CONSIDER THE LILIES

Matt. 6:28, "... Consider the lilies of the field how they grow; ..."

I think that too often in the study of the Scriptures we may try to master the deep mysteries of God's will and way and overlook the simple teachings of Christ Himself that may well be applied to common people in the building of our spiritual life. We notice just before that Christ spoke these simple words, He had given a lesson on the kingdom law of riches. The English word "thought" as is used in verse 25, when our version was made, expressed the idea of "anxious concern" and so the mere English reader is apt to be perplexed.

"Thought or forethought" for temporal things in the sense of consideration is required alike by Scripture and common sense.

He wants us to learn the lesson of trusting in God and putting first things "first." Verse 33 says, "But seek ye first the kingdom of God and his righteousness and all these things shall be added unto you."

Now let us consider the lilies and how they grow. This statement left in its own transparent clearness and rich simplicity gives an incomparable teaching. If you will carefully read between the lines, you will see that the Saviour calls our attention especially to the *growth* of the lily. Surely we all need to be making a spiritual growth as individuals, as separate churches, and as a denomination. As we notice the growth of the lily, may we be able to see in what sense it resembles the Christian.

IT IS ABSOLUTELY DEPENDENT

It looks wholly to God for everything—no fence for protection, no gardener to till it, no shelter to protect it from the elements; yet, God allows it to grow. This should be a beautiful picture of God's care for a true Christian. We notice the strange methods God used in leading the Israelites, teaching them the lesson of whole dependence, in bringing them from Egypt to Canaan. He did not lead them through cities and towns where they could purchase whatever they wanted to eat and drink, but through a barren wilderness where, as

they depended wholly upon God, they were fed by the hidden manna. David says in Psalm 37:3—Trust in the Lord.

Here is an experience that probably most of us have had at some time. A young minister related an experience as he and his wife were driving hurriedly to reach their appointment on time, when suddenly a tire blew out. The spare tire was soon on and again they were on their way. Then he remarked to his wife, "We'll have to trust the Lord now as we don't have another spare." We take things into our own hands a great many times and fail to look to and trust in God when we have a good spare and all is going well. Is not this the purpose of Christ in calling our attention to the lily that we might serve Him without anxious care and feel our dependence upon Him?

THE LILY RECEIVES ITS SUPPLY DAILY

It has no storehouse in which to lay up future supplies of the elements needed for its growth. We meet people who try to get a supply of grace and power to run a whole year or from one revival to another, but God does not give it to us in that way. "As thy day so shall thy strength be" We need a daily supply of God's grace.

THE LILY GROWS MORE PROFUSELY IN THE VALLEY AND LOW PLACES

The prevailing desire of many of God's servants is to have great external gifts, and they fail to see that God finds men for exalted positions in the valley; that is, in the attitude of prayer fitting themselves for the mountain top experience. We recall that God found a man for the throne of Egypt behind the prison bars, who had been sold by his brethren as a slave. He found a great leader for Israel herding sheep. He found the disciples on the seashore mending their nets. What God wants us to do is to learn to get down on our knees and wrestle in prayer as did Jacob of old.

THE LILY KEEPS CLEAN AMIDST CONTAMINATING ELEMENTS

So does the real sanctified and consecrated Christian. With the evil

around us as it is today, it takes one who has gone through the foregoing experiences to be able to keep clean at all times and in all places. This we cannot do within our strength, but by the divine help of God we can. It can be done only by heeding the words of James 1:27—and to keep himself unspotted from the world.

WHERE ARE YOU?

"Foolish questions that do gender strife." Paul says to avoid such; yet we hear them continually falling from the lips of our preachers. Listening we can only think of Jesus as He said to Peter, "What is that to thee? follow thou me."

Just what is that to thee? Do you have to know where the Devil came from before you can preach the gospel? Do you have to know where Cain found his wife before you can preach the gospel? You know you don't. You just want to impress others with your vast knowledge. Laying traps for your younger brother, scorning him because he does not give you the answer you want to hear. Causing controversy, dissension, railings, and evil surmisings among the brethren. Throwing away your chance to influence sinners and win them for Christ.

Men gather at a loafing place; up comes some quack calling himself a preacher. 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
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GIVING GOD A CHANCE

Matt. 20:6—And about the eleventh hour he went out, and found others standing idle, and saith unto them, Why stand ye here all the day idle?

Before we proceed I would that each one of you would turn to the above chapter and read the first 16 verses.

Would you read the words of our text again and hear them falling from the lips of our Savior: "Why stand ye here all the day idle?" While there is work to be done in the Master's vineyard? There is room for each one of us. We have a responsibility to take care of. The men standing in the market place could be excused for not going to work, the householder had come early in the day and these perhaps were not present at the other appearances, as their answer to the householder's question would indicate ("Because no man hath hired us." V. 7)

Can you say truthfully that the Lord has never called to you and asked you to go into His vineyard someplace to work? You may say God has never called me for a Sunday School teacher, Deacon, Minister, but yet He has called you for the salvation of others. God didn't save you just to keep you from going to hell, but He has a definite place for you. No, all the laborers didn't do the same job. You may say, "I have no talent"; "I have found nothing to do"; "Let somebody else take the responsibility."

Let us remember one of old whom God called for service, but he offered excuses also. Exodus 4:1—"But behold, they will not believe me nor hearken unto my voice: for they will say, The Lord hath not appeared unto thee." Exodus 4:10—"Oh my Lord I am not eloquent neither heretofore, nor since thou has spoken unto thy servant: but I am slow of speech and of a slow tongue."

How could he refuse after the experience at the burning bush, but still we have often had the same kind of experiences with the Spirit of God, and have we refused? Perhaps we can look at our lives and find the same type of objections, but "Thanks be to God" He answered and made all preparations for Moses, and He will do the same for you. Remember, He is the great I AM. Even now in the eleventh hour God wants you in His vineyard. Yes, you have heard the call, "Go ye into the vineyard: and whatsoever is right, that shall ye receive." THE BIBLICAL MEANING OF STEWARDSHIP

As a member of your National Stewardship Commission I have been asked to write an article to our church papers using the above title.

THE GENERAL IDEA OF STEWARDSHIP

The Bible and history teach the church has always believed in stewardship. A consciousness of stewardship responsibility was born with the race. From the first pages of the old Testament we read: "Let us make man in our image, after our likeness; and let them have dominion." This scripture proclaims the source and scope of man's accountability. "Therefore shall a man leave his father and mother, and shall cleave unto his wife" tells us there is a stewardship of family relations.

Cain and Abel stand before an altar presenting fruits of material progress. Cain killed Abel not because he felt no responsibility to God, but because he was desirous of getting ahead of his brother. Cain asked "Am I my brother's keeper?" The Lord answered, "Thy brother's blood crieth unto me from the ground." There is that partnership we have with God and with our fellowman that the Lord has set up for our good and happiness.

DEFINITIONAL MEANING

The *steward* is, in fact, a "partner" with his master. He is also a "servant" and "employee," a "manager," "agent," "superintendent," "director," "trustee"; sometimes a "son," but never a "slave." A steward has an honorable station. He is absolutely trusted by his master—trusted with his property, his plans, his reputation; trusted when his master's back is turned; trusted with his interests, safety, and welfare of his fellow servants; trusted to carry on confidential and diplomatic affairs of high importance.

Not only is the steward to keep intact the things intrusted to him but he is to devise and effect the greatest possible enlargement of his master's interests. To be a steward is never a sacrifice but an honor bestowed upon those worthy to receive it. The individual subscribes his hand to stewardship. Man becomes by his acceptance God's chosen steward.

SOME OLD TESTAMENT CONCEPTIONS OF STEWARDSHIP

"And all the tithe of the land, whether of the seed of the land, or fruit of the tree is Jehovah's: it is holy unto Jehovah" (Lev. 27:30). Which cometh forth from the field year by year" (Deut. 14:32). (Please read in full the following references: Lev. 27:30-34; Deut. 14:22-29; Numbers 18:20-32; Mal. 3:7-12). Many other scriptures you will recall. You are well aware that "the silver is mine, and the gold is mine, saith the Lord of hosts" (Hag. 2:8).

CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP

The word Christian means relating to Christ, belonging to Christ or Christlike. Christ makes stewardship Christian. His life is its chart; His teachings are its compass. His mind is final; the ideals and ideas He advanced are ultimate. We have already considered the word steward. Our conclusion then is that Christian stewardship is "the recognition and fulfillment of personal privilege and responsibility for the administration of the whole of life—personality, time, talent, influence, material substance—everything—in accordance with the spirit and ideals of Christ."

Think carefully of some of the things Jesus had to say concerning stewardship. Matt. 23:23, "Woe unto you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! for you tithe mint and anise and cummin, and have left undone the weightier matters of the law, justice and mercy and faith but these ye ought to have done and not to leave the other undone." Luke 11:42—"But woe unto you Pharisees, for you tithe mint and rue and every herb and pass over justice and the love of God: but these ye ought to have done and not to leave the other undone." Matt. 5:17 reads as follows: "Think not that I am come to destroy the Law and the prophets: I am not come to destroy but to fulfill." Matt. 5:20—"For I say unto you, that except your righteousness exceed the righteousness of the scribes and the Pharisees, ye shall in no case enter into the kingdom of heaven."

Now look at the words of Paul, who

is our great teacher and preacher. Rom. 6:15, "What then? Shall we sin, because we are not under the law, but under grace? God forbid."

In Luke 18:12, the Pharisee was thankful he was not unjust. "I fast twice a week, I give tithes of all that I possess." We can easily see that Jesus was a loyal Jew, a son of a Jewish mother, trained from childhood with diligence to reverence and obey every syllable of the law, that He repeatedly commended those who observed its requirements and declared that not one jot or tittle should pass away from the law until all had been fulfilled.

We know the Bible taught the law of the tithe—and Jesus approved it. Since Jesus is the Way, the Truth and the Life, we must practice Christian Stewardship as taught in the Bible and live under grace, keeping our hearts and minds centered upon Jesus who said, "For where your treasure is there will your heart be also" (Matt. 6:21).

YOUTH CAMP NEWS*Rev. Harvey E. Hill, Chairman*

As the time is drawing near for the fourth session of our Missouri Youth Camp, I feel it time to inform our people over the state of some of our plans and needs for this year's session. First, let me say that we as your Youth Camp Board wish to thank you for making it possible for this great work to continue through your financial support as well as your prayers. Many of our churches and many individuals have contributed regularly toward this great work; but yet there are so many of our churches and people who have not realized the great value of this work to our youth and to our denomination, thus, failing too support it financially and failing to receive the many blessings that have come to those who have done their best. Remember, as I have often told you, that your Youth Camp Board can only do what you make possible for them to do. All that I ask is that you pray, and let God lead you and then visit our session this year. Then I'm sure you will be a staunch supporter of our camp thereafter.

Our needs are numerous but I know God will provide. If you wish to help in some way, then note our following needs for this year's session and help us in whatever way you feel you can. We are building a five-room cottage on the camp grounds at this writing and the cost will be near \$1,000. So you see the need for more financial support. Then, we need about 30 mattresses for the bunks, 5 dipping ladles, 6 dozen drinking glasses, 6 wash pans, 2 saw cutters, 1 food chopper, 1 electric iron, about 20 yards oil cloth, an outside furnace to cook on, material to make cabinets for cottage, siding for our state cabins, screens, and many other things too numerous to mention. If you care to help us by supplying us with some of the above mentioned items, write to Rev. Wm. Reeves at the camp and he will be happy to receive your offerings and materials.

Now just a few words about our program for this year. I was appointed as Camp Supervisor and Rev. Rolla Smith as Principal of School. Recently Brother Smith and I completed the program for this year with subjects for classes as follows: A class in the Gospel of John, one on Person-

al Soul Winning, A Doctrinal Course, near Santa Paula, California. For Mission Course, and a course on the some time the Sunday School and Auxiliaries of the church, such as, church was held in a member's home in Saticoy. Then a small building was rented in Santa Paula, and the church moved in about July 4. On January 15 of this year we moved again. This time to our own building at 903 Ventura St. in the city of Santa Paula.

We are setting up a set of strict rules such as no smoking, attendance at all classes necessary, no courting, and many others which will soon be in print and mailed to our people over the state. All rules must be obeyed or the student will be subject to immediate shipment back home for we must keep our work as God would have us.

The teachers of these various classes will be announced at a later date as well as the evangelist for the night services. In closing, I sincerely hope each of you over the state will get behind us with all that you have and help us make this year's session the best we have had. If you will do your part, I'm sure God will do His. WILL YOU?

YOUNG CHURCH HAS PASTOR

As a result the church was organized. Believe it or not, this church had its beginning in an old dance hall on the Limoneira Ranch

For several months we had no pastor, but we didn't give up. We thought for some time that we had a pastor. He came and preached one time and then for some unknown reason went back. Then Bro. J. J. Hancock was our pastor for a short time and then we found ourselves again a flock without a shepherd. About this time we awakened to the fact that we were getting nothing done fast. So a lot of Kneecology was applied as prayers were sent to God to help us and a few pleas were mailed back to Arkansas to Brother Lewis until he said he would come back and help us.

Brother H. A. Lewis is our pastor now and we are very proud of him. We realize that he made a big sacrifice when he left his work in Arkansas to come out here, and that the people back there needed him too. Yet we feel that if those people realized how much the county needed a man like Brother Lewis to preach the Word of God to them they would be most happy to know that he came out here to help out in the Lord's work. We hope that all of you will pray for us that we may keep spreading the Word of God to the lost. We realize more each day that all the heathen are not in foreign lands.

**STATE SESSION ACCEPTS
 TREATISE COMPROMISE**

"At the 1948 national association the state (Oklahoma) protested revision of the Treatise of Faith and Practices, and after having been out-voted in trying to retain the original treatise, came home and voted not to accept the changes.

"Following a request by the state (Oklahoma) association that the national body send men to discuss a reconciliation, Rev. J. L. Welch and Rev. Henry Melvin, both of Tennessee, met with the state executive board and agreed upon terms of settlement. These were the agreements which were accepted at the special session:

"1. That section 5 on Government of Church, paragraph 2, on receiving of members according to regular methods does not conflict with section 3 on Meetings of Church, paragraph 4 clause 'e', but refers to the voting of raising of hands, taking a negative vote, etc. In other words, the Church must vote on the receiving of members, but according to rules and methods of the local Church.

"2. Pertaining to deacons. The Board believes that there must be some control of the work of the deacon, and that we agree that Section 2 is sufficient.

"3. Chapter 22. That the chapter be titled, "THE JUDGMENT AND FINAL RETRIBUTION," and that it should read as follows: "There will be a better judgment when time and man's probation will close forever. Then all men will be judged according to their works, 'omitting the word 'final' before the word 'judgment.' And that paragraph 2 shall read: 'Final Retribution—Immediately after this judgment the righteous will enter into eternal life and the wicked will go into a state of endless punishment,' omitting the words, 'the final,' preceding the word 'judgment.'

"These agreements will be presented to the national association at the 1950 session, which meets at Richmond, Calif."

Of walking right with God — then have no fear






