

Mt. Olive College President Attacks Bible College

An Editorial ...

In a recent news release the president of Mt. Olive College, Dr. W. Burkette Raper attacked Free Will Baptist Bible College of Nashville, Tennessee and blamed the denominationally owned school for all of the troubles in the state of North Carolina. Mt. Olive College is owned by the North Carolina State Association and receives its name from the town it occupies and not from the Biblical location.

As Editor of the Gem, I have remained silent on many of these issues in North Carolina and had not intended to publish any of their troubles for Missourians to read. Over a year ago I ceased to publish any news releases from Mt. Olive College because I did not approve of it personally and because I had received several letters of criticism for doing so. But Dr. Raper has attacked something I love dearly and I feel that I can no longer keep silent. He can call me all the names he wants to, but when he attacks a member of my family then I'm ready to retaliate. Attacking Free Will Baptist Bible College is the same as attacking one of my family.

I attended Free Will Baptist Bible College for one year in 1948-49 and then returned to complete my education there in the period from 1952 to 1955. I consider it one of the greatest honors in my life that I received my B. A. Degree from Free Will Baptist Bible College. A lot of folks have made a fuss over the fact that the College has not been accredited until its recent accreditation by the Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges, but I am convinced that Free Will Baptist Bible College has been accredited by God since the day its doors were opened in 1942. From its buildings have come many of the leaders of our denomination today. Most of our Missionaries received their training there. The major emphasis at the Bible College is on consecration. The Person honored is the Lord Jesus Christ. It is small wonder that God has blessed our school as He has. It is small wonder that Satan will use his forces to attack this school if he can.


The troubles in the state of North Carolina began many years ago. They are just coming to light now. I pastored in that state for two years after my graduation from the Bible College. I know from personal experience that the Conferences in the eastern part of the state have controlled the churches instead of the churches controlling the Conferences. On one occasion the moderator of the Eastern Conference told me that they had to be careful lest some of these churches got out from under their control. And that is exactly what is happening in that section now. Some of the pastors and their congregations are sick and tired of being told what to do. In one instance the moderator of the Western Conference came into the pulpit of a church and conducted a business meeting of the church and had the pastor 'voted out." He tried to do the same thing with another pastor and this young man rebelled and went to a court of law. The Conference has countered with their own law-suit and came to court armed with affidavits from some fifty preachers of that area who swore that Free Will Baptists did not believe in congregational church government but in connectional church government. Free Will Baptists in that area like to call themselves "original" and, brother, I must admit that they came up with something original with their claim to connectional church government.

Praise the Lord for the fact that Free Will Baptists at their recent National Association in Norfolk, Va., reaffirmed their historic belief in congregational church government. Furthermore, any minister holding any office in the National Association who had signed one of these affidavits was relieved from that office. Could this be the reason for Dr. Raper's article? He was relieved from his position on the National League Board and is more

than likely embarrassed by this action of the National Association. The news of the action came out on the wires of the Associated Press and was carried in front page articles in some North Carolina newspapers. Small wonder that Dr. Raper might be embarrassed.

It appears that Dr. Raper is now trying to shift the blame of the difficulties on someone else rather than shoulder it himself. Here are some quotations from his press release, "We believe that the issue of church government was only a pretense for our impeachment from offices. (Here, Dr. Raper is acting as spokesman for the group of men who were terminated by the National Association.) We believe the basic issue is the educational philosophy of Mount Olive College." He goes on to accuse Dr. L. C. Johnson, President of Free Will Baptist College as being opposed to Mount Olive College. He attacks Dean Charles A. Thigpen of the Bible College for making the motion on the floor of the National Association that the "connectional church government men" be impeached from their offices. He points out that all of these offices were filled by someone either connected with the Bible College or who is a graduate of the school. I believe this is to the credit of our denomination. I am thrilled that many of these offices are being filled by consecrated young men, who do not use tobacco, and who have other strong convictions that were instilled in them at Free Will Baptist Bible College. Let's not kid ourselves. Our denomination has made great strides forward ever since the establishment of our Bible College. God's hand has been upon us for our foresight in providing such a place to train our young people. This school was brought into being because a young lady appeared before the National Association years ago and pleaded with the denomination to provide a place of training for its young people.


MT. OLIVE COLLEGE PRESIDENT ATTACKS BIBLE COLLEGE

New Book— 'Evangelism-In-Depth'

Chicago, Ill. (MNS)—Under the title of Evangelism-in-Depth, an account of the recent evangelism program in Nicaragua and Costa Rica has been written. The book just released by Moody Press gives a step by step account of the development of the Evangelism-In-Depth program with the view of encouraging Christians in other places to undertake similar endeavors.

After relating the story of the eventful months of the campaign, a chapter is dedicated to an appraisal of the whole program. It is an objective look at the shortcomings of the program as well as its accomplishments—a refreshing report of a united spiritual effort against a common foe. It pictures national churches and foreign missionaries (denominational and nondenominational) all working together for six months to achieve one common goal of reaching the nation for Christ.

The first meeting of the State Association of Illinois convened at the Free Will Baptist Camp meeting grounds in Benton, Illinois, June 25th with a very large representation of the majority of the churches related to the Yearly Meeting.

This was a historic occasion as this fine assembly gathered in one of the most impressive denominational centers to be found within any State. It is a ten acre grove of stately oak trees covered with modern buildings. In the center is an imposing Tabernacle with a seating capacity of five hundred.

With the organization of the State Association the Free Will Baptists of Illinois becomes more related to the forces of the National Association and will become more effective.

This great State has reason to look back into its past history with pride. A stalwart group of noble men and women with fine churches made up the pioneer history of the Free Baptist in this State. Finally came the merger and the loss of entire congregations and imposing church edifices, some of these still bear the name, "Free Baptist Church," over their doors. Thank God, a few of the churches are saved to our denomination such as the Bear Point Church at Sasser, Illinois. This church has a history of over ninety years of continued activity.

As I write, visiting in the home of Rev. Jack Ketteman and his wife, I have before me a world of historical data kept by the parents of the Ketteman faithful Free Will Baptists who with a few, kept their identity. They have minutes of the Yearly Meetings, dating back to 1800. Even at that time as we read we can sense the trend toward the "sell out."

The two outstanding men who were strong opponents against the famous merger, stood against great opposition, are still with us, Rev. W. R. Burton,

now living in Whitting, Illinois and Rev. W. R. Spurlock, Bonnie, Illinois.

This State organization represents a progressive advance on all fronts of National endeavor. They are back of a strong Youth organization, also progressive up-to-date Sunday School program. It is interesting to note that the Sunday School Union bought the camp property. Plans were made and passed to place a full-time evangelist on the field to open new churches.

The camp has become the very center of the Free Will Baptist activity, related to all phases of the denomination. It is the official meeting place for the State meetings, youth camps, Sunday School Union and the Woman's Auxiliaries. Two summer camps will be held this summer. The Foreign Missionary Conference, with all the churches co-operating, just finished their annual conference at the camp.

Thirty-five or more churches have come together to form the State Association. Rev. Leon McBride moderated this historic association with great dignity, patience and courtesy to all. There was a sweet spirit of harmony, Christian love and fellowship. It was indeed refreshing to come to the end of a conference of this size and witness nothing but joyful unity.


A very representative group of delegates will represent this new State Association at the coming National meeting.

Mission Attacked In Jerusalem

Jerusalem (Israeli Sector)—MNS—A mission of the Church of Christ has been forced to cancel services because of the attacks of Jewish religious fanatics. Beginning in April the tiny stone church used by the Church of Christ

has regularly been molested during each worship service. Early in July the attacking crowds became so large and violent that services were called off pending protection from the authorities.

After the story received wide coverage in the United States, the Jerusalem police promised police protection each Sunday and Wednesday, so that services could be conducted.

Several stonings resulted in the smashing of virtually all the windows in the church. Leaders and members of the church have been threatened by the fanatics.

Other reports indicate that missionaries of various organizations are encountering difficulty in getting their visas renewed. It is felt that the Eichmann trial has contributed to the anti-Christian sentiment here.

National Association Votes To Sell Headquarters Property Norfolk, Va.—

At the recent session of the National Association the delegates voted overwhelmingly to sell the old Headquarters building at 3801 Richland Ave. and build a new \$100,000.00 building at a site that is yet to be selected. Plans for the new building were displayed by the Executive Department and will house the various Departments of the National Association. The building will not get under way until 20% of the funds are raised to pay for it. Other highlights of the Convention are pointed out in pictures elsewhere in the Gem.

SERMON OF THE MONTH

Romans 1:1; Matthew 16:24

In the Book of Exodus a very colorful service of the consecration of the priests is described. The priests laid aside their old garments and were washed in pure water. They were dressed in white linen clothing, with a needle-wrought girdle with flowers of purple, blue, scarlet mixed with white. They wore a cap of linen in the shape of a flower cup.

The blood of the consecration lamb was sprinkled on the lobe of the right ear (implying openness to hear God's voice), to the right hand (to dispense God's gifts), and to the right foot (always to walk in God's ways). A perfume of very precious oil was sprinkled upon their heads.

The priests remained in the Tabernacle for seven days separated from the people and unto God. After this their hands were filled with three kinds of bread: unleavened cakes, cakes of oil bread, and oiled wafers. They waved the whole mass to and fro expressing their praise and thanksgiving to God. After this the priests were ready for service to God and man.

This ceremony signified that their whole being was dedicated to God. It symbolized Calvary. It symbolized identification with the crucified One.

My Commitment to Christ

This message was delivered at the eleven o'clock hour on Wednesday at the National Association.

To Christ the cross meant one thing—the sacrificing of Himself to save others. And that is what it must mean to every disciple. Consecration means a cross. It means death to self and identification with Christ. We cannot skip from the wonderful doctrine of Justification in Romans 5 to Consecration in Romans 12 without identification in Romans 6 through 8.

Three things are necessary in consecration in order for our commitment to Christ to be of value. (1) Self-denial; (2) Separation; (3) Service.

When Christ came to this world, He found man all wrapped up in one thing -self. Jesus wanted more than just a following-more than just a crowd. He wanted men who would build and fight for His kingdom and die for this cause. The crowds followed Him as long as He healed their sick, fed their empty stomachs. They wanted to crown Him king. They laid their cloaks down on the streets when He rode in on His triumphant entry into Jerusalem. But when He gave these severe terms for discipleship, they left Him. When He talked of the keys to the kingdom, His disciples were all ears, but when He mentioned the cross and their cross they fell back. Don't criticize my brother, we are guilty of this so many

Jesus said in no uncertain terms, "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, take up his cross and follow me." Jesus realized that until self was put out of the way, His followers could never get the job done.

Selfish pride is a great destroyer of souls. We talk a lot about pride and selfishness but are we willing to deny self and turn completely to God?

Selfishness is a dreadful cancer that eats away at the soul of man, and if self is not crucified Christ will be. Selfcenteredness produces a self that you

can't live with. Doctors say that the majority of people that come to their offices are suffering from selfishness.

A woman was going to a doctor many weeks and he couldn't seem to get her straightened out. One day she said to him, "You know doctor, I am very sensitive." "Yes," he replied, "I know you are very selfish." "Oh, but I didn't say I was selfish," she said. "I did," was his reply. She slammed the door as she rushed out of his office. But ten days later she came back to him in tears and confessed that he was right.

Pride and selfish ambition have destroyed many a good preacher. Oh, that God would help us to see ourselves as we are. Oh, that we could see ourselves as others see us.

"O wad somi power the giftie gie us, To see ourselves as ithers see us."

The incident that inspired Browning to write this couplet was an experience in church. A lady filled with pride came strutting down the isle of the church dressed in the latest fashion. She felt that all the church should bow to her. She sat down right in front of him and as he was looking her over he saw something crawling up the side of her hat. On closer in spection he noticed that it was a louse. He then went home and wrote this couplet.

Pride is such a dangerous thing. It can breed jealousy among ministers. It can cause undermining and gossip. It can lead to splits in churches and denominations and life-long friendships. Oh, that God would break our pride and fill us with the Holy Spirit until we are able to learn what self-denial means. If we could see ourselves as others see us it might prove to be very humiliating.

The disciples were arguing one day over their positions in the kingdom of Christ. Some wanted the seats of honor and power. They had given up everything to follow Jesus—their homes, families, occupations—everything that is, but themselves.

Jesus knew that these men needed to learn a lesson so He took them to the upper room, girded Himself with a towel and began to wash their feet. Here was their Master taking the place of a servant. Jesus, by this simple action had turned these angry, selfish men into humble servants of mankind that would turn the world upside down. It was not enough for Jesus to command that they be humble, He must show them what humility is by taking the place of a servant. I am glad that on our 25th Anniversary we still cling to the beautiful doctrine of the Washing of the Saints Feet. If our people are taught what this beautiful ordinance means and then will go out and put it into daily practice, it will be the most beautiful service rendered in your church.

One of the great needs in the church and among the ministers is humility. John Branscomb said, "Humility is such a tender quality and turns on such a fine hair, that if one becomes conscious of his humility, he loses it."

To deny self is not necessarily giving up some pet sin—sacrificing something we like—practicing self-denial in the Lenten season. A man may do good deeds for selfish glory. It is possible for a man to go to the mission field and not deny self. It is possible for a young man to spend sacrificial years in preparation for the ministry and fail to deny self.

To deny self is utter abandonment of self. Paul expressed it in Romans 1:1. A bond-slave in Paul's day had no mind of his own—owned nothing—was nothing. Plutarch tells how Flaminius put a slave to death for a guest who had never seen anyone die.

We are to be bondslaves of Jesus. Saul "the big one" was the greatest threat to Christianity but on the Damascus Road he met Jesus and his life was changed. He was saved and changed to Paul "the little one." It is the service of perfect freedom that Paul describes in Romans 1:1. This phrase goes back to a ceremony in Exodus 21. A man who was in debt became the property of his creditor. He had to serve this man as master for seven years. After this time he could go free. Many of these slaves did not wish to go free. They loved their masters. When this was the case the priest would lead the man to the door of the

Tabernacle and bore a hole in the lobe of his ear. This signified that the slave was a free slave. He was known as a bondslave—a man who could have been free, but chose to remain a slave. Perhaps this is what Frances Havergal had in mind when he wrote:

I love, I love my Master,
I will not go out free,
For He is my Redeemer;
He paid the price for me.
I would not leave His service
It is so sweet and blest;
And in the weariest moments,
He gives the truest rest.

To deny self is to dethrone self, and put Christ on the throne. I deny self when I hand over the keys of my heart to Christ and let Him rule.

To deny self is to ignore self. One of the most insulting things in life is to be ignored. We must, in reality, insult self by ignoring self. L. E. Maxwell said, "It is taking a blank sheet of paper and, breathing my last breath, as it were, signing on the dotted line at the bottom of the page."

The Second Step in My Commitment Is Full Surrender, or Submission

When Jesus came to Peter to wash his feet, Peter said, "Lord dost Thou wash my feet?" Jesus said, "What I do thou knowest not now; but thou shalt know hereafter." Peter said, "Thou shalt never wash my feet." Jesus said, "If I wash thee not thou hast no part with me." Then note how Peter answered Jesus. "Lord, not my feet only, but also my hands and my head." This is full surrender. Perhaps Peter did not know until after Pentecost what full surrender would mean, but he was sincere and for that at least he gave his all to Jesus.

This is the great need among Christians and among ministers. We need to fully surrender our lives to Jesus. We need to take hands off of self and give our all to Him.

Fifteen years ago I said the marriage vows to a beautiful young lady. I was saying in reality, "I am no longer my own. What I have I give to you. My life is yours. My love is yours. I am yours as long as we both live. I belong to you and to no other woman on earth."

In surrender to Christ we say the same. Paul expressed it when he said, "What? know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost which is in you, which ye have of God, and ye are not your own." We are not our own. Jesus has every right to expect the full surrender of our lives to Him.

This means that we are separated

unto the Gospel. Full surrender means full separation. I believe in Separation from the world to be sure. We too often quote Romans 12:1 and forget the separation in Romans 12:2. But I believe it includes separation to the Gospel. The man who tries to separate himself from the world without being separated unto Christ becomes confused. So many times we meet selfrighteous people who are narrow and even cantankerous in spirit because all their lives they go around boasting of giving up this thing and of the things they don't do-yet never do anything for Jesus.

If you come to Jesus and surrender your all to Him you won't have to give up the world, the world will give you up.

The Third Essential Step in My Commitment to Christ is Service

After the crucifixion and resurrection Christ appeared to His disciples after they had been fishing all night. At the fire where they were cooking the fish Jesus asked Peter three important questions. He said, "Peter lovest thou Me more than these?" Three times He asked the same question. Peter being a little grieved the third time answered, "Lord, Thou knowest all things, Thou knowest that I love Thee." In these three questions we note the service Peter is to renderfeeding the lambs and the sheep. But we also notice something else of very great importance—the motive for service, which is love. Jesus demands first and foremost, our love.

It is possible to serve without love but it is impossible to love without serving, and Jesus knew that to get Peter's service He would need His love.

We cannot measure love by service because we may serve and not love. We get so busy serving many times that we fail to take time out to love Jesus. I may sing, serve, and even suffer without love. Thousands of people are doing things—anything but what God wants them to do.

We ministers must evaluate our service in terms of our love for Christ. You work many hours—long hours—that your congregation knows nothing about. Many demands are placed upon you. You rush about for ten to twelve hours each day and come home exhausted but with a feeling of satisfaction. During the day you have counseled with a husband and wife and perhaps they are reconciled together instead of entering the divorce court.

Vietnamese Church Celebrates Fiftieth Anniversary

Saigon, Viet Nam (MNS)—Celebrating fifty years of the Gospel in Viet Nam, the Evangelical Church of Viet Nam (Christian and Missionary Alliance) held anniversary services here June 11-14. Fifteen hundred persons, including many government officials, attended the Sunday services at the Hoi Tin Lanh Church, and hundreds of others standing outside heard the message over a public address system.

0.99 During the week young people from the Saigon Vietnamese churches conducted an exposition in a building directly opposite the National Assembly building. The exposition, which showed the progress of the church, was viewed by some 15,000 people. Twelve

of these accepted Christ after personal counseling.

The C&MA opened Viet Nam to the Gospel in 1911 and has seen the work grow until the baptized church members number 25,000 and there is a Christian community of other thousands.

The Evangelical Church of Viet Nam was organized in 1927. There are now 250 organized churches and 315 national workers carrying on all the ministries of the church.

Church Closed In Portugal

Lisbon, Portugal (MNS) — Portuguese authorities have closed an Assemblies of God church near Lisbon on grounds that the church held its services in a building which was not licensed for that purpose. The church, which served some 2,000 people, was the second Protestant organization adversely affected by a government ruling in a week.

Observers attributed these actions to the accusations that Protestant missionaries in Angola were aiding native insurgents against Portuguese authorities there.

Growth of Catholic Power Noted In Mexico


Puebla, Mexico (MNS)—The government university here has become infiltrated with a group of Catholic professors who also teach at the Colegio Jacinto Benavente. The activities of these men in forcing students of this government institution to attend mass, under threat of expulsion, have raised serious questions, but the central government has refused to intervene. Student reaction against the intolerance was so violent that it required the passive intervention of the army.

This maneuver to get control in the university is believed to be part of an experiment designed to feel out the federal government to see how far it will allow the Roman Catholic Church to infringe upon the Constitution's provisions for religious freedom.

From the capital city the Secretary of Government expressed the opinion that the problem was exclusively within the jurisdiction of the university and refused to intervene. The governor of the State of Puebla accepted the position of the central government and refused to take action. Apparently unable to cope with the situation, the rector of the university resigned.



You have visited the the hospitals and after reading the Scriptures and having prayer, left the sick person with a smile of hope and faith in God for a speedy recovery. You helped a teen-ager get on the right track and all in all it has been a full but successful day.

But why did you do it? Why did you put in all those hours rushing from one appointment to another? Why did you knock on doors? Was it out of love for Jesus or for self praise and glory? Why do you want your Sunday School to grow? To glorify God and win souls or to keep up with the brother minister and his church? We must be honest with ourselves and with God. We must be able to say with John the Baptist, "He must increase, but I must decrease."

John explained to his disciples that He was not the Christ but only sent to prepare the way for the Christ. He used as illustration the wedding ceremony where the friend of the bridegroom hands the bride over to the groom and when the voice of the groom is heard the friend steps out of the spotlight and rejoices. John was not striking a note of defeat but of victory that his task had been accomplished. The service to God had been rendered and now he is stepping off the scene and giving place to Jesus.

Our task is not to win men to ourselves but to Jesus, not to our church but to Jesus. We are to exalt Him in our preaching. Men must not see the preacher but Jesus. Many preachers are building empires in their glory as did the builders of Babel and making Jesus sit on the back pew.

I believe that if we had the proper love for Jesus we would have the proper love for each other. If we get our motive for service in its proper place, I do believe we could settle many local church differences and many denominational differences. If we love Jesus we would not be jealous of a brother pastor whose church is growing faster than our own.

The results of my full commitment to Christ is that the Father will love me and will make His abode with me. Isn't this a wonderful thought that the Father will make His abode with us in time of trials, temptations, testings? If He is on our side how can we be defeated? Christ loves us more than (Continued on Page 11)

Statement Adopted by the National Association Relative to the Church Government Issue

One of the distinguishing characteristics of all Baptist groups has been their democratic form of government. Almost without exception, Baptist bodies have adhered to this form of church government. Free Will Baptists are no exception. However, in these days of changing outlooks and methods, it appears that in certain areas of the Free Will Baptist Church there is a definite deviation from congregational government. In the light of this fact, we recommend that the National Association of Free Will Baptists reaffirm its position relative to church government with the adoption of the following statement.

The National Association of Free Will Baptists believes now, as it has always believed, in the independence of the local church; holding that "the local church is an independent body, so far as it relates to its own government, the transaction of its business, the choice of its officers, and the discipline of its members," and these rights cannot be denied the local church by any other organization within or without the denomination.

The local church has every right to hold and retain title to all property owned by it. A board of trustees, elected for this purpose shall be invested with authority from the church to make proper and legal transactions, subject to the will and order of the church, and they shall be the custodians of all such documents. Free Will Baptist churches are to be discouraged from surrendering any of these rights to any other organization under any circumstances.

Free Will Baptist churches have the right to employ any Free Will Baptist minister as pastor, who is in good standing with the denomination, regardless of his place of residence. It is understood that this right cannot properly be denied any local church by any subsequent action of a quarterly meeting, yearly meeting, district association, national association, or any other group. Free Will Baptist churches are to be discouraged from employing ministers who are not Free Will Baptists or Free Will Baptist ministers who are not in good standing with the association in which they have membership.

We recognize the value of Free Will Baptist churches coming together for the

purpose of mutual fellowship and endeavor and the establishment of proper organization for the unifying of our purposes and the accomplishment of our goals. However, we also recognize the dangers inherent in organizational machinery which is too cumbersome and complicated, or which tends to destroy congregational government, investing undue power in the hands of a few. Such organization makes subjects of those who come under it and consequently throttles the democratic processes of church government which we hold dear.

We are unalterably opposed to any organizational machinery within our denomination at any level that would bring pressure to bear on any group or individual who could not or would not conform to set patterns other than that prescribed in the Treatise of Faith and Practice of the National Association of Free Will Baptists.

Therefore, we strongly urge each Free Will Baptist church within our denomination to steadfastly resist any effort on the part of a quarterly meeting, district association or conference, state association, national association, or any other body to take from the local church its inherent and Scriptural rights as an autonomous body.

It is granted that in instances where a church has violated its covenant, become heretical or corrupt in practice, the quarterly meeting may investigate the matter, and after suitable labor, withdraw fellowship if the situation cannot be resolved. It is understood that to withdraw fellowship is the only form of discipline which may be brought against a local church since the final disposition of any matter within a church must be decided by the majority.

That further from our own experience and observations as Original Free Will Baptist ministers, we know that it is generally accepted and understood not only by us as ministers but also by members of our congregations that the Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina operate under a connectional form of church government not only by virtue of long established customs, practices, and usages, but also as a result of our Statement of Faith and Discipline 1955 revision, Sections entitled, "Church Covenant" page 42; "Organization of a Church" page 44; "Pastor" page 46; "The Ministry"

page 47 and 48; "Independence of Churches" page 52 and 53; "Constitution and By-Laws" pages 53, 54, 55, 56. (Orders 4736, 4737, 4738)

And, whereas, on the basis of the above claim, with others, His Honor Clawson L. Williams, Sr., Judge presiding at the Superior Court of Durham County, Durham, North Carolina, issued an order which reads in part as follows:

That the Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina had their beginning in this State in the year 1727 with the stablishment of a church of this denomination by Paul Palmer in Perquimans County, North Carolina. That there are three churches now in existence which were founded by Reverend Palmer. That the Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina are the oldest and largest state group in the United States now numbering some 50,000. That this denomination has historically differed from other Baptist denominations in that they have been more connectional in their church government as will be hereinafter set forth in more detail.

That between the plaintiff and the defended there is a connectional form of church government based upon their printed Statement of Faith and Discipline and the customs, practices and usages of this denomination. (Order 4736)

Therefore, be it resolved that the National Association of Free Will Baptists request the State Convention of Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina to repudiate any and all forms of connectional church government and reaffirm its position in our historic and established form of congregational church government as set forth in the Treatise of Faith and Practice of the National Association of Free Will Baptists at its next regular session. It is to be understood that no state, district association, or other body affiliated with the National Association of Free Will Baptists has the right to establish its own form of church government by virtue of the PROVISION AND CLAIM, page 39, section 1, of the National Treatise. This provision permits states, district associations, or other bodies to adhere to established usages and customs only in the election of representatives and delegates to said state or district body.


