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

#### An Important Halt

"The priests that bear the ark shall stand still in Jordan'' (v. 8). line between the land of Canaan and the land of the Amorites, which land the children of Israel conquered and gave to the tribes of Gad and Reuben and the half tribe of Manasseh. The exact middle of the river Jordan would be the line of separation between the two lands; and there, in the middle of the river Jordan, is where the priests who carried the ark halted and stood still until all the people passed clean over to enter their inheritance.

The ark, beging a symbol of God's presence and a sign of His covenant, when halted in the midst of Jordan, was the Lord's guarantee to His people, that all their hindrances and difficulties, in taking possession of their inheritance, would be rolled back before them, if they kept faith with Him (v. 13). Yes, the children of Israel all crossed over Jordan, from the wildreness of their experience into their own milk and honey land; because the ark of the covenant waited on the border to enable them to cross

The ark of the covenant was an all-inclusive type of Christ, who is our "Ark of the Covenant". Many years after the children of Israel crossed the Jordan, Jesus stood near the spot where they crossed.
