BORN OF GOD

The subject of the New Birth is old—yet perpetually new. It is still the supreme center of all subjects that touch our Christianity. It is the central miracle of Christianity. And all the wonders and powers of Christianity proceed from this simple, yet very definite center—the regeneration of an individual human soul.

This message to men, and its influence, is only forceful through transformation of human lives. Its witness is to the power of the Gospel. Only a born again individual can work for God.

Sin is a fact. Lawlessness in principle and in action is one factor of this subject; another is that provision has been made—the atonement in the body of Christ's flesh through death. All right, the question comes, "How may anyone who has become a slave to sin, pass into the realm of life which Christ has paid for?" The life provided by Christ's atonement becomes the property and power of the sinner when he is born again from above. Look at the interesting way John puts it, saying of those who receive Jesus Christ, "Which were born not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God." The emphasis here, the principle words, are, "born of God."

The Holy Spirit sweeps away false ideas in order that it may be perfectly understood. There are false ideas of Christianity. How can a man be born again? How can he begin to live this new life which is not a life of alienation but of fellowship, not of enmity but of friendship, not of evil works but a life of good works?

Look first at what it is not: Not of blood, not the will of the flesh, not the will of man.

No process of nature can bring a person into the higher realm of life. Because you were born of saintly parents does not make you God's child. When the Gospels were written some were trusting in having their descent from Abraham. This says you have no right because of ancestry. Yet some say, "I had a saintly mother," or, "My wife has enough religion for both of us." You can neither be born nor live the life of the new born because of descent

from some one else in the flesh. It is not the process of evolving from something that lies within natural life now—personality. We do not under value a strong, pure godly heritage, and though we might trace our family tree back generation after generation of believing, it does not in the least make me a child of God. Not of blood.

Neither, of the will of the flesh. One might exercise all the forces of his own nature to throw off evil and imitate the good. Alas! We are afraid many who make up the church membership are of this class. But all this self-culture and determined imitation of good cannot produce in men the Divine life. These things may be of real value in certain realms. But it is not by the triumph of the flesh over the flesh that a person is born anew, born from above. Neither by the will of man. No decision of man is the generation of the new life. Man does not become a Christian simply by being willing to become a Christian. There is a sense in which any unregenerate person may be born anew by willing it here and now. If a man wills to be a Christian he may. But it is not that will that reregenerates life. The act of his will takes hold upon another will and it is God who gives life. We may imagine some act of our own will or faith, being life. No! If not God-given there is no life. If asked, "Do you believe in faith healing?" No, but I do in Divine healing, which is entirely different. Our will is that which connects us with Him. Our will can never heal us—nor can it give us life. It is God's power that heals; God's power to give life, and not the will of man. "Which were born not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man."

"Born of God" is the positive statement. This is a great miracle and we do not attempt to explain its mystery as to process. We do not know how this new Divine life is imparted to man's spirit—to his soul; just as the secrets of all life are hidden as to the method of generation—but are an act of God, "beginning to be" by an act of God. God is the agent, and His act of generating new birth is the result. The secret things belong to the Lord. But He has revealed many things to His children

by His Spirit. We know the new birth comes from God through Jesus Christ by the immediate work of the Holy Spirit. John 10:10. "I came that they might have life and that they might have it abundantly." Therefore, He laid down His life for the sheep.

Nicodemus asked, "How can a man be born when he is old?" There is a vast difference between one born of the Spirit and one that is not—Col. 3:10, "Have put on the new man, which is renewed in knowledge after the image of him that created him." Eph. 4:23, 24, "...Created in righteousness and true holiness." So comes into the Spirit of man a new life principle, whereby that one dead in trespasses and sins, begins to live again. The new birth is the point where divine life is imparted and process of reconstruction is made possible whether or not people agree with Collapse and Calastrophe, the fact is, that in every human life there is a tendency toward sin; fires of passion that work for the destruction of men and races. It takes new birth to restore back to God's order out of disorder, as He did at the creation of the earth. The Spirit's brooding administers the will of God.

"Let there be light." The Spirit comes to man's clouded vision and he begins to see. The Holy Spirit touches the dead soul with life; man begins to live. There is a great deal to be done after that reconstruction, or setting back to order of all life so we can move toward absolute perfection.

Life cannot be evolved out of death, by an act of the will, by signing a pledge, or any thing like that. It is Divine, miraculous, and supreme. You can no more raise a dead spirit to life than you could create a world. Being born of God is the only hope for a sinning soul.

Jesus lived, died, rose again, and placed at the disposal of every soul dead in trespasses and sins the dynamic of a new life. He opened to all believers the Kingdom of Heaven. The simplicity of this causes the clever danger, and to pass up the only hope. He, Jesus, came to his own and they received Him not. They were lost! We will not have this man, to reign over us. One did receive Him as King as he hanged on a cross. "Remember me when thou comest into thy kingdom."

Will you take Him as your Savior King? Are you content to bear His

reproach? God has not said if you understand all mystery of life, but if you receive Jesus Christ you are born again.

Jesus of Nazareth, thou hast conquered by thy love. I do not understand much, but give myself to be thine. No peal of thunder or lightening flash by which to discern naturally. But thou, oh, Great Jehovah, gave life from above—Born of God.

There will be no second death for a twice born soul.

MISSOURIANS RAISE THE MERCURY ON YOUR CHARTS

All missionary charts which are posted in the churches in Missouri should have the mercury raised to the figure of \$748.36 for this present national associational year; these figures given as of September 1. Please be reminded that the quota for Missouri this year is \$8,000.00. We must quicken our pace if we reach it by next June 30, which date ends the national year.

The missions treasury is greatly in need of funds, which you will understand more clearly if you will read the article in this issue of the Gem by Rev. Raymond Riggs. Please read it carefully. Neither of our fields in India or Cuba have had any money for either August or September. Let us pray much and then give accordingly.

ABOUT MISSIONARY CHART

You have noticed on your missionary chart that it was dated for both 1950 and 1951. The reason they were so constructed was to make them fitting for use in this new national associational year of 1950-51 as well as during the past year of 1949-50. We have a supply of these yet on hand, and if any State Director of Foreign Missions will let me know how many you can use in your state I will gladly mail them to you for distribution. They should be in our churches for use this coming year, but it will take cooperation on your part to get them out.

However, if you would rather not undertake to distribute a supply again this year then I have a plan to offer whereby you may continue to use the one which may now be posted in your church or churches. First adjust, if need be, the figures on the chart in

keeping with the states quotas for the present national year. You especially should make that change as to the quota for your own respective state. The table of these quotas has been given in all our leading denominational papers. While it may be that your state quota is the same as that of last year, hence will need no changing. Second, take a narrow strip of white paper, which has been carefully cut out for the purpose, and paste carefully over the red mercury, which has been raised on your chart during the past year, and thus you have a white center again on which to begin raising the mercury in keeping with the receipts from your state month by month. Watch the papers closely each month for instructions as to the raising of the mercury on your charts. We hope to have the careful cooperation of every one possible in the use of these charts. Remember, if you desire a new supply please let me know.

Also, in the last clause of our church covenant we find this: "To this end we agree to labor for the promotion of educational and denominational enterprises, the support of Missions, the success of Sunday schools, and evangelistic efforts for the salvation of the World."

Just recently there has gone out from our Foreign Mission Board an S.O.S. call for funds; also a special appeal has gone out from our Bible College for funds to build more room for the increase in enrollment in our school.

While I regret we have failed to the extent it has been necessary to make these special appeals necessary, I am glad of the willingness of our people to respond readily when informed of the needs. Seeing that our people are willing to respond when informed of a need I am wondering who of us have failed to support our church paper, the Free Will Baptist Gem, and to teach others of its value to every part of our denominational work.

For us to have a church paper which will serve as a means of communication, whereby we may keep in touch

with every part of the work, we must support our church paper in a far greater way. As the present subscription price of the paper does not any way near pay the cost of publication and mailing each month, there have been several suggestions for a correction of this made by those who want to see the work go forward. Some of these suggestions for financial returns for our publishing house are: increase the subscription price, increase the subscription list to say three times its present number, continue to underwrite the Gem out of the Home Mission fund, underwrite by special gifts and endowments.

The Editor, the State Executive Board, and the Special Committee appointed at the State Association to work with the Executive Board, would appreciate hearing from you, not so much as to what extent you have failed in the past but how much you will do for our publishing house in the future.

NOTE: The above article was contributed by one who is well acquainted with the Gem from every angle. He has been a consistent booster and substantial contributor. He has been a spokesman both in and out of the state for the promotion of the Gem. He has always received it in his home. Both in the home and in his work over the field he has been aware of its real value and its potentials as a voice of the Truth and a means of communication among the brethren everywhere. His is not a limited vision of one phase of the work only, but of the necessity of the promotion of every department of the church everywhere. The Gem embraces this same broad vision of the Lord's work and strives constantly to encourage the growth of every department. CUBA MISSIONARIES EXPERIENCE GREAT SORROW AS LIMITED CONTRIBUTIONS FORCE HALT IN ACTIVITIES

We can't begin to tell you with what sorrow we had to take a step backward in the program of missions. We had to send a hurried note to thirty young men and women, Cuban Free Will Baptist, telling them that the opening of school this year would have to be suspended.

Here on the mission field we are wondering if our people who have hitherto been so interested have lost that interest. Is it plain, old indifference? Have you forgotten us? It is so easy to forget.

We can't begin to tell you by writing the work the Spirit of God has wrought in Cuba. This year great numbers have knelt in humble repentance and accepted the Lord through the ministry of your mission. On one of my trips into a new place 33 knelt in prayer at an old palm plank used for an altar. In another service there were 25 and in another we saw 50 people on their knees seeking God. This was not something that required a prolonged revival either.

I went to the most abandoned place in Cuba—the very end of any highway. We rode along the Gulf of Mexico. I heard the people commenting on who and what I might be. Finally the owner of the bus said, "We are wondering who you are." I said, "A missionary of the Gospel." Then began a discussion that lasted five hours as we bumped along over those terrible roads. They wanted to know how one might be saved from their sins. On nearing the small town as dusk was falling I said, "I shall speak tonight at a certain home on 'The Man That God Called a Fool and Why He Called Him Thus.'" They all promised to be there. Without any previous announcement, advertisement or solicitation there were fully 200 people standing. They had no church building and no benches. When I asked them what they were going to do with this great message they cried out, "Accept it." On a public confession the owner of the bus stepped out, his son, the telegraph operator, a merchant, the owner of the house, a blacksmith. Their plea was come and

teach us—live with us. I could not do that, but a prepared Cuban young man could if we would prepare him. Now these seven young men, including eight more—15 earnest, young Free Will Baptist students must go into the fields. We are not asking you, our people, for beautiful, commodious buildings although we need more. They were for years willing to live in huts. We are asking that you get under our burden.

We have seven young men who are graduates of our School of Missions. These boys ride on a horse from early until late, then come home to cook themselves a little rice and coffee. They live as self-denying and self-sacrificing on \$30.00 a month as possible. Words fail me to be able to convey to you the extent they are willing to go to tell the old, old Story.

Our trust is indeed in the Lord and in you, our people. Ask yourself the question, "Have I failed God? Have I failed to pray for Cuba and India?" There are not just a few American missionaries here—Miss Yeley, the Wilfongs, and the Willeys. There are Cuban pastors: Ricardo, with two small children; Sanchez, with an invalid wife; Rojo, with a new baby and his wife ill; Rafael, with three growing daughters. In all there are 21 full time native missionaries—15 of these are graduates of our School of Missions. I am going to leave it to you, our people, to answer. We cannot operate without your support.

We are financially "broke." Our workers will have to resort to credit. Shall we let them go into debt? I do not feel that we are pleasing God in doing so. We are not broken in the spirit to carry on. We look to the Lord who made the heavens and the earth and whose we are.

ENON, ARKANSAS REQUESTS SINCERE PRAYER OF SAINTS

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

It's with a heavy burdened heart that I come to visit awhile with you. I just want every praying saint to

remember Enon when they pray, for when I look around me and see people, my own loved ones and my dear neighbors, so spiritually asleep it makes me want to fall down on my knees and pray out to the great God of all mankind to wake them up before they plunge into eternal darkness.

We haven't had any regular pastor for some time. We have Sunday School and preaching once in awhile. The Lord has laid it on my heart to do something about fixing up the Lord's house. A number of our women are sewing and making garments and quilts to sell to raise money for window lights, a piano, seats, and to paint the floor and have some repair work done. We all have made the start and God is richly blessing us. So we ask you to pray for us that God will send someone to stand in the gate at Enon and warn the people, for we all know the fig tree has put forth her leaves. MISSOURI STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS IN HARMONIOUS MEET; MUCH WORTHWHILE BUSINESS

Another session of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptist is history. From first to last the session was an inspirational feast. Many progressive and worthwhile proposals came up for consideration during the business sessions, making the association a very busy one.

The introductory message was delivered by Rev. Benjamin Scott. The message was full of God's Word and was a feast to all present. Other speakers at the regular preaching hours included Rev. Eunice Edwards of Desloge who brought the introductory message of the Woman's Auxiliary session at 11:00 o'clock Wednesday. A soul searching message was delivered to the large congregation. Rev. Wm. Buster of Thebes, Illinois followed in the evening service with a powerful evangelistic message. Thursday morning the message was brought by Rev. It was again voted to support Missions in Missouri on a 30-70 basis. In other words 30% to go to Home Missions and 70% to Foreign Missions. This plan met with favor and success during the past year.

The Gem was considered very much a Home Mission enterprise and it was voted to continue to underwrite it, if necessary, from the Home Mission fund for the present time. Also, a Special Committee was appointed to work with the Executive Board in working out more far reaching plans of operation. One thing was apparent to all—the Free Will Baptist of Missouri recognize the need of a church paper and are anxious to keep it going out regularly.

The people of Mountain Grove, of the church, and of Mission Association are to be commended for the very fine entertainment of the delegation present. It was very pleasant to be with them for this session of the association.

HOW MUCH TRAINING SHOULD A W. A. DO?

Several hundred years ago an outstanding preacher of the Word urged the young Christian worker, Timothy, to, "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the Word of Truth." This same admonition applies to every Auxiliary worker today. The Woman's Auxiliary study course is designed to inform and inspire each member who will study with alert mind and eager spirit. The W. N. A. C. plan of study, if followed, will make each woman more missionary minded and a better steward of her time, talents, and money and will enable her to pray with a greater fervor for the lost of every land. Then, too, she will come to love and appreciate the Bible more and more every passing day. Thus, a great responsibility rests

upon each third vice president. Let's endeavor to do our very best to keep our members informed.

On page eight in the year book, under the Calendar of Activities, the Auxiliaries are reminded to study during the month of September the duties of officers. TO FREE WILL BAPTISTS EVERYWHERE

INTRODUCTION:

Free Will Baptist people are composed of a people of different opinions and customs but they are a people who love God and will reflect the very image of Christ under the right leadership and tolerance.

We have the woman preacher and the anti-woman preacher.

We have the tobacco crowd and the anti-tobacco crowd.

We have the feet-washers and the non feet-washers.

We have the progressive and the non-progressive.

We have the educated and the uneducated.

We have the mission minded and the non-mission minded.

We have the post, the pre, and the non-millennialist.

We have the high emotional and the cold and formal.

We have the tither and the non-tither.

We have a past record, a present challenge, and a future responsibility.

We are on the Rock. We are not on the sand.

We are on the One Foundation, but we need to take heed how we build thereon. From the extremes let us find the medium and "attempt great things FOR God," and "expect great things FROM God," praying, asking in faith, nothing wavering.

The Medium is "World Evangelism."

One of the best and quickest ways to step any kind of trouble, or erase any doubt or suspicion, that may arise in a church, is for that church to get souls saved. Sinners coming to Christ in a church, will stop wagging tongues of gossip, it will break up the fallow ground in hearts, it will solve the problem of finance and will gain for that church the confidence and respect of any community.

Free Will Baptists everywhere believe this. The only reason for a church to exist is that we might lead the lost to Christ. Men everywhere are lost, thus we must either go everywhere in person or by proxy in order that lost men may be saved. It is high time that Free Will Baptists every-

where stop "bickering" about our own "fancies" and take our eyes off "personalities," crucify our own "whims," and see only a *lost world* and the Lord Jesus Christ as the only Saviour.—Acts 4:12.

It matters little whether or not we shall spend a thousand years with Christ here on the earth, or in the air, or where ever it may be, the thing to be concerned about is that we shall be with Him, and "we shall be like Him, for we shall see Him as He is." It matters little, through whom we channel our services in carrying out this program of world evangelism, but it matters much if we fall short of our task.

Proof that some of us here at home have failed in some way is revealed in the following letter recently received from our Missions Director in Cuba. We believe that Free Will Baptists everywhere should know these facts. Please read the letter prayerfully, and then may we all ask ourselves the question, "Where have I Failed?"

Discouragements in Cuba

September 3, 1950

Rev. Raymond Riggs

206 California

Highland Park 3, Mich.

Dear Brother Riggs:

Greetings. We are rather up-to-date on discouragements—long ago we learned to take them in our stride.

We had planned to begin school September 18—the students coming in on the 11th to get the buildings in order, but under the circumstances the best thing we can do is to suspend school for five months.

At the present the check is a month and fifteen days behind and we are running on one month's credit with our merchants. Our name for being prompt in business is of great value to us in Pinar and we want to maintain that reputation. I think this would be a shock to our people here in Cuba as well as in the States.

Our expenses for this coming year naturally will be much higher. We have placed our four graduates in full-time service with pay corresponding. We are expecting seven new students and have refused as many or more. We are just taking men. In order to

prepare those we could not accept, we are arranging a correspondence course. Hence if we start on time it will depend on the finances being sent to us in time. I would like to know your reaction to this proposal: To suspend the opening of school for five months.

Bob and Jerry Wilfong have a baby girl, born August 18. This means additional financial support for them. I don't recall how much for each child.

I know it was very costly for them—the hospital alone was over \$300.00. They are desperately in need of a house. Where they are living can only be called a hut; I had thought of asking for additional funds to build them a small cottage.

Benito married one of our graduates last month — this means additional financial step up due to an increase in his salary. We managed to repair the old dormitory for them. Mario, one of our graduates, who taught last year, is planning on taking a wife—an additional step up financially. Onelio, graduate of this year, is making plans to marry next summer. He is pastor of San Juan. Victor, another graduate, is begging me to help him get his house ready for his bride—he can't marry till he has a house. Estenio, pastor of Jibicos, who is to graduate this coming year, wants to marry. So on, and on, and on. I am sure the Lord is coming soon. (Not because everybody is getting married.) Then all family troubles, along with divers others, will be at an

end. These boys really sacrifice, living alone and cooking for themselves. They really need wives.

We are in the midst of a cyclone and had six days and nights of pouring rain. All rivers and streams are out of their banks with a large loss of life and crops. It will be fully three months of repair on the roads and bridges. Great numbers of bridges are washed out below us and people by the thousands are without homes and hungry. Many of them are our own Free Will Baptist Cubans. There are cases of mothers losing their children and in despair hanging themselves.

Miss Yeley was pastoring San Juan Church and the waters came up so that she had to wade in water above her waist, some one said up to her neck. She can't get to Pinar as all bridges are washed out. This of course, is a great blessing, they will have to build new bridges.

We suffered very little at the school—about four sows about to litter were caught in the streams and lost. The root crops are a total loss to the farmers.

But tomorrow the sun will be shining. We know that beyond every cloud is the silver lining. God is greatly blessing and using us. After all that is why we are here. Please pray much for us.

Disturbing Facts at Home

Further disturbing facts are revealed in the following paragraph taken from a recent letter from Rev. Winford Davis, treasurer of the Foreign Mission Board.

"I just mailed to Miss Barnard last Saturday the check of \$1,200.00 for India for the month of July. I wrote Bro. Willey and told him there would be no money for them for August, at least until up into September sometime. Just when I can send it depends upon what comes in from North Carolina and Missouri for August which checks I should receive this coming Monday if not tomorrow (Saturday) the 2nd. Instead of a brought forward figure of August 1 we had a deficit of \$680.00 which deficit had to be taken care of from the early August receipts, so that has knocked our ready cash for the August disbursements back quite a bit."

It is an unpleasant thing to me to have to reveal these things, and I personally did not know such an emergency existed, at least to this extent, until I received these letters, thus, I knew of nothing else to do but to transfer these facts to "Free Will Baptists Everywhere."

What To Do?

During the last year it became necessary for the Foreign Mission Department to send out S.O.S. calls to meet our needs on various occasions. Free Will Baptists everywhere responded to each call—and the need was supplied. I have faith and confidence that you will rally to the need of the present.

I also have faith to believe that after this immediate emergency, and after our people are informed, and kept informed, that no longer will it be necessary to send out the unwelcome, alarming S.O.S. signal.

I'm sure that all of us want to see our School of Missions in Cuba open on schedule. If so we must act quickly. We cannot wait another day. If all the pastors and preachers will read these letters to their congregation and give them an opportunity to give, sufficient funds will come in. If every Free Will Baptist who reads this article will just mind the leadership of the Holy Spirit, sufficient money will be sent to the Foreign Mission Treasurer to meet every need.

In order to save time, and just for this emergency, we suggest that you send your special gifts direct to—Rev. Thomas H. Willey, Apartado 27, Pinar del Rio, Cuba. Send in the form of a certified check, and don't forget to send it air mail and register the letter. Bro. Willey will keep a careful record, and report to our treasurer, so the books will be kept straight. Remember this is just for this one time. If you cannot send direct then send through regular channels to Foreign Mission Treasurer.

It is hoped that many of our folk, especially the pastors and state Mission Directors, and state Mission Board members will attend the Missionary Conference scheduled for October 3-5, at the Free Will Baptist Bible College, Nashville, Tenn. The evening services will be held in the East Nashville Free Will Baptist church, Rev. C. F. Bowen, pastor. Miss Laura Belle Barnard and Rev. Thomas H. Willey will be the

principle speakers.

On Tuesday, October 3 the Foreign Mission Board is scheduled for a special meeting at which time new officers of the board will be elected. Please pray for this important transaction.

In the meantime, send those special gifts at once for Foreign Missions.
