

PROVERBS 31

"Favor is deceitful, and beauty is vain: but a woman that feareth the Lord, she shall be praised." Proverb 31:30.

As we study this chapter, we find the praise and properties of a good wife and mother. How valuable she is to the home. Many of us can recall the sweet childhood memories of a Godly, praying mother while there are many who have no such memories. Instead, they remember unwholesome living and influences on the home. Such has produced broken homes, juvenile delinquency, broken bodies, and lost souls. 
