Is the Altar Scriptural

In this day of modernistic advancement and achievements, there are varied notions and ileas concerning the whole Bible. These ideas are sometimes dangerous to the advancement of our Lord's Kingdom.

There is a belief, which is being widely circulated todoy, that God will not hear the prayers of an unsaved person. Consequently, the altar, or "mourners bench," has been branded as unscriptural and of no value.

Those who hold this view define repentance as of knowledge of sin and a turning from sin. But repentance means more than that, in my opinion. I believe that repentance includes:

- 1. Knowledge of sin. Since the is a-greed upon by most everyone no need for argument is visible.
- 2. Sorrow for Sin. 'For godly so row worketh repentance to salvation." 2 Cor. 7:10. Sorrow such as this is not sorrow for one's self, but is a sorrow of the heart in realizing one is an oftender of Gol and has transpreted. His lays.
- 3. Confess on of sins to Cod and not to man. "He that covereth his sins shall not proper; but whose confesteth and for-saketh them shall have mercy." Prov. 28: 13. "For whoseever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved." Rom. 10:13.
- 4. Turning from sin. "Therefore also now, saith the Lord, turn we even to me with all your heart, and with fasting, and with weeping, and with mourning." Joel 2.12. "To open treir eyes, and to turn them from darkness to light..." Acts 26:18.

Of course, it is difficult to separate these steps of repentance, because repentance takes place in the heart. True repentance, however, will include the steps mentioned. The heart of the penitent is then ready to accept Christ and be justified, as the publican who prayed. "God be merciful to me a sinner," was justified—by faith. The Hebrew word for repentance carries with it a meaning of weeping and mourning. This must be the attitude of the heart, for it is the heart that needs to be cleansed.

How, then, can anyone mock at a church which has retained the altar? Yet it is being done. Some say that the "mourners bench" is an addition to God's plan of saving men and women. Let us look into this a little farther.

When John the Baptist was baptizing, he told the people to repent. He did his peaching either before or after he baptized. The logical conclusion is that he baptized those who heard him preach repentance. Surely no one would have been baptized without knowing what John preached. He demanded that people repent and many "were baptized of him in Jordon, confessing their sins." Matt. 3:6. John's baptism was the baptism of repentance. Whom did he baptize? Those who confessed their sins.

"And behold, there came a leper and worshipped him, saying, Lord if thou wilt, thou canst maake me clean. And Jesus put forth his hand, and touched him, saying, I will; be thou clean. And immediately his leprosy was cleansed." Matt. 8: 2-3. The meaning of worship to the Jew was to bow down before what was being worshiped. This leper seems to have knelt before Christ and asked to be cleans.

ed. Does that compare favorably with the altar? I think so.

The Greek woman, Mark 8:25-31, came and asked Christ to cast forth a devil from her daughter. She besought him says the Bible. Her daughter was made whole,

Most of the miracles which Jesus performed upon the sick, and lame were done so after He was asked. These people were seeking the Lord while he could be found. There are many instances in the Bible of people asking and then receiving.

Turn with me to Jonah 3:7, "And he caused it to be proclaimed and published through Nineveh by the decree of the king and his nobles, saying, let neither man nor beast, herd nor flock, taste anything; let them not feed nor drink water; but let man and beast be covered with sack cloth, and cry mightily unto God: yea, let them turn every one from his evil way, and from the violence that is in their hands." Here is a Biblical example of repentance. God did not destroy Nineveh, either, because He heard the prayers of those wicked people.

"But if all prophesy, and there come in one that believeth not, or one unlearned. He is convinced of all, he is judged of all: and thus are the the secrets of his heart made manifest; and so falling down on his face he will worship God, and report that God is in you of a truth." 1 Cor. 14: 24-25. Here an unbeliever is mentioned as being convicted of sin (secrets of his heart made manifest), and falling on his face and worshipping God. It looks like Paul believed in an altar.

Can a person be saved without kneeling at an altar and weeping and moaning? I believe he can, because repentance and faith takes place in the heart. One can be saved anywhere at any time if one meets the conditions. When a man is ready to be saved, God is ready to save him.

I sincerely believe that an altar where people may come and repent and accept Christ should be left in the Churches. They have proved their worth and are certainly scriptural.

Find a church that is modernistic and is cold and formal where the divinity of Christ is doubted, and that church will not have an altar where penitent men, women, boys, and girls may come and seek the Lord.

Free Will Baptists, this is a challenge to us. Today, people want to go to churches where the Lord may be found. Shall we keep the altar and be called a "peculiar people," or shall we take the road others have taken and leave the scriptural altar out of our churches? I think the altar is one of the best places there is for people to come and be saved. Whether in the city or the country, if people will humble themselves, the Lord will lift them up.

Is the altar scriptural? I believe it is. Why, then, have so many left the altar out of the churches? Does it mean that Satan has gained a strong place in the sanctuary. The devil wants people to believe that God will not hear sinners. That is his way of keeping them under bondage.

Again I say this is a challenge to Free Will Baptists to keep the altar and present a Christ, no longer on the cross, but in heaven where He acts as the one Mediator between God and man. He is the only hope for this war-torn sinful world. Shall we do it?

Gods plan of Redemption



The law of Spirit life Rom. 8:13", For if ye live after the flesh, ye shall die; but if ye through the spirit, do mortify the deeds of the body, ye shall live." Now this is a very plain statement, who is Paul writing to? v. 1, those that are not under condemnation, who are walking after the

spirit. Would you affirm that Paul was not warning Christians against spiritual death? You surely know that all must die a physical death, and too, Paul was not writing to dead folks. Dead in sin, it is being preached that the commission given the apostles Mark 16-16 affirms the Christ-

ians eternal salvation. However I want you to notice the word (believeth) it denotes continuing in belief. Sure, if one continues in the faith he will be eternally saved. The term (believeth) goes beyond the term (believe.) I once believed things that I do not now believe. It has been said and is at least true in part, that folks practice what they believe. If you are sick and you believe in medical aid, you get a physician, and take his treatment, now according to definitions faith is that you believe, and if you have faith in God, you practict what God tells you to practice. And John wrote by the instruction of the Lord, Rev. 22:14, "Blessed are they that do His commandments, that they may have right to the tree of life, and may enter in through the gates into the city." So you see the premises is to the faithful only. John 5:24, is another text that is used to try to make a backslider feel safe, the same verb is used in that statement and we admit that the Christian who practices faith will not come into condemnation, but I want you to notice that Paul wrote by the inspiration of the Spirit of God. Rom. 14:23, "Whatsoever is not of Faith is sin." Sin to some? To the one that practices Again it is being taught it to be sure. that there is no power in Heaven or earth that can seperate us from God. Now if such teachers would stay with the Bible it would not be so rediculous, for it is a fact that God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish. but have everlasting life. John 3:16. You surely would not affirm that all the world will be saved, the scripture to which they refer is Rom. 8:38-39, but honestly I want you to study v. 39, "Nor height nor depth, nor any other creature," are you not a creature? Can you not see the word (other) excludes you in the statement, you are the only one that can seperate you from the love of God. Let us study the truth as it is revealed in the book of James 1:13 "Let no man say when he is tempted. I am tempted of God: for God cannot be tempted with evil, neither tempteth he any man:" now you know, if you know anything, that when it enters your mind to commit sin, that is temptation and God is not responsible for that temptation, it came from satan and if you

carry out the thought and commit the sin then you are responsible for the sin. Notice v. 14 "But every man is tempted, when he is drawn away of his own lust, and enticed:" this proves beyond any doubt, that any Christian can seperate themselves from God. Some may question our logic on the word drinketh and want to know what we do with the term drinketh. John 4:13, "Jesus answered and said unto her, whosoever drinketh of this water shall thirst again:" you may say if the word drinketh means continuing to drink, then if we had all the water that we could drink in this life would we get thirsty? Yes, you remember the story of the rich man, there is no doubt but what he had all the literal water that he could drink in this world, but you must remember he was very thirsty in the world to come. Mark 16:24. One silly question that we have been asked is after one is born of the Spirit, can they be unborn? Auswer, no but they can die. How does a child get out of his father's family? They are not unborn, they die. The child of God is born of the Spirit then he is a member of God's family, his name is written in the Lamb's Book of Life in Heaven, if he does not sin unto death, he will live forever. But John wrote 1 John 5:16 "If a man see his brother sin a sin, which is not unto death, he shall ask, and he shall give him life, for them that sin not unto death, there is a sin unto death; I do not say that you shall pray for it." Anyone ought to know that if a Christian can commit an unpardonable sin in this life, he will not be lost, he is already lost death again in sin. Jude said twice dead, plucked up by the roots. see Jude v. 12. The Apostle Peter calls them cursed children, which have forsaken the right way. 2 Peter 2:14-15. Personally I can see the doctrine of once in Grace always in Grace in only one light, and the Apostle Peter gives the light on the teacher and the pupil. v. 19-20 "While they promise them liberty, they themselves are the servants of corruption; for of whom a man is overcome, of the same is he brought into bondage, for if after they have escaped the polutions of the world through the knowledge of the Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, they are again entangled therein and overcome. The latter end is worse with them than the beginning." Reader I want you to notice that the backslider is entangled in sin but the apostate is overcome, let us study v. 21 "For it had been better for them not to have known the way of righteousness, than after they have known it, to turn from the holy commandment delivered unto them. v. 22, But it is happened unto them according to the true proverb, the dog has turned to his own vomit again, and the sow that washed to her wallowing in the mire." Apostacy is a Bible doctrine from beginning to end, the truth (if you receive it) shall make you free.

The time for a school to grow is when it is young. This analogy is exhibited in all forms of life, both plant and animal. The time for a Christian to grow is when he is young; the time for a preacher to grow is when he is young; and the time for a church to grow is when it is young. Age is averse to being pushed, it is more static than dynamic.

The Free Will Baptist Denomination is among the oldest Christian organizations of the United States, and its age and traditions are manifestly hindering influences all to frequenly. But the National Association is an infant organization, potent and aggressive. We are in the habit of thinking of the National Association as a general organization composed of subordinate constituent bodies within the several states, and it is desirable that this trend of thought constantly deepen The real life and force, and expand. however, of the National Association abounds in the devotion of an ever increasing number of Christian men and women who appreciate those larger achievements that are impossible without a consolidation of sacrificial service and money.

Life grows after the inside-outside sequence. The progress which we have made as a people in recent years reveals this order. God has laid His hands upon individuals and has directed them in paths He directed Miss Barnard to of service. India; the Willeys, the Dodds, Miss Yeley and Miss Van Syoe to Cuba. He has made His will known to others who are to follew in missionary service. He has stirred the hearts and inclined the wills of thou-Free Will Baptist churches sands in throughout the country. The cry "Awake O Free Will Baptists" is being heard from hundreds of pulpits, Sunday school rooms, auxiliary and league assemblies. A revival of faith in the cohesive ability of Free Will Baptists is in evidence.

picture herewith is an offering which exclaims the love and foresight of many Free Will Baptists. Out of a firm faith in the revealed Word of God as the only message of salvation, they have spoken by a deed that cannot be gain said .All money is real money in God's hands, and every Free Will Baptist of sincere convictions will find in this offering a challenge. Look at these checks! You might even like to read the names of their makers. The bag altually contains \$1000, the entire amount of which was given by Free Will Baptists of South Carolina. Observe the Annual Endowment check pad, which represents the method by which approximately half of the funds of the Bible College are realized. We give thanks to God for our Sisters in the Lord, Mrs. Sophia Hardee and Mrs. R. W. Smith; for our brethren, Levi Hill, B. F. Payne, and G. C. King; for the Cumberland Association of Tennessee; and for the Free Will Baptist Church of Davis, North Carolina. Our people in the great state of South Carolina have challenged Free Will Baptists in all the states. They resolved to raise the 1945 quota for the expansion of the college, and they did it! Is it too much to say, "Others can do as welll?

The Bible college does not maintain a field force, only a business manager-treasurer. It is expensive to operate collecting organizations; therefore, since we really mean business, may we urge that every minister of the denomination, every Sunday school, every auxiliary, and every league, together with all quarterly meetings and union meetings respond to the needs of the Bible College with offerings and individual gifts as freely as the Lord may lead.

We have purchased an additional building of approximately the same size of the administration building, and this will

greatly facilitate the efficiency of the college work; but our list of applicants for admission at the opening of the spring semester already predicts a congestion problem, not as much as in the past but nevertheless sufficient to result in loss to many of our students.

A new wall picture (28" x 14") of the Pible College, including the building recently purchased, is now available and will be sent free of charge to those who desire to post them in their churches.

More than half of our student group in the spring will consist of men and their wives. These men expect to become pastors of our churches, and their wives leaders and teachers in various phases of the work. The housing situation in Nashville is a major problem, and rental property rarely ever obtainable. Our married students are challenging the denomination to provide apartments in which they may live while pursuing courses of training in the Bible college. Other institutions have recognized the deserts of married students and have spent tremendous sums money as a means of providing living facilities for them. Some of our best material is to be found among this classs of students. Shall we give them a chance to prepare to serve the cause that so greatly needs their service? Yes, we need more property; we must expand; the time to grow is now.

The above figures reveal the fact that two of the states; namely North Carolina and South Carolina are well over the top. It should be remembered that the 1946 quota calls for the raising of 30% of the total allotted to each state; hence these two states will have a nice balance at the close of 1945 to apply on the 1946 quota. We are sure, however, that these states will not confine themselves to the raising of the amounts allotted for each year. South Carolina is driving to finish up the entire quota for the next three years during 1946. The two Carolinas, Missouri, Georgia, Texas, and some of the other states have definite plans for raising the quotas alloted to them. Surely the allotments are easily within reach of every state, we have from now through Dec. 21, 1945, to finish the 20% which should be raised this year. Come on, preachers. and lay the matter fairly before your people and let us all go over the top as have North Carolina and South Carolina.

How many times hearts are blessed and hopes revived when people see through our church papers, records and reports of souls being saved, people coming to Christ, the Cross, and the Church.

Records and reports have always been stressed by our Un'ted States' Government. It is a source of strength to know what is going on all over the states. If we, as a lenomination, knew all the good things being done by others of our denomination, we would be greatly encouraged. We would know how many are ready to meet their Lord. We are warned "be ye also ready," but do we have the record made that will prove we are really. To be ready for a visitor and to joyfully look for or expect the visitor are two different things. We are not only to prepare to meet our God in the world to comebut prepare and meet Him here day by day, "Looking for and hasting unto the coming of the day of the Lorl." "Looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ." It is poss'ble to be worked up over the coming of the Lord without being stirred about the Lord who is coming. One is an event, the other is a Person, and it is the Person who makes the event. Looking for something to happen is one thing; looking for someone to come is another. Yes, have a good program. Keep accurate records and reports but these are dry as dust unless there is joyful expectancy of the person who makes the program. That would be like the br'de more interested in the trousseau and the wedding trip than in the groom himself. We are not to be just agents to an event but looking for some Person to come on the train when the train does arrive. Not only does the second coming of Jesus Christ mean preparation (recorls and reports) and expectation but also purification. "And every man that hath this hope in Him purificth himself, even as He is pure." This paing true then it calls for separation from everything that would hinder our records and reports that He will judge in that day.

Every work will be judged, so—"what manner of persons ought ye to be in all holy conversation and golliness." Godliness or God-like-ness is to keep a record. You might not have an angel to keep the records, but surely the ministers are responsible for see ng that records are made and reports given on time.

F.nally. we have a duty to the outside world. We must evangelize. Not only to keep records and reports of activitiesbut work toward a greater report. If we are not gathering souls with Him, we scatter abroad. It is time for us to awake out of sleep, for now is our salvation nearer than when we believed. It isn't enough to sit on the shore and discuss how many we have caught-how much to Christian Education, Foreign Mission, etc., we have given-not even discussing the signs of the times, when we ought to be driven by the signs of the times to launch out into the deep and let down our nets for a draught. I know it isn't pleasant to keep records, but we are not called to do the casy or the pleasant thing but the essential. So do not hang a sign over your heo'!-- "Please do not disturb"-but be disturbed as to how our records and reports are made. God help us not only to appear zealous for the work-but to live and do our religion by living prepared, and expectant, purifica and separated lives. Keeping on working, witnessing, and winning with Christ, if so I think a great revival will spread.



A LETTER FROM THE DODDS

Since I am aware of the interest many of our people have in the Cuban School of Miss'ons, I am going to devote this month's article entirely to the school, an! its surroundings. Let me state in the very outset that Free Will Baptists have something on the island of Cuba in this school of which to be justly proud. Nor do we need to be ashamed of our facilities with which we are carrying on this educational program. While we, perhaps, could not carry on in the states with what we have here, we get along magnificently with it on the island and already we are enjoying returns from the investments in training the Cuban young men and women for the carrying of the Gospel to their own people. Please bear in mind all the while that the standards in Cuba so far as living and housing are concerned, are drastically lower than those in the home land. To be sure, we are separated by only a few miles but if you could be here for one day and get a slight glimpse of the dire poverty that abounds among the poorer people you could read ly understand what we mean when we say that such things as higher living standards are out of the question for the average Cuban. Cuba's society recognizes only two classes-the rich and the poor. The rich are very rich and the poor are very poor.

"Los Cedros de Lebanos" or The Cedars

of Lebanon (the name of the Seminary in Cuba) is located in a region known as the Cangre. The Cangre is in the midst of the tobacco growing section and also produces quite a bit of fruit such as oranges and guava. The school is fifteen minutes by bus from the city of Pinar Del Rio which is used as the buying center for supplies of all kinls. It is approached by a drive through an orange grove and as the road winds around up to the campus one gets a bird's eye view of the entire countryside. Off to the northeast the mountains loom up forming a beautiful purplish haze against the skyline. The majestic royal palm can be seen everywhere and seems to serve as a border for vast stretches of scenery along the way. To the southwest the land rolls away in gentle reaches that tang of greenness and ver'lure. Banana plantains line the fence rows and arroyos and some of them are just beginning to put out the small stalks of fruit. The fence posts can be seen budding and growing everywhere because they are made from a wood that continues to grow when severed from the main trunk of the tree. These serve as a constant source of fence posts. In the fields men and oxen move slowly to and fro, tilling the land as did those of olden times. The shrill staccato of the Cuban reaches ones ears as he shouts at the clumsy brutes which serve him so faithfully, yet so slowly. Off to our right as we near the school sets a small Cuban hut. This is the home of Cecelia, a faithful Christian who has been converted a short while. He celebrated his birth lay only last week and Mrs. Dold, Mr. and Mrs. W lley and I were his spec al guests. They served the favor te Cuban dish, "arroz con pollo" or Rice with chicken. From this home we can see the thaten roofs of the Seminary. All the people in the neighborhood refer to the school as "our seminario" and any of them would go their limit for it. Entering the school grounds we make our way through the orange grove and at last come to the main building.

On the campus are located five main buildings, all thatch covered. This thatch (let me explain) is made from the long fronds of the royal palm and serves as roofing material abundantly in Cuba. The larger building directly in front of us in the girl's dormitory and dining room. At the present time the kitchen is housed in a small annex to this main building but a new one is un'ler construction and will soon be completed. There is also a classroom in this building. To our right is the Place of worship, commonly referred to by the Cubans as "The Temple." It is a small chapel with a concrete floor. The sides are walled up about three fourths of the way to the top. Immediately behind the Chapel is the home of the principal of the school, Rev. Josue.

Down to the left of the main building is a small two-room house, painted with white wash and trimmed in celestial blue. This is our home, and humble though it may be, it is veritable heaven to us becaus? We are happy in it. The boy's dormitory is located some distance from the other buildings but is typically Cuban.

This year there are twenty two students enrolled in the seminary. Of this group there are 11 young men and an equal number of young women. The course of study requires five years to complete and since the school has only been in operation three years there are three groups The newest group is known as the prep class. They are groomed for seminary study which will be the second year of the'r stay in school. The second year group is of course farther advanced and more is expected of them. The third year group is the senior group at this time and like any other senior group in any other school they are proud of the fact that they are seniors. The school spirit among the students is unexcelled and the fellowship which exists is wonderful. It would serve as a worthy example for any group to follow. None of these boys and girls have been converted very long and their zeal and knowledge makes one wonder and marvel at what the grace of Gol can do. Not only are they a consecrated group, they are also a willing and studious group and we are expecting great things of them. Among the number are those who have come from the most humble homes. One young lady became despaired of Eving and tried to take her own life just a short time before she was converted. One day she heard the Gospel, was converted and soon thereafter came to school. Today she is one of our most promising students.

The day for the students at the seminary begins at 6:30 A. M., which is arising time. The morning chores are completed and Cuban coffee is served at 6:45. From 6:45 until 7:15 is levotional time, after which breakfast is served. The morning chapel service is conducted at 8:00 o'clock and is very much like a similar service in our own college. Classes begin at 8:30 and continue until 11:30 when they are suspended for noon and s'esta time. There is one more class in the afternoon and at 2:30 all classes are over for the day. Then begins work time

and everyone takes a han! Each individual has a particular task assigned and he knows exactly what to do. The girls take care of the cleaning and cooking while the boys take care of the outside work. No one dares begin work without first praying so a brief prayer meeting is conducted before work begins. Such singing as you have never heard is lone by the students as they go about their work and to hear them you would think they were not even thinking of work. At 5.30 the "quit work" bell rings, at 6:00 P. M. supper is served and immediately thereafter study hours begin, lasting until 9:30. Lights out bell sounds at 10:00 P. M. Thus goes the typical day at the seminary "Los Cedros le Lebanos."
