



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REPORT OF TEXAS HOME MISSIONARY

Our mission work is growing, the Lord is blessing, and we give Him the praise for it all. Most of our work is holding revivals. We have been in four meetings since March 15, and have a two month schedule until in Sept. With our half time church, we keep pretty busy. 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
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
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
