By July the subscription list had not yet reached the 400 mark, with it already necessary for the editor to sacrifice long hours and much actual cash to make the paper possible. Even then the plaudits of several and the enthusiasm of many gave hope of several times this amount. At the end of the first year the list had not reached 600, though there were some 10,000 Free Will Baptists in the state of Missouri. This still left a termendous load on Bro. Brown and others closely connected with the publication.

> After the Gem moved to Missouri, it was housed in the home of Rev. and Mrs. Brown in Purdy, Missouri. Here they continued to labor in love for the denomination, carrying a heavy load, and faithfully producing the paper for the people. Gradually there was some increase in the number of subscribers, but no phenominal growth has ever been experienced.
