

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GOSPEL SERMONS

Divine Fellowship

Text: First John 1:1-7.

"That which was from the beginning, which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we have looked upon, and our hands have handled, of the Word of life; (For the life was manifested, and we have seen it, and bear witness, and shew unto you that eternal life, which was with the Father, and was manifested unto us). That which we have seen and heard declare we unto you, that ye also may lave fellowship with us: and truly our fellowship is with the Father, and with His Son Jesus Christ. And these things write we unto you, that your joy may be full.

"This then is the message which we have heard of Him, and declare unto you, that God is light, and in Him is no darkness at all. If we say that we have fellowship with Him, and walk in darkness, we lie, and do not the truth: But if we walk in the light, as He is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ, His Son cleanseth us from all sin."

The Book of First John is a family letter from the Father to His children. It is one of the most intimate communications in the entire Bible, the Song of Solomon alone being equal. The world is viewed as without with no legitimate inroads, while the sin of the children is treated as the child's offence which was answered by the sacrifice of Christ upon the cross.

Some difference may be recognized between the writings by John in the Gospel that bears his name and those of this Book: In Saint John we are led across

the threshold of the Father's house, while in First John we are made at home there. Hence, the fellowship of the Father's House is made the privilege of His children.

Conception of This Fellowship

No doult this followship is one of the privileges which the Triune God had in view when the plan of redemption was conceived. Note the record of this conception in Ephesians 1:3-12. "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who hath blessed us with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ:

According as He hath chosen us in Him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame be-Having predestinated fore Him in love: us unto the adoption of children by Jesus Christ to Himself, according to the good pleasure of His will, to the praise of the glory of His grace, wherein He hath made us accepted in the beloved. In Whom we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of sins, according to the riches of His grace; wherein He hath abounded toward us in all wisdom and prudence; having made known unto us the mystery of His will, according to His good pleasure which He hath purposed in Himself: that in the dispensation of the fullness of times He might gather together in one all things in Christ, both which are in heaven, and which are on earth; even in In Whom also we have obtained Him: an inheritance, being predestinated according to the purpose of Him Who worketh all things after the counsel of His own will: that we should be to the praise of His glory, who first trusted in Christ." Thus God through His perfect foreknowledge, wisdem and power conceived a production, even before the foundation of the world, which wrought a redemption with such wonderful fellowship as a fruit thereof.

The Spring of This Fellowship

The very spring of this fellowship is revealed as in the Son of God in First John 1:1-2. "That which was from the beginning, which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we have looked upon, and our hands have handled, of the Word of life; (for the life was manifested and we have seen it, and bear witness, and shew unto you that eternal life, which was with the Father, and was manifested unto you;)" The greatest price ever paid for anything was sacrificed in the deal through which the spring of this fellowship is made possible through the spring of life opened in our Speaking relative to this spring hearts. in His message to the woman at Jacob's well Jesus said, "Whosoever drinketh of this water shall thirst again: But whosoever drinketh of the water that I shall give Him shall never thrist; but the water that I shall give him shall be in him a well of water SPRINGING UP INTO EVERLAST-ING LIFE."

Circumference of This Fellowship

Only for the truths revealed in God's Word we would be compelled to strain our imagination to conceive anything of the bounds of this fellowship. Verse 3a of First John one tells us that that which has been seen and heard by others is declared unto us in order that we might have fellowship with them. The thought carries our minds into history of the former redeemed, hence we come to a comprehensive appreciation of the Divine Fellow. ship as it associates us with the saints of history. Other portions of the Word emphasize the relationship of the present redeemed, and of those who are to be redeemed; and John tells us as he speaks further in verse 3 that, "our fellowship is with the Father, and with His Son Jesus Christ. We thus accept the quality of our fellowship as pre-eminent.

The Endurance of This Fellowship

The very eternity of the Father and the Son as declared in the Word are readily revealed as tied up with this Divine Fel. lowship. The last clause of First John 1:3 declares the following: "Truly our fellowship is with the Father, and with His Son Jesus Christ." There being no grounds to fear a cessation of the sundry activities of the Triune God. Which is eternal in nature, there certainly is no reason for any one questioning the perpetuation of this fellowship. Other fellowships are of short duration, and in reality come to an end, but our fellowship with the Father and the Son, consecuently with each other, is an eternal reality.

Visible Fruits of This Followship

No doubt there are many fruits which might be pointed out as products of this fellowship, but I am thinking in particcular of that which is declared in First John 1:4. "And these things write we unto you, THAT YOUR JOY MIGHT BE FULL." Much of this fruit is not utilized because of the fact of our failure of appreciation of this fellowship, and of our failure in appropriation of the things which associate therewith. Of all classes of people in the world true Christians should reveal fullness of joy. An experience with God, and with each other, which makes for happiness will produce fruit in this world which cannot gainsay.

The Model of This Fellowship

Since earth could not, and can not now. furnish a model there was no other source to which God could go but to Himself for the model of such fellowship, thus we hear His offer of Himself in First John 1:5. "This then is the message which we have heard of Him, and declare unto you, that God is light, and in Him is no darkness at all." Note the declaration, "GOD IS LIGHT, AND IN HIM IS NO DARKNESS AT ALL." It certainly follows that if He, in Whom is no darkness at all, lives in us as He desires He expels the darkness which was in us and we become surety to the fact that the "True, Light Now Shineth."

The Test of This Fellowship

The two laws known as negative and appositive, known to operate in every revealed thing, play up in this test of the Divine Fellowship portrayed in First John 1:6-7. The negative law says, "If we say that we have fellowship with Him, and walk in darkness, we lie, and do not the truth:" Further light may be seen in the

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admonition recorded in the second chapter and the fifteenth and sixteenth verses. "Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world. If any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him. For all that is in the world, the lust of the flesh, and the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life, is not of the Father, but is of the world." This world system is declared to be against aur fellowship with God, and surely it makes definite inroads into the fellowship one with another, when we give room in our hearts for the world; and this world may be fairly represented in our selfwill.

But looking to appositive side we hear John say, in the seventh verse, "But if" we walk in the light, as He is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ His Son clean-seth us from all sin." Do we get the real truth stated here? "IF WE WALK IN THE LIGHT" (FOLLOW THE PATTERN) "AS HE IS IN THE LIGHT," fellowship with each other is the result. That is. Gaid John. "WE HAVE FELLOWSHIP ONE WITH ANOTHER." This is seen: to be in harmony with the law of the Light of Jesus as recorded in Matthew 5:16. "Let your Light Shine," said Jesus. Do we not see that He means for us to allow the law it's course in operation, and! that we are not called upon to force its operation. It follows, that, if we walk in the light as directed the law of fellowship with each other, and of communicateion to others, is in full process of operation. ÷.,

Relative to our fellowship which is a fruit of oneness with the Father; and the Son, and, which carries over in it's effects; concerning our relationship one with another, Jesus gives vent to His heart's. pulsations in this very thing as His ideal ... Let us look at John 17:11-13. "And now" am I no more in the world, but these arein the world, and I come to Thee. Holy Father, keep through thine own name: those whom Thou hast given me. And now come I to Thee; and these things speak I in the World, THAT THEY MIGHT HAVE MY JOY FULFILLED IN THEM-SELVES. So we see that our fellowship

with the Father, and the Son; and with each other, was one of the chief concerns of Cur Saviour in the final hours of His earthly ministry. No doubt Jesus realized the fact that our successful corporate with sirg depended upon this fellowship, and, to wonder it was of such concern to Him.

God's -- Financial Plan

As I have not written anything for publication in our church paper for some time will submit this article in the form of an appeal to our churches to adopt the plan God gave us in financing His work, together with brief report of our work here in Monett. May the Lord bless our hearts together.

God in His infinite wisdom gave us a financial plan that is sufficient with nothing added, nothing to be taken from, that will meet every financial need of the church of today. The Bible Doctrine of tithe and offering, while considerable emphasis has been given this important doctrine throughout our National Association the last few years, we have not as yet heard much said about adopting the tithe system in the local church, or perhaps better stated the local church tithing their income.

Ist. this is God's plan and if He will bless the individual who honors Him with the first fruit of his increase, He will also bless the church that will tithe their income for the promotion of our denominational interprises. We are truly grateful to Cod for our school at Nashville, our interest in missions and superannuation, all of these worthy interprises could be supported regularly, systematically and adequately if each church would tithe their income. Some will say how can this be done: have one treasure, let all funds go through their hands and the tithe be sent at least once each month through it's regular channel to our unified program fund.

This is not just a new thought, but a Bible plan. Malachi 3:10; God says bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse. Can we who tithe place all the tithe in the local church, unless they in tarn tithe to cur denominational interprises?

Does the church have a right to ask it's members to bring all the tithe into the church, and keep it all for local needs? If we all did that how would our denominational interprises be supported?

Futhermore when our offering goes in from the church, the church as a whole receives the credit and not individuals. If we don't love the church enough to want it to receive credit for what we do, well God knows what is liking. Self isn't being denyed that Christ may be exalted. Since the first of this pastorial year

we have been placing our Sunday school and church offering into the hands of one treasurer. The tithe has been sent in to our Unified Program fund, except one months tithe which was given to our State Association's general fund. God has blessed the church and verified His promise made to those who would bring the tithe into His storehouse.

We are only a small church, but during this a sociational year, beside special offening to our school, mission, Tenn. orphalage and superannuation, which will run approximately \$100, we have been able to keep up the currant expense of the church. Paid for evangelistic efforts \$135, and \$700 for improvement and liquidation of debt on the property. It probably would be of interest to our friends to know our indebtedness is now less than \$100. All the praise be to Him who giveth us all good things.

As we have been with this church since it's organization in 1932, we feel the church is now in a position to call a pastor who can lead them on upward and accomplish some of the things we have failed to get done. We will be submissive to the will of God as to our future field of service.

Where Art Thou

You have crucified Christ afresh and are bankrupt, as far as drawing on the Bank of God for peace and love as long as you remain in your condition, but Christ loves you and reaches out a beckoning hand for you, as the prodical son to return.

Baptism and It's Necessity

Acts 2:38 "Then Peter said unto them, Repent, and be baptised every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost."

Matt. 28:19 "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, (make disciples) baptizing them in name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost.

There are many questions that arise among the many different religious faiths on the subject of baptism. We will not be able to cover the entire subject because of lack of space—but let us consider some practical points I What is Baptism?

Baptism is the immersion of a regenerated person in water as a token of his fellowship with Christ in His death, burial and resurrection. An outward manifestation of an inward work.

Romans 6:4 "Therefore we are buried with Him by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life. II Is it necessary to be Baptized?

Immediately some one may think of the thief that was saved without being baptized. (Luke 23:39-45) Salvation is not

dependent upon a person having been baptized as there is no saving grace or efficacy in baptism Remember this, the thief did all that he could do. Therefore if it is humanly possible, it is necessary for you to be baptized as soon after conversion as possible. The thief repented and believed; he asked for salvation and he testified to all could hear him in the way open to him. Notice the great commission. Matt. 28:19 "Go ye therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holp Spirit:" MAKE DISCIP-IES! But when they are disciples, then baptize them? The command to baptize was given with the command to repent. (Acts 2:38) However, repentance, and saving faith precedes baptism in every case recorded in scripture. We notice that the three thousand converts were baptized. (Acts 2:41) and that the Eunich wanted to be baptized immediately (Acts 8:36-38) The disciples seemed to take baptism for granted. Jesus called His baptism a fulfilling of righteousness. (Matt. 4:15). III What must precede baptism?

By this we mean, what must precede scriptural water baptism.

(1) A Spiritual Baptism.

There is one baptism that is absolutely necessary before—or at the time—we are saved. It is this baptism that is also very much misunderstood. The baptism of the Holy Ghost. This baptism occurs at the time an individual is born, or adopted into the Kingdom of God. In other words we receive the baptism of the Holy Ghost at conversion.

and a station

1 Cor. 12:13, For by one Spirit are we all baptized into one body, whether we be Jews or Gentiles, whether we be bond or free, and have been all made to drink into one Spirit. We are not saved and then sometime later receive the baptism of the Holy Ghost, but we receive it at the time of conversion, otherwise we are not saved. Romans 8:9, If any man have not the Spirit of Christ, he is none of His.

So we see that regeneration, or the new birth, must occur before water baptism. It requires three things for any kind of baptism. (1) Administrator, (2) Subject. (3) Element. In water baptism, which in every case where at all possible, follows spiritual baptism, the administrator is the preacher, the subject is the believer, and the element is the water. Now notice closely the difference in the baptism that precedes water baptism. The administrator is the Holy Ghost, the subject is the penitent, and the element is the blood of Christ.

Water baptism always was a symbol of what had happened to the individual. Please observe the order in the Great Commission. (Matt. 28:19-20), the baptism of John the Baptist, (Free Will) (Matt. 3:16) the conversion of the Eunich (Acts 8:36-38) and the conversion of the three thousand. (Acts 2:41). Since baptism is the testimony of salvation through faith in the death of Jesus, only those capable of faith should be baptized. This excludes infants. Baptism may not always be mentioned in connection with salvation but faith is always included.

IV Is Immersion the Only Mode of Baptism?

How can one conceive of being buried or overwhelmed in Christ without immersing the whole body? (Rom. 6:3-4:

Col. 2:12). How could one symbolize the resurrection out of a glass of water? We are buried, why not represent it that way? All the leading scholars of all denominations agree that the original Greek word meant immersion and that immersion was the only practice of the early church. (Liddell and Scott—church of England, Sophoeles—Native Greek, Dr. Marcus Dods church of England, John Wesley, Prof. A. S. Peake—Methodist and Calvin—Presbyterian). All admit that Jesus had only immersion in mind or He would have used a Greek word permitting sprinkling.

V Do We Have a Right to Change the Mode?

Remember that Jesus never changed His views or commands because others disagreed with Him. He was the disciple's dictator and He is ours or He is not our Saviour and Lord. He is the legislature and we are the executors of His will. He said to baptize. We must do it. Remember that the northern churches in Europe immersed long after the churches of southern Europe changed to sprinkling. The Greek Orthodox church immerses also. We must discover His will and carry it out. We ought to do His work in the best way. We tell our children and those who work for us, "I don't want things done a good way, I want them done the best way." Let us be perfectly obedient.

"Must Baptism Precede Church Membership?"

If a man won't testify for the Lord in baptism, does he deserve to be recognized as an obedient disciple? Actions do speak louder than words. Baptism is the first test after the initial "standing up" for Christ. Let us not pick the ways we will testify but take all the means to testify. The three thousand converts were baptized before or at least at the time they were added to the Church. (Acts 2:41).

Are you buried with Christ or are you buried in your trespasses and sins? (Eph. 2:1). Every baptism you see, or hear about, must convince you of your unhappy relationship toward God and the tremendous price Jesus paid for you. Stop just a minute and let Him speak to you. Let Him lead pou in the way of obedience to eternal life.

The Desecrated Day

The Secularization of the First Day of the Week a Menace to the Future of the Church and Nation.

SUNDAY as a day of rest and worship is rapidly being made a day of labor and recreation. People are working today on Sunday, who a few years ago would have been to conscientious to do as they are doing today.

SOME CAUSES FOR DECLINE

The decline in Sunday observance became more noticeable at the time of what We call World War Number One. The emergency connected with the war led people to feel that work on Sunday was justifiable. But the tendency to work on Sunday did not cease with the armistice. The habit had been formed in the emergency and it remained with the people who had excused themselves on that account. They soon found other excuses to work on Sunday that partially guieted their consciences.

With the coming of World War Number Two the tendency to work on Sunday has been accentuated. Some have insisted that it is a patriotic duty to work on Sunday. Others have justified themselves in Sunday work to take care of their "victory garden." But when a person has done these things a few times his sense of the sacredness of the day becomes dulled. Sunday soon becomes just "another day." SOME INCENTIVES TO SUNDAY WORK

Some say they will lose their job if they do not work on Sunday: that the job they have requires Sunday work, and their boss threatens to discharge them if they do not work on Sunday. This is quite often a threat that is not carried out, as some have testified, who plainly told their boss they would not be on hand Sunday, that their duty required them in

church or Sunday school. They went back to work on Monday and were not discharged. Once their boss knew they meant what they said, threats about discharge ceased.

Others are induced to work on Sunday because of the extra pay promised in case they work that day. The fact that increased pay is offered for Sunday work is in itself a confession that something is being bought on Sunday that is worth more than any other day. The added pay is salve for the conscience. A Christian's time on Sunday belongs to God and His service, and world acknowledges this fact and offers larger pay to buy the man off from his duty. It is a sad fact that so many Christians esteem their Sunday duty so low that they will sell out for double pay.

Some make another excuse by saying that if they do not work on Sunday it will force some other man to work on Sunday and therefore deprive the other man of Thus they his Sunday rest and service. pose as being self-sacrificing to let the other man have his Sunday. But that is far fetched. The other man works anyway whether you do or not. Many men have no conscience in the matter. They are not Christians. This is their world and they will play on Sunday if they do not work. · They will not go to church even if they do not have to work on Sunday. Perhaps they might as well work as to ride the highway and drink their beer and attend the ball game on Sunday.

SOME LAME EXCUSES FOR SUNDAY WORK

There are undoubtedly those who feel it their duty to work in a defense plant, at least occasionally, on Sunday. It would not be wise to disown these members in the time of We feel they are not justemergency. ified in their stand, for it has been demonstrated again and again that a man, a beast, or even a machine, will do as much work on six days with a rest day the seventh as they will working continuously without a day of rest.

One pastor said his problem was not members working in a defense plant al-He had members who bought together. their groceries on Sunday. When he admonished them obout it, their excuse was that they never saw anything in the Bible to the effect that it was wrong to buy groceries on Sunday, and challenged him to show them where the Bible said it was wrong. Of course such persons are hardly worthy to be called Christians. They could justify themselves in the use of tobacco, going to movies, circuses, having more than one wife at a time, drinking beer, and a host of other evil things that the Bible does not mention. I think he said these persons, in some cases, claimed to be saved and sanctified. Truly, if the Spirit of God dwells in a person he would not be trying to justify himself in a harrow interpretation of the letter of Scrip. ture.

The Bible tells us that grace teaches people some things: "Teaching us that, denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly in this present world; looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appear. ing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ; Who gave Himself for us, that He might redeem us from all iniquity, and purify unto Himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works." (Titus 2:12-14). Again the Bible says, "Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world. If any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him. For all that is in the world, the lust of the flesh, and the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life, is not the Father, but of the world. And the world passeth away, and the lust thereof; but he that doeth the will of God abideth for ever." (1 John 2:15-17).

SOME PRINCIPLES GOVERNING SUNDAY WORK

Admittedly there is work that must be done on Sunday, and in this dispensation we are not bound by the rules that governed the Jewish Sabbath and the traditions that bound many people in New

Testament times. Jesus broke some of the traditions that had been heaped upon the use of the Sabbath in His day. We have found what we believe to be four guiding principles about the use of Sunday based on the use Jesus made of the Jewish Sabbath.

First-Work that is necessary for the proper conduct of public worship. "Have ye not read in the law, how that on the Sabbath days the priests in the temple profane the Sabbath, and are blameless?" (Matt. 12:5). It was necessary that the priests on the Sabbath kill sacrifices for the morning and evening offerings, in fact an extra one on the Sabbath, This required hard work. From this we find we can be justified in the janitor building a fire in the meeting house Sunday, in people getting their automobiles out and going to church, and a pastor going to the distant church on his circuit to preach. In fact, as we stated, any work that is necessary for the proper conduct of worship. We hardly think the janitor should put off until Sunday morning the sweeping and dusting of the meeting house, or any other work that could be done on a week day. The building and maintaining of the fire is essential.

Second-Work that is essential for the care of the sick or their relief. Jesus healed the man with a withered hand on the Sabbath (Matt. 12:10-13). And also healed the woman who was bowed down (Luke 13:11-13). He also healed the man at the pool of Bethesda on the Sabbath (John 5:2-10). He also gave the blind man sight on the Sabbath (John 9:1-16). This may not justify getting the auto out and going a hundred miles to see Aunt Kate who is not sick at all, and who gets the visitors a Sunday dinner while there. Sunday is sometimes the hardest day for a sick person because so many put off their visiting to that day. The nurse and doctor are justified in their hard work. We think, too, Christians may justly help put out a fire in their neighbor's house on Sunday, even if it is hard work to fight the fire.

Third-Work that is necessary for the

care of domestic animals. Jesus made mention of such cases in Luke 13:15 and in Matt. 12:11-12. It is therefore right to feed the chickens, fodder and milk the cows, and see that the horses have feed and water. We hardly think, however, that it justifies making hay on Sunday in July to feed the horses and cows next winter.

Fourth—Work that is necessary for the preparation of food on Sunday that cannot be done before. Jesus justified His disciples in plucking the heads of wheat and eating the grain when they were hungry. We note also that Peter's wife's mother evidently prepared a meal for the guests after she was healed (Mark 1:29-31-, We hardly think this justifies getting up the largest dinner of the week on Sunday, and staying away from meeting to prepare it. All preparation that can be made beforehand should be made, and no work allowed to keep the mother of the family or the hired girl away from Sunday services.

A judicious consideration of these four principles and a prayerful determination to adorn the doctrines of the Bible and set a good example to the church and the world ought to guide any wise Christian to a proper and praiseworthy use of the first day of the week.

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

When aerial gunner Stanley W. Tefft, 25, from Tcledo, Ohio, was rescued by natives on a Japanese occupied 'island, little did he know what was in store for him and seven other Navy fliers. For 87 days they were hidden and protected by the natives, whose first act was to give them a Bible. Though nominal Christians in America, these men never knew they were condemned sinners, without God, and that they needed to be saved from their sin by This they learned as the natives Christ. preached from the Holy Scriptures. After his conversion Tefft said, "You can tell the world that I am a devout Christian."

Years ago, before the outbreak of the war, a global God had sent His missionaries to carry the message of His love to, the natives of that Pacific island. 

Having enjoyed the blessed fellowship, and precious spiritual outpourings at the Bible Conference in Nashville, Tenn. we boarded the plane at Nashville airport at 1:45 A. M. April 13th., and in just six hours and eleven minutes we landed at the airport in Miami, Florida. Three stops were made on the way down, namely: Atlanta, Jacksonville, and Orlando. Dr. Lydia Mason, an own sister to our missionary, Rev. Thomas Willey, was our destination in Miami, and it wasn't long until we were in her hospitable and comfortable home where one always finds it a pleasure to visit. Dr. Mason is serving a great purpose in that her home is always open to our missionaries and workers going to and from Cuba. One must always stop over in Miami for certain routine in getting out of the country, and Dr. Mason always has an open door of welcome. In fact she had made our Pan-American reservations for us 'ahead of time. However I found a great change in this home to what it was two years ago. When I was there in 1942, Mother Willey was there, and this time she had gone on to her glorious reward. We visited the resting place of her body while in Miami, and had prayer at the grave. Dr. Mason is very lonely, and stands in need of our prayers. Mother Willey had made her home with Dr. for many years.

Friday afternoon the 14th. at three o'clock we boarded the Pan-American for Havana. It was a lovely trip over the ocean. All was clear and so it was a very quite and pleasant trip. In just one and one half hours we landed in Havana. Bro. Willey was there to meet us with a friend, Rev. Arthur Pain, and in a few minutes we were on our way out to catch the bus to the city of Pinar Del Rio where Brother and Sister Willcy live, and which is considered the central headquarters of our mission field which is in the Province of Pinar Del Rio. The capital city and the province have the same name. About 10:30 that night we landed at the home of the Willeys. We were all tired and so was not long getting to our rest for the night. We went to sleep happily conscious of the fact we were in reality on the F. W. B. mission field in Cuba.

It was my privilege to cover our entire field. This we did by various means of travel. Train, bus, herse back, ox cart. and on foot. Some of this was strenious indeed to one not accustomed to riding horse back nor walking a great deal; but forgetting that, it was all a great pleasure, and certainly a great privilege. Eating and sleeping in the homes of the native Cubans is sometimes trying; for their customs are very different to that of an American. But one could surely find a more friendly people no where. They did their very test for us where ever we went. The following I give as an example: We were passing through the country on horse back. Were scheduled to take dinner with a certain family on the way. When we arrived at the noon hour he had a hog butchered and dressed. This was all done soley because the Americans were to be there for dinner. After we got the ponies larieted cut on the grass, and this Cuban table was spread with fresh pork, rice, beans, cucha, Cuban coffee, etc., we did not have to be begged to seat ourselves around the table. When the go sign was given by the man of the house we began to devour. When they would pass the bowl and say 'mas" (more) we would say "si" (yes). The live hogs running around under the

table did not hinder us from getting away with the one so unfortunate as to be on the table. I assure you when we left there that afternoon there was not as much of that heg left as before our arrival in the forenoon. But truly this is typical Cuban hospitality.

The first place to visit after our arrival on the field was with the church at Sabalo. We made this place by train and ox cart. It was convention day with this church Sunday April 16th. The women folk went with us to this place; though many of the places they were not privileged to go because of the hardships incurred in getting over the mountains on the ponles, staying cut at night, etc.

Sabalo is considered the mother church, as this was the first Free Will Baptist church to be organized in Cuba. Pedro Rojo is their faithful pastor. They have a membership of 26, and six others awaiting baptism. A Sunday school of 50, a chapel built and paid for, and this church is beginning to support themselves financially.

There was a large crowd present the day of this convention. Some were there from as far as forty miles. We noticed some of them coming in groups with song books in their hands singing as they gathered. Our people throughout the work are a great people to sing. The climax of the

day was the profession of nine souls.

APRIL 19th.

The next place to visit was the church at Rie Seco, Miss Yeley is pastor of this church. At Rio Seco we see a beautiful expression of the union of hearts between the church and the pastor. They love Miss Yeley dearly and she is equally in love with them. We had baptizing in the afternoon with eleven candidates, and service at the chapel at night. A large crowd was in attendance, a great interest manifested and fourteen professions.

This church has a membership of 18, a Sunday school of 25 and hold three services each week.

Friday night the 21st. we had service in the chapel in Pinar Del Rio. The front room of the house where Miss Olive Van Syoc lives is used for services. This work has not been started long and is not yet organized; but an organization is in prospect. Service is held here each Friday night, and Sunday school each Sunday. Also Bible study once each week.

Sunday 23rd. Bro. Willey and I took the train for San Julian where I preached at the American Naval Base. This is on the coast at the west end of the island. Bro. Willey has been serving there as chaplain a great deal of the time. We enjoyed the service very much, and of course everything was carried on in English.

Late Sunday afternoon we packed the traveling bags for a trip to the north and east into the mountain*country. We took the bus to Vinales, a small town laying in the beautiful valley of Vinales. It is a marvelous sight to look into this valley from the mountain lookout on the highway. It is said to be the most beautiful place in Cuba. I left my wife with Sis. Willey and the others in Pinar Del Rio, because this trip promised to be not too easy. We were away from Sunday P. M. until the next Saturday P. M.

We had service Sunday night in Vinales where Pedro Oliva has been preaching for some time. Pedro, with his little family live in the chapel building which is located on the main street of the town. We had a very nice service, and spent the night in the home of the pastor.

The next afternoon, Monday the 24th., Pedro, Bro. Willey and I climbed on the little pony cart and drove a long way down the valley to a Catholic home where services were scheduled for the night. We had a nice drive enjoying the mountain scenery, stopping at a home for the evening meal on the way, arriving at the place of service in due time. We found a splendid family. Things were very much in trim for a Cuban home, and in the service

that night the spirit of the Lord was very prevalent. Six members of this family professed faith in Christ. Leaving catholicism and coming over to the "Evanhelicos" as they call it; the protestants. The head of this family of fourteen children told us there was a man through the community in the year 1925 who gave him a Protestant Bible. He said the priest tried in every way to get it from him or to get him to burn it; but he held on to it. He showed us the Bible. All these years this family has been reading it, and it has had a great part in their conversion to the Protestant faith. We left this home feeling that a great good had been done.

Tuesday we took the bus out of Vinales going on north. After many miles over roads next thing to impossible we arrived at the farm home of Pedro Betancourt. Some horses had been taken on ahead for us, and here is where we left the motorized means of travel and took to the saddle. Bear in mind this name of Betancourt; for some interesting things took place on his farm of which we will tell you later.

Late in the afternoon we, Pedro Betancourt, Pedro Oliva, Bro. Willey and myself, climed on our ponies and started across the mountains to the little coast town of Port Esparanza, twelve miles away on the north coast of the island. This was my first horseback ride, and I was pretty tired when we arrived. We have no organized church in this town; but a lot of interest in the gospel is to be found there, a few converts, and so it is considered one of the main preaching points. We had a very interesting service, took the evening meal in one of the homes, and rode back to the Betancourt home after service; arriving there between twelve and one o'clock. There was no moon and some times the mountain trails were very dark. All we could do was just lay the reins on the ponies neck and trust it to take us home. But those little sure feet never made a step amiss, and their judgement of the way never failed them. We could trust the ponies far more than we could ourselves. We enjoyed the ride for it was a clear tropical night with an

unusual number of stars in the elements. We had the north star to our back and the southern cross in the low horizon before us. We talked of the southern cross (la cruz del sur) being a splendid illustration of the cross of Christ and ones keeping their eye on the same.

Wednesday morning we saddled 0111 ponies and started for the little mountain town of La Palma 35 miles to the east and south. After riding about three hours, it was decided in order to save the visitor a little for the preaching service that night, he should catch the bus as it came by, and Bro. Willey would lead the horse over the trail on in to town. So I boarded the bus alone, as far as English speaking companionship was concerned, with a note in my pocket to present upon my arrival ahead of the other two members of our party. I found it would have been as easy to have rode the horse as it was to ride the bus over these unbearable roads. But I held on with a death grip and we arrived altogether about 12:30 noon. One interesting thing to me was that the bus went through two gates on the way to the town. About 5:00 P. M. Brother Willey and Pedro Oliva arrived. I had managed to tell the folk "yo tengo hambre" y "yo tengo sed" (I have hunger and I have thirst). I also managed to tell them, or rather to show them, that I was tired and so I got a good meal and a good place to lay down and rest.

After the others arrived we took a good bath out of a water bucket, shaved up, changed some clothes, and got all ready for service that night. Enjoyed a splendid service with a nice crowd. Slept in the chapel building that night, starting on the trail toward San Andrace, Thursday morning 27th. Stopped at a home for dinner, and stopped at another home for service at three o'clock in the afternoon. The farmers layed down their work, and a large crowd had gathered for the service. In this service several babies were dedicated to the Lord, and I might say this type of service took place in several instances over the field. We took some motion pictures, and then were on our way. Our little ponies did some real mountain

climbing that afternoon. The scenery was gorgeous. We arrived 'in the beautiful valley of San Andrace in time to have supper and for service thot night. Saw 35 professions in this service. I saw great possibilities at all these points we touched, and especially is it true at San Andrace. A large spacious valley with a little town. No road, however, into this valley at all. Only mountain pony trails.

Next morning we were on our way up the valley bearing back to the west before sun up. Santiago Delgado met us at San Andrace, Pedro Oliva having gone on in the night before. We rode into Vinales that day which is 18 miles to the west. Stopped on the way for dinner at a farm home, arriving at our destination about two in the afternoon.

Saturday A. M. we took the bus out of Vinales again to the farm of Pedro Betancourt. Miss Olive Van Syoc came from Pinar Del Rio, and several of the workers and students from the school, and in fact from all over, because this promised to be a great day. A very large crowd was present. Twenty candidates were baptized in the spring branch on this farm, and in the afternoon the Free Will Baptist church of Vinales was organized in the home of Mr. Betancourt with 24 charter members, officers elected, and two deacons ordained. Until this time the work in Vinales was only a preaching station. We were very happy to have part in this organization. In all it was an interesting day. The pig was roasted on the ground, and all enjoyed the roast pig sandwiches when the meal was served.

Sunday April 30th. we took the train to San Juan for another convention. It was another enjoyable day which was characterized by much singing, testimony and preaching of the gospel. We saw three professions at this place. San Juan is an organized church with 26 members, Sunday school and services almost every night. They have a fund started for the erection of a chapel. Again a large crowd was present.

Tuesday May 2nd. Bro. Willey and I started on another trip to the south west part of the province. Stopped over at Sabalo and held service Tuesday night. Had service in a home on the next day, and arrived at our destination for service Wednesday night down in a section called Ray Martiz. This is a new field, we have no organization; but several preaching stations. This is a very backward part of the island and we found the people very hungry for the gospel. I preached to people down there who had never before heard a gospel message. Our missionaries have been making contacts in this section and we have some splendid prospects there. Slept in a tobacco barn that night after the service and took the bus and train back to Pinar Del Rio next day. The road in to this section is another one almost impassable. Pedro Rojo was with us on this trip.

Saturday May 6th. the last convention which we were privileged to attend, opened at the Cuban school of Missions out on the 18 acre farm and continued over This was indeed an enjoyable Sunday. time. Folk gathered from all over. Services were held in the chapel which the neighbors around the school have erected on our school farm. Rafiel Josue, the head of the school, had carefully planned the convention; including the printing of programs, etc. There was some kind of worship service in session nearly all the time from the opening to the close. Sunday morning 12 or 15 came forward in a consecration service. Sunday afternoon a very significant move was launched, that is, a fund was started among those native Cubans for the extension of missions. Thank the Lord for their vision and may this spur us to do more. Sunday night in the closing service there were 13 professions.

Tuesday night May 9th. we took the train to San Luis for service. San Luis is a very beautiful little town. We have an organized church there with only five members; but a very prospective place. At present they have no pastor and the students from the school are supplying. We enjoyed our short visit there very much.

This finished our work of covering the field. The next two days were taken in preparation for leaving as we were to leave May 12th.

1 am very favorably impressed with our farm and school and with the man who heads our school Rev. Rafael Josue. Brother Josue and his fine wife are graduates from a fundamental bible school at Los Pinos in the province of Santa Clara. It is an interdenominational school, and is the best school of its kind on the island. He and his wife both teach in our school, and are both very capable. He is a man of strict detail, very careful in business, very devoted and maintains very strict discipline at the school. He is a member of the Free Will Baptist church at Vinales.

The school opened January 4th. 1944, and had closed a short time before our going down. Plans are that it shall open session again in the late summer or early fall. However there are students there throughout the summer at work on the farm and taking care of the stock. Maximina Sanchez, one of our earnest bible women, is doing the house work through the summer. There were seven students during the winter term; but there are nineteen in prospect for the opening this fail. The students seem to be a fine type of young people. They are indeed very promising. The subjects they have been teaching are as follows, homiletics, hermaneutics, Bible introduction, Bible characters, personal work, false doctrines, writing and language. The plans are that this fall they shall have music, etiquette, and some other subjects such as arithmetic, etc. They go to school one half day and work one half day. The students are to pay a fee of perhaps \$2.00 per month
