

SERMON OF THE MONTH MOTHERS OF THE BIBLE

Here in outline form is a sermon on womanhood at its best. May God bless all women who measure up to His standard of motherhood.

Scripture: Proverbs 31:10-31
Text: Proverbs 31:28, "Her children arise up, and call her blessed; her husband also, and he praiseth her."

Introduction:

Someone has said that behind every successful man there is a woman. That woman, though she may not receive much of the credit, is mother.

Sir Walter Scott's mother was a superior woman, well educated, and a great lover of poetry and art.

Byron's mother was noted for being proud, illtempered, and violent.

The mother of Napoleon Bonaparte was noted for her beauty and energy.

Lord Bacon's mother was a woman of superior mind and deep piety.

The mother of Nero was a murder-ess.

The mother of George Washington was pious, pure and true.

The mother of Patrick Henry was marked for her superior conversational powers

The mother of John Wesley was remarkable for her intelligence, piety, and executive ability, so that she has been called, "the mother of Methodism."

It will be observed that in each of the examples the sons inherited the prominent traits of the mother.

Today we honor our mothers and they deserve our honors. I site to you five mothers of the Scriptures.

Body:

I. Sarah, the mother of Isaac.

Hebrews 11:11 "Through faith also Sara herself received strength to conceive seed, and was delivered of a child when she was past age, because she judged him faithful who had promised."

A. The Lord had promised Sarah

Genesis 17:15-19 "And God said unto Abraham, As for Sarai thy wife, thou shalt not call her name Sarai, but Sarah shall her name be. And I will bless her, and give thee a son also of her: yea I will bless her, and she shall be a mother of nations: Kings of people shall be of her. Then Abraham fell upon his face and laughed, and said in his heart, Shall a child be born unto him that is an hundred years old? and shall Sarah, that is ninety years old, bear? And Abraham said unto God. O that Ishmael might live before thee. And God said, Sarah thy wife shall bear thee a son indeed; and thou shalt call his name Isaac: and I will establish my covenant with him for an everlasting covenant, and with his seed after him.'

B. The Lord fulfilled that promise. Genesis 21:1-6 "And the Lord visited Sarah as he had said, and the Lord did unto Sarah as he had spoken. For Sarah conceived, and bare Abraham a son in his old age at the set time of which God had spoken to him. And Abraham called the name of his son that was born unto him, whom Sarah bare to him, Isaac. And Abraham circumcised his son Isaac being eight days old, as God had commanded him. And Abraham was an hundred years old when his son Isaac was born unto him. And Sarah said. God hath made me to laugh, so that all that hear will laugh with me."

II. Hannah, the mother of Samuel.
I Samuel, chapter 1.

A. Hannah was barren.

"And he (Elkanah) had two wives; the name of one was Hannah, and the name of the other Peninnah: and Peninnah had children, but Hannah had no children."

B. Hannah prayed. V 10-11.

"And she was in bitterness of soul, and prayed unto the Lord, and wept sore. And she vowed a vow, and said, O Lord of hosts, if thou wilt in deed look on the affliction of thine handmaid, and remember me, and not forget thine handmaid, but wilt give unto thine handmaid a man child, then I will give him unto the Lord all the days of his life, and there shall no razor come upon his head."

C. God answers prayer. V 20.

"Wherefore it came to pass when the time was come about after Hannah had conceived that she bare a son, and called his name Samuel, saying, Because I have asked him of the Lord."

D. Hannah keeps her vow. V 26-28.

"And she said, Oh my lord, as thy soul liveth, my lord, I am the woman that stood by thee here, praying unto the Lord. For this child I prayed: and the Lord hath given me my petition which I asked of Him: Therefore also I have lent him to the Lord; as long as he liveth he shall be lent to the Lord. And he worshipped the Lord there."

III. Elisabeth, the mother of John the

Baptist. Luke 1:5-25.

A. Elisabeth, like Hannah, was barren and like Sarah, was old.


V 7.

B. Another child of promise. V 13.

"But the angel said unto him, Fear not, Zacharias: for thy prayer is answered and thy wife Elisabeth shall bear thee a son, and thou shalt call his name John."

"And it came to pass, that on the eighth day they came to circumcise the child and they called him Zacharias, after the name of his father. And his mother answered and said, Not so, but he shall be called John."

D. Her son was to become a great prophet. V 76.

"And thou, child, shalt be called the prophet of the Highest for thou shalt go before the face of the Lord to prepare his ways."

IV. Mary the mother of Jesus. Luke 1:26-38.

A. She was highly favoured of the Lord. V 28.

"And the angel came in unto her, and said, Hail thou art highly favoured, the Lord is with thee: blessed art thou among women."

The Dance

Has the Leopard Changed his Spots?

EDITOR'S NOTE:

Be sure to Read this shocking but true report about Dancing.

"Oh, Can God ever forgive me?" These words were wrung from the bleeding heart of a girl, as she continued, "Oh, If I just had never learned to dance." In an unguarded moment she had sacrificed her virtue, and she poured

This true incident has been duplicated in the experience of many a leader of our youth, and yet the dance has steadily gained in favor in our churches and church-related schools.

out her heart to her teacher.

The author determined upon a survey of denominational colleges. Where can one better feel the pulse of the church than in these, fostered and maintained by the church, and to which, the loyal churches send their children and ministerial students to be educated, trained, and molded? If the colleges sanction dancing, then so do the churches which maintain them, or, if not today, then tomorrow. The conclusion is inevitable.

I secured a total of forty-one (41) catalogues and bulletins of denominationally-related colleges. I received also twenty-nine (29) personal letters from officers of administration of as many colleges, in reply to my inquiries on the dance question. My own denomination was covered by a complete survey, and a spot-check of colleges of three classes gave definite information. In the following report, dancing is understood to refer to the dance as a part of the social life with the approval of college authorities.

When I prepared to read the accumulated letters from the colleges of my own denomination, I selected first a bunch of letters from our "home mission colleges," for the most part, founded by our Home Mission Society, with an emphasis on education for ministers, and largely supported by that society during the years.

I was due for a shock. Every one of the "home mission schools" whose letters I opened has dancing! I am a

The rest of the colleges of my denomination ran as I had thought they would. Eleven of the thirteen colleges have dancing.

The spot-check of the colleges of the other old-line denominations showed that most of the colleges checked (except those of one denomination) have dancing.

The similar check of the colleges of the smaller and off-shoot denominations showed definite rules against dancing in some schools.

A like check of the colleges of the "holiness-type" denominations showed definite rules against dancing in all of the schools checked.

This study indicates a great change of attitude toward the dance has been, and is, taking place in our churches. The rules and regulations laid down by the "founding fathers" of our older colleges reflect the prevailing standards of the churches of their day. As revealed by this survey the college rules were strict, and the standards high. One quotation expresses the general thought of the founders: "To produce a maximum spiritual benefit to a perishing world."

Finding myself out of step with the apologists for the dance, I ask: "Has the leopard really changed his spots? Has human nature changed, or is the change due to the lack of conviction and spiritual insight in the membership of our churches today?"

Let us look at the arguments, which, in the past, were advanced against the dance, when the evangelist devoted one of his sermons to the evils of the world, of which, the dance was a major one. There were three main lines of thought: Dancing is based on sex and

awakens sex passions; Dancing is opposed to Scripture teaching; Dancing is inconsistent with the Christian life.

Accepting these arguments as valid, the church, expected one who claimed "conversion," to refrain from the dance. The growth of the church in popularity and wealth in large measure accounts for the great change that has taken place. As the line between the church and the world has become more and more dim, it has become easier to accept the dance than to purify the church.


But how has the church disposed of these arguments to which it once subscribed? Largely by silence. Neither pastor nor evangelist mentions the dance. It is assumed that without instructions, a "convert" will satisfy his conscience and his God.

But where opposition to the dance has been insistent, the arguments have been met point by point, by the proponents of dancing. "True," say they, "both sexes participate in the dance, but positions taken in the dance are not 'vulgar, tempting, indecent, arousing passions,' if participants and observers are pure in thought. If chaperoned, possible evils of the dance are avoided." "A reinterpretation of the Scriptures quoted against the dance, say the dance advocates, shows that the world is really good, not bad, that the dance, instead of being part of a 'vile world,' is essentially good, not only harmless, but positive in its goodness."

"And," they continue, "the dance is not inconsistent with the Christian life. It is only inconsistent with the 'blue laws of a narrow church.' Unreasonable rules have made it appear bad."

But my mind refuses to thus dispose of the question. I cannot go along with those who refuse to see harm in the dance. Let us consider the points once accepted by the church against it.

That the dance is based on sex cannot successfully be denied. No other (Continued on Page 11)

Baptists Report On Cuba Crusade

Atlanta, Ga. (MNS) — Evangelistic crusades in 92 Baptist churches and missions of Cuba have resulted in 5,166 conversions in four months. "This was the finest series of crusades Cuba has had," said Herbert Caudill of Havana, Superintendent of Cuba Missions for the Southern Baptist Home Mission Board.

All but three of the Baptist churches affiliated with the mission board took part in the crusade. Meetings started in November and ended in March, with none held in December.

Missionary Engineering-Missionary Aviation Fellowship Merger Announced

Houghton, N. Y. (MNS)-It has been announced here that Missionary Engineering and Missionary Aviation Fellowship will begin integration procedures on June 1. In announcing the merger plans, Gordon G. Sanders, general director of Missionary Engineering, said that "the basic direction, motive and purpose of Missionary Engineering will not only be continued, but blessed with the added impetus of a wellqualified mission of like mind." He also observed that "flying and communications go hand in hand and complement one another in multiplying the missionary."

Missionary Engineering's present office in Houghton will be closed by June 1 and the office equipment and personnel will be transferred to the offices of the Missionary Aviation Fellowship.

Medical Men Return From Africa Tour

Oak Park, Ill. (MNS) — Speaking for the Christian Medical Society representatives who have just completed a tour of ten African countries, J. Raymond Knighton said that "probably the greatest area of future medical missionary work is in the field of medical education." He stressed the urgency of training African medical personnel to meet future needs for medical service in the newly formed countries.

Mr. Knighton, accompanied by Drs. Everett Koop and Gustave A. Hemwall, visited medical establishments of 20 missionary organizations, eight university and government hospitals, and six medical schools.

Student Ministry In Tokyo

Tokyo (MNS) — A part of the Greater Tokyo Crusade in May will be a special ministry to the 300,610 students enrolled in the city's 156 universities. This specialized effort will be under the direction of Bill Bright, founder-director of Campus Crusade for Christ. Working with him will be a team of experienced campus workers.

Missionaries Serving Under E. F. M. A. Reach New High

Grand Rapids, Mich. (MNS)—The Evangelical Foreign Missions Association meeting here in its 16th annual convention April 11-14 received two missionary agencies into membership bringing the total of missionaries serving under its member boards to 5,586. The two new members are the Latin America Mission, Bogota, New Jersey (145 missionaries), and the Pilgrim Church Foreign Department, Indianapolis, Indiana (118 missionaries).

Mission executives gathered for the convention heard Rev. David Adeney, Far East secretary of the International Fellowship of Evangelical Students, declare that foreign missions today must find a way to reach the teeming millions of young people who have been swept up in great social, economic and political changes. He recommended that missionaries give close attention to encouraging Christian university students to carry on an effective witness on their campuses. Training courses designed to prepare these students as leaders should be conducted, Mr. Adeney said, in strategic areas where there are large concentrations of

Joe Weatherly, overseas vice president of Gospel Films, Inc., further emphasized the opportunities of work among the youth of the world by telling how the teen-agers of Singapore had been trained for witnessing and had reached large segments of that city's population.

Rev. James Kiefer, general director of the Child Evangelism Fellowship, continued the theme of the "Challenge of Youth on the Mission Field" by reporting on the work of his organization among the children of all nations.

Plans Progressing For Tokyo Crusade

Tokyo, Japan (MNS)—The Tokyo City Council has made the Meiji Auditorium available for the Christian Crusade to be held here May 6 to June 5. A contract has also been signed for nationwide television coverage of the crusade for 30 minutes each week on 17 stations.

More than 600 churches in the Greater Tokyo area have joined hands for this mighty soul-winning effort in a culture 99½ per cent non-Christian. Thousands of Japanese Christians have been undergoing weeks of intensive counselor training, and many hundreds of others have been preparing to sing in the nightly 1000-voice choir.

In addition to the nightly evangelistic meetings, a special ministry will be directed toward the more than 300,000 university students in this city. The month-long crusade is expected to attract thousands to the Meiji Auditorium.

Dr. Bob Pierce, evangelist for the Tokyo Crusade, has issued this urgent prayer request: "The May 6-June 5 Tokyo Christian Crusade represents a thrilling venture of faith on the part of the church in Japan. Well over 600 churches in the Greater Tokyo area have joined hands for this mighty soulwinning venture . . . and they plead with the church throughout the rest of the world to stand with them in earnest, believing prayer. I am humbly grateful for this opportunity of helping them minister to the world's largest city, and I add to their's my fervent plea for prayer."

Missionaries At Manaus, Brazil To Return To Stations

Manaus, Brazil (MNS)—After being released from trumped-up charges by the Brazilian Army (see MNS, March 1), missionaries of the New Tribes Mission have been forbidden to return to their stations in the border areas of Brazil's hinterland.

The army maintains that an old colonial law forbids foreigners to live within 150 kilometers (about 100 miles) of international borders without special permission from the National Security Commission. The Commission will determine whether missionaries are going to be permitted in the area.

It has been reported that the Unevangelized Fields Mission, working in the territory of Rio Branco, has been prohibited from operating in areas near the international frontiers and has pulled its operations back to the city of Boa Vista pending action by the National Security Commission in Rio de Janeiro.

institution, outside of marriage, depends on the participation of both sexes, and while human nature is human nature, such positions would, in any situation, other than family relationships, be taken only for the sex thrill. By what mental alchemy does this physical juxtaposition of the sexes become harmless in the dance?

And here we may ask: "What part might this institution—the dance have in the sex debacle of this generation?" This debacle may be shown by one quotation from a news item: "Pregnancy among unmarried adolescent girls is increasing, possibly influenced by teen-age tolerance toward sexual activity," a government worker, Mrs. Katherine Brownell Oettinger, chief of the U. S. Children's Bureau said. "The rate of motherhood per 1000 unmarried women tripled between 1940 and 1956" (quoting from an item in the Progress-Bulletin of Pomona, Calif.)

Statistics attest that we are living in a constant sex-atmosphere in the social life of America today. In checking all possible causes of this sex-atmosphere, I would name as an A-1 cause—the dance—an institution depending for its very existence, on the pairing of the sexes with physical contact.

Let us quote some of those Scripture passages against which, the dance has opposed itself: "Come ye out from among them and be ye separate; Make no provision for the flesh to fulfill the lusts thereof: Whosoever therefore is a friend of the world, is an enemy of God; Follow holiness, without which no man shall see the Lord; To keep himself unspotted from the world; But ye are washed, but ye are sanctified."

These Scripture quotations, with large numbers of others, and the great teachings embedded in them, with an honest interpretation, give nothing but condemnation for the dance. That divine institution—the church—must not tolerate this institution of the world—the dance.

Dancing is inconsistent with the individual Christian life. If I am a dancing church member, I profess that I am born again, and yet I dance. I know that I must strive after holiness—yet I dance with the world that crucified Him. This inconsistency escapes criticism in large measure, for worldliness is a theme not used in the pulpit today.

I cannot change the convictions, (Continued on Page 14)

Mrs. Program-Prayer Chairman, great are your opportunities. To take advantage of these opportunities you must be prepared not only by information but also by inspiration. These can be secured only through study and prayer. One of your most important tasks is the setting forth of an examplar prayer life. In this way you can encourage prayer in the lives of others. You must believe that your job is important, that it is the Lord's work. Your's is a position of trust, given to you not only by the women in your auxiliary but by the Lord. It is most important that you be found faithful to this trust.

The privilege of planning the monthly programs given in the Co-Laborer Magazine is the programprayer chairman's. There you have basic material for the program and suggestions on how to present it. However the presented program should offer something more than what the women have read from their Co-Laborer. Take advantage of all your sources of material. Keep your old Year Books and Co-Laborer Magazines to refer to at various times. You can find helpful information in our own periodicals, as well as other Christain literature. Some of the things that prove useful to the program are missionary films, drama, illustrated maps, and pictures. The use of a native costume or food can prove interesting in a missionary program.

There are different ways the program can be presented such as panel discussion or panel of experts, a radio or television program, conversation over the telephone as a skit, or the program could be given in the form of a debate using outstanding (fictitious) personalities. The use of variety in the program will keep your auxiliary look-

ing forward to the next meeting with anticipation.

Plan your program weeks in advance; this will enable the participants to have plenty of time to prepare their parts. Keeping the needs of your auxiliary in mind, adapt the material and presentation to your local situation.

The use of attractive posters announcing the meeting will do much to arouse the interest of the women in the church that are not active members of the auxiliary.

You, the program-prayer chairman, are responsible for point seven on the Standard of Achievement Chart; that is "All prayer seasons and weeks of prayer as suggested by the WNAC should be engaged in and offerings received."

The weeks of prayer are to be observed the week preceding Easter, Thanksgiving, and Christmas of each year. Much prayer and planning must go into the preparation of these prayer programs, but as a result the women of the auxiliary will be brought into a closer fellowship with the Lord and have a greater vision for missions.

If it is extremely difficult for the members to attend a full week, attractive folders with Scripture references and definite objects of prayer for each day may be distributed among the members and then at the end of the week they can come together for a program and the giving of their offerings.

The program-prayer chairman should strive to enlist each member of the auxiliary in the special prayer fellowship hour. At this time women throughout our denomination are praying for the same things. God honors such prayer for He tells us in His word, "Again I say unto you, That if two of you shall agree on earth as touching anything that they shall ask, it shall be done for them of my Father which is in heaven." Matt. 18:19. A prayer calendar is given in the Co-Laborer Magazine.

Too much cannot be said about the need for family altars in the home to-day. The home, more than school, church, or amusement center, determines character. It is the combined personal character and integrity of individuals that determines our Nation's future. It is in the home that the pattern of life is established and destiny determined. "Bring up a child in the way he should go and when he is old he will not depart from it." Proverbs 22:6. What is the way to bring up a child? Jesus replied to Thomas, "I am the way, the truth, and the life."

According to J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the rising tide of juvenile delinquency is in direct ratio to the breakdown of family altars in America.

You, Madame Chairman, can do something about this: you have the responsibility of promoting family altars in the homes of the members of your church. Here again you must know from personal experience the value of having a family altar. In order to promote family altars you must have one in your own home.

First, make a survey in your church to see how many families are having a time of Bible reading and prayer in
