

#### Our Best for Christ

Scripture Text: Mark 14:8 Rev. R. Luther Sanders Monett, Mo.

We see from the reading of this passage of Scripture that there is a great challenge extended to us to do more for Christ. Christ said of this woman in Mark 14:8 "She hath done what she could." In examining ourselves in the light of this verse we undoubtedly come to the conclusion that we have not done all that we could have done for the Lord.

This flash of ointment could have been sold for three hundred pence which was equal to about \$45.00. This was approximately a year's wages since a day's wages in those days was one penny which was equal to about 15 to 17 cents in our money today. This woman was willing to give this costly gift that Jesus might be glorified; Therefore Jesus said of her, "She hath done what she could." In order to have this said about us by the Lord there are at least three things that we must take into consideration.

The first of the three things that we are to consider is what we are to be for Christ. First of all, We must be a Christian-in other words you must be born again—for without being a Christian it is impossible to be our best for the Master. Jesus said in John 3:7 "Marvel not that I said unto thee, ye must be born again." Next we must be steadfast. I Cor. 15:58 tells us to "Be ye steadfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, for as much as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord." In this Scripture we not only have the challenge to be steadfast, but to be unmoveable, which means that we should not under any circumstances be moved by the various winds of doctrine that shall come to our ears. Not only do we find these two challenges of being "Steadfast" and "Unmoveable", but also to be fruitful or to abound in the work of the Lord. Then, too, we must be unashamed. Rom. 1:16 says, "For I am not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth, to the Jew first and also, to the Greek." And, also, the Word of God tells us in Mark 8:38 that "Whosoever therefore shall be ashamed of me and of my words in this sinful and adulterous generation; of him also shall the Son of Man be ashamed, when He cometh in the glory of His Father with the holy angels." In addition to you being a steadfast, unmoveable, and unashamed Christian, you must also be a Light

for Jesus. Jesus said in Matt. 5:16, "Let your light so shine before men that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in Heaven."

The second thing we are to observe in order to have Christ to say of us "You have done what you could" are Things to do. First of all we must Spend Much time in Prayer. We are told in I Cor. 5:17 to "Pray without ceasing." Prayer is truly the hinges on which successful Christian life must swing. It does not mean that we have to stay on our knees twenty-four hours of the day; however, there are times when we must steal away to the closet and have a season of prayer on our knees before the Lord. But we must pray without "Giving up"; Pray with importunity; pray with faith and God will give you the desire of your heart. Another thing that a successful Christian must do is to spend much time in Study. II Tim. 2:15 says, "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be a-shamed, rightly dividing the Word of Truth." Even though prayer and study are both very important they are not altogether sufficient, because we, as Christians, must Endure Hardness. Paul writing to Timothy in II Timothy 2:3 told him to "Endure hardness as a good soldier of the cross." Truly this Christian life is not always a mountain top experience because there are valleys that separates one mountain peak from another and the valleys are inevitable in going from one mountain peak to the other; nevertheless, we can be assured that the God we serve is not only the God of the mountain tops, but He is the God of the valleys as well. Paul possibly had as many valley experiences or hardships, and possibly more than the mountain top experiences; therefore, He is speaking to Timothy out of experience when he said, "Endure hardness as a good soldier of the cross."

There are not only "Things to be"

and "Things to do", but there are also things that we must give before we can have the Lord say of us, "You have done what you could." First you must give of your time, Heb. 10:25 tells us to "Forsake not the assembling of ourselves together as the manner of some is." Therefore, we see that our Lord requires that a portion of our time be spent in worshipping Him; however, it does not stop here for He requires a part of our time for the direct spreading of His Gospel and the winning of the lost to Christ. When Jesus had completed His mission here on earth, He gave the challenge of what we today call the "Great Commission" to a handful of faithful ser-

vants. This challenge was to "Go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." This would truly require that all our time be dedicated to the work of the Lord. Too many people take this challenge lightly and just give enough of their time to the Lord to measure up to the selfish standard as to what they think the Lord should require of them. If all Christians should even give the tithe (10 percent) of their time-two hours and forty minutes per day-I am sure that the world would feel the impact of "Go" in the Gospel. The Great Commission is great for at least three good reasons. First of all because it is in the Holy Bible; and because it is the words of Jesus Himself, and too, it is the last words of Jesus Christ while here on the earth. This is evidence enough that this was very close to the heart of the Lord Himself because He would not have spent the last few moments with His Apostles talking about something that was not important. If we were about to leave this world it is not likely that we would call our family together and talk about trivialities, or things of minor importance, of course not, but we would want to talk about the things that we held dearest to our hearts. This, I believe, is just what Jesus did when He gave the "Great Commission", to His apostles to go into the world and to preach the gospel

We not only have to give our full time to the Lord but the Lord also requires us to give of our money. Malachi 3:10 says, "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith saith the Lord of Host, if I will not open you the windows of Heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it." The fact that this is in the Old Testament does not make it any less the Word of God, for we find in II Timothy 3:16 "All Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness." Not only does the Lord require us to give our time and money but also To Give Our Very Lives. Romans 12:1, "I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." Therefore any demand that God may make upon your time, your pocketbook, your family, or even your life, is only a "Reasonable service." So, then, not until we do our best "To be", and "To do", and "To give" what the Lord requires of

#### O SEND OUT THY LIGHT TO AFRICA

(Editors note: This message is a continuation of Rev. Rigg's message preached at Bible Conference following trip to Africa).

Already two land grants have been given upon which to build stations, and soon an application will be made for the third site. Each station, when complete, will consist of two residences for missionaries, a dispensary building, class room, quarters for African help and necessary out buildings. The first station will begin at Coumere, and the next one will be built at Koun. Actually, if the Lord provides the funds these stations could be built simultaneous. Bro. and Mrs. Lonnie Sparks will occupy the first residence at Coumere, and the Merkh family will reside in the first house at Koun. These two stations will be about 42 miles apart and each will be responsible for approximately forty or fifty thousand people.

We also propose to build at least one station in the Northern part of the circle, in the Bouna subdivision where there are forty thousand people, but not even one Protestant church. A large plot of land was offered to us at the large center of Doropo in the heart of Lobi country. Then too, we would definitely need a station in the Western part of the circle to minister to the large tribe of Kulangos.

On one of these stations we would need to build a hospital to serve as medical center with a dispensary and a nurse on each of the others. Just where to place this hospital is a matter of definite prayer. Also the personnel for the same. We also believe that just as soon as possible we should provide at least a Primary School in connection with each station. Also Bible Schools for the training of African Christians.

Even though the field is ours, and we have outlined our strategy, it remains to be seen just how much we will accomplish in taking the Gospel Light to Africa. We are not, however, without a guide to follow. The first missionary in this Age of Grace was the Lord Jesus Christ. He is not only the first missionary, but He is the example for all Christian Missionaries, and He has established the pattern for all missionary work. This is quite clear from John 20:21, "Just as my Father sent me, I am now sending you." (Williams)

This means that the missionary today will fulfill his ministry under the conditions, methods, resources, and principles of existence that governed

the Lord Jesus in His earthly ministry. In order for us to do this we must study Christ and His pattern. In so doing we find that:

#### I. Christ Emptied Himself

When Christ came to this earth He laid aside the robes of His majesty. He had all the resources inherent in His Diety, but He did not avail Himself of them. He left the radiant glory of Heaven for the spiritual darkness of this world—A world under condemnation, a world which had Satan as its God, a world of rebellion, wickedness and death. He chose to live as a real man under the normal conditions of humanity on earth. He did not sustain or ease the weight of His own human infirmity by the exercise of His omnipotent power. He voluntarily relinquished the use of His divine powers when He was made like unto His brethren. He could have turned the stones into bread, but He did not. He could have summoned a legion of angels to His defense in the Garden of Gethsemane, but He did not. He who is the wisdom of God so limited Himself that it could be said of Him, 'Jesus increased in wisdom and stature and in favor with God and man. (Luke 2:52)

So must the missionary lay aside natural earthly glory, position, resource in his ministry. He must never rely on what he is in his humanity or has obtained in himself. Sometimes it is easy for us to boast about what we have done. Not one time did the Lord Jesus refer to His acts in creation. The missionary must not depend upon natural talent to achieve spiritual ends. Rather, he must rely upon the Holy Spirit alone. He must always remember, "That we do not wrestle against flesh and blood and that the weapons of our warfare are not carnal." If we put our trust in what we are naturally, if we rely upon our education even our Bible College education or theological education, or our talents, or human ability, then we fail to follow our Lord. And we fail to fulfill His commission to us as His missionaries.

#### II. Christ's Source of Strength

In His incarnation the Lord Jesus relinquished the use of His divine eternal power in the fulfillment of His earthly ministry. He relied upon the enabling of the Holy Spirit being subject to the will of the Father. The Christian then in his earthly ministry must relinquish reliance upon his natural human attributes and power and depend solely upon the guidance and enabling of the Holy Spirit subject to the risen and glorified Christ.

The resource of the Lord Jesus

Christ was the Holy Spirit, with whom He was endued in full measure. In Acts chapter 10 verse 48 we are told, "God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Ghost and with power, who went about doing good and healing all that were oppressed of the devil, for God was with Him." So we see that our Lord could say that He received His authority or power from God the Father and that He could do nothing by himself. That the actual words He spoke were not His own words, but were words given to Him by God. He could claim that He did not please Himself, that He did not do His own will but the will of God the Father.

It is in these terms we see the meaning of the words. He was rich but for our sakes He became poor. The Lord found it necessary to spend long hours in prayer and fasting for spiritual power and strength. He relied upon the leading, the authority, the power of the Holy Spirit as His source of strength. The servant is not greater than his Lord, or he that is sent than he that sent him. And if it is true that the Lord Jesus laid aside the exercise of the fullness of His diety and relied upon the enablement of the Holy Spirit to fulfill His ministry, in like manner this must be true of every Christian in relation to his natural ability and skill. This is true not only of the missionaries on the foreign fields, but it is true with every Christian workers even in the homeland. To day we are emphasizing special training which indeed is necessary. But may we never forget the importance of being anointed by the power of the Holy Spirit. Every Christian is called to be a missionary, a witness. He is one of those sent by God into the world to preach the Gospel. Therefore, the constant concern of the missionary and of every Christian worker must be his complete reliance upon the guidance and enablement of the Holy Spirit and his constant dread that of functioning in the energy of the flesh. Ah! My friend we need to learn this lesson and not to lean upon the arm of flesh. This, of course, is one of the very great dangers of today. Many times we forget the teaching of the first two chapters of the Apostle Paul to the Corinthians in which the Apostle repudiates the wisdom of the world. His determination was that his preaching should be in the demonstration of the power of the Holy Spirit and not in man's wisdom and ingenuity of humanity but upon the power of God. Today, I fear we place too great a reliance upon techniques, methods of our Western Civ-

#### VICTORY CELEBRATION REPORTS \$17,000

Improvment Program gifts reported and received on Victory Day, December 18, totaled a p p r o x i m a t e l y \$17,000, and pledges to be paid within one year raised the total to more than \$26,000. A goal of \$60,000 was sought to pay off the indebtedness owed on the new student loungedining hall building. The Celebration was attended by the student body, faculty, and more than 100 guests.

Dr. L. C. Johnson, College president, expressed appreciation for the

gifts already made and said that the campaign would stay open so additional gifts may be counted. Churches are encouraged to send late gifts as soon as possible and individuals are asked to use the purple envelope mailed them recently and send a personal gift for the Victory Campaign.

At the December 18 service, Dr. Johnson recognized every gift of \$50 or more to the Improvement Program since July 1956. A list of all donors of whatever size gift was presented on a bulletin board. Dr. Johnson explained to the audience, that from August 1, 1958 all gifts to the Improvement Program were credited to the \$60,000 debt retirement drive. # A Soldier Missionary

Korea

Dear Bro. Riggs:

I send you greetings from myself and the (Ambassadors for Christ) Bible Class in the name of our most blessed Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. I pray this will find you still on the firing line for Christ.

Before I came to Korea, I was pastor of Providence Free Will Baptist Church, in Columbus, Georgia. I arrived here in Korea Oct. 12th. Since my arrival, I have by God's help been doing my best to be His servant and lead others to him. Although I am limited in the amount and way of service by being in the army, I have been able to represent the Free Will Baptist denomination in presenting Christ to lost people and weak Christians by teaching the word of God through the inspiration of the Holy Spirit. At the present time I have four Bible classes a week, I have a class in the Company area on Thursday and Saturday night with an enrollment of 14. We have seen three precious souls come to Christ and plead for mercy, then shared in their great testimony of praise to God for salvation. I conduct an English speaking Bible class in Seoul, Korea at the young Nak Presbyterian Church, Sundays at 10:00 A. M. I began the class about 6 weeks ago with an attendance of 6. At present we have an attendance of 25. I pray it will continue to grow. The church is one of the largest churches in Korea with an attendance of over six thousand people. The civilian churches are badly in need of consecrated English speaking Bible teachers.

The Presbyterian Church is the strongest group here. There are missionaries from the Assembly of God, Church of Christ, Christian Science, Missionary Baptists, yet all of these and there is still a need for more. They fail to teach the reality of God's Word as it is. We need to accept this challenge and meet it with our own missionaries to Korea. There is truly a great need for Christ here. The people who accept Christ are far more serious than the average ones in our own churches. We should be concerned and all join together in prayer with our finances as well on behalf of not

only the other areas that know not Christ, but Korea also.

The unit I am with sponsor an orphanage. It is called the (Dong Chin) orphanage. There are about 75 children there, from the ages of 5-15, both boys and girls. Our Bible Class that we have in the Co. accepted it as a project and we desire the prayers of God's people everywhere in its behalf.

I have been blessed twice with the opportunity to lecture the entire outfit and turn thanks on Thanksgiving.

I am not only trying to be a soldier for my country but a missionary for God and the Free Will Baptist while I am here. If there is anything that you wish me to do or get please let me know. I pray this might help in the mission rallys there. Pray for me as I labor, for Christ here. This is my address. SFC Richard R. Meade RA13292443, 55th Sig. Co. (Repair), APO 20, San Francisco, Calif. If there is anything that you might be able to do to help this work here please let me know. Also, give me information as to how I might obtain tracts written in both English and Korean. There is also two of our class that have accepted the call to the ministry and I am doing my best to lead them to Nashville. Pray for them and myself as we serve Christ here.

## New Testament Missions

Missions is taking the gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ to people where ever they live. The born again believers we read about in the early church all had the feeling of personal responsibility for witnessing. They never went out to win arguments—but to win souls.

Whenever the gospel was preached, and souls were saved a church was organized. Then this group of bloodwashed Christians felt they must lend an arm to establish another church. Therefore, they would send workers into the next village or to the country side near by to preach and establish churches.

Of course, our first concern must be to win souls. It would be better for a church never to be organized than for it to be organized with any other purpose in mind. True believers want to share in the salvation of souls everywhere.


A New Testament church is a missionary church. The ideal plan is to give more for missions than it takes to operate the local church.

We have many channels in our denomination through which to give to missions. We have the educational institutions which are vital to our work. Eleven of our National Home Missionaries are graduates of Free Will Baptist College, as well as the Director of the work.

We have local missionary projects. We have state projects. Then we have the Nation Mission Boards, All of North America, 250,000,000 souls, is the responsibility of the National Home Mission Board. This Board is the missionary agency of your church for the spread of the gospel in Alaska, Canada, Mexico, The United States, and Old Mexico. If we fail as churches to provide funds for our missionary work, we do not fail Boards, but Christ, and souls for whom He died.

The churches we read about in the days of apostles preached the gospel to "all men"—the rich, the poor, the learned, the unlearned. We should look again at our missionary program. In many instances it is altogether too "one sided." We should love the souls of people everywhere. "Who they are," or "where they are," should not come into the picture. Our churches should give for missionary work at home and abroad.

A soul without Christ in America is as lost as one without Christ in any

other country. Our denomination will be strong only as we strengthen our missionary activity in all the world.

Missions travel on a two-way street. America must be won to Christ if the world is to be evangelized. We cannot wait till all of America is won before we give the message to the rest of the world, but we cannot neglect America as we seek to give the gospel to any portion of the world.

The major support of evangelical missions around the world comes from North America, therefore, we must undergird our missionary program by establishing new churches at home, promoting stewardship, enlisting missionaries, and winning our neighbors to Christ. The best way to gird ourselves for victorious service on the foreign field is to strengthen the home base. More churches at home means more money with which to support our other fields of service. More churches at home will mean more young men and women for our schools, and more missionaries for the home and foreign field.

The New Testament church believers did not look over the fields, but rather "on them." Our work in the United States remains "spoted," that is we have hundreds of miles from one church to another in many instances. We only have work in one city out of five. We have looked over the fields.

The following quotation from the fifty-second annual report of the Free Will Baptist Home Mission Board given at Boston in 1886 to the Old General Conference, still is true today.

"Thousands of our young people have gone in the past from their country homes and churches to be lost from us for the reason that

when they went to the city they could not find the people of their choice and have sought homes in other folds."

There is an alarming tendency in our connection at this time to use home mission money in the bounds of our already established and strong work. If this continues, it will mean that the state with Free Will Baptist strength will continue to increase, but it will also mean that where the work is most needed, there will be no finances with which to send workers, or organize churches. We must increase our support of the National Home Mission program if we are to get churches in new areas. In other words, the strong conferences, and churches, must help in establishing churches in places, other than their own cities, or districts, if we are to see the denomination grow and develop in all sections of North America.

I feel that if God wants me to go to the field only He can heal and lead me out in His own time. My husband is a real born again Christian who loves the Lord's work and is the one who is in charge of the maintenance dept. here at the mission hospital.

I'm so lonesome for dear friends from school and would love to know where they are and want to do my part in praying for them.

# Down Mexico Way

The challenge of Mexico, here on the Arizona border, is a great one. Sometimes we feel like we are trying to fill an ocean of sin with one or two pebbles at a time of the love of God—but we are made to realize that His love, and His grace are sufficient. It is He who gives the increase, and it is He to whom the increase belongs. Our duty is only to work while there is still day.

We are located in Nogales, Arizona, which is a border town, and one of the best gateways into Mexico. Our headquarters, church, and school, the Nogales Academy, is just one mile from the gate into Mexico. The building, which serves all these functions is a former Dairy Queen building with a coffee shop. It has 6 rooms, but some are quite small, and some are oddly shaped.

We use the former customer room, 4 ft. wide by 15 ft. long for an office. We use the former ice cream room for a library and clothing storage room. Actually there is no storage of clothing, but we have bins where the clothes may be sorted for size and kind. The former kitchen is used as a kitchen and dining room in which to feed the children. It is also used as our audiovisual room.

The former coffee shop is 15 ft. wide by about 35 ft. long, and is our assembly room for the Academy, as well as being the class room where Rev. & Mrs. Elliston have 28 students in 3 classes. On Sundays it is the auditorium, as well as the class-room for Miss Yeley's adult Sunday School class. Every morning the entire student body of the Academy assembles here for devotions before going to class.

We have two other small rooms (about 9ft. x 12ft.) where Miss Barker and Miss Yeley have their classes. Miss Yeley has 17 students in the 1st & 2nd grades in one of these rooms, while Miss Barker has 8 students in the 3rd & 4th in the other. Yes, we're rather crowded. In fact, if I didn't see it every day I wouldn't believe it. Help us pray that God will provide better facilities soon. For this building we pay \$100.00 per month.

Our 54 students live in Mexico, coming back and forth every day on regular border crossing passes, except for 3 students. Of these 3, 2 are Mexicans who live on this side, and the other is our own Mary Bell Elliston, age 10, in the 6th grade.

Our Sunday School is also composed of Mexicans who live in Mexico, and who have crossing cards, who come over for services each Sunday. We have over 100 of them on our Sunday School roll. During October, we averaged 61 present in Sunday School. On November 23rd, we set a new record with 89 present. Except for the 3 Ellistons, Miss Yeley, Miss Barker, and one missionary family, the Yardy's, all come from Mexico. Many must come 2½ or 3 miles to get to the line.

On November 16th, 4½ inches of snow fell in 11 degree weather, but 25 faithful persons came to Sunday School. One family walked 2 miles in the snowstorm with their baby, to keep up their perfect attendance. So far in November 15 persons have made professions in our services. This includes Bible Clubs and jail services held in Mexico.

In October we distributed clothing to over 200 families, and November will see a much greater distribution of clothing. In the accompanying picture, many of you can see some of the clothes you sent, for practically every garment in the picture arrived in a mission box from somewhere.

We wish to thank those of Missouri who have been such wonderful help. The story is told of a loaf of bread that fell from a baker's basket. When it hit the pavement, a crumb broke off and lay beside it. Almost instantly, three sparrows made a swoop for the crumb, and when the contest was over, two of the birds flew away without a bite while the other carried off a meager breakfast.

The loaf was untouched in the frenzy. Only the crumb had seemed a worthwhile prize to the birds.

Just a little wider range of vision, and a little less greed, and each bird could have been more than satisfied.

The moral is plain. Men, like birds, quarrel over trivialities, and in the heat of doing so let life's bigger, more lucrative prizes escape them unnoticed.

# Auxiliary Woman's

#### THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

The hope is that this article will serve a two-fold purpose: First, that it may serve as a clearing house in which the woman's place in the church can be, at least somewhat, clarified, and second, to set forth the true aim and purpose of the woman's auxiliary.

The writer has only one purpose in mind, and that is to witness to the amazing grace of God that is found in the Person of God's Son, Jesus Christ. He is more to be desired than all the world or its riches.

Jesus accepted and blessed services of women:

1. Members of His "Evangelistic Party" (Luke 8:1-3)

2. Used women to teach His disciples a lesson (Luke 7:37-50)

3. Love gift commended (Mark 14:3-9)

4. Women anointed Him for burial

(John 12:3-7)

5. Women watched Him on the cross and followed Him to the grave (Luke 23:26-28, 49, 55)

Position of women in New Testament churches:

1. Received by Holy Spirit on Pentecost (Acts 1:13, 14, 2:1-4)

2. Faithful under persecution (Acts 22:4)

3. Recognized as fellow helpers (Phil. 4:3)

Since the Word does not change even with the passing of time nor with the changing fads and fancies of succeeding generations, I believe the above Scriptures are still applicable. Moreover, I believe the pattern of service as outlined here is still a good pattern for our present day Christian women to follow.

I believe the women of our churches have a definite place in the church program. I think the time has come for that place to be identified.

Notice please, the places these Biblical women filled, the types of services they rendered, and the spirit in which these services were rendered. They filled places that were peculiar to women then and now, that is, places of service where a woman's talents could be used for the greatest good.

He also used their quick perception, their ardent affection and capacity for the sublime. God has endowed woman with these natural talents and to Him be all the praise, honor, and glory for all them. God wills for women to be tender-hearted, kind, affectionate,

long suffering, full of faith and good works. Furthermore, God wills that these qualities find expression to those in their homes and in their churches through the channels of motherhood, home-making, teachers of Truth, examples of prayer and piety. (Prov. 31: 10-31)

I cannot find one instance where women of the Bible did the men's work either in the home or church. Neither can I believe that God intends for women to do men's work today such as building or furnishing churches, etc. Women do not have the strength nor wisdom for such work. Their strength is in their hearts.

In the past, while it was never the intention of the auxiliary founders, but perhaps because of a lack of men to carry the load, or, because there was a dearth of consecration in the men who were members, women did much to initiate and sustain the churches programs. And praise the Lord for every woman who gave her all to propagate the gospel of Christ. In some instances, I fear, many churches would have closed their doors had it not been for the devotion to Christ of its women members. Even today, there still are not enough men with strong, virile faith in God who will assume their rightful leadership obligations, but it is not true to the extent it was in the past. Through the auxiliary, the women's services can be directed into the channels for which they are especially fitted.

The aim and purpose of the auxiliary is to help our churches teach and support missions and to impart missionary education to our young peo-

The auxiliary has five departments of work through which she endeavors to accomplish their aims and purposes. Let's examine each department briefly.

The auxiliary purposes to interest and enlist every woman in the church in this undertaking, so it has the Enlistment Department.

Because we believe that in order to continue the task of winning the world to Christ, young people must be enlisted and trained, the auxiliary lays great stress on its Youth Department. Without young people to carry the message, the task would reach a bottleneck. The task of missions demands the strength of youth, so the auxiliary aims to impart missionary education to the youth of our churches. Can you think of anyone who should be better qualified for this teaching than mothers?

Basic to carrying out the Great Commission is knowledge not only of the message, but where to tell it. Someone has said that the Bible tells us God's plan for the redemption of mankind; mission study tells us how far we have progressed with the plan. This is the reason for the Study Course Department.

Without prayer, missions becomes only a task without power; with prayer, missions becomes a direct, vital link with God and world evangelization Travailing prayer is a woman's forte'. God so ordained women to be peculiarly fitted for this glorious service. Prayer has sent out, equipped, and supported missionaries all over the world. Prayer has opened doors that no other force could have ever opened. With out prayer there is no advance in missions, so there are three special weeks of prayer sponsored during the year besides the daily prayer hour to undergird the work. The Convention makes available a yearly program book in which these aims are stressed. This is the Program-Prayer Department.

Coupled with prayer is the dedicated convention that we will never be better pray-ers than we are pay-ers, so the auxiliary devotes time and place to teaching Christian stewardship.

Finally, the auxiliary tries to practice the above principles by telling people everywhere how to be saved and begins the task at her own doors through the Personal Service Department.
