A Costly Hair Cut

Scripture Reading, Judges, chapter 16

Text: "And she made him sleep upon her knees; and she called for a man, and she caused him to shave off the seven locks of his head; and she began to afflict him, and his strength went from him."

Samson's life presents us with an enigma. Was there ever one with a character like that of Samson? Perhaps there has never been one with exactly the same pattern of character as Samson, but there are those today, no doubt, who resemble him in his character too much. But in spite of Samson's fickleness, unstableness; in spite of all his faults, God used him in the restruction of many of the enemies of God and of His people.

Samson was endued with supernatural strength. No other man has ever possessed the physical strength which he had. But it was given for a purpose. His physical strength was given him that, with that strength, he might honor God in the destruction of the enemies of God's people. It will be well if you will begin reading at chapter 13, verse 2 and read his history from his birth till his death. Note that he was supernaturally conceived: the Lord brought him into the world for the accomplishment of a certain purpose, and though Samson's character was a riddle the Lord accomplished His purpose through him.

He was to be a Nazarite from the womb to the day of his death. His long hair was the sign of his Nazarite vow. His strength did not lay in his hair as so many, perhaps, think, but his strength was in God; God's presence would be with him in all places, and under all conditions, and at all times so long as he was faithful to his vow as a Nazarite.

Let us study thoughtfully and prayerfully the act of disobedience which Samson committed, seeking to make a personal application to our own lives in the service of God. Let us observe—

I. Samson Didn't Need a Hair Cut.

Why did not Samson need a hair cut? His hair was long. It was contrary to the custom of his time for men to wear long hair as Samson wore his hair. With his long hair he would be oddly different from his associates from all other men. It would, no doubt, cause him to be stigmatized; cause him to be a gazing stock and a laughter stock to others. Why should he be thus different from other men? Well, that is just the point. Remember he was a Nazarite; he was to be different from others. He was set apart for a special work, and his long hair was his mark of identification as a specially called person. To have shaved, or cut off his locks would have rendered him like others of the world, but he was not like the world. We, as God's children, are to be different from the world; there must be something about us that marks us as not being like others of the world. When we give up our separation from the world, we like Samson, give up much else. No, contrary to all appearances, Samson did not need a hair cut.

II. His Long Hair Was the Sign of a Solemn and Sacred Vow.

This has already been intimated. Samson had been called of God for a special and sacred and solemn task. or work. To fulfill this work he would need to have great strength. And, on condition that he would sacredly honor his vow, God would be his strength. As before stated, his strength did not lay in his hair; his strength was in God who miraculously brought him into the world in answer, no doubt, to many earnest, fervent prayers by his mother. Because she was childless she was the object of much derision by other women in her day. The Lord graciously removed the occasion of her derision. gave her a son who was to be wholly dedicated to the Lord.

III. Samson Got a Hair Cut.

Samson very foolishly married a worldly-wise woman. His marriage to this wicked woman was the scheme of Satan to destroy the usefulness of Samson. Now he plans how to destroy our usefulness. If he can get us, like Samson, to give up our separation from the world and our consecration and dedication to God he has accomplished his purpose. He knows he cannot touch our lives; he cannot cause one to lose the Salvation of the Lord. but he may, if we permit it, cause us to lose the godly influence with men that we should have to serve the Lord's purpose in our lives. Samson went to sleep in the lap of Delilah; believers sometimes go to sleep, as it were, in the lap of the world; then get their hair cut. When Delilah saw that Samson had revealed all to her, she quickly called a man who cut off his locks. Then she awakened him; he shook himself as he had done before; he was unconscious that his strength was gone till he did this, but he now finds himself a weakling.

IV. Samson's Hair Cut Was A Costly

Samson awoke and found to his sorrow that his strength was gone. Have you ever awakened to find that your strength as a Christian was gone? If so, you can realize the sorrow that then possessed the heart of Samson. Sometimes we are made to believe that just a little indulgence in worldly things will not cause any injury or harm, but when we have indulged we find to our sorrow and hurt that it was a costly indulgence. What did Samson's hair cut cost him? Note—

1. It cost him the presence of God. See last clause of verse 20. "And he wist not that his strength was gone.' Perhaps Lot never realized that the Lord had departed from him until he tried to persuade his loved ones to leave Sodom; he found then that he was as one who mocked. Lot's hair cut, spiritually speaking, was a costly one. In a spiritual sense, Christians sometimes have their hair cut; it is surreptitiously done while they go to sleep on the lap of Delilah—the world. When they awake they find, like Samson, that the Lord has departed from them, and they are weak as other men. Remember, dear believer, that your spiritual hair cut will cost you the presence of the Lord.


2. Samson's hair cut cost him his liberty. He was bound, his eyes were put out, and he ground at the mill. Here we see that sin is binding, blinding, and grinding. Many Christians have had their hair cut, then found to their sorrow the binding, blinding, and grinding effect of sin, even in the life of a child of God. Don't go to sleep on the lap of the world and get your hair cut—lose your good influence with men.

3. Samson's hair cut cost him afflictions. Think of having his eyes put out. This was sore affliction. The grinding at the mill was a great affliction. Day in and day out he had to tread the mill. Have you ever tread the devil's mill? If so you realize how turning from God can bring sorrow and affliction and trouble; it is a miserable condition, isn't it?

4. It cost him his life. Had Samson been faithful to his vow to the Lord he would not have met the death he did. His days were cut short as well as his hair. Do you realize, dear Christian, that you may shorten your own life by your disobedience to the will of the Lord? Avoid these spiritual hair cuts; they are very costly. When you have had such a hair cut your life will be filled with affliction, sorrow, and your testimony will be unavailing; it will be as that of Lot; you will be as one who mocks.

V. Samson's Death.

When Samson realized his awful mistake; when he realized that the (Continued on Page 4)

(Continued from Page 3) Philistines would now make great sport of him as they planned to do as they made a great feast to Dagon, their god, he confessed his sin to God and prayed that he might, even in his death, glorify God. See the poor man as he was placed in the temple where all could make sport of him, but also see him as he rededicated his life to God and he asked the lad who was leading him to place his hands on the great pillars of the temple. His hair was growing again; the Lord gave him great strength, and he surged against the pillars and the great temple of Dagon fell; and great was the fall of it. Samson killed more men in his death than in his life.

If you have had your hair cut, confess to God, rededicate yourself to Him and God will yet use you to the tearing down of the strongholds of Satan and sin.

COME BACK

The second step as we go up the ladder is prayer. First humbleness, then prayer. Prayer is talking with God in earnest about the way in which the church is going, and asking God's help in bringing unsaved souls to church. There is no problem too big, or no question too tough that God can't solve if we ask him. We have the promise from God: "and him that cometh to me I will in no wise cast out."

Prayer is a big factor in the life of a Christian. Christ tells us that when we pray to always put God first. If we pray for our pastor we will have a good pastor, who is inspired by the Word of God. If we pray for our church we will have a good church as well as a big church full of Christians, instead, which I am sorry to say, of having a big church full of hypocrites which so many of our churches round about are such, churches full of cold, lifeless people who have backslidden and are on their road to hell.

You can go to a great many churches, and what do you see? A group of people playing church. That's what you see! God forbid that man has stooped so low that they can't see an inch beyond their noses, that if they will take hold of the almighty hand of God they can be lifted out. We have read in our papers about our churches having their doors closed by one of two ways, either by the law or by the devil. Either they have gotten into a fight and the only way it can be stopped is for the law to take over, or else the church has gone so far out on the road of sin that the devil has taken over. A prayerless church is a dead church. It is a church that has gone so far that only a good hot fire kindled by the power of God, or a good hot cup of coffee brewed from the very words of the Scriptures can warm it up.

God has promised: "For where two or three are gathered together in my name there am I in the midst of them." I say to you that there is more to a prayer than just getting down on our knees and saying a long prayer, and there is more to shouting than just screaming to the top of our lungs. I have heard prayers that just consist of a few words which brought the Spirit of God down on a revival. Also the time to shout is when you've got salvation that you know that you have. Then you can see your loved ones come to an old altar of prayer

and be saved. That is the time to shout the praises of God.

A true story goes like this: A certain preacher (I know him very well) was pastor of a church and there was two boys, who when the invitation was given would run out the door. In this same church was this man's wife, who as they ran out the door, would begin shouting. The church happened to be in a revival meeting and when the husband and sons ran out the door and the wife began shouting, this pastor walked over and called her by name and asked, "What have you to shout about? Your husband and boys have just run out the door. You need to be down on your knees praying for your loved ones that they will be saved, then you will have something to shout about.'

So prayer as well as shouting is to come from heaven and along with it there is to come a blessing. Prayer is the back bone of a church. Without it, it becomes "as sounding brass, or a tinkling cymbal."

Jacob and Bethel

"Arise go up to Bethel and dwell there: and make there an altar unto God". (Genesis 35:1)

Jacob was in trouble again and as he told Pharaoh when he was 130 years old: "The day of the years of my pilgrimage are an hundred and thirty years: Few and evil have the days of the years of my life been". But through it all God dealt with him.

Now his only daughter had gotten into trouble. She "went out to see the daughters of the land." Many mothers should ponder these words!

Simeon and Levi, Dinah's brothers, took trouble vengeance which caused serious trouble to Jacob. So Jacob gave orders to his house, and told them, "Put away the strange gods that are among you, and be clean, and change your garments." A clean case of a new start. A cleaning-up. Put away evil. Be clean. Put on a new robe and we will go to Bethel, where God "answered me in the day of my distress."

Now Jacob and all his household went up to Bethel, and at this point let me digress. Satan has a new "dodge" now. When you ask some people to come to your church the excuse is: Too many kinsfolk. Here went Jacob up to Bethel taking his kinsfolk. Now Bethel was where he slept on his way from home, running from Esau, who had threatened to kill him.

In Genesis 28, we see God's Church typified on earth. Jacob said in verse 22, "This stone which I have set up for a pillar shall be God's house." Bethel means "The House of God".

Now here Jacob is with his family, worshipping. How many times we read where God said, "Come thou and thy house." In Genesis 7:1 we read, "Come thou and all thy house into thy ark." All the sacrifices of the Israelites were to be observed by all of the household.

The first European Church started by Paul had a fine woman whose heart the Lord had opened. Her household was baptized with her, and this became a great church at Philippi. (Acts 16) We see all through the Scriptures where God wanted the people to teach their children to walk in His ways.

Well Jacob obeyed God and no one bothered him on his journey, and when he came to Bethel, he worshipped God. There he built an altar and God talked to him, re-naming him

Israel, meaning, a prince, or one who who prevailed with God. (Gen. 32: 28) And God gave Jacob gracious promises.

Why didn't he dwell there as God told him? Just again, doing as he pleased. But they journeyed from Bethel and Rachel, Jacob's beloved wife died. The worst blow of all! "And it came to pass, as her soul was in departing (for she died) she called his name Benoni". All soul sleepers take heed! Her soul left her bodydeparted.

On Jacob journeyed. His eldest son Reuben committed a vile sin which brought a curse on him. Oh, Reuben, how you paid for it! On Jacob went and he and Esau buried their father. Jacob's sons did evil in the sight of God, and only Joseph and Benjamin did right.

When Joseph was sold into Egypt, Jacob was told he was dead, "I will go down into the grave unto my mourning." (Gen. 37:35) But if Jacob had lived at Bethel with his family as God told him, none of these terrible things would have come upon him. What a "kinsfolk church" he could have had!

Mrs. Thomas, the only daughter of Orville and Emma Cassatt, both deceased, was born March 28, 1898 near Liberal and passed away following an illness of only two days.

She was at the Hannon church Wednesday afternon, February 4th, conductng the adult auxiliary services when she was suddenly stricken and soon became unconscious. She was rushed to the hospital where she never regained consciousness or recognized any of her family who were soon at her bedside.

Sister Thomas was converted when very young durng a revival at the Verdella Free Will Baptist church. She

united with the church and as a young girl was a faithful member for several years. After her marriage to Ross R. Thomas, August 23, 1919 at Iantha, she united with the Hannon church with her husband and was a faithful and untiring worker in every department of the church work.

Sister Thomas felt the divine call to the ministry and after much prayer she answered the call and was ordained at Hannon during one of the years that Rev. Davis was pastor of the church 26 years ago.

HAWAII

Anyone born in Hawaii is automatically a full-fledged American citizen. A boy born in Hawaii is eligible to become President of the United States. The population is 554,000 which is more than the population of Alaska, or Delaware, or Nevada, or Vermont, or Wyoming. It has more people than any previous territory admitted to the Union except Oklahoma.

Hawaii consists of seven major islands, and dozens of smaller ones, out of each hundred people you will find: 38 Japanese; 3 Native Hawaiians; 15 Part Hawaiians; 20 White People; 13 Filipinos; 7 Chinese; 2 Puerto Ricans; 1 Korean and 1 from other parts of the world.

The literacy rate is very high. Medical services are top-notch and the general health is the same. The Americans who settled in Hawaii came from the New England States, therefore Honolulu is basically a new England community. Life is much more like Boston than San Francisco. Young people in Hawaii speak only English.

The need for Free Will Baptist work in Hawaii is the same as the need in all parts of the world.

I will conduct myself in such a way that I shall not be ashamed to tell them all about my private life; such as, with whom and where I go, and what I do on my dates. I will further honor them by being home at a reasonable hour unless on special occasions I have their permission to stay out later, and if I am unable to return home at the appointed time I will call them and explain why.

8. I will take my pastor or some other capable spiritual advisor into my confidence and will consult with them when necessary about my spiritual, moral and emotional problems.

9. I shall, to the best of my judgement, always do right in relation to my God and my fellowman regardless of what it will cost me or anyone else.

10. I will be considerate of the rights and property of others, especially my elders, and will endeavor to contribute more to the welfare and happiness of others than I shall demand or expect for myself.

SHALL WE CONTINUE TO PERMIT LIQUOR ADVERTISING?

Advertising is the life blood of commerce. Especially is this true of the liquor business. As alcoholic liquors have no inherent worth to the body, the taste, the habit and use must be built up, established and cultivated this is the function of advertising so far as liquor is concerned.

Advertising has come to be big business in the United States. The advertising of alcoholic liquors has reached the astounding total of \$400 million dollars per year.

Has it paid off?

The dollar expenditure for alcoholic liquors says so. The first full year of repeal, 1934, the expenditure was a bit over two billion dollars, it has now gone to ten and one-half billion dollars per year. That is 4 and one half percent of the expendable income of the people. Let us transfer that to the channels of beneficial businesses and see what would have happened. Where would it go?

\$1,200,000,000 would have gone for food.

\$1,000,000,000 would have gone for clothing.

\$3,000,000,000 would have gone for household operations.

\$450,000,000 would have gone for used cars.

\$438,000,000 would have gone for new cars.

\$435,000,000 would have gone to pay rent.

\$192,000,000 would have gone to the doctor.

\$404,000,000 would have gone for additional recreation.

\$55,000,000 would have gone into private education and research.

\$59,000,000 additional for church and charity.

\$283,000,000 for additional new homes.

From 1933 to 1953 one hundred and thirty one billion dollars went for liquor. With this annual expenditure we could have built 4,400,000 new homes at \$10,000 each, bought 10, 000,000 new automobiles at \$2,000 each, and started 25,000,000 savings accounts of \$1,500 each.

You know as well as I do that this country would have been better off if this 10 billion dollars spent for liquor each year, with the liquor it bought, had been dumped in the Atlantic Ocean.

This is something for men to think about. Here is something for members of the Missionary Union to think about also. This annual expenditure for alcoholic liquors would keep 4,098 missionaries on the field at present salaries for 2,000 years.

REV. ROLLA D. SMITH VISITS CUBA

Rev. Rolla D. Smith, pastor of the Fellowship Free Will Baptist Church in Flat River, returned recently from the island of Cuba, where he had spent nine days. Rev. Smith serves on the board of foreign missions of the National Association of Free Will Baptists. His chief mission in going to Cuba was to visit the work of his church on the island and to assist the director of missions, Rev. Thomas Willey, in making plans for the extension of missionary activity in Cuba.

Smith's itinerary began in Havana on January 28. There he spoke at a conference of the native pastors, Christian workers and American missionary personnel. Other towns in which he preached were Jaruco, Jibacoa, Ganasi, Matanzas, San Jose, San Francisco, La Lima, Matahambre, Pinar del Rion, and Vinales. He also spoke at the Free Will Baptist Seminary near Pinar del Rio and in one rural church and visited several mission points. Other towns in which he visited with the native pastor but did not have services were Peru, Guinies, San Juan, Les Martinas and La Emperanza.

Smith preached three times in the prison at Pinar del Rio to a total of 400 prisoners. These were the accused criminals from Batista's army. According to information received at the prison, it is expected that 83 percent of the men will be released after trials. Some will receive prison sentences and others will face the firing squad. Already twelve have been executed at Pinar del Rio, the capitol of Pinar province.

Smith also visited the Union Theological Seminary at Matanzes and talked with the president of the Seminary, Alfonso Roduiques, who is credited with saving the life of Fidel Castro. A group were planning to kill Castro upon his arrival in Havana after the rebel victory, but were persuaded by Roduiques to give up their plans to kill the revolutionary here.

Thou that hast given so much to us, give one thing more . . . a grateful heart.

DIFFICULTIES IN SPAIN by Mario Cignoni

The Rev. Raymond Riggs:

Many thanks indeed for your letter dated January 3rd, with enclosed cheque covering the amount of \$150. 00, for which we are very grateful to you.

With respect to our missionary work I must say that despite of the difficulties caused to us by church and civil authorities, we are making headway under the blessing of the Lord. During the year 1958 the Lord granted us the joy of baptizing five souls converted to the Lord, in addition to other five precious souls who gave their testimony of having received Christ as their personal Saviour, and there are many more that came to our Gospel Hall to listen to the Gospel of salvation and eternal life in Jesus Christ.

We are still being watched constantly by both church and civil authorities, which supervise all what we are doing for the Lord. But we are not afraid in the least and always try to avail ourselves of all opportunities of making the Love of God known to the souls, such as revealed in the Holy Scriptures and in the Person of the Lord Jesus Christ.

During the whole month of December and the first fortnight of January we displayed an intense activity, since we had convened special meetings on which we were very glad to enjoy a pretty good attendance; praise the Lord! The seed of the glorious Gospel has been sown into the hearts; now let the Lord give growth to the seed, to produce fruit. We only know that souls were thoroughly interested in our Christian faith and that we have been able to spread tracts, New Testaments and in many cases, to sell complete Bibles to those who have shown a keen interest in possessing one.

Our work among the many people living in hovels is still going on, but with a great deal of difficulties, and work is the longer the more hard due to the low level of morality among those people addicted to all sorts of vice. We thank God for all the souls we were able to lead to the foot of the cross of Christ, and so we endeavor to bring other souls to the same place. You know those hovels were situated close to the sea side, but now many of them have been destroyed by the stormy billows of the sea. Among a great number of families bereft of their homes, there is one sister of our church, whose "home" was completely destroyed by the water. We tried to help her as much as we could, but owing to the serious housing problem she is still left without a home of her own.

Since here in Spain we do not have any means, many problems are to be solved. We don't have homes for our old people abandoned by their relatives who do not profess Christian faith. Therefore they are reluctantly entering Roman-Catholic institutions, which would mean something like denying their Christian faith. Our young people cannot get married, since civil marriage is not allowed in Spain: they should be married by a Roman-Catholic priest!. We are not allowed to have Christian schools, and our children are obligated to attend schools where lessons of Roman-Catholic doctrine are compulsory. Protestants will never be allowed to occupy any post in the service of the Spanish State. When joining the forces they are obligated to attend mass, while they will never be allowed to achieve any military rank. In Spain there is still prohibition of publishing and spreading Bibles. We are not entitled to have any Christian literature printed and issued, whilst soul-winning is severly punished, and Protestant Churches are closed by Roman-Catholic authorities and public worhip is not allowed. . . .

For the time being about twenty Protestant churches remain closed by order of the authorities, for the only delict of not being in possession of an official permit from the authorities, and because churches are found to be guilty of proselytism. In this respect all Spanish Protestant churches are charged with the same guilt of proselytism, since our very first mission is teaching people in accordance with our Lord's Commandments. For this reason every Spanish Protestant Church remains in obeyance of being closed as well.

For all this we are depending on God only, and only by the virtue of prayer constantly offered by God's flock we shall be able to pursue our missionary endeavour. Here in Spain we shall have a national Day of Prayer on February 8th, when all believers shall lift their voices to the throne of Grace of our God, considering the difficult situation in which we are plunged. And the 19th of March is expected to be a World Prayer Day in behalf of the Spanish Christians.

Our warmest thanks to all brethren in Christ who pray for us!

One of the most glorious days in history of work was December 21st when we baptized twenty individuals. A young lad of 14 came with his parents begging us to baptize him. After discussion and talking with the lad (Mr. Merriweather actually dealt with him), we felt he knew Christ as his Saviour. His face was aglow with the joy that was in his heart. He comes from our Gopalapuram work and each time I have seen him since the baptism he has told me "My heart is full of the joy of the Lord". On the day of the baptism, one of our deacons (Jacob Wilson-Raj's father) came up to me and with tears of joy welling up into his eyes he said "Oh what a glad, glad day-praise the Lord. We have never seen it like this in our mission before". Well, we give all the glory and praise to the One to whom it belongs and the One who deserves it. We could work all our life and unless the Lord came in and used it, it would avail nothing. We shall never, never forget the glory of Dec. 21st.

There is such a moving in our midst that it is not possible for us to answer all the calls. We respond to invitations coming in beseeching us to come for prayer and fellowship as much as possible; however, it is not always possible for us to go in response to all invitations. Do pray for us. We expect more help the first of the month at which time we are planning to open up 13 Bible Study centers. (1 for young people, 2 for children and 10 for women). In addition to this we are going to organize 4 more new Sunday Schools. We need your prayers.

Our Watch Night Service was lovely —even better than last year. Our hearts were stirred by Pastor Dorairaj's message on I Sam. 7:12 and II Cor. 1:10 just before midnight. And just as the clock struck the midnight hour we were on our faces before God, asking Him to cleanse us anew and empower us for the New Year of 1959. Then at about 12:10 A. M. our Bro. Wilson-Raj challenged our hearts with Deut. 28:1-14. Our hearts were warmed anew as Wilson-Raj held before us God's blessings if we would only obey Him.

And the New Year's Service was precious. Strangely enough our pastor, Bro. Dorairaj, brought the New Year's message on obedience, Deut. 11:26-28. Well, the blessings of that day were numerous, as well as the services.

After that we had to return to Kotagiri for an eight o'clock service. I think it was around 10:00 that night when I ate and finished everything and retired. Tired? Yes! But it was a happy tiredness. My honest and sincere opinion regarding the work here is still the same as I wrote you before. The work should be headed up by a man. Oh yes, the Lord uses despised things such as we women but the work has so expanded in this last year that more and more I believe God wants a man to take charge of the work. May He raise up His choice.

DAN MERKH WRITES OF PROGRESS ON CO-LABORER STATION!

We are well into the building program of the Co-Laborer Station. Please be much in prayer as we continue. We have been working during the past month on the blocks. We have a little hand-block machine and five men are working continually making blocks. We have at present 1094 blocks made. The work is slow and sometimes difficult. We have to dig our gravel by hand, sift it and wash it by hand, then haul it 10 km. to the site. The truck expenses have been about \$3.00 or more each day. Water must be hauled from another 10 km. in another direction. Fortunately the sand is just across the road. And the Lord arranged a

good "deal" in our cement. We are saving from \$5.00 to \$10.00 a ton on the price and getting it delivered here to Goumere. My father-in-law, who made up plans for our sketches, etc., wrote and said that the plans for the house are in the mail. We drew up the rough plans and sent them to him for his advice and to have blueprints made. As soon as we receive the prints, we will begin the actual construction. I shall do my best to get some pictures as we go along so that you can have the "history" of the Co-Laborer Station.

Beth is home from school. We got her in Abidjan on the 19th of December and her time is just about up. We do not know when she is to return, but are awaiting word from her school. She seems to like school very much and talks much about her new Uncle and Aunt, but has been rather moody lately as she realizes she will soon leave until June. The Lord is able, and we thank Him for His nearness. The boys are still "all boys" but now they have plenty of room to be boys. We try to keep an eye on them and keep them as near the house as possible. We are surrounded by poisonous snakes and we have killed as high as five in one week. Hardly does a week go by that we don't kill or see a snake. The kids have a swing, a sand box, a half-finished see-saw and a little tent out back, so they have more than they ever had in the States and seem happy and are well adjusted to their new life.

Thank you very much for the gifts that have been sent through your office for our account. If there are individuals that we could write to, please let us know and we shall do so. We do appreciate very much the support that we have received from various auxiliaries around the denomination. For example, during December we received two gifts from your office, \$43.80 from the G. T. A.'s from Hyde Park in Norfolk for Beth's transportation, and the month before that a Christmas gift for Beth from Oaklawn, Pleasant View, Tenn. Nearly each month we hear from some auxiliary. The month before that, or October, we received gifts from auxiliaries in Lowland, North Carolina and Bethany Church, in North Carolina and Bethany Church, in North Carolina. And so it goes, nearly each month. May God continue to richly bless you as you continue to lead our women in Mission Stewardship.

Please give our fondest Christian love to the folks there. Continue to remember us in your prayers. We stand in need.

Statement on

Stewardship

Issued by the Executive Committee

Over the past few years there has arisen within our brotherhood a divisive spirit which seems to have its roots in what method or methods should be used in supporting the Lord's work through our denominational program. One stoutly contends that his method is best and another as earnestly pleads for his method.

And in the midst of the hue and cry we have overlooked one vital pointthere are hundreds of churches that are failing completely to fulfill their denominational stewardship responsibilities. Hundreds of churches give nothing to carry on the great worldwide ministry of our denomination and many others are giving only a fraction of what they could and should give. While well-meaning people on both sides have argued the merits and demerits of the ways of supporting, many churches have lost God's blessings by failing to support in any way. Some of these may have become confused or discouraged by the apparent disunity.

So for reasons we issue this statement and make this plea: for denominational unity, first of all; for adequate support of every denominational agency, and for a broad base of support in which every Free Will Baptist church will have a share.

We plead for a revival of stewardship in the hearts of our people and in the churches that will transcend our disagreement over methods. What we do is far more important than how we do it. A church has the privilege of deciding the method it will use for support—this is a matter of choice but whether or not to support cannot be left to question. The Bible admonishes all Christians to exercise the grace of giving. Paul said the exercising of this grace is proof of Christian love.

In view of the urgent international situation, the spread of godless communism, and what we believe to be the soon coming of the Lord, we urge all pastors and laymen to take positive steps to enlist their churches in regular and generous giving. And yet this necessity itself should not be the sole factor that motivates the churches to be good stewards. We give because God gave and continues to give —the love of Christ must constrain us.

We believe that every agency and board established by the National Association is worthy and is an important member of our world-wide team. None of them should be lacking in the necessary funds to take advantage of every spiritual opportunity opened by our Lord. Every church should give regular support to every agency. This is a family responsibility which the churches as the members of the Free Will Baptist family must assume.

Again we emphasize—the vital point must be in the doing and not the method.

Each church may choose its ownmethod. If they want counsel or help, let them contact any of the associational officers in the district, state or national association. We list here for information some of the ways by which a church may support the denominational agencies:

1. It may set up its own system of designated giving whereby every state and national agency is included for a specified percentage or amount on a regular basis.

2. It may send regular undesignated contributions through the Cooperative Plan of Support (many churches begin by sending a minimum of ten per cent of their offerings), 3801 Richland Ave., Nashville 5, Tenn., where all offerings are allocated as follows:

Foreign Missions—30 percent Home Missions—15 percent Executive Dept.—24 percent Bible College—20 percent Sunday School Dept.—5 percent Superannuation—3 percent

Free Will Baptist League-3 percent

3. It may send a regular contribution through the Cooperative Plan of Support and then make special offerings to the various agencies according to the ability of the church and the need of the agency.

4. Offerings may be sent through the district or state treasurer, or they may be sent directly to the National Association.

In order to assist the churches in determining the needs of the national program for 1959, we list the budgets for the various agencies:

Superannuation—\$20,000 Home Missions—63,720 Foreign Missions—204,680 Sunday School Dept.—67,500 Free Will Baptist League—8,000 Executive Dept.—28,540 Bible College—183,700 Total Budget—\$576,140

Since we have a reported membership of 184,287, to raise this budget will require per capita giving \$3.13. This compares with per capita giving in 1957 of \$1.47 for the national agencies. It is thus easily seen that more churches must give more in 1959. If they fail, just to that extent the denomination has failed to meet its world-wide obligations and we will have failed God's Faithful Steward who gave His all.

So again we plead for a revival of stewardship on the part of the churches. Make it a matter of prayer. Decide on a plan that fits your local situation and that will include every department and agency listed above and then give!

Give consistently! "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store, as God hath prospered him" (I Cor. 16:2).

Give generously! "Give, and it shall be given unto you.... For with the same measure that ye meet withal it shall be measured to you again" (Luke 6:38).

Give gladly; ".... for God loveth a cheerful giver" (II Cor. 9:7). Give enough; "Neither was there

Give enough; "Neither was there any among them that lacked...." (Acts 4:34).

If you will do this, "God is able to make all grace abound toward you; that ye, always having all sufficiency in all things, may abound to every good work" (II Cor. 9:8). —Charles A. Thigpen, Chairman,

The banker refused to take a mortgage, but insists that he wants us to keep it on open note and save us mortgage cost. No bank could be more generous. Let us not fail to take care of this obligation in such a manner that will increase our credit rating in the city of Nashville.
