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THE MANTLE OF TURIN

YOU may be astonished to learn that there exists in the world today a garment, which according to the consensus of best scientific opinion, contains a print of the body of Christ.

Scripture Text—John 20:1-10. "The first day of the week cometh Mary Magdalene early, when it was yet dark, unto the sepulchre, neth, and cometh to Simon Peter. Jesus loved, and saith unto them, of Palestine. They have taken away the Lord out of the sepulchre, and we know not where they have laid him. Peter therefore went forth, and that other disciple, and came to the sepulchre. So they ran both together: and the other disciple did outrun Peter, and came first to the sepulchre. And he stooping linen clothes lying; yet went he not in. Then cometeh Simon Peter following him and went into the sepulchre, and seeth the linen clothes lie, and the napkin, that was about his had, not lying with the linen clothes, but wrapped together in a place by itself. Then went in also that other disciple, which came first to the sepulchre, and he saw, and believed. For as yet they knew not the scripture, that he must rise again from the dead. Then the disciples went again unto their own home.

This passage from the Book of John tells how John and Peter came to the tomb of Jesus, stooped down and looked in, and saw lying there on the transversal of the tomb, a bundle of cloth wound around and tied up with tape. It is that artifact that we shall discuss..

Joseph of Arimathea requested Pilate to be allowed to take the body of his nephew from the Cross, and on the way back to Golgotha, he bought the syndona, known as an Egyptian mummy cloth. 
It is easy to see how such an imperishable relic could have been saved. After those who were intimately associated with Jesus had passed away, it could have become the treasured possession of the Church.
