Many things demanded the attention of these board members, and among them was the filling of a vacancy on our Foreign Mission Board made necessary by the recent resignation of Rev. I. J. Blackwelder. course the filling of this vacancy was the Lusiness of the Executive Board, however our Foreign Mission Board did get together and offered a recommendation to the Executive Board stating whom we desired them to place in the vacancy. We recommended Rev. Mrs. Elsie Curis of Herrin, Illinois, and the Executive Board was kind enough to approve our recommendation. We wish to express our thanks to the members of the Executive Board for their willingness to place on our Board the one whom we recommended. We feel Sister Curtis will make a splendid member on our Foreign Mission Board, as we know her to be in deep sympathy with the mission work.

After the appointment was made, our Board of Foreign Missions held another business session in which a number of things were done. Rev. Bert Rogers of Wewoka, Okla., was elected Recording Secretary, and the writer was elected as Treasurer of the Board. We feel very humble and inefficient in taking this place which Brc. Blackwelder has faithfully filled for many years; but the Lord willing, we shall do our best. We covet your prayers and must have your co-operation.

I for one, and I am sure I am speaking for our entire Foreign Mission Board, and for many many others of our entire denomination, we appreciate the tireless efforts and service of Bro. Blackwelder which he has rendered in this capacity for many years. In his service rendered, we know he has contributed much to the late uprising in foreign mission activities in the Free Will Eaptist connection. May we, in our future

foreign mission activities, see much fruit borne as a result of the service which has been rendered by Bro. Blackwelder.

About Cuba

Soul stirring news is coming to us constantly from Cuba. The Free Will Baptists are about to really do things there. I have just received a picture (which you will see elsewhere in this issue) of Bro. Willey baptizing our new native Free Will Baptist preacher, Pedro Cliva. Also a number of workers are being secured, new and unevangelized districts are being inspected, looking forward to starting things in a definite way. Since our return from the island last February, Bro. Willey and Pedro have made some tours over into the Province of Pinar Del Rio. This is the western most province of the island. They say they have found an even more hungry people for the gospel over there than we found in Mantanzas Province last winter; and to be sure they were hungry enough in Matanzas.

We are depending on you to furnish the means so we can build and really do things for Christ and the Free Will Baptists in Cuba. Please don't let our work there be held up for lack of means with which to do. We do appreciate so much the giving our people are doing for our mission work; but remember as the work builds up there and as we put on more native workers it will take more means. We will be just as economical as we can; but at the most we can do, it will take money to spread the gospel in Cuba just the same as it takes money to spread the gospel anywhere.

Some of our churches are taking the responsibility of supporting one native worker; which means somewhere from ten to fifteen dollars per month. The church at Tulsa, Oklahoma, of which Bro. Melvin Bingham is pastor, has taken one by the name of Jose to support. We are very grateful to them for this liberality. They will receive the picture of Jose to place on the wall of their church there in Tulsa. There are a number of our churches which could do the same, I am sure. If you are interested in doing this, let me know, please.

About Our Educational Program

It looks very much like we are going to pay for our new school property in Nashville by the time of the National Association; or at least by the time the first annual payment is due in the month of September. It has been many many years since great strides were made by the Free Will Baptist people along the line of Christian education.

We are so grateful to our people of Missouri for the response in the giving of foundation checks while Bro. Davidson was in our state. There were nine of the \$100.00 checks given from this southwest Missouri district alone. We are certainly proud of our people because of this splendid response. I think something like about twenty checks have gone in from Missouri, so far, and I am confident there are others which will go in soon. Five \$100.00 checks were given by our Oak Grove Church near Stella, Missouri. Their church happened to be in the Camp Crowder area, and they allotted \$500.00 of their allowance for our school. Thanks to Bro. Linton, the pastor, and to the church as a whole.

About the Work at the Gem Office

Everything seems to be moving in a splendid way now at the Gem Office. The force has all the work they can do, apparently, for which we are thankful. Gem Office also received due consideration in the money recently expended by the Cak Grove church people. \$750.00 was donated for our new machinery fund, and that brings our indebtedness down to such a small figure until it is almost the same as nothing, considering what we have in-Two hundred and fifty to three hundred dollars will pay every thing we owe on property and machinery. Now that is something to be thankful for, isn't it? And I am sure we all are. May the Lord bless the Cak Grove people, together with all others who have had any part whatsoever in this worthy enterprise.

I will close these remarks by again urging you to do your best for our foreign mission cause. Not that we do not wish to see the other denominational departments supported, for we most certainly do;

but in my position now I feel so responsible concerning our mission work and our missionaries. Come on and lets do things in Cuba.

Advancements in Cuba

Jaruco, Havana Province, Cuba, May 1st

We want you to share with us in prayer and interest for the new fields into which our native preacher and I have already entered. Our first trip, or survey, was made two weeks past in a district in which there are 38,716 persons. Almost all of this large territory we found to be unevangelized. Cities of 5,000 people have no evangelical witness. While we did not find a Christian witness, we did learn of the presence of spiritualists with their doctrines of devils, deceiving the people; this ought to be a means of shame to the Christian church.

This trip was made in the Overland Willis and how we did suffer to get through. There were no roads over a large part of the distance. What might be called a road by the Cubans was cut into great ruts by the large wheels of the cane carts. These wheels are eight feet in diameter drawn by six yoke of oxen. These carts are loaded with a ton of sugar cane. Many places we had to take out across the open fields, or bump along railroad tracks. We went places a car had never gone before on

that first trip. The results were that we came out with our muffler dragging, and the gas tank looked like battered junk. It took us sixteen hours to drive two hundred miles.

Here, in this first great province that we visited, we hope to place a worker. A province corresponds to a state in our own country, in size they correspond to counties.

The next province we went into was Pinar del Rio, which has a population of 351,389. Pedro Oliva and I drove down to the furtherest great city of Pinar del Rio, a dis-

tance from Havana of 107 miles. We have our plans made and already functioning to use, for the summer, at least five students from a Bible school called "The Young Pines". This school is similar to Colombia Bible College of Colombia, South Carolina. Pedro, our full time worker, is a graduate of this school. His sweetheart, Cila, whom we hope will become his wife in a few months, is also a graduate. A student who graduated from the school of the Bible went with Pedro into this great district yesterday to start something. This lad who is with Pedro has been taken for his support by Brother Melvin Bingham of Tulsa, Oklahoma. Our plan is to ask our people, by this I mean individual congregations, to take the full support for a student which will amount to about \$15.00 per month for the period of five or six months. This student will report each month personally, to the church, by letter regarding his progress, the souls saved, the places open, the preaching opportunities, etc. This will give the church an individual

interest in the student and his work. Then the pastor of the church can write to him in reply.

Brother Winford Davis writes me that he will be responsible for one student. If you are interested in the support of one of these fine students, and want them to be your representative on the field, write to Brother Winford Davis. Remember this, we now have working on the field three native preachers, and in a short time expect to have four more. We are pleading with you to help us, and quickly. Some will say this means larger expenses. Yes, it will mean that we are going into cities where there are no other church than a dead Roman Catholic Church, cities that have never heard an evangelical message —a Bible message. We shall have to buy chairs or benches, and lumber, rent large halls for our services, rooms for our workers, and feed and laundry for them. On the

other hand, it will mean that dear souls, for whom Christ died, will be saved and go forth with the glad news of a great salvation.

Last week I had the happy privilege of burying in the waters of baptism our native worker, Pedro Oliva. How we wished for a great company of our people to be lined along that beautiful palm fringed shore. Nine in all were baptized and came up out of the water with glad shouts of Hallalujahs. They sang with joy as each one was placed under the water. How our hearts were knit in faith and love. I have a moving picture of this baptizing which I hope we can get to the National Convention this coming July.

Please pray for us as we labor in a field so great and needy that it would take a life time to preach in each one of these cities asd hamlets.

New Recuits in Cuba

Rev. Melvin Bingham and his church in Tulsa, Cklahoma, have agreed to take one of the native Cuban preachers and support him financially as their representative in Cuba. As a result of this transaction the native Cuban preacher has written a personal letter to Brother Bingham and his church which was translated by our missionary, Rev. T. H. Willey. The letter, in English, is as follows:

Jaruco, Havana Prov., Cuba April 22, 1942

Bro. Melvin Bingham and Members of Your Congregation:

My beloved brother in Christ, I beg of my beloved and eternal Saviour a spiritual blessing on you and your church.

Brother Melvin, possibly you will receive an extra letter from Mr. Willey, who led me to write to you. I wish to say, brother, that I am student of the word of God. The Lord has called me to His work for which I am happy. He has taken me by the hand in order that I might realize the end of those things divine which things God has prepared for me. Though I am very young

in the Lord, I have been called to serve Him and I am determined by the grace of God to keep His commandments in Mark 16:15.

My parents are Christians and they desire that I shall serve Him, seeking to help me in this. I feel the call of God to prepare myself for this service and I am studying in the Bible college of "The New Pines". The Lord spoke directly to me, truly, and I have a desire to work for Him in His work. Though I am on my vacation, I have thrown myself in the fields of need, places that need the Saviour. They need to hear of the living Christ - the Christ that is able to save them and to keep them from the hell that awaits them in the future. The devil has placed many obstacles to hinder in my life, but my desire is to do God's will. All my desires and asperations and proposals are to work in the vineyard of the Lord. I know that in front of me are mountains of difficulty, but I know that the Lord has called me.

Well then, brother, if the Lord has called me, He will carry all my burdens and keep without fail. (Phill. 4:19.)

Without saying more, know this that I am sincerely grateful as your brother in Christ.

Glorious News from Cuba

Rev. T. H. Willey, Missionary to Cuba

Jaruco, Havana Province, Cuba, May 11th

"As cold water is to a thirsty soul, so is good news from a far country" Prov. 25:25.

We have felt the results of your prayers in many victories and in the testing times during these months. Thank God for the power of prevailing prayer! We could take up much of this letter telling you of the severe testings we have had in our bodies, our hospital experiences, etc., in this past month, but these things are minor, just a part of the "all things". We want you to know of the hearts that have been turned from darkness to the glorious light of the Gospel.

God is doing marvelous things for us in Cuba, whereof we rejoice! In the past two weeks, we have gone in to possess a part of the most needed province of the Island of Cuba, Pinar del Rio. We are believing God to open wide the door and supply the native workers with their support. The results in so short a time has thrilled our hearts as I am sure it will yours as you have this report.

We have now two permanent native workers, Pedro Oliva and Luis Diaz; also two

student workers, Jose Jardines and Rufino Cjeda. The Tulsa Church has taken the support of Jose for the summer months. We received their ten dollars today. You will rejoice to know of the work already done by Jose who is located in the town of Vinales with Pedro. Luis and Rufino will go next week into another district that has asked for someone to come with the message.

Pedro came in to see us Saturday with this news, that we pass on to you. The first night he had a service in Vinales there were fifty people present. There wasn't a seat for them to sit on, but they stood. The second night, I was with them and saw about that number raise their hands for prayer, many of them weeping as they expressed their desire to accept Christ.

Pedro found a man with the only Bible in the town, and he had been converted by reading the Word, alone. He proved to be a firm believer. He kept saying over and over to Pedro, "At last someone has come to preach to us of this Book". How sad are those words, "at last"! There are ten or fifteen young men surrounding the

workers all the time. One of these fellows has definitely been converted and gave the following testimony, "I have watched your lives these few days that you have been here and see in them that for which I have been hungry". This boy, within less than two weeks, is now going into the surrounding country with Jose giving his testimony and doing personal work.

There are three families who have accepted Christ and are publicly giving their testimony. In one family, a girl has been wonderfully saved who is dying of tuberculosis. She is asking for prayer, saying that she wants the will of God in her Pray that God shall heal her, and raise her up for His glory and for a testimony to His power in that section. Last Eaturday night a service was announced in this girl's house. When the boys arrived they were told not to expect anyone as there was a special picture show in the town that night. The lady of the house told them that they should call the service off as it was an unheard of thing that the people would stay away from a show of that type. But Pedro said it would he a test to their interest in the Gospel, and to their happy surprise, the people began to come in until the house was packed and God gave them a gracious service.

There are calls coming from other towns already. One man, deeply interested, wants to take the workers to another town where his brother lives that he might hear also. This is truly the working of the Holy Spirit, and it all reads like the Book of Acts in a modern edition. It is amazing to see the hunger for the gospel. I am sure it is going to be hard for you to believe, and had I not seen it with my own eyes, I would find it hard to comprehend also. The men who visited us on the deputation tour can witness with us concerning the hunger in this land for the Truth. They know what it is to have the people swarm about you on the streets, begging for more gospel preaching! They can, I'm sure, verify the truth of these statements. Cuba is hungry, spiritually!

Here is another testimony of an old man whom Pedro met in the Valle of Vinales: "Hear me, I am seventy-four years old, and have never heard this message that you bring." So with tears in his eyes and lunning down his wrinkled face, he received the message of Christ for the first time.

Another incident, the boys met two women on the road into the valley, one had a little child with her. By way of introduction, Pedro said to her, "How much would you want to sell that kiddy for?" With tears coming to her eyes, she said, "Don't ask me a question like that, only three months ago I lost a child and I am without comfort." The boys took this occasion to show this sorrowing mother that there is a way whereby she can see and be with her child again. course, wanted to know how, so they gave her the story. Weeping profusedly, she sought in prayer, by faith and repentance of her sins, and was found of Him. How glorious to have good news for the comfortless! I cannot help but think here of the scripture, "A little child shall lead them."

We could go on and on relating to you other happenings for His glory, but I am sure this bit will cause your hearts to rejoice, and also bring to you a deeper desire for earnest prayer that we might see a real revival in Cuba. It may be interesting for you to know that Cuba has never known a revival as you and I have seen and experienced. Do pray that the Lord shall keep our workers humble and give to them a special anointing of power from on high to proclaim this glorious Gospel without fear. We do thank God for them, they are so willing to live on little and sacrifice May the Lord add unto our number.

Our hearts and minds go out with you constantly in fellowship in the Spirit, and we never fail to thank God for those who labor together with us in the Gospel.

The Tennessee Free Will Baptist Orphanage

May 10, 1942, finished three years of marvelous growth for the Tennessee Free Will Baptist Orphanage at Greenville, Tennessee, under the capable and efficient leadership of Brother and Sister Stanley. These two devoted and talented Christians exerted

themselves to the uttermost in the behalf of the Home and our children, as the boys and girls were called by Daddy and Mother Stanley.

May 10, 1939, was a red letter day for the Free Will Baptists of Tennessee when

ford dreams became a living reality. On that date, the formal opening day, The Home consisting of 150 acres of land, a threestory dormitory with twenty-nine rooms, four baths, numerous wardrobes and built-in closets; a dwelling house formerly the parsonage for the Presbyterian minister, with six rooms, a furnace, a bath and full size tasement; a combination dairy and feed barn; some ninety acres of farming land with the rest in timber (not virgin), was dedicated free of debt to God and Him who said, "Suffer the little children to come unto me and forbid them not for of such is the Kingdom of Heaven". The Woman's Auxiliary of the Cumberland Association furnished the first floor, but the second and third floors were exactly what one would expect of a large and old building that had not been used for a long time. On that date, the formal opening day, The Home consisting of 150 acres of land, a threestory dormitory with twenty-nine rooms, four baths, numerous wardrobes and built-in closets; a dwelling house formerly the parsonage for the Presbyterian minister, with six rooms, a furnace, a bath and full size tasement; a combination dairy and feed barn; some ninety acres of farming land with the rest in timber (not virgin), was dedicated free of debt to God and Him who said, "Suffer the little children to come unto me and forbid them not for of such is the Kingdom of Heaven". The Woman's Auxiliary of the Cumberland Association furnished the first floor, but the second and third floors were exactly what one would expect of a large and old building that had not been used for a long time. The furnances were out of commission, the barn was badly in need of repairs; the farmer who lived in the parsonage owned all the tools and live stock and was entitled to most of the proceeds of the farm. For years, the farm had been rented to those who could produce the most cash with little or no thought for a soil building and soil conservation program. There were no children in the Home, in fact summer was half gone ere the first childish voice proclaimed it a home.

boys and girls, especially those who otherwise would be lost to the better and finer things of life, would have such training from early childhood.

The Home was no sooner opened than Bro. Stanley, along with others, began to lay plans for a Free Will Baptist Church to serve the needs of the local community and the "Home". Rev. M. L. Hollis, then of East Tupelo, Miss., conducted an evangelistic campaign in the nearby High School building that very fall. As a result, a small organization, consisting of a few women and children, a boy who was a senior in high school, Bro. Stanley and Rev. Paul Woolsey, was effected. Evacuation for a church was begun immediately. The Woman's Auxiliary of the Cumberland Association again started the ball rolling with \$1500.00. The people of the local community contributed labor and necessary materials. There is now a small but modern and beautiful stone church which is conductive to true worship. The church was erected under the sacrificial leadership of the Rev. Geo. D. Dunbar, Chuckey, Tennessee. though the church is only two and a half years old, and is located in a sparsly settled community, bounded on two sides by rugged mountains, there is now a membership of eighty. The junior and entermediate league have between fifty and seventy-five boys and girls each Sunday evening. Prominent among the officials and those more often on the program are the boys and girls of the Home. Although no pressure or persuasion of any kind has ever been brought to bear upon the boys and girls, all of them over eight years of age have accepted Christ as their personal Savior, been haptized and united with Harris Memorial Church (named in the honor of the late Mr. George T. Harris and His widow both of whom have done so much for the Home and Church). The entertaining is such as would awaken an early consciousness of sin and promote the longing to early enlist in the cause of the Master. Not only around the tables at meals and the large library table for devotions every evening, throughout the day as well.

The two older girls, one will be a senior and the other a junior in high school next year, have already felt their call to definite

Christian work. They are both talented, and it is our prayer that they will keep humble and consecrated so the Master can give them abundant labor in His vineyard. All of the older children have already given promise of being aggressive and militant soldiers of the Cross regardless of the field of human endeavor or activity they may enter.

The county retained a dormitory for a teachers' home (assuring that at least a major portion of the faculty would live in the community), the high and elementary school buildings, the Manual Training and Smith Hughes Vocational Agricultural building, along with twenty-two acres of land. The school building is connected with the Home by a concrete walk, a distance of only 200 yards. At the time the property was purchased, and also at the present, Rev. Paul Woolsey was and is a member of the Green County Board of Education. He has served two terms as chairman and acted as superintendent during a twelve months' illness of the superintendent. Care has been taken in the selecting of capable and conscientous Christians as teachers of the school. One of the best features of the school is the Vocational Agricultural and Manual Training department which is presided over by Prof. J. S. Irwine, who is recognized as one of the leading teachers in his field, not only in the state but in the nation as well. He is a member of the Harris Memorial Church and is chairman of the finance board. His department includes blacksmith and metal shop, equipped with tools; an auto machancists; a wood shop where the boys are taught to make all wood products. This kinds of department, with all the tools (valued at \$3000.00), is accessible to the community. It has saved the Home many a dollar, and will provide excellent training for the boys.

The orphanage family now consists of twenty-six, including the workers. Improvements, repairs and additions have been made to all the buildings. The farm which has been stated before was in a run down condition is being improved as fast as possible. It lays well and most of the land has a clay bottom and can be easily built up and improved. About thirty acres have been subsoiled. The best garden in the community

last year was the garden at the Home. The other crops are increasing in yield as the soil is taken care of and improved. Everything now points forward. Ninety additional acres have been brought and paid for although most of this is mountain land and rough, it will make excellent grazing land; some of it would make fine truck patches. We have just taken over the farming and have to buy all of the tools and farming implements. They are higher but will continue to get higher provided one can secure them at any price.

Until the present, the boys and girls have occupied the same dormitory. It was only a few weeks ago, April 28, that Mr. and Mrs. Koontz of Afton, Tennessee, were engaged as farmer and supervisor of the boys, and matron of the boys Home. They are honest Christian folk. Mrs. Koontz is an active church worker and has had several years of experience in practical nursing and the care of children. The children already affectionately call them Uncle Walter and Aunt Elizabeth. The boys are now happily located in their own quarters. The boys and girls have their meals together and all gather around the large library table for their evening devotions. None of the atmosphere of the Home Life has been sac-

Mrs. Stanley was giving music lessons to the five older girls. Mrs. Payne, a school teacher and an accomplished music teacher who is a member of the church and our pianist has been engaged to continue the music training.

We have very much indeed for which to thank our Heavenly Father. We have children from two states at the present and are receiving support from at least nine states. Each month our ever increasing circle of well wishers is enlarged. sire that the Home will be a real asset to the whole denomination. In regard to the training for Christian service, we are thinking in terms of primary and early training. We hope that the Bible school in Nashville will furnish the more advance training for a large percent of the boys and girls of the Home. At the present we are conducting a weekly mission and Bible study which will soon enter its fifth month.

The increased cost of living, the equal advance in the price of all kinds of materials, and the ever present need of expanding are handicapping God's work, means that if the best work is to be done, the income must he increased accordingly. Our good people all over the National Association have responded in a wonderful way for which we are grateful to them and render thanks and praise to the Giver of every good and perfect gift. The Home has sustained a loss in the going of Brother and Sister Stanley; however, they are still supporting the Home with both their prayers and their means. The board is, at present, endeavoring to replace the Stanleys. and Mrs. Woolsey are acting as Superintendent and Head Matron merely for the present. There is no outstanding debts and the Home is run on a cash basis. The support is ever growing.

House Cleaning

THIS IS The time of the year for general house-cleaning; of putting our homes in order for the months ahead. We want everything in good order, and as lovely and attractive as we can afford.
