The Birth of Jesus

Matthew 1:18; Luke 2:1-20

Now the birth of Jesus Christ was on this wise: When as His mother Mary was espoused to Joseph, before they came together, she was found with child of the Holy Ghost.

Where is the Christ of Bethlehem

I Peter 3:22

Have you wondered where the Christ is who caused so much excitement in Bethlehem in the long ago? I am sure that every sinner and probably some professions of religion have wondered where the Christ is, who caused angels to come from Heaven and Shepherds to come from the hills and wise anen to journey from afar to see the one who was to be King of the Jews.

Let us answer this all important question from the Bible and see where he really is.

I. He Is Gone Into Heaven we read in Psalm 68:18. "Thou hast ascended on high, thou has led Captivity Captive, thou hast received gifts for men." We know that to assend is to go up. We know arcording to His book he is really living on high.

We also read in Mark 16:1 "So then, after the Lord had spoken unto them, he was received up into Heaven and sat on the right hand of God." This scripture tells of the exact location of Jesus. He was received into Heaven, not just near it. And is seated at the Fathers right hand. II. So then you see Him in the second place at the right hand of God. Luke 22:

69 "Hereafter shall you see the Son of man sit on the right hand of the power of God."

When Stephen was being stoned to death he saw Jesus there; when Paul was caught into the 3rd, heaven, he saw Him there. When John on the lonely Isle of Patmas, saw Him, he saw Him at the right hand of the Father. Also in Phil. 2:9 "Wherefore God hath highly exalted him and given him a name which is above every name." III. Also He is where He has the preeminence. I John gives us one of these pictures John 3:31 "He that cometh from above is above all. He that is of the earth is earthly and speaketh of the earth, He that cometh from heaven is above all! I all Rom. 14:9 "For to this end Christ both died and rose and revived that He might be Lord of the dead and living."

Heb. 1:4 "Being made so much better; than the angels as He hath by inheritance obtained a more excellent name."

Heb. 3:3 . For this man was counted worthy of more glory than Moses, in as much as he who hath builded the house is worthy of more glory than the house."

He will one day have the reins of Government and be honored on earth. When He was here before He was dispised and rejected. They spit on Him, whipped Him spiked Him to a tree, but one day He will be conquoring King.

Listen to the prophets tell you about the Christ. He has taught us to share with the uncollightened heathen the blessings of civization, education, free intercourse and understanding, to the end that all the creatures of God shall be equal in opportunity as we are all equal in His sight. This is God's plan, and in His good time it will be brought to pass. Mary's Babe at Bethlehem was the genesis of this plan.

He came to save us all!

We could go on almost without end enumerating the blessings that have come to the world through the birth of Jesus, for they are eternal. His spirit has filled us with generous impulses; we want others to be happy because we have found happiness in Him. Through the Bethlehem Babe we have the blessed certainty that our peace is God's constant concern. The whole world revolves around this Babe, born in a lowly stable. He is the miracle of all ages—God, manifested in the flesh, that the beauty of this sinless God-man may be reflected to others by our likeness unto Him.

At the time of this momentous event in Bethlehem, only Mary knew of its true significance. Through an angel, God told her that she was to be the mother of the promised Messiah, for whose coming all Israel was looking and longing and praying. But it is easy to doubt that even she could foresee its full scope.

Mary lived in such a little world; she was such a lowly maid. The minds of the people of Israel were centered solely upon the coming of a deliverer. They wanted only power to conquer Caesar Augustus; not wisdom to conquer themselves.

Israel yearned to rule instead of being

The chief concern of its leaders was the political issue: who was to be first in the new kingdom? Nor was it any part of Israel's idea that the Messiah should include the Gentiles in any of His plans.

How, then, could the mind of Mary, the lowly Hebrew maid, embrace the all-inclusive plan of world salvation that was the intent of God for the Babe born in a stable?

Mary's world was such a drab world, such a very somber world. Because the minds of Israel's people were fixed wholly upon their hated enemies and their captivity, there was no room for gladness in Israel's heart—no music in Israel's soul. Many of her Psalms, chanted by the priests were imprecations of hate, calling upon God to destroy her oppressors. The congregations in the temple sat silently in sackcloth and ashes.

Then, suddenly one night, the angel of the Lord appeared to some shepnerds out on the hills; the glory of the Lord shone round about them; and the angel said:

Crisis, Christmas and a CHILD

It was a terrible peace—a peace enforced by crosses, spears and spies that prevailed throughout the world on that starlit night when the shepherds of Bethlehem listened to the chorusing angels as they announced the birth of a Saviour.

Caesar Augustus—stern, callous, determined, suspicious and ruthless--sat upon the throne in Rome, the complete master of the world. True, the world was quiet; at least outwardly so. Revolt flared no-

where, and the burnished shields of the marching legions were seldom stained with blood, except in some abortive rict when ruffians went adventuring.

The smooth military roads which provided for swift transfer of legions from one section of the empire to another, and the cleverly organized intelligence service which enabled the emperor to keep it a finger on affairs even in the remote provinces, provided a threat so dire that he

man, save the most desperate, ever dared invite the terrible wrath of the government.

The Roman peace-had brought large benefits to the world, and shrewd business men were quick to recognize its advantages. Caravans of merchandise might travel all the way from Damascus to Rome, or from Alexandria to Athens or Corinth. in perfect safety. Caesar's police saw to Bandits and thieves lived a difficu't life, except along the byways of the empire. Of course, the cost of transporting merchandise was excessive, and customs were demanded every hundred miles or so, but merchants who enjoyed special favors at the hands of their local governers or procurators were able to net a neat profit, for merchants will find a way.

Caesar's government was, actually, an alliance of big business men organized for mutual protection and for the perpetuation of their class. The plan was very simple.

In every province there were those who because of wealth or position, constituted the ruling class. But rulers who charge all the traffic will bear are always in need of the protection of an army and police force, and arms have always been expensive. This is where Caesar came in. I'e provided the military equipment with which to keep the world in order, and the local capitalists, ruling classes, money landers and big-wigs paid for their protection in taxes levied upon the poor against whom they sought protection. Thus the "burden" of government was divided, "th Rome maintaining the army, and the local lords paying the bills out of their r nts, profits, usury and spoils.

Once we dig down under the polite langrage with which Luke tells the story, we come upon the sinister aspects of the situation. The decree of which he speaks (Luke 2:1) refers very frankly to the cubject of taxes, but the actual facts and conditions were so well known to his first readers that it was unnecessary for him to explain them in detail. To the modern reader the account seems to tell of a very simple matter-Joseph had to go down to Bethlehem to pay his taxes. As a matter of fact, it was a far more complicated proposition. By virtue of the fact that Herod the Great had rendered a tremen-

dous service to Caesar Augustus in the early years of his reign, the Jews of Judea had been granted certain valuable favors. Any Jew who could prove that he belonged to a Judean family found it of very real advantage to do so.

Now the only place in the world where Joseph could prove his citizenship was in Bethlehem. There the family records were kept, and there he was able to trace his ancestry and prove that he was of the house and lineage of David. This made the journey to the little village necessary.

But establishing the fact of citizenship, and being enrolled was not altogether a simple matter. In addition to proving his identity, Joseph was under the necessity of furnishing to the Roman officers a complete inventory of all his property, including the tools of his carpenter shop back in Nazareth, and any stock of materials he might have on hand. this inventory his class as a tax-payer was judged, and to make doubly sure, a duplicate copy of the inventory was furnished to the publican (tax-gatherer) in Nazareth. If that officer, in calling upon Joseph, discovered any real discrepancy between his inventory and the facts, the publican was at liberty to confiscate the excess property with liberal interest for his trouble.

The whole purpose of Caesar's decree was to make an economic invoice of the whole world, in order to determine how

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much the empire might hope to be able to squeeze out of the people. Back of every publican stood a squad of Caesar's soldiers with their terrible short swords and their brutual hearts, and back of every squad stood many legions.

The first contact that the Babe of Bethlehem had with the world into which He was born was with the tax machinery of Rome. His mother was driven to a stable and His own first cradle was a manger because of the cupidity of Caesar.

In the meantime the empire was a vast system of interlocking economic interests resting upon a quivering base of slavery. It was the slaves that furnished the labor for the world. The empire made war deliberately and avowedly for the purpose of recruiting workers for the vast industrial system by which Rome lived. mediately following every military victory auctions were held and the captured armies were sold to the merchants or toilers. On one occasion as many as thirty thousand men were sold to a single buyer, from an auction block that was set up on the battlefield before the blood was dry upon the soil.

This system of militarisms and slavery meant that some of the best educated, some of the most skillful, and some of the most intelligent men in the world were slaves. Their one crime consisted of fact that they had been on the losing side.

Again and again it happened that a highborn lad, captured in some raid, became a slave-boy in the home of some aristocrat. He might be educated, trained and disciplined for important service inside the household. In fact, many of the physicians of the time were youths had been so trained, and there are those who have suggested that Luke, the evangelist, was such a one, and that the "most noble Theophilus,' to whom the Gospel and the Acts are addressed, was his mas-That, of course, is no more than conjecture, but it well might have been the case, for the social conditions of the times could easily have made it possible.

At one time, so it is recorded, a proposal was made in the Roman Senate that every slave in the empire should be branded with the letter "S" on the forehead. Then it was discovered that three out of every five adult males in the city

of Rome were slaves, and the freemen became alarmed lest the slaves might discover their strength and overthrow the government and the existing system.

Caesar Augustus took great pride in the belief that he was a generous ruler. His grants of rights and powers to the people were heralded as vast benefactions. But he would never have admitted that any man had any rights except those he granted. The idea that any man was born with rights, by the fact of his creation, did not seem ever to have entered any Roman head.

According to Roman political philosophy, whoever sat upon the throne became the arbiter, of every man's destiny. It was only a short, quick step from that position to the next, and very terrible one-the divinity of the emperor. In Augustus' day there were those who sought to flatter the emperor by suggesting that he was a god, and as such entitled to divine honors. But he was far too practical and realistic an individual to be deceived by such blandishments, and consequently he brushed aside the idea rather easily. But less than a hundred years later Christians were being thrown to the lions because they would not swear by Augustus' successor, and pray to him as a god.

When the heralding hosts drifted down from the skies over the heads of the Bethlehem shepherds, and began their anthems of joy, there was not one man in all the countryside who dared call his soul his own. All he had, all he was, and all he might ever hope to be were at the mercy of Caesar. The picture we usually get of the adoring shepherds, and the sweet face of the young mother, with Joseph in the shadows, is an idyllic view of a very terrible world.

According to all the laws of the empire, the little Child who lay so helplessly upon the arm of the young mother had come into the world without one right, except those conferred upon Him by Caesar Augustus. We speak very glibly of our rights to "life, I berty and the pursuit of happiness." But Joseph and Mary knew of no such rights that their Little One might ever enjoy, except by Caesar's largess.

Yet, in spite of all the terrible might and power of the Roman empire, the birth of that Babe in Bethlehem that first Christmas night spelled the doom of the entire Roman system.

There is an amazing miracle in this. A Baby upset the world which Caesar and his legions held together with such awful power.

It was not that the Little One ever raised a sword. In fact, on the last night of His life He said to one of His friends who was ready to strike in His defense, "Put up thy sword." But during those years, as a preacher to the plain people, He let loose some ideas which brought Rome down in a mass of rubble.

From the very night that His infant cry was first heard coming from the manger the rights of every new-born babe have had a new status.

In Matthew's Gospel, in connection with the story of the visit of the Wise Men, it is said that the Easterners were warned that they should not report their discovery to Herod, so "they went home another way." The experience of the Wise Men is not peculiar. All the world has gone down along another way since that night when the angels sang.

Force, tyranny, materialism, might and power had gone as far as they were able to go. They reached their supremacy in Caesar, and there was nothing beyond.

On every hand there was a feeling that life had reached a crisis. Roman legions had established quiet over the earth; money and property were comparatively safe. One mighty empire ruled the world and one system of law operated everywhere throughout the earth. One language was official; one coinage was everywhere accepted, but there was no unity of faith. Indeed, there was no faith. Men everywhere

were groping.

So low had the religions of the earth fallen that the Greek gods were being burlesqued on the stages of the theaters of Athens, Corinth and Ephesus. No one in Rome ever thought of turning to the priests of religion for solace in sorrow, or for strength in the hour of need.

And the coming of the Child was in the midst of such a crisis.

In a world of insecurity here, at last, was something secure—in a manger!

In a world that admitted no rights except those an emperor bestowed, there was a Babe, destined to establish rights for every man—rights which no government or dictator might take away.

In a world where every man's property, and even his life, was at the mercy of a tyrant's whim, there was a new-born Infant upon whose little pink shoulders there rested the new government of men predicted by the prophets.

From the manger there began to flow influences that turned the tide of history rights which are, today, the dearest possessions of the human race.

To that stable, and that manger, we turn again at this Christmas season to offer our thanks for the emancipation that has come to the race through the gentle and powerful words that fell from those lips as the Babe, become a Man, preached by the shores of Galilee and from the mountainsides.

Let no crisis dismay us! Our faith was born in a crisis; our faith was born for a crisis. Christmas, the Child, and a crisis seem to go together.

The Christ of Bethlehem

No other single event the whole year arouses so much enthusiasm among all classes of people, as does the day when God came into the world at Bethlehem in the person of His Son, the Lord Jesus Christ. All other special events pale into utter insignificance when compared with this one.

For some four thousand years the Old Testament (aints contemplated the coming of the Messiah; now for some two thousand years we have celebrated the fact that He was born in Bethlehem. Who recalls the birthday of the great men of the earth, such as Alexander, Napoleon or Nero? Not the average person; a few tea-

chers of history may remember such dates, but everyone who has heard the story of Jesus being born in Bethlehem as recorded in Luke or the visit of the wise men to Bethlehem, to do homage to the new born king as recorded in Matthew, celebrates this annual occasion; even those who may have no time for the Bible or the Christ revealed therein, do Him honor with every calendar that hangs upon their walls, or the one they carry in their pocket or in their purse. This is not all, every time you write a letter or sign a legal document of any kind, you honor the birth of the Christ Child.

What makes this event so important in human history? Certainly it is more than lies upon the surface; by the shephers finding the babe in Bethlehem's manger or the wise men of the east bringing their gifts and doing homage to the new born king some years later. Indeed, many people have missed the power that makes this story what it is because they have not taken into account what is back of it or what follows it as logically as night follows day.

The thought of the writer is to have you see four of the many things that make this one of the greatest stories of the ages, that thereby your soul may be blessed as his has been blessed, as well as the congregation who heard these truths in sermon form.

HIS PRE-EXISTENCE

Jesus Christ lived in Heaven before the world was created. The Apostle John opens his Gospel thus: "In the beginning was the Word and the Word was with God ... all things were made by Him; and without Him was not anything made that was made." In Colossians 1:16 we read. "For by Him all things created, that are in Heaven and that are in earth, visible and invisible." The apostle John is the only one that begins his Gospel with the life of Jesus in Heaven. For other references to this fact we must go to the old testament and the new testament episties. He was the joy of Heaven, for in Proverbs 8:30 we read: "I was daily His delight." Again in Hebrews 1:6, "Let all the angels of God worship Him." He was in existence long before Isaiah wrote of Him some 700 years before He was born

"He saw His glory and in Bethlehem. spake of Him (John 12:41). When the Jews boasted of Abraham as their ancestor, Jesus roblied: "Before Abraham was, I am." More than seven times in the Gospel of John, does Jesus claim to be the "I Am." You will recall when Moses was commissioned by God to go to Israel, but said: "Who shall I say sent me?" Thus shalt thou say unto the children of Israel, I AM hath sent me unto you." (Exodus 3:13-14). You will recall the Jews accused Jesus of blasphemy because he claimed to be God and forgave sins. He was God. He was with the Father and was active like Melchisedek, "having in creation: neither beginning of days or end of life"; thus He was eternal-God the Son, and existed from eternity before He became a Babe in Bethlehem. Why talk about the Christ of Bethlehem without recognizing this fact? viz.: HIS PRE-EXISTENCE!

HIS VIRGIN BIRTH

Jesus Christ came into the world in a way that no man ever came into the world before. He was not the son of Joseph, but the Son of God. Adam, the first man was God's creature by a creative act, but Jesus Christ was God's Son by being conceived of the Holy Ghost. This, however, does not detrace from the fact that He was one of the Holy Trinity in which each person is co-eternal and uncreated. A miracle, most assuredly, without which the birth in Bethlehem's stable would be meaningless and our Bible would be without authority.

Man had nothing whatever to do with the Babe of Bethlehem coming into the world. It is interesting how the Scriptures state this truth, for in Genesis 3:15 we read "the seed of the woman" (not of man and woman) in Isaiah 7:14: "a virgin shall conceive and bear a Son." In Jeremiah 31:22 "the Lord hath created a new thing in the earth, a woman shall encompass a man."

Again in Galatians 4:4, "But when the fulness of the time was come, God sent forth His Son made of a woman"; also Galatians 3:16: "Now to Abraham and his seed were the promises made; he saith not to seeds as of many; but as of one, and to thy seed, which is Christ." Kindly note the emphasis is upon the miracle:

"The seed of the woman; a virgin born child; a new thing in the earth." married woman to conceive and bear a son was no "sign"; neither was such an event "a new thing in the earth." Wherein is the reply to this mysterythis miracle recorded in the Gospel of Luke 1:35? It is in the message of the angel to Mary! "The Holy Ghost shall upon thee, and the power of the highest shall overshadow thee, therefore that Holy thing which shall be born of thee shall be called: "the Son of God." Matthew 1:23, "Behold a virgin shall be with child, and shall bring forth a Son, and they shall call His name Emmanuel. which being interpreted is, God with us" God in the midst of us. Thus Matthew and Luke give us the interpretation of the passage in Genesis, as well as the prophecies in Isaiah and Jeremiah.

In Eden sin came into the race thru the disobedience of Eve, but Paul in his epistles, not only shows thereby all were made sinners, but that the blame for this sin is attributed to Adam and not Eve, because he is the head of the race; therefore no man as a member of this fallen race could have any part in providing a Saviour from sin. Only God could do that which he did in the perfect and spotless life of His Son, Jesus Christ. You may be familiar with the art of grafting fruit trees; into the limb of a poor or scrub tree may be grafted a twig from a good fruit tree; the result is that the fruit produced does not take after the poor or worthless tree but after the good fruit that has been grafted in. Though Mary was a member of a sinful and fallen race, yet her son being conceived by a Divine act, means that we have Emmanuel-God with us. Why talk about the Christ of Bethlehem without recognizing this fact? viz.: HIS VIRGIN BIRTH.

HIS INCARNATION

Jesus existed before He was born in Bethlehem. No other person ever came into the world by their own choice, or chose their own mother, or the town in which they were to be born, or the village in which they were to grow up; but Jesus even chose the time and circumstances under which He was to be born. It has been suggested by Bible students that the

Lord visited this earth some thirty times before He became the Babe of Bethlehem: for instance He talked with Adam, Enoch, Abraham, Jacob, Moses, Joshua and Gideon, besides many others; his appearance to Old Testament saints made them strong in their testimony to God. But it remained for the Apostle John in His Gospel and Paul in His epistles, to give us an insight into the mystery of His incarnation. John says: 'And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, full of grace and truth; and we beheld His glory, a glory as of the only begotten from the Father. (R. V.) John 1:14-15. Jesus said: "I proceeded forth and came from God." (John 8:42). How striking! "The Word became." "I proceeded forth." This indicates a condition in which Jesus lived before His earthly appearance. "I came from God." "I came forth from the Father, and am come into the world." Herein we see the voluntary act of our Lord in His incarnation.

In Phillippians 2, Paul in speaking of Jesus Christ said: "Who being in the form of God, thought it not robbery (or a thing to be grasped after), to be equal with God," rather, His goal was to make Himself of no reputation, "and took upon Him the form of a servant, and was made in the likeness of men." The reason for this is indicated in the epistle to the Hebrews. "Forasmuch as the children were partakers of flesh and blood, He also Himself, likewise took part of the same." Or again, He took not upon Him the nature of angels, but the seed of Abraham. Thus Christ was born in Bethlehem, grew up in Nazareth as a child, and at the age of 30 years, began His public ministry in His home town; said ministry covering about three and one-half years. If you want to understand God, then study the life of Jesus as He ministered in the midst of men. As someone has reverently said: "When God spoke to us in Christ, He lost His speech, because there is nothing more to be said." Why talk about the Christ of Bethlehem without recognizing this fact? Viz. HIS INCARNATION.

HIS FACRIFICE

To talk about the Birth of Christ in Bethlehem without the cross of Christ is meaningless. Other men were born to live but Jesus Christ was born not only to live but to die; to offer Himself as a sacrifice for the sins of the world. Without this fact of His death, we would have no redemption from sin and the Bible would be no more than any other book. apostle John said: "Ye know that He was manifest to take away our sins." In Hebrews we read: "Without the shedding of Blood, there is no remission." Jesus said: "The Son of Man is come to seek and to save that which is lost." Again, "the Son of man is not come to destroy men's lives, but to save them." "I am come, not to judge the world, but to save the world." "I am come that they might have life." "The bread of God is He who cometh down from Heaven, that He may give life to the world." This self-giving is suggested in the passage already referred to in Philippians 2, where Jesus is referred to as descending from being equal with God, to take upon Himself the form of a servant, and that for a purpose; "and being found in fashion as a man, He humbled Himself and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross." Herein you have the climactic statement of the purpose of the virgin birth, the incarnation and His sacrifice upon the cross.

Now a fact that is often overlooked is this: that man could not of himself produce a perfect life that would become a perfect sacrifice for the sins of the race, because only God could do that, which he did thru christ, the virgin born one. He had no sin in Him, but our sins were laid upon Him: "He became sin for us"; thus the author of our salvation was not of human, but of Divine origin. God taught Israel to have two animals to take care of their sins; the one was slain and its blood sprinkled upon the altar to make a covering for their sins. The other was the scape goat. The sins of the people were confessed upon its head and He was sent far into the wilderness, there to be How true is the lost in utter oblivion. testimony of the psalmist: "As far as the east is from the west, so far hath He removed our transgressions from us." as John said: "Behold the Lamb of God which taketh away the sins of the world," or beareth away the sins of the world, and thus the Jews understood perfectly that Jesus was their Saviour who took Why talk about the away their sins. Christ of Bethlehem without recognizing this fact, viz: His sacrifice?

The ground on which the building stands is a very beautiful corner lot 100' x 200' n size. The building from front to back extends 80' with 54' breadth. In addition to the spacfous living room on the first floor, there is a dining room, 20' x 24'; front room, 20' x 24' and the kitchen, 18' x 24', with a nice hall. The upstries affords four lame rooms approximately 20% square, with a nice hall and one small apartment; The floor space will make convenence for two nice class rooms, library, and assembly hall with housing accommodations for male students on the second floor. Out-buildings consist of a servance contage and a large double garage building which is 20' x 20'. The heating system is what is known as 'hot air' system.

The picture is an interior view of the x 52' vh ch will read ly make accommedations for a nice assembly hall.

This property, a stude building, was recently purchased for \$10,000 on a callibration and the deed, guarantee of title, ar list forth are filed in the safegin the college office. It will be necessary to spend

some extra money on repars, improvement, and arrangement for use by the college, but with an expenditure of possibly \$2,000 we will have sufficient housing facilities to make possible an enrollment of fifty to seventy-f ve students.

We feel certain that our people as a whole are proud of the progress made thus fir, and are looking with great anticipation into the future in the development of this institution. And, it seems that the progress made thus far, with the prospects that le before us, should serve as a sufficient challenge to our people,

in the several states associated with the national cause, to hasten the raising of their respective quotas of the \$100,000 needed for the expansion of the callege. We shall be looking with fond expectation for the incoming of your checks, money orders, annual endowment check bools, and cash as an expression of your gratitude for the past blessings, the present program, and the prospective achievements.


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



A LETTER FROM MISS BARNARD

Dear Friends.

It has been delightful to receive all the letters from the different ones who have wished to assure me of their thoughts and of their prayer support. If you have been looking for an answer and have been leappointed, please forgive me. When you can send new missionaries out to help. I can hope to have the pleasure of writing personal letters and keeping you in more intimate touch. Until then, however, we shall all have to be content with a pub-

1 c letter. But I hope you will continue to write mc.

In my last letter I think I wrote of my intention to re-open work with the Kota Tribe. A few weeks also we made our first evangel stic visit to them, and found their hearts open and over-joyed at our returning to them. For several years they had no school in their village, and they were much concerned about this. Last week we met vith the leaders of the village and arranged to open a school on October 10. Their small builling is in a dilapidated condition, but they offered to replace the roof (which was off) and put it in good

repairs against the Monsoon which is now at hand. We had hoped to find the young Kota who had taught the school in the past, and use him again, but he is away on other work and not available. The only other possibility is a boy who is very young and entirely untrained. The leaders of the village, not feeling confident of the ability of the youth, aske! if Mr. Mulli might not be permitted to come for a few months and conduct the school and train the Kota lad. Th's was asking a hard thing of Mr. Mulli, for the Kota village is no paradise. To live there would be out of the question, and it is a long, hard walk for an old min to make to and fro daily. Remaining there during school liburs for five days a week is sacrifice enough. I wouldn't think of asking Mulli to do it. However, as we talked, Mr. Mul'i bowed his head for a moment, and when he lifted it again his eyes were moist, and he sa'd, "I'll do it, Ammu!" I felt sure he had received the call from above, and so we made the arrangement immediately. The Kotas' faces were radiant as he tolt them he would come and conduct their school until the Lord worked out some other plan. We earnest'y ask prayer for Mr. Mulli as he undertakes this very diff'eult task, a task which few would stoop to do. (This letter has been interrupted and considerably delayed, arl! now I can tell you that the school has actually been in session a week. We opened it with a gathering of the villagers and a Gospel message. A young man in service from Californ'a was with us and delighted the Kotas by speaking a few words to them by interpretation. Fifteen chillren are thus far enrolled. From every aspect, the outlook of the Kota work at present is most encouraging.)

One interesting observation among these Kotas is the scarcity of children, a noval situation in India. There are in the vhole vhage only about twenty children of school age. A high rate of infant mertality accounts for this to some extent, but I am of the opinion that the birth rate has noticeably decreased also. This I can confirm only after observation. One thing is sure, that there are fewer children among them now than at

any other t'me since I have known the Tribe. This is an appalling fact, and points to the gradual dying out of the Tribe. Pray the more carnestly, therefore, for the effectiveness of the Gozpel message among them in these days of opportunity.

Our Kotagiri school proceeds with blessing. Although we have prayed earnestly for a qualified teacher with spiritual vision we have been disappointed to some extent. Meanwhile, however, the Lord has given us a lovely young woman with adequate experience an! ability. Kumala Kanaka, s'ster-in-law to Mrs. Mary Kanaka who worked so nobly with us before she received her grand promotion to be with Christ, is able to turn her hand to many things and is proving a blessing indeed to us. Pray for Kumala as she serves the Lord here with us.

Our Kotagiri boys are arranging a football match with the Kota boys. This is a bit amusing. Their enthusiasm is unbounded, and to hear the discussions about this impending match would remind you of items in the Sports Section of the New York Times. These boys, like those of any other color, require physical act vity, and if we do not direct them towards suitable entertainment, they, like all others, will naturally find it elsewhere am sure the Lord requires us to meet this need. All the young men who have gone out from us and standing true to the Lord are boys belonging to our Scout movement of former years. We therefore feel this phase of our work a very fruitful one.

Lest week we had the privilege of a visit from another one of our soldiers who was in our school a few years past. He has confessed Christ openly and been baptized since he has been in the Army.

Salome is our new Biblewoman. She began work with us the middle of September and is proving herself a gem, knowing the Lord in a real way for herself and then having a clift for imparting the message simply and attractively. Already I have noticed a quickening of pace in the work in several particulars, due partly to her services. We have a weekly schedule visitation, taking us into every

community in this caste. We meet in someone's house, inviting all in that section to attend, and teach a regular course of study. It has been a wonderful experience to sit with these women and discuss the mer'ts and claims of Christ and the Gospel. The sweet story is gripping their hearts. Proy for us and for them.

In our evancelistic work we have discovered a community of people who have migrated from a native state south of us. They are untouched by the Gospel but seem eager to hear. Some of them speak and understand Tamil and can Isten to us. while others know only their own language. There must be about seventy-five of these people in one of our villages. Again I miss our valuable worker Mary Kanaka, for she was fluent in this tongue (Ma'ayalam) and could have met this need admirably. We are trusting the Lord will put us in touch with some one speaking Malaya'am and able to do a better part by these people than we can do with language limitations.

The zenana work for caste women in the Lazaar area has only been begun in a small way. As we enlarge our staff, our work also expands, so that we are still "pressed down beyond measure" and unable to meet the necd. Another missionary or two from home would relieve the situation greatly.

A few weeks ago I was guest speaker at the Kotagiri Badaga Methodist Church on the occasion of their annual Harvest Fest val, the largest affair of the year for them. At the urgent request of the pastor, with much fear and trembling I accepted the invitation-fearful because of my imperfect command of the language But I am glad I did, because the Lord helped me wonderfully and gave tokens that He had used the effort. Of course it was polite for them to tell me I did well and that they had received blessing, but later the pastor informed me that his people had urged him to invite me aga'n. This was an encouragement not only in the matter of language, but it also indicates that this church not hitherto noted for spiritura like, is reaching out for deeper things. As you pray, intercede for them and for the India Church for a quickening of life and a burden for evangel'zing India.

I could not give a fair picture of any particular field in In lia without commenting upon the precauious situation in all India. All are aware of the pending Home Rule. It is definitely anticipated that entrance of missionaries into all parts of India will be more and more difficult when Home Rule is spanted. This statement should be read and reread, with greater emphasis each time Then, perhaps, we may realize something of the urgency of praying the Lord of the Harvest "that He may thrust forth laborers into the harvest field" at once.

A ong with the foregoing, I must also state that at the present time missionaries are rapilly returning from the United States to India and new missionaries also are entering the country. Independent missionaries as well as those representing Boards of lesser significance than ours are getting out. I emph size this in case any at home are thinking it is not possible to send out new missionaries now. Others are leaving the States and entering India; our missionaries can also. Persistence and perseverance will do it.

With this note go my loving rrectines to ill the dear friends in every State and my very special appreciation for all the letters and gifts received.

A LETTER FROM THE DODDS

Greet nes from Cuba:

At last our lifelong dream has materialized and we find ourselves on the Mission field in Cuba. Having been here only two verks are can, of course, only give information from first impression but let me state in the outset that this first impression is indeed a very favorable one. If Cuba lives up to this first impression, we are going to like it very much.

Mrs. Dodd and I left the states on Thursday Cotober 25, at 2:30 P. M. for Havana, we came by Pan American plane

from Miami, Florida, where we had been conveyed by automobile through the kindness of our good friends of Nashville, Tennesse, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Simpson. Our going had been preceded by two splendil farewell parties. The first one was given at our home church, in Flat River. Missouri and was sponsored by the new pastor and wife, Rev. and Mrs. Me!vin B'ngham. As a parting present, the church gave us a gift of \$250.00. The other party was given by the Dorcas Class of East Nashville Church, Mrs. Dodd and I are members of the East Nashville Church, having been pastor there for some 20 months pr'or to our going to the Mission field.

Our trip over was very lovely. The air was smooth so the riding was comfortable. As the huge plane cleft its way through the skies, and as the waters of the sea slipped by under us, we could not help but exult in the fact that we were on a miss on for the Lord. The pangs of parting from love lones were not even present because we had committed them to the Lord. Ahead of us was the land of opportunity in the Lord's service. It was our "Canaan", our 'Prom'sed Land." And with the realization that we were go ng under the leadership of the Lord and in accordance with H's will, nothing else really mattered. Miles rolled by quickly (and it was no wonder) because at one point in the journey our stewardess informed us that we were flying at 10,000 feet altitude at a speed of about 175 miles per hour. We made the trip to Havana in exactly 92 minutes from the time we left Miami.

One who has not had the experience of sighting a new land from the air for the first time cannot know what it does to one. We literally leaped with joy at the first sight of Cuba. While we were yet about 20 minutes out someone shouted, "There's Cuba." We both stretched our necks for a glimpse and sure enough there lay the island in the distance, still nothing more than a blur against the horizm. However, as we drew nearer, the land gradually took shape and we could make out the vast hulk of the island's outline.

In less time than one could think, we had swooped in over the island and were preparing to land. To our right as we came into the airport was the harbor at Havana with the beautiful Morro Castle. Under us stretched the city of Havana, snuggled amongst numerous small hillocks. Mountains loomed up to the west, and the numerous royal palm trees everywhere testified mutely that we had at last come to "The Pearl of the Antilles."

The first sight to welcome us as we landed was three happy smil ng faces. Yes, you guessed two of them; our own Bro. and Sister Willey. Never have two people looked so good to us as they did. The other was the superintendent of our work in Matanzas province, Bro. Herbert Sanchez. We had time only to wave to them and then were hustled off into the customs house where we awaited our turn to go through Customs. However, upon entering the examining room in the Customs division obout fifteen minutes later, we found all three of our friends waiting there for us and what a glad time we had. We were very fortunate in get. ting through Customs and were soon on our way. We first went into the city of Hayana and had a good American meai. From there we boarded the bus for P nar Del Rio, where we arrived about 11 o' clock P. M. We were certainly glal to relax and get some rest for we had gone through a most strenuous day.

Up early the next morning, we caught another bus and came on out to where the Willey's live. It is a beautiful place just at the edge of town and here we are making our headquarters until our own house is set in order. We got our first idea of Cuba on this trip, as we came through the very heart of town. Pinar Del Rio is a fair sized city, recking with Cuban people, Cuban sounds, Cuban smells and Cuban sights. It all seemed so strange that we were thoroughly fascinated with it. On every hand were new experiences and realizing as we did that we were indeed in a land of need, we breathed a prayer to God to prepare us to be of the greatest possible help to the people. The very air tanged with heathenism. The customs are some 100 years behind t'mes.

The mode of travel is primarily by horse and cart or bullock and cart. The people are slow and bordering on indolency. No one has any sense of the value of time. As a result, hours and hours of precions time are wasted. Catholic temples dotted the area and one could see that great numbers of the people wore crucifixes or prayer beads. In short the first impression was one of a desperate need on the part of the Cuban people for something that they didn't have—the true religion of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Our first contact with the Cuban Christ ians came when we attended a service just outside the town of P nar Del Rio at a place known as "La Tirita" (The Terrace) There was a nice group of young people out for this service. This place offers a promising fiel) of endeavor. As yet we do not have a building here for worship but the people want one desperately. The following Sunday night we attended services at our church in P nar Del Rio. It was here that I had my first

experience at preaching through an interpreter. We had a precious service and much interest was manifested. The following week we were with Sister Yeley and her people at Rio Seco. Here we had an overflow crowd and again I preached through an interpreter, Miss Yeley serving as my mouthpiece. This was a beautiful service. Miss Yeley has a most promising group of young men here; young men with talent. Pray for the work in Rio Seco.

Perhaps our crowning experience thus far was our first trip to the school. Upon arriving on the grounds one could sense the presence of the Lord. As we became acquainted with the students and teachers we could well understand this. They are a consecrated group of people, anxious to serve the Lord. We had soon made friends with everyone and even though we could not converse with them, we had splendid fellowship.
