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LISTS NEEDS FOR SERVICE

Wanda Edwards, who is now nearing completion of preparation for work as a medical missionary, has responded Washing Machine (gasoline) to inquiries of equipment needs. A partial list is supplied herewith. Sis. Edwards is the first of our missionaries going qualified in this field. Also, she is the first qualifying under the new rigid requirements of the Indian government, who now require almost all such workers to be highly skilled in a social work of some kind before granting visas. It is hoped that all these items and any others needed will be supplied at an early date. This is imperative to expedite packing and shipping details.

Many Christians would reply that the main purpose of the Church is for fellowship; some would say that worship is the main purpose; and others declare that the main purpose of the Church is to serve your family, your community and your river of the water of life will flood town. In other words, the supreme task of the church is not fellowship, not worship, nor satisfaction for our selfish desires. It is the EVANGELIZATION of the world! Jesus Christ said, "Go ye therefore and teach all nations." This is Christianity in action. Jesus also said, "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only belotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life" (John 3:16). This is God in action. And in Matthew 20:28 we read, "The Son of man came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, and to give his life a ransom for many." This is Jesus Christ in action. God loved and He gave His best. Jesus Christ loved and He gave Himself. Therefore, the church should labor to blaze abroad the glorious message of God's redeeming grace.

A church that does nothing to evangelize the world is a powerless, lifeless and a loveless church. Water that remains still for a long time becomes putrid. A church that remains idle and does not reach out for the world's perishing millions loses its zest and becomes distasteful to man and God. God intended that the Church be a channel through which the rivers of living water would flow to the far corners of the earth. Jesus said, "He that believeth on me, as the Scripture hath said, out of his belly shall flow rivers of living water" (John 7:38).

I certainly would like to visit every church in the State of Missouri in behalf of our Youth Camp, but this is impossible. However I can appeal to you through our Gem for your support of our Youth Camp.

Our Youth Camp Board borrowed \$5,000.00 from a local bank in order to finance these improvements, which of course will have to be paid back. If you remember, the plan of financing the camp as changed at the recent setting of the Missouri State Association. Then new plan calls for gifts from individuals, churches, Sunday Schools, leagues, auxiliaries, etc., instead of an allocated amount from the co-operative fund. So you see how necessary it is that we all get in behind our camp and send our gifts direct for the Youth Camp. Remember, there is no allocation for the Youth Camp from the Cooperative Plan.

It has come to my attention that one of our smaller churches has already taken action on this new plan. This church gave an entire Sunday morning offering amounting to \$64.06 and voted to send \$5.00 monthly to the Youth Camp. If all of our churches would respond in proportion to this church, the financing of our camp would be a great success.

I do not believe we can over emphasize the work that has been done by our camp. In the last eight sessions there have been around 85 conversions, and counting those of the renting groups, I imagine the number would exceed 100. All that we can do to make our camp a more desireable place to attend will be well worth while. For how can we place a monetary value on the soul of one young person or child? Jesus said, "Or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?"

I appeal to you as pastors and laymen to place this financial plan before your church and then pledge your support to our Youth Camp.

Secretary of Board Wishes to Make Position Clear and Correct Erroneous Reports

August 17, 1954

To Whom It May Concern:
