Dear Co-laborer in the Lord:

It is a privilege to write you again from the Home Mission office, in Nashville. This has been a busy summer, but many blessings and victories have come to make it a delightful one indeed. It has been a source of real joy to witness revival spirit In many localities and to hear our people express themselves in terms of missionary vision. I'm sure that the Lord will honor His people who strive to find His will and do it.

The Outstanding Need!

The one demanding need this month is funds. We must have money if we are to continue our Home Mission work.

July and August were heavy months in disbursements. There were some contributions made to new churches which pulled down our reserve to the danger point. We had counted on the funds being replaced by offerings coming into the Home Mission office, but the offerings fell off about 25 per cent below normal. Add to this the fact we doubled our missionary payroll by adding two more Home Mission Teams and you can readily see what our need is.

We will have sufficient funds with

which to pay our missionaries this month, but unless offerings increase vastly before next month everyone on the field will have to receive only a portion of his salary.

Home Missions is a Bibilical program and the preaching of the Gospel is one of our major responsibilities. I'm sure that we as a Denomination, are not going to let down in this matter. Please pray about it and mention it to others. And then increase your giving to Home Missions.

If you feel led of the Lord to do so, we would appreciate a special offering to help us over this hard place.

This letter is going to nearly 8;500 people. A small offering from each one would certainly meet the need and put us on our feet.

Please don't let your missionaries down. And above all things, let's not disappoint our Lord, under whose direction we are working.

New Churches:

Several new churches are reported this month by Rev. Tom Hall, of Bristol, Tennessee. We are listing some of them herewith: Clinchport Free Will Baptist church in Clinchport, Virginia; Hilton Church in Hilton, Virginia and Blountville church located in Blountville, Tennessee.

Annual Missionary Conference In Nashville

Highlighting the theme "Constrained by love—that all might live," the Annual Missionary Con-ference of Free Will Baptists will open on Tuesday evening, November 22, at 7 o'clock P. M. at the Free Will Baptist Bible College Auditorium and continue through Thursday noon, November 24.

The Conference, which is jointly sponsired by the Foreign and Home Mission Departments, will feature outstanding speakers from our Free Will Baptist Missionary ranks, together with Drama and music from the Bible

The Theme will be developed from three subjects: Sin the Universal Malady: Christ, the Universal Remedy: and Service, the Universal Obligation. The first two messages will be by Rev. and Mrs. Daniel Cronk, missionaries on furlough from Indiana, and the latter subject will be discussed by Rev. W. S. Mooneyham, Denominational Executive Secretary.

The opening service on Tuesday evening will feature Dr. L. C. Johnson in the introductory message and the College Speech Department will present a drama entitled, "Thy Will Be Done," an original play written by Miss Naomi Brant, head of the Speech Department.

On Wednesday evening the film entitled, "Passion for Souls," will be shown. This is a moving message by Dr. Oswald J. Smith in which the challenge of missions is presented first- hand. Following the film the missionary offering will be presented.

The offerings again this year will be divided equally between the two mission Departments unless the gifts are designated, in which case they will go to the cause for which they are marked. Pastors are urged to plan now to have their churches represented with an offering at this service.

Rev. James E. Timmons, who has recently been sent to Mexico by the Home Mission Board, will speak on Wednesday and Thursday. Other messages will be brought by Rev. J. Reford Wilson, of Pocahontas, Arkansas, and Rev. Homer E. Willis, of Paintsville, Kentucky.

The Conference will close at noon on Thanksgiving day with a commissioning service to be conducted by the Foreign Mission Board for six missionary candidates who are soon to go to the field.

Accommodations for room and meals may be had nearby for out-oftown visitors and we will be happy to help you make previous arrangements. Your letter or postcard telling of your desires, addressed to Missionary Conference, 3801 Richland Avenue, Nashville, Tennessee, will be sufficient. Plan now to attend this great Missionary Conference.

OBEDIENCE

"And the Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life: and man became a living soul." (Genesis 2:7)

"And the Lord God took the man, and put him into the garden of Eden to dress it and keep it. Herod, The Fox

"He (Jesus) said, Go ye, and tell that fox......" Luke 13:32.

A number of men by the name of Herod appear in the gospels and in Acts, so we should point out that the Herod under discussion here is known as Herod Antipas, killer of John the Baptist. He was a son of Herod the Great, whose horrible crimes included the murder of the children in Bethlehem. This Herod is the only man to whose name Jesus added an epithet. Our Lord generally held no man in contempt, and apparently he was not contemptous of Herod. But the life and action of this man could not but draw the revulsion and scorn of a clean and noble mind. Jesus certainly held the threat of Herod in contempt, and expressed a very low opinion of him as an individual. "That fox". which Iesus so aptly applied to Herod was undoubtedly deserved, and this incident gives us additional insight into the things which Jesus despised. For our own good it is well that we look over the life and record of Herod, the only man on whom Jesus bestowed a contemptous title.

I_A Man without Principle

Herod was a man who lived without law. Senseous, cruel and low, this man had no guiding principles. He claimed to be a Jew but he ignored all the laws by which godly Jews lived. In Luke 3:19 we have a very good summary of the case against Herod as an unprincipled scoundrel. Luke tells us that "being reproved by him (John Baptist) for Herodias, his brother Philip's wife, and for all the evils which Herod had done, added yet this above all, that he shut up John in prison."

Herod broke up the home of his brother, Philip, taking his wife and living with her in an incesteous marrage. The utter lack of respect for family ties, for decent relationships, and for the law shows us a desolute, unprincipled man, having no decent rules by which to live. With clearness, but with kindness, Luke points out that this was only one of the many evils of which this king was guilty. Being reproved by the fearless Baptist, Herod restored to the rule of a tyrant, and he shut up the prophet in prison. Every civilized nation under the sun at that time would have recognized Herod's act as one of shame and degradation. But Herod showed no respect for the principles of mankind. and imprisoned the man who dared to call his sin to his attention.

Today we have people like this

man Herod. They have no principles by which they live, except the principles of selfish, sensual lust and the feeding of the appetite of the body. From them no home is safe, no innocence is respected, no decent rules are regarded. Yet if you dare to criticise their sins, you are set upon by all the hounds at their command. We have not passed the day when a minster will be lashed, mauled and crushed by unprincipled people because he dares to expose their sins. I have felt the power of these "little Herods" more than once, and so has every other minister who dared to challenge sin. And do not forget that. in subtle ways, they can deal out misery, for no principles restrain them. Our tyrants often "out Herod Herod", as the English bard puts it.

II-A Moral Coward

For all his unprincipled attitudes and deeds, Herod was a moral coward. In Matthew 14 we have the conclusion of this story about John the Baptist, and the story there cannot help but curl your lips with contempt and scorn. Having placed John the Baptist in prison, he lacked the moral courage to see the miserable thing through. He was afraid of the people. One feels that, had Herod executed John the Baptist without respect to the opinions of the people, we could find one thing to regard him for, his courage. But Herod lacked the courage to try John and execute him. He left the poor man to languish in prison, the act of a moral coward. But he was to be forced by his very lack of courage to do the things he had not the natural character to face.

Herodias, infamous for her towering rages, would have made speedy work of the Baptist had it been within her power. And suddenly, in an unexpected way, she is presented with the opportunity. On Herod's birthday a great drunken party in his honor was given. It was filled with dissolute people like himself, and the party reached a climax when Salome, wicked and ribald daughter of Herodias by her former marriage, came in to dance for Herod and his guests. In the fashion of the time, she was probably nearly if not entirely nude. The dance was one of those Oriental sexual displays. Herod, drunk with wine and burning with passion, offered this giirl anything she would ask as a reward for her contribution to his party. Being coached by her mother, she asked for the head of John the Baptist on a charger. Herod was agast at her request. In his heart he knew John was innocent or he would have had him killed long before. But he had made the promise on an oath, and he hated to back down before his guests.

His terrible moral cowardice was never more in evidence. The life the girl asked was not Herod's to give. He was never bound by oath when he wanted to break them. But the grinning scorn of his drunken companions forced him to carry through his promise. So he had John killed and his dripping head relayed to the girl. But moral coward that he was, he had to live with this ghost the rest of his life. In his twisted, cowardly mind he pictured Jesus as John come back to life. For all of this he lacked the courage to repent. Too weak to turn away from sin because of what others might say to him, and too weak to repent of his weakness. That was Herod, the moral coward: many, many are like him today.

III-Spiritually Destitute

Such a life leads inevitably to spiritual destitution. The spark of the divine in us will not stand up always under such sledge hammer blows. All that is best and noblest in us dies when forced to live under these conditions. Driven desperate by his ghosts, Herod fell lower and lower, In his dissolution, he had a mad craving to see Jesus. His mind was filled with superstitions, and he probably felt that in some way this miracle worker could help relieve the fever of his soul. Perhaps it was only his desire for the unusual. He would have Jesus perform at his court like the king's jester. Anyhow, he did not get an opportunity to see Jesus until just prior to the crucifixion. Pilate, on hearing that Jesus was from Galilee, sent him to Herod to be judged. Herod was delighted. Now he had a chance to see this miracle worker face to face.

But Herod was chagrined and angered by the attitude of Jesus. Our Lord had already shown his contempt for the character of this man by calling him "that fox." He now further exhibits that contempt by refusing to even answer one question of Herod. When this attitude is placed side by side with the attitude Jesus displayed before Pilate, it is impressive. There is no question as to the unfitness and low character of Pilate. But for all his weakness and cruelty. Pilate was not totally depraved. He was not lacking in human feelings. He was a torn and driven man, and the struggle through which he passed prompted Jesus to answer him calmly and respectfully. Once Jesus told him, compassionately, "Those who delivered me to thee are the real offenders here." Jesus talked freely with Pilate. But he totally ignored Herod as a cunning and cruel tyrant without spiritual sense enough to listen. The record shows that Jesus ignored Herod so completely as to insult the so-called king. There is not another occasion where Jesus shows this attitude. Even for the wicked priests he had some answers, but for this spineless, spiritless excuse of man Jesus had not a word.

Does this seem cruel, unkind in our Lord? It will not if you remember the terrible warning of the Bible against spiritual destitution. In the very first book of the Bible and in the earlier chapters it is said, "My Spirit will not always strive with man." It should not surprise us, when Paul tells Titus that there are those who are "unto every good work reprobate." when we recall the ominous word of Paul in Rom. 1:28 when he speaks of God giving men over to reprobate minds, then the action of Jesus with regard to Herod becomes clear and understandable. With these things in mind, and knowing the dissolute nature of Herod, the scene in the king's palace takes on meaning.

Conclusion

In this day there is a tendency to admire the sharp, the smart and the able in the world of social and economic actions. Many people may know that a man is a sharpshooter in business, a reprobate in life, and dessolute spiritual wreck. But if he can dress well, carry out smart business deals, make and spend money, he has the secret and open admiration of many people. Young folk are apt to be taken in by him especially. It is in this respect that Herod Antipas becomes an interesting figure for study today. He was that kind of man. He was sharp, smart, nimble with his personal affairs. He slipped the beautiful Herodias away from his stolid and plodding brother, Philip, in such a way as to leave the hangerons a juicy bit to gossip about for many days. No doubt about it, he was smart. He was a fox. But having said that, you have said it all. For a heart he had a thumping stone, for mind he had a twisted and ruined thing, for religion he had superstition, for a soul he had a reprobate spirit now condemned forever to inherit the house of lost souls. For all of us there is a point of no return, and Herod passed that point before he ever faced Jesus. When he did face our Lord, there was nothing in the empty shell of him to which Christ could speak. Therefore, our Lord sorrowfully ignored him.

Do We Want A Superannuation Program

This question is addressed to you, my brethren, in the Gospel Ministery.

I would like to answer this as I see it. When I came to this office, I asked the Lord to lead me. The first thing I did, after getting straightened out from moving, was to send out a circular letter to 1700 of our ministers.

I asked for only one dollar per minister in the letter. I thought I might hear from half this number and fix up an office in the Head-quarters Building. But, to my be-wildered amazement, I have not heard from one dozen out of 1700, from coast to coast, with an offering, but many requests for insurance. We wanted the request and also wanted an offering.

I tried to set forth in the circular letter that we wanted to insure all full time ministers from twenty years old to fifty two years old, and to try to set up in every state a Superannuation Board where they do not have

We find in the states that have a board that is functioning that it is far more successful to channel all this money through their board and let them send 25 per cent of it to the National Superannuation Board to insure the ministers who are insurable; then keep 75 per cent of it in state treasuries to help the disabled ministers who are not insurable.

It is appalling to know how many states and local associations are not doing anything for their ministers through either of these means.

There is one association, I have learned, that is paying all of their ministers premiums on their policies. This is a noble example to follow.

Then I know of a state that channels all it's money through the state Superannuation Board, and they are doing one of the best jobs of any of the states in giving monthly checks to all the retired ministers and ministers widows.

If this program succeeds, the churches will have to pay into the National Superannuation treasury as much money as it costs to insure the ministers, or better still, the church would do a golden deed if it would pay all the minister's premium.

From the 1700 letters sent out we got a number of requests for insur-

ance, but not much money. In fact, the money received from these letters would not pay for the postage.

If you want to know why there are less than one hundred ministers insured in ten years of this program, it is because of insufficient funds.

There are thirty three policies for \$2000 and thirty in force for \$1000 and a number pending. It would almost exhaust all of our funds to issue the new policies wanted.

Brethren, if we cannot depend on you, on whom are we to depend? I ask you to sincerely join us in prayer for this cause.

I will appreciate an invitation to visit your churches and associations to explan this program to you.

It would break your heart to read the letters from some of our elderly ministers, who have worn themselves out in the cause, asking for help from this office.

If I cannot get to your church people to explain our program to them, the offerings will continue to be small.

Many churches are baring the door to everything except the Co-operative Program, and some of the states are doing likewise.

The move that was passed at the National Association, was that as a supplement to the Co-operative budget each respective department be encouraged to promote it's particular phase of the work, and to receive designated funds as individuals, groups or churches may feel so disposed to give. That all churches be encouraged to give 10 per cent of their general offerings to the Co-operative fund as a minimum of their denominational giving.

May we count on you for your prayers, letters and offerings.

THE NEED OF WITNESSING

"Howbeit Jesus suffered him not, but saith unto him, Go home to thy friends, and tell them how great things the Lord hath done for thee, and hath had compassion on thee."
(Mark 5:19)

The most careful scrutiny of God's Word will fail to find one instance of Jesus commanding His followers to be selfish with His Gospel. However, there are uncounted commands for them, and us, to share His Gospel with others. How can anyone be so blind to God's will for the salvation of the world as to think for one moment that Jesus would have them hoard His Gospel? That it is for them alone? That the Gospel was given for one age, one people, one race?

Not once did Jesus ever infer that the gospel of salvation was for a select few. But He did give us some specific orders about sharing it with the world—with "every creature."

specific orders about sharing it with the world—with "every creature."

We are to begin our witnessing at home. Jesus said, "Go home.... and tell." How much I pity the man or woman whose children scorn their salvation. Too many parents talk loudly in public, but fail to "tell" of Jesus and His mercy at home. They fail to "tell" with loving deeds that any sinner can understand. Children and young people do not appreciate the salvation of parents who are not consecrated at home. Jesus said, "Go home..... and tell", so we are to begin witnessing at home.

Who are to witness? Those for whom Christ has done "great things." Has Christ seved your soul? Then you surely have a message for others. We cannot witness to something that we have not experienced or do not know, but if Jesus has done "great things" for you, can't you do as much witnessing as the maniac of Gadara, with whom our text deals?

David said, "Restore unto me the joy of thy salvation; and uphold me with thy free spirit. Then will I teach transgressors thy ways; and sinners shall be converted unto thee." (Psa. 51:12, 13) There is power behind the testimony of a converted person, but testimony becomes a weak, ineffectual thing when a person tells of a salvation they have not experienced, one they have only heard or read about.

The maniac of Gadara had many things done for him when Jesus saved his soul. Jesus delivered him from his stubborn, rebellious will. The Word says, "No man could tame him", but Jesus did. Has Jesus conquered your stubborn will? Jesus also delivered him from the power of the devil and I Corinthians 6:11, teaches that we too, were in the grip of the devil for the Word says, "and such were some of you."

Incidentally, as soon as Jesus freed this poor man from the power of the devil and restored his sanity, the man put on clothing. No longer did he run around naked, but "he was clothed and in his right mind." Jesus declared that a person who follows Satan, "know not what they do."

The maniac lived among the dead until he met Jesus. Those who are dead in sins and are dead to the will of God still "dwell among the tombs." However, any person who accepts Christ, lives among the living and his testimony must circle the globe if he is obedient to Christ's commands. Even as this man cut himself with stones, so does the one whose life is filled with unbelief. He destroys himself. A life spent in unbelief is a life that is wasted.

The maniac obeyed Christ's command to "go home... and tell". and then he followed the pattern I believe God would have each of His children follow. Verse 20 tells the story of a man who is now in the complete will of God, for it says, and he departed and began to publish in Decapolis how great things Jesus had done for him: and all men did marvel." Not only did he witness at home, but he pushed out farther with this wonderful testimony of praise. We should do the same. We should never be content with just telling those right about us, but we should be ever seeking to widen our world of witnessing.

The witnessing power of any person is greater when the commands of Christ are obeyed. Jesus said, "Go and I will be with you." Friend, if you are one of those who think that the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ is only to a certain class, race, or creed, you do not have the assurance of His presence that Jesus promised. Jesus will not be with you in your daily life nor with you in your work, but instead, His blessings will be withheld.

I pray that God will challenge your heart with this truth! Find a church, or person, who is obeying Christ's command to "Go" and you will find God's blessings being showered there. On the other hand, find a church, or person, who is hoarding the Gospel and you will find God's blessings being withheld.

It is only when we obey God that He blesses us. He said, "Go.. tell others." Are you doing it?

Adversaries On The Mission Field

Our Free Will Baptist Missionaries are laboring on five different Foreign Mission Stations. On each station there are peculiar problems that demand our prayful consideration. The chief adversary of course, is the devil himself.

It is our prayer that during these days many of you will take on a new burden to pray definitely for our representatives in foreign lands.

No doubt one of the greatest adversaries on the mission field is that of superstition. Japan, for instance, is usually considered a highly civilized nation and its standard of education equals that of America. However, its heathenism is seen in the superstitions that still rule even the most cultured classes.

Here are some of them-

(1) It is unlucky to face northeast because that is the "devil gate" direction. For the past 1200 years a special prayer is uttered annually by 100 priests in Kyoto to pacify the northeast.

(2) Once in every 64 years is the "fire horse year." Girls born in that year are doomed to spinisterhood because they are as wild as horses and likely to kill any man who would marry them.

(3) The danger age for men is 42 and for wemen 33. These are years of calamity. When people reach those ages, the faithful ones spend much time in temples, seeking survival.

(4) Priests in one ancient temple own more than 200 huge fans, each six and a half feet long. In case of fire, each priest grabs a fan and waves it madly, shouting, "Confusion to the spark." They report they extinguished fires that way in 1876 and 1926.

(5) Geisha girls go each year to temples to pray for the souls of departed cats who furnished the catgut strings or their musical instruments.

Touch Not Mine Anointed

"Touch not mine anointed, and do my prophets no harm," I Chron. 16: 22. These are mighty words and professing Christians today are taking them very lightly. We had better be very careful in our criticism of ministers of the Gospel. God will protect His anointed and all our fault-winding and picking them to pieces will only be to our own suffering. God said, to do His prophets no harm. "He suffered no man to do them wrong: yea, he reproved kings for their sakes." I Chron. 16:21.

Real God-called ministers that are preaching the straight Word of God and are anointed by the Spirit are being scorned and literally driven from our churches by so-called members. My heart goes out for real Spirit filled preachers. "Blessed are ye, when men shall revile you, and persecute you, and shall say all manner of evil against you falsely, for my sake. Rejoice, and be exceeding glad, for great is your reward in heaven: for so persecuted they the prophets which were before you." Matt. 5:11-12.

It is a very dangerous act, when we (who profess to know God ourselves) lay hands on one of God's called servants. "And David said to Abishai, Destroy him not: for who can stretch forth his hand against the Lord's anointed, and be guiltless?" I Samuel 26:9. If we have been born of the Spirit, we are supposed to know real messengers of God from false prophets, for we read this in God's Word: "Beloved believe not every spirit, but try the spirits whether they are of God: because many false prophets are gone out into the world." I John 4:1.

"And he said unto his men, The Lord forbid that I should do this thing unto my master, the Lord's anointed, to stretch forth mine hand against him, seeing he is the anointed of the Lord." I Samuel 24:6.

We read in the book of the Revelator that Christ is holding the "angels" of the churches or messengers of the churches in the right hand of His mighty power. To be able to get to a godly minister and harm him, therefore one will have to loosen the hand of Christ, and who can do that? We need to think twice before we try to dislodge a spiritual preacher from the place where Christ has put him. Christ has full charge of his anointed servants and no puny hu-

man hands should be stretched against His mighty hand.

I give one example that was personally known to me; a church was spiritually alive and the attendance was above average for a country church. Hands were stretched forth against one of God's prophets and today the church is cold and formal and the attendance has dropped to a very low number. Substitutions are being used to try to build up the organization, but nothing will work in place of God's Spirit.

We need to take heed when God warns us, "Touch not mine anointed, and do my prophets no harm." I Chron. 16:22. David dared not touch Saul as long as he was in office of the king, to which place God had appointed him. Read I Samuel 26:7-12, 23.

What if we refuse to receive one of God's pastors or prophets? "Verily, verily, I say unto you, He that receiveth whomsoever I send receiveth me, and he that receiveth me receiveth him that sent me. John 13:20. What if we fail to receive the message from God's anointed? Uzziah tried to stretch forth his hand against Israels ark of the covenant and he fell dead. Saul of Tarsus put his hands on God's people barring their testimony, and he was struck down to earth. Elymas put his hands on one of God's preachers (Paul) and was struck blind. Anyone today who tries to interfere with a God-called preacher or pastor is inviting God to smite him. It is a sin to lay unbidden hands on the holy thing of God. It is indeed 'sacrilege", which is to commit the crime of stealing or desecrating that which is sacred. It is an insult to Christ to force one of His prophts from a field where the Holy Ghost has led him to serve. It is the sin of touching God's anointed and doing His prophet harm. If we lay hands on God's chosen ones we are trying to keep God's message from going out to the people.

Forms of godliness are being indulged in and people are trying to scorn the Word of God, but they are only rejecting the Authority of the Scriptures. To persevere in this present age demands separation from the world and a close adherence to God's Word. "Follow peace with all men, and holiness, without which no man shall see the Lord." Hebrew 12:14.

When we are sure the individual or the deed is of the Lord, then let's give them or it our whole-hearted support, lest we bring the curse of God upon our heads. "Touch not mine anointed, and do my prophets no harm."

Missionary From Cuba Writes

The tide of interest in native churches is running high. While we are far short of the goal with the amount on hand, which in itself would build only one church in these large cities and towns, it is serving as a vale of confidence to spur the Cuban believers on to build and to do the

larger part themselves.

Sunday, Mrs. Willey, Lucy, Mr. Phenecie and I attended our district conference in Havana and Matanzas. Our people were on hand with their pastor. The temple in this town is almost finished. It stands as a monument of Cuba and American co-operation in the Kingdom of our God. Up to now the temple has cost \$2, 250.00 and \$1,800.00 is needed to finish it. Half of this is Cuban money and when it is finished it will mean it is our property with the title held jointly by the Cuban Free Will Baptists and the Original Free Will Baptists of North America. The mission treasury will be through paying rent.

The next place of importance is one of our newest works within the city of Havana where lots alone cost \$12.00 a square yard. The latest information is a lot available for \$1, 900.00. The mission paying \$400.00 and the church paying \$12.00 per month, with a little help, they will begin to build. This church represents about 6 bricklayers and 5 carpenters whose time and labor will be donated free. This means that \$55.00 per month will go into our own property.

In Vinales, one of our pastors and people have bought a lot. They are now laying the foundation out of the Chapels for Cuba money we gave them (\$105.00). The building will be 21 feet by 69 feet including the parsonage. The building will gain the attention of everybody passing through. There are bus loads of tourists going to the valley of Vinales.

At the present we are investigating a number of properties in Pinar del-Rio, hoping to buy our own building large enough for big evangelistic campaigns. We need much prayer and your concentrated means to advance. Too many of the existing churches hold just a small handfull and while our churches never hold the crowds people will go home for lack of seats.

We are facing a new day in the history of the Free Will Baptist Church in Cuba. It has meant that we either move ahead or continue crippled in our capacity. Thank God for

those of you who are under the burden with us.

"I am enclosing picture which I made in Jibacoa during the Vacation Bible School there. This is a side view of the Temple which they are building showing the men working. The Christians themselves raised \$1,000.00 for the building and of course that isn't nearly enough to finish it. They have made great sacrifices and I know the Lord will supply the means to finish the Temple".

Since the funds, Chapels for Cuba, is left open we trust that others throughout the denomination will see fit to send in special gifts to the Foreign Mission Department designated for Chapels for Cuba.

Mr. Willey states in recent correspondence that investigation for proper location for a building in Pinar del Rio has been throughly made and land would cost from ten to twelve dollars per square yard. He has a proposition however of buying a building right down town with suitable facilities for our church in Pinar del Rio. It will cost in the neighborhood of two thousand dollars additional to swing the deal with the total price being \$7,500.00. We appeal to each of our constituents to make this a definite matter of prayer that the Lord might provide the necessary means that our work there may continue to advance.

BARNARD REPORTS ON COST OF NEW CHURCH BUILDING IN SOUTH INDIA

Following is a paragraph taken from a recent letter from Miss Laura Belle Barnard regarding the cost of the new church building in South India.

A few months ago a picture of this church appeared in our church papers as the church of the month. Miss Barnard writes as follows regarding the cost of this building.

"The entire cost of the building was something under Rupees 10,000. The Estimate came to a bit over the amount but the contractor bought usable materials of the old building and it brought the cost down below Rupees 10,000. Now according to present exchange \$2,000.00 is slightly more than Rupees 10,000 so that the actual expenses of the finished building would be nearly \$2,000.00. I am sorry that some have gotten the impression that it cost \$5,000.00. If I have been responsible, I would like to correct it."

I am sure that all of us are proud of the new church in Kotagiri, South India and we are praying that as the Nationals continue to assume more and more of the responsibility that it will grow into a strong church that shall be standing even when the Lord comes. Miss Barnard further states that there are some 40 members in the church which constitutes about 10 families. In addition to the church that is being carried on in this building, village work continues to be carried on through the National workers and also the Christian day school. Raymond Riggs

Conduct the services in such a manner that the young people will consider it an honor to take part in them. 

CHAT WITH OUR BRETHREN

By K. V. Shutes
Dear Brother Preachers:

I have been elected to serve you this year as National Promotional Secretary of the Superannuation Board. This is a job I did not ask for, but the Board told me I was their choice.

If anybody ought to understand each other's heart-throb it should be brothers in the ministry. Brethren, I covet your prayers and cooperation. I ask for a chance to present this cause to your churches and conventions.

I feel like a boy, who applied at a factory for work where he saw a sign, "Help Wanted". He could not answer half the questions, but he signed off by saying, "I quess I don't know much, but I can and will learn." He got the job. I do not know much about this, but I can and will learn.

I do know our ministers are insurable from twenty-one to fifty-two years old. Also, that if you are twenty-one years old your part of the premium on each \$1,000.00 will be \$6.19 the first year and \$8.72 the following years. If you are forty years old your part of the premium will be \$12.47 the first year and

\$17.72 the following years, and the National Superannuation Board will match it and send the total amount to the Ministers' Life and Casuality Union, 3100 Lake Street, Minneapolis, Minnesota. Please make all checks and money orders to the National Association of Free Will Baptists, 3801 Richland Avenue, Nashville 5, Tennessee.

It will be a fine thing if you brethren, who are already insured will send to this office your church treasurer's name and address. We may be able to get your church to match your part of the premium.

The Rev. John T. Knight, who baptized me when I was twelve years old, stood before the General Conference in 1927 at Steel City, Florida, and pleaded for us to do something for the aged ministers. He would have died in the poor house had it not been for his son. He organized forty churches and most of them live today.

My dad carried the Word fiftyseven years and never had one dollar from a Superannuation Board.

I heard an elderly minister in North Carolina, by the name of Coats, in the early forties plead before a convention in that state that he was too old to work or preach and had gone to Raleigh to run a Boarding House; had failed, and had gone to the welfare board and they failed him. "What am I to do?" he said. They gave him a nice love offering, but nothing permanent. Now, they have a good Superannuation program.

Brethren this thing is in all our laps. Will you help me to raise enough money to insure every F.W.B. minister from twenty-one to fifty-two and set up in every state a superannuation board to help raise money to insure those from twenty-one to fifty-two years old and to give a nice monthly offering to the man who has already worn his life out in the ministry? Will you write this office for information about it? Will every minister send an offering for superannuation to this office (at least one dollar) and see to it that your church does something about it. This thing concerns every minister in our church. We can put it over or fail, but we will be the ones who suffer. Two thousand dollars is all the endowment the board can offer now, but we hope to build it up until one can have \$10,000,00 endowment if he desires.

We hope to start insuring ministers' autos, church buildings, and parsonages in February of 1956.

Brethren, I plead with you to show

your interest in this cause before I plead with the laymen.
INFORMATION GIVEN TO THE 1955 SESSION OF THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION by Bro. Joe Fort, former Secretary and Treasurer.

The purpose of National Superannuation is to make possible for every active minister and full-time Christian worker the following benefits.

1. Protection for loved ones in case of untimely death of the insured to the extent of the face value of the policy plus all accumulated dividends.

2. A regular income in case of total and permanent disability by their receiving \$10 per month per thousand dollars of insurance if disabled before the age of 56 years.

3. Income from retirement and until death through receiving the face value of the policy or a monthly income.

The Board pays one half the annual premiums of those insured by it. The annual premiums are 17 per cent lower than the average of twenty-five of the largest companies in the nation for policies of this kind. The Ministers' Life and Casualty Union, Minneapolis, Minnesota, issues our policies when signed by the Secretary-Treasurer of the Board.

How can ministers and full-time Christian workers secure these policies? They should write the Secretary-Treasurer of the Board for an application blank with specific instructions as to filling it out and returning it to the Board.

The Board Makes the Following Recommendations:

1. That more of our active ministers make application for policies through the Board.

2. That every insured minister urge his church or charge to pay to National Superannuation at least as much as his policy costs the Board. This will insure the soundness of the programs.

3. That the National Association authorize the Board to offer en "Endowment-At-Age-65" policy in addition to its present "Endowment-At-Age-70" policy.

EDGEMONT CHURCH PLEDGES \$8,604.60 FOR FOREIGN MISSIONS

Sunday, Oct. 9, marked the beginning of the third annual Missionary Conference of the Edgemont F.W.B. Church, Durham, N. C. Missionary Conference week is always a spiritual highlight in the life of Edgemont Church.

Speakers for the Conference this year were Rev. T. H. Willey, from Cuba, Mrs. Trula Cronk, from India, and Rev. Raymond Riggs, Foreign Mission Secretary. In addition to these speakers, Missionary films, The Heathen Rage, Passion for Souls, and Slides of India were shown.

Every service was well attended and a deep pugent spirit of compassion was manifested in every service, as each one was made to realize his responsibility to a lost and dying world.

As in every Christian service the most important happening is the salvation of lost souls. It was a real joy to see souls come to Christ in almost every service. Also, many dedicated their lives anew to the service of the Lord.

On Sunday night Oct. 16, the Missionary Conference came to the close with the tabulation of Foreign Mission pledges for the next year. After each Sunday School Class had submitted their monthly pledge, each member of the Church was given a pledge card and asked to prayerfully mark the card as to how much they would pledge each month for Foreign Missions. It was a real joy to sit in the audience and watch the pastor, Rev. Joe Ange, read the amounts from the pledge cards, and to hear the adding machine "click the totals. Everyone was held in suspense, waiting for the last pledge and the grand total. Finally it came, and Rev. Dan Mergh, Educational Director for the Church, held up the long list of figures on the adding machine paper, and announced the total pledges to be \$8,604. 60. This represents about \$1000.00 more than was given by this Church last year for Foreign Missions. Also, when we realize that less than four years ago this church was giving less than \$200.00 per year for Foreign Missions it certainly represents a tremendous increase.

As a result of the missionary spirit of this church the pastor reports that within the last three years there have been six hundred (600) decisions, and souls are still being saved in almost every service.

One hour of the Sunday evening service is being broadcast, and the church is also supporting the other phase of the denominational program. Their Foreign Mission offerings are being channeled through the State Mission treasurer, Rev. Bruce Barrow, Lucama, N. C.

In addition to the services at Edgemont, missionary services were held in following churches near by Sherron Acres, Calvary, King's Chapel and Shady Grove.
