He Is Risen

And he saith unto them, Be not affrighted: Ye seek Jesus of Nazareth, which was ciucified; he is risen; he is not here: behold the p'ace where they laid him. Mark 16:6. He is risen is one of the facts of the gospel. When we think of the gospel or good news or glad tidings we think of it in terms of three very important acts of the Lord Jesus and each of them a fact or in the plan of salvation and the last just as important as the first. That is the Birth, Death and Resurrection of Christ. The plan of salvation would not be complete with one of them missing. The virgin birth of the Jesus is the most beautiful of any birth in the Bible .Our subject was sucken by the angel to the women when they came to anoint the body of Jesus after the c-ucifixion.

Let us look for a short time at the events leading up to the time of this announcement. Jesus had finished His ministery. He had selected the apostles and shown by many signs and wonders that truly He was the Son of God. He told the twelve that he must suffer and die and rise from the dead that the plan of savation might be complete. Mt. 16-21. He was betrayed and given into the hands of the chief preists and the scribes and the elders by one who was one of the twelve. How often it is that the child of God 's betrayed by one who should be praying for them and upholding them. Judas sold the master for thirty pieces of silver. Mt. 26: 15. He is being sold today by many for the pleasures of the world. After a mock trial He was condemed to death and crucified with two theives one on the right and one on the left that the scripture might be fulfilled, which saith, And he was numbered with the transgressors. Is.

53:12. Here we have a picture of two classes of people; one thief or sinner turned with penitent heart and said Lord, remember me when thou comest into thy kingdom and Jesus said unto him, Verily. I say unto thee, Today shalt thou be with me in paradise. Luke 23-42-43. The other like so many folk today railed on Him and doubted saying, if, oh that little word means so much if, thou be Christ, save thyself and us. How often does the devil place a doubt in the ininds of people with IF and get them to do just as this thief did and lose their soul? Here was one saved because he believed and one lost Locause he disbel eved.

Now from the sixth hour there was darkness over all the land unto the ninth hour. Mt. 27-45. Jesus, when he had cried again with a loud voice, yielded up the ghost. And behold the veil of the temple was in twain from top to the bottom; and the earth d'd quake, and the rocks rent: and the graves were opened; and many bodies of the saints which s'ept arose, and came out of the graves after his resurrections, and went into the holy city, and appeared unto many: Mt. 27-50-53.

When the even was come, there came a nich man of Arimathaea, named Joseph, who a'so himself was Jesus' disciple: He went to Pilate, and begged the body of Jesus. Then Pilate commanded the body to be delivered. And when Joseph had taken the body, he wrapped it in a clean kinen cloth, and laid it in h's own new tomb, which he had hewn out in the rock and he rolled a great stone to the door of the sepulchre. Mt. 27-57-60. And when the Sabbath was past, Mary Mardalene, and Mary the mother of james and salome had bought sweet spices, that they might

the morning of the Arst day of the week, they came unto the sepulchre at the rising of the sun. And they said among themselves, who shall roll us away the stone from the door of the sepulchre: And when they looked, they saw that the stone was rolled away; for it was very great. And entering the sepulchre, they saw a young man sitting on the right side, clothed in a long white garment; they were affrightcd. And he saith unto them, Be not affrighted ye seek Jesus of Nazareth, which crucified; he is risen: he is not here, behold the place where they laid him. But go your way, tell his disciples and Peter that he goeth before you into Galilee; there shall ye see him, as he said unto you. Mk. 16-1-7. He 's risen. Here were the words of the prophet fulfilled. But God will redeem my soul form the power of the grave; for he shall receive me. Ps. 49-15. For thou wilt not leave my soul in hell; netther will thou suffer thine Holy One to see corruption. Ps. 16-10, Jesus had told the diciples on the mountain of transf guration that they should te'l no man what they had seen till the Son of Man were risen from the dead. Mrs. 9-9. O blessed thought that He was raised again for our justification. How the hearth of these women must have rejoiced as the angel told them to go tell his disciples and Peter that he goeth be ore you into Calilee; there shall ye see him, as he said unto you. Mk. 16-7. Not only will you know because I have told you but you shall see him. Praise the Lord. We do not have to take someone's word but if we seek the Lord we can see Him for ourselves. We can know for curselves not by our natural sight but by an eye of faith. Dy His Sp'rit that dwelleth in us. These saw him with their natural vision after he was risen: "Now when Jesus was risen early the first day of the week, he appeared first to Mary Magdalene, out of who he had cast seven devils." Mk. 16-9. To the other Mary: And as they went to tell his disciples, behold, Jesus met them, saying All hail. And they came and held him by the feet, and worshipped him. Then said Jesus unto them, Be not afraid: go tell my brethern that they go into Galilee, and there shall they see me. Mt.28-9-10, To two disc ples on the way to

come and anoint him. And very early in

Emmaus, And it came to pass, that, while they communed together and reasoned, Jesus himself drew near, and went with them. And their eyes were opened, and they knew him; and he vanished out of their sight. Luke 24-15-31. To the eleven, And as they thus spake, Jesus himself stood in the midst of them, and saith unto them, Peace be unto you. But they were terrified and affrighted, and supposed that they had seen a spirit. And he said unto them, Why are ye troubled? And why do thoughts arise in your hearts? Behold my hands and my feet, that it is I myself; handle me and see, for a spirt hath not fiesh and bones, as ye see me have. And when he had thus spoken, he shewed them his hands and his feet. And while they yet believed not for joy, and wondered, he said unto them, Have ye here any meat? And they gave him a piece of broiled fish, and of an honeycomb. And he took it, and d'd eat before them. Luke 24-36-34, After these things Jesus shewed himself again to the disciples at the sea of Tiberias, and on this wise shewed he himself. There were together S'mon Peter, and Thomas called Didymus, and Nathanael of Cana in Galilee, and the sons of Zebedee, and two other of his disciples. Simon Peter saith unto them, I go fishing. They say unto him, We also go with thee. They went forth, and entered into a ship immediately: and that night they caught nothing, But when morning was now come Jesus stood on the shore; but the disciples knew not that it vas Jesus. Then Jesus saith unto them, Children, have ye any meat? They answered him, No. And he said unto them, Cast the net on the right side of the ship, and ye shall find. They cest therefore, and now they were not able to draw it for the multitudes of fishes. Therefore that disciple whom Jesus loved ca'th unto Peter, it is the Lord. St. Jn. 21-1-7, He was seen of above five hundred brethern at once; 1 Cor. 15-6, Seen of Paul, And last of all he was seen of me also, as of one born out of due time. 1 Cor. 15-7. Seen as he ascended up to heaven by the apostles whom he had chosen: To whom also he shewed himself alive after his passion by many infallible proofs being seen of them forty days and speaking of the things pertaining to the king-

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dom of God, And when he had spoken these things, while they beheld, he was taken up; and a cloud received him out of their sight. And while they looked stedfastly toward heaven as he went up, behold, two men stood by them in white apparel; Which also said, Ye men of Calilee, why stand ye gazing up into heaven? This same Jesus, which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven. Luke 2-3-9-10-11, Seen of Stephen, in heaven, as he was being stoned to death. But he, being full of the Holy Ghost, looked up stedfastly into heaven, and saw the glory of God, and Jesus standing on the

right hand of God. Acts 7-05. But now is Christ dien from the dead, and become the first Amits of them that slept. For since by man came death, by man came a so the truth of the dead. For as in Adam all die, even so in Christ shall all be reade alive, 1 Cor. 15-20-21, Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ which according to his abundant mercy hath begetten us again unto a lively hope by the resurrect on of Jesus-Christ from the dead, 1 Peter 1-3, For if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the-Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thineheart that God hath raised him from thedead, thou shalt be saved. Romans 10-9.

The Gospel of the Risen Christ

Remember that Jesus Christ of the seed of David was raised from the dead according to my gospel" (2 Tim. 2:8). These words vere written by the Apostle Paul to his "dearly beloved son, Timothy, and evidently this wonderful fact of the resurrection of Christ was foremost in the apostle's mind as he penned his fourteen Epistles, or he preached the Gospel to both Jews and Gentles on his missionary journeys. He constantly made known the power of the risen Christ to save the ungodly, and the mystery of the ascended Christ as the Head of the Church, the Body and Bride of Christ, "which in other ages was not made known unto the sons of men." (Read Ephesians and Colocs-(ans). For this reason, Paul continually spolte of the Cospel of the risen Christ as "my gospel" (Rom.2:16; Tim. 1:11).

Paul did not know the man of Galliee. nor the preacher of Jerusalem, nor the the risen, glorified Christ whom he met on the road to Dumascus. Afterward, he met Him in Arabia and received by reveintion this Cospel of the risen Christ which he proclaimed as the power of Cod unto salvation (Gal. 1:6-17; Rom. 1: 16). I's gloried in the cross of the living Christ, because of what Christ had accomplished for him and every believer by Pig death and resurrection (Gal. 6:14; 1 Cor. 1:19-24). He determined, whereever he went, not to know anything among the people, except 'Jesus Christ (the risen Christ), and him erac fied", (1 Cor. 2:2).

On the day of Pentecost, the Apostle Peter emphasized in his sermon the resurrection of Christ, and during his entire min stry Peter pointed to the risen Christ as the One who alone is able to save. Throughout the Book of Acts, whenever the death of Christ is mentioned, immediately it is followed by a declaration of His resurrection. His death is not emphasized nor explained in Acts, but the fact of salvation through faith in the risen Christ is magnified. In Acts there are 145 references, either directly or indirectly, to the resurrection of Christ, but only 22 references, either directly or indirectly, to the crucifixion of Christ. This is signif cant, and should stimulate every preacher of the Gospel to point lost sinners to the living Christ who is mighty to save. (Feb. 7:25).

The Outstanding Event of History

The resurrection of the body of the Man, Christ Jesus, 's the outstanding event of all'history. Nothing just like it had ever taken place before and nothing like it has occurred since. Millions upon millions of human beings have been bur-

ied or destroyed during these nearly 6,000 years since man was created by God, but not one of those bodies has been raised from its grave, never to die again, except the body of Christ.

It is true that a few mortal bodies have been restored to natural life, but all such bod'es died again, "dust to dust," and still comain in their graves. But the body of Jesus that was nailed to the cross of Calvary, pierced by the Roman so'dier, pronounced dead by the Roman centurion, and bur'ed in a tomb by Joseph of Arimathaea, assisted by Nicodemus, was quickened into newness of life by the Holy Spirit, and brought out of the tomb three days after its bur'al, never to die again. In this body of flesh and bones prepared for Him when He came to this earth in the likeness of men, He now lives as the Great II'gh Priest to make intercession for all who confess Him before men (Matt. 10:32; Heb. 9:24-28), and one day this very same Jesus will return to this earth in that body with glory and great power as the King of kings and Lord of lords (Tim. 6:15,16; Rev. 19: 11-16)."He only hath immortality." The words "mortal" and "immortal" refer to the body only, therefore it is not proper to speak of the "immortal soul."

This indisputable fact, the greatest event of all history, is the heart of the Cospel and the foundation of the Christ faith. If it is not true, then there is no salvation or any hore for a single son of Adam. The whole race is doomed and forever lost if Christ was not raised from the grave, as forefold by the prophets, promised by Christ Himself, and witnessed by the disciples.

In the fifteenth chapter of 1 Corinthians, which deals exclusively with the resurrection of the body, the Apostle Paul declares, "If Christ hath not been raised then is our preaching vain, and your faith is also vain; . . . ye are yet in your sins. Then they also which are fallen asleep in Christ have perished" (vs. 14-18, R. V.). Sinners are saved by a risen, living Man in the glory, who has all power in Heaven and in earth.

What Is The Gospel?

The Gospel, or Good News, for lost sin-

ners, which "is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth (Rom. 1:16), is declared by the Apostle Paul in the first four verses of this great resurrection chapter to be simply this: "That Christ died for our sins according to the scriptures; and that he was buried, and that he rose again the third day according to the scriptures." There are some who preach that "Christ died for our s'ns" and nothing else, and think they are preaching the Gospel. But not so! This is not the whole Gospel! Such preaching gives the hearer the impression that Christ is dead, and most people think He is dead. Those who in "so-called" Christian lands often see a cross on some church steeple, or in some home, or worn as an ornament or an insigne by some people and are reminded of "death"--- a dood Christ. But a dead Christ has no power to save guilty, weak, condemned Without His resurrection His sinners. death was in vain!

Then it is well to note that Christ not only d'ed for our sins "according to the scriptures." Through the Old Testament rophets Cod made known the manner of His death, the purpose of His death, the place of His death; so that Christ died in God's appointed t'me, in God's aprointed way, in God's appointed place, and for Go4's appointed purpose, in order that the Old Testament prophecies should

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be 'ulfilled. He could not have died in any other way than He did. He was the Lamb of God slain before the foundation of the world (Rev. 13:8); but "when the fulness of time was come, God sent forth his Son . . . to redeem them which vere under the law" (Gal. 4:4, 5). "He appeared to put away: sin by the sacrifice of himself" (Heb. 9:26).

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"Christ died for our sins according to the scriptures," and without the Scriptures the death of Christ cannot be fully understood or appreciated. The Old Testament sacrifices in the Tabernacle and Temple pictured the significance of the offering, the meal offering, the peace offering, the sin offering, and the trespass offering give the fivefold aspect of the one offering of Christ on Calvary's cross; and that one offering is better understood as we view it in the light of the Scripcures. "Christ died for our sins according to the scriptures." This is the first part of the Gospel, a very important part, but only a part.

Second: "He was buried." This is also important. What was buried? Not His spirit! Not His soul! These never died! He committed His spirit to H's Father and yielded up the ghost, voluntarily. Only His body died! Only His body was bar'ed! Only His body was raised from the grave! His body had been wrapped with grave clothes, together with a hundred pounds of spices, before it was placed in Joseph's new tomb. It was guarded for three days and three nights by soldiers, lecause His enemies were afraid that His disciples would steal His body and then report that He had been raised from the grave. There can be no doubt that the crucified body of Christ was buried, inasmuch as H's Sacrificial work was finished. His last words on the cross were, "It is finished." Why? He pet away sin by the sacrifice of Himself (Heb. 9:26). He tasted death for every man (Heb. 2:9). He paid the penalty of the broken law (Gal. 3:13). Therefore, His body was buried. This is part of the Gospel and should not be omitted. Without death there is no resurrection, for resurrection is bringing back to life that which has died, never to die again. There are some

who try to explain away the resurrection of Christ by claiming that He did not actually die, but only swooned and then was resuscitated; but such is not the case. Christ actually died, His body was really buried, and that body was held in the grave for three days and nights before it was raised from the dead. In that body He is living today and will live forever.

Third: The next phase of the Gospel, which we preach and which is the power of God unto salvation to every sinner who Lelieves its message, is that the material body of Christ was raised from the grave and that He is living today in the very same body that was put to death on the cross of Calvary. "He arose again the third day according) to the scriptures; and he was seen." He was seen after His resorrection by Mary Magdalene at the sepulcher early in the morning "when it was yet dark" (John 20:1-18); He was seen by the women on their way back to Jerusalem from the empty tomb (Matt. 28:1-9); He was seen by Peter and by the two disciples of Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35); He was seen by eleven of the disciples on the evening of that day in which He arose, and He asked them to handle Him, which no doubt they did, for John declares in his First Epist'h: "That which was from the beginning which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we have looked upon and our hands have handled, of the Word of life" (1 John 1: 1-3). Evidently John referred to the risen Christ, for in chapter five of this Epistle. he declares: "This is the record, that God hath given to us eternal life, and this life is in his Son. He that hath the Son hath l'fe; and he that hath not the Son of God hath not life" (1 John 5:10-13).

We have the record of eleven appearances of Christ to His disciples after Hisresurrection and before His ascension, and seven appearances after His ascension. Fut very likely there were other times when He showed Himself alive, for in Acts 1:1-3 we read, "He showed himself alive after his passion by many infall'ble proofs, being seen of them forty days, and speaking of the things pertaining to the kingdom of God." After appointng His

disciples as witnesses of His resurrection in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and the uttermost part of the earth, when He had spoken and while they were looking. He was taken up into Heaven, and sat down on the right hand of the throne of the majesty in the Heavens as a great and merciful High Priest, as our Advocate as the one and only Mediator, and as our mighty Lord and Saviour. There is none other, for no other man has been raised from the dead and is "alive for evermore." He is able to save to the uttermost all who come unto God in His name, "seeing he ever liveth to make intercession for them."

The Resurrection Denied

The preaching of the resurrection of the bo'y of the Lord Jesus Christ has always been opposed by religious sinners. Why? Read the third and fourth chapters of Acts. The priests, and the captain were grieved that the disciples taught the people. and "preached through Jesus the resurrection from the dead." Who: asked by what power, or in what name the lame man was made whole, Peter replied that it was in the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, "whom ye crucified, whom God raised from the dead," and then he added: "Neither 's there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven, given among men, whereby we must be saved." (Acts 4:12).

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Again in the 5th of Acts, we read that Peter spoke to the high priests and the members of the council, saying, "The God of our fathers raised up Jesus, whom ye stew and hanged on a tree. Him hath God exalted with his right hand to be a Prince and a Saviour, for to give repentance to Israel, and forgiveness of sins. And we are witnesses of these things." Then follows this statement: "When they heard that, they were cut to the heart, and took counsel to s'ay them" (vs. 30-33). It is not the death of Christ that troubled these religious sinners, but H's resurrection; and so it is today, if the whole Gospel is preached.

In the 13th chapter of Acts, we have the account of Paul's sermon in the synigogue in Antioch of Pisidia, wherein he emphasized the resurrection of Christ. anoting from the Psalms to show the fulfilment of prophecy in that "God raised him from the dead." Then were the Jews filled with envy, and "spake against those things which were spoken of Paul, contradicting and blaspheming." (v 45). Also the Jews "stirred up the devout and honorable women, and the chief men of the city, and raised persecution against Faul and Barnabas, and expelled them out of their coasts" (v. 50).

This is the message that makes people mad or makes them glad! This is the Gospel that means salvatin to those who believe it and receive the risen Christ as Lord, or greater condemnation to those who reject Him. Wherever Paul went in his missionary journeys "he preached Jesus and the resurrection" (Acts 17:3. 18). On Mars' Hill he closed his address by boldly declaring that God "hath anpointed a day, in which He will judge the world in righteousness by that man whom he hath ordained; whereof he hath given assurance unto all men, in that he hath raised him from the dead" (vs. 31). This message caused division. Some mocked, some were indifferent, some believed (vs. 32-34). Thus it has been from that day What is the result? Those who to this. believe are saved, for the Gospel of Christ is the power of God unto salvation t cuenvone that believeth (Rom. 1:16). Without the power of God there is no salvation, but merely a formal religion which deceives and destroys the soul. With the power of God there comes the assurance of salvation, the joy of salvation, and the hope of salvation. The one who is really saved knows it, and shows it, and looks forward to its glorious consummation.

The hope of salvation does not denote uncertainty, as some have thought, but is a joyful anticipation of the consummation of the believer's salvation when body, like unto the glorified body of ('brist, and shall be ushered into the new heavens and the new earth, wherein dwelleth righteousness, and in which there will be no pain, or tears, or death, or disappointments, but all things will be forever new. This and much more is the portion of those who hear and bel'eve the Gospel of the Risen Christ.

"Relieve on the Lord Jesus Christ (the risen One), and thou shalt be saved, and thy house."

Newness of Life

UNQUESTIONABLY the resurrection of Jesus Christ is the cardinal doctrine of Christicnity. Upon this fact Christianity stands or fa'ls. It 's the one distinctive doctrine which different/ates between Christianity and all man made religions. It stands at the heart and core of all true mankind. Without it we are still in our subs and of all men most to be p'tied.

Yet I wonder if our consideration of it has not too frequently stopped with the fact that, because we are trusting a risen Christ, we thereby have forgiveness of sins and eternal life. That is all gloriously true, of course. Nothing further could be said if that were untrue.

At the same time the purpose and value of the Resurrection is not by any means exhausted with regeneration. The progrossive steps of Christian experience, as taught in the Book of Romans, show that we are justified by the Resurrection. (Rom. 4:25). Then the justified ones are to be identified with Christ in His death, burial, and resurrection, the outcome of which is that we are to "walk in newners" of life" (Rom. 6:4).

The hereafter was settled when we believed God concerning the risen Christ, and that faith was imputed to us for righteousness (Rom, 4:24). The here and now is taken care of when we are experimentally or experientally, located in Christ. That is the power that operated in Christ when He was raised from the dead, operates daily in the lives of those who would walk "in newness of life." Wrightsville, Ga.

Too often people become satisfied to enjoy the hope of eternal life, with consideration only for the hereafter, without having any desire for or intention of living a new life by that same power in the here and now. Any view of the Resurrection that does not include the life which now is, along with that which is to come, is partial and incomplete.

Paul could say with conviction, "I know whom I have believed, and am persuaded that he is able to keep that which I have committed unto h'm against that day" (2 Tim. 1:12), but he did not stop there. The intense longing of his heart, which was the result of the foregoing assurance, was, "that I may know him (not in the forgiveness of sins, that was already taken care of), and the power of his resurrection" (Phil. 3:10). Ite Canted that resurrection power, which will change our bodies of humiliation at His return (vs. 20-21), to operate in him throughout the remaining days of his mortal life, which it did.

At the same time Paul also acknowledged that this could only become a reality as he entered into the "fellowship of his sufferings, being made conformable unto his death" (v. 10). All of this complements Pomans 6.

It is not sufficient that we stop with the reality of the new birth for a lost humanity, as we look into the empty tomb. Let us rejoice that, because death could not hold Him captive, we not only have life forever but liberty for today. May our hearts burn within us as He empowers us, by His indwelling presence made possible by the Resurrection to 'walk in newness of 1.fe." How can we selfishly claim all that the risen Christ has to offer in the way of deliverance from hell, and be unwilling to stretch ourselves upon the cross, let the old self-life be laid in the tomb, and be content to be submerged in Him and thus be conformed to the image of His Son?

Cod's ultimate objective in ra'sing Christ from the dead is not realized in our experience until His resurrection power is manifested in the lives of those Hc has redeemed. The power to redeem a lost world will never be revealed to a lost world until we who have been justified freely by His grace learn to walk, step by step, "in newness of life."

The resurrection of Christ from the dead promises eternal salvation and present victory. At the close of that great dissert tation on this theme, Paul exclaims "Thanks be to God which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ."

(1 Cor. 15:57). I like the rendering. "Thanks be to God who always causeth us to triumph in Christ." It is not simply a victory over death at the close of this I fe but, in view of that, we have daily victo. y over sin which is the strength of death. On the basis of this promise, resultant of course from the Resurrection, Paul concludes w th his great challenge to steadfastness, undying devotion and consecrated service to Christ (v. 58). It is thus that we "walk in the newness of life." Just as our relationship to Him settles our eternal destiny so cur relationship to Him each day determines our walk. Thank God for a risen Christ who walks with us and in us as we pursue our pilgrim journey.

"Now the God of peace, that brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, . . . make you perfect in every good work to do his will, working in you that which is well pleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ; to whom be glory forever and ever." (Heb. 13:20.21).

Let us "walk in newness of life."

An Easter Message

He is not here; for He is risen, as He said, come see the place where the Lord lay. Matt. 28:6. The most glorious announcement that was ever made to mankind was the positive stated fact by the angel at the tomb, where Jesus had been laid, He is not here for He is risen.

There are four separate statements in this verse of scripture, all of them glorious truths. First, He is not here. (The grave is not the abiding place). Second, For He is risen (not moved by other hands but with life in himself). Third, As He said (not an unexpected unknown truth, but something He had taught them). Fourth, Come see (don't accept rumors and myths, but see for yourself).

When we place a dear one in the tomb, we as natural men, expect it to remain there and often visit the tomb and hold that place as sacred to our hearts. So the the women that come to Jesus' tomb came to show esteem of Him and to annoint His boay.

The horror of death has always been man's greatest dread. That man can live and be active and possess the qualities of enjoying life, can see, hear, feel, taste and smell, can move, go from place to place and loves and appreciates all of these qualities; yet when that great enemy death overtakes him all these are gone.

There is in man and always has been a great anxiety and longing to know that life extended beyond this sphere, that just a few short years of life on earth was not all. Job expressed the thought of every heart, when he asked, "If a man die shall he live again?" That question was fully answered by the angel, "He is not here".

The women that went to that tomb to annoint the body of Jesus, expected to find a cold lifeless form, which they would, with grief stricken hearts and loving hands annoint, but instead of a pale lifeless corpse, they found an empty tomb for "He is not here".

"He is risen," this statement gives the reason for Him not being there. The skeptic may say, as did the chief priests, that the body was carried away, but no, He is risen, His body is not cold and lifeless in death any more. He is alive and active again, it was not other hands that moved Him, but life and power in His own body. Oh! glorious fact, oh blessed assurance the tomb is not a prison, from which there is no relief, but man can and will live again. as He said.

We find on at least three different occasions, Jesus positively said that He would rise from the dead the third day. Matt. 16:21; 17:23; 20:19. The unusual and out of ordinary sometimes happens to men and with men, but they had no knowledge of it until it had occured, but Jesus knew and said that He would rise again, this reminded to the disciples should dispell every doubt and reassure them that He was truly the Christ.

"Come see the place where the Lord lay" to fully convince them that He was not there and that He had risen, the angel asked them to come see, look for yourself. be thoroughly satisfied that this tomb is empty, it is just the place where the Lord had been lain, but He is not here now.

God wants His people to see and know the truth. Jesus said before His death, "Ye shall know the truth and the truth shall make you ince." John 8:32. In the 28th verse of this chapter He said" When ye have lifted up the Son of man, then shall ye know that I am he" so God knowing that the fact of the resurrection of Christ was the crowning truth of the gospel, and that His disciples were to be witnesses of this fact, He wanted them to see with their own eyes that Jesus was not in the tomb. If we have a valuable or cherished article of some kind, perhaps its a present from a friend or a loved one and we lay it away in a place where we think it is secure and we tell someone else where it is and tell them go get it and they go, and return and say it was not there. we would not be convinced until we had looked for ourselves, Jesus was the most precious friend and dear one the disciples had ever had, so when they went to the place where they had laid Him and the angel told them He was not there, He knowing the anxiety of their hearts told them, "Come see the place where the Lord lay."

I am glad that the disciples wanted proof that Jesus had risen from the dead, it shows and proves to the world they were sincere and honest and that Jesus was not what the Jews said He was, a deceiver. If they had been too anxious and ready to accept the report of the resurrection it would have given the Jews an argument to disprove the resurrection. The chief priests and Pharisees came together unte Pilate and saying, sirs we remember that, that deceiver said while He was yet alive. after three days I will rise again. Matt. But the anxiety, uncertainity 28:62-63. and unwillingness to go right out and announce the resurrection until they had the poitive proof, proves that they did not go and steal His body from the tomb.

What are some of the proofs of the resurrection of Christ? Let us consider accepted facts: It is an accepted fact in both literary and sacred history that Jesus did live in the world and that He was crucified by the Roman authority, persecuted by the Jews, and that He was burried and that His body was gone from the place where it was laid. His bitterest enemies (the Jews) admit these facts.

Since the Jews and the Romans are the ones that disputed the fact of the resurrection and since they were responsible for His/death and they had all of the authority to investigate and prove that He was carried away by His disciples and execute judgement upon the ones that stole His body, why did they not do this? It would have been impossible for the disciples to have stolen the body from the tomb the way it was guarded and secured and it would have been impossible for them to have secreted the body where it could not be found.

The most positive and undeniable proof of the resurrection of Christ, excepting the personal testimony of His disciples and the demonstration of the devine power of God, (which the disputer will not accept) is the fact that just 50 days after it occurred Peter stood before a great multitude of the ones that were guilty of His death, ones that were eye witnesses of all that occurred and understood all of the circumstances and said, "Ye men of Isarel, hear these words; Jesus of Nazareth, a man approved of God among you by miracles and signs and wonders, which God did by Him in the midst of you, as ye yourselves also know; Him being delivered by the determinate consul and foreknowledge of God, ye have taken and by wicked hands have taken and crucified and slain; Whom God hath raised up, having loosed the pains of death; because it was not possible that He should be holden of it. Acts 2:22-23-24. Notice, Peter told them that they were the ones that crucified and slain the Lord, and then boldly declared that God had raised Him from the dead. And when they heard this they were convicted and there was about three thousand of them saved on that day. If Peter had been fabricating a myth before this multitude that were eye witnesses of His crucifixion, there certainly would not have been so many accepted the truth and been converted.

The fact of the resurrection of Christ is the hope of the world, it proves that the grave is not the victor; it takes sting out of death. Christ said that He would rise from the dead and He did, And He also said that we and all mankind would rise from the dead (or be changed) John 5: 28-29; 1st Thess, 4:15-16-17: 1st. Cor. 15:, 51-52.

Since His prophecy concerning His resurrection became a transpired fact, just that sure will His prophecy concerning our resurrection become a transpired fact .. Thank God "He is not here" (in the tomb). for He is risen.

The Brujo, also claims power to cure by setting a glass of water beside the s'ck enes. Naturally many of them die without aid, unwilling to call a medical doctor.

There is much of this, to a fanatical extent, in the Cangre. This is the neighborhood of the Bible Seminary of The Cedars of Lebanon Free Will Baptist Bible School. God has permitted us to break in on this fearful practice just a few weeks ago.

One man, with whom I have had occosion to do business for the School, expressed his confidence in the Bible and to'd me that he had one. It's said, 'But I need someone to teach me th's Bock and there are many here that need to know it. Can't you come or send some one to preach?" He continued, My wife is crazy, demon possessed, the result of this voolooism and the only way I have found to bring her out of these spells is to read the Fible to her."

Finally, after much persistency in demanding a teacher, one of our students and a carpenter employed at the School went. The man and his wife and two others | were definitely converted and a preaching hall was opened.

Last Sunday, I attended the service with about 30 packed in the hall. All stood up expressing their desire to follow Christ. This man is one of importance in that community and has a truck. Filling the truck with people, he took them to the school that they might hear Bro. Josue, our professor of the seminary, expound the word. The visit was all unexpected on the part of those at the school, out suspending studies. Josue preached to them. The work is reaching the proportions of a real revival. God is moving. The only answer to the challenge is a group of students, consecrated and preparing at the Bible Seminary to go out into all the surrounding towns.

These boys and girls, twelve of them, will soon be going into their preaching missions throughout the province. They have come to us from the futhermost province of Orient. The Province of Santa Clara and the Province of Matanzas. Pray that God shall send us additional consecrated students this fall to push the battle for souls. They are our only answer to the errors of doctrines of devils and fanatism as it abounds in Cuba.

OUR VANISHING SUNDAY

Some considerations about the misuse of the First Day of the Week.

It is a fact, evident to any one who observes the trend of things, that Sunday as a day of worship and rest is rapidly slipping away. And the last few years has seen the tendency to misuse the day rapidly increase. Unsaved people have for a long time been disposed to disregard the day except as a day of pleasure. But we have now come to times when persons who have stood high in the church are misusing the day and attempting to justify themselves in doing so. And it is with this class that we especially plead for a return to the right use of the day.

SOME OF THE EXCUSES OFFERED

One of the outstanding excuses is that it is patriotic at this time to work on Sunday in order to help the nation win the war. Unfortunately patriotism is a cloak under which various evils can operate. It has been demonstrated again and again that men, horses, and even machinery will do more work in six days, with an intervening day of rest than they will working continuously day after day. It seems to be built into the fabric of things that there must be a periodic rest for everything, and one day in seven has been designed by our wise Creator as the regularity of that period of rest.

Some say they will LOSE THEIR JOBS if they refuse to work on Sunday. Well, shall a Christian fear man more than God? We know of instances when men have conscientiously refused to work on Sunday and did not lose their jobs. But what if they did; are we so soft that we cannot sacrifice anything for the Lord? Is our faith in the Lord so little that we fear He will let us suffer beyond endurance? The Lord says that He will honor the person that honors Him.

Others say they NEED THE ADDED MONEY they can get by working on Sunday. And yet people are getting wages for six days a week away beyond what they ever received before.

Others say their church needs the money and they are GIVING THE EARNINGS OF SUNDAY to help the church pay its debt or build a new parsonage. There was a king named Saul one time who thought the Lord's cause needed a few more cat. tle to sacrifice, so he saved some the Lord had told him to destroy. It is well for these Sunday givers to remember what the prophet of God told Saul, that it is better to obey than to sacrifice.

These are but samples of the excuses, but much of this trying to excuse one's self for Sunday work can be traced to

MISPLACED LOVE

Some people love money more than they love God. And, regardless of the excuses offered, the vast majority of people who have fallen into the way of working on Sunday do it for the love of money.

Some love the luxuries they can buy with their increased wages, and truly the Bible says of the last days that men shall be lovers of pleasures more than lovers of God.

Some may say that love of country prompts them to work on Sunday. But it is also true that there are many workers who hope the war will not soon close so they can make more money while it lsats.

THE REMEDY STATED

As stated above, misplaced love is at the root of this situation, as it is of most ills of the people of God. If church members loved God supremely, loved His house loved the assembling of the saints together, they would not allow spurious ideas of patriotism or other things to interfere with their devotion to God and His service.

This country was founded on devotion to God. The early settlers came here to find a place where they could be at liberty to serve God as they conscientiously believed they should. They did not come to the forbidding shores of New England in quest of gold, but in quest of God. It

was not love of pleasures that induced them to come, but love for God. They laid deep the foundations of righteousness, and one stone in that foundation was the keeping of the first day of the week sacred to the worship of God.

It will be observed that our expenditures for the month of February amounted to \$624.75 in excess of our income. This may be readily understood by the fact that we invested \$490.00 in seating equipment; and approximately \$50.00 in extra pantry stock, with a traveling expense of \$88.94 in excess of that of January.

DEATH CANNOT LONG BE HIDDEN

THE SPANISH WARRIOR known as Cid felt death approaching him on the eve of a battle with his ancient enemy, the king of Morocco. The Cid ordered that h.s body be embalmed immediately after he died—dressed in armor and placed on his horse so that he might lead his troops in this final battle. When the Moors who believed the Cid was either dead or incapacitated—saw him at the head of his troops they were so astounded they fied in panic!

But the deception was only temporary; all soon knew, or could know, that the Cid was really dead.

Christ proved Himself alive after His passion by "many infall b'e proofs," including ten distinct appearances to His people.

Not the least of the infallible proofs of the resurrection of Christ was the form the grave clothes, left in the tomb. When Peter and John ran up to the tomb and looked in, John 20:1-9, they saw "the linen clothes lie, and the napkin, that was about his head, NOT lying with the linen in a place by itself." (Vs. 6,7). The loving hands of the Savior had thoughtfully folded that napkin and placed it away from the grave clothes, for the grave clothes were still in the form of his body: but by removing and flattening out the napkin all could SEE that His body was no longer in the grave clothes! When John saw this evidence of the resurrection from the grave c'othes "he saw and believed (that Jesus was raised from the dead)." And this belief was entirely from the evidence of the grave clothes and the empty tomb, "for as yet they knew not the Scripture that He must rise again from the dead." (Study John 20:1-10).

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GOOD MORNING, GOD

Does your alarm clock irritate you? Do you get out on the wrong side of the bed? Are you catankerous until you've had your coffee?

Try starting your day with God. His presence makes every morning a refreshing, delightful new opportunity. But not only that: meeting God in the morning, makes the whole day go smoother.

e what Bible passage vould Ged have rue read? Through what verse does He csp-cially speak to me?

2. 'or what am I especially t'ankful today?

4. For whom would God have me pray today?

5. Is there any sin or mistake in my life for which I should ask God's forgiveness? Is there any apology or rest tution I should make?

6. What would God have me to do today?

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COMMUNISM AND THE "WORKER" ---

Eric Johnston, president of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce recently returned from a tour of Soviet Russia. With the pro-Red virtually in control of the press and the radio, very few informed persons have the opportunity to tell the truth about the enslavement of the worker. However, much can be read between the lines in Mr. Johnston's article in the Oct. 1944, "Nation's Business." (Article entitled, "A Business view of Russia.")

Mr. Johnston says they call the Soviet system "State Socialism". (Same as in Germany where they call their system. "National Socialism," or "Nazism," for short.)

"The average worker," he says, "receives 800 and 900 rubles a month (a ruble is 19 cents)." This sounds like good wages, \$160 or 175 per month, but when you figure the BUYING POWER of 800 or 900 rubles, it amounts to about FIVE CENTS A DAY in our money.

Mr. Johnston says that in the non-rationed stores, "A SECOND-HAND SUIT OF CLOTHES COSTS 3,000 RUBLES; a pound of sugar 400 rubles: a pair of shoes 2,000 rubles."

A second hand suit is worth about \$5.00 and it takes a Soviet worker about four months to buy such a suit. That makes his wages about \$1.25 per month, or 5c per day. He must work two weeks for a pound of sugar which makes his salary in that realm about one-half cent per day in that wonderful worker's paradise (????) where the goverment owns and controls the means of production.

Where did Russia get those second-hand suits? The native Russians don't have any usable suits to discard. Are these the suits Americans recently donated for Russian relief and now the Russian worker must work four months for one? I'd like to know, wouldn't you????
