The front page carries the picture of the student group and the four faculty members of the Christian Workers' Institute held at Tulsa, Oklahoma, in June of this year.

This session of the Christian Workers' Institute scored the highest attainment yet in enrollment and in benefits to the entertaining church. There were thirty-three certificates awarded for the completion of ALL the courses offered. Of this number, more than a dozen certificates were left in the Tulsa Church, including one to the

pastor and one to his son. Other members received enduring benefits upon their attendance of given classes but who were not given certificates.

This was a real climax, but the highest attainment has not been reached yet. Come to Monett in July where, for the first time in the history of the world, Free Will Baptist students will graduate from the Christian Workers' Institute, and receive Normal Diplomas which is earned upon the completion of four two-weeks' sessions of the Christian Workers' Institutes.

A Glorious Day Coming! The Christian Worker's Institute

Surely the Holy Spirit never spoke more definitely in any matter than when He moved upon the Board of Education of the National Association to make provisions for the Christian Worker's Institute. Not one single person who has attended regularly the sessions of these institutes, which are just a portable Bible school, but will cheerfully testify to this guidance of the Holy Spirit—not only in His speaking

to the members of the National Board of Education but also to the leaders in these institutes.

Every institute, thus far, has been a glorious success, both to the individuals in attendance and also to the communities in which they have been held. The proofs of this statement are too numerous to mention. The blessing derived from the study of the Word of God and from those worthy methods and means by which the Free Will Baptist denomination may effectively propagate its sacred truths, was so complete at Monett in July, 1941, that another session of the Christian Workers' Institute has been planned for this place Gathered in Monett last July were students from five states. It is hoped that the enrollment this year may represent a greater area. The work is steadily expanding as is evidenced from the fact that eight states were represented in the Tulsa session held in June of this year.

Those students who have attended former sessions and who have received certificates at these sessions will be ready to receive their Normal Diplomas in July at Monett.

The institute at Monett, however, is not just for these former certificate students. The Institute Courses of Study have been so planned as to provide for the entrance of new students at any time. It is therefore urged that the following make their plans now to come to Monett in July, and partake of the blessings that await them there: ministers, prospective ministers, evangelists, Sunday school officers and teachers, workers in Woman's Auxiliary and Missionary Circles and Free Will Baptist Leagues. In fact all Christians who are desirous of becoming more efficient and effective workers will find in this Portable Bible School those courses that will enable them to make their desire a realization

"Come thou with us and we will do thee good!"

Description of Courses

The courses of study offered in the Christian Workers' Institute have been arranged in four groups. Upon the completion of any single group, however, a certificate will be awarded the student; and, for the completion of the four groups of courses, a normal diploma will be awarded. Each

group of courses offered may be finished in a session of two weeks.

A new course is being given in this fourth Institute session—"The Rural Church". The author and instructor of this course, Rev. Robert Crawford, graduate student in the Vanderbilt School of Religion, is one of Tennessee's outstanding young ministers. Formerly from Alabama but now he is pastor of the Ashland City church at Ashland City, Tennessee. Rev. Crawford comes with this course in rural church problems, desiring to help all rural church leaders and workers in a more effectual service.

BIBLE DOCTRINE—This course will treat on the doctrine of the Trinity, with special emphasis on the person and mission of Christ, the personality, office, and work of the Holy Spirit, together with the doctrines of salvation and the Church. The method of treatment will not be systematic except as applied to the specific teachings of the Word of God. The student will find this course to comprehend much of that volume of Christian thought and faith which is essential to stability in personal life and efficiency in service.

BIBLICAL SURVEY—The purpose of this course is to introduce the student to

the Bible as a whole. An examination of both the Old and New Testaments with a view to recognizing their interrelationship, literary and historic importance will receive attention. How we came in possession of our Bible, and on what grounds we may be assured of its inspiration and authorship is considered.

EVANGELISM — Soul winning is the privilege of every Christian, and no minister or church worker may be considered efficient, evangelistic or truly faithful who disregards his obligation to the lost. In this course the student will receive vital training in the use of the Bible in personal, pastoral, and professional evangelism. He will be taught how to deal with all classes of unsaved people.

FUBLIC DISCOURSE—This course deals with the preparation and delivery of sermons and gospel addresses. The subject will be presented simply, but with a thoroughness sufficient to meet a universal need among ministers and Christian workers who have not had the advantage of homiletical training.

MISSIONS—The course in missions is considered of major importance. The subject is treated under four separate headings, and will run throughout all four sessions of the Christian Workers' Institute. In the first session the Biblical background of missions will be studied; in the second session brief outlines in world-wide missions will be reviewed; in the third session Free Will Baptists in modern missions will be considered; and in the fourth session the recent awakening and present program of foreign mission will receive attention.

Cur missionary to India, Miss Laura B. Barnard, is the author of this course.

FREE WILL BAPTIST ORGANIZATION—The subject matter presented in this course is contained in the minutes of Free Will Baptist organizations, and in the unwritten customs and traditions of our denomination. Special attention will be given to the variations of customs and practices of local churches and general bodies. The purpose of this course is to bring about uniformity in organization, practices, and program.

FREE WILL BAPTIST LEAGUE—The prominence of youth in modern society lays upon Christian bodies grave responsibilities.

Practically all vocations demand trained mean and women. This course is offered in response to a widely recognized need for trained workers in all departments of the church.

WOMAN'S AUXILIARY — Evangelical denominations have been spared the reproachment, if not a collapse, as a result of the devotion and missionary passion of their women. Woman's Auxiliary is comparatively new to our present generation of Free Will Paptist women; but, it is nevertheless the most highly perfected organization in the denomination. There is, however, need of uniformity and simplification. This course is designed to inspire and inform pastors of the possibilities of Auxiliary work, and to give essential instruction to women regarding the conduct of the organization.

SUNDAY SCHOOL ADMINISTRATION—The Sunday school is fundamentally an evangelizing agency. The latest estimate reveals that seventy-four per cent of those who unite with the churches annually come from the Sunday school. Efficiency in administration will be the theme of this course.

Expenses

It has been the purpose of the National Board of Education and the management of the Christian Workers' Institute to offer Free Will Baptists throughout all the states the advantages of training in this Portable Bible School without any cost whatsoever to the student except the actual expenses of board and incidentals. We have urged upon local churches the importance of this training to Christian workers, and have thereby secured their sponsorship of the Institute on a sacrificial basis. The good people of our church in Monett have insisted that they would not make a profit on boarding students in the Institute. actual cost is desired. We are glad therefore to announce that the board rate for the entire session will be only \$8.00. There will be no charges for rooms. The usual registration fee of \$1.00 is required of all students. Thus the total cost to the student for this session of the Christian Workers' Institute will be \$9.00.

Registrar



THE following is a letter that I received this morning from our native worker in Pinar del Rio. I left Luis Diaz last Thursday in this new field, not knowing anyone, only a few casual acquaintances that we had made that day. I am sure you who read this will rejoice with us at the success attending our faith. We have on the field now, actually, four native workers; two of these will be married soon, making six workers, for the girls are very capable also. We are taking on another worker this week who has for months prayed about his labor with us and now feels definitely God's leading. This will make seven workers. I wish you might know each of them, see their sacrifices and feel with us their deep consecration to the Lord and the cause. They are yours, so pray earnestly for them that they might be filled with love of God and the power of the Holy Ghost to witness and build up a strong church here for His glory. We are praying God to give us a hundred workers in this needed province.

Senor Thomas Willey Jaruco, Cuba My Beloved Brother:

It is my fervent desire that you are in good health in both body and spirit. I am writing you in regard to the marvelous things that God is doing.

They were not able to give me a place on the American Tobacco farm at Rio Seco. So the first night I passed here in San Juan looking for the group of believers whom we had heard about. The following day I kept searching for them and finally when I did find them they were filled with joy. When I made them our proposition one of the brothers carried me from house to house and I found them all filled with joy and very content that I had come. That night we had a service in the honor of our Lord Jesus Christ.

The second day after finding this group, who are like sheep without a shepherd, I found that they had made a covenant to pray, demanding of God that he send them a pastor. The following I found written

on the blackboard when I arrived for the service: "Service, preaching in charge of our brother Luis Diaz, who was brought here to tell us the good news of our Lord and Master Jesus Christ."

Tonight they studied our proposition and our actual labor. I invited them in the name of the Free Will Baptists (Bautistas Libres) to unite their souls with us to praise God who provided our redemption through the blood of His Son. They all expressed their desire to unite with our church because God had answered their prayer in a moment. But their decision was held over that they might present it to all that they might have a unanimous vote on the proposal.

Last night, May 22, the congregation met together and asked for my indentification and decided to receive me in the Presence of God as their pastor. They are still amazed and are relating over and over the similarity of their experience to that of Peter when he was in prison and the church prayed for his deliverance. God answered their prayers and set him free, then when he stood in their presence they could hardly

believe that it could have happened so quickly. They were made to realize that they were dealing with a living God. So this group had called for a night of prayer, just two nights before I came, they were praying for a pastor and God sent one.

I wish to be brief and not weary you. There is one expression I am hearing from all of them, "I want to be baptized".

Today I am going to a mission which they have started 25 kilomers (15 miles) from here. We have to go by train and horse back. Here there are thirty Christians. Others say there are more than that. At 2:00 p. m. today there is Bible study and at 4:00 p. m. preaching service. They want to be baptized soon and to form a church. This is what they say to me.

It is the case of Philip and the Enuch, but in this case it is repeated with a group who want to unite with our association of which we are, Acts 8:29-38.

The group in San Juan had never been baptized as they had no preacher to instruct them in the full meaning of baptism. Because of this I have told them that I

would instruct them beginning Wednesday on the meaning of baptism and the constitution of the Free Will Baptist Church. So they will hear from us what we are able to say on this subject and we shall give the truth for which they are waiting.

So they are praying for us, and please come when you are able to baptize these who are in truth longing to be baptized.

There are other places also where we can go and open up by the help of God. There are precious young people here. This is a marvelous opportunity that we have.

Greet mother and Barbarita and the Honorable Elena and the brothers. Receive from me your son in the Gospel a very strong embrace.

My health is not good now, please pray for me in this particular; it is a touch of grippe.

A PROBLEM SOLVED

For a good many months we have wrestled with the problem of having good manuscripts to be crowded out of the current issue for a belated appearance in a succeeding issue, or to be thrown in the waste basket. These reports of church activities come to us from a field which include 35 or more states. They are good, but too numerous. Those thrown away do not make good advertisement for the Gem. The very atmosphere is charged with uncertainty even for those whose reports find

space in the *Gem*. One pastor advised his reporter, "Go ahead and report to the *Gem* and if your report finds the editors waste basket, don't let that discourage you."

We think we have found the solution to the very grave problem which has confronted us so long, and it will eliminate the possibility of discouraging the reporters.

We now ask all reporters, and would be reporters, to come on with your reports. Confine your reports to the activities of your church or quarterly meeting or whatever you are reporting. Leave off personal testimony; the *Gemu* readers will know

whether you love the Lord by the activity you produce in the church—besides a testimony meeting is very difficult to edit and print.

If the Gem will not hold all the reports, we will create a new department called "Gold Nuggetts" or "Spot Lights" or whatever, in which the editor will "boil down" reports, which would otherwise be left out, into highly concentrated paragraphs of honorable mention of the churches represented by the reports.

This will have some very definite advantages, and we trust will prove to be a satisfactory solution to the problem with which we have wrestled for many months.

WHEN CHANGING ADDRESS

The Free Will Baptist Gem is mailed under a second class mailing permit, therefore it is impossible for any post office to forward a copy of the *Gem* to any address. We have known certain persons to move and leave a forwarding address with their post office and expect the *Gem* to follow them. Months later, they would write and give the editor a "once over" for stopping their *Gem*.

When you change your address, write to us, giving your old address and your new address AND YOUR KEY NUMBER. This is important!

Your key number is the date when your subscription shall expire. It is printed with your name and address on every Gem you receive. Without having this key, it is very difficult for us to do anything about changing your address.

Often we are forced to ignore a reguest for a change of address because the information is incomplete. We then wait and pay two cents for an official report from the Post Office you have left. In this case, the subscriber misses a copy of the Gem, then too, all post offices do not report. The Editor does not like to be sewed up in a sack, so help him out by sending him your own notice of your change of address. Only three things are needed.

- 1. Your old address
- 2. Your new address
- 3. Your key number.

Power - Acts 1:8

By J. W. Handy, 7838 Baltimore, Houston, Texas

We wish to deal, in this brief article, with the subject of Power; having in mind the fact that power was the first and greatest evidence of the coming of the Comforter as promised by our Saviour in John 14:17.

In order that we may more fully appreciate the acquisition of power, let us first get a glimpse of the spiritual weakness of our Lord's disciples before they received power at pentecost. On the night of the betrayal, we find Peter so destitute of spiritual power that his temper overcame him and he cut off a man's ear with his sword. Just a few minutes later we find him under the pressure of a Jewish maid denying all knowledge of His Lord, and confirming it with profanity. Just here, let us leave him for a time while our Saviour goes yonder to be scourged and spat upon, to wear the cruel crown of thorns, to bear His own cross up golgotha's hill there to surrender his life on the cross that we might live, and His glorious resurrection from the tomb brought our wonderful saviour to utter the language of our text, "Ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost has come upon you" Acts 1:8.

Some fifty days have now passed since we left the apostle Peter, a cowering weakling, denying his Lord and repenting. Now we find him at pentecost with his whole being charged, as a result of his waiting before God, declaring in seventeen national languages the divinity of Him whom he

had denied (Acts 2:36), and why this great change in Peter's demeanor? He had been filled with the power and presence of the Holy Spirit. Jesus had promised them this great power and presence that they might be witnesses unto Him, both in Jesusalem and Judea and Samaria and unto the uttermost part of the earth (Acts 1:8).

Spiritual power is the heritage of every child of God. It is his to know the exceeding greatness of God's power for the believer, and to be more than conqueror in his struggles with the powers of darkness. Emerson says, "Life is a search for power". That which men most long for is power. The things we eat, the things we wear, books, pictures, institutions, machinery and wealth represents power in some form or degree, either physical, intelectual or moral.

Educational institutions are valuable, not in proportion to the amount of money expended in the building or equipment, but in proportion to the mental power which they can stimulate, and the great thinkers they can produce.

Churches are valuable, not for the outlay in the buildings or splendid forms of worship, but in proportion as they are centers of moral power for the regeneration of individuals and their salvation from evil.

The great need, both of the church and of the individual, today, is spiritual power. We fail to do what we know is right because we are spiritually weak. For this

wonderful power to overcome temptation, the believers yearns and frequently prays. David experienced this thirsting for God and for power (Psalms 42:1-2), and without this our code of moral ethics is of little value. The heathen have a religion, but it is a religion without power; and as a result the millions who blindly and ignorantly worship at the pagan shrine are degraded and miserable as if they had no religion. Real, true Christianity is a mighty, potent, dynamic power. That same mighty power that called Lazarus from the tomb, that healed Jairus' daughter, and that opened Bartemaus' blinded eyes is exactly the same power that spoke the worlds into existance. Paul must have had some fact like this in mind when He declared, "I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God unto salvation" Rom. 1:16.

Jesus, the great head of the Church, and the captain of our salvation, is declared to be the Son of God with power (Rom. 1:4). This same Jesus came with power to impart life and energy to His people. said, "I am come that they might have life and have it more abundantly" John 10:10. The greater the life the greater the power. This greater life and power is both for the individual and for the church, battling with the powers of darkness today.

Spurgeon tells us that churches are like factories, splendidly built and furnished with the most perfect machinery, but without power they are useless. The power of

the church is not materialistic but supernatural and invisible. The Spirit of God is that unseen yet mighty agency which imparts spiritual life and power to the human soul. Without it men are spiritually dead and Christianity is but a form. "Now if any man have not the spirit of Christ he is none of his." "As many as are led by the Spirit of God they are the sons of God." The Holy Spirit is the connecting link between the throne of God and the human heart, regenerating, sanctifying, and purifying the soul.

Oh, brother, sister, why is it we are not feeling out more after God? Seeking to have more of His presence in our life? Seeking to know Him and the power of His resurrection? Why do we not hunger and thirst for the presence of the Spirit since this is the means by which we are to recieve power? Why do we not talk of it, pray for it, preach concerning it? Lord is more willing to give us the Holy Spirit than we are to give our children bread (Luke 11:13). For a special and yet a general out-pouring of the Holy Spirit in this awful time of trouble when nations, one after another, are falling, and men's hearts are failing them for fear, every child of God should be pleading. Companies of God's children should be gathered together to seek special help and power from God, that we might be filled with all the fullness of God (Eph. 3:19), which is in its self the mighty power of God.

I guess it's about time I said "hello" to my friends, especially my church at Myrtle, Missouri. This leaves us well and enjoying life as much as it's possible to enjoy life in a war torn world. At times I wonder how and when it will all end, but heing a puny human being I can't see the

I had a letter from Miss Yeley, our missionary here in Venezuela a few days

I wish I could meet her, but guess that is impossible for she is 3 or 4 days journey by car from here and in some places the roads are impassable. She said she wasn't in very good health. I think those brave souls who are risking health and in some cases their very lives to help those unfortunates of foreign lands should be a shining example to those of us who selfishly do so little to help our unlearned brethern in other lands.

Just last week I talked to one of the missionaries here in this little village. She

is so happy in her work, and it isn't for pay because they get very little. Her face fairly shone as she told about the little girls and boys in her Bible class; also the grown-ups. She is refusing to go home for her vacation because she is afraid she can't come back. She lives in Norman, Oklahoma. She says anything else would not satisfy her half as well as telling these poor people of Christ and teaching them other things that we at home take for granted.

I went to the village here yesterday to buy some things and passed a school house It's front door opened right on the side-The sidewalk is about 3 feet wide. no porch nor any screen; the little boys and girls sitting on straight homemade chairs; the seats of cow hide with the hair still on the hide; no desks; their books on the floor under their chairs; the blackboard about 3 feet wide and 6 feet long, just like a homemade table top nailed on the I couldn't help but compare that to our modern school houses at home, and the careless attitude we take and how some of us, especially the young ones, fail to take advantage of the great opportunities offered them, while our cousins across sea have so little. That makes me so glad I am an American and I feel that to give my life for my country would be a small price to pay for the grand country that's ours.

I thank God every day that He has given us our great land and I wish each American would thank Him and ask his guidance as to what we should do. I believe prayer would stop all wars—prayer and obedience to God's commands.

I guess everybody is thinking of the Missouri State Association. I still plan to be home by then if not hindered some way. I am still feasting my soul on the wonderful sermons I heard last year. This was my first time to attend a State Association.

I wish so much I could get the Gem. I had the January and February numbers but that's all. I enjoy it so much. My mother-in-law gets so much enjoyment out of the Gem. now that she's a shut-in most of the time, and also my mother and grandmother. Grandmother is now 80 and in poor health, but I am asking God to spare all my dear ones and us until we get home.

The rainy season is starting now. The grass is shooting up and the tree's in the jungle blooming. There's a tree that's covered with yellow blossoms that's the first to bloom when the rains start. The seasons aren't the same here that they were the first time I was here. The rains have started earlier.

Every few days we see lots of airplanes flying over and several times they have stopped at our local airport for the night. My brother-in-law and his partner are building a big airport now, and have it almost finished. I hope what I have just said about the airport won't be cut out by the censor, still sometimes we say things that if the right person read it, it would aid the enemy.

I guess I have told enough this time. I want to ask the prayers of all God's people for the dear boys—members of my Sunday school class—who have joined the army to help keep our homes for us. May they return safely to us is my constant prayer. God bless you all is the prayer of your sister in Christ.
