Faithfulness is rewarded in the home by good deeds; in school faithfulness is rewarded by good grades and in the kingdom of God faithfulness is rewarded by crowns.

The Lord expects us to be faithful to Him and His teachings at all times. He has not required any certain amount of work from any of us, but He does expect us to be faithful to the work He calls us to do.

We shall consider this evening some very important ways and reasons for faithfulness t_0 Him.

1. The Rewards God has in store for us.

Crowns are not always glimmering objects, but rewards, in the sense Jesus spoke of them. The five rewards Jesus has promised to give are:

a. Crown of glory. 1 Peter 5:2-4 "Feed the Flock of God which is among you, taking the oversight thereof, not by constraint, but willingly: not for filthy lucre, but of a ready mind; neither as being lords over God's heritage, but being ensamples to the flock. And when the Chief Shepherd shall appear, Ye shall receive a crown of glory that fadeth not away."

This reward is for those who feed the flock of God. This does not only apply to the minister but to the lay members as well. A special reward that can not be won any other way is this crown of glory. To wear this crown we must be personal workers, not failing to feed the flock of God in our midst.

b. Crown of righteousness. "Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day: and not to me only; but unto all them that love His appearing." II Timothy 4:8.

This reward is given in recognition of those who love His appearing, and who live in the atmosphere of "that blessed hope."

c. The incorruptible crown is given as a reward to those who have been temperate in all things and have striven for the mastery.

This is the reward God gives for selfdenial, and to those who put God first in their lives.

"And every man that striveth for the mastery is temperate in all things. Now they do it to obtain a corruptible crown; but we an incorruptible crown." I Cor. 9:25

d. The crown of rejoicing is given as a reward to soul-winners. This crown will never be given to us for any other deed. With this reward to our credit we have the assurance of recognition in heaven.

"For what is our crown of rejoicing?" I Thessalonians 2:19.

e. The crown of Life is given to those who are faithful unto death, amidst temptations and hardships. Also for those who enjoyed their salvation. amidst difficult situations.

"Be thou faithful unto death and I will give thee a crown of life."

"Blessed is the man that endureth temptation: for when he is tried, he shall receive a crown of life, which the Lord has promised to them that love Him." James 1:12.

II Necessity of faithfulness.

a. One of the main reasons to strive for these crowns is to be able to escape the second death. If we fail to receive the crown of Life, we must hear Him say, "Depart from me." "That He by the grace of God should taste death for every man." Hebrews 2:9. Surely we want to work and aim for this reward which means eternal life.

b. As we strive for the various rewards we enjoy our salvation more fully. One who is faithful, surely enjoys the fruits of his labor. We enjoy our labor because we wait for the "Chief Shepherd to appear." I Peter 5:4.

c. We are told in the Scriptures to grow in the grace and knowledge of the Lord Jesus Christ. As we are faithful to the things He would have us do, we bring about this growth. Faithfulness is required to try not destroy Christians. "The trial of your faith being much more precious than gold." I Peter 1:7.

As we prove our faithfulness in one department of His work, no doubt, He will give us more to do.

III. a. Now you ask how may I be faith-

ful to the Lord. Cne of the best ways is to read the Bible daily for instructions. You find His plan in the Word. "Study to show thyself approved unto God a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." II Timothy 2:15.

b. Then we need to pray without ceasing Ask God for His guidance daily. "The effectual fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much." James 5:16b.

c. To be faithful we must be obedient. It is not ours to question the leading of God, but it is only ours to follow. We must obey when God tells us to feed His people. Live in the atmosphere of the hope of His glorious return for His people; to be temperate in all things; speak to the seul He lays on your heart; and be faithful in all things unto death.

You remember the story of the lord who called his servants to him, when he was about to go into far country and delivered unto them talents with the request that they add to the number while he was away.



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The Anti-Diluvian World

The Bible tells us of three worlds: The world that was, the world which now is, and the world which is to come.

The world "that was" (2 Peter 3:6) is also called "the old world" (2 Peter 2:5), and we also call it the Antediluvian World. Ante means before and diluvian means deluge or flood: The Antediluvian World then, was the world before the Flood.

The world which now is called "this present world" (2 Tim. 4:10; Titus 2:12). It is an evil world (Gal, 1:4). It had its beginning just after the Flood, and Noah and his three sons and their wives were the first inhabitants of "this present world", the only antediluvians who were inhabitants of the world in which we now live. If they lived in willing obedience to God until death, they will be citizens of "the world to come". I certainly hope to meet Brother Noah over in the world to come.

This world will come to an end and all ungodly persons will perish, just as certainly as the ungodly of the old world perished in the Flood, though it won't be by a flood of waters that this present world will perish, but by fire (2 Peter 3:10); but God has provided a way by which all who will live godly lives and be overcomers by faith our Jesus Christ in this present evil world shall be citizens in the world to come. God's people are strangers and pilgrims in this world, but will be citizens in the world to come (Heb. 11:13; 1 John 2:17; 5:4).

The world to come is quite different from the two worlds preceding it. Satan will not be there; sin and sorrow will not be known there; sickness and death will be no more; it shall be "full of rightcousness as the waters cover the sea." The world to come will not perish, as did the old world, nor as the present world will perish; but shall continue for ever and ever. It is pleasant and gratifying to think of the world to come and the glories the redeemed shall there behold.

There is much said in the Scriptures a-

bout the for this on of the world. A foundation is composed of principles or elements which constitute a firm base upon which a building may be crected. The principles or elements which constitute the foundatton upon which the old world was built. are set forth in the first chapter of Gen. and are expressed in the uncruing, unfailing words of the living God. There was acthing wanting in the foundation; but the first (world) building erected uponthat foundation was a miserable failure. because men chose to believe and obey Satan rather than to trust and obey God. However the old world was permitted to run its evil course from the creation of Adam until the Flood, a period of 1656. years.

The only record we have of the founding of the Antediluvian World, its wickedsinful career, and its tragic ending is told. in the first eight chapters of the Book of: Genesis. Though this account of the rise and fall of a great world is brief, it is to the point and contains all we need to know about it.

Though the Genesis account of the Creation is by the infallible word of the living God, and cannot be set aside, wise (?) men.

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of all ages have refused to believe it, and have spent much time and labor, writing many books, to teach us, and even our children in school, how the earth came into existance, how the animals came to be what they are, and how man became man and the human race was developed, all of this by evolution, by a process of development taking millions of years. They claim that man appeared on the earth perhaps a million years ago; according to the Bible man was created, a little less than six thousand years ago. Why spend years reading all this fallacy of men when the true account is given in the first eight chapters of Genessis and can be read in one hour?

Now let us consider a few of the statements found in the account of the founding, rise and fall of the world that was.

Gen. 1:1. "In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth.". There are several important facts expressed in this 'irst verse, which deserve at least a brief comment, but it must be brief:

IN THE BEGINNING--The beginning of all things is God. All things had a beginning except God. It is a fact, there was a leginning of all earthly things; and Genesis is the Book of Beginnings. "In the beginning" was a time farther back thar any man can know; the beginning was long before there was any man to know about it: we know of it only as God tells us Culy the heaven and the curth were created in the beginning; but that must have included the waters upon the earth and the air about and above the earth, and the sun, moon and stars which are in the heaven above.

GOD—God was in the beginning, but He never had a beginning. He always was, He is the Great "I AM", the self-existing One. The Hebrew for God in this verse is plural; so must include the Son and the Holy Spirit. The Son was with God in the beginning and by Him the worlds were cre ated, "and without Him was not any thing made that was made" (Heb. 1:2; John 1 1-3). The Holy Spirit was also there, and by Him was the Word of God spoken to and through holy men (1 Cor. 2:13; 2 Peter 1:21).

GOD CREATED-Cod not only created

the heaven and the earth, but the whole universe, all things were created by Him. No, Satan never created anything, he only works on and perverts the good things God has created, making them serve an evil purpose, instead of a good purpose, all that God created was good (Gen. 1:31).

The sum of all the things that God created is called Nature. Men have ever scught to know the origin and purpose of Nature; they have asked her many questions, and received many answers; for Nature has and speaks a language all hor own; and what she says to man is called science. Nature always speaks the truth; and if men hear correctly, it is true science and we are thankful for Christian men who are scientists, they are the source of true science and agrees 100% with the Bible. but, alas! most of the men who enquire of Nature do not know God, they are natutal or unregenerated men and not spiritually 'minded, just what Paul had in mind when he said in 1 Cor. 2:14, "But the natural man receiveth not the things of the Spirit of Cod: for they are foolishness unto him: neither can he know them, be cause they are spiritually discerned."

"The heavens declare the glory of Cod; and the firmament sheweth Hi; handywork. Day unto day uttereth speech, and night unto night sheweth knowledge. There is no speech nor language where their voice is not heard" (Psa. 19:1-3). Ungodly men cannot hear that voice, nor see the glory of God in Nature; for they have no eyes to see, nor cars to hear such things but in darkness they construct theories. then work hard to find out the origin and then they have their findings printed and purpose of the things God has created; distributed as scientific facts. But, usually, these facts are not facts; for they deny and oppose the Word of God.

THE HEAVEN--The heaven of Gen. 1: 1 is not the heaven of heavens. God's dwelling place, nor the third heaven to which Paul was caught up to see and hear things not lawful for man to utter; but it is the firmament which men call the sky, and which the Jews call the first heaven; nevertheless it is wonderful. The Psa'mist looked up and was moved to say: "When I consider thy heavens, the work of thy fingers, the moon and the stars which thou hast ordained; what is man, that thou art mindful of him?" (Psalm 8:3-4). Yes, God created the heaven, which testifies of the power and the glory of God to all who have eyes to see.

TUE FART'-The earth was cleated, and not evolved as some smart (?) men of the earth would have us believe. Men have many theories about the earth, as to its origin, shape, size, motions, age, etc. But none of these things trouble us so much; for we know that God created the certh and prepared of for the habitation of the human race. God made the mountains, hills and valleys; He appointed bounds for the oceans, lakes and streams; H₂ put metals, minerals and water in the earth; He has clothed the earth with an abundance of forest trees, fruit-bearing trees and shrubs, herbs, grasses and flowers; He created the animals, fowls and tishes; and He gave man dominion over them all. All that man should need or desire was abundantly provided for him; but man perverted the things God so gracicusly provided for him, and his world perished in the judgement of the Flood.

By "resurrection" we do not mean that our Lord's spirit continued to live after His body died, but that He was actually raised from the dead by the grery of the Father, and came forth from the tomb in the very same body that halbeen impaid on Calvary's cross. In that body, now glorified, He sits at Got's right hand, and in that same body! He iscoming, again.

There were many results obtained by the resurrection of Christ from the dead, One of these results is that the resulrection of Christ assures the believer of his own resurrection, also his glorificatiin. This one particular result should be a scource of inspiration to every believer. In time of trouble, the believer may meditate upon this doctrine, and receive strength to meet the problems o' life. In Matthew 28:18, Chr st says, "All power is given unto me in heaven and in carth. These words vere spoken unto the disciples by the risen and glor fied Christ, a short time prior to His ascension. Seeing then, that the risen and glorified Christ hes this pover, He will quicken the bodies of those who are asleep in Him. The following Serpture will verify this statement: "And this is the will of him that sent me, that every one which seeth the Son, and believeth on him, may have everlasting life: and I will raise him up at the last day." (Jn.6:40)

The resurrection of the dead in Christ, and translation of the living saints are inevitable results of and inseparably connected with the Second Coming of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Up to this point we have taken the Secend Coming of Christ for granted. Let US observe further, and see what saith the Scripture. For the purpose of establishing the fact that Christ is coming again, we shall consider for a starting point, Jn. 14:3, which reads, "And 'f I ge and vreptre a place for you, I will come egain, and receive you unto myself; that where I are, there ye may be also." Now, whether this passage refers to the first or speend plass of Uis Second Coming, we are not chiefly concerned at this pericular point. As has already been stated;

this passage serves to definitely establish the fact of the Second Coming.

Therefore, we see that the Scriptures teach beyond the shadow of a doubt, the fact that there will be a Second Coming of the Lord Jesus Christ. Further, the Scriptures teach just as clearly that there will be two phases of the Second Coming of Christ. First will be the return of Christ FOR His own; and secondiv there will be the return of Christ WITH His own. This may seem at first glance as if we were advocating a THIRD coming of Christ, but not so. These two phase really make up ONE event. If the reader will bear with us, we shall trust that the Holy Spirit will enlighten us on these blessed and glorious teachings of His precious Word.

We must needs distinguish between the two phases of His Second Coming in order to give the rapture, or the blessed hope of the church its rightful place.

In order to do this will observe 1 Thess. 4:15-17. "For this we say unto you by the word of the Lord, that we which are alive and remain unto the coming of the Lord shall not prevent them which are asleep. For the Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel and with the trump of God: and the dead in Christ shall rise first: Then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air and so shall we ever be with the Lord." We observe further, Behold I shew you a mystery; we shall not all sleep, but we shall all be changed. In a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trump: for the trumpet shall sound, and the dead shall be raised incorruptible, and we shall be changed" (1 Cor. 15:51,52). In the first passage we will note the words "clouds" and "air" which surely teach that is the coming of Christ FOR His own, the second passage will further verify this statement. As we note the order of events in both these passages, we see that the dead in Christ shall rise first. Then the living soints shall be changed and caught up to meet the Lord; where? In the air.

This could not be the visible return of power and great glory, because when this takes place Christ's feet shall touch the earth, Zech.14:4. "And His feet shall stand in that day upon the mount of Olives, which is before Jerusalem on the east, and the mount of Olives shall cleave in the midst thereof toward the east and toward the west, and there shall be a very great valley; and half of the mountain shall remove toward the north, and half of it toward the south."

Therefore the passage in 1 Thess.4:15-17, refers to the Rapture or to the first phase of Chr.st's Second Coming, while the passage in Zechariah refers to the second phase. What joy will flood out beings as we find ourselves transported through the air, and feel the Holy Spirit surging and throbbing in our veins! What joy it will be to behold Him who died for us!

We shall never be perfect in this life, but when He shall appear we shall be perfect, for "we shall see Him as He is," and "our vile bodies shall be fashioned like unto His glorious body!" As we meditate upon these great truths, we receive unfold joy and comfort. When we think how that in spite of our imperfections, failures, and short comings, God has saved us by His grace, we praise His great name; even though we can not fully comprehend these things.

Then at a time that is according to His good will, He will return to earth with power and great glory. At this visible and personal manifestation of Christ, He will be accompanied by His saints as prophesed by Enoch in Jude 14. "And Enoch also, the seventh from Adam, prophesied of these, saying, Behold, the Lord cometh with ten thousands of His saints." This phase of His Second Coming will be in judgment upon the earth. Hew biessed it will be in His presence and to know that we shall ever be with Him throughout all eternity. Hallelujah, what a Saviour! Yea, even so come, Lord Jesus.

It should be remembered by every interested person throughout our ranks that the National Association is a young but growing organization. Perfection of design and results are difficult in this stage of the organization. Plans have been intensely studied and adopted with a view to unity of faith and action. A genuine Christian fellowship which is born of a common experience of Christ and practically expressed in a cooperative service in the fields of Christian Education, Missions, and benevolence is the basic reason for the existence of the National Association. The Board of Publcations and Literature, Women's Auxil-

iary work, Sunday School, and Free Will Baptist League, are inseparably tied up with this basic reason for the existence of our National organization, and their contributions to the successful prosecuior of educational, missionary and benevolent work is expected to increase vith every passing day.

What is the purpose of the Unified Program Fund?

The purpose of the Unified Program Fund is that individuals, churches, auxiliarles, and general organizations may be provided a method by which they may render equitable support to Education. Missions, and to Superannuation. You should remember that the chairman of each of the standing boards which receives a percentage of the Unified Program Fund, is a member of the General Board, and that the basis upon which this fund is divided is studied carefully by this Board in the light of all the needs and plans for the success of their respective departments; and then the National Association is called upon to authorize such a distribution of the Unified Fund.

1. How is this Fund distributed?

This Fund has been distributed so far as follows: 10% to Superannuation, 20% to Home Missions, 30% to Foreign Missions, and 40% to Christian Education. This schedule of distribution was recommended by the General Board and adopted by the National Association. Let it be understood that the National Acsociation duly appraised and authorized this method of financial support to our various denominational enterprises. It is understood by the Treasurer of the National Association that the Unified Program Fund shall be allocated monthly, and any undesignated funds he may receive from time to time shall be included in these monthly allocations.

2. What expenses are paid out of the Unified Program Fund?

The answer is, none whatever. The National Treasurer receives this fund, and forwards it to the treasurers of the four standing boards mentioned above on the

first of each month.

The Executive Department of the National Association

The Executive Department of the National Association was created through the adoption of a special resolution in the 1941 annual session for the purpose of meeting all expenses incurred in the management of the business and general program of the National Association together with the expenses of all promotional service not specifically prosecuted and financed by the standing boards. This fund is created and paid to the National Executive Secretary as time and needs may require by the treasurers of the following standing boards, and on the percentage basis herein set forth: 10% by Superannuation, 20% by Home Missions, 30% by Foreign Missions, and 40% from Christian Education, From this fund are paid the Executive Secretary's salary, traveling expenses, office rental and supplies, essential part-time stenographer's salary, A stenographer's necessary time should never be much The expense of the Christian Workers Institutes are paid from this fund. Funds may be paid out of this department as the National Association may order for any special reason, as was done for the Board of Publications and Literature in the 1944 session.

The Executive Secretary is raid \$50 per week. The stenographer's salary is fifty cents per hour. Christian Workers Institute teachers get \$25.00 per week plus travel expenses.

Persons under special assignment for promotional work for the National Association are paid five dollars per day, their travel expenses.

Watch this department for the program of the National Association, all of its boards, and auxiliaries--such as Women's Auxiliary, Sunday School Convention, and Free Will Baptist League Poard. The Executive Secretary promotes all phases of the National work.



CHURCH DONATIONS

During the past fifteen years, the U.S. national income has almost doubled, registering an increase of more than 86 per cent, according to figures published by the Golden Rule Foundation, Inc., of New York.

During the same period, taxes have increased more than 600 per cent, and Federal expenditures more than 2700 per cent, contributions for churches and while church-related charities have decreased 33 per cent. These figures are made more vivid with the following comparison:

In 1932, during the deepest depression, the per capita income of the American people was \$322 and they donated \$19.02 per capita to church activities, or a percentage of 5.9. In 1943, the national income was \$1,062 per capita, while the church or church-related gifts were only \$15.59 per capita, or a percentage of 1.5about one sixth of the Biblical tithe of 10 per cent, and about one ninth of the 15 per cent hitherto allowed for income tax deduction.

"It is reported that the concentration camp commander at Sachenhausen, where Martin Niemoller is being held, is determined to make an atheist of his famous prisoner, and to this end placed a Communist atheist in the cell next to him, with permission for them to talk. He also arranged for these two men to take their daily half-hour walk at the same time, and in the same yard. The atheist was a very intellectual person, skilled in argument. He had been promised all sorts of 'favors' if he could make Niemoller lose his faith. Each prisoner enjoyed presenting his own viewpoint. This lasted four days. On the fifth day, the atheist begged Niemoller to lend him his Bible, a Book that now assumed a new meaning to him The same day the athiest was moved to another cell." The News Chronicle.

She helped the young folks, And never grumbled. She led us on when we almost stumbled.


Our pastors wife, one very dear.... We'll miss her while shes gone. But if we live a life as pure, We'll see her later on.


THE BACKSLIDER

WHATS WRONG WITH THE MOVIES

Seventy-seven million people in U. S. attend the movies each week: 28 million are adolescent young people: 11 million are under 14 years old.

The emotional reaction of children to moving-pictures is from 2 to 8 times greater than that of adults. Minds repeatedly shocked, thrilled, horrified, and excited by scenes of murder, war, rape, crime, monsters, nudity, are not normal minds.

Movies impair health, produce nevousness, fear, hysterics, insomnia, suicide, insanity, miscarriage, high blood pressure, heart failure, inability to concentrate constructively, susceptibility to discase, and disinterest and deficiency in work. Pethaps this explains why: the present generation is so restless, hasty, nervous, dissatisfied, uncontrollable and changeable.

Movies destroy self-control, thus producing drunkards, dope fiends, spendthrifts, adulterers, fornicators, murderers, thieves, liars and what not. In an analysis of 40 films, in which 57 criminals committed 62 crimes, only 7 of the or minals were punished by the law. On the average, less than one-fifth of criminals in the movies receive legal punishment. Part are punished by extra legal methods and many go scottfree.

About 50 per cent of the boys and girls, men and women in jails, reform ittes, and penitentiaries hold the movies partly responsible for their criminal and immoral conduct.

Moving pictures deal principally with sex, crime, and impure love themes: nudity, murder, robbery, war, gambling, stealing, vile witticism, etc.

The overwhelming majority of "movie stars" are immoral and lacivious. "Filmproducing cities are communities full of grossest vice and degeneracy - modern Eedems. Hell couldn't concoct more degeneracy than is prevalent in these places; men lying with men, and women with women or both sexes clinging toprether in every conceivable arrangement of nude bod ly contact.

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The movie teaches revolt against all constituted authority and newlect of responsibil ty: would destroy the home by teaching children disrespect for parents, parents, neglect of children, wives, disobedience to husbands, and husbands, unfaithfulness to wives, it would destroy the government, by teaching disrespect for law, and for officers of the law. and by encouraging crime, riot, violence and anarchy. Its philosophy is 100 per cent anti-American and anti-Christian. It would dethrone God and right, and enthrone Satan and evil. Hate should shou'd be exterminate¹; reign, love "Self" should be the supreme motive "ethers" should be the least. It magnifies sin, minimizes its punishment, robs

death of its seriousness, and forgets that the resurrection shall place all men before the judgment bar of God Almighty, where they shall be rewarded according to their works.

According to the movies, the Bible is all wrong, sinners are all right—they don't need saving; Christ's death for all men was in vain—but be not deceived
