GOSPEL SERMONS

The Body of Christ

Elder B. F. Brown, Cassville, Mo.

"For by one Spirit are we all baptized into one body" — 1Cor. 12:13.

The Apostle Paul is here speaking directly to the church at Corinth; but his message is not for Corinth alone; and when he says, "We all," he could mean all those who are baptized into the "one body" by the "one Spirit," not only at Corinth but everywhere, even to include us of today.

In Paul's first epistle to the Corinthians he says in chapter one verse 2: "Unto the Church of God, which is at Corinth, to them that are sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be saints, with all that in every place call upon the name of Jesus Christ our Lord, both theirs and ours." Peter addressed his second epistle "to them that have obtained a like precious faith." Jude addressed his epistle "to them that are sanctified by God the Father, and prescrved in Jesus Christ, and called." Certainly these instructive, inspiring messages are for us — the "we all" surely includes you and me: "For by one Spirit are we all baptized into one body."

BAPTIZED BY THE SPIRIT

Yes, we have all been baptized into the

"one body" by the "one Spirit." We were once Gentiles (or Jews) and servants of Satan; but we have been transformed and become willing and obedient servants of God,by the renewing of our minds that we "may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect will of God" (Rom. 12:2). We now have the mind of Christ (1 Cor. 2:16; Phil. 2:5), and can think the thoughts of God, which are written for our consideration and can understand the Holy Scriptures, at least that part which was written for us.

Since only dead bodies are buried, and since baptism suggests there has been a death before the baptism by the Spirit. By the baptism of death (Rom. 6:3,4), we are baptized with Christ into death, and buried with Him, which our baptism in water symbolizes, Surely then if our old life, now dead and buried with Christ, was wholly sinful our new life, to which we rise with our risen Saviour by the power of the Spirit, must be altogether a holy life.

Now when we go back to "those things whereof we are ashamed" (Rom. 6:21), we deny our resurrection with H im to newness of life, and "forget that we have been purged from our old sins" (2 Peter 1:9 When we think of these things, it may seem strange to us that truly born again Christians will go back again to sinful things of the old life, yet we know that many do that very thing. It is because we walk in the coursel of the god of this world, or in the coursel of the ungodly (read Psalm 1).

We have been born again by the power of God the Spirit (John 1:1?; 3:5), and become the sons of God, let us then, be led by the Spirit (Rom. 8:14), and show to all about us that we are the sons of God.

THERE IS ONE BODY

Yes, we are "all baptized into one body." Paul says (Eph. 4:4), "There is one body, and one Spirit, even as ye are called in one hope of your calling" — One body, one Spirit, one hope. If we are in this "one body" which is the bedy of Christ, led and upheld by the "one Spirit," which is the power of a Christian life, we have hope, otherwise there is no hope; that is why there is only "one hope."

This "one body" is the true Church, "the Church of the firstborn," whose names "are written in heaven" (Heb. 12:23). Into this "one body," the true Church, we are born by baptism by the Holy Spirit. This means that all we have and are is consecrated to God - devoted to Him and given into His care and keeping, nothing held back. Satan would like to destroy this unity; so sends out his false teachers to publish his false dectrines, by which many are deceived and much wheat becomes tares, because of Satan's untiling efforts there are many fowl among the branches of the mustard tree. There are many members of the visible church who are Christians only in name. There are many children "of the wicked one" among the children of the kingdom" (Matt. 13:36-43).

The Lord has made ample provision for the welfare and edification of this "one body;" for within the body of Christ, the true Church, there are God called, Spirit filled prophets, evangelists, pastors and teachers: "For the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ: till we all come in unity of the faith, of the knowledge of the Son of God. unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ" (Eph. 4:11-13. "If ye know these things, happy are ye if ye do them" (Jro. 13:17). We cannot satisfy God, nor even ourselves, with anything we try to do in the power of the flesh; but if Christ be "the hidden man of the heart" (1 Peter 1:4) and we fully trust and obey Him, He will strengthen us and we can do all things through Him, just let go, and let Him.

CHRIST HEAD OF THE BODY

Now this "one body" would be incomplete, even helpless and perhaps useless, without a head; but it has a head, which is none other than the Lord Jesus Himself. Christ is the Head of the church and He is Saviour of the body" (Eph. 5:23). Much is required of the Church; but Jesus said in Matt. 28:18, "All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth." This "all power" is freely given unto all who are willing to go in obedience to His will and commands.

Christ is far away to them that believe not; but to all true believers He is closer than near, He lives in them.

All members of the true Church "are members of His body, of His flesh and of His bones, and they two shall be one flesh" (Eph. 5: 39-31). He and she the Head and the members form but one Christ. "For as the body is one, and hath many members, and all the members of that one body, being many, are one body: so also is Christ" (1 Cor. 12:12).

Comparison of a Christian and a Soldier

Rev. Ray Markly Siloam Springs, Ark. of the John Brown University

(1) As it is an offence against the government, so is it an offence against God to fail to answer His call. (Consecration) Rom. 12:1-8

(2) In the same way the government

gives a soldier a blood test; God gives a person a blood test to see if he has the Blood of Christ covering him.

(3) Just as the government classifys a prospective soldier, God classifys us. (How

do you rank?)

(4) A Christian, like a soldier, often gives up his home, wife, business, and many comforts of life in order to be in the full service of the Lord.

(5) The government examines a prospective soldier. God also examines a Christian to see if he has certain defects before He places him in responsible service. (A careless, worldly Christian can not qualify.)

(6) If accepted, they teach him a field he can fill. In the same way God teaches you after He calls you before He puts you in certain service. Jesus had a preparation period.

(7) After getting some "book learning" or education they put some to work with experience. A flyer, for example, is told what all the instruments are for and how to use them. This is learned from books and classes. But it is made clearer as they are shown in a plane. However, they do not just "run across" it before going into this special service but get acquainted with all the instruments they will use. A Christian, in like manner, will have book (Bible) learning. Also practice before going into this special service. Then after enough training and a final review you are sent to special service. Likewise, so is a Christian.

(8) If a soldier does not reverance and obey those in command he is punished; often K. P. If we do not respect and obey God's Word we will be punished. Gal. 6:7

(9) A soldier is to never question his commander's word or order. What he is told to do, regardless how useless it seems, he is expected to do it. We are to never question God's Word regardless what we think. Matt. 8:9

(10) Just as the soldier has a uniform issued to him by the government; God gives us an armor-uniform. Description Eph. 6:10-18

(11) A soldier does not gradually leave his home and civilian life in which he is accustomed to and gradually grow into the army life. Neither should a Christian gradually give up his old habits. He should cut them off; not taper off!

(12) There are some soldiers who do no more than necessary and yet get along. Sad to say, but there are Christians who do the same.

(13) There are some basic things all soldiers learn regardless of what type of service he will be in. A Christian is trained in certain basic spiritual matters also.

(14) How reliable is the soldier, that never listens to his officer or instructor, but is all the time telling him why he can not and does not learn and obey his commands or instructions? Some Christians are the same way. They like to pray and tell the Lord all their troubles and why they aren't better Christians, but they seldom want to know what God wants them to do. If they did, they would read His. Word, because prayer is a means for you to talk to God and reading the Bible is God talking to you.

(15) A soldier while in training is to eat the right food and do the right things, that will fit him for better active service, So is a Christian to eat the right food, the Word of God. (Matt.4:4), and to practice its laws.

(16) It is for the soldier never to start; than to start and then decide he doesn; want to be a soldier. It is better for the Christian never to start and then turn back.

(17) If a soldier does not know how to use his weapons he may be killed; or, he may harm himself. In the case of a sword he could cut himself badly. In the same way a Christian must know how to use his weapons: the sword of the Spirit, the

(18) In the same way a soldier goes over; a Christian is often called by God to go over to the other races. But their call is to show them life; not death.

(19) Every soldier is to see that the American flag stays up. If the flag-bearer is shot another takes his place and bears it. It is not to touch the ground. In the same manner, we are to lift up Christ and His Blood Stained Banner. That is our flag. John 12:32

(20) As the soldier relies on his armaments, so is a Christian to rely on God and what weapons He has furnished: prayer with its great power, His word (thesword), testimonics, His promises, and His power to keep them.

(21) A soldier on the enemies territory is on very dangerous ground. Likewise, a Christian on the devils territory.

(22) A brave soldier never considers danger. Neither does a brave Christian. (Are you brave?) Phil. 4:6

(23) A true soldier who loves and stands for what he is fighting for never considers compromising. If you are a Christian who loves Christ and stands for His teachings; you should never compromise with the world or any of the devil's things.

(24) A soldier fights to kill but a Christian Fights to live. (Mainly to live spiritually.)

(25) When a soldier is in action and accomplishes a great amount of good he

receives honors and a lot of praise from his side. The Christian is praised and rewarded by God and His people, when they accomplish a great amount of good and victery. (Leading one lost soul to Christ is much accomplished.)

(27) A satisfied soldier is of less value than one who is dissatisfied. For the one wip is dissatisfied will try to change the matter. A Christian who is satisfied with present conditions is of less value than one who is dissatisfied with the present situation, for, he will try to change it.

(27) Just as the soldier is willing to give up his life rather than give up what he is fighting for, likewise will the Christian. He would rather give up his life than his Lord and Saviour and His great promises.

(28) A group of soldiers who have a good morale can really go. They are hard to stop. They get something done. The same of a Christian. A band of Christians who are of one accord, loving, obedient, and having zeal will accomplish something worth while. But the ones who only strive, argue, and fight will accomplish little.

(29) If a country and her people are neutral, then she and her people have not the help and favor of any nation at war. If she would join one or the other, that one would help her and she would share the benifits of that nation. In the same way a person must not be neutral. If they are neutral, a good moral person, they do not get the pleasure of either.

gifts will live forever. It has been truthfully said, "There can be no immorality without generosity. Men live forever only if they give forever." In the Unified offering the consecration prayer can correctly be ended-"for Jesus sake."

There are those who give as the pharisees gave, the tithe, (Luke 11:42) but that is not enough. We must exceed what they did if we expect to live the happiest and most profitable christian life, and if we expect to get to heaven. (Matt. 5:20). We worship the heavenly ones and lay up treasures in heaven when we give a real offering, above the tithe, to the One who is the fulfillment of the Law. Carry your tithe and offering to God's store house, then there will be enough money for all things needed: To help the needy, to pay the minister, to care for current church expenses, and to give to every worthy cause through the Unified Program. Souls will be saved and fed from such a ministery. We believe first in seeking the Kingdom of God and then things will be added or come in their proper time and place. "Look right at souls, but wrong at things and and you miss most of God. Look right at things and wrong at souls and again you miss God. When both are seen in the light of God you walk in the light as he is in it." So don't get to concerned about things, but the thing to do is to get concerned about giving God His right place in your things and thoughts.

Again Christ, with the Cross in . ther. His voice needs to speak to us when money talks in all the known languages of men-in a world in which money talks mamon, we are to talk Christ. We propose to talk no more than Christ in talking about the Unified Program. "Love ever gives and where it lives, it gives." (John Oxenham) You do not love Jesus Christ if you do not love in giving unto Him. It is when we are giving in'Jesus that we are living in Jesus. Taking an offering is not an anticlimax,, but the proper issue of the religion of our Redeemer. The outcome of our income must be the success of Christ's cause. The gift of eternal life is everlasting. giving. There is a relationship between the economic and the eternal. The way one uses his finance shows his real fineness.

My prayer has been for Free Will Baptist that they will not be overcome by benevolent needs, but will see the real issue in giving money, that is for the salvation of souls through evangalism. So far Free Will Baptist have responded more easily to the visual than the vital. We should all pray for the day to come when Free Will Baptist will say it is no longer I-but Christ. Christ lives in us and ours. Paul said if you are look-

ing for me I am no longer here. This is Christ. This is Christ talking. So may we walk and talk as Christ directs. Christ must have control of our minds, moods, motives. methods, and money. When Christ is alpha and omega and central in our lives He is also over our cash. Shylock said, "You take my life when you take the means whereby I live." There is more to life than money but precious little to life without it. Life is abundant through Christ. John 3:16 is a great statement. "God so loved the world that He gave His-" This is not just a message to be delivered by preachers, but a practical program for all life. A God is on the giving hand, who loves us so much that He gives us the love to give to Him; not to us be the glory. We then give unto Christ our substance for that we hope for.

As I close this article, I bow my head in prayer, literally, asking God's blessings to attend these lines that have been given to me. If you will think deeply about the things written you will be less inclined to cover your defenseless heads with the shadow of your own wings. The shadow of your wings. The shadow that isn't enough. We stand in need of the Eternal; Unto Him we look, love, live and give.



Direct From the Cuban Mission Field


I am writing this to you from our Mission Field in Cuba. Having just landed here in Pinor Del Rio, Friday night at 10:00 oclock the 14th of April. We had a splendid trip down, made all connections perfectly. The Lord went before us in a very difinite way. We do praise His name for it.

You will notice the figures at the head-\$18,000 needed during 1944-45, I ing. have not been prompted to express this need only since I came here; for I knew the need before I came. However I am more keenly conscious of it now, though I have only been here three days. Have only visited one of our fields since landing. That was our church at Sabalo, yesterday, (Sunday). We went most of the way by train, then on in to the church by ox cart. A distance of three miles. It was a convention day and people were there from as far as forty miles. The services of the day were charterized by much singing, testimony, and preaching service. I brought a message in the afternoon through Bro. Willey acting as interpreter. At the close of the message I made an appeal and nine precious souls

came and kneeled in the altar thus making a sincere and difinite start for the Lord. They are people with no back ground what so-ever in the way of Christian knowledge. They will be taught by their pastor, Pedro Royo and held on probation for a period of six months before baptism. It was a great day in the Free Will Baptist Mission Field of Cuba.

Yes, we must have money, more money. Ch! that our people of means would get the VISION. Here is our Cuban school of Missions with only seven students now; but a prospect for 30 or 40 students another year, if you will only make it financially possible. We are soon going to need more land for our school and mission center. Some of our stations here need chapels badly. We now need a couple more horses, we are also in desparate need of another American man on the field to assist Bro. Willey for he is doing two or three mens work.

While I have touched upon a few of the many needs of Cuba I have said nothing of other needs. Suppose the door to India should suddenly open; what great demands would then be made on our treasury.



Then, too, the need of promoting the Foreign Mission cause among our people in the states. We must have means of arousing interest, literature, tracts, itinerates, etc. Certainly we must have funds.

Wife and I expect to be here until about We greatly desire the middle of May. your prayers while we are here.

If you do not receive a receipt for your contribution as quickly as usual remember I am in Cuba. Please be patient, when I

return you shall have due acknowledgment. Your donation will be in safe keeping until my return. Just continue to send them on to Monett as usual.

May the Lord bless you all back in the states.

Report from Miss VanSyoc

Many of you have been asking concern- young people there, and there is great ing the new missionary in Cuba and what her reactions are to the field. Perhaps you'd enjoy hearing first handed.

I arrived in Cuba, Febuary 27, and immediately liked the country. It is beautiful, the hills and the palms. I feel right at home and have felt that way since I arrived. It is the place appointed by God.

My chief difficulty, of course, is that 1 cannot speak Spanish. It is a real handıcap when I meet our people. Pray that the Lord will help me grasp the language quickly.

I have met many people and like them. One Thursday night, I went to Rio Seco to visit Miss Yealey. I gave my testimony at the Young Peoples' Meeting. Of course, Miss Yealey had to translate. I think there were nearly one hundred people at the meeting. She has a fine group of opportunity for the furtherance of the Gospel with all ages.

The school for training native workers is something that you may all be proud of. I have never seen a finer group of young people. They have a good teacher. He is a Cuban and understands his people and is well trained. You should all rejoice that your money is helping support such a cause.

I started teaching the Willey children the second week I was here. We have been working hard because they had not had much of this years work. I like Tommy and Barbara and am enjoying teaching them. To me, it seems almost as if we were playing school, with only two pupils, but to them it seems very like work.

This certainly is a needy field and I thank God for the way He led me to it.

The realization of the great need here struck deeply today. This is Good Friday. I went with the children down town to see the parade. I think three-fourths of the population of Pinar del Rio was in it. The altar boys led, with girls dressed in white, from the parochial school following. Then came a number of women dressed in white bearing a glass casket with the statue of Christ wrapped in white. On further were men carrying the statue of Mary dressed in black, a handkerchief in her hand and tears painted on her cheeks.

The day was very quiet because they believe that Christ is dead.

One little girl said, "On Thursday, God is sick and on Friday He dies."

Thank God that Christ died once for cur sins, but today He is living, an intercessor to whom we can go any time.

Pray much for each of us that we may be used in that capacity which He has prepared for us.

How do I like Cuba? I feel almost guilty, enjoying so much being a missionary.

Lieutenant Goodwin Saves a Comrade

IN THE FIRST REAL BATTLE HE HAD EVER SEEN, LIEUTENANT WALfound himself in the TON GOODWIN thickest of the fight. His platoon of light tanks was well ahead of other United States units in this engagement on the Tunisan front

anti-tank fire soon knocked German out two of the machines, while Goodwin's own tank hit a mine and was wrecked. As they escaped from the wrecked machine Goodwin used smoke grenades to hide their movements while some of the men ran to a nearby scout car. But as they reached the car it was struck by a German shell and two of the men were killed. A third managed to crawl 20 yards, with his leg nearly severed.

Goodwin crawled through the hail of gunfire to the side of his wounded comrade, but he saw that his friend's shattered leg needed to be amputated before he could be removed from the field So from a first-aid kit he administered morphine and applied sulfanilimide to the wound and then amputated the leg with a pocket knife.

Then he put the wounded man on his shoulder and started to run for cover. And they remained silent until Lieutenant Gcodwin had crossed the brow of the hill with his burden and was out of range of the guns. So the Germans themselves showed their respect and confideration for this boy who was risking his life to save his wounded comrade.

Goodwin was immediately made commander of his company in recognition of this act of heroism. It is no wonder

that our brave boys are winning victories when they manifest such courage as this where the shells are flying thickest. Another Hero not only risked His life to save someone, but gave His life for them. And it was not a friend, but one of His enemies that He gave His life to save. That Man is my hero, and He always will be, because I was the enemy He laid down His life for.

It takes something more than courage to lay down your life for an enemy; it takes love to do that. But my Hero, the Lord Jesus Christ, had what it took; for "the Son of God..loved me, and gave Himself for me" (Galatians 2:20). I do not know of a single reason why He should love me, as I had no love for Him, and I had sinned against Him and disobeyed Him times without number. But He just loved me in spite of everything, and He loved me so much (John 3:16) that He willingly crossed the brow of Calvary's hill with my burden of sin and guilt. And there, lifted up on the cross, He suffered all the punishment that I deserved for my many sins, and He put them all away forever by the sacrifice of Himself. What amazing love that the Lord of Glory should do this for His enemies!

"For..when we were enemies, we were reconciled to God by the death of His Son. But God commendeth His love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:10,8) Have you received Him yet, dear friend, and thanked Him for doing all this for you?

WHY I BELIEVE IN THE SUNDAY SCHOOL

By J. Edger Hoover

Director Federal Bureau of Investigation

In 1920 there resided in a certain Midwestern city a family consisting of seven sons and a daughter. To their parents the reform school was more familiar than the Sunday school.

The sons were aged six, seven, eight, nine, ten eleven, and twelve. Soon the boys began associating with members of a gang who later became notorious desperadoes. They started stealing equipment from cars and selling it to junk dealers, and for these minor offenses they Upon their were sent to reformatories. release they again associated with the gang-now automobile thefts and robberies claimed their attention. Today all seven brothers are behind the bars for their failure to conform to the rules of our social order.

It is not necessary to mention other illustrations of the somewhat specific chaotic trends in our modern society, cold, bare figures on youth in crime are sufficient. Nearly 20 per cent of all crime is committed by boys and girls of less than voting age. Last year it was not the hardened criminal of middle age who was arrested most frequently-it was rather the boy of nineteen. During 1939 persons under 21 years of age committed 12 per cent of the criminal homicides, 29 per cent of the robberies, 46 per cent of the burglaries, 33 per cent of the larcenies, and over 52 per cent of the auto thefts according to fingerprint records received by the FBI. Certainly such figures portend dark days ahead for a nation whose crimial army already aggregates 4,750,000 and whose appalling crime bill amounts to approximately \$15,000,000,000 annually.

The monetary cost of crime overlooks numerous elements which cannot be evaluated in dollars and cents. It does not include the thousands of mothers of our youthful offenders who have held tight to their hearts the babes for whose future they dreamed and planned. What greater challenge to decent citizenship is needed than this bitter disappointment to the motherhood of America? Then there is the victim-and the victims family. The dependents of a murdered man are given no thought when the crime is planned and consummated.

I am convinced that there is little likelihood of our diminishing crime by studied effort to reform habitual criminals. The house has already been burned down, it cannot be re-erected from the debris and ashes. The only possible way to strike a telling blow at crime is to strike at it before it gains momentum through its affiliations and thru the cunning technigue of law evasion acquired so quickly in association with the underworld. The time to strike is during youth when our boys and girls are being molded into manhood or womanhood to follow one of two courses—the tangled path of crime or the straight one of honesty and decency.

Honesty more than anything else is needed in America today. We must look to the home, the school and the church primarily to establish this basic principle in our youth. Significant in the attack of the church upon the legions of crime and delinquency is the work of the Sunday school. Of course I believe in the Sunday school. Crime among youth would become practically negligible if the young people of America attended Sunday school regularly during their formative years. Surely no one cognizant of the true crime situation in the United States could be blind to the importance of the activities of this institution in reducing materially the army of youthful offenders and delinquents.

In addition to its strictly religious aspects the social features of the Sunday school are of paramount significance in the lives of its students. Who are the everyday associates of your boy? Of your Do they run with the crowd? Do girl? your boys associate with those who idle away their time on the street or in the alleys or who frequent the corner poolrooms or saloons? The Sunday school offers our young people an opportunity to make worthy friends. I firmly believe that there is a vast difference in so far as character is concerned between the average Sunday school attendant and the boy who habitually frequents the corner dive. Also there is the opportunity for much healthful and wholesome fun and enjoyment in the Sunday school parties or socials, athletic contests and other similar activities sponsored by many Sunday

schools. These unexcelled diversions are important in the lives of many boys and girls.

What of leadership and preparation for the future life of a citizen? Sunday school classes are organized groups for uplifting moral instruction and each member has a definite task to perform.

Through the Sunday school it is possible to impress upon receptive youth the principles of Christianity. These, it must be recognized, 'are foundational in a democracy and in a society predicated upon justice and liberty. Today our democretic institutions are being assaulted by these who would substitute for American ideals and practices the revolutionary doctrines from foreign shores. These exponents of hatred and atheism seek to infiltrate their hideous and outrageous propaganda into democratic America through the medium of our youth. More and more they are seeking to paint for our young people rosy pictures of the conditions in their own lands. We in America want none of their panaceas or their d: ceit'ul picachment. The Sunday school and other similar institutions can play a vital rcle in guarding our citizens of tomorrew against the atheistic and the undemocratic teachings of those who would "save America."

I believe every child should be taught the Golden Rule and its application to the ramifications of our modern life. The Sunday school affords an excellent training ground for the inculcation of this principle in our youth. It is a fact that too many misguided and neglected boys and girls are theiving, robbing, and engaging in numerous other criminal activities. We know that some mysterious and diabolical hand does not take the child from the cradle and place it upon the road to crime -a road which leads only to misery and destruction. More of our children should be reached by the Sunday school-more should be taught that they cannot get something for nothing. I am reminded of the case of Alvin Karpis a young man who wanted everything in life without working for it. He craved everything which other persons possessed; he wanted big cars and plenty of money. During his brief criminal career Karpis was implicated in fifteen bank robberies, numerous murders, and three kidnapings, which brought him enough loot to satisfy the wants of a millionaire. Today Karpis is in Alcatraz for life and should be an exemple to those who do not respect the rights of others.

Our Unified Program in Alabama

Dear Brethren:

Until 1911, the Free Will Baptist church was one of the flourishing denominations. After the merging of Free Baptist and Northern Baptist, we were crippled for many years.

Our church is now taking her place in the world again. I have watched her grow with swiftness for the last ten years.

At the Alabama State Association in Alabama City in November 1943, we adopted a State Unified Program. If this is carried out, it will help us to take our place in Alabama as a denomination. In a few years we can have an Evangelist and tent in every Association in the State; we will have the Orphanage at Eldridge, Alabama paid for, and operating on cash basis. We will be doing a hundred times more for our college in Nashville, Tenn. ard fifty times more for Foreign Missions and the worn out preachers.

THE UNIFIED PROGRAM

Thirty per cent goes to V. C. May, Vernon, Alabama for orphanage, 25 per cent will be retained in the treasurey for State Missions, 25 per cent will be sent to Rev. F. S. Van Hoose, Paintsville, Kentuckey for National Unified Program, 20 per cent will be used for Superannuation. 75 per cent of this 20 per cent will be retained in the treasury for disabled preachers now; the other 25 per cent of the 20 per cent will be sent to to the treasurer of the National Superannuation Board, Rev. J. O. Fort, W-27th St. Bryan, Texas.

This money will be used to insure all the preachers who are members of the State Association, and who can be granted insurance by the company, provided the individual who is insured will pay half of the insurance.
