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A BRIEF HISTORY OF MONETT CHURCH

The Free Will Baptist Church of Monett, Missouri was organized on January 7, 1932 during a wonderful revival meeting conducted by Rev. Winford Davis and Rev. O. T. Allred. Twelve charter members formed the church and members were added daily until the close of the meeting when a total of 26 members were on record.

The little church elected Brother Allred as pastor, and he has served well in that capacity ever since. Marie Atwell was the first clerk and Myrtle Alyea treasurer.

The church purchased a church building on the corner of Third and Bond Streets. God so wonderfully blessed, spiritually and financially, that the church was soon paid for, and only recently about \$2,000.00 has been spent remodeling the building. The church now has a very nice place to worship and an ever growing interest and progress is maintained by the worshippers,

The names of those who have served as church clerk are: Mrs. Marie Massey Atwell, Mrs. Elsie Keeton Kennedy, Mrs. Marguerite Metcalf Swaffar, Mrs. Bertha Hunt, and the present clerk, Mrs. Flossie Jones.

The present trustees are Will Gates and Eddie Jones, however Rass Matthews, and J. M. Alyea have served in this capacity in the past.

Elisha Eagle and Archie Calton were ordained as the first deacons, and later Ben Hunt, W. K. Weston, W. B. Fredrick, and George La Shum were ordained. The present board of deacons are: Ross Thomas, Will Gates, Dave Phillips and Eddie Jones.

Five members of the church have been ordained to the gospel ministry, four of whom are still active members. They are: W. B. Fredrick, W. K. Weston, Claude Timmons and Charles Hatfield. Lucy Deckard Friend has removed her membership. The following ordained ministers have joined the church by letter, and are now active members: O. T. Allred, John B. Rollins, Kenneth Turner, Frank Linton, and Rowena Thomas.

Christ for the Youth

NOTE — This message was delivered to the Young People's Group at the National Tabernacle 6440 Piney Branch Road, N. W., Washington D. C. on the evening of March 28, 1943.

My message tonight is divided into two parts. The setting of the first is found in the fourteenth through the nineteenth chapters of St. John. We will touch very lightly on the points in these chapters for time will not permit studying them thoroughly. We could stand here all night and not be able to fully sound the depths of the wonderful message contained therein.

We will take up where Jesus' ministry on earth is almost completed —. He walked the shores of Galilee healing the sick, raising the dead, opening the eyes that could not see; and now He is almost ready to return to the Father. His purpose on earth is almost finished — He has been tempted, and has suffered all things in order to help us when we are tempted, and now we see Him the night before His entanglement with those who sought to take His life.

We read in these chapters those wonderful words He spoke to His disciples - especially that wonderful prayer, in the seventeenth chapter, just before Judas came with those who were to take Him. There is something about that chapter that touches our very heart strings. In the opening of the eighteenth chapter, we see Him crossing the brook Cedron into the garden where He often went. Shortly thereafter came Judas with those who were to take Him. Nay, with those with whom He was to go, for no man could take Him. At any time during His ministry here. He had the angels at His command, but He went willingly because He was dying for lost men. Dear friends, it was for us that Jesus was going that night to Pilot's Hall to be accused unjustly—it was love that made Him do it. Look at Him going out to meet those whom He knew were to beat Him, scourge Him, and even spit upon Him; but He went willingly for He had already won the real battle on His knees in the Garden of Gethsemane. It was there the real fight had been fought and won when He sweat "as it were great drops of blood."

Judas betrayed Him with a kiss, and they led Him away. All of His disciples. excepting Peter and one other, had forsaken Him. Peter only followed Him afar off, and in the end denied Him. Look at Him, young people, as He faces the angry mob - earthly friends had turned Him down but He never hesitated. The purpose for which He came must be accomplished. They spit upon Him, they whipped Him, they mocked and scourged Him, and then crowned Him with thorns, but He uttered not a word. "He was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities: the chastisement of our peace was upon him; and with his stripes we are healed." (Isaiah 53:5). When they started to climb to Golgotha, they compelled Simon to bear His cross. Today, dear friends, we as young people have a cross to bear for Jesus.

"Must Jesus bear the cross alone, And all the world go free, No! there's a cross for everyone, And there's a cross for me."

Now, we come to the second part of my message in which I will present to you some Bible characters who are excellent examples of serving God in their youth. No doubt, you are familiar with these persons, so we will not take up too much time with them but will just bring them to your mind at this time. It seems to be a common error among young people to feel that it is all right to put off salvation until one is old

or ready to depart this life, but the examples I shall bring to you all served the Lord while they were young.

Our first example is Solomon, the man who wrote that very familiar scripture, "Remember now thy Creator in the days of thy youth, while the evil days come not nor the years draw nigh, when thou shalt say, I have no pleasure in them." (Eccl. 12:1) And in the chapter preceding that, "Rejoice, O Young man, in thy youth; and let thy heart cheer thee in the days of thy youth, and walk in the ways of thine heart, and in the sight of thine eyes: but know thou that for all these things God will bring thee into judgment" (Eccl. 11:9).

Another example from the Old Testament is found in 2 Kings 22:1. Josiah was eight years old when he began to reign, and he reigned thirty-one years. "And he did that which was right in the sight of the Lord, and walked in all the ways of David his father, and turned not aside to the right hand or to the left."

You may ask why we are using examples from the Old Testament. Our answer will be found in Hebrews 10:11, "Now all these things happened unto them for ensamples: and they are written for our admonition, upon whom the ends of the world are come." But we also present to you two examples from the New Testament, our first one being Timothy. Paul, in writing to Timothy, instructed him thus: "Let no man despise thy youth, but be thou an example of the believers, in word, in conversation, in charity, in spirit, in faith, in purity." (1st. Tim. 4:12). Timothy was a young man that had been converted under Paul's preaching. (1st. Tim. 1:2, 18).

Our last, but by no means the least example is Jesus Himself. At the early age of twelve, we find Him in the temple talking with the Doctors of the Law. But, you say, we read nothing more of His life until He enters into His work at the age of thirty—what did He do all those years in between? We have no information concerning those years. Jesus said of Himself, "Think not that I am come to destroy the law, or the prophets; I am not come to destroy, but to fulfil." (Matt. 5:17). A man could not become an high priest until he

was thirty years old, and Jesus had come to be our High Priest. I believe He returned to the carpenter shop with Joseph and worked until He was thirty years old, for we read, "And he went down with them and came to Nazareth, and was subject unto them." He was obedient unto Mary and Joseph, and I am sure, He served the Lord diligently during those years until He set out to accomplish the purpose for which He came.

Jesus became our High Priest—today He is interceding for us because He understands every temptation, every burden. He is able to help us when we are tempted, discouraged and almost overwhelmed with the cares of life. We should think of Him as One who understands and wants to help, for is He not that? Yea, and more—Jesus is all that we require, as we often hear Dr. McNeil say.

I trust this message has in some measure brought the blessing to you that it brought to me while preparing it. If it has occomplished that in a small measure then the time spent in preparing and bringing it to you has not been in vain.

Financing Our National Work

At the 1941-Session of the National Association there was reported a total of \$7,414.98 received by all departments of the organization. A year later in the annual session of the Association which was held in Columbus, Mississippi, a total of \$15,260.33 was reported - a gain of more than 100 per cent over the previous year. At the end of the first half of the present year the receipts to all departments amounted to \$15,985.46 which is an increase of \$725.13 over the previous year's receipts. is however a concession to be made: Of the amount received for the first six months of this year, \$950.00 of the amount was collected for room and board from students in the Free Will Baptist Bible School. But this amount subtracted from the total receipts for the half-year places us within \$224.87 of the goal attained in 1942. Free Will Baptists are really beginning to do things.

As one studies, however, the financial report published herewith, he will find many gaps which challenge, if not reproach, us. Many of the states show no contributions whatever to Home Missions and Superannuation. These two departments call for earnest and thoughtful consideration. Those blank columns in the report will doubtless depress the hearts of many loyal Free Will Baptists. There is no use to say that the Home Mission Board or the Superannuation Board deserves censure for the nonsupport of these phases of our national work - the responsibility is with the Denomination. The Denomination has produced these boards, and these boards will come to their own in the leadership which they will offer our people in their respective phases of work. The present year is destined to mark the beginning of greater things for Superannuation and Home Missions.

The Foreign Mission treasury shows receipts for the first half of the present year in the amount of \$4,139.82 which is only \$425.51 short of the goal of last year. Free Will Baptists everywhere are awakening to the world's need of salvation. Many insist upon promoting Home Missions, but those who are really missionary obviously abound in the support of Foreign Missions. There is no phase of our work which is fraught with greater quickening power than our Foreign Mission program.

The Bible School of Nashville, Tennessee, is now a historic fact. The Free Will Paptist Denomination owns the property totally free of encumbrance. In the advancement of this cause, we have spent \$14,354.76 during the first six months of the present associational year. The present enrollment of students is fifteen. We couldn't have asked for more. All of these are first year students in every sense of the term. Next year, these students will advance to second year work and others will come in for first-year training. Free Will Baptists are conservative people, and our Bible School is definitely conservative. It is conservative doctrinely; it is conservative socially; it is conservative financially. An investment in the training of Christian workers is the best investment any Christian can make.

The Unified Program Fund and the Auxiliary Fund will be recognized as a source of support to all of our enterprises. From these two sources, there has gone during the first six months of the year \$2,085.09 Please observe that most of the states have contributed some amount through these

channels. On a comparative basis, it should be noted that our National Treasurer, Brother Van Hoose, paid to the treasurers of those boards which received the Unified Fund last year \$2,169.05 and that he has paid to those treasurers during the first six months of this year \$1,322.15. (For whom it may concern, May I report that the Executive Department received a total of \$1,200.00 during the half-year.) The Auxiliary Treasurer reported receipts in the amount of \$977.42 last year, and \$333.53 for the first half of this year. I have no doubt that the amount raised last year

will more than be equaled this year. Blessings on woman's work.

As one reviews the last item in the financial report, a worthy sense of achievement may justly be enjoyed. A credible balance is found in all of our treasuries totaling \$4,377.33.

Free Will Baptists have a plenty of money, and they are revealing their Christian devotion by the use of which they make of it. The place and right to live as a Christian denomination is exhibited in our services to a lost world. Money is a means to an end, and not the end in itself.

Joint Sessions of National Boards

A group of important boards of the National Association of Free Will Baptists met in Nashville, Tennessee, April 13th and 14th which conferred in a joint session regarding matters of our common cause, then each board held separate sessions for the advancement of their respective departments of activity.

The Executive Committee of the General Board, the Foreign Mission Board, the Board of Education, the Chairman of the Board of Superannuation, the Executive Secretary of the National Association, and Miss Yeley, a returned missionary from Venezuela, made up the personnel of the general session. Also Miss Barnard, missionary to India, was an active counsellor in the meeting. The membership of all these boards was a widely scattered representation of our entire National Association. Those in attendance were: Joe Fort and C. B. Thompson from Texas, Chester Pelt and L. R. Ennis from North Carolina, Bert F. Rogers and Melvin Bingham from Oklahoma, Mrs. Elsie Curtis from Illinois, Miss Bessie Yeley and W. J. Sheppard from Chio, Miss Laura Belle Barnard, Henry Melvin, J. R. Davidson, J. E. Hudgens, and L. C. Johnson from Tennessee, and F. C. Zinn, James F. Miller. Winford Davis and Rollins from Missouri

A consideration of the 1943 Session of the National Association resulted in the conclusion that regardless of all the adverse circumstances which tend to incourage it, the National Association should not be post poned this year. The East Nashville Church was deeply embarrassed to be forced to revise its invitation to the National Association to include lodging and breakfast, only, to the delegation which will be done gladly, without the \$2.00 registration fee for each person receiving entertainment. Concerning this, the following measures were drafted and adopted:

"Whereas the East Nashville Free Will Baptist Church invited the National Association to hold its 1943 Session within her sacred precincts, and finds, in consequence of the national food rationing program, that lodging in the homes of her members together with breakfast served each morning is necessarily and regretably the extent of those courtesies for which her gracious members have become known, this Executive Committee does hereby advise:

- 1. That visitors requiring entertainment by the host church be requested not to attend.
- 2. That district delegates be requested to assign their power of representation to their state association delegates, except in those states in which there is no state organization, such district delegates being requested to attend as formerly.
 - 3. That all delegates and ministers be

advised through our church papers to assume financial responsibility for their dinner and supper, daily, in the eating places of the city."

Superannuation was discussed at length. and some very acceptable plans were analyzed. The Executive Secretary was authorized to work with the Board of Superannuation to draft the plans for presentation at the 1943 session of the National Asso-The general plan is to direct state associations in the charitable superannuation service to aged and retired ministers of their respective states, and that the Superannuation Board of the National Association will meet the younger and active ministers on half-way ground in its offer of protective service in the form of annuity against a future day of disability and retirement. The Board of Superannuation is destined to create some very keen

enthusiasm at the coming session of the National Association

The Executive Committee drafted a program for the 1943 session of the National Association, and left it in the hands of the Executive Secretary for literary completion and to otherwise prepare it for publication The program calls for the association to close Thursday noon of the week of the session, and it will not be a preaching parade, but will include only three sermons and a short inspirational message with each major report. sessions will proceed for the best interests and the advancement of the cause of our Lord.

The departmental boards held their sessions separately and will report their counsels under the auspices of their departments of work.

Among the states of the South is the great State of Alabama. It is great because of its geographic situation, its climate, its industries, and its people; but most of all because of its religion. And after all, there is no factor or potency which more vitally affects the life of a people than does their religion. Religion is the highest exercise of the soul in quest of God, and those who through God's perseverance and their own persistence have immerged by the light of the Scriptures into His fullness are destined to rule the world. They are now by Jesus Christ its light. Among these are about 20,000 Free Will Baptists in Ala-How great is their light? mighty their power?

The Christian Workers' Institute is committed to the hope of a revival through teaching the Word, witnessing to the Spirit's fullness, and communing with the saint. It is in this interest that this second session of the Institute is to be held in Alabama. That fellowship which is essential to power among all Christian bodies is greatly needed among Free Will Baptists,

and this training school affords it as nothing we have found. Our general associational meetings are too soon over and too much occupied with business to admit of those heart-searching discourses at Jesus' feet.

Please come to Leeds June 7-18. Those from junior age (12 years) up will find classes planned especially for them. Free Will Baptist League, Sunday School, Evangelism, Missions, Bible Survey, Bible Doctrine, Public Discourse, and Free Will Baptist Organization—all will be offered according to a daily schedule by a select group of teachers.

The town of Leeds, Alabama, is situated nineteen miles east of Birmingham on the Bankhead highway, and those traveling by bus or automobile will find no difficulty in locating the town and the Free Will Baptist Church. Reverend William H. Ryland is pastor and will be on the grounds to show every courtesy to students and visitors.

Applications for enrollment should be attended with the required registration

fee of \$1.00 and sent to the pastor of the church at the earliest possible date. Reservations for lodging will thereupon be made in the homes of the gracious members of the host church. Everyone is requested to bring his ration stamps, in order that food may be pooled sufficient for the required meals. It is estimated by brother Ryland that the cost of board will be approximately \$1.00 per day. Should it be less only the actual cost would be required. The host church and

pastor are making every essential preparation for the comfort of the faculty and student body, and it is hoped that this second session in Alabama may mark the beginning of a great spiritual awakening among the people of our beloved Denomination.

Rev. Winford Davis, Chair.-Treas. National Board, Monett Mo.

We have enjoyed a very fine session of our Foreign Mission Board which assembled in our school building at Nashville, Tennessee. We first met in a joint session with the Executive Committee and the Board of Education which was very pleasant, and then we had a fine session of our own. Each member of our Board was present, and stayed until we were entirely through. This is the first time we have had a 100% attendance for a number of years.

Several things of importance was transacted which, I am sure, is of interest to all. Sister Bessie Yeley, our returned missionary from Venezuela, was authorized to go to Cuba just as soon as she can get her passport. She is to assist Brother and Sister Willey in the work there.

We voted to launch an effort to get some native missionaries in India to go into the Purnea District and start a work there. You will recall that Sister Laura Belle Barnard secured permission, while in India, for the Free Will Baptists to launch an effort in that district, and then while she was home on her furlough and at the same time securing workers to return to the field with her, the war conditions closed the door in our face. We have received information that perhaps we can get some native missionaries to go to work there while we are so hindered from getting our own workers across.

We also heard with great interest the report of Brother Henry Melvin who has recently made a survey of our work in Cuba. His report was most interesting. It was also very inspirational to see the motion pictures of the work which he took while down there. We feel Brother Melvin's trip to Cuba has been of great value to our work. Surely it was timely, and money

well spent. Brother Melvin has returned, as you will notice by his own report in the papers, very enthusiastic over our work in Cuba.

Another matter we are trying to get across to our people is that we might become better organized as to the receiving of funds and the making of our monthly reports to the papers. Each state is requested to have a treasurer of foreign missions Then each contributor in the respective states will send the foreign mission contributions to the state treasurer. He (or she) will make an itemized report to our church papers each month in which will be stated the name of each individual or organization which gives and the amount given. The state treasurer will then send the entire amount in one sum to me as National Treasurer. My report will be as from the various states. In other words I will say North Carolina, so much. Oklahoma, so much, Michigan, so much, and so on, you see.

Now if you do not have a treasurer of fereign mission funds in your state, then won't you please co-operate with us in doing your best to get one elected? However there are several states which already have their state treasurer, and for this we are glad. We urge you to co-operate with your state treasurer, if your state happens to have one. Although do not

with hold your contribution by any means just because you may not have a state treasurer. Send it right on in to us; but in the mean time let's be working toward this goal as we have tried to explain it to you. So far as we know the states which do have Foreign Mission Treasurers are North Carolina, Oklahoma, Michigan, Missouri, Tennessee, and perhaps Texas. There may be others we do not know. May the Lord bless in this effort.

Several other smaller items of interest were transacted, and then we adjourned late Wednesday afternoon, April 14th, happy and feeling that the Lord had truly been with us in a most gracious way. Certainly the Lord is blessing our denominational missionary program wonderfully. Oh may we please increase our giving to this worthy cause. God's approval upon it is so very evident may we not fail to be labourers together with God.

It was indeed a joy to have the privilege of visiting the school. Personally it was the first time I had been privileged to visit the school since it was opened last September. We were treated most royally by our school president and wife, Brother and Sister Johnson, by the other members of the faculty, the students and by other of our good Free Will Baptists of the city of Nashville. We returned home feeling it was good to have been there.
