Dear Reader:



Our readers would like to hear from you and see what you look like.

News from the churches this month is very scarce. May I suggest that each church select someone to make a periodic report to the Gem. Frankly, don't you like to read of the news of our churches? Just as you like to hear from other churches, other churches would like to hear from you. The Gem is primarily a paper of information. It is used partially for promotional work, yes, but it remains primarily a news source. Please submit your news items.

Make good use of the other columns too. Many churches are not reporting their Sunday School averages. Many Auxiliaries are not reporting. Please use the Gem it is your paper.

Did you know that only fifty-three churches are currently enrolled in the Every Church Family Plan? Every church in the State ought to use this plan to keep their members informed. The goal set by me when I assumed editorship was 2,000 subscribers to the Gem. Our current mailing list is carrying around 1250 names so we have a long way to go to reach 2,000. However, if the remaining churches in the State that are not on the Family Plan would enroll in the plan we could move towards the goal rapidly. Presently the cost of printing the Gem is not being met by the yearly subscriptions. If the Gem were not underwritten by the State and supported through the Cooperative Plan then it would be operating constantly in the red. If we charged you the total cost of each paper then it would run around twenty-five cents per copy. You are currently paying $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents per copy if you are on the single subscription plan and only $8\frac{1}{2}$ cents per copy if you are on the Family Plan. Certainly you'll have to agree, the Free Will Baptist Gem is one of the biggest bargains you can get today.

SERMON OF THE MONTH

CHRISTMAS PRELIMINARIES

Scripture: Luke 2:1-7

As early as mid-November the world begins to prepare for Christmas. The merchants prepare by decorating their shops and displaying their wares. The people prepare by making out their gift lists and the purchasing of same. The churches prepare by planning their Christmas programs and services. This has been going on for years as people get ready for Christmas.

As the time draws nearer the hustle and bustle grows greater. Now, one week before Christmas, the preparations become more intense. The Christmas tree goes up; last minute purchases are made; Christmas cards are mailed; and Bing Crosby groans, "I'm Dreamin' of a White Christmas." It's Christmas time, U. S. A.

Did you ever stop to wonder the why of all this? If some were asked why Christmas they would report, "To celebrate Christ's birthday of course.' It all started back in the fifth century A. D. when the Western Church first celebrated a day they called the Mass of Christ. No one was sure of the exact birth date of the Lord Jesus so a date in December was selected. This date was adapted from the pagan holidays along with many of the ideas that go with it. The giving of gifts; the yule log; the tree and its lights; the sending of Christmas cards; these all came as later additions.

It is fitting that we commemorate the birth of Jesus as long as we do so in the proper fashion. In this message I would like to cite two things: Getting ready for the first Christmas whenever it was; and Getting ready for Christmas today.

Getting Ready for the First Christmas Whenever It Was

Let's first note the promises of the Saviour's coming. As early as the Book of Genesis we have the promise of the coming of the Son of God. Genesis 3:15 "And I will put enmity between thee and the woman, and between thy seed and her seed; it shall bruise thy head, and thou shalt bruise his head." In this verse we note that God promises Satan that the Saviour of the world will come through the seed of

woman. The promise continues on through the pages of the Old Testament. Isaiah stated that Jesus would be born of a virgin. Isaiah 7:14, "Therefore the Lord himself shall give you a sign: Behold, a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel." Micah promises that He will be born in the city of Bethlehem, "But thou, Bethlehem Ephratah, though thou be little among the thousands of Judah, yet out of thee shall he come forth unto me that is to be ruler in Israel; whose goings forth have been from of old, from everlasting. Malachi predicted the coming of John the Baptist and then prophecy ceased. For four hundred years nothing was said about the coming of the Messiah. The Jews began to ask, "Where is the promise of his coming? For since our fathers fell asleep, all things continue as they were from the beginning of the creation." God had not forgotten the promise He was merely preparing the world for the coming of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Now we shall note the preparation for the Saviour's coming. The way was paved in the political world. Prior to the coming of Christ the chief mode of government was the city-states. Then the Babylonians overran their borders and made a world conquest. They were followed by the Persians, the Grecians, and finally the Romans. Of all the empires none reached the heights of the Roman empire. It was by far the greatest. Men of different races were fused together into one political organization with the Ceasars at the head. It was now possible for a Jew to become a Roman citizen. Thus Christ came to a world united rather than a world divided.

There were several other ways in which the world was made ready for Christ. One of these was in the modes of travel. With slave labor the Romans built great concrete highways to the extremities of the Empire. Many of these are still in use today and certainly must have been beneficial to the apostles as they traveled with the gospel. Also ships sailed constantly to the great seaports along the Mediter-

ranean. Paul used these for much of his travel. There was also a type of universal language in these days. Most of the people spoke a modified Greek language known as Koine (pronounced coin-a) Greek. The apostles spoke and wrote this language as they traveled with the gospel. Most of the New Testament was written in this language. Still the way was paved for the coming of Christ because sin was abounding. Emperor and pagan worship was common. The entire Roman Empire laxed into a state of gross sin. Edward Gibbons in his, "Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire" lists the greatness of the sins of the Romans as the chief cause of the collapse of the Empire.

Getting Ready For Christmas Today


Most people get ready for Christmas today by getting ready for Santa Claus. This old grey-headed gentleman came to America with the Catholic Dutch in the personage of St. Nicholas. St. Nicholas was thought to be the patron saint of the children and thus he left gifts in the little wooden shoes of the Dutch children every Christmas. St. Nicholas became "St. Nick" in the poem, "Twas The Night Before Christmas," and later the name 'Santa Claus'' was given to the jolly old fellow who wears a red suit and drives a sleigh with eight tiny reindeer. Today, through deception, Santa Claus has a more prominent place at Christmas than does the Lord Jesus Christ.

We get ready for Christmas today by the customer growing poorer and the merchant growing richer. Christmas has been commercialized to the point that it is no longer a religious holiday. On Christmas Eve most offices will celebrate with a Christmas party (usually a drunken one), most factories will close down at noon, and most stores will remain open late to glean from the last minute shoppers. Then all will retire to await the arrival of Santa Claus. n the morning the children will get up earlier than usual and the family circle gathers around the tree to open their gifts. We say we do this because the Magi brought

Bible College Receives \$5,000 Record Gift

NASHVILLE, Tenn.-President L. C. Johnson recently announced that the Bible College has received a gift of \$5,000 from the estate of E. D. Parker, prominent layman of Nashville. A member of the East Nashville Free Will Baptist Church, Mr. Parker remembered the college in his will as well as other denominational enterprises. The gift, largest ever received by the Bible College, will be used as an endowment fund for the school. The fund will be invested to earn annual income, school officials explained. The administrator of the will, the Rev. J. L. Welch, presented the check to the school on October 19. Rev. Welch was a life-long friend of the East Nashville deacon. The Board of Trustees of the Bible College has named the former Dunbar Property in honor of Mr. Parker. It is now known as Parker Hall.

Evangelicals Prepare For World Day of Prayer

WHEATON, Ill.-With a strong emphasis on prayer for Christians in the areas of the world where worship and witnessing are restricted or prohibited, evangelicals will gather in their churches March 4 to observe the World Day of Prayer.

'As Bound with Them" is the theme for the observance this year. A prayer booklet to be used as a guide for the services has been written by Dr. Merrill C. Tenney, dean of the graduate school at Wheaton College, Wheaton, Ill. The introduction is by Dr. Armin Gesswein, chairman of the Spiritual Life Commission of the National Association of Evangelicals and well-known for his revival-prayer conferences.

Providing the materials for the observance of World Day of Prayer is a part of the service ministry of NAE. The materials, including the worship booklets and advertising posters, can be obtained by writing the National Association of Evangelicals, 222 East Willow Ave., Wheaton, Ill.

NAE Convention

Set For Chicago

CHICAGO, 111.-The eighteenth annual convention of the National Association of Evangelicals will be held here next April 26-29, according to an announcement from Dr. C. C. Burnett, secretary of the NAE Executive Committee. Sessions will be held in the Palmer House, Dr. Burnett said. Dr. Stephen Paine, president of Houghton College, Houghton, N. Y.

and a past president of NAE, is the convention chairman.

Theme for the 18th gathering of this organization which represents more than 40 denominations and has a membership of over three million will be "Speaking the Truth in Love."

The convention is expected to attract 1,500 denominational leaders, pastors and key laymen. Because of the nature of the convention which embraces some 17 commissions and affiliates that hold simultaneous sessions, it is often called a "convention of conventions."

Canadian Says Booklet Courts Roman Catholics

WHEATON, Ill.—"An olive branch extended to the Church of Rome" is the way a Canadian describes a booklet recently issued by a committee of the United Church of Canada.

Writing in the December issue of United Evangelical Action, Dr. Stewart L. Boehmer of Toronto, takes issue with the controversial booklet, "Life and Death—a Study of the Christian Hope," which made its appearance a few weeks ago in Canada. The booklet is not an official statement of church policy, but is the result of five years' work by the Committee on Christian Faith.

Chief among the propositions in the booklet, Boehmer, says, are these: hell is not a place of everlasting torment, espousal of the doctrine of Universalism, and suggestions that purgatory and prayers for the dead may be legitimate beliefs for Protestants.

It is in this connection that Boehmer says, "One would have to be blind to fail to see the olive branch extended to the Church of Rome." He asserts that the booklet is not only "revolutionary," but may well produce a revolution in the United Church. He says there is already "a decided uneasiness... for there are many devout, God-fearing, Bible-believing folks who dearly love the Lord."





Meet John Noble

John H. Noble was born in Detroit, Michigan, in 1923. He attended school in Detroit until 1938. The family was forced to move to Germany because of his father's health and Mr. Noble went to work in one of his father's factories in the photo industry. With the outbreak of World War II the Noble family was put under local internment by Hitler's forces until 1945. As the Soviet Red Army occupied East Germany, the Nobles expected to be liberated but found exactly the opposite—imprisonment despite United States citizenship.

John Noble was held by the Soviet N. K. V. D. in the Dresden Prison for 14 months without a question or explanation. While there he suffered several periods of starvation and was near death. In late 1946 he was shipped to a concentration camp at Muehlberg East Germany for two years and then on to Camp Buchenwald (notorious Natzi concentration camp). In 1950 he was sentenced without trial or accusation to 15 years (1950-65) and shipped through Poland into the U. S. S. R.

He arrived at the notorious Artic Slave Camp "Vorkuta" where he worked under deplorable conditions in the coal mines for $4\frac{1}{2}$ years. His weight dropped to under 100 lbs where it remained throughout the remainder of his confinement. The weather was unbearable and on many occasions dropped to 50 degrees below zero and even lower. Thousands of prisoners died only to be replaced by more "slaves". Together with about 100,000 of the 500,000 prisoners at Vorkuta, John Noble participated in the first uprising against communism in the Soviet Union. Thousands were slaughtered before the "strikers" went back to work. Only a few weeks after the survival from the horrible bloodshed, John Noble was transferred to another camp at Vorkuta from where he was able to smuggle a postcard out which reached his parents who by this time had been permitted to return to Detroit. This postcard served as evidence of his existance. His parents began to work for his release. It was only after the personal intervention by President Eisenhower that John was able to obtain his release from the Soviets. Returning to America he spent much time in Washington, D. C. He has spoken before Congress concerning his experiences.

While enslaved in Russia John Noble found God and dedicated his life to Him. He is now affiliated with the Cicero Bible Press and spends much of his time on speaking tours from coast to coast attempting to awaken America to the dangers of communism.

On Monday night, November 2nd an overflow crowd of some five hundred people filled the auditorium at the First Free Will Baptist Church at Mt. Grove to hear Mr. Noble. On Tuesday night, November 3rd, Mr. Noble spoke before a large crowd of Free Will Baptists in the High School Auditorium at Flat River. On Wednesday night, November 4th, he spoke before a capacity crowd at the South Side Free Will Baptist Church in St. Louis. The churches of the St. Louis area dismissed their mid-week services to come out and hear Mr. Noble.

John Noble has authored two books, "I Was A Slave In Russia" and "I Found God In Soviet Russia." His story has appeared in leading magazines and on television where it was viewed by millions. Mr. Noble is married, has two children, and lives in the suberbs of Chicago.

They are scheduled to leave Houston, Texas via Braniff Airways, flight No. 603. The Wilkinsons will increase the South African Missions staff to seven. Already on the field are Rev. Dave Franks, Rev. & Mrs. Ken Eagleton, Miss Eula Mae Martin, and Miss Esther M. Ruehle.

Missionary's Mother Suffers Fatal Attack

ST. LOUIS, Mo .- Mrs. Alline Wright suffered a fatal heart attack on Wednesday, November 4, while a patient at Deaconess Hospital in St. Louis. Previously she had been injured by a freak accident while visiting a cemetery near Fredericktown, Mo. As she was walking about the cemetery she stumbled and fell and clasped a tombstone to break her fall. The tombstone broke loose and fell on top of her. She was rushed to Fredericktown to the clinic and from there to St. Louis to the hospital. She seemed to be recovering from the accident at the time of the attack. Mrs. Wright was a member of the South Side Free Will Baptist Church in St. Louis and the mother of Marie Hanna, missionary to India. Mrs. Hanna was unable to come home for the funeral services.

Calverys Reach America For Year's Furlough

Harvey Hill Visits Missouri Churches For Home Missions

ST. LOUIS Mo.—Rev. Harvey E. Hill, pastor of the First Free Will Bap-

tist Church of Berkeley and member of the National Home Missions Board has been visiting Missouri churches in behalf of Home Missions. While in Mexico last May, Rev. Hill made some interesting slides of the work there that is under the leadership of Rev. & Mrs. Arthur Billows. Rev. Hill showed the slides at the Indian Creek Association on November 3rd and at the First Free Will Baptist Church of Monett on November 4th. On Thursday night, November 5th he presented the program of slides and information to the First Free Will Baptist Church of Springfield. On Saturday night, November 21, Rev. Hill conducted a Home Missions service at the Copper Mines Free Will Baptist Church near Fredericktown. He will be visiting other churches in the near future. Rev. Hill says, "I beg each of you to help your National Home Missions Board by putting them in your church budget.

Nogales Academy Has Record Enrollment

NOGALES, Arizona-The Lord is blessing the Arizona-Mexico Missions in many ways. One of the outstanding growths is shown by the large enrollment of the Nogales Academy which is a Christian Day School which is part of Arizona-Mexico Missions. The Academy was opened under the direction of Rev. John Elliston in September 1957 with Miss Bessie Yeley, as teacher. For a long time Miss Yeley has been a Free Will Baptist Missionary in both Venezuela and Cuba under the Foreign Mission Board and in Texas and Mexico under Home Mission.

The first term we had 8 students and the spring term 1958 opened in the now present building (which rents for \$100.00 a month) with 12 students, grades 1 (one) through 4 (four). In the summer of 1958 Rev. John B. Elliston taught the school with the aid of Mrs. Elliston, with 40 students enrolled. Miss Yeley took the summer for Bible Clubs and Mission work.

In August 1958 school opened with

60 enrolled and a staff of 4. Miss Molly Barker, 1959 graduate of the Free Will Baptist Bible College of Nashville, Tennessee, was added. Miss Yeley taught first and second grades, Miss Barker 3rd and 4th grades, Mr. Elliston 5th and 6th and two special classes A & B while Mrs. Elliston taught class C. These special classes are so classed according to age and are children who know not one word of English. By the end of the spring term in 1959 there were 72 enrolled.

Summer school 1959 had 63 enrolled. With the opening of the fall term we now have 91. With enlargement of enrollment the teaching staff must be enlarged also. Mrs. Elliston has Beginners and 1st grade, thirtyfour of them. Miss Yeley has volunteered to teach 2nd grade. Miss Barker 3rd and 4th grades. Mr. Elliston has 5th through 8th with a special class. Mrs. Breeding is the Commerce teacher.

Pray for us we are very busy in the school besides our fourteen services a week, also clothing distribution and other Missionary activities.

Pope's Ecumenical Council Is Rescheduled For 62 or 63

ROME, Italy—Pope John's Ecumenical Council, scheduled for late 1960, will not be held until the end of 1962 or the beginning of 1963. The annonucement was made at a press conference by Domenico C ar d in a l Tardini, Vatican Secretary of State, who is chairman of the council's planning committee. Some 2,700 letters have been received to date, suggesting everything from new dogmas to condemnation of modern heresies. They have come from cardinals, archbishops, bishops and religious leaders all over the world. (EP)

AN OPEN LETTER FROM JAPAN



Nakamachi 1 Chome Bihoro cho, Hokkaido, Japan October 14, 1959

Dear Gem Readers:

We are very thankful and grateful to God for the privilege we had in opening up our newest Free Will Baptist preaching point here in Japan. We went to the town of Shari where there was no church of any kind. There wasn't any suitable land for us to use for a tent meeting so we rented an old store building for the meetings. A young Japanese pastor who was the evangelist, Daniel Kimure and his wife, and myself were there for five days of special evangelistic meetings.

meetings. Special services were held each afternoon for the children. The first day there was such a large crowd they overflowed the building and those outside pushed each other trying to get a peep at what was going on through the open windows. We counted about 200 or so inside the building and about 50 or 60 outside. The following day and throughout the rest of the week we divided the children into two large groups and filled the building nicely every day.

In the evening for the adult services we averaged between 40 or 50 every night. One young man rode his bicycle over one hour each way to attend the meeting every night. We met one man who was a Christian and he gave his testimony one night. He was very thankful that we had come there to start a work for the Lord.

We praise the Lord for the good start we have had there. Daniel Kimura and his wife are now going there every Tuesday for services. They have been having a good number of children to attend and have been averaging about 30 for the evening service. I have been going some but not every week as it's a pretty long trip from Bihoro.

30 for the evening service, runner concerning a meeting place for us to use there every Tuesday. The place we are now using is not very ideal for a meeting place and the landlord doesn't want to rent it to us after this month. We have spent several days walking up and down the streets of Shari looking for a suitable place. We feel that He will give us a good meeting place.

There are many other towns like Shari where there is no Gospel witness at all. We certainly should be thankful for the open door here in Japan. Pray that we might have more workers so that we could enter more of these other towns.

quested three ministers of the Presidential cabinet to appear on November 19 to explain the treatment which Protestants have received.

The House action. taken on November 3, cites the following cabinet officers: Dr. Julio Cesar Turbay, Minister of Foreign Relations; Dr. Jorge Enrique Gutirrez. Minister of Government; and Dr. Abel Naranjo, Minister of Education.

The tragic plight of Protestants in Columbia had been brought to the attention of the House of Representatives last month in a memorandum denouncing persecution. The memorandum had been signed by 14,000 Colombians, including Protestants and others interested in religious freedom.

A study of the situation has brought to light the fact that in many areas local authorities, at the insistence of Roman Catholic bishops, are enforcing unconstitutional circulars which were published as decrees of the military dictatorship of Lieut. Gen. Gustavo Rojas Pinilla. (CEDEC)

Italian Evangelical Denounces Offical Action

FONDI, Italy—An evangelical resident of this village has been refused permission by the mayor to have a New Testament verse inscribed on his wife's tombstone. Gaetano Sperduto had written the mayor for approval of the text taken from Hebrews 4:3 "We who have believed do enter into rest." Protesting the refusal. Mr. Sperduto has denounced the official's action as violating Italy's Constitution, which guarantees religious freedom.



At the annual setting of the Tennessee State Association of Free Will Baptists, which convened at Nashville, Tennessee, in October, 1959, it was unanimously voted by the body that we express our disapproval of our Govenrment's spending the taxpayer's money for alcoholic beverages.

The following letter, which was authorized by the association, is an expression of that sentiment.

Dear Sir:

It is our understanding that on certain occasions government money is spent for alcoholic beverages to be served in govermental entertainment. If we have a misunderstanding on this matter, we would appreciate a clarification concerning it; however, if we have not misunderstood, we would like to express our disapproval.

We believe that many of our taxpaying citizens have definite convictions against the use of alcoholic beverages. We realize that it would be impossible for our government to spend its money in such a way that no one would have any complaints. However, we do believe that our government should refrain from spending money, which the taxpayers have given, for anything which so many Americans have firm moral convictions against.

For these reasons we are requesting that you use your influence as editor of the Gem to see if something can be done to stop the spending of the taxpayers' money for the purchase of alcoholic beverages to be served in govermental entertainment or for any other purpose. If this is done, we believe that God will bless our nation for it.

Madison (Matt) H. White died Thursday at his home northwest of Plattsburg at the age of 91 years. He hadn't been in good health for several years, but was able to get out in the car at various times to attend church, visit friends, or just to enjoy the countryside, and also enjoyed having his friends visit in his home.


Madison H. White, son of James V. and Lucendia Estes White, was born Oct. 1, 1868, near Starfield, Mo., and died at the homestead of his grandfather Caswell C. White, later known as the M. H. White farm where he had lived since 1898 except four years when he lived near Hemple, Mo. He was left an orphan in early childhood, his father having died when he was two and a half years old and his mother when he was ten. He was then reared by his grandparents. He was united in marriage Dec. 27, 1893, to Miss Anna Gaultney who preceded him in death Feb. 20, 1957. To this union was born three daughters. Lew Ethel who also preceded him in death; Miss Melha Ester White of the home and Mrs. Milford House (Sarah) of Gower.

Mr. White was converted and united with the Mount Zion Free Will Baptist Church in 1887, and was ordained Deacon of that church June 9, 1929. He served as clerk for a number of years, resigning when he was elected a deacon. He also served for a number of years on the Executive Board of both the local and State associations, and as a trustee of the Mount Zion Church since Aug. 10, 1901. He was a member of the A.F. and A.M. Masonic Lodge No. 113 of Plattsburg for more than 50 years. He was secretary for the Mt. Zion Cemetery Association for at least thirty years.

Memorial services with Masonic rites were conducted by Elder John D. McKown in the Mount Zion Church Sunday afternoon, and burial was in the church cemetery.

Surviving besides his two daughters are his son-in-law, Milford House; three grandsons, Darrel House of San Antonio, Texas, Gary and Dale House of Gower; two nieces, a number of nephews, and a host of other relatives and friends who will sadly miss his cheery presence and wise counsel. He was a kind and loving husband and father, honest in all of his dealings, and respected by all who knew him.
