

N. C. State Convention Is Stormy

Mt. Olive, N. C.-

Sixty delegates walked out of the State Convention of North Carolina Free Will Baptists that met September 14, 15 at Mt. Olive, N. C. The Convention refused to seat other delegates because they refused to sign a registration card that contained a clause which stated they must accept the convention's "statement of faith and discipline." (The North Carolina State Convention has never operated under the treatise of the National Association. They have always had their own.) To sign the card would mean to approve "connectional church government." THE STATE CONVENTION RE-FUSED TO REPUDIATE CONNEC-TIONAL CHURCH GOVERNMENT. They were asked to do so by the National Association. Instead they reaffirmed their position on church government as being connectional.

Another interesting fact came to light when the Rev. Herman Hersey, pastor of the Raleigh, N. C. church, rose and asked, "Has any faculty member of Mt. Olive Junior College ever pleaded the first, fifth, or tenth amendments on charges of practicing unamerican activities or communism?' The moderator, S. A. Smith of Beaulaville, N. C. gaveled Hersey out of order. It is significant that a few days after the Convention the faculty member in question resigned his position as Professor of Social Studies. His name is William Evans and he did appear before the House Unamerican Activities Committee in 1956. When he was



questioned at that time by the Committee as to his affiliation with the communist party he invoked the fifth amendment.

The delegates who walked out of the Convention met the next day at Goldsboro, N. C. and organized their own State organization. They chose Rev. Frank Davenport as their moderator. This group affirmed their belief that each church is an autonomous Baptist body. A steering committee was picked to draw up a Constitution and By-Laws. It is reported that this group represents some 18,000 of the 40,000 Free Will Baptists in the state.

Washington, D. C .--

On Monday, September 18th at 10:00 a.m. in the office of J. Edgar Hoover, Department of Justice building, Washington, D. C., officials of the National Sunday School Association met with Mr. Hoover to present a Bible with proper inscription as recognition of his interest in Sunday School and influence on Sunday School leaders during the past decade.

Dr. Clate A. Risley, executive secretary of NSSA, introduced Dr. Lloyd Knox, president of National Sunday School Association, who made the presentation.

Dr. Knox stated, "On behalf of the National Sunday School Association, its board of directors and General Council, I deem it a great privilege to congratulate you for your concern for the youth of America. We are here to express our appreciation for your understanding of the determinative role of the Sunday Schools in our nation.

"Yours has been a sure voice for the best and against the worst. Over many years your expressions of support of the Sunday School have been heartening to the thousands of people who, each week, give themselves unselfishly to teaching in our Sunday Schools.

"Your words have given urgency to our efforts and have helped our nation to become more aware of this educational movement as a character-building force.

SERMON OF THE MONTH

God's Men With God's Message

> by Rev. R. B. Spurgeon

Pastor—Third Free Will Baptist Church, St. Louis

(Author's Note: Much of the material in this message is quotations and opinions expressed by other men of God. In most cases where this is so I have given credit to the author. If I have missed some in this regard it is with regret and apology.)

"Ye have not gone up into the gaps, neither made up the hedge for the house of Israel to stand in the day of battle in the day of the Lord." Ezekiel 13:5

"And I sought for a man among them, that should make up the hedge, and stand in the gap before me for the land, that I should not destroy it: but I found none." Ezekiel 22:30

First of all I should like to draw to your attention the circumstances which caused God to speak these words to Ezekiel.

In 721 B. C., because of the sins of the northern kingdom of Israel, God had allowed Sargon II of Assyria to sweep down across Israel, destroy her cities, and carry away her people in captivity. In 606 B. C., Nebuchadnezzar, on his way from battle in Egypt, swept through the city of Jerusalem taking many captives; among them was Daniel. In 597 B. C., the King of Judah rebelled against Nebuchadnezzar. It is at this time when Nebuchadnezzar puts down the rebellion that Ezekiel is taken captive.

Ezekiel's prophecies date from 592 B. C. to 570 B. C. (First vision to last

vision). Therefore when God spoke the words of our text the situation was indeed grave. Judah and Israel were both overrun, their people taken captive, and their cities in ruins.

In chapter 22 of Ezekiel, God tells them the why of their captivity and the reason for their suffering. In verse 2, God tells them Jerusalem had been a city of murder (bloody city); in verse 7, God says they had oppressed the stranger, the widow, and the fatherless; in verse 8, God says they had despised holy things; in verses 10 and 11, God charges them with fornication and adultery; in verse 13, they are accused of having been dishonest in business; in verse 24, God tells them they had not been cleansed from their sins; and in verses 25-28, God says even their prophets had conspired to devour souls, profane holy things and had been liars.

But in verse 30 is the most pathetic accusation of all! God says He looked for a man to be concerned and disturbed about all of those conditions, and to intercede for the land and HE FOUND NONE!!

How tragic! How pathetic! When God looks for a man to carry His message and finds none.

However, before we condemn this people let us pause briefly and draw some parallel truths between Israel and Judah and our own beloved nation and church of today.

Recently at a U. S. Prayer Break-


On the left is the man who preached the Keynote Message at the State Convention. Below is the Message he delivered. Read it carefully.

fast group, Senator Strom Thurmond made this statement "Our nation—indeed the world—today stands in our gravest time of peril, from the standpoint of human survival on earth. Nuclear, thermonuclear, chemical and biological w e a p o n s, and the swift means to deliver the weapons of mass destruction to virtually any point on earth carry grave signs that perhaps the Biblically - prophesied B attle of Armageddon may not be too far away. Many who once scoffed at this prophecy... are now concerned for fear of its validity.

"For our nation to come through these dangerous times with survival preservation of our liberties, we need not only to remain strong economically and militarily, but — above all — we must be strong spiritually and ever seek the guidance of Almighty God. We must be sure—as Mr. Lincoln so aptly put it years ago— not only that God is on our side, but more importantly, that we are on God's side, individually and as a nation.

"Our nation, though richly blessed by God, is certainly not immune from His judgment. Therefore, every American must give consideration, prayer, and effort toward individual spiritual regeneration so there can be no question as to our nation's being on God's side. We, who are in positions of leadership, must be humble and seek God's guidance in determining the course of our nation. For, it is written in Proverbs:

"Righteousness exalteth a nation...."

President Lincoln closed his message to Congress in December, 1862 with these words, "We shall nobly save, or meanly lose, the last, best hope of earth."

According to a crime report released a few days ago by the F. B. I. for the year 1960 serious crime increased 14%over 1959. For the decade of 1950 to 1960 crime increased 98% while the population increased 18%. During 1960 there was a serious crime committed every 15 seconds, there was a murder every 58 minutes, a forcible rape every 34 m i n u t e s, and over 200,000 unwed mothers. The crime rate has been rising four times faster than the population for the past five years.

Are we not guilty of the sins of Judah and Israel?

Dare we close our eyes to facts and say this is not happening in our country? I believe here tonight God is searching in the ranks of Missouri Free Will Baptists for men and women to build a hedge to stand against this decay of morals. As evangelical Bible believing Christians let us meet this challenge.

Mr. J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the F. B. I., recently said this, "Today, the forces of materialism are directing their most concentrated power against the very wellsprings of our strength. The forward march of secularism is visible in many areas. It is apparent in much of what we read and much of what we see. The promotion of the sensual seems to be the purpose of whole shelves of books and magazines. On every hand, deliberate pandering to the lower instincts is apparent.

We are today threatened by twin menaces. Materialism has f a t h e r e d both crime and communism. The criminal statistics for the year just past attest to the steady growth of the one evil. The progress of the other — and the intensity of the struggle in which we are engaged with it — does not yield to such forthright measure.

No man can know the destiny that is decreed for our nation but these are signs that free men can ignore only at the peril of their freedom. The greatness of our nation is spiritual in origin. The broad achievements which we enjoy today come from vision born of faith, sustained by unshakable resolution, and supported by increasing effort....

These words are not the words of religious fanatics, but rather of political and governmental leaders who are concerned with the future of our land. Fellow Free Will Baptists, we have been drinking from a vast spiritual reservoir of strength which we inherited, but that reservoir is not limitless, it must be replenished by us if we are to leave a spiritual legacy for our children.

Tonight, here in this great audience of people God is searching for faithful men and women to stand in the gaps, gaps that are being caused by materialism, liberalism, pleasurism, complacency, self satisfaction, and mediocricy.

I do not believe hope is gone and God is dead, but God is looking for men to take His message to the ends of the earth.

What must be our message? What is that message? First-IT MUST BE GOD'S MESSAGE. In Hebrews 13:8 we read, "Jesus Christ the same yesterday, today, and forever." This must be our message because it is the only thing that will meet the need of mankind. Jesus Christ has been called the only universal figure of history. Whether the individual be Negro or white, European or American, savage or cultured, He meets their need. He fills the vacancy in the soul of the king in his palace as well as the empty spot in the heart of the paper boy on the corner. Oswald Chambers once said, "Jesus Christ is the representative of the whole human race in one person." The words of Christ have engraved themselves upon the hearts of countless millions across the world. His is a message filled with truth and vitalized by love until it has become deathless. It is the only light for a world in darkness, it is the only safe guide in a world society of confusion, it is the only hope in a world of hopelessness. Jesus Christ is the sinless Son of God. Many testify to this: Pilate said, "I find no fault in this just man," the thief on the cross said, "This man hath done nothing amiss," the centurion said, "Truly this man was the Son of God." The most telling testimony of all, however, was God Himself at the baptism of Christ and at the transfiguration when He said, "This is my beloved Son in whom I am well pleased."

I. This must be our message because Christ has done for man what He could not do for himself. II Cor. 5:21, "For he hath made Him to be sin who knew no sin that we might be made the righteousness of God in Him."

II Cor. 8:9b, "... though He was rich, yet for your sakes He became poor, that ye through His poverty might be rich." This has brought God near to

man; He is not a far off potentate who cannot be touched by our pains and sorrows. Jesus Christ has brought man and God into such a relationship that we can say with Paul, "I know in whom I have believed."

In the person of His Son, God stepped out of unreality into a blessed personal presence with us.

II. This must be our message because Jesus Christ is changeless. First He is changeless in His attitude of mercy and pardon. On the cross He prayed for those who had placed Him there saying, "Father forgive them for they know not what they do." What encouragement for saint and sinner to approach the throne of God when He extends to them such encouragement. Secondly, He is unchanging in His attitude toward the hungry, sick, and diseased of the world. In His earthly ministry we read many times where He, "being moved with compassion' did many marvelous things. Tonight, He is still concerned with those who are unfortunate, and as His children we must be concerned and compassionate also.

III. This is also our message because Christ is timeless. Although He gave His message 2000 years ago it is still as up-to-date as tomorrow morning's headlines. He was eternally existent in the bosom of the Father when the universe was set in order, but still shall be the light of the New Jerusalem.

Yes, here is our message because it is God's message, but God has always used faithful men to carry it.

When God wanted to bring His children out of Egypt He sent Moses with a message from I AM; to speak to heathen kings. He sent Daniel with a message from the Ancient of Days. When God wanted to evangelize Africa, He sent Livingston with a burning heart, to India the message came by the bleeding feet of Carey, to Burma by the starving body of Judson.

He averted revolution in England by sending revival through Finney, Wesley, and Spurgeon. And to America His message has come in great force through such men as Moody, Sunday and Graham.

This message of Christ is what Luther, Hus, and Zwingli dared their lives for at the beginning of the reformation. But reformation is not enough, again the bold doctrines and truths have been modified until eventually truth has been covered up and in the superficial subsoil of compromise, self complacency, and mediocricy grows an

Thank God for Our National Home Mission Board

I think we as Free Will Baptists should thank God for our National Home Mission Board. I know that the members of the Riverview Free Will Baptist Church of Bettendorf, Iowa, join me in extending my deepest appreciation and thanks to God for the dedicated men, who work so faithfully on our Home Mission Board. Without their help, there would be no Riverview Free Will Baptist Church.

When I accepted the pastorate of the church in May of this year, a Free Will Baptist church in Iowa was only a dream in the hearts of a few faithful worshippers, who had rented a building in Bettendorf, Iowa. Through the help of our Home Mission Board and the grace of God, this dream has become a reality.

In May of this year, Rev. Harvey Hill, a member of our National Home Mission Board, came to Bettendorf and conducted a two week's revival and organized our church. The church was organized with 20 charter members. Shortly after the church was organized, the National Home Mission Board voted to pay my salary for six months until the church could get more firmly established.

Since the organization of our church just three short months ago, we have had twelve additional members unite with our church, making a total of 32 members. We have also had 22 decisions for Christ. During the month of August, our Sunday School averaged 89, our League 42, our Y. P. A. 23 and our mid-week prayer meeting 40. Our average for September at this date is 98 in Sunday School and 70 in League.

All of the above was made possible because of God's love and mercy to us and because our National Home Mission Board has given us a helping hand.

I think that Free Will Baptists everywhere should join me in saying, "Thank God for our National Home Mission Board."



STEWARDSHIP

Luke 12:42-44. "And the Lord said, Who then is that faithful and wise steward, whom his Lord shall make ruler over his household to give them their portion of meat in due season? Blessed is that servant whom his Lord when he cometh shall find so doing. Of a truth I say unto you, that he will make him ruler over all that he hath."

Christian Stewardship is a position of great honor. A steward is "one entrusted with the management of estates or affairs not his own." As Christian stewards we are expected to look after our Father's business here on earth, to be the executors of His will, His trustees. What we do we will have to do guickly for we are just here for a short time, for in Job 14:1-2 we find, "Man that is born of woman is of a few days and full of trouble. He cometh forth like a flower and is cut down, he fleeth also as a shadow, and continueth not."

The chief requirement in stewardship is faithfulness, I Cor. 4:2. Moreover it is required in stewards that a man be found faithful.

In order to be a good steward we must be stewards of the gospel. First of all we must study the Word of God daily for in II Timothy 2:15 it says, "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." We must know the Gospel ourselves before we can be able to either teach others or to be able to help others find the way of salvation, and that is the principal aim of the Auxiliary, to win souls for Christ. If we really study and meditate upon God's Word we must be a good steward of prayer because study and prayer go hand in hand. Through prayer we draw from

the storehouse of God the necessities that we need to make God's kingdom thrive and grow in the world. Prayer is an act or a force that beareth fruit in our lives. We are challenged to pray without ceasing for in I Thess. 5:17 it says, "Pray without ceasing." If we obey this command and train ourselves to pray and to live in a state of prayer, God's voice will not be foreign when He speaks to us, and we will recognize it immediately.

We may not be able to go on the foreign fields as missionaries, ourselves, but through prayer for other missionaries we can be a big help. We can send other missionaries by being good stewards of our means and money.

Money is a great power for good or evil. To some, God has entrusted little, to some much. He expects all of us to use a portion of the money He has given us to spread the Gospel. Besides giving money to send missionaries to foreign mission fields, we can help by contributing to our Student Loan Fund, our Bible College which helps young people to get their Christian education which, in turn, may go as missionaries or be servants of God at home.

We can also help through the benevolent work in our local Auxiliary. This not only includes our money but we must be good stewards of our time. We may not all have the same amount of money to spend in God's work but we all have the same amount of time, for there is twenty-four hours in the day for every one of us, and it is left up to us as stewards as to how we use it. It is used for selfish motives or it is used for the glory of God. I know in this busy hurried life some of us hardly have time to read our Bibles and pray. But let us resolve in our hearts that if we have to leave the dishes unwashed, the kitchen unswept, let us be sure and take time to pray and read God's Word and let Him speak to our hearts and make known to us His precious will for our lives. Let's give our talents, however small they may be to God, He can use them for His glory and to bless our own hearts and lives.

We need to ask ourselves this question, "Have I given everything— my life, my talents, my time, my all—to Him?" Remember, "We are not our own, we've been bought with a price."

Let once more truth be preached by men whose lips are touched as with a live coal off the altar. This shall be the weapon in the hand of the Spirit for bringing about a great rivival in our land."

Archimedes thought he could move the world if he had a fulcrum large enough and could find a place to stand. God has given us the fulcrum, His gospel, and He has provided us the place to stand, His pulpit.

May every preacher know that he stands on holy ground. Let us proclaim the Word of God. Let us say "thus saith God" or let our voices be stilled and our tongues tied. God forbid that we should use the pulpit to convince others of our wisdom, prudence, or holiness, but simply let us say, "Thus saith the Lord," for we have nothing else the ear of man must hear before death encompasses him.

The pulpit is the measuring point of Christendom. Here it is that the great spiritual battle must be fought between Christ's church and the invading hosts of a wicked world.

It has been consecrated by a Saviour's presence, established by the clearness and force of an Apostle's eloguence, and upheld by a succession of evangelists, who like stars, have marked the era in which they lived and stamped it with their names.

Truly we are earthen vessels and who can understand why God has designed that we should be His own and live under Him in His kingdom? But this is our calling to the living hope which is in the Lord. In view of this let the church speak with conviction from faith that will not shrink. In the face of all impending doom let us walk as children of light without fear. Even though the earth be swallowed up in the midst of the sea or a ball of fire, the church shall prevail against all things, even the gates of hell!




