The Birth of Jesus

Too Late For Last Month Luke 2:8-20

And there were in the same country shepherds abiding in the field, keeping watel. over their flock by night. And, lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone around about them: and they were sore afraid. And the angel said unto them, Fear not: For, behold, 1 bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord. And this shall be a sign unto you; Ye shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger. And suddenly there was with the angel a nultitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying, Glory to God in the highest, and on the earth peace, good will toward men. And it came to pass, as the angels were gone away from them into heaven the sherherds said one to another, Let us now go even unto Bethlehem, and see this thing which is come to pass, which the Lord hath made known unto us. And they came with haste, and found Mary, and Joseph, and the babe lying in the manger. And when they had seen it, they made known abroad the saying which was told them concerning this child. And all they that heard it wondered at those things which were told them by the shepherds. But Mary kept all these things, and pointcred them in her heart. And the shepherds neturned, glorifying and praising God for all the things that they had heard and seen, as it was told them. The birth of Jesus was the most strange event the world had ever known. Never before nor after had there been or will there be another

one like it. Lets look and see just what brought this strange birth about.

Back in the garden of Eden after Adam and Eve had sinned and lost fellowsh'p with God, when they had lost the likeness of God and God was about to drive them from the Garden. He placed a curse upon the screent and in that curse there was a promise to fallen humanity. Gen. 3:15 and I will put enmity between thee and the woman, and between thy seed and her seed ; it shall bruise thy head, and thou shalt bruise his heel. That was the first light on redemption of the human family. The seed of woman would bruise the serpent Then came the time that people worshiped God by offerings which could not take away sin but only rolled it back for che year then they had to make another offering. Heb. 10:1 For the law having a shadow of good things to come, and not the very image of the things, can never with these sacrifices which they offered year by year continually make the comers there unto perfect.

The years rollcd on and there was four hundred years of silcace that the people of the earth did not hear from heaven either by ange? or prophet. But people still worshiped by offerings. 'One day Zacharias, the pliest, vent into the temple to buin ncense and the people were without praying and the angel of the Lord appeared unto him and said, "thy vife Elizabeth" shall bear thee a son, and thou shalt call his name John and he shall prepare the way of the Lord." FAITH

Text: "But without faith it is impossible to please him: for he that cometh to God must believe that he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek Him." (Heb. 11:6)

Faith is fundamental in the Christian's creed and conduct. Faith is a paramount quality shown in the example of the healing of the Syrophenician womans daughter. "Then Jesus answered and said unto her, O woman great is thy faith: be it unto thee even as thou wilt. And her daughter was made whole that very hour." (Matt. 15:28) When Bartimacus received his sight as recorded in Mark 10; it was faith that was the supreme virtue. "And Jesus said unto him, Go thy way: thy faith hath made thee whole. And immediately he received his sight, and followed Jesus in the way." (Mark 10:52)

Faith is not believing a thing without evidence: on the contrary faith rests upon the best of evidence the Word of God. "So then faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the word of God." (Rom. 10:17)

Faith is the constent of the will to the assent of the understanding. Faith always has in it the idea of action. It is the soulleading to embrace the Christ in whom it believes. In comparison we might think of a childs faith in its earthy parents. There is no doubt in the mind of a child, but what mother or father will care for him. He has faith to believe in them, no matter what may come in his life. Like wise, we should have similar faith to our heavenly Father. Faith is complete confidence or trust in a person. "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen." (Heb. 11:1)

Faith is the work of the triune God. It is first of all a gift of God's grace. "For I say, through the grace given unto me, to every man that is among you, not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think: but to think soberly, accordingly as God hath dealt to every man the measure of faith." (Rom 12:3) "For as the body without spirit is dead, so faith without works is dead also." (James 2:26) When we have recieved this gift of God's grace, we will be determined to serve him in our weak way. "I can do all things through Christ which strengthened me." (Phil. 4:13)

Second, faith is the work of the triune God, in God the Son, "Looking unto Jesus the auther and finisher of our faith." (Heb. 12:2) We as servants of God today should pray unto our Lord as the apostles did in Luke 17:5 "Lord, increase our faith. In answer to them the Lord said. "If ye had faith as a grain of mustard seed, ye might say unto this sycamine tree, be thou plucked up by the root, and be thou planted in the sea; and it should obey you. (Luke There is nothing too difficult for 17:6)our Lord Jesus to make manifest in our lives, if only we could believe. "Therefore I say unto you what things soever ye desire, when ye pray, believe that ye receive them, and ye shall have them." (Mark 11:24)

Faith is the work of the triune God in God the spirit. The Holy Spirit is the executive of the God head. One of the diversities of gifts of the Holy Spirit is faith. (1 Cor. 12:9)

We can see that faith is the work of the triune God head. Then we are responsible for having it. God wills to work faith in all his creatures. He will do so if we do not resist His Holy Spirit.

There is also a human side to faith. We receive faith by hearing. (Rom. 10:17) "So then faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the word of God." During the time of Peter's ministry, it is recorded that many believed by hearing the message he preached. "How be it many of them which heard the word believed; and the number of the men was about five thousand." (Acts 4:4) "Jesus Christ the same yesterday, and today, and forever." (Heb. 13:8) Having this wonderful promise we can know by hearing of the word of God, the results can be the same. (By faith)

Prayer is an instrument in the deveopment of faith. We think of the incident when the disciples realized they were powerless because they could not heal as Jesus Christ had. They came to Jesus and ask him why they could not cast out devils, and heal as he had done. Jesus answered and said unto them, "Because of your unbellel: for verily I say unto you, If ye have fatth as a grain of mustard rocd, ye shall say unto this mountian, remove hence to yonder place; and it shall remove; and nothing shall be impossible unto you." (Matt. 17:20) As we cultivate our prayer life day by day, we can rest assured our faith is being developed.

Our faith grows by the use of what faith we all ready have. (Matt. 25:29) "For unto every one that hath shall be given, and he shall have abundance; but from him that hath not shall be taken away even that which he hath." If we use the talent we have for God's sevice, our faith will be increased, and our spiritual life will be far sweeter.

There were many instances of faith recorded in the Word of God. (Heb. 11:4) "By faith Abel offered unto God a more excellent sacrifice than Cain, by which he obtained witness that he was rightcous, God testifying of his gifts: and by it he being dead yet speaketh." Abel is a type of the spiritual man. His sacrifice in which atoning blood was shed, was therefore at once his confession of sin, and the express-

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ion of his faith in the interposition of a substitute.

We find another instance of faith found in Enoch's life. "By faith Enoch was translated that he should not see death; and was not found, because God had translated him: for before he was translated he had this testimony, that he pleased God." (Hcb. 11:5)

This picture has a promise for each of us; No child of God ever really scendenth. It is faith that saves us. Death is when the light of earth will fade from one's consciousness, and the light of God's eter nal day will come flooding in upon your soul, and you will pass from death unto life without any dark valley. Do we have this faith in our life?

Noah, a true man of God, was another instance of faith. "By faith Noah being warned of God of things not seen as yet, moved with fear, prepared an ark to the saving of his house; by the which he condemned the world, and became heir of the righteousness which is by faith." (Heb. 11:7) Noah proved to be a man of faith in the midst of mockery, scorn, etc. Noah did just the things that God had commanded him to do. In faith believing he set forth to build the ark. Can we not, as Christians today follow this same example? No matter what God may call upon us to perform in his great) service, lets go forth in faith believing.

Abraham was the first great man of faith. Therefore, he is the pioncer of faith and is known as the "Father of the Faithful." In Genesis 12 Abraham is presented as a pioneer who separated himself to God. The call of God came to Abraham. telling him to get out, and go to a land that God would show him. Thus Abraham. in faith believing, left all in prompt obedience. Abraham's faith stood out in contrast to Lot's materialism. Lot could not stand the separated life. Abraham had great faith in the God of salvation. Faith without obedience is not real faith. What an example Abraham gives us. It took real faith to leave, for Abraham could see what he was leaving, but he could not see what he was going to. This is always God's method with His child. This is why faith is necessary. Abraham endured bardships, and was obedient. Lets follow that

true example of faith, and prove ourselves to be true servants of God. (Heb. 11:8) "By faith Abraham, when he was called to go out into a place which he should after receive for an inheritance, obeyed; and he went out, not knowing whither he went."

One of the greatest results of faith is our being saved. The whole of our salvation, past, present, and future, is dependent upon faith. Our acceptance of Christ is faith. (John 1:12) "But as many as received Him, to them gave he power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on his name." Our justification is by faith. (Rom. 5:1) "Therefore being justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ." The justified believer is a son in the family of God by our adoption. (Gal. 3:26) "For ye are all the children of God by faith in Christ Jesus." We are sanctified by faith. (Acts 26:18) "To open their eyes, and to turn them from darkness to light, and from the power of Satan unto God, that they may receive forgiveness of sins, and inheritance among them which are sanctified by faith that is in me." Then, we are kept

day by day by the power of God through faith. (1 Peter 1:5) "Who are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation ready to be revealed in the last time."

Rest, peace, assurance, and joy are other results of faith. When our exercise of faith is used we have this rest in Jesus Christ. peace in Jesus Christ, assurance through Jesus Christ, and joy in Jesus Christ.

Fact, faith, feeling, this is God's order. Satan would reverse this order, and put feeling before faith, and thus confuse the child of God. We should march in accord with God's plan. "Feed Faith with Facts, not with Feeling." A. T. Pierson.

We have noted some of the wonderful things done by the men of faith as recorded in Hebrews 11. Jesus attributes a kind of omnipotence to faith. A disciple, by faith, can do great things for his Master. The great question for us Christians to answer is not "What can I do?" but "How can I believe?" for "all things are possible to hum that believeth." (Heb. 11:6) "But without faith it is impossible to please Him: for he that cometh to God must believe that he is, and that he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek Him."

The People had A Mind to Work

Text— So built we the wall; and all the wall was joined to gether unto the half thereofs for the people had a mind to work. Neh. 4:6

There is a saying, "You can lead a horse to water but you can't make him drink." Let us say this horse needs water, is thirsty and for the afternoons work ahead of him he must have water. He has been lead to water, he sees the water, he knows he needs to drink, he knows it won't hurt him because he has often drank there before. But maybe he is excited or alarmed about something and again he may be in a stubborn mood. Grab him by the halter and do your best to get his head down to drink and you will worry yourself down and he hasn't drank yet.

By reading Nehemiah we find God's

people had sinned and their enemies had come and God allowed the walls of Jerusalem to be torn down and the gates burned. When Nehemiah heard this bad news he sat down and wept, and moaned certain days, and fasted, and prayed before the God of heaven. He was a man of God with God's work on his heart. Free Will Baptists, and probably Generals as well, in this state of California, have heard of the work of both denominations here and different Churches and cannot help but see they are needed in the vineyard of the Lord. Many show little or no interest In our text we find the walls of Jerusalem were rebuilt and how come them to be rebuilt is because "the people had a mind to work.') The reason the work of these denominations is no further adromed is because the people have no mind to work, and the work is not on their heart. The reason there are Generals and Free Will Baptist Churches yet in the state is because the people have a mind to work and the Lords work is on their heart.

When we left the strong walls of Jerusalem back in Okla., Mo.. Ark., Tex., Kan., and elsewhere we hoped to find God's work well establisted out here. Many places no walls have been built. They are desperatly needed, for many are hungry for a home church for themselves their children.

Before Nehemiah began his work he prayed to God. The good hand of God was upon him. God put the desire to rebuild the wall in his heart. When he told the peeple of the good hand of God upon him they said, "Let us rise up and build." Then they strengthened their hands for this good work. When they resolved to do this the enemies of God rose to tear down and God's people had to build while others guarded. But that desire in their hearts was strong and not easily moved and the walls were rebuilt against much oppositions because God fought for them. I'm glad to know we serve the same God and the following is a portion of Nehemiahs prayer, and we see how God answed him. "O Lord, I beseech thee, let now thine ear be attentive to the prayer of thy servent, and to the prayer of the servants, who desire to fear thy name: and prosper, I pray thee, thy servent this day, and grant him mercy in the sight of this man. For I was the Kings cupbearer."

Paul said in Gal. 1:13 for ye have heard c. my conversation in time past in the Jews religion how beyond measure how I persecuted the Church of God and wasted it.

Wasted: To dimen'sh. Acts 8:3, Saul

made havoc of the Church. Havoc: syncnym waste according to Webster.

Sylogism:

1. major part, Paul wasted the Church.

2. major part, when Saul wasted the Church, he made havoc of the Church. Acts 8:3.

3. Conclusion to waste the Church is therefore to make havoc of the Church; but when Saul made havoc of the Church, he bound men and women and cast them in prison. Therefore, men and women constituted the Church.

Jesus said: Matt. 18:15-16-17 Tell it to the Church not to some metaphysical or indescribable something, but to the Church.

The geographical designation proves the scripturalness of the definition of the Church of God at Corrinth. 1 Cor. 1:1-2. Cal. 1:2, And all the brethern which are with me unto the Churches of Galatia.

Acts 14:17, And when they were come and had gathered the Church to-gether they reheatsed all that God had done with them, when this came to the ears of the Church which was at Jerusalem.

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Dangers of Church Combinations

Some Thoughts About the Tendency Toward a United Protestantism

We are living in days of unification along all lines. The little businesses are feeling the necessity of getting together in some kind of a combination to protect themselves. The solitary laboring man is urged to join a union in order to protect himself from capitalism that he is made to think will take advantage of him and keep his pay low. Farmers are forming their unions for the purpose of getting what they believe they ought to have for their products, and buying at an advantage. Nations are being a lied for defence or aggression. "Get together" is the slogan along all lines. It is not surprising that churches are also combining.

TWO ASPECTS OF THE SUBJECT

It was the prayer of Jesus for His people that they all might be one. There will undoubtedly be unity in heaven. Denominational divisions will not be manifest there. There is a unity of true believers on earth now. The mystical body of Jesus is being formed in spite of denominational affiliations.

But there is another spirit in the world that is undertaking to form another body antagonistic to the plan of God for the formation of the mystical body of Christ. And people of religious tendencies are being drawn into this other combination in some cases. It is quite possible for the enemy of the church to use the church to defeat the very thing for v hich the church was formed.

The Jewish nation was formed for the purpose of preserving righteousness in the earth, and yet that nation through its official body condemned Jesus to death, the very Person Who had been looked for all through the ages.

The Roman Catholic church of the Dark Ages came from a combination of what were supposed to be Christian churches. And yet that great church opposed true Christianity. There are agencies at work today in the borders of the nominal Protestant churches that are intended to defeat the purpose of original Protestantism. Modernism in Protestant churches is opposed to evangelicalism in the same churches. In due time we may look for a person to rise who will be equivalent to a Protestant Pope, anl in due time the combination will unite the Roman Catholic and the federated Protestants in one great universal church that will do to Christianity what official Judaism did to Jesus and His disciples, and yet do it in the name of Christianity.

TWO GREAT COMBINATIONS

Two rreat combinations are on the wey the combination of government under one head, and a combination of religion under one head. The Anti-christ will head the combined government, and a person with powers like the Pope will head the other, with powers more than the Pope of the Roman Catholic church. These are mentioned in the book of Revelation as the Beast, head of government, and the False Prophet, head of religion.

SMALL DENOMINATIONS COMBINING

There may be some advantage in small denominations combining; and yet, even here, there are dangers. Every denomination has started with some definite principle that was not being advocated by already existing denominations. I think it is Neander, in his Church History, who says that everything prospers best that continues to maintain the purpose for which it was started. This is true of denominational churches: they prosper best when they continue to maintain the principles that their founders advocated when they broke with already existing denominations.

I think it will be a great day when Free Will Baptist everywhere will lay all their 20th century, stream lined ideas on the shelf and get back in the old path that Benjamin Randall blazed out.

Now, when two churches that have started with different emphasis undertake to

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combine, there must of necessity be some compromise of principles in order that they may work as an harmonious organization. Something must be laid down or modified, and in that modification there is likely to be the clouding of the original testimony that one or the other of the combining churches originally stood for. This is a danger that confronts churches considering combination.

, MOTIVES FOR UNION

It is well to inquire what are motives for uniting Protestant churches. One motive generally is that the united church will have more prestige than either of the churches functioning alone. When appeals are made to governments they feel that the larger the church is the more likely it is to get what it wants in the way of liberties and concessions. But it is a remarkable fact that the church often has prospered best when it was considered an outlawed institution, when governments were fighting it rather than favoring it. The early church outlived ten periods of persecution from pagan Rome, but began to wane as soon as Constantine issued his edict of toleration, making the church a recognized institution in the eyes of the government. While government concesions are desirable, some compromise is fivequently introduced in granting them.

As little streams unite in the valleys and eventually form great rivers, so as the little churches are uniting there may be the preparation for what will eventually be a great river of apostasy, a church made up of denominations that have surrendered their original principles.



They have not started their building yet as we understand, but are looking forward to the building of th's church in 1945.

Total population is in excess of 2,000,000 in Miss. There are 150 churchless aleas and 700,000 above 10 years of age not Christians, unquote.



AN AGNOSTIC CONVERTED

The most interest ng story I ever heard v as told me years ago by a man over eighty years of age. We were sitting together on a projecting rock of a mountainside in Arkansas. Here's the story:

"I was down in this country during the Civil War. Across on the other side yonder there were hundreds of tents where our soldiers we'e encamped. Measles broke cut, and many of our brave lads died. The epidemic got so bad that we stretched some tents farther down the valley and moved all the measles patients into these tents. This, of course, was done to Protect as far as possible the health of the well soldiers. I was wardmaster in chargo of the tents where the measles patients we're located.

"One night, while I was on the ward,

I passed a bunk where there was a very sick soldier lad not more than seventeen years of age. The boy looked at me with a pathetic expression and said, 'Wardmaster, I believe I am going to die. I am not a Christ an. I'y mother isn't a Christian. My father isn't a Christian, I never had any Christian training. I never did attend church. I did go with a boy friend to Sunday School just once. A woman taught the Sunday school class. She seemed to be such a good woman. She read us something out of the Bible about a man I thak his name was Nicodemus, Anyway, it was about a man who went to see Jesus one night. Jesus told this man he must be born again; The teacher said all people must be born again in order to go to heaven when they die. I have never been born aga'n, and I don't want to die like this. Won't you please get the choplain so he can tell me how to be born again?"

The old man hesitated for a moment. "You know, in those days I was an agnostic-at least, that is what I called myself. As a matter of fact, I wasn't anything but an old sinner. So I told the boy, You don't need a chaplain. Just be qu'et now. Don't worry, you'll be all right. I went on around the ward and in about an hour I came back to the boy's bed. He looked at me out of such cad, staring eyes as he said 'Wardmaster, if you don't get me the chaplain, please get me the doctor. I am choking to death. All right, my son, I'll get you the doctor," I sa'd. So I went off and found the doctor, and he came, morped out the throat of the lad so he could breathe just a little easier. I knew the boy was goin; to die. I had seen many other cases just like his. The boy was so sweet he l'terally climbed into my heart. He thanked me for my kindness. He thanked the doctor for being so good to h'm. The doctor and I went away from the bed.

"In about an hour I came back expecting to find the boy dead, but he was still strugg'ing. He looked up out of his eyes of death and said, "There is no use, Wardmaster, I have got to die, and I haven't been born again. Whether you believe it or not, won't you find the Page 30

chaplain and let him tell me how to be born arain?' I looked at him for a moment and thought about how helpless he was in the grip of death. So, I said,' All right, my son. I will get you the chaplain.'

"I walked away a few paces and then turned and went back to the boy's belside. I said, 'My boy, I am not going to get you the chaplain. I am going to tell you what to do myself. Now, understand, I am an applied. I don't know whether there is any God. I don't know whether there is any heaven. I don't know anything. Yes, I do.

I know one thing.

I know my mother was a good woman. I know if there is a God, my mother knew Him. If there is a heaven, I know she is there. So, I will tell you what my mother told me. You can try it and see if it works. Now, I am going to teach you a verse of Scripture. The verse is John 3:16. "For God so loved the world, that I'e give His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth on Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." My mother said that I cannot save myself, but if I will believe in Jesus He will save me.

"I asked the boy to say the verse with me. I started and he followed me with a weak and trembling voice. 'For God so loved the world,' 'He gave His only begotten Son,' 'He gave His only gegotten .
