printed records closes at the year 1888. From that time until now, I have made an extended research which is incomplete, of course, and any facts anyone can furnish with reference to recent history and present standing will be appreciated.

AN ERROR CORRECTED

In the second chapter of our historical series, we made an error with reference to the amount paid to foreign missions during the first fifty years of missionary endeavor by our denomination. The figure given is "three billions, nine hundred thirty seven millions of dollars" and that figure is an error.

As a matter of fact, our denomination began its foreign mission activities in 1835, and here is the correction:

Average Annual Receipts
for 1st decade (1835-1845) ... \$2,424.48
for 2nd decade (1845-1855) ... 4,537.58
for 3rd decade (1855-1865) ... 6,042.99
for 4th decade (1865-1875) ... 12,234.34
for 5th decade (1875-1885) ... 13,698.32
for three years 14,429.05
Grand total (53 years) ... \$432,664.25

This figure is less than half a million and it is a commendable contribution. The error was very gross, indeed, and it makes me feel like a terrible sinner. I shall press forward however, in my course of factual analysis until I have completed a successful work.

A LINOTYPE SCHOOL

Your editor, a certified teacher in the Missouri Department of Trades and Industrial Education, is conducting a night school in the office of the Free Will Baptist Gem on a special course of Linotype operation.

The school began on October 20 and the class sessions are from 7:00 to 9:00 o'clock on Monday and Wednesday nights.

Chapter III In the Ohio Valley

In the previous chapters, we learned that three independent groups arose independently of one another's influence and building their activities upon the Bible doctrine now known as Free Will Baptist faith and practice. These three groups were:

Benjamin Randall's Freewillers of New Hampshire from whose influence the denomination aggregate was formed which was of national significance with inter-national activity.

Benajah Carpe's Free Baptists of New York which became extinct as such in 1841 when they united with the General Conference (national) of the Freewill Baptists.

Paul Palmer's "Original" Free Will Baptists of North Carolina who have had only brief connection with the denomination at large until comparative recently, and in 1936, they helped to form, and became a constituent member of, the present National Association of Free Will Baptists.

In this chapter, we are to learn of the westward movement of the denomination, down the Ohio river valley, and particularly into the state of Ohio.

The development of the denomination in Ohio is, in part, the results of the consecrated endeavor of the Home Mission Society who labored "from Nova Scotia to the Mississippi valley" and whose printed record shows an expenditure of \$294,564.42 during the first 50 years of service.

The work of the denomination in Ohio was begun by Eli Stedman, who organized a church at Rutland, Meigs County, in 1810. Other churches were formed which composed the Athens Quarterly Meeting.

MEIGS QUARTERLY MEETING—
The Athens Quarterly Meeting became extinct and the Meigs Quarterly Meeting took its place. This quarterly meeting had as many as 28 churches at one time, including first, second, and third Kyger churches; first, second, and third Ruthland churches; first and second Carthage; first and second Alexander; Chester; Cheschire; Bedford; Orange; Salisbury; Cotumbia; etc. The Meigs Quarterly Meeting was noted for its strong churches; the First Kyger and Second Ruthland



maintained more than 200 members each for many years, Second Kyger, Campaign, and Middleport exceeded more than 100 members each, and the Canaan, Cheschire, and the First Ruthland churches had memberships which would be considered large.

LITTLE SCIOTO QUARTERLY MEETING had its origin in the labors of Rev. Rufus Cheney, from New York, who settled a few miles east of Portsmouth on the Ohio river and organized the Porter Church in 1817. This church is one of the strongest in Ohio today, standing in a new brick building, but there are bricks in the walls which have been used in three brick Porter church buildings on the same foundation. A picture of this church is to appear in the Gem soon.

The Porter church did belong to the Meigs Quarterly Meeting, but withdrew to help form the Little Scioto Quarterly Meeting in 1833. This quarterly meeting grew to a membership of 29 churches, some of whom came from the Meigs Quarterly Meeting.

PINE CREEK QUARTERLY MEET-ING was formed in 1879 when Mt. Zion, Union, Green, Mt. Hope, Chaffin's Mill. Buffalo and Cross Roads Churches of the Little Scioto Quarterly Meeting went together to form a closer union. This quarterly meeting was strong on Home Missions and employed its clerk as home missionary for several years.

JACKSON QUARTERLY MEETING was organized about 1873, and having as many as 10 churches.

OHIO RIVER YEARLY MEETING was organized in 1833 with Meigs and Little Scioto Quarterly Meetings. This yearly meeting grew to include Johnson Quarterly Meeting in Kentucky, Raleigh Quarterly Meeting in West Virginia, and the West Virginia Association.

OHIO AND KENTUCKY YEARLY MEETING. In 1879, the Little Scioto Quarterly Meeting and Pine Creek Quarterly Meeting formed this yearly meeting with the Lewis Quarterly Meeting in Kentucky uniting.

OTHER QUARTERLY MEETINGS AND YEARLY MEETINGS. There were a host of quarterly meetings and yearly meetings in Ohio which are now extinct, but are listed here with date of organization:

 Meigs Q. M. 2 churches

The Missouri State Association met in its twenty-eighth annual session with the Flat River Church, Flat River, Missouri, on September 30, 1941.

The sweet spirit of Christian fellowship was prominent throughout the entire setting of the Association. To this fact we give credit for the glorious achievements that were accomplished. "In unity there is strength."

On Monday night, prior to the Association proper, Sister Elsie Curtis of Herrin, Illinois, brought an introductory sermon to the Home Mission Organization, which was directly from off the altar, kindled by the Holy Spirit. She used Rev. 6:17 "The Great Day" for a subject.

The Mission work created quite an interest. The Woman's Auxiliary work was endorsed, which is destined to eventually succeed the Home Mission organization. According to Free Will Baptist polity, state organizations are composed of district organizations. Because there was only one district Woman's Auxiliary organization re presented, namely Indian Creek, we could not organize into a state con-However, Sister Marie vention. Thomas was elected field worker, and by the help and co-operation of each local organization we anticipate a step farther in advance at our next State Association.

Kenneth Turner very ably delivered the message introducing the League work, using for his subject, "Going a Step Farther". The League service was a blessing to all those present and certainly an inspiration to any one interested in the League work for our young people.

W. K. Weston presided over the meeting and had the hearty co-operation of those on the program, which consisted of interesting topics followed by discussions from each district association represented.

Miss Helen Young from the Niangua League gave a very impressive reading which was full of meaning and sentiment.

The introductory message to the Association was delivered by Cecil Campbell of Carterville, Missouri. He used Rev. 3:20 for his text an very



forcibly brought to our minds the con ditions as they exist today.

Delegates were present from Kansas Oklahoma, Illinois, Arkansas and Missouri. It reminded us somewhat of our National Association, with the exception of the larger delegation.

Winford Davis brought a missionary message at 11:00 o'clock on Wednesday from Rev. 7:9. Undoubtly, every heart in the audience was touched and we were brought face to face with the opportunities to do good which lay ahead for those who are mission-minded.

Bro. B. F. Rogers of Wewoka, Okla, brought us a very tinely message from Psalm 8 "The Greatness of God" on Wednesday afternoon.

An effort was made on Wednesday night to raise funds to send Kenneth Turner to Cuba with his motion picture camera to take pictures and present them to us that we might be better able to understand the needs and conditions of the mission fields This resulted in a collection of \$55.50.

Melvin Bingham of Tulsa, Oklahoma, brought an arousing and soul stirring message from Rev. 1:17. Only those who are acquainted with Bro. Bingham and have heard him preach can appreciate his sermons to the fullest extent.

After Bro. Bingham's message, Bro. Turner showed some of his pictures which proved quite interesting to those who enjoyed clean wholesome entertainment.

On Thursday, the report of the

Business Committee was read and adopted. To us, the most interesting item was that of raising money to better equip our Gem Office. Pledges and cash were taken to the amount of \$712.50, and don't forget, if any one has anything to donate on our new fixtures Bro. Winford Davis, Monett Mo., will be happy to write you a receipt for that amount. (See treasurer's report.

Another item of interest was the cancellation of the one-dollar (\$1.00) registration fee. This simply means that our associations will be financed as before, by contributions from local churches

At eleven o'clock Thursday, John B. Rollins preached on "Wrinkles" Eph. 5:27. This was very logical and those sitting under the sound of his voice took it in the right spirit.

A letter was read from Bro. and Sister Willey and Sister Laura B. Barnard, our missionaries, who were with us in spirit but absent in body.

Bro. Harry Beatty, Thayer, Mo., preached Thursday night and used Rom. 8:28 for a text. Bro. Beatty brought a very interesting message and all those present were benefited by the same.

Friday morning time was devoted to the work of the Sunday School Convention, followed at 11:00 o'clock by a sermon from O. T. Allred, Monett, Missouri. He brought a spiritual message from John 4:35 "Vision and Commission".

Friday afternoon the Six Point Re cord System for Sunday Schools was demonstrated, which proved quite successful.

Friday night F. C. Zinn, Bristow, Oklahoma, preached from John 11:28, 29. Bro. Zinn very ably addressed his audience with a powerful sermon. At the close of this service several came to the altar for a re-consecration of their lives to God.

Much good singing and several musical numbers were enjoyed at each service. The Missouri State Association can proudly boast of its singers and musicians of which we are all justly proud.

The next session of the Missouri State Association will meet two weeks

early, next year, with the Myrtie church near Thayer, Mo., in Oregon county of Cave Springs Association of which Harry Beatty is pastor. Frank Linton is to bring the introductory message.

Our Association was a perfect success with praise for all accomplishments going to God.

Work of Business Committee Adopted

Item 1—Be it Resolved, That a permanent committee of five (5) be appointed to pass upon questionable manuscript received for publication in the Gem. We suggest the following: O. T. Allred (chairman), Kenneth Turner, B. F. Brown, W. K. Weston, and Winford Davis.

Item 2—We recommend that the next session of the Missouri State Association convene with the Myrtle church of the Cave Springs Association.

Item 3 — First, Be it Resolved, That this body now in session raise all the cash possible for the purpose of more fully equiping the Gem Office by donations from any person in the amount of twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars more or less.

Second, Be it further Resolved, That the plan adopted by this body be presented to the several churches and associations by the pastors or other intrusted persons until the state has been thoroughly worked. Let this plan be worked and consumated by December 1, 1941.

Item 4—Be it Resolved, That we grant the Sunday School Convention time on Wednesday afternoon each year to transact their business.

Item 5—Inasmuch as the one (\$1.) dollar registration plan has proven unsatisfactory, we recommend that the churches and local associations adopt the original plan of contributing to the entertainment of this association.

Item 6-Be it Resolved, That the

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committee previously named by the executive board for incorporating the state work be authorized to re-insure the equipment of the publishing house on the five year plan if possible, and that we raise the first preminum here and now.

Item 7—Be it Resolved, That bond be provided for the treasurer of the State Association.

Item 8—Be it Resolved, That beginning next year the association begin on Monday night after the second Sunday in September, rather than after the fourth Sunday as now.

Item 9—We recommend that all money for state and national work be sent through the state treasurer.

Item 10—We recommend that the state adopt the unified program of giving as adopted by the National Association.

Item 11—Be it Resolved, That we extend a standing vote of thanks to the Flat River Church, the people of Flat River, and the Southeast Missouri Yearly Meeting for their splendid hospitality and kindness to the delegates and visitors of this body.

Stages of Developement

In the National Educational Program

By J. R. Davidson, Chairman National Board of Education, Bryan, Texas

T was in the month of June, 1938, at Smithville, Mississippi, that the very first plans were laid for a National Educational Program. During the 1938 session of the body, known as the Eastern General Association. a board composed of three members was selected with a view of co-operation with the Western General Asseciation Mrs. J. R. Bennett, now of Goldsboro, North Carolina, Mr. W. E. Coville of Nashville, Tennessee, and J. R. Davidson of Bryan, Texas, were the ones selected for this work. Before leaving Smithville, this group got together and drew a few simple plans for raising some money. The small amount of ten cents per capita was asked for, and the plan drew quite a bit of criticism, but it proved successful enough to create a financia; nuceleus; so whatever has, or may be done, this will go down in history as the beginning. I thank our God for it, and especially appreciate the part played by Sister Bennett and Brother Coville in making this possible.

In November, 1938, the National Association convened in Nashville, Tennessee, and during the sitting of this body a board of five was named as National Board of Education. Those composing the board were: Rev. J. R. Bennett of North Carolina, Rev. Geo. D. Dunbar of Tennessee, Rev. D. Self Jones of Missouri, Rev. Melvin Bingham of Oklahoma and Rev. J. R. Davidson of Texas. The board met. before leaving Nashville to organize and Rev. George D. Dunbar was named secretary and J. R. Davidson as chairman-treasurer. It was agreed that we should go forward with the plans started by the three above mentioned, so we thus launched forth, though greatly handicapped, for a full

July, 1939, found us in session in Bryan, Texas, in the capacity of the National Association, and it was there that Rev. D. S. Jones tendered his resignation as a member of the board, and Rev. Winford Davis of Missouri was named in his stead. At this time we were able to report a bit over one

thousand dollars collected, and were charged with the responsibility of beginning a search for some suitable property for a Bible school. Early in the month of August, accompanied by Bro. J. L. Edge who has gone on to his reward, the board took an across-the-country search. Property was investigated in several states, including two sites in the state of Tennessee, but God did not so direct that any deal was negotiated. We have been constantly on the alert for the very thing that God would have us have since that day.

We continued to make some interesting history until the National Association convened in Paintsville, Kentucky, 1940. It was while there that the board prayed and communed together until God came in manifestation with great revival power, and out of this revival was born the plan under which we are now operating It was agreed that wisdom called for conference with representative brethern, and several were called in counsel. We were greatly encouraged when it was known that "all were When our of the same mind". report, with some recommendations, was made, the Association enthusiastically approved everything, with a unanimous vote. The General Board was then elected, and after the Association adjourned it organized, including the naming of its executive

committee. It became the responsibility of the executive committee to endeavor to carry out the plans for the National Association, which included the employment of an Executive Secretary. Rev. L. R. Ennis was approached and offered the position, after his having been fully recommended by the brethern in attendance from the state of North Carolina; but he was not able to give an immediate answer. The matter of endeavoring to complete the contract with Brother Ennis was committed to Rev. Henry Melvin, Chairman of the Board and Executive Committee. All plans were fully completed and Bro. Ennis resumed the work September 15, 1940 The Executive Committee had arranged with the Board Education for a loan with which to meet the initial expenses of the work of the Executive Secretary. but in a called session of the Board and the Executive Committee in May. 1941, it was agreed that the work of the Executive Secretary had proved such a potent factor educationally for all phases of the work that the funds which were to have represented a loan should be allocated. And although Bro. Ennis suggested the discontinuation of the office for certain reasons, these two boards were in full accord of the mind that we could not successfully function without the office, hence a motion was passed to allocate a suf ficiency of funds to perpetuate the office of Executive Secretary until

the 1941 session of the National Association. When our report was made the National Association said, with a unanimous vote, that it was of the same mind with us.

During the sitting of the 1941 session of the Association the Board of Education was granted trusteeship authority and was authorized to proceed with the purchase of suitable property in which to operate a Bible school in the city of Nashville, Tennessee. It was further authorized that institute work should be the vogue for the associational year 1941 and 1942, and one thousand dollars was allocated to be used in the prosecution of the program. The first session of this work was held in Monett, Missouri, and plans are in the making for many additional sessions in the different states during the year. fruitful was the first one that no one could have grounds to question that this is the very best fore-runner possible to a good Bible school. In fact God has so blessed until fruits are being borne in several different states in the salvation of the lost, and the advancement of His great cause We are convinced that we will never be able to spend any of the Lord's money that could be more fruitful than that which we shall use in institute work.

The final stage of our history, so far, revolves around the dates of

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September 23 and 24, 1941, when the Board of Education was called in session to consider certain property which had been previously investigated and believed to be ideal for our use. On the above dates, the Board negotiated a purchase from Mr. W. O. Tirrill of the city of Nashville, near West End, of property most adaptable for Bible School purposes for the consideration of \$15,000.00. And this Christian man, a devout Presbyterian, in turn donated a check for \$1,000.00 toward the retirement of the debt. This represents the first cash donation of this amount since our beginning in this great eudeavor. God bless this noble man, and may many Free Will Baptists catch the same spirit, for such men make real history. We arranged for annual payments of \$3,000.00, and the rate of interest is to be only 41/2%. Five thousand dollars having been paid down leaves an incumberance of only ten thousand dollars.

To be sure the Lord has gone ahead of us in this matter, hence here is the answer to our prayers. The question now is, What shall we do with that which God has given us? I feel sure that we will do nothing less than to execute his will.

Very soon full descriptions, including pictures, will be furnished the *Baptist* and the *Gem*, and many will be looking upon the materilization of one of their fondest dreams.

A Message to All Fourth Vice Presidents from the National Fourth Vice President

"Ye are not your own. For ye are bought with a price: therefore glorify God in your body and in your spirit, which are God's" said Paul in 1 Cor. 6:19-20. And oh, the joy it brings to our hearts as we see the women of our denomination accepting and teaching this great truth.

I have been asked to suggest books to be used for study classes but that is rather hard to do, not knowing what you have used before, you will find, however, a list recommended in your 1941-42 Year Book. May we study them prayerfully.

Stewardship Suggestions

In the Woman's National Auxiliary Convention plan of work, November is stewardship month. This means we formulate stewardship plans for our years' work. Begin stewardship activities. Plan our stewardship reading circles and study course. In the new 1942 Year Book of Programs it suggests that our stewardship activities begin with a Church Night of Stewardship. This is a splendid idea. It is also a fine program to have for a Sunday evening service early in the new year of the church. The stewardship chairman in the local church auxiliary working with Sunday school teachers should plan the program. Here is a suggested outline for the service which I trust every auxiliary will sponsor in your church as heartily as we once did the Stewardship Declamation Contest. To my mind this idea, if planned, prepared, and carried out in our churches will not only put this matter of stewardship before our auxiliary members but the entire church membership, and we pray produce a greater number of Bible stewards and especially tithers.

Pray, plan, and prepare that the coming months may be used wisely and well to train our fine Free Will Baptist people to work and witness for Christ with substance and with self.

The suggested program outline is as follows:

Stewardship Church Night Program

- 1. Opening Hymn, "Praise God From Whom All Blessings Flow".
- 2. Scripture, Psalm 65.
- 3. Prayer, Stewardship Chairman of Woman's Auxiliary.
- Devotional Talk, "Faithful Stewardship"—a young person from the senior department.
- 5. Quartette, "We Give Thee but thine Own."
- Primary Demonstration primary boys and girls.
 (Have children learn scripture

verses about stewardship and recite them. They could carry letters spelling out "Stewards" or "Tithes and offerings" or "Stewardship Band" and recite verses for whatever letters are used; for example, S—Serve the Lord with gladness, Psalm 100:2.)

7. Junior Presentation — Junior boys and girls.

(A "Professor Quiz" affair would interest this age and could be arranged by having a junior boy fix up as Professor Quiz and read the first line of a stewardship hymn stanza, and the contestant will complete the stanza. For example, "Take my silver and my gold," (read by Professor Quiz and then the contestant completes the verses from "Take My Life".) Of course this would be rehearsed before the program is presented to the church).

- 8. Hymn, "Trust, Try, and Prove Me."
- Intermediate Girls' Presentation –
 "The Gift of Self"--a declmation
 (an article in the November Gem).
- 10. Intermediate Boys' Presentation—
 "William and His Soap". Tell the
 story of William Colgate, being
 sure to make the tithing point
 clear.)
- 11. Young Peoples' Presentation—"The Co-operating Dollar".

(This should be a momologue given by a young woman holding in her hand a dollar bill and speaking as if the dollar were relating its own experiences. As the causes among which the dollar is divided are described, women carrying placards, on which are printed these words (home missions, foreign missions, orphanages, old ministers' relief, Christian education) enter as the work is described and form a semicircle back of the woman holding the dollar. The Auxiliary literature department will furnish copies of this speech to all who will send a 3c stamp to the National First Vice President.)

- 12. Pastor's Remarks—(If impossible for pastor to be present, auxiliary president responds. See page 23 in the 1942 Year Book.)
- 13. Hymn, "Take My Life and Let It Be Consecrated".
- 14. Benediction.

Repentance

After Jesus had raised from the dead and gone into heaven and the Holy Ghost came down, we find Peter on the day of Pentecost with the same message, Repent!

Then in Acts 17:30, Paul went to Athens and uttered the same cry, "God now commandeth all men everywhere to repent."

Let us find out, if we can, what repentance is. If God has commanded it we want to know. Let us look first at what repentance is not: Repentance is not fear, and it is not feeling. Repentance is not conviction of sin. Repentance is not fasting and afflicting the body. Praying is not repentance.

Let us look into fear: Many who are very profane, when danger comes grow very quiet, call on God for mercy, as in a terrible storm, yet when the storm was over went on swearing as before. You could not say they repented.

You might think the King of Egypt repented when God allowed judgments upon him and his land. But this was not repentance at all. The minute the plagues were removed, Pharoah's heart was harder than ever. He did not turn from sin. He was the same man. Not true repentance, it was

fear.

Death coming into a family looks as if it would bring conversion to all the family, but this is not true. When the trial is on, the sorrow is great, and it looks as if they were going to repent. But afterward the impression is all gone.

Some think they cannot turn to God unless some certain kind of feeling comes. In a penitentiary people have feeling enough, some of them at least, to cry when they are first imprisoned, but if released, go back to the same old ways. This crying and feeling was only sorrow because they were caught—not because they had sinned nor because their conscience tells them they have done evil in the sight of God.

Repentance is not fasting and afflicting the body. One might do with out food and not repent of one single sin. Repentance is not remorse. Judas had enough remorse to make him go and hang himself, but that was not repentance. If he had gone to Jesus and confessed his sin, asked forgiveness, I believe it would have been granted. Instead he went to the priests, and then put an end to his own life.

A person may do all sorts of penace but there is no true repentance. You cannot meet the claims of God by offering your body for the sins of your soul. Such delusion!

Repentance is not conviction of sin. This may sound strange. Some have been so convicted of sin, they were miserable, could not eat for a time nor sleep well for weeks. They were not converted. They did not truly repent.

Praying is not repentance and that may sound stranger than ever to some. Some become concerned about their souls and say "I will pray and read the Bible". You can pray, cry, and read your Bible and yet not repent.

Another thing, it is not the breaking off of some bad habit. A man who has been a drunkard may sign, and pledge, and stop drinking, yet breaking off one sin is not repentance.

Stopping one vice is like breaking one dead limb from a tree, when the whole tree is dead and has to come down. A profane man may stop swearing but if he does not break off from every sin it is not repentance. It is not the work of God in the sou!. He wants us to turn from every sin.

If a ship I am in leaks in many places and I stop one leak, it will fill and go down just the same. True repentance is not quitting this or that particular sin.

What is repentance? A good defintion is a "right about face". It implies that one who has been walking in one direction is faced about in exactly the opposite direction, when before he was satan's victim faced toward perdition. He leaves the old life behind him, and can do it instantly. It does not take months to repent. Instantly, anyone can say, "By the grace of God I will go no further towards death and ruin. I repent; I turn away from my sins." The instant you make up your mind toward God, God gives you power to do what you have not the power to do.

There is no one but himself to blame if one will not repent. God has called and commanded all men everywhere to repent, and God is not going to save you whether you repent or not. He will meet and bless the soul where there is a turning away from sin. "The goodness of God leadeth you to repentance." God so good, gave Jesus his Son to be delivered, nailed to the cross, suffer, bleed for our offences—raised, thank God, for our justification.

No one can say they have no need for repentance. "We have all sinned and come short of the glory of God" Rom. 3:10. A poor contrite heart went into the temple and asked God's mercy and mercy came to him. He went out, through the mercy and grace of our Lord, Jesus Christ, justified. In contrast with the Pharisee who prayed about his own goodness, the goodness of God is the ground for repentance for we have none of our own.

If we have known God and lost communion with Him because of sin, we must not excuse ourselves but instead, repent and turn back to God. As Peter after he had denied his Lord, His heart left unguarded for a few moments. He had gone to sleep when Jesus had commanded prayer. Haven't we? He had become self-confident and said "Though all forsake Thee, I will not." "I will go with thee even unto death." He followed, but far away. How close do we follow?

Maybe you are staying away from God's house or maybe you are in company with His enemies. Look the Bible through. You will not find one harsh word for the backslider. Look in the prophets. Jeremiah, in his lamentations, invites "Return, return, return". There are just two words in the Bible for the backslider—come back. The door has not been closed since you went away.

If we, who know Jesus as a Savior, are not concerned about others finding the way of life as we were at first after we were saved, we have left our first love, and God's message to us is repent for we have backslider Have you? Faith can not come without true repentance.

Help us, O Father, to search our own hearts, that we may recognize the failures in our own hearts. Give us the courage to think of all our sins in the light of the life of Jesus. Forgive us of our blindness in not being able to see the opportunities offered to us in the common place experience of every day. Help us to see in every person the soul that our precious Master gave His life to redeem. Amen.

We wish that all you readers could have been present and seen the Spirit in which Brother Hicks accepted the position as superintendent. Since the Sunday morning over three years ago when we saw him come to an altar of prayer and surrender his life to God, he has proven himself a real Christian. With him as leader and the splendid group of teachers we're expecting this to be a great year in Sunday school.

Since we last reported, the church here has completed a very important piece of business, which is a big step towards building a new church. In the August business meeting Brother Colliver pointed out that it would not be wise to come back and build a new church on the old lot, since history had proven that every twenty-five years there is a major flood. Twice in the thirty-one years of this church's existence the flood waters have risen

into the church. He asked the church to consider buying a lot out of the flood district, yet close enough that it would still be the Sandy City Free Will Baptist Church. It was decided that Bro. Colliver should appoint a committee to look into the matter.

Rev. Henry Geyer, Brother Earnest Griffith, and Brother James Gambilli were appointed on the committee. Two-weeks later a special business meeting was called, at which time the committee presented to the church the information they had obtained. It was voted by a majority of the members present to accept the committee's report and recommendations, and to use the money in the building fund to go on the lot.

The lot cost one thousand (\$1,000.) dollars, and there was four hundred: ninety-eight (\$498.00) dollars in the building fund. By asking the church, for one hundred eighty-five (\$185.00) dollars from their treasury, and tne-Sunday school for one hundred (\$190.1) dollars from their treasury, there was: a total of seven hundred eighty-three (\$783.00) dollars. By the time all business concerning closing the deal was finished, enough money had been received from the fifth Sunday offering and personal donations that only dighty (\$80.00) dollars had to be borrowed from the bank. We're expecting to pay this off as soon as possible, and then the building fund will be continued right on until the church is ready to build - and we're not expecting that to be as long as: it has been since starting the project.

This new lot is on the opposite side of the railroad about one block above where the church is now standing. This is an ideal location on U. S. Routes 23 and 60. We are thanking and praising God that He has made this possible. It is an answer to prayer and a dream come true.

In our September business meeting Brother Colliver was chosen as pastor here for another year. Tonight (October 5) he is continuing with the revival at the Westwood enterprize Baptist Church, Ashland, Kentucky. This revival was discontinued last April, after three weeks with 26 conversions. Until their auditorium should be completed, they have been holding services in the basement of their new church, but now the auditorium is

ready and from all reports they are expecting a real revival.

We are expecting this to be a great vear in God's service, and we solicit your prayers in behalf of the neonle at Sandy City, that we will continue to stay humble where God can use us. Especially, dear readers, do we want you to remember your humble reporter. After much prayer I have given up our Sunday school class at Sandy City in order to work elsewhere. For some time I have felt the burden and God has heard and answered my prayers. Pray that I will continue to stay under the great protecting hand of God, and go wherever He sees fit to lead. We know that without God we can do nothing. but if we let Him have charge He will bless our efforts - that has been proven more than once in my own life in the last year.

We have organized seven new Auxiliaries here in Kentucky.
