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GOSPEL SERMONS

· OH BEOHLEHEM

MARLIEW 1:18-25 - "Now the birth of Jesus Christ was on this wise: When as His mother Mary was espoused to Jos ph. before they came together, she was found with child of the Ho'y Ghost.

Then Joseph her husband, being a just man, and not willing to make her a publick example, was minded to put her away privily.

But while he thought on these things. behold, the angel of the Lord appointed unto him in a dream, saying. Josephfrom son of David, fear not to take unto thre Mary thy wife, for that which is conceived in her is of the Holy Ghost.

And she shal bring forth a son, and thou short coil his name JESUS: for He shall save his people from their sins.

For all this was done, that it might he fulfilled which was spoken of the I o d by the prophet, saying,

Teho'd, a virgin shall be with chi'd, and sha'l bring forth a son, and they shall call his name Emmanuel, which being interpreted is. God with us.

Then Joseph being raised from his closen did as the arrel of the Lord had bidden him, and took unto him his wife.

And Inew has not till she had brought forth her firsthorn son and he called bis rame JESUS.

These wonderful words confirm the prophecies of the O'd Testament concerning the virgin birth of Christ. There is one other thing I would like to impress upon your mind concerning Jeaus, and that is, when Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea it was the Christ of eternity who became the Christ of history. Jesus himse'f said before Abraham In Micah 5:2 the prophet

said: "But thou, Betalehem, ...pn. though thou be little among the thousands of Judah, yet out of thee shall he come forth unto me that is to be ruler in Israel; who's goings forth have been from of old from everlasting." words speak to us of the eternal nature and the true character of Christ. Christmas Story therefore has to do with the cloricus event of the v'rgin birth of Christ, when the Christ of eternity beerme the Christ of History.

The Shepherds Wore First to Hear The Good News

It is interesting to note that when Jesus had been born in Bethichem this glorious fact was made known, first of all to the sheperds, who were watching over their focks by night. The announcement was made unto them by the angel of the Lord, who was soon joined by a multitude of the heavenly host, as confirmed in Luke 2:5-15, where it same: "And there were in the same country shepholds abiding in the flolds, keeping watch over their flock by night, and lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord thone around about them, and they were some afreid. And the angel said unto thom. From not: For, behold I bring you good tidings of erect joy, which shall be to all people; for unto you is Born this day in the city or D vid a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord. And this shall be a sign unto you: ye shall find the bobe vrapped in swaddling clothed lying in a manager, and suddenly there was with the anger a multitude of the heaven'y host praising Cod, and saying: Glory to God in the Highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men. And it came to pass as the

angels were gone away from them into heaven, the shepherds said one to another, Let us now go even unto Bethlehem, and see this thing which the Lord hath made known unto us."

How the Wisemen Found the Christ Child

While God used the angels to announce the birth of Christ to the shephe ds he employed a different means in making this same event known to the wise-men. God employed what we often speak of as the Star of Bethiehem. According to the Scriptures however it should be called the Star of the East, because that is where the Wise-men first saw it, as confirmed in the divine record of this event recorded in Matthew 2:1-12: "Now when Jesus was born in Bethiehem of Judaea in the days of Herod the King, behold, there came wise men from the east to Jerusalem."

Eaying, Where is he that is born King of the Jews? for we have seen His starth the east, and are come to worship Him.

V. hen Herod the King had heard these things, he was troubled, and all Jerusalem with him.

And when he had gathered all of the chief priests and so ites of the people together, he demanded of them where Christ should be born.

And they said unto him, In Bethlehem of Judaea; for thus it is written by the prophet,

And thou Bethlehem in the land of Jud ea: for out of thee shall come a Governor, that shall rule my people Israel.

Then Herod, when he had privily called the wise men, enquired of them diligently what time the star appeared.

And he sent them to Bethlehem, and said, Co and search diligently for the young child; and when ye have found him, bring me word again, that I may come and vo ship him also.

When they had heard the king, they departed; and lo, the star, which they saw in the cast, went before them, t'll i' came and stood over where the young child was.

When they saw the star, they rejoiced

with exceeding great joy.

And when they were come into the house, they saw the young child with Mary his mother, and fell down, and worthipped him; and when they had opened their treasures, they presented unto him gifts; gold, and frankincense, and myrth.

"And being warned of God in a dream that they should not return to Herod, they departed into their own country another way."

We cannot read this passage without realizing that God performed a miracle in the heavens to make known to the wase men the spiritual wonder of the virgin birth of the Christ child.

There is no question in my mind but what the star, which appeared unto them, as the star of Messiah, because you will netice from the record given that the vise men befored to it as "It's Star," saying. 'Where is He that is born King of the Jevs for we have seen His Star in the east and are come to worship Him." This star therefore, was His Star in a very particular sense. To the wise men it was a symbol of the new born king of the Jews, and to them a guiding star, for it went before them and stood over where the young child was.

The Star of David

It is very interesting to not ce that the Star of David, which appears on nearly all the Jewish synchogues is a six pointed star. The six pointed star is made up of two interlaced trangles. One of these triangles is supposed to represent the triane nature of God as Father, Son and Holy Spirit. The se and triangle is supposed to represent the triune natrure of man as spirit, sou and Lody. When these two triangles are 'nterlaced they form a six pointed star, which make a composite symbol, representing the unification of Cod and man. In other words they symbolice the incarnation of Christ, who was God manifested in the flesh, or in other words, the God-man.

The incarnation of Christ is beautifully taught and confirmed in Isaiah 9:6, where the prophet said: "For anto us a child is born, unto us a son is given:—This

was not a needless repetition, as some nay suppose. On the contrary when the prophet said "unto us a child is born" this expression had reference on the humanity of our Lord, for he took upon Himself the seed of Abraham, and having been conceived by the Holy Ghost was born of virg'n mother.

When the prophet said "unto us a son is given" he had reference to Christ as the divine Son of God, whom God gave as His giftunto men. Therefore the child born and the son given were expressions used to represent the Mess ah, who was God manifested in the flesh. Jesus therefore was both human and divine.

The results of this divine incarnation are beautifully expressed in the complete reading of this same verse which says: "For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given; and the government shall be upon his shoulder; and His name shall be called: Wonderful, Counsellor, The mighty God, The everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace."

The Star Out of Jacob

Prophet cally Jesus was referred to in Numbers 24:15-19 as a Star out of J. cob. This prophet's title occurs in the prophency of Balaam, which is recorded in this passage. In Numbers 24:17-19 Balaam said: "I shall see him, but not now: I shall behold Him, but not nigh, there shall come a star out of Jacob, and a Sceptre shall rise out of Islacl, and shall smite the corners of Moab, and destroy all the children of Sheth.

And Edem shall be a possession, Soir also shall be a possession for his enemies; and Israel shall do valiantly.

"Out of Jacob shall come he that shall have dominion, and shall destroy him that remaineth of the city."

That Jesus vas the fu filment of this prophecy is confirmed in Luke 1:30-33 in the divine anunciation which the angel Gabriel gave to Mary the mother of Jesus, even before he was born. In this passage it says: "And the angel said 1.to her, Fear not, Mary: For thou has found favor with God. And behold, thou

shalt conceive in thy womb, and bring forth a son, and thou shalt call his name. Jesus. He shall be great, and shall be called the son of the Highest, and the Lord God shall give unto him the tirone of his father David; and He shall reign over the house of Jacob forever; and of his kingdom there shall be no end."

Another passage confirming the fact that Jesus was to have power and dominion is found in Isaiah 9:7 where the prophet said "Of the increase of His government and peace there shall be no end, upon the throne of David, and upon his kingdom, to order it, and to establish it with judgment and with justice, from Lenceforth even forever. The zeal of the Lord of Hosts will perform this."

After reading such passages, such as these no earnest student of the scriptures can deny the earthly Messiahship of Jesus and that some day He will be the Messiah of Israel, accepted by them, and that He will then be King of Kinge and Lord of Lords, and rule and reign in righteousness over the nations of the whole earth.

Christ, The Day Star

No doubt, that is the reason in II Peter 1:19 He is spoken of as the Day Star. In this passage it says: "We have also a more sure word of prophecy; whereunto ye do well that ye take head, as unto a light that shineth in a dark place, until the day dawn, and the day star arise

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in your hearts."

I rom those words we see that Jesus is a Star of Hope to all those who believe in Him. We, who are Christians therefore, can rejoice in Him, who is our Star of Hope while we are waiting for the cure word of prophecy to be fulfilled.

The Bright and Morning Star

The Birth of Jesus

For unto us a child is born, unto us a Son is given: and the government shall be upon His shoulder: and His name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, the Mighty God, the Everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace. Of the increase of His government and peace there shall be no end, upon the throne of David, and upon His Kingdom, to order it, and to establish it with judgement and with justice from henceforth even for ever. The zeal

of the Lord of hosts will perform this. Isa. 9:6 and 7.

And there were in the same country shepherds abiding in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. And lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them: and they were sore afraid. And the angel said unto them, Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people.—Luke 2:8-10.

"Hark, the glad sound! the Saviour comes, The Saviour, promised long; Let every heart prepare a throne, And every voice a song.

He comes, the pris'ner to release.

In Satan's bondage held;
The gates of brass before him burst,
The iron fetters yield.

It is natural, at this season of the year, that we who are Christians should rejoice with joy unspeakable and full of glory, because of the birth of Christ which occurred in Bethlehem, nearly two thousand years ago. His coming at that time was and is still the "glad tidings of great joy that shall be to all people." Wars and rumors of wars do not and cannot change the plans and purposes of God in redemption. In other words, the purposes for which Christ came are just the same today and mean as much to the world as they ever did.

WHY JESUS CAME

It will do all of us good, I am sure, to study and meditate upon some of the rea-

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sons why Jesus came from heaven to earth, and was born of Mary in Bethlehem.

First of all, I would like to suggest that He came as the Divine Son of God to fulfill the prophecies, which had been recorded in the Old Testament, concerning His coming as the Messiah of Israel, and as the Saviour of the world. For example, in Isa. 7:14, the Prophet spoke prophetically of Christ and His coming, and the manner of His appearance, when he said:

"Therefore the Lord himself shall give you a sign; Behold, a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel."

Again, in Micah 5:2, the Prophet spoke of Christ's coming, and the place where He should be born, by saying:

"But thou Bethlehem Ephratah, though thou be little among the thousands of Judah, yet out of thee shall he come forth unto me that is to be ruler in Israel; whose goings forth have been from of old, from everlasting."

And thus, my friends, we see that Jesus came to fulfill these and many other prophecies, which had been recorder concerning Him.

TO BEAR WITNESS TO THE TRUTH

That Jesus came into the world to bear witness to the truth is confirmed in John 18:37, where it says:

"Pilate therefore said unto him, Art thou a king then? Jesus answered, Thou sayest that I am a king. To this end was I born, and for this cause came I into the world, that I should bear witness unto the truth. Every one that is of the truth heareth my voice."

TO BE THE LIGHT OF THE WORLD

When Jesus came at His first advent, the world was filled with spiritual darkness, and He came to be a light to the Gentiles, and the glory of His people Israel. In John 8:12, it says: "Then spake Jesus again unto them, saying, I am the light of the world: he that followeth meshall not walk in darkness, but shall have the light of life."

No one can doubt but what Jesus was and still is the light of the world, but the trouble is that men love darkness rather than I'ght because their deeds are evil. The fact that so many people are still walking in spiritual darkness, therefore, is because they have rejected Jesus, the light of the world.

TO DO HIS FATHER'S WILL

We know also from the Scriptures, that Jesus came, not to do His own will, but to do the will of God. In John 4:34, it says:

"Jesus saith unto them, My meat is to do the will of him that sent me, and to finish his work."

We know that God's will and purpose was to give His only begotten Son, as a sacrifice for sin, so that whosoever bedieveth upon Him should not perish, but have everlasting life.

TO DIE UPON THE CROSS

Few people realize that it had been prophecied that Jesus would come and die a sacrificial, atoning death but in Isa. 53: 7-10, it says:

"He was oppressed, and he was afflicted, yet he opened not his mouth: he is brought as a lamb to the slaughter, and as a sheep before her shearers is dumb, so he openeth not his mouth. He was taken from prison and from judgment; and who shall declare his generation? for he was cut off out of the land of the living: for the transgression of my people was he stricken. And he made his grave with the wicked, and with the rich in his death; because he had no violence, neither was any deceit in his mouth. Yet it pleased the Lord to bruise him; he hath put him to grief: when thou shalt make his soul an offering for sin, he shall see his seed, he shall prolong his days, and the pleasure of the Lord shall prosper in his hand."

The four gospels of the New Testament give to us an historical confirmation of the death of Christ, and in Philippians 2:5-8, it says:

"Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus: Who, being in the form of God, thought it not robbery to be equal with God: But made himself of no reputation, and took upon him the form of a servant, and was made in the likeness of men: And being found in fashion as a man, he humbled himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death

of the cross."

TO RISE AGAIN

That Jesus came not only to die a sacrificial atoning death upon the cross, but to conquer death and rise again is confirmed in the statement which He made to Martha, as recorder in John 11:25, where it says:

"Jesus said unto her, I am the resurrection, and the life: he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live:"

THANKS BE UNTO GOD FOR HIS UNSPEAKABLE GIFT

The above statement is the caption of a little tract concerning God's Christmas Gift to the world, as published by The Gospel Fellowship, of Salina, Kansas, in which it is pointed out that: "Jesus gave HIMSELF for us (Galatians 2:20). This means that as the Infinite Son of God, HE GAVE AII "For our sakes He became poor, that we through His poverty might be RICH" (II Corinthians 9:8).

He gave His EYES to weep over your sins. (Luke 19:41).

He gave His CHEEKS to be smitten for you (Lamentations 3:30).

He gave His TONGUE to pray for the lost. (Luke 23:34).

He gave His BACK to be beaten for you. (Psalm 129:3).

He gave His SIDE to the spear for you. (John 19:34).

He gave His HANDS to the cruel nails for you (Psalm 22:16).

He gave His BLOOD to redeem your soul. (Acts 20:28).

He gave His SOUL an offering for you (Isaiah 53:12).

He gave His LIFE for the sheep (John 10:11).

WHAT WILL YOU DO WITH HIM?

Christ was given that sinners might be saved. He died on the cross for any one who will receive Him as their substitute. The Gift God has given is His Son, the Lord Jesus Christ, and if you will receive

Him now He will give you another gift: eternal Life. Will you receive God's gift now? 'As many as received Him to them gave He power to become the Children of God.' John 1:12.

JESUS TO COME AGAIN

Many scripture passages could be given to confirm the fact that Jesus, who came and was crucified and buried and rose again, and ascended into heaven, will come again, to fulfill the purposes of God, as set forth in the prophetic scriptures concerning His second advent. For instance, in Acts 1:9-11, it says:

"And when he had spoken these things, while they beheld, he was taken up; and a cloud received him out of their sight. And while they looked stedfastly toward heaven as he went up, behold, two men stood by them in white apparel; Which also said, Ye men of Galilee, why stand ye gazing up into heaven? This same Jesus, which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven."

To every truly born again Christian, the promise of Christ's second coming is a blessed hope, which gives to us faith, and hope and courage in these dark and trying times. In Titus 2:11-14, it says:

"For the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared to all men, denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly, in this present world; Looking for that

blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ; Who gave himself for us, that he might redeem us from all iniquity, and purify unto himself a peculiar people, realous of good works."

Therefore, my friends, while we are remembering with thanksgiving, the birth of Christ, those of us who are Christians should rejoice also at this Christmas time in the hope that our Lord and Saviour will soon come to deliver us who belong to Him, out of this wicked world, and to judge the wicked of the whole earth, after which He will establish His own messianic kingdom of righteousness over the nations of the whole earth, as prophetically fortold in Isa. 9:6 and 7, where the Prophet said:

"FOR UNTO US A CHILD IS BORN, UNTO US A SON IS GIVEN: AND THE GOVERNMENT SHALL BE UPON HIS SHOULDER: AND HIS NAME SHALL BE WONDERFUL, COUNSELLOR, CALLED THE MIGHTY GOD, THE EVERLASTING FATHER, THE PRINCE OF PEACE. THE INCREASE OF HIS GOVERNMENT AND PEACE THERE SHALL BE NO END, UPON THE THRONE OF DAVID, AND UPON HIS KINGDOM, TO ORDER IT, AND TO ESTABLISH IT WITH JUDG-ANDWITH JUSTICE MENT HENCEFORTH EVEN FOR EVER. THE ZEAL OF THE LORD OF HOSTS WILL PERFORM THIS."

The Remedy For Fear

On that sacred night when Christ was born a great thing was said to the shepherds abiding with their flocks in the fields. It was a glorious statement, made by an angel, a statement which touched one of the deepest needs of human nature.

"Fear not," said the angel, "for behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy.... for unto you is born this day a Saviour.."

This Saviour was to save men from many things—from sin, from weakness, and also from fear. No one, before or since, has been able to do so great a service to humanity. Only Jesus Christ has

the skill necessary to save people from the grievous burden of fear.

The importance and far-reaching effect of this aspect of the Saviour's work is indicated by the statement of two scientific men:

"Fear is one of the most common and most subtle of all human diseases," says a famous American physician.

"Fear is one of the most disintegrating enemies of personality," declares an outstanding psychologist.

Obviously, these scientific men are referring to abnormal, not normal fear.

Normal fear is healthy and wholesome. It is a mechanism for the protection of the individual. A certain amount of caution is necessary to the safe conduct of a man's life. But abnormal fear is something quite different. It is an agency of disunion, and it is productive of complexes. It is a deep, dark terror in the mental and emotional life. It disrupts happiness and frustrates cherished ambitions.

One of the greatest of all blessings is the fact that fear can be cured. A physician relates his personal experience as follows:

"I was a victim of fears from childhood. Fears consumed my energy and drew off the power which I needed to do my work efficiently. I knew that I must find a cure for fear or face failure and ruin. I searched far and wide for that cure, and one glad day I found it."

And where do you think this physician found the cure for fear? It was in a tert... a text from the Bible: "But God hath not given us the spirit of fear; but of power and of love, and of a sound mind."

"This text I took as a medicine," he declares, "and it cured me. Now my practice has become largely one of delivering burdened men and women from their fears. Eagerly they fill my office, and in addition to the medicine which I give them for their bodily ailments, I also prescribe for their minds and souls this other medicine which cured me. It cures many of them, also."

The first ingredient in this formula for the cure of fear is power—the power of faith. Faith may be described as a medicine—a healing medicine of the mind, of the spirit and even of the body. It may be received into the consciousness as a therapeutic agent, the curative potency of which can reach even the most obscure centers of consciousness.

How does one take medicine? One method, of course, is by the mouth. Medicine is also taken intravenously, as an injection into the blood stream. But these are not the only ways by which one can take medicine. Medicine may be taken through the eye or through the ear. For example, if you are afflicted with the malady of abnormal fear, place a Bible before

you. Open it to a passage which tells of the power of God. Your eye looks upon these words. This causes a reflection upon the retina of the eye. Thus far, it is purely a mechanical reaction. The image reflecting on the retina of the eye produces a concept or idea which, if received and believed, will pass through the ramifications of the mind until it comes to the diseased area where it throws around the center of infection its benign and healing influence. If this dosage is repeated consistently, the disease germs of fear will presently be driven off by the health-giving power of the faith which plays upon the center of infection, and one will ultimately be cured of fear.

Again I would remind you that faith as a medicine may also be taken through the ear. Go to church and sit in a pew. There you listen to the reading of the Scripture, to the prayer offered by the minister, to the hymns of faith, courage and affirmat-The minister preaches, and sound waves are set up and fall upon your ear drums. So far, as in the case of the eye, the process is mechanical. But as you continue to listen, the sound waves falling upon the ear drum are transformed into an idea. You receive this idea. You believe it. You act upon it. You allow it to proceed farther into your mind. It makes its way through the brain to the center of consciousness-to the area of infection. if And this dosage. is continued.

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in due course a cure will be affected.

This healing goes even farther, however. If it becomes an habitual attitude of mind so that faith is allowed to develop into a dominating influence in the consciousness, one will gradually attain within one's self a positive immunity to fear. In a crisis, this immunity will react as an automatic protective device. "If ye have faith.... nothing is impossible."

The second element in the medicine advocated by the physician as a cure for fear is love. "Perfect love casteth out fear." Love always leads to trust, and trust has an astounding way of driving fear from our minds.

If you really wish to be delivered from fear you must develop in your own mind ame attitude of trust and love that a child entertains for his father. We are the places is mechanical. And if this dosage is continued. to trust God, because we first are taught to love God, and our attitude toward God should be the same attitude that a little child has for a human father. This is one of the basic teachings of Christianity, and it is of very great importance in the curing of fear. When people have the native childlike genius to rest their burders, their troubles and their fears upon God, they find through this interchange of love and trust that the burden of their fears is removed.

It is strange that it is so difficult to paramade people to adopt this mental attitude. There is a curious twist to the mind by which men are reluctant to let go of their fears—fears which they, nevertheless, hate and which make their lives miserable. Perhaps long-continued association with fear has the same effect that makes men love their chains.

I have often (nought that in our church services we ought to have a second collection—but not for money. Every church, it seems to me, ought to be equipped with huge baskets which at the conclusion of a service—just before the benediction—would be passed down the aisles. The people would hand along their fears to the end man, who in turn would put these fears in the basket, until all the fears in the church had been collected, whereupon the ushers would bring the baskets forward to the pulpit. The minister, acting in the name of God, would say, "I hereby declare that you are freed from your fears. Go in peace, and may the peace of God go with you."

One can well imagine how released the members of such a congregation would feel. They would stand to their feet and sing"Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow" with such vibrancy and earnestness that the very rafters of the roof would shake. Do you know what would happen then? The people would start to file out, but before they would get to the door, nearly every one, with a sheepish smile, would turn around, hunt out the basket where his fear had been deposited, and fish down and recover his fear.

Perhaps this seems a rather foolish suggestion, $b_{\rm H}t$ we must come to the point of realizing that if we are ever to be cured of fear we must trust God enough to leave the fear with Him—and have strength to walk away released.

The final element in the formula for being cured of fear is to have a "sound mind." That is surely one of the greatest blessings any human being can have—a sound mind. It is very easy for the human mind to become tangled. You have seen a kitten play with a ball of yarn. It is amazing how many knots it can creat—and in a very short space of time. Life does the same with the mind. A sound mind is, without any question, the greatest blessing that a human being can have.

Many factors combine to tangle men's minds. Tension stops the free flow of power, as does also the chill of anxiety. A grudge, long—sustained, creates blockades in the emotional life which cloud judgement and distort the possibility of rational thought. The sense of guilt is perhaps the most insidious of all the entanglements of the mind. This, in reality, is a wound in the mind. Sorrow is a wound—but a clean one.

Sense of guilt, though it is also a wound

in the mind, is nevertheless an unclean wound and therefore, the healing process is never concluded unless forgiveness is attained.

These wounds may, perhaps, be more or less successfully carried for a period of time, but eventually the poison disseminated through the emotional and even the physical system manifests itself in many vays-in nervousness, instability, irr tability, tension, high blood pressure, rapid heart action, panic, restlessness, sleeplessness, and in other malad'es often attributed soley to overwork or to organic disease. These are manifestations of what St. Paul refers to as the unsound mind, in the fogs of which fears are generated to float across the surface of the mind like ghosts, as Ibsen in powerful allegory once described them. Lady Macbeth, you remember, desperately attempted to erase a spot of blood from her hand, but no matter how vigorously she washed her hind, the spot remained-for the reason that the spot of blood was not upon ther hand, but was in her mind.

The process of untangling a mind is a long and tedious one; and it requires skillful treatment. It can be accomplished by a wise psychiatrist or physician or pastor, but there is one sure method of untangling a mind, thus eliminating this source of abnormal fear.

A noted editor tells us that from infancy he had a withered leg and was forced to wear a brace. Being unable to run and play with the other boys, he developed a fee irg of inade uacy and inferiority. The acids of bitterness began to develop. Fear laid a cold and crippling hand upon his mind.

One day his father, a devout man, told

the lad that he was going to take him to a great cathedral where God would heal him. Dressed in their Sunday best, father and son walked reverently down the vast aisle, the boy trailing his poor shriveled leg. They stood, presently, before the great altar. They knelt in prayer. After a while the father lifted his face. The editor said that he had seen his father's face under many circumstances, but never this look before. It was as if a light streaming from Heaven illuminated his strong face. It was the exultant look of the believer.

"God has answered; you will be healed, my son," whispered the father.

But as they walked down the aisle the leg was as before. There it hung, limp and pathetic, enclosed in the hateful brace. As they neared the great doors of the church, suddenly the boy stopped. It was as if something had broken within his brain—as if a great hand had touched him. He was aware that something tremendous had happened. He felt released, free and wondrously happy. Boy that he was, he knew the meaning of the experience-God had healed him. He had taken a brace-not from his leg-but from his Personally, I have no trouble in believing that if God had so willed it the leg could have been healed, but it is far more important to take a brace off a man's mind than a brace from his physical body. He was freed from the bitter tyranny of his thoughts.

Little wonder, then, that people celebrate the glorious day on which was born this Saviour with healing in His touch. We give thanks for Jesus, who is able to lift from poor human beings the fears in which they have become entangled.

The Nativity

The Creator Becomes Creature

Let us consider the condescension presented to us in the incarnation. There are a number of steps. First, what condescension that the Creator should become a creature. What condescension

that I'e Who is the First-born, the Originator of all creation, should Himself be brought into being as a ceature. The Maker is here H mself made. The infinite One becomes finite. It is a tremendous candescension, then, for the Creator

to assume creaturehood.

He Became Man

But, secondy, if He is going to assume creaturehood, it might be thought that He would assume that form of creaturehood which is the very highest. would expect Him to become angel and not man. Man at his best is likened to angels. It is said of David, "And my Lord is wise, according to the wisdom of on angel of God" (2 Sam. 14:20); and of Stephen, "And all that sat in the council, fastening their eyes on him, saw his face as it had been the face of an angel" (Acts 6:15); and Paul says, "If I speak with the tongues of men and of angels..." (1 Cor. 13:1). Thus angels are viewed as above men in some important respects. Yet He did not become an angel; He became man-a still lower step.

In Likeness of Sinful Flesh

Thirdly, when He became man, it might have been expected that He would have Lecome man in a state of gor fication. such as Christ's state now at God's right hand. One would expect Him to become man in his highest condition. But not so. He assumed the nature of man without glory. When man was created, he had a certain degree of glory. It was not that state of glory which characterizes Christ now at God's right hand. Man in Eden roccessed a measure of glory, but it was not the measure which we shall possess ultimately. Therefore, if the Son of God in the incornation d'd not take man's rature in its highest possible condition. we might have expected Him to take it in its next condition, that of man of Eden. But not so. He took that nature as it was found after the Edenic glory had been stripped from it, "was found in fashion as a man." "He came in the likeness of sinful flech"-not even with the Edenic glory. He assumed our nature in its state of poverty; not depravity, but poverty.

Further, he d d not only take the nobler part of man's nature, the spiritual part, that pa t vhich knows and loves, but He a so took the lesser part, the outer man, and "was made flesh."

As an Infant

Still lower He came, because when He was made man, He did not assume manhood in a state of maturity, such as Adam possessed to begin with, but He became an infant, needing to grow to full manhood. He became, as some one long ago said, "The Word unable to speak a word."

But Man Forever

Did He come into this estate just for a time, in order that then He might later lay aside creaturehood and revert to H's cternal glory? No, He entered into an everthating state. He took the nature of man to retain it forever; our manhood became His nature no less than Godhood itself.

Born Among Beasts

Finally, not only did He come to dwell amongst men, amongst ginful men, but He came to represent them. And that is a stip lower yet. Sinful men—to what a level have they sunk? They have sunk, says the pralmist, to the level of beasts. I an is "like the beasts that perish" (Psa. 49:12, 20). Representing men who have become as beasts, He was born amongst beasts.

Representative of Sinful Men

O, the condescens on of the incarnation! What con lescension to become a creature: to become anything less than the greatest creature; to become man instead of an angel. And then, to become man notain the state of glorification, not in the state : of partial glory even, but in the state of poverty. To become man as to the baser element, the flesh, as well as the nob er element, the sprit. And to become an infant, needing time to develope. And in all this to be the Representative of sinful men. To be as though He were Thus in His condescension l'e came down, down, to the very lowest level possible, all for Ibve of us. wonder Bernard said in this connection, "The lower, the dearer."

Born in Bethlehem

In order to set off the condescention the better, He was born in Bethlehein. Might tens us that Bethlehem was little,

and the literal rendering is, "Thou are too little to be among the thousands o' Judah" (Micah 5:2). There is a great deal wrapped up in that. At the time of the exodus, we read in Numbers, the tribes of Israel were broken up into thousand; and each thousand hid a princ; er head. Joshua tells us that this arrangement continued when the nation entered into Canaan (Joahua 20:11). However, if there was a group in Israel too small to make a thousand, it was consolidated with another group. Bethlehen was so small that Joshua does not even list it when he enumerates the cities in Canaan. Yet it was in existence long before that. Nor does Nehemich list it. when Israel enters the land the second time, after the captivity. In Nehemiah's time the citizens of Bathlehem were so few that they, together with a neighboring village, made less than two hundred. Yes, this Beth'chem was too small to be rmong the thousands of Judah. It was too insign ficant to be mentioned in any part of Judah's polity.

An Out-of-the-Way Village

As it was insignificant in size, so Behlehem was insignificant in its loca-It was an out-of-the-way place. There is a road that runs from Jerusalem to Hebron. Four miles out, there is a side road to the left which goes over to Bethlehem, a distance of two miles. So licthlehem was insignificant as to its size and also as to its location. Did He come down, down, down? Then how fitting it was that He should select this place in which to be hom. Beho'd, the greatest has become the leart! The highest has become the lowest. Transcendent humility!

As He Was-So May We Be

And shall we who bear H's name be characterized by pride? In His life in us, the life of Him who is so humble? Then how can we be at the other pole? Cyprian, who was converted about the year A. D. 245, referring to Christ's humility and birth, says, "He would have us first to express in our life what He first showed us in the very entry of His Life -humility." Especially so, since at was pride which made necessary His bumbling. For it was pride in Adam which ruined us all. Now that pride nuist be reversed. Did Adam doubt Ged? That doubt must be reversed by faith. Dd Adam eat? That eating must be reversed by firsting. Was Adam's heart lifted up with pride? That must be reversed by humility.

In Superlative Humility

Something more than that reversal is becessary in order to our salvation, but the reversal itself is indispensable. The pride of the first man must be reversed, and therefore the Second Man came in superlative humility. Because the pride of the first man was so high, the humility of the Second Man was so low. In Eden, man aspired to be like God; and in Bethlehem God became as the beasts.

Greetings to the members of our Free Will Baptist family:

Just a few days past we suffered one of the most severe nurricones in the history of Cuba, resulting in unestimable damage. Fortunately, our property and people were not in the votax, as was Havana.

The storm has been the means of a real testimony to the people of the surrounding villages. Our houses at the school, in the first place, were built on the same order as the Cuban tobacco barns, good targets for the hurricone. While all the tobacco barns are leveled to the ground, our houses stood. This caused our people to marvel. They came the next day expecting our teachers and students to be in the open, but they left saying, "Surely God is with this people."

Out of our two hundred beautiful royal palms, only ten were down. These can be used as planks for bridges and fences.

Everywhere the crange crop was completely whipped from the trees by a hundred mile gale. In the favor of God, over half our crop is still on the trees and those are sold to one of our American Camps in Cuba, at a reasonable price.

All about us we see devastation, which should be a lesson on the uncertainity of life. Some classes of people have enjoyed a wave of prosperity and gain. The to-bacco farmer has received large prices for his tobacco, but the gains of the last year must be invested in new tobacco barns and they are costly.

Our responsibilities are almost unbearably heavy with the problems that naturally arise in dealing with on undisciplined, unevangelized people, who know not how to do the most common tasks because they never have had with which to do. The call is for great patience. We need your prayers that we might be equal to the

task.

We must labor in the farm and school under great handicaps. Living facilities are very difficult. Water must be drug from the well in barrels by teams of bulls. Lights are the porest type to study by, but all this is borne cheerfully by a very fine group of students.

We are encouraged by the unusual response that is coming from our people. To know that one rural church in Illinois gave \$650 to missions is an inspiration to us on the field. I hope some day to visit and know these people of the Rescue church.

Due to the difficulty of transportation and the slowness in getting harness and wagons we have been forced to make them ourselves. One, to be a missionary, must be very practical, ready not only, to expound a text but to build a house or a wagon, and make the harness to pull it.

We are grateful to God for a goodly measure of health and with the coming of our Cuban winter ar increasing challenge presents itself to us to reach out to these, who by unpassable travel conditions have been closed in from the outside. Pray with us for faithful consecrated Cuban missionaries, also, pray for the fine student group we have with us this year.

We wish you could listen in on their joyful testimonies and hear them sing. Altogether God has favored us in a marvelous manner, for which we give Him praise.

Superannuation

Rev. J. C. Folt, National Secretary-Treasurer Superantuation Board 808 West 27th Street, Bryan, Texas

At the 1944 session of the National Association in Flat River, Missouri, the National Superannuation Board authorized its administrative office to offer fifty (50) protective superannuation polices to insurable ministers of the denomination. These policies were to be allocated to the several States according to the relationship that the Free Will Baptist population of each State bore to the total population of all the States. The figures given below, based upon statistics in the 1944 National Association Minute, are the work resulting from our authorization by the Board.

Alabama; population, 9563; % of whole, .097; policies, 4.85 or 5. Florida, population, 2012; % of whole, .020; Policies, 1.00 or 1. Georgia; population, 6206; % of whole .063; policies, 3.15 or 3. Illinois; population, 1500; % of whole, .015; policies, 0.75 or 1. Kentucky; population, 4555; % of whole, .046; policies, 2.30 or 2. Michigan; population, 1500 (established); % of whole, .015; policies, 0.75 or 1. Mississippi; population, 2464; % of whole, .025; policies, 1.25 or 1. Missouri; population, 5581; % of whole, .057; policies, 2.85 or 3. North Carolina; population, 28,000; % of whole, .285; policies, 14.25 or 14. Ohio; population, 1532; % of whole, .015; policies, 0.75 or 1. Oklahoma; population, 20,000; % of whole, .203; policies, 10.15 or 10. Tennessee; population, 6363; % of whole, .064; policies, 3.20 or 3. Texas; population, 3473; % of whole, .035; policies, 1.75 or 2. Virginia; population, 2973; % of whole, .040; policies, 2.00 or 2. West Virginia; population, 1595; % of whole, .016; policies, 2.80 or 1. Totals; population, 98,317; % of whole .996; policies, 49.80 or 50.

We have forwarded this information on to the States which have Superannuation Boards and have tried to get the information to the other States from which there has been no report of the election of a Superannuation Board. However, there are several States that we have not been able to contact because we did not know whom to write. We hope every State Association, that did not have a Superannuation Board, elected one this year at its annual meeting, because we do not see how we may administer the program in a State except through its Superannuation Board. There is so much work to be done in every State which we as a National Board cannot do but which may be done easily by a State Board. Therefore the program is going to be hindered in those States which do not have an active Superannuation Board. It is our purpose to prevent any minister or group of ministers from being discriminated against, or deprived of the benefits of this program. Therefore we urge that each State Board give us its maximum co-operation for the sake of the benefits its ministers may receive.

The policies allocated in the table above will be held in reserve for each State until its board is organized or until we see that the allocation is not going to be used by that State. Then we shall re-allocate these pollicies to those States who want them.

We are very anxious to have this program operating in every State, and as you read this article we hope you will determine to find out if your State is co-operating in this most important program. If your State Association does not have a Superannuation Board, urge your moderator to call an executive session to elect a temporary board to serve for this year so that your State will not be behind others and your ministers will not be deprived of the benefits that others are receiving.

The policies we are offering are one thousand dollar Retirement-at-age-70 endow-

ment policies. The National Board will pay one half the annual premium and the insured minister will pay the other half. We believe this offer on the part of the Board will enable every minister to have protection for his family should he diebefore retirement age or money to live on in his old age should he live to retire.

The program generally is moving along nicely in many of the States, but the ministers are not returning their filled-in survey blanks in every instance as speedily as we had hoped they would. Ministers, this is your program and will be of inestimable value to you and all others who may be called to carry the same cross you are carrying. Let us plan for ourselves and those who come after us as we, through our benevolent Superannuation program, plan to care for those who are still living and who carried the cross before us.


