The Missionary Deputation to Cuba

WE have made our trip to Cuba and returned safe and sound, assured in our hearts that the Lord's approval is stamped upon our effort in a definite way, and that our tour among the Cubans was, and is, a decided success from every viewpoint. We left Monett about six o'clock Monday morning, January 19th. By saying we, I mean Rev. B. F. Rogers, pastor at Wewoka, Okla., Rev. Melvin Bingham, pastor at Tulsa, Oklahoma, Rev. Kenneth Turner, Rev. George La Shum, and myself all of Monett, Missouri. Let me make this explanation: We were expecting Rev. Henry Melvin of Durham, North Carolina to go as one of the party, but just before we left, word came from Bro. Melvin that due to increased matters of business he could not go. So. Bro. La Shum decided to go with the party, however, he paid his own expenses on the trip.

We drove from Monett to the home of Rev. and Mrs. J. A. Card, near Ozark, Arkansas, where we spent an hour with them. Bro. and Sister Card, devout servants of the Lord, have recently volunteered their service to the foreign mission work, hence we desired a visit with them. After our visit with them and a season of prayer in their home we went on our way, crossing the river at Vicksburg, and on to Valdosta, Georgia, where Rev. L. C. Johnson of Glenville, Georgia was to join our party. Upon our arrival at Valdosta we found Brother and Sister Johnson waiting; but only to tell us that for certain conditions over which he had no control he could not go with us. It was too bad to have to hear that Bro. Johnson could not join our party. However, after visiting a little while with them we proceeded on our way.

At ten o'clock Wednesday night, January 21, we arrived at Miami, Florida. We called Dr. Lydia Mason (Dr. Mason is a sister to our missionary, Bro. Willey) and found that she had rooms already engaged for us. So we were not long getting to bed. I den't know what we would have done while in Miami had it not been for Dr. Mason. She took off from her work for a day and showed us around the beautiful city, and helped us make our preparation for sailing, etc. We had a wonderful visit with her and her dear old mother who lives with her. Both of them are consecrated servants of the Lord.

In making our preparations for sailing we ran into but one "snag". In our haste to get started from home we had overlooked the matter of getting a release from our local selective service board. Three of us, Bro. Turner, Bro. La Shum, and myself being draft age had to wire immediately to Cassville, Missouri for our release so as to visit Cuba for ten days. We were very anxious, of course, until the answer came about six hours before sailing time giving us our permission to leave the States.

After getting through the U.S. customs, Bro. Rogers getting his car declared and on board ship, etc., etc., we finally were assigned to our state rooms, and at 7:00 P. M., Friday January 23, the S. S. Cuba begin to plow its way on the 236 mile voyage to Havana harbor. The water was unusually quiet, the moon was shining brightly, and you can imagine our thrill as we sailed on our way. None of us, of course, had ever taken a trip on the water of any length before. We sailed under complete blackout. The beautiful S. S. Cuba was painted a dull grey all over. The lights on the outside were all out except one red and one green light. The light bulbs in our state rooms were painted blue. The boat zig zaged a great deal of the way across during the night as a safety measure. One official on the boat told me he was crossing once more and then he was quitting because of the danger. We were of course

conscious of danger; but far greater than that we were keenly conscious of the divine presence and protection of the Lord: for as the poet said, "Isn't God upon the water just the same as on land". We went in prayer and trust. Every evening while driving down as night would draw near we would all lift our hats and engage in a season of prayer; even while the car was bounding on its way. We repeated the same as we returned home. These seasons of prayer were a great blessing to our souls. We kneeled by our bed sides in our state rooms and committed ourselves to Him for safe keeping.

About 7:30 Saturday A. M., January 24, we sighted land on the island of Cuba. About 10:30 our boat pulled in by old Moro Castle into Havana harbor plowing directly through the water where the battleship Maine was blown up February 15, 1898, and on to the docks of the P. and O. S. S. Co. After getting through the customs we found Bro. Willey and Bro. Hugh Pain at the door waiting for us. How comforting it was to find them there! Everything was so strange and foreign to us. We of course could understand but very little of all the clatter going on about us. You can rest assured we immediately laid all our burdens on Bro. Willey and Bro. Pain. They became our spokesmen and saw us on through.


After getting telegrams and mail started back home we drove out through the great capital dity of Havana, of from seven to nine hundred thousand population, and on toward the town of Ja-

ruco (prononuced Haruco) some 40 miles inland. Everything, of course, was intensly interesting to us as we made this our first drive into this strange land. It was almost like being in a new world to us. We arrived at Bro. Willey's home in Jaruco Saturday afternoon in high spirits; finding that the good house maid, Julia, and Sister willey had a good meal prepared for us. Service was announced that night for the young people

at the Mission Church and School. Bro. "'urner was selected to bring the message. Bro. Hugh Pain interpreted for him. That was our first introduction in the services where we could not understand the language. They had a very busy schedule for us while we were there. We were in service every night except one, and all day each Sunday.

Early Sunday morning, the 25th, we loaded into cars and started to the convention to be held at the San Ignacia Church, a country church a number of miles farther into the country. We drove the cars to the little town of Hershey, Cuba. There we left the cars and boarded the electric train. After about a thirty minute ride we got off to find a native boy with a yoke of oxen and an ox cart waiting to take us on to the church a mile and a half. Some rode and some walked, taking turns about - taking pictures along the way, cutting off and chewing a piece of sugar cane now and then, and just having a jolly good time. Yes, picture taking was the order from the time we left home until we returned. There were three still cameras and one motion picture machine in the party. Bro. Turner was on the job with his motion picture machine continually, and took several hundred feet. He will have an unusually interesting line up of pictures when he gets them developed. Don't fail to see them.

We arrived at the San Ignacia church and found the people gathering. The church is a little thatched roof building covered

with palm leaves, which is very typical of Cuba. A dirt floor; but a comfortable place to worship. And the dear people it seemed tried to kill us with kindness. We were profoundly impressed with the friendliness of the Cubans. They especially loved the Americanos De El Norte (the Americans of the north). A native preacher, of course, preached in Spanish, and Bro. Pain interpreted for the Americans. We had a precious service then dinner at noon. In the afternoon Bro. Willey preached, bringing a powerful message in Spanish. At the close of his message a native Cuban man and his wife came and kneeled at the altar of prayer and wept their way to God. What a glorious service it was. After this Bro. Bingham brought a message of power, the Americans were all introduced, some indoor pictures were taken by Bro. La Shum, and then the benediction. The oxen were yoked again to the cart and we headed back to catch the train. The oxen, and people stringing across the field reminded one of customs and days of which we have heard our grandparents speak. We arrived back to Jaruco for the evening services where Bro. Bert Rogers brought a splendid message. We were all thrilled t. over flowing with the experiences of the day.

Monday A. M. the writer gave a message in the chapel at the Mission School. The party made a trip into Havana taking many pictures along the way. One sight of interest I will mention here was the men digging up human bones in the Havana cemetery. It is a Cuban custom. The grave ground is rented, and when people get behind with their rent as much as two years the bones are taken up and burned and the ground rerented to another.

On Monday night an important missionary discussion was held in the home of Bro. and Sister Willey.

Tuesday A. M. Bro. Bingham brought the message in the Mission School, after which we drove to the city of Mantanzas over in the Matanzas Province on the At-

lantic coast, a city of 116,000. There we visited the Woody Orphan Home, which institution is under the direction of Rev. and Mrs. Samuel Pain. We had dinner with them, a typical Cuban dinner. There we also met another American missionary, Miss Bessie Vander Valk of New Jersey, who is working there with Brother and Sister Pain. We also met an interesting Cuban native, Justo Jiminez (pronounced Husto Himines) who is teaching in the orphanage. After pictures were taken of the 21 children in the orphanage and of the property, we loaded in Brother Rogers' and Bro. Pain's cars and started on what proved to be one of the most, if not the most, interesting journeys while we were in Cuba. We started toward the southern part of Matanzas Province over toward the Carribbean Sea.

We drove 75 miles on from Matanzas to the city of Jaguey Grande, a city of 14,000 population. When we got to Jaguey Grande we were at the end of the road. We passed through a number of large cities and towns on the way. We found this great district to be wholly unevangelized. No Protestant mission work is being done there in any way. The chief head of the army post and the chief of police in Jaguey Grande assured us of a hearty welcome if we, as a Free Will Baptist denomination decided to open a work in this district. They said that they would be glad to have us establish a work there. I wish each of you could have seen this great district of opportunity with us. We left

that city at dark. On the way back our young Cuban man as we were leaving car, which was the rear car, showed signs of a tire going down just out side the city of Agra Monte, a city of 7,000 people. Bro. Samuel Pain, Justo, Bro. Bingham, Bro. La Shum, and myself were riding in this car. We turned back into town to get the tire repaired, and while three of the party stayed down at the shop with the car, Bro. La Shum and I decided we would take a walk up on main street. The natives discovered we were Americanos and they begin to throng about 115. perhaps two or three hundred of them, all trying to talk to us and us to them. We began to hand out Spanish gospel tracts. I wish you could have seen how eager they were, they took them almost faster than we could hand them out. We had some great time there in the street which was literally filled and blocked with people flocking around the Americanos. Finally the three other brethren came up with the car ready to go. We suggested to Bro. Fain that we have a service with them, so he called them to order. We took our stand on the side walk, and sung a verse of the old song, "Are you washed in the blood?" Bro. Pain interpreted it in Spanish. We each then preached a short sermon, after which we finally crowded our way out from the throng and got going again. We had great difficulty getting away from them. But we want you to get this: When we started closing our messages numbers of them cried out in Spanish, "Speak on, speak on". I truly believe they would have stood there un-

til midnight those brown eyes looking eagerly up at us hearing the gospel truth. shall never forget those The longest day I live I eager brown eyes looking up at us and their ears so attentive unto our gospel My God, what messages. a challenge to Free Will Baptists. I wish those words 'speak on, speak on" would ring in every Free Will Baptist heart and ear until your pocket books would burst wide open One fine looking

told Bro. Pain these words: "There is only one church here and they are doing nothing for us. We need help." That one church is not a Protestant church. Now let us tell you the best yet of this wonderful experience. As we started on our way we'all lifted our hats and begin to have prayer. Dear Justo, a fine Cuban father and husband, had never yet found the Christ. I took him by the hand, and we all prayed for Justo. In a few minutes he was happy in his soul and claiming Christ as his personal saviour. What a happy time. You can rest assured that everyone throughout the mission bounds rejoiced over the salvation of Justo. Just before we left for the states Justo reassured me he was right with the Lord.

We left Agra Monte thanking God for tire the flat which resulted in this wonderful service. We arrived back at the orphanage at 11:00 P. M., then 55 miles on to Jaruco arriving at 1:00 A. M. Sister Willey expressed that we all came in walking on air. We had but little difficulty arriving at the conclusion that in the southeast part of Matanzas Province is where we as a Free Will Baptist people shall start our new work under the supervision and leadership of Brother and Sister Willey. It makes me want to lift my voice in praise to God as I relate those grand experiences.

Wednesday afternoon, the 28th, we went through the Hershey sugar mills, driving on to the town of Santa Cruz over on the

Atlantic coast for service in the mission there. Each of us ministers brought a brief message being introduced by Bro. Willey, and our messages being interpreted by Bro. Hugh Pain. One soul was saved in this service. It was a very precious service indeed.

Thursday night we enjoyed an open air street service in the town of Jibacoa, far into the country. We preached there through a loud speaker system.

Friday we spent most of the day in Havana making preparation for our trip back to the states, as we learned the boat sailed Monday at 3:00 A. M. instead of Tuesday at 7:00 P. M., as we thought. They continually change the schedule so as to offset the enemy submarines.

Friday night we enjoyed a fine open air meeting in the town of San Jose where again the loud speaker was used. A large crowd was present. Two of our party preached with Bro. Samuel Pain bringing the principle message.

Saturday Bro. Rogers, Bro. Bingham, and Bro. La Shum decided to take the Pan American Clipper Plane back to Miami to spend some time there while waiting for the arrival of our boat Monday P. M. Bro. Turner and I remained in Jaruco to go over with the car on the boat Monday.

Saturday night Bro. Willey, a native preacher, Bro. Turner and I drove to the town of Guines where we had service with the mission. The service was held in an humble Cuban home. I brought a message with Bro. Willey interpreting. We found a fine group of people at Guines.

Sunday was another convention day. This time it was held in Jaruco. It was a glorious day. Early in the morning people begin to gather from Jibacoa, Santa Cruz, San Ignacia, San Jose, Guines, Matanzas and all around. Bro. Turner preached at eleven o'clock. It was a very precious service. The spirit of the Lord was there in a wonderful way, and at the close of his message a fine Cuban young man was saved. A young lady was also seeking, and she found her way to the Lord in the afternoon. In all there were seven souls saved while we were on the inland, Sunday afternoon a native preacher bought a message, after which the writer

brought a message on the "Signs of the Times". We found the people there to be strictly fundamental, truly premillennial, and purely evangelical. These findings were certainly gratifying to us. We also took special notice to the much singing and prayer which characterized the services of these dear people wherever we went.

Late Sunday afternoon every one was saying *Adios* (goodbye). How it did touch our hearts to part with these dear people. We never were treated nicer.

I know this is getting lengthy, but I cannot close without paying tribute to the Pains. Ellen and Martha Woody from North Carolina went to Cuba as missionaries starting their work in March of 1900. In August of the same year Arthur E. L. Pain was wonderfully converted under their ministry. He became the husband of Ellen, was also called to the ministry, and became a powerful missionary; covering the entire island of Cuba establishing many churches. He passed on to his reward four years ago. Dear old Sister Pain is practically retired, though she is yet very active in the local mission there in Jaruco. Several children were born to this union. Among whom were Samuel and Hugh who are carrying on the Interdenominational Mission. Hugh is over the school at Jaruco and the work in Havana Province. Samuel

has control over the orphanage at Mantanzas and the work in Matanzas Province. We never found finer men of God to work with. Both of them speak English and Spanish fluently, and are wonders at interpreting. We had our sleeping rooms in the Jaruco mission church and school building, which was an old priest headquarters building of fourteen rooms. Bro. Hugh and his mother also live in this building. We took our meals in the home of Bro. and Sister Willey, three blocks from the building described above.

Sunday night we drove into Havana, and Bro. Turner and I went on the boat and went to bed at nine o'clock. The boat sailed at 3:00 A. M. It was a rough sea all day, and we just had to do some feeding the fish, try as we would to keep from it.

At 4:10 P. M. Monday we saw the hands of our fellow partners and Dr. Mason waving at us from the docks at Miami. It seemed good to land. Upon coming back in we found the United States customs very strict. We were four hours getting through them. We drove to the home of Dr. Mason and her mother where we enjoyed a fine meal.

At 9:30 that night we were on our way toward Missouri and Oklahoma. We stopped in Orlando, Florida the next day and had ε visit with little Tommie Willey who is in school there. We conveyed to him as best we could messages and love from his parents, and then we were on our way arriving at Monett, Wednesday, 11:30 P. M. February 4.

We have returned feeling that our tour has been a decided success. The Lord definately went before us all the way. He made clear to us what he would have us as a denomination undertake on the island of Cuba. He showed us the district thronging with hungry souls. Now it is up to us. We must furnish Bro. Willey with some native preachers to help him open up in that district. We can get plenty of them, good ones, and at a very small salary compared to what we call salary here. In fact we have one or two already in mind. They will become Free Will Baptist ministers. We must furnish Bro. Willey with a loud speaker system. We must assist the natives in building them some places of worship. They will be grateful for the erection of even a thatched hut. May the Lord open your hearts. Let us earnestly pray the Lord to give us Cuba. Then may we back our prayers with our means. Come on let's double our giving to our great missionary cause. We must close, but you will be hearing from us again about our great prospects and possibilities in the dear, quaint, old fashioned, and HUNGRY land of Cuba.



Music Department

The Official Relationship of the Choir

How close should the choir and the music committee function? In many churches, there is a music committee appointed by their officials. Theoretically, it is entirely correct. Practically, it should be simply an emergency committee with authority to interpose, if the music is not functioning properly under the immediate supervision of a physically limited or incompetent pastor. Many of our pastors know little or nothing at all about music, and much less about how to organize the music into an instrument of worship.

Now, if the committee is not itself musical, in the professional sense of the word, it will not greatly matter. It should, however, consist of persons who are tactful and considerate, fertile in resources and plans, not easily discouraged, sufficiently versed in music to know good work when they hear it, and yet imbued with a practical sense of music that shall assure their cooperation with the plans of the pastor.

Nevertheless, if the pastor is prepared to do his own share of the work and has an

energetic, faithful, and discreet choir leader, who will accept responsibility for all phases of the musical service, the music committee there can be dispensed with as a needless piece of machinery. In place of a music committee there may be a "choir patron" who devotes himself to the interests of the choir, socially and otherwise.

The choir should by all means accept the authority of the pastor. It lies in the very nature of the church that the pastor should have authority over the choir and its work. The work of the choir has no meaning or purpose except as it cooperates with the rest of the church under the direction of the pastor. True, there are many instances wherein the pastor, unfortunately, is much the less informed than is its active members and church leaders despite this fact, he is the pastor and if he is a good man, and loves God and his work, that should not prove detrimental to him nor his position as pastor.

Some of our half-handed choirs with a nonetheless Charlatan leader, have a selfish, arrogant attitude, as if they were organizations apart from the church and its work. They should realize that the church is the purpose for their being a choir and their soul duty is to serve the church. They even resent the suggestions of being subordinate to the pastor or to the church officials. You recall Paul said in his letter to the Corinthians, I Cor. Chapter 12, "Now concerning spiritual gifts, brethren, I would not have you ignorant.... There are diversities of operations, but it is the same God which worketh all in all." Then, Paul goes on to say that some might have wisdom, some knowledge, others might have faith, while still others might be able to heal, yet all be believers in the same and one Further he says, "For as the body God. is one, and hath many members, and all the members of that one body, being many, are one body: so also is Christ....for the body is not one member, but many....But how hath God set the members every one of them in the body, as it hath pleased him." T like the way he puts the object lesson when he says we cannot all be a tooth, nor au eye, nor a hand, or a foot, and then he says that even those members that seem so

little of importance are extremely important to us for we would suffer much without them. And as he goes on in essence to say, that there should not be any disagreements in the body, no "isms" but all should function its duty well and properly, and that when the body has even one member to suffer, the whole body should lend itself in sympathy with it until it be again restored to normality. Yes, what great and blessed thought, and how applicable to our churches even to-day amidst all modernism.

So choirs, do not think too highly of your selves, try to realize you are only one ment ber of the many organizations of the entire church. There are the Sunday Schools, the Young Peoples League, the Ladies Aid Society, the Mid-week Prayer period, and the Church Service itself, and all come under the jurisdiction of the pastor, and all are subjected to him, who is the leader, the pastor, the preacher. He has all departments and organizations at heart, he prays for them daily, he visits their meetings, he helps when and where ever he can, and so in every Sunday morning pastoral prayer he should not forget to pray publicly for each of those organizations which represent all together the one body, namely the Preachers, make your first mornchurch. ing prayer in all your morning services a prayer of utter devotion to God, conclude with "The Lord's Prayer" and when you pray your pastoral prayer, which should come just after your morning anthem by the choir, make that a prayer of petitions, thanks, praise, and all your requests for the week, for the sick, and needy, for each organization within the jurisdiction of the church of which you are pastor.

CHOIR SHOULD BE LOYAL TO THE PASTOR. The choir should be something more than outwardly subordinate: it should be loyal in heart to its chief. Its members should hold him in high esteem, making much of his favorable qualities, and passing over his failings. Most of all remembering him in their daily prayers.

The choir should be in sympathy with the pastor's plans. The pastor should be trying to deepen the religious life of his people. He should be seeking to attract the unchurched to his services in order to win them for Christ. He should be organ-

izing an evangelistic campaign. He should be striving to build up his mid-week prayer services. He should be seeking to bring the young people into closer and kindlier relations with the church, he should be trying to build up the generous and unselfish impulses among his people by laying stress upon the regular benevolences or on current movements of helpfulness.

Why should not the choir sympathize with these efforts and do what they can privately, as well as by their public singing, to help him in these projects? This sympathetic attitude is like bread cast upon the waters: its results return to bless the singers, directly in the admiration and affection of their pastor, indirectly in the larger fruits of their regular work. They should be helpful to the pastor. They will suggest new plans and methods that will further the spiritual and social life of the church. They will occasionally offer to sing in the mid-week service. They will listen to his sermons and cheer him by commending them, surrounding him with a genial atmosphere of appreciation and commendation.



Men felt they did not need God, therefore, they politely bowed our Lord out of His own world. But alas, the sand suddenly crumbled beneath his feet. At the very gates of their carnal dream, behold, an awful mass of wreckage! The moans of the despairing and the groans of the disillusioned, hundreds of millions duped and degraded by modernism, liberalism, and materialism, fill the whole earth. War clouds have gathered over the world. shadows of hate are lengthening, and lives are being forever wrecked because of a universal disregard for the shed blood of Christ, the Lamb of God. Fear grips the heart of many! Selfishness rules the world and the forces of iniquity are frantically active at this very time. Why Don't You Tithe?

Our own Free Will Baptist denomination certainly could not advance without a system of communication as that found in the printed page.

Missionary interests is the world-wide program of Christ, and to ignore it is sin! The church or denomination which looses its missionary zeal will die.

Benevolence is the program of Christ,

therefore our establishment of orphanages, hospitals, asylums, homes for the aged, superannuation of ministers, etc. are in order, and our neglect of them is sin.

Christian Education is the work of Christ, the greatest teacher of all ages. Because it is the program of Christ, our neglect of it is sin.

It requires a denomination, or a large group of people, to carry out these things for Christ. One person, or one church working alone cannot do these for the glory of God. A mere denomination cannot do it. Only the denomination that is informed, having a perfect understanding can do it.

The perfect understanding is affected by the aid of a church paper. A church paper is indispensible, therefore, to the welfare and prosperity of the church's life. Every church member should be a regular reader of his church paper.

A church paper brings information, and information brings inspiration. A paper is the bringer of good tidings.

A small concern, doing a small amount of business, may function in an all-in-one capacity, but it is disasterous to allow a thriving, growing, busy publication (like our own Little Gem) to continue its operation under its present official organization.

Important business matters will be neglected, passed over, and lost while the Business Manager operates a press. The press is stopped while the Manager-Pressman acts as Foreman in seeing forms properly made and all hands are kept busy. The Manager-Pressman-Foreman has to "let things ride" while he edits manuscript for the typesetter (and if the type-setter doesn't have to wait for copy, he is fortunate). Then to climax it all, the Manager-Pressman-Foreman-Editor (the big shot) stops to do the job of a Flunky, and while in the midst of that job, the office girl comes with the announcement, "There are important business callers in the office to see you, Sir." This is a typical day in the Gem Office under its present official management.

The recent S O S of the Editor created a great shock among our people which had its reaction in varied forms; from the scornful and indignant "I told you so" to the desperately sympathetic and agonizing prayerful attitudes. Perhaps it was a bit childish. Only remember, the invitation stands open to those who would venture to engage in vigorous activity for 10, 12, and even 16 hours a day over a period of months without any "time out" much of which is under high pressure. Ah! but scorn and indignation will dissolve.

Am I complaining? Oh no, no a thousand times! Business is good, too good for our present sct-up. We are only sorry business cannot be cared for properly, promptly, with courtesy and our compliments. That's why we are FORCED to step up to a better

and bigger business organization.

The Missouri Board is asked to consider, and the Board plans to meet and consider a Business Manager whose duty it shall be to transact all business matters and superintend the production facilities of the *Gem* Office. A good man for this position is available. He is trust worthy and capable, and is generally admired by our whole denomination.

The present Editor is asking to be released from his too-much responsibility and assigned to the duty of Foreman and he shall superintend the Works Department, stay back among the machinery and see that production goes on. He shall supervise the labor of the employees, and be generally responsible for first class production.

A third responsibility should be cared for: that is a stenographer who shall edit all manuscript, keep a regular and complete set of books, and make all reports, monthly to the manager and quarterly to the Gem readers:

to the city to pay taxes and give in the census. I see in this throng a blushing young couple taking their honeymoon on a donkey. They reached the city, but hundreds had reached the city ahead of them and all lodging places were full; so this young couple turned aside to rest for the night with the animals and the poor.

While the social and political world slept, that night, in the hush of the night, God's prophetic clock struck and, "She brought forth her first born and laid him in the manger."

Yonder I see the wise men looking in the sky, they see the star we are told about by Moses, Num. 24:17, and out they go, mount their camels and ride away, following the star till it stood over the Christ child. They said, "Where is he that is born king of the Jews? For we have seen his star in the east, and are come to worship him."

May we catch the spirit of these ancient men and come to worship the King.

When we come to worship, we must first offer ourselves, for He says, Matt. 5:23, "Bring your gifts to the altar" and in Rom. 12:1 He says for us to present our bodies a living sacrifice. These wise men fcll before Him, and angels bow to Him, but not many Americans are bowing to Him. I believe before this world conflict is over that many more will be giving themselves to Christ. You can't serve God and Mammon; neither can a spring send forth bitter water and sweet. So, we must first give ourselves to Him before we can worship Him.

These wise men went in search of Him to worship, as Ponce de Leon went in search of the fountain of youth. The wise men found their object, but Ponce didn't.

When they came to worship they brought gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

In 1 Chron. 16:29, "Give unto the Lord glory due his name: bring an offering and come before him: worship the lord in the beauty of holiness."

When we Free Will Baptists learn that giving our tithes and offerings is a part of worship, we will get further than we have. Don't be afraid to pass the plate and worship Him. If our people would (uit robbing God and go to paying tithes, we could have more money to build more churches and send more missionaries.

I preached several years before the Lord converted me on tithing. The Free Will Baptist people will respond if you will just keep preaching it. It is the Lord's budget system to run His church. I could give you many personal examples, but I refrain.

In Benson's Commentary, he says, "Prayers may be signified by frankincense; gold is as it were, the common measure of the good things of this life, wherewith we relieve wants of others." And as we learn from Pliny and St. John 19:39, there is hardly any other use of myrrh than to preserve bodies from corruption.

Let us think just a little about the person worshipped. They said, "Where is he that is born King of the Jews?" So they had come to pay homage to their King in His infancy. In Isaiah 95:6, "Oh come, let us worship and bow down: let us kneel before the Lord our maker." They fulfill this prophecy that David gave when they came to worship. In Matt, 4:10 "Thou shalt worship the Lord thy God and Him only shalt thou serve." This was the message of Jesus to the Devil. I see so many times where people fail to worship Him.

How must we worship? Let Jesus answer for Himself. He said to the Samaritan woman: John 4:24 "God is Spirit and they that worship him must worship him in spirit and in truth." To worship in Spirit we must be born of the Spirit says John 3:5. Herod pretended that he wanted to worship, but he only wanted to take His life. But according to Matt. 2:11 the wise men really worshipped.

So if you are hungry and thirsty stop and read Isaiah 55:1, "Ho, every one that thirsteth, come ye to the waters, he that hath no money; come, ye, buy, and cat; yea, come, buy wine and milk without money and without price."

Let us resolve to give Him our best in this war torn world of hatred and bloodshed. Show to the world "God is love". Only a short time and Christ will take His church out of the world. "Let us work while it's day, for the night cometh when no man can work."

Lord give us the Spirit of the wise men to give our bodies, money, and praises to Him.

Quiri Quire, Venezuela February 3, 1942

Dear Bro. Rollins and all Gem Readers, especially my church and Sunday School at Myrtle, Missouri:

I wonder how everybody is getting along at home. We are well physically, but in this time of war I think no body could really feel good. However, I am thankful that things are as well as they are.

We, baby and I, had a nice trip down bere, if leaving home and friends could be We flew on one of the large Pan nice. American Clippers. We left Miami, Florida at 7:00 A. M. on Saturday. We were very high, something like 10,000 feet. We could look down on the clouds and they looked like I felt afraid at times, big snowdrifts. but the God that cares for us on the ground can also protect us in the air. One who has never tried it can't imagine what a comfort it is to place yourself and loved ones in the hands of God.

We ate lunch aloft while flying about 200 miles an hour. We arrived at Maracaibo the same evening and spent the night there. Then we left there next morning and got here at 5:00 P. M.

The weather is so warm here that baby Nan had to pull off her shoes and has hardly had them on since.

We live in a tile house built by the Standard Oil Co. There are quite a large family of us. About 20 when we are all at home. We, my husband and I, work for my brother-in-law and his partner. I am timekeeper and cashier. I've never worked before when I was here and I like it as it helps to pass the time.

Things seem much better here among the American people. I don't see as much drinking as when I was here the other time.

A few days after I got here I heard about two missionaries living in a little town near here, and a few days later I saw them pass here. I couldn't rest until I could go look them up. I thought they might be our missionaries. As soon as I got my immigrant papers fixed up, Shelby and I went to see them. We found the house where they lived and met one of them, the other one was gone to another town for a few days. The one we met was a Mrs. Phillips, a very nice middle aged lady who has spent 10 years in Venezuela doing missionary work. She is very much in love with her work. She is due a vacation home this year, but she is afraid she can't get back down here and is about to decide not to go home until the war is over. She belongs to the Orinocco Missionary, is non denominational. They have a good church house and a church membership of 70. I saw some of the girls about 12 to 15 years old and was very much impressed with them. She said the only church here was Catholic and it had become so unsatisfactory most of the men quit altogether. They have Sunday school in both the country camps here. At one on Saturday morning and at the other on Sunday morning, as well as in the native village. She knows our missionary, Miss

Yeley. Talking to her made me wish I could speak Spanish and help these people as I know she must be doing. Then the thought comes that since I can't do as she does, there are people who speak my language that are away from God that I might help, and anyway I can pray.

We don't hear much about war here only as we listen to news broadcasts from home. This country isn't at war yet and we are as safe as if we were at home. When we hear a report of some heroic deed some of our American boys have done it makes my heart swell with pride, but then I think of the ones that lose their lives—what good will all the glory do them?

I think so often about Bobby Brewer and Clifford Wisehart. They are members of my Sunday School class and boys that help make their community a better place in which to live. I'm praying especially for them to be spared to come home safe and sound. I believe if everybody that claims to be a child of God would pray for peace, and live lives that God wants them to live, we would have peace.

I'm hoping I can be home for the Missouri State Association next September as it meets with my church. Last year was the first State Association I ever attended and I hope I never miss another one.

I'm giving my address and will try to answer any letter I might get. If too many come I will just write to the Gem. If letters are sent by air I will be more apt to get them. It costs 25 cents to send a letter from home to me here.

May God bless all of you and prosper the work of righteousness is the prayer of your sister in Christ.
