Keys To Getting The Most Out Of League!

Getting the most out of the Free Will Baptist League in your Church may be somewhat like it used to be back home for getting something out of the smokehouse—we had to use a key. Perhaps the "most" which you desire is still locked up just because the right keys have not yet been used. Anyway, here are three of the most important keys that need to be used for getting the most out of League.

Key number one is proper mo-tivation. Many of your leaguers, no doubt, are attending for wrong purposes; at least they are elsewhere. For example, there are young people who go for purely social purposes. It is, of course, nice for a couple to go to League. But the real purpose of the League is not to provide a social outlet for the young people of the Church. Another example of a quite different misconception of purpose is that there are many who think we attend League to learn. I remember one occasion when our General Director in my home church wanted us to have a teacher in each group to teach the lesson instead of group members participating. But though there will be some learning at League, the primary purpose is something else.

In addition to those who have wrong ideas of purpose, there are many who simply do not realize that there is any valuable purpose in the work of the League. But there is a fundamental purpose; and unless it is realized fully by the Leaguers, the most cannot be gotten out of the League.

The Sunday School

The Sunday School is the longest arm of the Church for reaching the unreached masses of people. It is the 20th century recruiting agency for the entire church program. As a denomination we have always been identified by those things which we most vividly assert we believe.

We Free Will Baptists, with a reaffirmation of the basic facts of our faith, have been peculiarly marked and classed by the extension of the Kingdom of God through our organizations and programs. The Sunday School, as the oldest of these organizations, has become the tool for our Bible teaching task, the instrument of projection and outreach used most effectively in the extending and developing of the church program.

Since the Sunday School is the longest arm of the Church, its constituency is all inclusive. From the cradle to the grave, the old, young, the shut-ins and the shut-outs, all of these have come to know the blessings of the ministries of this great

organization.

Its curriculum is the Bible, its objective, Bible teaching, thus making its ministry to become the main artery of the Free Will Baptist blood stream-in outreach, indoctrination, and evangelization of the Church.

Through the Sunday School the church can multiply herself ten-fold. Over the past five-year period of our denomination there was an approximate gain of 476 Sunday Schools, and an enrollment gain of 31,344 pupils. Over this same period nationally, there has been an average gain of 2,000,000 a year in Sunday School,

It is very evident that more people are attending Free Will Baptist Sunday Schools today than in any other period in the history of our denomination. With this increased attendance, more pepole are brought into contact with the church. However, according to last years statistics we had approximately 2,000 churches reporting. We say that the Sunday School furnishes the greater portion of the church membership. If this be true there would be a gain in membership of only approximately 15½ members per church over this five-year period.

For some reason we are failing to tie these Sunday School pupils to the church proper. What are the reasons? As Sunday School Promotional Secretary I have contacted well over 200 Sunday Schools in the past 18 months and I list some of the apparent reasons: The lack of interest in the Sunday School program on the

part of the pastor. Here is one of the best ways for a pastor to multiply himself, through his Sunday School. A church never rises above its leader. It has been said that the pastor is the chief officer of the Sunday School in the same way that the President of the United States is commander-inchief of the Army and Navy. He really holds the key to the situation; and in the last analysis, therefore, is responsible for the success of the Sunday School. Thus, he should be interested in the Sunday School program of his church. There is but one possible answer to this demand made upon the pastor for fruitful teaching throughout the Sunday School-he can invest himself in officers and teachers, thus multiply himself throughout the Sunday School.

The lack of trained teachers, equipment, housing facilities, over-conservativeness, selfishness, etc. It must be remembered that the first introduction most people have to the church is through Sunday School. What they see and hear while in the Sunday School will largely determine whether or not they become a member of that church. These are some of the

reasons for our loss.

Free Will Baptist Sunday Schools are a multi-million dollar business functioning for God in the outreach, indoctrination, and evangelization of the church. This in turn effects the entire church program. For as the Sunday School program goes, so goes the church program. This makes the Sunday School an integral part of the church, worthy of the wholehearted support of the church and its officers. Someone has said, "The Sunday School exists to aid persons in becoming Christians and in reaching their maximum growth in Christlikeness".

His Young Warriors

The Lord Jesus is pictured in Psalm 110 as Ruler over all, the King of Righteousness, and Priest of God. There is a panorama of the Messiah and His Kingdom, viewed in tre-mendous scope and majesty. The complete picture and application may be future, yet verse 3 has a present application for those of us who are young in years and young in heart. In the American Revised Version here is how it reads:

"Thy people offer themselves will-

In the day of thy power, in holy array: (Or, "in the beauty of holiness:" margin)

Out of the womb of the morning Thou hast the dew of thy youth.'

Even if this is part of the portrait of the Lord, it still has a significance for us because we are in Him. We are told also that the word "power" has a double significance, sometimes it means "strength" or it can mean "army", which is probably the best word for us to use in this verse. The day spoken of here is the day of His army, the day of the gathering of His warriors. Then, the whole verse tells what kind of warriors He has in His army. They are willing, they are faithful, and they are young. How about you, will you be one of the Lord's willing, faithful, young warriors?

In the day of the mustering of His army His people offer themselves "willingly". They are not drafted, they are not hired as soldiers, they are not pressed into service, they offer themselves willingly.

Willingness is important to God in His relationship with His people. In preparing to build the Tabernacle, Moses stood before the people of Israel to say, "This is the thing which the Lord commanded, saying, Take ve from among you an offering unto the Lord: whosoever is of a willing heart, let him bring it, an offering of the Lord." The word "willing" in that verse can also mean "liberal or noble". And the people brought a willing offering. Near the end of his life, David encouraged his son to build the Temple, reminded Israel of all the materials he had collected for that building, and then challenged those people with, "Who then is willing to consecrate his service this day unto the Lord?" In 1 Chronicles 29: 6-9 the Bible tells us that "then the chief of the fathers and princes of the tribes of Israel, and the captains of thousands and of hundreds, with

the rulers of the king's work, offered willingly.... Then the people rejoiced, for that they offered willingly, because with perfect heart they offered willingly to the Lord.'

Today the Lord wants us. He has some plans for our lives. He has some plans for our service. He wants to carry out these plans. But He wants us to be willing for Him to have His way is those plans. He wants us to willingly give Him our lives. He wants us to willingly carry out the service He has for us. How about it? Are you this day ready to consecrate your service, your life, your plans, your future, your everything to Him who is the Captain of our salvation.

We are told that the expression "the beauty of holiness" was used in speaking of the dress of the priests. Doesn't that tell us something more about the kind of army the Lord has? His people are soldiers, willing soldiers, but more than soldiers, they are also priests. They have a ministry to be performed, and in that ministry they are to be faithful. The ministry for His warriors today is that of winning souls to Christ. We can point other young men and other young women to the Christ who saved us from sin and tell them that He can save them also. There are many that we can reach. Someone said that in Tampa, Fla. there 13,000 boys and girls in the elementary schools that are not in Sunday School. I wonder how many there are in your town in elementary school that are not in Sunday School? I wonder how many there are in high school in your city that are not in church on Sunday Morning? How about you finding out and then starting to work in that mission field? There is someone you can reach for the Lord?

A friend of mine told me a story of a salesman who worked in a furniture store. A lady dressed in rather old-fashioned clothes came into the store. Since she didn't look like much of a customer, the salesman didn't bother to "sell" her on any of the merchandise. He answered her questions, gave her the price of this article and that article as she inquired, leisurely with her down the ailes, and finally yawned. This was too much for the customer. She turned for the door. Just then the owner of the store, coming from his office, recognized her as one of the wealthiest persons in town, stopped her from leaving, showed her some merchandise, and succeeded in selling her more than a thousand dollars worth of furniture. And the salesman was fired because he yawned on the job.

How many times do we try to pick our "customers" in this business of soul-winning? Have you ever thought, "I couldn't talk to him", or "I couldn't possibly say anything to her"? Maybe you have said, "He wouldn't come to our Sunday School?" Go see if he will! But don't yawn on the job.

Thou hast the dew of thy youth", these warriors of the Lord are young. Dew is used in Scripture as a symbol of that which purifies and refreshes. What could be more refreshing to this whole world than a great company of vibrant, enthusiastic, young people who have plunged whole heartedly into the Lord's service of winning souls because they are willing for Him to lead their lives. Young lives are compared to dew because dew is pure, and sparkling, and bright, and clean. And young lives are just that, sparkling, clean and bright. The important thing about all that is for you to see that your life stays that way. Don't dirty it up with sin. Don't mess up your life with bad habits. Accept the Lord Jesus as your Saviour make Him. the Lord of your life, and go forth with Him to conquer as one of His young warriors.

"In the warfare that is raging For the truth and for the right, When the conflict fierce is raging With the powers of the night, God needs people brave and true: May he then depend on you? May the Lord depend on you? Loyalty is but his due; Say, O spirit, brave and true, That he may depend on you."

"Missing The Mark"

Text: Phil. 3:14 "I press toward the mark for the prize of the High Calling in Christ Jesus.

Introduction: Every ship sails from port does so with the expectation of anchoring safely in a distant harbor at the end of her voyage. The pilot of every airplane which flies through the skies has a landing strip in view, on which he plans to land safely at the end of his flight. Everything that moves has a destination. Every person born into this world begins the voyage of life with his final destination-Eternity. From the cradle to the grave we press forward on the journey of life. There are few, if any, who would not like to find a Home in Heaven with God the Father at the end of this earthly life. Such a prize is a mark worthy of our best efforts.

Occasionally a ship will meet with disaster on the high seas and fail to make the distant port. Quite often we hear of airplanes becoming lost in a storm and crashing into a mountain side, thus missing the mark. More serious than these tragedies, tho, are the lives of millions in the world today who are drifting aimlessly toward

eternity without hope.

In the text of Scripture before us, Paul expressed the opinion, or at least would seem to imply the fact that it is possible for us to miss the mark. Let us look at some plain reasons which are set forth in the Bible as to why men may miss the mark.

I_Looking Back

Luke 17:32 is a short verse in the Bible as verses go, but it is calculated to arouse our attention and interest. The Saviour, Jesus Christ, simply said, "Remember Lot's Wife." No doubt but Lot's wife, like we all, had made many mistakes in her life. But the sin which led to her destruction was committed when she dis-obeyed God's commandment and turned to look back. Immediately her progress ceased; her doom came suddenly; she became a pillar of salt, a monument to all who would dare dis-obey God.

The danger of looking back is clearly set forth. We cannot make progress as an individual Christian, as a church, or as a denomination unless we look ahead with a goal in mind. Along with that goal we need a broader vision and a greater zeal for the work of God.

Again in Luke 9:62 Jesus declared "No man, having put his hand to the plough and looking back, is fit for the Kingdom of God." If the road to

eternal life is strait and the gate to Heaven narrow, we can ill afford to take our eyes off the goal to look back to the things of the world. To Israel at the Red Sea God said through Moses, "Go Forward." If Israel had done what Paul teaches us to do. they would have forgotten the things of Egypt and looked forward more diligently to the Promised Land. By looking back many of them missed the mark.

2-Presuming, which means taking for granted or possessing a spirit of arrogance.

This was another thing which led to the downfall of Israel. We are warned in 1. Cor. 10:11 "Now these things happened unto them for examples." We may find ourselves saying "It will never happen to me" but Paul warns the members of the church again in the next verse, "Wherefore let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall."

Many are like the story of the Hare and Tortoise who, we are told entered into a race. The hare, being much more swift, ran well at the start and would have won easily had he not presumed he had the race won, and stopped to commend himself. After doing this, he indulged in a little bit of careless and foolish play. As the story goes, while he was having a good time the tortoise kept moving along slowly, but step by step toward the goal. At the outcome of the race, it was the tortoise and not the hare who won.

Some of the major sins of Israel are mentioned by Paul. They are Lust, Idolatry, Fornication, Murmuring, and other sins as well. After they were delivered from Egypt's bondage, presuming they could not help but enter into the Promised Land, the people became careless. It is said of them in the Scriptures, "The people sat down to eat and drink and rose up to play. The Bible also declares that many of them fell. They missed the mark! History tells us that Nero fiddled while Rome burned. He felt so certain that he and his city were secure that he never bothered his mind with the solemn warnings of coming disaster. It is sad but true today that many churches and church members have 'Sat down to eat and drink" and are fooling their time away while souls are being lost.

It is said the Greeks and Persians met in battle on the plains of Marathon. After the battle was won by the Greeks a young soldier was chosen to carry the good news to their people who waited in the city of Athens. The journey was long and hard but the young soldier ran hard, never stopping. Mile after mile he kept running. He had a mes sage to carry to his people who were anxiously waiting. Just at sunset, as he came in sight of his beloved city, the people who had gathered gether gether to wait his coming opened wide the gate to let him in. Just as he his tered the gate he shouted with his last breath, "Rejoice, We Conquer! and he fell dead. At the end of the Christian race many wait in the City of God for our coming. When our bodies fall in death, if we have been a faithful runner we can join the glad number of the redeemed, saying "Rejoice! through Jesus Christ, have conquered." Following is a quotation from a recent letter from Rev. Wesley Calvery from Tokyo, Japan. (Dear Editor: The quotation is on separate sheet enclosed.)

Visas to India have been refused Rev. and Mrs. Fred Hersey and it has been agreed by those concerned they should enter the field of Japan. This is advised by our missionary there and also the missionaries on other fields who know the problems entailed by leaving lone missionaries on the field.

It will require between two and three thousand dollars for passage and equipment to get this fine couple and their baby into Tokyo, which today remains one of the greatest mission fields in the world.

We only have a short time in which to raise this money and to get these missionaries to the field. We are going ahead by faith and arranging for the space on steamship and also trusting that much of the equipment will be provided by churches and auxiliaries on the field. You might note elsewhere in this paper or the enclosed copy the articles that are needed to equip them for service on the mission field.

It has been some time since we have actually sent a new missionary to the field and we believe that now is your opportunity to help do it. Remember this must be over and above your regular missionary giving. Let us rally to this special project at this time.

The Herseys indeed, are worth-while folk. They have proven themselves in every respect and we are anxious for the funds to come in for them to be sent to Japan. Let us not keep them waiting. Send your offerings today designated for the Hersey fund. Make a special donation to the Hersey fund that we might plant a new missionary team in Japan.

The Herseys will be doing itinerate work in the different churches in the near future and in the event they arrange to come to your church, we believe that you will do your utmost to give them a good reception and a fine offering to hasten them on to Japan. We are confident that the recommendation of Bro. Calvery is noteworthy and we would certainly like to have them there in time for the language school beginning April the 9th.

After the visa refusal to India the fif Herseys expressed their willingness Ja to go either to Africa or Japan but

somehow we believe the Lord would have them to join our staff in Japan at this time. We have hopes of course of opening a field in Africa at a later date and we are praying that the Lord will provide sufficient personnel for this field.

Calverys' Letter

Tokyo, Japan

Greetings from Japan:

Thousands of miles from home and a wonderful Christmas. This statement sounds contradictory doesn't it? Americans usually associate Christmas with going home to be with the folks for a few days and without that trip home, Christmas does not seem complete. But for us, even though we were far from home we had a truly happy Christmas day. First of all, on Christmas morning we attended English speaking services, in down-town Tokyo, for missionaries in this area, but our real joy came in the afternoon and evening with our Japanese friends. In the afternoon we had a Christmas service for the children in our garage. There was singing, Bible Stories and slides. Each child received a little box of candy which was bought from their own Sunday School offerings. They also each received a scripture verse pencil as a gift from "Wsuri San and Airlin San" (Wesley and Aileen). They were really happy. You should have heard them as they said "ureshii" (I'm happy) and then all bowed together and said "Thank you very much". We trust that all of them have learned to love the Lord Jesus Christ and the true God. Some of the older ones have expressed a desire to become Christians.

In the evening there was a Christmas service for the adults. There were seven or eight Christians among the thirty who were in attendance; most of whom have become Christians as a result of our meetings. The service was held in our neighbors living room. As you know, in a typical Japanese room everyone sits on the floor. So we did not have to worry about chairs. All of us sat on the floor for the two hour service. (I must admit that it was rather painful after the first hour.) The service was in the form of a candle light service with each person lighting a candle from a large candle on the Bible. It was an impressive service and reminded me again of the thousands in this land who have not received the "Light of the World" into their hearts.

After Christmas we joined about fifteen other missionaries in Morioka, Japan (10 hours by train north of

The Jericho Road

Upon our visit to Jerusalem we' traveled over the Jericho road, and our guide pointed out to us the place where the man fell among thieves and was stripped of his raiment, was wounded, and left for dead. Also, we were shown the Good Samaritan Inn, or rather the place where the inn once stood. Even though a police station is now standing on the spot, much of the remains of the "ole inn" is still there.

As we traveled the narrow winding road from Jerusalem to Jericho it was quite obvious how dangerous this road could be. There are many places where thieves might hide, and pounce upon an unexpecting victim.

It is twenty-three miles from Jerusalem to Jericho, and as you go, you will descend over three thousand feet. While there may be snow in Jerusalem, on the same day it would be hot in Jericho.

The wild country laying off the Jericho road is a barren, trackless wilderness in which nothing grows. It is covered with stones, completely waterless and cut into hideous and fantastic ravines and gorges with steep, overhanging cliffs, which throw back an intense heat that makes existence almost intolerable.

It is difficult to describe ones feelings as you stand on the roadside looking over that expanse of baking, shimmering, convulsed and arid land, so hostile and menacing. Off in the distance I remember seing a lone Arab citizen as he walked along leading his camel. The poor beast looked almost starved, and actually was hardly more than a rack of bones.

This landscape reminds you of some obscene and horrid monster which would lure you into its lair and reveal horrors that would turn the brain before devouring your flesh. The yellow, sulphurous rocks seem to be twisted into a kind of agony as if they were cooling from some ghastly, devilish furnace.

Actually this is the Wilderness of Temptation, where Jesus wandered for forty days and forty nights, tempted of the Devil. The Bible says, "He was with the wild beasts..." jackals, hyenas, hungry wolves, and during the time of Christ, lions and bears.

Before visiting the Holy Land, I had more or less envisioned the Wilderness of Temptation as a dense forest with thick underbrush, etc. Imagine my surprise as we viewed the jagged rock, barren cliffs and gaping caves!

From the writings of Leslie Weatherhead comes this story that describes the hazards of this desert, "Two students discovered just how terrible this desert is. They thought they would take a short cut across it. And it is not that the desert is so vast. Actually, the distance as the crow flies would not be a distance outside the power of two normally healthy young men. But one cannot travel in a straight line across this desert. First the desert loses you in its intersecting river gorges. Then it starves you and drives you mad with thirst. Then it leaves you to the wild beasts and the pitiless sun and vultures. An Arab found one student unconscious and brought him back to Jerusalem. They never found the other. They only found a few bones and buttons in a jackal's den. Yet the students were never more than a few miles from Jerusalem.

Another story is told of the police searching for a bandit who had built a stone wall right across the narrow black-top road, stopped fourteen cars, robbed everyone, threatened to cut off a lady's fingers because her rings could not be gotten off quickly enough, and shot dead several policemen who attempted to arrest him. There is certainly nothing ancient and out of date in the Scripture that says, 'A certain man went down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell among thieves who stripped him of his raiment and wounded him, and departed, leaving him half-dead.'

But, we certainly don't have to go to Jericho to find thieves. During our recent visit to Michigan we stopped over in Columbus, Ohio for a service with our good friend and brother in Christ, Rev. Delbert Gould, who is pastor of the Welch Ave. F. W. B. Church. After a very fine service in the church we went to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Crum on N. Washington St. My wife two sons and two daughters were along, and we were looking forward to the next day, Dec. 23rd when we would go on to Michigan to spend Christmas with our parents, and friends of long standing. We had the station wagon well loaded with our clothes, and also our Christmas gifts for our people. We were royally entertained in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Crum, but were certainly disappointed the next morning to find that the station wagon had been broken into and stripped of our possessions.

Fortunately, none of the Foreign Mission equipment was missing even though there was a camera and Missionary film inside.

We mended the broken glass in the car window as best we could—and went on our way, feeling rather empty, but as we looked toward the back of the station wagon—Behold, it was empty too! We must say, however that soon our hearts were full as we visited loved ones at home with memories of "Glad Re-Union Day—in heaven—where thieves do not break through nor steal.

Japan-Equipment Suggestions For Hersey's-- Hurry!

Household Equipment

(The following are a Must)

Refrigerator—one of the small, compact ones are best. Electric. Portable kerosene heater—the tall, round ones with a bail are good—bring 2 kerosene stoves for cooking—Perfection brand with 3 or 4 burners and either portable or built-in oven are used by missionaries here satisfactorily.

(The following you must have but now because there are many armed forces personel here moving about, their used ones may be bought cheaper than buying them and shipping. So if you do not already have these, do not buy but bring money to buy

Washing machine, Large kerosene heating stove, Sewing machine, Type-writer, Radio, A good mattress.

(The Following bring)

Any electrical appliances you have except a clock as it won't work. Also any that you may receive as gifts such as toaster, mixer, etc.

Electric blanket—if possible. Especially if you have difficulty in getting warm at night in the States as it's much worse here.

Kitchen—a good set of pots and pans, a pressure pan with extra parts, a good can opener, stainless steel silverware; dishes are everywhere here but if you have a few very heavy ones bring them; bring pyrex pieces.

Household linens etc.—bring pillows; sheets-about 12; bath towels—about 30; hand towels; washcloths; dishtowels; tablecloths (pure linen is cheaper here) a few doilies; curtains if you have some nice ones, anything you would use at home.

Blankets—about 6 or so heavy ones, can buy here; can also buy the heavy quilts here.

Books—bring the good books you have on hand that you think you might use. Be sure to include a good dictionary, medical books, Bible comentaries and Bible study books, a good book on etiquette. If some friend wants to give you a subscription to some good magazine accept them because you will appreciate them very much. Flannelgraph material which you have used.

Food—bring for at least one year: coffee, cocoa, jello, Shampoo, deodorant, lotions, and creams, (all the kinds you would use at home plus some lanolin), razor blades, shaving cream or soap, aspirin, Lux soap

flakes, Vitamins—a general everyday one unless you need a special one, home medicines if you think you need them—as Alka Seltzer, etc. Jellies are expensive, so if you like it bring sure jell, there's none here. Also, put in some cans of sandwich meat as Spam, and if winter, some cheese. All these can be bought here, but are from three to five times the price in States.

Clothes-

Japan is quite a bit like the States in climate. Tokyo being like the Central States, except is more humid in summer and has hard drying wind in the winter. The people in Tokyo dress same as in States, wearing very nice clothes. You'll probably be in Tokyo the first year and a half or longer except perhaps for the summer. The houses are open and no heat much at all, so more clothes are needed in winter and the chlorine in the water wears out all clothes and linens etc., more quickly than in America. So, judging accordingly, I suggest bringing all the clothes one needs for the first 2 years or so and then, if they can't be found here they can be made or sent from the States. Most things can be bought here at about the same price but sometimes sizes are a problem. Two distinct types of clothes are needed. For the hot, humid weather: open sandals, light cottons, crinkle nylon are fair; then for the cold weather. Do not bring any red, nor buy many bright colors.

You cannot wear red here, nor the men any bright colors. If you have on hand bring a few. Bring all the good clothes you have plus new ones. In addition perhaps to what one would need in the Central States at home, here are some suggestions.

Woman:

Shoes—worn outside only—good walking shoes, no heels except what you have as the side walks and streets are bad. One pair each of boots and galoshes. A couple of rain-coats. For inside—two or so pair of lined house shoes or any light weight warm shoes that are noiseless and won't mar the floor for winter. They have slippers here but are cold for winter.

Hat-only the one you will wear.

Underwear—part wool slips and or undershirts and knee panties. For summer the lightweight four-gore shadow panel cotton slip is nice, and

Dear Brother Riggs:

"We were happy to hear that the Herseys will be joining us soon. We trust that the Lord has led and will continue to lead all the way. I will get right down to your questions and plans for their coming to Japan.

The most urgent thing for them now is that they get started with the language. Thus if at all possible they should be here ready to start language school on April 9. If not they must wait until July for the summer session which is held in the mountains about 40 miles from Tokyo. If they can begin in April we will be here to help them in the many problems that they will have as newcomers. We plan for the ending July 1 to be our last term in school. After that we will probably not be in Tokyo. Considering everything, it will be much better if they can be here by April 1st. So if at all possible please make arrangements for them to be here then. It is not advisable for them to start to language school late but if they can not be here by April 1st they can study with a private teacher until the next term starts.'

CHRISTMAS SERVICE IN SOUTH INDIA

Our Christmas season was a bless-

ed one. We had over 200 in Sunday School and 300 in the church service. It was a thrill to see it. Five of our young men-products of our own church—gave brief messages on: The Shepherds Received Him, The Wise Men Sought Him, The Innkeeper Men Sought Him, The Innkeeper Neglected Him, and the King Rejected Him, What Will you Do with Him? respectively. And in all the Sunday School class rallies held during Christmas week (we have 7 classes in the Sunday School now) there was real blessing. In our intermediate and senior Boys groups 14 either took their stand for the first time for Christ, or (4 of them) renewed their yows and asked for baptism. In the women's class 26 were present, and one of the greatest joys of all was to see the little woman who during our dedication time was under the power of demon-possession, now joining in all the fun and inspiration and testimonies. She hasn't missed a Sunday since she started. There are more earnest enquirers than ever before. Even out on R. V. Estates, the place which has been so raw and so hard.

it seems the Spirit is moving. Our own teacher, Ahiezer, goes out each Sunday afternoon now and conducts a Sunday School for the children there.

they as well as all underclothes wear out quickly here. These can be bought here but sometimes size is a little problem. Nightwear—very light weight for summer and very heavy for winter. Bring some heavy wool sox, and wool hose if you can find—can be bought here.

Coat—bring very heavy one with zip lining is best. Must have very heavy one.

Sweaters—At least 8 or so cardigan sweaters, besides plenty of slipovers, wool blouses, skirts, wool dresses, gloves, scarves, etc. I wear 3 or 4 sweaters in our house and more at the neighbors, as it takes a lot. All skirts should be full as you will sit on the floor when visiting. Try to bring I or 2 very heavy sweaters as they have to be custom made here. If you have a pair of wool slacks bring them. Also, heavy bathrobe.

About the same line of thought. Cannot wear any red at all. Perhaps a little in a tie. If you have any other bright colors on hand bring them but do not buy new bright colors. The men wear mostly dark blue, gray, black and brown, although lately a few wear brighter colors. In getting clothes together pay special attention to the following:

Sweaters—plenty of wool ones.

Socks—heavy wool ones, can be found at sporting good stores, if you wear over size 8 shoe size, bring plenty of all kinds.

Shoes—a couple of pair of good ones for walking and a dress pair, if you like loafers, they are good as you take them on and off so much—this goes for girls too. Also, heavy house shoes for winter.

Underwear—long under wear for winter two piece is better. Of course other wear.

Pants—dress pants for school or you can wear khaki to school. Bring a heavy pair or two.

Shirts—a good supply of dress and sport shirts, but no loud sport shirts.

Suits—You will need two or so for each season and bring what you have.

Rainwear—rains a lot, so bring rainshoes, boots, rainhat of some kind.

The field of Enlistment is a challenge to us today. We have many women in our churches who are not members of the Auxiliary. Enlistment Chairman, have you and your committee done what you could in this field? Have you invited again and again the women in your church who are not attending the Auxiliary? If the Auxiliary is important enough to have, it is important that all the women belong to it. Have you contacted the absentees to see why they are not coming? If not, you have not done what you could.

Youth Chairman, how about you? Have you looked on your field that is white unto harvest, the Youth of your church? The grain in this field will soon be fallen if it is not harvested quickly. What have you done toward getting a Y. P. A. or a G. T. A. organized in your church? If you have done nothing about it thus far, may the Lord help you to get started now. We must do something for our Youth today, tomorrow may be too late.

The field of learning is a broad open field today and one which remains un-explored so far as many of our Auxiliaries are concerned. The woman at the head fo this department is the Study Course Chairman. Every Auxiliary should have the regular study course. Mrs. Chairman, how about planning a study course for your Auxiliary? You can either teach it yourself or get some one whom you know will be capable of teaching it. Certainly the saying is true "if we never know we never grow.'

Mrs. Program Chairman, much depends upon you. It means a whole lot to your Auxiliary to have a well planned program each time. Sometimes because of an uninteresting program lies the cause of keeping up your attendance. Your work involves much prayer and planning and also utilizing the women on program.

From the field of personal service comes a direct challenge to each of us. If we are not using this field we are falling far short of doing what we can. Christ's work is personal. Mrs. Personal Service Chairman, let it not be said of you that you failed on your part. View the field and see what needs to be done that your Auxiliary can do. Each respective field presents varied opportunity to serve. Come to the Auxiliary prepared to direct the personal service work in your field. You need to have the list of services to be performed with you that time may not be taken from the program. Seek help from God in the guidance of your field of work. "To serve" must be our chief aim. Do not neglect the house to house visitation program which pays such big dividends in His work.

Sometimes we over look the field of "records". But our Secretary-Treasurer has a very important task. One of her chief tasks should be to keep us informed as to whether we are making any progress. She ought to know—she has the records. If we have not done more this year than we did the previous year we have not progressed. She should also remind us of our responsibilities, financially. The money we give in the Auxiliary is used in the Lord's work the same as what we give in church. That re-

minds me, Mrs. Secretary, if your Auxiliary has not sent in your offering for the visual aid equipment for Dan and Trula Cronk please do so at once. The amount to be raised in Missouri is \$100.00. As to date there has been \$55.30 sent in leaving a balance of \$44.70. Each Auxiliary was asked to send thirty cents for each member to Sister Eunice Edwards, Des Loge, Mo.

Last but not least, Mrs. President, you hold an important office. The success of your Auxiliary depends much upon you. Be very careful in the conducting of your business meeting. Keep the business moving right along so that time will not be wasted or taken from the time for your program. Sometimes women will not come to the Auxiliary because the business period is too long and drawn out. Avoid as much of it as possible. You should see that the plan of work in every field is carried out. Study your duties and do them well and your Auxiliary will bear fruit for the Lord.

"There remaineth much land to be possessed" and we take this means to "stir up your pure minds by way of rememberance." May God help us each one to have the approval of the Master upon us with "she hath done what she could."

God's Stewards

As stewards of God we have the performance of certain tasks and the care of certain things entrusted to us. Usually when we think of stewardship we immediately think of money. Certainly we are stewards of the money we handle but money is not all that has been entrusted to us. We are stewards of time, talents and all that we call our possessions as well as money.

The full meaning of stewardship carries with it the fact that we are not only to wisely use, invest or care for that which has been entrusted to us but also that we must give an account of such use, investment and care. Were it not for the fact perhaps many of us would not be nearly as careful and cautious as we are with those things in our keeping. Then, too, it is probably true that because we have not yet been asked to give account and because the day of ac counting seems so far in the future, many of us are more careless than we

would be if we had to give a personal account of the use of every minute at the end of each day. This does not lessen our accountability in the least.

One of the strongest requirements of a steward is that of faithfulness. "Moreover it is required in stewards that a man be found faithful." (I Cor. 4:2.) As stewards of God we will not be reckoned with altogether on the basis of the amount of service done but according to our faithfulness. Thus the person whose capabilities are limited can be just as faithful to his small duties as the person whose capabilities are many and seemingly unlimited. The story of the servants in Matthew 25:14-30 well illustrates that

The servant that had been capable of taking care of only two talents was just as faithful as the one that had received the five talents and accordingly received the same commendation and reward. The one who had been given the one talent was cast away not because he had been capable of taking care of only one talent but because he had not been faithful in the care of the one talent entrusted to him. Accordingly, we must not be unfaithful in our duties because they seem small and unnoticed but we should accept them as the best service we can offer to God and be faithful in the care of them. Perhaps women are more prone to think of their duties as unimportant than any other group of people. Because we are unwilling to perform the humble tasks assigned to us we often attempt greater things and fail. The truth is, that faithfulness to our tasks is so very important that we can not afford to leave them to another and attempt greater things. It is comforting to know that we are accountable only for those tasks assigned to us—not those assigned to another. "So then every one of us shall give account of himself to God." Romans 14:12.

Missionary Reviews

"Westfield" Kotagiri, South India December 10, 1955

Dear Ones:

The Old Year is ending, and Christmas hastens on. I expect all of us are profitably reviewing the year. 1955 has been a year set apart in my experience. Last Christmas season had brought unusually rich blessing in fellowship with our humble Indian Christian "family", and the Bible Conference and evangelistic meetings immediately following had ended with a glad harvest of souls. We were terrifically aware then that 1955 was to be a marked year.

Then came the crisis when our old school-our-church building had to be demolished and a larger structure erected to meet government regulations (and our own conscience) for our growing school. This was a task much beyond my small range of knowledge and ability, and I know wisdom would have to be given step by step. With humble thankfulness I recall how the Lord sent along one missionary brother with wide experience of building in India, just when I was getting the plan and estimate drawn up. His wise and willing counsel in the outset was a blessing direct from the Lord. And so, throughout the six months of demolishing, excavation and builded, the future nine and one half months of furnishing and finishing, the Lord gave the needed help. We dedicated the church on September 11, and Bro. Carlisle Hanna used Psalm 127:1 as a text for his part of the service: "Except the Lord build the house they labor in vain that build it." I knew, as no one else could have known, how literally true it was that God Himself had built that house! And then the Indian clinched this message with John 10: 22-23, "It was the feast of the dedication-and Jesus was walking (about) in the temple." I believe it is true to say that all of us felt the presence of our Lord on our Dedication Day, "walking about" in our midst in the house He had built. And we felt then, as we do 3 months later, that it was not built in vain.

But we set out to build a school. How did we end up dedicating it as a church? This, too, is a blessing that sets this year apart. After we had gotten well under way with the building program a servant of God poured out her sweet lintiment on His feet in giving us one half acre of land with a fine school building all ready for use, even to blackboards built in the walls! A much larger building with

many more conveniences than we had set out to build for ourselves, and a playground we had dreamed of but had not dared to hope for! So, by this miracle the would have been school building became a church! We have now a nice church building and a beautiful adequate school, one across the road in front of our residence, the other up the path at the back.

For two months, after beginning to demolish, we had the entire school in our residence, giving up space for five classes daily. Then for the entire 6months period it was necessary to continue with the church service, Sun-day School, and all other meetings here. This meant even more rooms for Sunday School. It taught us a good many valuable lessons-and no doubt it was ourselves the Lord was wanting to teach, more than the school children! It was a precious experience, and the Lord empted the noise of the children and other annoyances, so much so that we felt a little pained when outsiders asked how we could bear it! Then when God's child came along and gave the beautiful school building and campus, we felt we had given so little and He so much.

Annual Harvest Festival was held in the new church on Saturday 10th, preceding Dedication on the 11th. Although offerings from this service were smaller than last year, we were aware that during the year our people had advanced much in the grace of giving and there had been a steady increase in number of tithers. Also, a fine spirit of giving had been shown in other connection. Moreover, it was gratifying to see the men of the congregation undertake gladly and efficiently the collecting of harvest gifts, arranging them on attractive display, and afterwards conducting the auction in the open air. At the close we sent one hundred and thirty rupees to the Bible Society. A lovely detail of the Festival concerns a 12-year old Hindu boy who in return for a kindness he had done, had a half-rupee as a tip. His conscience would not let him receive pay for an act of kindness, and so he brought the coin in an envelope carefully labeled, and presented it as a Harvest offering to help distribute Bibles to the world.

One of our boys. Wilson-Raj, having completed a Bible training course in April, is now doing a fine pioneer work in nearby villages of his own caste and languages. He has persevered with groups of jungle children untouched by a school and other civilizing influences, trying to teach at least a few in each village to read

so that these villages may have the witness of the written Word. Also, he has tried hard to teach adults to read. All this is a tedious effort, especially when evil-doers come to the villages and spread false rumors that the teacher has a political connection and aims to deceive hem. More than once he has gone 8 miles to meet his class to find not a child in the village. Once they had even destroyed the brush-arbor school which they had built for this use. Often we find some one has frightened them in this way, and the lad has to start from scratch again and tediously rebuild, not only the arbor but attendance and interest. As many children work, grazing sheep, cattle or buffaloes, regular attendance is near impossible at best. In one village only 4 boys are regular, but these are justly proud of their progress and they read and write their lessons before me with great satisfaction. I wondered if I would have the grace and patience to persevere against odds as this teacher-preacher has done. He is one of the blessings God has given us this year, and we feel that when our little church (the spiritual building) produces the likes of him, it is on a solid Rock.

Then we have over and over again seen the Lord at work in answer to the united prayers of the church. There was the 16 year old lad who was enticed away by false teachers, and who in a spectacular way was watched over through severe testings of hunger and pain and attempts to pervert his faith, and was delivered back to his parents with a stronger faith, in answer to united prayer. A woman demon-possessed was delivered from thraldom as the church prayed. A piece of land adjoining our church compound was critically need ed to safeguard our new building and to give us a suitable access to it. Owned by a man of Kota Tribe, an unbeliever caring for nothing but material gain, it had been a government grant to the Tribe and this portion always held by one family, handed down from generation to generation. A miracle therefore was needed to break down sentiment against parting with it and also to cause the man to agree to a moderate price. A second miracle was needed to provide the money for purchasing. As in simple confidence the group prayed and expected, both miracles were performed. The owner was invited to a special business meeting of members and there he told the group he had heard they were praying God would give the land, and that he had not been able to resist those prayers.

The Free Will Baptist Story

Ever since Damon C. Dodd joined the Free Will Baptist church in Flat River, Mo., twenty-two years ago, he has been greatly interested in the history of his denomination. All of the material he could find, however, stopped at the close of the 19th century and even this was scarce. There was no current history to satisfy his appetite for the facts about his denomi-

So fifteen years ago, armed only with his fascination for church history and a desire to bridge the gap between 1900 and current Free Will Baptist activity, he set out in earnest to collect the valuable material which has gone into this book. He consulted with many of the people who

actually made the history and visited most of the important sites in the development of the denomination. He spent days among books, periodicals and documents pertinent to the Free Will Baptist cause at Crozer Theological Seminary in Chester, Pa., and at Hillsdale College, Hillsdale, Mich. His research also included material from the Samuel Colgate Historical Collection in the Colgate-Rochester Theological Seminary, Rochester, N.

This activity was pursued while he was serving as a pastor, a foreign missionary, and a denominational executive. Mr. Dodd is now promotional secretary for the Board of Missions and resides in Nashville, Tenn., with his wife and two daugh-

KEYS TO GETTING MOST OUT OF LEAGUE

(Continued from page 3)

What is the purpose? It is to help train the members of the Church for most effective service in the local community. Every phase of the League's work should help toward this aim. For example, even being an officer is part of the training process. I still attribute the fact that I am in Christian service today to the fact that I was once made General Director of our League back home. And of course it goes without saying that the purpose of having members participate on programs is so that they may develop poise and confidence in being able to be more effective servants in the local church. I wonder also if other types of training, such as soul-winning, should not be undertaken or sponsored by our leagues. Every activity, all organization, each program, and the presentation of each part must work together toward this goal of training if the Leaguers are to get the most out of league.

The second key is proper organization. There are yet many Leagues which meet in one or two groups, having only a general league. This is certainly not satisfactory; for the Leagues must be separated into proper age groups for maximum effectiveness. Doing this lessens tension. since members of one age group work best by themselves; and no group is neglected. Proper organization will result in more activity such as regular meetings for departments, officers, etc. For these and other reasons, getting the most out of League will be impossible without proper organization. One may see the Manual for further suggestions here.

Third, but by no means least, is the key of proper preparation. This has two phases: (1) It concerns proper preparation on the part of the group captains and those responsible for planning the activities and programs

of the Leagues. Proper and careful planning on the part of the leaders will insure the activities of the League to be vital and interesting. On the part of the group captains, careful attention and prayerful planning will insure variety and interest in the weekly programs. In turn, this will stimulate interest, keeping the League out of the old rut that runs so easily. Hard work in preparation by each of the committees, such as the social or membership committees, will keep all the activities of the League going smoothly, and there will be no 'dead heads" in the organization. The General Officers as well should give much forethought to the work of the League as a whole; this would include special activities, such as the training of soul-winners as already mentioned. (2) The other phase of preparation concerns the individual member as he prepares for the weekly meetings, especially for the one who has a place on the program. With the dull, monotonous way most parts are read on Sunday evenings, it is no wonder our Leagues have the poor attendance they do. People do not get anything out of a part presented this way; much less do they get the "most" out of it. The truth is this: only proper preparation for the presentation of a part will bring about the realization of the League's purpose, the training of its members, which after all is, getting the most out of League.

W. N. A. C. PROJECT:

All auxiliary members: the progress being made on their special equipment project. This material, consisting of loud speakers, slide projector, movie camera, visual aid material etc. has already been ordered and much of it delivered. We would like very much to have all funds in as soon as possible so perhaps you could remind those in your auxiliary of the need so every state may share their portion in this worthwaile ministry. Bro. and Sis. Cronk will take the equipment with them back to India and they, along with all of us say-Thanks to our fine women who are making this possible.

VISION

God does not make the mountain tops to be inhabited. They are not for the homes of men. We ascend the height to catch a broader vision of the earthly surroundings, but we do not tarry there We decend to our farms, our shops, our studies, our household and other tasks. This need not be a downfall. Let life hold its true meaning and all duty becomes sacred.

Tokyo) for some "dendo" (Evangelism) work. This was our first experience with people away from Tokyo. We spent only two days in house to house visitation but that was enough to let us know that Japan still needs the gospel. About one third of the people we contacted had never heard' of the message of Christ. Another third of them knew only a little about Jesus Christ. Only a few of them were professing Christians. Some of the people seemed glad to listen to the message; others were openly opposed to the gospel. As we were telling the gospel in one house, the old lady of the house kept saying "dame desu, dame desu" (It's no good, no good). Another man said "Kikitakunai" (I don't want to listen) and shut the door in our face. The people of Japan are not receiving the gospel with open arms but here and there are those who after having heard, believe. How precious they must be in the eyes of the Lord. We praise God that He has sent us here to help find those who have gone astray. Most of the eighty million people of Japan do not know of the saving grace of Jesus Christ; many of them have never heard. Please pray for us that God will use us here in this great harvest field. Our success or failure may depend upon your faithfulness.
