

## The why of Worldwide Mission

Text; Matt. 28:19 Go ye therefore and teach all nations.

These are days in which the true disciples of Christ feel the tremendous responsibility of carrying out the Great Commission that the Master gave to the Church just before He went back to the Father. We realize that this command was given in infinite wisdom and infinite love and therefore demands our serious consideration. Many are asking both by word of mouth and by attitude, why the church of today should be concerned about world wide evangelism. We hope to show in the light of the scriptures, by historical facts and the present need, that the present day church is under divine command and obligation to carry the Gospel message to the ends of the earth.

## I. A Look at the Commission. (Command)

Matt 28:19 -- "Go ye therefore and teach all nations.

This is an all inclusive statement made by the Lord Jesus Christ to the Auostles. Some might dare to say that this command was meant only for the apostles and does not apply to us today, but not so. The apost'es were the pillars of the The brevity of life would not church. permit them to fully carry out the command. The generations to follow must al-The command so accept the challenge was given to the present church and her successors. In other words it is a responsibility that is charged to every "Go ye" and teach all Christian person. This command has never been repealed, neither has it been ammended it

still stands and rings out in tones clear and strong, "Go ye and teach all nations." It is just as binding today to the church as is was the day it was uttered by the Lord Jesus Himself.

Another expression of the "Command" is found in Mark 16:15; "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every every creature. Not merely in our home community, state, or nation, but to ALL the vorld, and to EVERY Creature Meaning, of course, those created in His cwn image and likeness. All mankind. Also in Luke's Gospel we have the phrase, "Among all nations." In full it reads: (Luke 24:47), "And that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem." Of course, we must begin at home (Jerusalem), but too many people want to stay at home. Another passage that emphasizes the fact of miss ons is found in Acts 1:8, "But ye shall receive power after the Holy Chost is come upon you; and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and all Judea, and in Samaria , and unto the uttermost part of the earth."

These passages surely are proof enough that we need to carry the glorious message to all men everywhere. But some w'll say:

#### II. Are the Heathen Lost?

Some have declared that Cod would be unjust to condemn a man who had never leard of the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ. Others have said, "He has a law of His own by which he will be judged." Shall we look again for the correct answer in the word of God? On first

thought we would say: 'Surely they will be saved." or "It doesn't seem right." But let us search the Scriptures and find out why we are to evangelize the world.

#### 1. Jesus is the Only Way.

Acts 4:12, "For there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved." John 14:6, "Jesus saith unto hm, I am the way, the truth, and the life; no man cometh unto the Father, but by me."

We are told that in Hinduism alone there are more than 300,000,000 gods. Any, or all of these will not suffice for salvation. Only Jesus san save.

The way in which God deals with all classes of people is very definite y described in the book of Romans.

In chapter one, directly following the Apostle's great statement of missionary onlig..tion and the power of the Gospe! (vs. 14 to 17), we find a terrific indictment o the beathen world and an appalling p cture of its spiritual wickedness and moral filthiness. The heathen are declared to be without excuse as to their idolatrous rites and abominable practices because of the measure of light which Cod has given them, even apart from the Cospel, threigh nature and conscience (vs. 19, 20). In chapter two the cases and the Jenish legal st are token up, and their guilt is shown to be aggravated by reason of the r added light and privilege. The absolute firmness of God's judgement of all men, whether the heathen under conscience, the Jew under law, or the hearer of the Gospel under grace, is made clear (vs. 6, 12, 14, 11). In chapter three the argument leads on to a final verdict of guilt against the whole human race (vs. 2, 9, 12), culminating with the words, "that every mouth may be stopped. and all the world may become guilty herore God" (v. 19).

The world's guilt and need thus established, the Apostle thereupon proceeds at ones to introduce God's great plan of salvation through faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. When chapter ten is reached, a c ear and beau iful summary is given of the equality before God of Jew and Gon-

tile.

"How shall they call on him in whom they have not believed? and how shall they be ieve in him of whom they have not heard? and how shall they hear without a preacher? and how shall they preach, except they be sent?" (vs. 14, 15) HOW? HOW? HOW?—Unanswerable questions these, constituting one of the mose convincing arguments for missions!—What solemn responsibility do they lay upon all those who have the only remedy for the condemning sin of the heathen world!"—Dr. Glover.

So we can readily see that the responsibility rests upon the home church to send the messenger, that the lost may hear the Gospel story, that hearing and believing, he can be saved from his sins. No other way has God provided. God tire, and of his abounding grace toward a'l alike, so that "whosoever sha'l call mean the name of the Lord sha'l be saved" (vs. 12, 13). But immediately afterwards come those convicting words: has so ordained it that human instrumentality is used in the ministry of reconciliation.

## 2, The Heathen Conscious of Lost Condition.

Eph. 4:17, 18. "This I say therefore, and testify in the Lord, that ye henceforth walk not as other Gentiles (heathen) walk, in the vanity of their mind,
having the understanding darkened, be-

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ing alienated from the life of God through the ignorance that is in them, because of the blindness of their heart; who being past feeling, have given themselves over unto lasciviousness, to work all uncleanness with greediness."

These verses present a deplorable picture of how low humanity will go without God. This is the condition of heathen lands today.

Our own missionary, Miss Barnard, tel's of talking to a man in India who had returned from one of the great festiva's of which large sums of money had teen received and thousands of fowls and animals had been sacrificed. He described it as a big affair as they worslipped their gods. The man was asked if he had not returned with a light heart and a light spirit, seeing all this was one to atone for sin. The man hung his and confessed, "Ah. head in shame M'ssi—Amma, alas, alas, how I w'sh your words were true! There is still no peace in my heart, for my sins are yet with me" So we see they are conscious of their lost condition -- and millions of them are crying for the Truth.

If the B'ble teaches anything, it teaches that there is on'y one way to be saved, one standard of judgment for all men, and only one Redeemer for all races of nconte. Unless the multitudes of the world hear, and believe the Story, surely they are lost. They are already condemned. We read in John 3:18, that believeth not is condemned already because he both not belived in the name of the on'v begotten Son of God." Comparing this Scripture with Romans, chapter ten (how can they believe in whom then have not heard), we are compelled to admit that they are LOST, LOST, and that we are under obligation to go or send come one with the message of light. ## The Precious Blood

1 Peter, 1:18-19.

"For as much as ye know that ye were not redeemed with corruptible things, such as silver and gold, from your vain conversation received by tradition from your fathers, but with the precious blood of Christ, as of a lamb without blemish and without spot.

Tcday, men are seeking redemption and are thinking that they are going to be saved by following the insignificant things of the world. Some seek silver and gold thinking that they can pay the priest and he will pray and make their hope for eternity secure. While these are depending on silver and gold, there are others that think there there morality and good deeds will be accepted in the sight of God. Then still others are saying, dad and mother were good Christians when they lived, they told me that I was christened when I was a baby. I'll be all right at the judgement because I belong to the church.

But while men are seeking to get into eternal rest and happiness by their own merits, I want you to read again with me, 1 Peter 1:18-19.

"Forasmuch as ye were not redeemed with corruptible things, as silver and gold, from your vain conversation received by tradition from your fathers; But with the precious blood of Christ, as of a lamb with blemish and without spot."

It seems to me rather foolish for some one to try to do otherwise than the plan that God, the creator of this universe has laid out as a blue-print for our lives. Yet so many men have the twisted idea that they are pretty good fellows and that God will just look over their little sins and permit them to enter heaven without ever having the blood of Jesus Christ, the perfect offering for the sins of the world applied to their souls. Listen though! don't get the idea that you are righteous and Holy, because your righteousness is as filthy rags in the sight of God.

It is necessary to have that blood applied to your soul so that your sins are under

the precous blood, for Christ's words tell us that without blood there is no remission of sins. Then if there is no remission of sins without the precious blood, there is no admittance to heaven and eternal rest and glory, for God has said in His word that no sin shall enter heaven. A man will be sinful as long as he does not have sin covered by the blood. Just saying in short what we have already said. You are bound to a Devil's Hell of fire and brimstone forever if you don't accept the precious blood of Jesus, to cover your sins. When this precious blood has been applied, this person becomes a new creation in Christ Jesus.

We remember the case of a woman, who had stooped to almost the lowest standard that a woman could stoop, when she had come to Jesus and had been enlightened of His way, went away a changed person, one who would have been a good example for others to have followed. God had cleaned up her life and she had been a recipient of the great Salvation and had followed Jesus and ministered to Him even until death to show her gratitude for His miraculous power that He had used to cast seven devils from her. Yes, Mary Magalene received the precious blood and was used of God as a messenger after His resurrection to tell the first account of this to the disciples. (Mark 16:9).

Another character who wsa changed by the precious blood was a man that had been educated in the highest courts of the land. a man, who knew the laws almost by heart even though he was comparitively young. He is on his way to Damascus with legal papers in his tunic pocket to persecute all of those people who call themselves Christians and are following this strange religious movement that has been started by a man named Jesus Christ. He is thinking that this movement would have died, had they killed the rest of the disciples when he had seen them stone Stephen. He is still pondering why these so called Christians continue to follow Christ's teaching in spite of persecutions, when suddenly (the Scripture says) a light shone from heaven and he is blinded by its rays, dumfounded and helpless, he falls to his knees and crys out, "who art thou, Lord?" Only to hear a voice ringing and rebounding on his ears, "Saul, Saul, why persecutest thou me?" It is hard for thee to kick against pricks. When he arose he saw no man had to be ied under the direction of God to an old prophet by the name of Annanias, who opened his eyes with a touch. God after having applied His own Son's precious blood to Saul, not only changed his personality tut changed his name and made Paul His first missionary. Another new creation in Christ Jesus. Old things had passed away and behold all things had become new.

God needed business men too. We remember, when He called Matthew a tax collector, who accepted the challenge at once; leaving his table of money he went, at Jesus' call, "Follow me," to do business for God.

Too,you remember, when the precious blood had been applied to the heart of Zaccheus that he wanted to repay fourfold anyone he had wronged in return for his wrong doing, This precious blood makes you want to pay your debts, friends.

But, Oh! if we refuse this blood, it can only mean one thing and that is an eternal death in a never ending tomorrow. Not just a physical death, but an eternal death in a never ending hell. If we refuse the precious blood we are to miss heaven; and if we miss heaven, it means eternal separation from God.

Even refusing to follow the leadership of God in the placing of a few worldly pos-

sessions meant death to Annanias and Saphira.

Judas a man who was in the inner circle with Christ. The man, who had carried the purse of the twelve disciples, the treasurer of the first group of followers of Christ, before his physical death suffered misery untold. He sold his Christ for a few dollars. He was ashamed to follow anymore; afraid to stand the test. He was a follower who had forgotten the sureness of a promise from Jesus Christ.

Too, we remember the story of the rich man, who refused Lazarus, the poor beggar, the crumbs that fell from his table. The Bible tells us that he lifted up his eyes in hell. He knew nothing of experiencing the precious blood. While Lazarus, even though a beggar in this life was happy in Abraham's bosom. Silver and gold, worldly possessions, nor fame mean nothtoward your salvation. Only the precious blood of Jesus will save you.

Sinner friend, it is needless to ask in which place you desire to spend eternity. We know that you prefer heaven. You can have an eternal home in heaven by accepting the precious blood. Remember, you reach heaven through acceptance of the precious blood, and you are to be thrown into an eternal, misery-ridden hell if you reject that blood.

Will you accept the precious blood of Jesus Christ now?

## A Christian' Walk

Walk in wisdom toward them that are without, redeeming the time. Col. 4:5.

First I take the term outsider in its broadest sense. I mean not merely the people who stand without all our church organizations, but those who are without Christ; ones who do not submit to His authority nor consult His will. There are

such people both within our churches. It is nesessary for us to call our minds to the great simple fact that all the people about us are either in Christ or out of Christ. And to this fact also, that all the people who are in our churches are supposed to be in Christ. They join our communion on profession of their faith, which means the definite entrustment of their

lives to the saving grace and authority of Jesus, and acceptance of Him as their Saviour, Lord and King. The church as we understand it is a community of regenerate and believing souls who have not a definite relation to their Lord and each other, but also a definite relation and responsibility toward them that are without; and there are few things that need more careful consideration than this relation.

There are perils of which we need to be aware, and duties to be intelligently attempted. One of our perils is that we shall be afraid of the outsider, of his opinion and judgement, his criticism or disapproval. And there is a person known today as the man in the street. His opinion on the beliefs and practices, the policy and duty of the church have almost been thought to be inspired. He has been credited with special illumination; his taste has been consulted, he has been thought by some to be perfectly competent to instruct the church in the conduct of its sacred business. The estimate of his qualification has endowed him with the power to judge the saints, if not angles. The church has sometimes been in awe of him and afraid of his sneers. And if we alter the term and speak in scriptural phrase of the men of the world, I would like to say that we are not to be afraid of them. We are to love them far too well to be afraid for they are neither competent to rule nor judge the saints. We have only one ruler and judge. We study them, we may learn from them, but we may not pander to them, nor lower the door or widen the threshold at their demand. They are not to determine our faith or our policy. We are never to sue for their patronage or modify our principals in order to gain their support. We are not to be cast down when their judgement goes against us, nof puffed up beyond measure when they approve and speak well of us. It is possible for the church to pay too great a price for the applause of the outsider. We may be quoted by him with approval and be all wrong with our only Master and Judge. The church of God should carry herself with a certain self-respect and dig-As the elect bride of Christ she nity. should refuse to give herself away; in a sense, the world's opinion of us should be a matter of no importance. It is possible

that when we are persecuted we are nearest Christ: if you be reproached for the name of Christ, happy are ye.

The opposite peril is that of indifference to the outsider on our part. Not that we care little for his opinion but that we are little or nothing for him; that we go on our way as if we had our life to live and he had his, and we had no responsibility. The teaching in the New Testament clearly states that our neighbor who is outside is our responsibility and a part of our entrustment. My own conviction is that in many instances the outsider knows that, and wonders that we take our responsibility so lightly. We may not allow the world to rule us and we may deny its right of power to judge us.

There is something supernatural about the true Church of God. It is a part of his mystical body and it has spiritual illumination which the world has not; a closer relation to Christ than the world can know. It is the authoritive organ and instrument of his will and grace, the channel of his word and power, his visible witness in the The outsider is an inevitable part of our stewardship. For him Christ died, him Christ loves. The church is set in the world to lay seige to him, to care for him, to witness to him, to win him. We are the living epistles of the church. My dear friends, we shall not arrive at the duty of the church to the outsider save as we sec the duty of the individual Christian. We come together in part to know, to be in-

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structed and stimulated. I urge that our work must be done, our influence exerted and our impression made.

There is a third grave peril besetting us today. It is the peril of thinking that it does not matter whether the outsider is won or not. There is no denying that we have lost in great part the horror that our fathers had of the future state of those who are disobedient and who went down to the mysteries of death unreconciled and a stranger to God. We think we have a broader and loftier conception of the Divine Mercy. Whether it be true or not, some of us have gone so far as to think it does not greatly matter whether men are brought to Christ or not. It may be we have ceased to read our bibles, and so have created for ourselves a good natured Deity who will suspend all the laws that bind together cause and effect and make it his business to see that nobody is allowed to suffer, whatever his condition or character. We are taking our ideas of God from the man in the street rather than from the New Testament. We are adopting current ideas too much, instead of discovering truth and declaring it. May we ask this question, does it matter, does it make a vital deep cleaving difference in childhood and youth, in middle life and old age, in the hour of death and in the day of judgement, whether a man fears God or not; living day to day without acknowledging Him. If it does not matter, why did He come? Why did He plead with men? What is the meaning of His agony and passion? Why does He speak the parables that search our hearts and fills us with awe, of the unprofitable, the wretched and slothful servant, the foolish virgins, the woe of those whose doom is the shut door, the outer darkness, the worm that dieth not and the fire that is not quinched? What does He mean of the great division between the wheat and tares, and the sheep and goats? We know that men are lost now, and the business of the church is to get men to build on the eternal rock, to seek to lead men out of one condition into the other; and failing to do so the church will surely be guilty to a great and holy trust. How can we discharge our trust? What can the church do as a body, with respect to the outsider? I hope it will not seem unreasonable if I suggest as one most important thing that we should take care that their numbers are not increased from our own ranks. I would be an immense gain if we could keep and increase our hold on what we have there, if all our scholars in Sunday School were prevented from ever becoming outsiders. This is a great messege, "be not fogretful to entertain strangers"; let there be no difference between the rich and poor. There must be more than a welcome, of course, there must be a living message; a message received from the living Christ. My dear friends, the church has a great business in hand and there is a grave danger that we may be slothful in it, that we hurry our talents for witness bearing in the earth and trifle with a great opportunity. Even that we be found sleeping at our post by our Lord when He comes. I pray that we may all be aroused to a keener sense of our responsibility for those who are without Christ, and that there may come upon the whole church a baptism of holy passion and desire for the winning of the world to the feet of our Master.

## THE LIQUOR PROBLEM

#### Liquor Men as Patriotic Citizens

Liguor dealers raise the flag, make public speeches and parade the streets in celebration of news from the liquor front, the liquor industry is "almost all out" for the war. Almost 7,000 men and women are employed in making alcohol for war purposes, and we have nothing to say against that; but we cannot help being somewhat disturbed about the more than \$00,000 men and women who are engaged in making, importing and selling intoxicating fiquors.

The liquor dealers claim to be engaged in essential war industries. They parado with the flag in one hand and a bottle in the other. In their estimation they should be given the Victoria Cross and the Congressional Medal; for they are very patriotic. How they love their country!!

#### AN ABUNDANCE OF BOOZE

Yes, there is and will be plenty of booze, and it is not rationed. August 1, 1941 was

a red letter day for the liquor industry; this is the merry month of August for them. On this date (Aug. 1, 1944) the War Production Board turned them loose with 11,000,000 bushels of grain to produce 50, 000,000 galions of whiskey and rum. Mr. Roosevelt ordered this done, perhaps, figaring that it would help him to be elected for a fourth term in the White House. And an editorial of one of the big daily papers has the gall to say: "This new whiskey may enable the nation's tipplers to put on a better quality celebration on V-Day." And what will all this whiskey do on election day this fall? It makes us shudder to think about it. The tipplers will roll in the gutter, while the liquor industry will roll in the profits.

It is reported that our enlisted soldiers, sailors and marines will get an estimated one billion cans of beer. Government authorities urgently said: "Save your tin cans for the war!" "Tin is a war essential!" And the people have obeyed in this as in other things necessary to winning the war. Then the brewers come along with the gall to tell us that one billion of those "saved" cans will hold their product. We save the tin, which is made again into cans, which the brewers fill with beer, which Uncle Sam ships overseas to debauch our boys who are giving their lives to save America. I say it is deplorable.

#### CASUALTIES

Government reports show that from Dec. 7,1941 to June 13,1944, American casualties in the war amounted to 55,206 killed, 99, 991 wounded, 55,033 missing, and 40,928

prisoners of war, a total of 251,158 war casualties. But during the same time (2½ years) there were at least 125,000 deaths in U. S. attributed to alcohol and during the same period of time (2½ years) at least 125,000 people, who didn't die, became chronic alcoholics. War is bad and very bad, but intemperance is much worse. Alcohol kills and disables more people than war, even the awful war that now rages.

#### WHAT DO YOU THINK

The liquor business is legal under our civil law; but do you think it ought to be a legalized business? Does the law of the Lord sanction such a business? Do you think a Christian can sanction and support such a business and not violate the divine law? Do you think that a Christian can patronize a place of business that sells intoxicating liquor and still be a good Christian? Who is to blame for more than 50, 000 deaths in U.S. A. each year, which are directly attributed to alcoholic liquors? Perhaps we'll say, "The liquor industry is guilty of killing 140 people in U.S. every day." But is the liquor industry alone to blame for 140 deaths each day? It took millions of votes to legalize the liquor industry; the wets won because so many thousand church members voted wet. The New Deal Administration and its supporters are responsible for the present liquor industry which they fully intend to perpetuate. The 500,000 deaths during the eleven years since liquor traffic is responsible for at least repeal of the 18th. Amendment. Can any Christian, in any way sanction and support the liquor traffic, which destroys so many lives, and not to be guilty of murder along with the worst of them?

I must say Illinois Free Will Baptist hospitality is surely unexcelled anywhere. We were never treated more lovely and to see these good people walk up and lay their offerings on the Bible for this missionary cause, well, it just made me wonder if I could believe my eyes. They are certainly not afraid to give of their money in Illinois. We enjoyed some splendid visits in the homes of three Brother Preachers while there: Rev. Kettaman, Rev. Burton and Rev. Harpole. Praise the Lord for the Free Will Baptist of Southern Illinois.

As to Missouri of course they are lining right up with us on this \$40,000 campaign. Which is no more than I knew they would do. We can always depend on Missouri. The offering taken at the Missouri State Association last week for foreign missions was, as far as we are able to determine, the largest offering ever taken for foreign missions at any one time in the history of Free Will Baptist's. So we have cause to be proud of the liberality of our good peo-

ple in Missouri.

By the loyal help of Brother Kenneth Turner we have the motion pictures which were taken on the Cuban Mission field last spring all lined up and have been presenting them in several places. They are proving a blessing and we received some film from Brother Parsons of Nashville a few days ago which we will add to them. Calls are coming in much faster than we will ever be able to fill with the picture machine, but will do our best. We have a number of places on our list to try to make in the coming months, among them is a picture tour in Ilinois, and the Alabama State Convention. I see already we will never get around to all the places during the coming year; but will go as far as we can.

Miss Barnard has been doing some splendid itinerate work during the month of August among some of our untouched churches in the mountains of western North Carolina. Also contracting some Associational meetings along the N. C., Tenn. State line, and the Chattahoochee Ass'n. of Ga. As a result of these contacts I received a nice check from her to the amount of \$260.80 and another for \$38.19. This is very good considering the fact that most, if not all, of these churches were never touched before in the interest of forign missions.

Also had a fine report from Bro. Bert Rogers of Drumright, Okla. Bro Rogers has recently made a tour down into Texas where he has contacted a number of places and a nice check comes in with his letter to the amount of \$144.00 Bro. Rogers has introduced a plan among the people out there in our western ranks which he says is working very fine. We are proud of this fine piece of work by the Recording Secretary of our Board.

Very favorable reports continue to come in from the field in Cuba. Souls continue to be saved there. The students from the Cuban School who have been preaching over the field during the summer vacation months have reported some splendid results. Our missionaries are improving in health over that of a few months ago; but we urge you to please continue to pray for them, and for the work in general.

## AND HE TOUCHED THEIR EYES

That Jesus went about doing good is nowhere declared more emphatically than it is in Matthew 9, inasmuch as this chapter is a record of one incident after another of

works of mercy and compassion. Jesus was concerned primarily about mens' spiritual welfare but while ministering to their spiritual needs He ministered also to their temporal and physical needs. The poor in spirit and the sick in body or mind always

found a loyal, sympathetic friend in Jesus. And as our Master went about seeking occasion to do good, so should we concern ourselves with the immediate task at hand, that of being a friend to those who are in need.

Jesus had spent an exhausting and exasperating day. He had been invited to leave Gadara after having healed the demoniacs, the people having declared by their actions that they loved their hogs more than they did men's souls. Undaunted, He came over the Sea of Galillee and once on this side He healed a paralytic man. Passing on He must needs go by the toll office where He called Matthew to the discipleship. ing grown weary, Jesus sat and ate with a group of tax-gatherers and sinners and was taken to task by gain-saying Pharisees. In the course of time Jairus came to Him saying, "My daughter is dead; but come put your hand on her and she will return to life." Jesus rose to follow but even in going He was besieged by those who were in need and He healed the woman who had been afflicted for twelve years. Once in the house of Jairus He soon banished death and restored the daughter to life while doubters and scoffers looked on amazed.

Thus it was that while many remained in spiritual blindness, two men who were actually, literally blind hailed Jesus as He left the house of Jairus with, "Thou Son of David, have mercy." It was no uncommon thing to see blind men in that country as there was a peculiar disease that affected the eyeball causing sudden blindness. It was, however, a rare thing to hear men thus crying to another man to heal them. These men, though, were men of no ordinary intentions. They had heard of Jesus and out of their deep need they were seeking aid. And they sought one who would not fail, Jesus, the wonder-worker. So the order follows: In the first place, the men recognized their needs. Again, they recognized the ability of Jesus to meet that need. Further, they called on Him to perform the necessary work, at the same time exercising faith that they would be heard and healed.

And what a lesson we should get just here. At our best we are needy creatures, blinded to the fullest magnitude of the task. How we need to recognize as Free Will Baptist that we are merely scanning the surface, to see that there are deeper depths and higher heights!! That there are paths of service as yet untrodden, alpine heights as yet unsurmounted, human suffering as yet unrelieved, lost souls as yet unrelieved, lost souls as yet unrelieved, children yet homeless and hungry. GOD HELP US\*\*\*THOU SON OF DAVID!! PITY US!!!

Thus out of the realization of our needs we will be driven to our knees and our hearts wil pour out as a flood to Jesus, and He will hear us and "OPEN OUR EYES." And more than that, He will THRUST US OUT INTO SERVICE. So women, if you do not want to serve, you'd better not pray. For before you get up off your knees The Master will give you a job.

Jesus did not heal the blind men until He had asked, "Do you believe that I can do this?" When they answered "Yes" 'He touched their eyes. The actual touch was probably unnecessary, they could have been healed without it. But what an impression that touch must have made. And so when Christ touches us and opens our eyes, we will do as did these blind men when they were healed. "And they went out and spread His fame."

May we Auxiliary women over the states pray the Christ to touch our eyes so that we will be able to see the fields that need harvesting. Many times we are able to help bring in the harvest through the printed page. Let's work this year for a bigger and a better Literature Department that we may be able to spread His fame.

"Faith" Eph. 2:8.

"For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God." (Eph. 2:8)

Shall we read this verse again? "For by grace are ye saved through faith, and that (that faith) not of yourselves: it (that faith) is the gift of God." We are saved by Grace through faith and even that faith is not of ourselves but is the gift of God.

In the light of this verse then we may go further to say, that faith is fundamental in the Christians creed and conduct. We are saved through faith and further, we walk by faith in our Christian experience.

I'm sure you have heard this illustration given in defining faith: A small boy was atop a high fence. His father was standing beneath and when all other methods had failed to get the boy to desend from his precarious perch, his father called to him, "jump, I'll catch you." Whereupon the child immediately jumped into his fathers out stretched arms. This illustration is given oftentimes to show the penitent that

he must accept Christ by faith and that be will not let him fall. It is a very good illustration, but the one point often overlooked in the story is the fact that the child knew his father.

Faith is not believing without evidence; it is not a blind leap into nothingness; true faith is based upon knowledge, that God is God and His Word is true and will be true forever and forever. We cannot believe in God without knowledge, but knowledge is not altogether sufficient by itself.

We have a world full of people who believe that God is God; that He is omnipotent, omniscient, holy, just and all these things, but they only believe with their heads. They do not believe with their hearts, in that they have not surrendered their love and devotion unto Him and the scriptures say, "As a man thinketh in his heart so is he." It isn't enough to acknowledge Christ as the Saviour of the world, but there must also be the assent of the heart to this knowledge. "But as many as received him, to them gave he power to become the sons of God even to them that believe on his name." John 1:12.

Further there must be an appropriation unto ourselves of all we know and assent concerning Christ and His work. There is such a thing as saying "Amen" without surrendering the hearts affections and desire to Christ. I know that water will keep me from dying of thirst; my heart can yearn for water, but until I reach out and take and drink. I will not have been benefited. Faith always has in it the idea of action!

Faith is the work of the Triune God. Rom. 12:3; 1 Cor. 12; Phil. 1:29; Gal. 5:22; 1 Cor. 12:9.

Are you asking, if faith is the work of the Triune God, why am I responsible for not having it? Because you will not allow God to create faith in you and because you will not use faith He has already entrusted to you.

Remember the time when the Spirit whispered to you, to speak to that one about his soul; to teach that Sunday School class, to pray in public or whatever the task may have been, but you would not, do you remember? You failed to grow in faith because you would not yield yourself to the

bidding of the Holy Spirit and do the task assigned to you.

Had your obeyed, your faith would have to been strengthened and made stronger for the next task. There is a human side to faith. Rom. 10:17; Acts 4:4; Eph. 1:13; Gal. 3:2-5; Rom. 4:19. The reading of God's Word is an instrument in the development of faith. Also the power of prayer in the development of faith must not be under-valued.

I could go further here and give you some Bible results of faith, but I shall not take up the space and too, to impose upon our good editor, but I do wish to bring this to your attention:

We are saved by faith; we walk by faith; and our faith is not based on nothing. God is expecting us to use our faith and put it to work in the salvation of the lost and the edifying of the saints. ## EAST NASHVILLE CHURCH

Sunday July 30, 1944 marked a red-letter day in the history of East Nashville F. W. B. Church, for it was on that day that the church plant was dedicated, debt-free to the Lord and His cause. On the fourth Sunday in June of this year the final goal had been reached when the congregation responded with an offering of \$2,209.00. Plans were made then and there for the dedication service and these plans were carried out the fifth Sunday in July, thus bringing to a climax many hard and discouraging years of labor and toil. We can rejoice greatly in the Lord because only His mercy and goodness made such an accomplishment possible. Following is a portion of a talk delivered by Mrs. J. E. Frazier on dedication day which gives some of the highlights of East Nashville church.

"In the fall of 1923 a small group of zealous women residing in East Nashville, but attendants at Cofer's Chapel church in north Nashville, asked permission of Cofer's Chapel to start an organized work The permission was in East Nashville. granted and the work was launched by Rev. J. L. Welch on Jan. 10,1924 with twelve members who had assembled at the home of Mrs. Fred Polston at 318 Woodland St. At first this branch work was known as the East Nashville Workers, but on Sept. 7, 1924 it was duly constituted "East Nashville Free Will Baptist Church," with 19 charter members.

For a few months all the services were

conducted in the homes of the members. Later a hall located over a grocery store at 12th and Woodland Sts. was rented and worship services were begun there on the first Sunday in Sept. 1924. Rev. Henry Oliver, a student as S.P.U. located then at Clarksville, Tenn., was the first pastor. He pastored the church until the fall of 1926, when he accepted a teaching position in Eureka College at Ayden, N. C.

Rev. M. S. Harris was the second pastor. He served one year and was succeeded by Rev. Loy E. Ballard of North Carolina. In 1930 the second home, our present building, was purchased and on the second Sunday in May, 1930, it was formally opened. On July 30, 1944, it was dedicated free of any debt and with a substantial amount left in the bank for future needs.

The same year that our church was purchased, Rev. J. L. Welch, the organizer, accepted the pastorate and remained with us five years, when he accepted a call to Cofer's Chapel Church where he had formerly served as pastor.

The next pastor, Rev. I. J. Blackwelder, also served the church five years, then resigned, taking with him thirty members with whom he organized an independent work in northeast Nashville. In January 1941, Rev. Henry Melvin, of Durham, N. C. and two years later he resigned to return to his church in Durham.

The members of East Nashville church have always and still do "earnestly contend for the faith once delivered to the saints." So all the way the Lord has led us and crowned even some bitter years To Him be all the with His blessings. True, the glory and honor and praise. task has been great and at times quite discouraging even to the faithful few. the unfaltering faith and the unquenchable zeal of her charter members and those faithful and loyal members added from year to year have resulted in the achievement of this time and other great blessings of the past.

"Faith without works" is just as dead today as it was when James first made the assertion. It is still true that dead things do not grow. The rule in heaven is: you grow or go. East Nashville church has grown from 19 members to 164 members; from an offering of \$2.00 on Jan. 10,1924

to an offering of \$2,209.00 given worshipfully on June 25, 1944. She has grown until among her children are members of leadership ability, initiative, consecration and generosity of time, talent and money. With everyone of these sharing his and her best in the Master's service, East Nashville can expect even greater achievements as the days come.

Before I close, I must say that much credit for this debt erasure plan is due the official board whose chairman is Mr. E. D. Parker and to the newly elected pastor, Rev. Damon Dodd of Missouri. Both the Board and the Pastor have done a praiseworthy piece of work in the few months given them to work the plan. Rev. Dodd's soul winning spirit, courageous

heart and Christian patriotism are in harmony with East Nashville's character of progress and unselfish devotion to truth and to God. The Spirit of God is among us and there are many reasons for rejoicing. Surely there is a glorious day ahead for East Nashville and the F. W. B. cause in Nashville, Tenn.

#### END OF THE ROAD

WHAT WILL HAPPEN to Hitler and some of his associates when the United Nations have won the war? James McClincy, in a Chicago Sun article, "End of the Road," speculates:

HITLER—Der Fuehrer is capable of suicide, since he is an hysterical mystic at times. He might be more useful alive, though, and his generals might persuade him to accept martyrdom in the hands of the Allies.

MUSSOLINI—Would take his life if he could work up the intestinal fortitude, or could be sure that he would see the headlines in the spirit world. Actually he will probably surrender to his country.

HIMMLER—Has burned all his bridges. Cannot flee anywhere in the world where relatives or friends of his victims could not get him. Most Allied nations have large scores to settle with him.

Goebbels—Has made more enemies than entire Nazi hierarchy and might be killed by another Nazi when the final bars are down. He is ruthless, introverted and embittered.

Goering-Has safely provided for him-

self to live comfortably in one or another neutral country. Is convinced that war guilt won't take place, and that he can get away with anything.

Although Roosevelt and Churchill have assured the world that a criminal record of these international outlaws is being kept for future prosecution, just what will happen to them is pure speculation. But whether suicide, execution or assassination, one thing is sure: That will not be the "end of the road." Death is not the end of the road; it is but a brief bridge from time to eternity.

More pointed and pertinent is the question for these men and all to face: "After death, what?" The Holy Scriptures say, "It is appointed unto men once to die, but after this the judgement" (Hebrews 9:27). Yes, judgement—judgement for crimes, atrocities; in fact, all sins committed in life.

And there will be no chance of escape, for God too keeps a record of men's sins in a book of deeds, from which some day all men will be judged unless their names are written in another book which God calls the Book of Life.

How can one know that his sins are not awaiting judgement in God's record book, but that his name is in the Book of Life? That the "end of the road" for him will not be judgement and eternal Hell? Christ said, "Verily, verily, I say unto you, he that heareth My words and believeth on Him that sent Me hath everlasting life, and shall not come into condemnation, but is passed from death unto life" (John 5: 24).

Yes, God has provided a way to escape the judgement which He must otherwise justly impose upon all men for their sins. Jesus Christ died to save sinful men from the penalty of their sins, and to give them eternal life. When a man by faith trusts Christ as his Saviour and hope for eternal life, God wipes out his sinful record and writes his name in the Book of Life, guaranteeing him everlasting joy and blessedness in Heaven. The stars will fall before this promise of God can be broken to those who put their faith in Christ.
