

SERMON OF THE MONTH

The decade in which we now live has been described by many as being the "Soaring Sixties." It would be difficult, perhaps, to find a two-word phrase which could more fully describe this present age. Around the earth this morning are objects which give a mute testimony to the fact that these are the soaring sixties. Man-made satellites are circling the earth every hour having been sent into orbit from a launching pad either here in our nation, or from another great world power. Man in his search for an answer to the mysteries of the universe has never before soared so high. On the earth itself may be found many other witnesses to testify that these are indeed the soaring sixties! We are supposed to be doing more, eating more, enjoying life more, and going farther and faster today than ever before in the history of the world.

Let us however, take a realistic look at the world around us. It costs more to live today than ever before: prices of groceries, hardware, clothing, and other necessities of life are going higher all the time. The cost of living almost monthly soars to a new height. No one knows where it will all end. But the cost of living is not the alarming thing about this generation; other things are soaring which I believe should stir us to a greater understanding of the times in which we live.

As a nation our annual crime rate is soaring. Mr. Delbert Priest, a deacon of the First Free Will Baptist Church in Richmond, California, and who is also head of the juvenile department of the police force there has compiled the following statistics: In 1959, there were a million juveniles picked up by the police in America. At the present time there are three times as many persons in prison as there are college students. Eleven and one-half million people in America have a criminal record-one person out of 15. There are over 8,000 crimes committed in our country every 24 hours. A serious crime is committed every 12 seconds. For every dollar spent on churches, twelve dollars is spent on crime.

I remember reading a verse of Scripture from the prophet Ezekiel which might well describe this present day: "Make a chain; for the land is full of bloody crimes and the city is full of violence." Last week's daily papers carried the news release from the office of J. Edgar Hoover, head of the FBI. Crime in the U. S. leaped up by 12 percent, in 1960, a situation which Mr. Hoover calls shocking! The news release goes on to say, "Not a single major category of crime showed a decrease. Robberies increased 18 per cent, major larcenies 11 per cent, burglaries 15 per cent, auto theft 7 per cent, and murder was up 4 per cent over 1959."

What is the reason for it all? Wherein have we failed? I believe that much of the blame can be laid at the doorstep of the American home. At the present time there are more than six million children living in broken homes, with one parent missing. The home life of America, which is the foundation of our civilization, is suffering from a disease worse than that of cancer. We need a return to the oldfashioned family altar, Bible reading, church and Sunday School attendance; the home-life of America needs to experience a revival from which will come forth a greater sense of responsibility to Almighty God and to the rising generation.

I would also state that the church life of our nation stands greatly in need of a soul-searching revival. The kind of church service which many of us experience in this day is not the kind which will turn the world upside down for Christ. Much of our preaching is of peaches and cream variety which sugar-coats the moral and social issues of life. We could use some of the plain straight-forward preaching of John the Baptist: of Paul the Apostle: of Jonothan Edwards, the pioneer preacher whose sermons often made sinners and saints alike tremble as he preached about sinners in the hands of an angry God. As a nation we are suffering from a spiritual and moral breakdown. Much is said about a financial recession in the land, but the sad truth is we are suffering from a spiritual depression, the likes of which we have not known before.

Let us take a further look at existing conditions. As a nation we are wallowing in beverage alcohol. More than 60 per cent of our adult population are victims of the sin of strong drink. A man of God a long time ago declared, "Wine is a mocker; strong drink is raging; and whosoever is deceived

thereby is not wise." From the nation's capitol to the local precinct our land is soaked with demon rum. One third of the world's beer consumption is in the U. S. There are 137,000 more alcoholic beverage outlets in this country than the combined number of churches, synagogues, and temples. The prophet Joel declared "And they have cast lots for my people; and have given a boy for an harlot, and sold a girl for wine, that they might drink." It is also contained in the Holy Scriptures, "They have sown the wind and they shall reap the whirlwind." This is our plight; as a nation we have licensed and legalized a deadly evil which in a single year caused 118 million accidents with 10 thousand lives being taken. We are reaping the whirlwind and in one way or another each of us is involved. Must we have the revenue of such an enemy of both soul and body to finance our government? Horace Greely said, "To sell rum for a livelihood is bad enough, but for a whole nation to share the responsibility and guilt of such a traffic seems a worse bargain than that of Eve or Judas." And William E. Gladstone said, "Give me a sober population, not wasting their earning in strong drink, and I shall know where to obtain the revenue." Now let me make this clear; God loves the drunkard as much as He loves any other class of sinners, and He will save all who will come to Him. But God hates the deadly evil which often makes brutes of men; which often takes all the motherly instinct from a woman and causes her to leave her own offspring to spend her hours at the bar.

You say it doesn't concern you? Let me hurriedly give you just one or two true examples which I believe should convince us that we are all involved. Thousands of lives are slaughtered on the highways of America each year with alcoholic beverage a contributing factor. Col. Hugh H. Waggoner, Superintendent of the Missouri State Highway Patrol, reported the most tragic accident in 1958 investigated by his organization was caused by a drunken driver careening around a curve on the wrong side of the road at a high rate of speed, crashing into another automobile traveling in the opposite direction. The drinking driver was killed as were 7 other people: two were hospitalized with serious injuries. Three of the victims were innocent (Continued on page 7)

2. Never before in the history of our work in Alaska have we been as pressed financially for funds to work with. For several months our support has continued to drop until it is at its lowest ebb.

3. Our church has been making the property payments and paying its own operating expenses which totals more than \$300 per month. This is a heavy load, taking into account that many of our number are unemployed at this time. Presently, our church is unable to meet its obligations and we are facing some very embarrassing experiences. We are trusting the Lord to undertake that there be no reproach brought upon our witness here. It's difficult for our people in the Southern 48 states to comprehend fuel bills that soar to over \$100 per month and eletric bills as much as \$58 some months-but those are our experiences (living quarters and church combined).

4. One of the most effective methods of preaching the Gospel in Alaska is by means of radio. For several months we have had a fifteen minute weekly broadcast, and have received mail from as far as four hundred miles out into the interior, saying the program had been heard there. We could also put the same program on a Fairbanks station and enable people as far north as Point Barrow to hear the message. But unless God undertakes, this ministry will have to be discontinued. We are praying that God will raise up organizations and individuals who will assume the responsibility of some portion of this expense monthly.

5. With great anticipation, we are looking forward to the immediate arrival of Rev. and Mrs. Kirby Godwin to be partakers in the expansion of our ministry into other areas of Alaska. Much consideration and prayer is being given to entering Fairbanks, Alaska's second largest city and a field of challenge. Fairbanks is located four hundred and thirty-eight miles north of Anchorage where the temperature drops as low as 60 degrees below zero at times. Living expenses there are 54% higher than in Seattle, so this undertaking is worthy of much prayer.

Even as Moses pressed forward in the confidence of God, we are trusting the Lord to go before us and fight our battles and open the seemingly impossible doors. Calm Continues In Ruanda-Urundi

Washington, D. C. (MNS) - Reports here indicate that the Ruanda section of Belgium's Central Africa trust territory, which declared itself a "sovereign republic" on January 30, is progressing peacefully toward full independence. The provisional government of Ruanda was set up by an important congress of 3,120 local officials who met January 30. The 45-man provisional legislative assembly was converted into an official body by the gathering, and Dominique Mbonyemutwa was made President of the Ruanda Republic.

The new government is controlled almost exclusively by men from the Bahutu tribe. The Batutsi tribe, which comprises about 14 per cent of Ruanda's population, boycotted the sessions which formed the new government and were consequently excluded.

The sudden and unexpected action of Ruanda has caused the United Nations to send a commission to the territory to make a study before that body takes further action in the case. The elections scheduled for March 7 were not held, since the government had already been chosen.

In declaring her own independence, Ruanda put in a provision recognizing the continued trusteeship of Belgium, so that Belgian technicians will stay on, and foreign affairs and defense will continue under Belgian control.

To keep it on a par with Ruanda, the southern part of the territory (Urundi) was given autonomy in internal affairs and its provisional government became the recognized government

The United Nations will soon get a report on current developments and make decisions concerning the next steps to be taken. It is felt here that the date for full independence will be

1962, as had been previously scheduled.

Two Churches For Cuba?

Miami, Fla. (MNS)-The goal of Castro's Cuba is the establishment of two national churches (one Roman Catholic and the other Protestant), according to refugees interviewed by Religious Editor, Adon Taft, of the Miami Herald.

"Severing the Cuban Catholic Church from its ties with Rome and setting up a Cuban 'Pope,' with Communist leanings," says Taft, "appears to be the first aim of the present government."

He also reported that harassment of Protestant churches has begun (this has not been confirmed by MNS) and "half a dozen clergymen are being groomed to become the 'hierarchy' of the national Protestant church, with one of them slated to become boss of the church with cabinet rank.'

Czech Embassy

To Handle Cuban Visas

Washington, D. C. (MNS) - The Czechoslovakian Embassy has established the procedure for applying for Cuban visas. Applicants are required to present Czechoslovakian visa forms in quadruplicate and four photos. The application is then referred to Cuba where it is expected to require two or three weeks for approval.

United States passports are still not valid for travel to Cuba unless they have been stamped with a special endorsement for travel to Cuba. Such endorsements are being issued upon presentation of the passport and a letter of request directed to Miss Frances Knight, Director, Passport Office, Washington 25, D. C.

ary Board of the Free Methodist Church, it was announced here. The initial phase of the crusade started on March 12 and consists of counselortraining, advertising and other preparation.

From March 19-26 a city-wide crusade will be conducted in a large amphitheater with all evangelical churches of the city cooperating. The crusade will then move to the newlyconstructed Free Methodist Church of Hermosillo, where follow-up services will be held March 27 to April 2.

Rev. Elwyn E. Culter, Free Methodist director of overseas crusades and assistant to the missionary secretary, is the evangelist for the crusade. He is assisted by Rev. Charles W. Kingsley, executive director of the Light and Life Men's Fellowship. Also assisting are a corps of musicians headed by Gene Jordan of Radio Station HCJB in Quito and a large group of pastors and lay people from both Mexico and the States.

Mission For Ex-Priests

To Be Established In Bolivia

Cochabamba, Bolivia (MNS)—The Mission de Cristo Redentor (Christ Redeemer Mission) is the name of an organization to be established here for the purpose of bringing together converted Roman Catholic priests and establishing them in the Christian life. The Bolivian Indian Mission, which has a strong work here, will give the necessary help and backing until the organization is able to stand on its own.

Forming a nucleus for the new organization will be Sr. Jose M. Rico, Sr. Antonic Cuesta Garcia (who expects to come from Spain in July), and Sr. Angel Correon. All these men are converted priests who desire to be effective witnesses for Christ.

A Catholic Views Protestant Missions In Latin America

Asheville, N. C. (MNS) — Commenting on the growth of Protestant work in Latin America a Catholic professor, Paul Bouchard, in an article on missions in Latin America carried by the **Presbyterian Journal** (2/15/61) says that "the Catholic Church has already started to counteract" these activities.

"In all the Catholic countries of the world," he continues, "and especially in nations which like French Canada are nearer to the Latin mind, an international crusade is being organized to save Hispanic America from the spiritual anarchy of the United States. A plan is under study to send educators, social workers, lay and religious missionaries to the rescue of the Church of Christ. Latin America will thus become the battlefield of the most unneeded struggle of its history."

Mr. Bouchard views Protestant activities in Latin America with alarm, seeing them as "a Big Money Operation, an out and out offensive in which an enormous capital is invested."

The Journal carried the article to give its readers a firsthand view of the Catholic view of Latin America.

Russians React To

'Light and Life Hour' Broadcast

Winona Lake, Ind. (MNS) — The Russian Light and Life Hour, now in its third year, is getting many and varied reactions from Russia. Letters of gratitude for the broadcast far outnumber those expressing opposition, but some do come through expressing an atheistic outlook.

One writer said: "We do not need the word of God. Everybody of us knows that there is no God and never was a God. Do you really believe that by listening to your broadcasts I will become a believer in God?"

A great number of letters, however, express a deep hunger for a knowledge of God. From the area of Jitinsky Oblesk in the USSR a listener wrote: "I hear your radio message, but if you are really sure that there is a God, and you believe in Him, can you tell me how to come to God, and how to believe in Him?''

The program is released 17 times a week to Russia and the other Iron Curtain countries. Bibles are sent to any listeners who request them.

The Light and Life Hour, broadcast in a total of seven languages by the Free Methodist Church, is carried by 170 radio stations, 155 of which are commercial stations within the U. S. The other 15 stations carry the program to Canada and overseas countries.

Youth For Christ Expands Overseas Ministry

Wheaton, Ill. (MNS)—As a part of a four-year program to strengthen the Youth for Christ program in North America and to extend its outreach to the restless teen-agers of the world who have suddenly become a powerful minority group, two "Teen Teams" are currently touring important cities in Mexico, Europe and the Near East. Purpose of the tour is to train young people for teen-age evangelism.

It has also been announced here that a World Teen Convention will be held at Jerusalem, Jordan in December, 1964. At that time teen-agers and their adult leaders from almost all nations of the world will gather for five days of sessions aimed at inspiring Christian youth to evangelize the teenagers of their homelands.

New French Bible Dictionary To Be Released

Vennes sur Lausanne, Switzerland (MNS)—A new French Bible dictionary is scheduled for release here this spring by Editions Emmaus. It has been 95 years since the last French Bible dictionary was published, so this new work of 800 pages, 4400 articles will meet a long-felt need among pastors, teachers and evangelists in the French speaking world.

The manuscript reached the printers after five years of relentless effort by a committee of translators and writers, according to a recent report by the editor, Dr. Rene Pache.

Gospel Radio Station Expands Ministry

Managua, Nicaragua (MNS) — Beginning with the New Year, Station YNOL has gone on the air daily from 6:30 a. m. to 10:15 p. m. with cultural and religious programs. Only two years old this month, the gospel broadcasting station already claims to be the most powerful long-wave station in Central America. YNOL is easily

EXPANDING OUR HORIZONS CAMPAIGN

EXPANSION is a sign of progress! It is seen on every hand. Churches are enlarging facilities. Newspapers inform us of new industries moving into the community, while established companies remodel and enlarge present o p e r a t i o n s. New subdivisions are springing up overnight in nearly every town. Millions of dollars are being spent each year for research in education, medicine, nuclear science, and other fields. This is progress.

Time and time again people have said, "Why don't you expand the work of the National League Department?" With much embarrassment the answer has come, "We cannot expand because we do not have sufficient funds." In fact, the income for this department has been so limited that it has hardly met operating expenses.

At a recent meeting the National League Board decided to launch a oneyear expansion campaign beginning January 1, 1961. This will be the first time in the history of Free Will Baptists that a campaign has been presented for promoting this phase of the work. Although several projects in interest of other causes have been sponsored by the League Board, no financial gain has been realized by the department itself. Actually, these projects incurred extra expense to the department, such as bookkeeping, printing, banking charges, postage, and additional publicity expense.

There are four major goals to be achieved in this campaign. They are:

- 1. A Training Program in Every Church.
- 2. New and Improved Literature.
- 3. Life Commitments to Christian Vocations.
- 4. Increased Income Increased Service.

A Training Program In Every Church

There is still the tremendous need for effective leadership in almost every church throughout the denomination. This need will continue to exist until Free Will Baptists catch the vision of training for service in the local church. One purpose of this campaign is to awaken every Free Will Baptist to the benefits derived from a properly functioning League.

New and Improved Literature

Good materials are essential in building effective programs. The cycle of themes which was introduced a year ago has already proved to be helpful in creating new interest in League work. There is certainly room for additional improvement along this line. Definite steps are being taken to provide more and better materials. These plans include the publishing of beginner-primary program materials. Another improvement in League literature is to be seen in the current issue of The League Pointer (formerly The League Monthly), the official publication of the National League Board. Life Commitments to Christian Voca-

tion

The impact of League has been felt throughout the denomination in the lives of individuals as well as in the total church program. Many have



been converted, others have committed themselves to dedicated Christian living, while still others have answered God's call to various fields of Christian service. These results have been achieved not only through local activities, but also through district and state organizations.

Scores of young people have realized God's purpose for their lives through the influence of the nationwide League Conferences. Hundreds are anticipating the greatest conference yet when the Ninth Nation-wide League Conference meets June 20 - 22, 1961, in Albany, Georgia.

Increased Income — Increased Service

Since the League Board began functioning as a service department, it has had to operate on a minimum of finance. Therefore, the services provided by the department have been limited to necessary correspondence and some promotional materials, and the growth of the League Pointer has been retarded because printing costs could not be met. For these and other reasons, the department has not been as effective in promoting the League work as it should have been. It is simply impossible to promote without finance.

Consistent financial support would enable the department to carry out plans for increasing the output of helpful materials. More study courses could be taught, and additional workshops could be conducted. Thus, the overall League program could be revitalized.

Expansion Is Contigent

A goal of \$7,500 has been set for this expansion campaign. There are more than eight hundred and fifty active League organizations in the denomination. If the Leagues in every state would share in the responsibility of consistently supporting this work, future financial embarrassment would be eliminated.

Il Timothy 2:15 tells us to "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." It is so easy to excuse ourselves from an obligation if we know nothing about it. But does God excuse us on such grounds? No! He gives us a command to study.

Until we learn, we are unconcerned—about missions, stewardship, prayer, evangelism, methods, youth work, etc. Therefore, study courses are needed.

The purpose of the Woman's Auxiliary is to teach and support missions. Before we can teach others we must first know something about the subject we are to teach.

As the Study Course Chairman, you hold one of the most important offices in the Auxiliary. It is your duty and responsibility to plan and sponsor the study courses and to see that they are carried out.

The Study Course Chairman is responsible for point eight of the Standard of Achievement.

An A-1 Auxiliary is required to study at least one class each on (1) Missions—that we might be missionary minded and have a concern for the mission work around the world: (2) Stewardship—that we might be a good steward and tither: (3) prayer—to challenge us as Auxiliary members to pray more fervently and effectively: (4) Evangelism—to stimulate a desire to do more personal witnessing and to teach us how to do personal soul-winning: (5) Methods—that we might better understand the Woman's Auxiliary and the Youth Auxiliary. A list of textbooks recommended by the W. N. A. C. may be found in the first issue of the Co-Labor Magazine on page 24.

There are several ways in which the study classes may be held. They are (1) the several night study, (2) the one night study, (3) the one night a month study, (4) the pastor and the study, (5) the prayer meeting night study, and (6) the devotional meeting study. Each study must consist of at least four class sessions. The length of each class session should be at least 45 minutes.

A report of the class must be made to the District of State Study Course Chairman on the blank found in the Co-Labor Magazine. If requirements are met, she shall report to the National Study Course Chairman, who will issue a certificate for work meeting the required standard. The rules for the Standard Study Classes are on page 28 of the Co-Labor Magazine for the first quarter.

Additional information and helps may be had by securing the Study Course Chairman's Workshop Packet from the W. N. A. C. headquarters for 25c.

The Auxiliary Convention year is quickly drawing to a close. Has your Auxiliary conducted a study course yet? I strongly urge each Auxiliary to participate in at least one Standard Study Course.

Dear Friends,

It is certainly a joy for us to be able to write and tell you that we have arrived in Switzerland to begin our study of the French language. If we study hard and our Lord blesses us with an understanding of the language we might finish in about nine months.

We are staying at a Christian school until we can obtain an apartment. The pupils come from several different countries but like Christians everywhere they are very helpful and polite. They go out of their way to help us in any way they can.

En route to Lausanne we went through Paris, France, a city known the world over because of its wickedness. We spent the week-end there with the LaVerne Mileys, and we learned that only 2% of the French people were professing Christians. Do we wonder then that it is a wicked place?

Although these people are more open with their sin than the American people, I did not see anything in Paris that I have not seen in the States. In fact, they dress more modestly than many of our church members. Is this not a terrible warning as to how low the convictions of those who profess to obtain their convictions from God's Word have waned? I pray that more of our preachers will preach that the grace of God that gave Jesus Christ a ransom for us all not only releases us from penalty of sin but from the power of sin (Romans 8) and teaches us to live a godly life in an ungodly world (Titus 2:11-12).

Brothers and sisters in Christ, I thank God for you and your faith, that you are willing to serve the Lord and do what you can to make Christ known everywhere without petting and praise of men that you might receive praise from God and be glorified with Christ (Rom. 8:17). That is worth patiently waiting for, isn't it? (Romans 8:25)

Thank you for your prayers for us and every expression of your love. The Lord bless you and keep you.
