

SERMON OF THE MONTH The Just Shall Live By Faith

Romans 1:16-17



Rev. James Barker, Pastor of the First Free Will Baptist Church, Farmington, Missouri

Rom. 1:16-17 "For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek. For therein is the righteousness of God revealed from faith to faith: as it is written, the just shall live by faith." These words of the Apostle Paul reveal a precious relationship that mortal man can have with God. However. when we read Isaiah 64:6, we find that all our righteousnesses are as filthy rags. Romans 3:10 "There is none righteous, no, not one." Romans 3:23 "For all have sinned and come short of the glory of God." Paul said, "the JUST shall live by faith." How can sinful man ever be JUST with God? Eph. 2:8-9 "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: Not of works, lest any man should boast." My friend, this is the gospel of Christ. This is the power of God unto salvation. Sinners being saved by grace. The unredeemed being made just in the sight of God.

Through this experience with Christ the righteousness of God is revealed. Righteousness! So impossible with man, for righteousness is a divine attribute of God. How can we hope to experience a thing that is impossible with man? The Apostle tells us that we are saved by grace, the condemnation of sin is removed and God imputes to that man **righteousness**.

This is a glorious privilege that man can enjoy, but, our faith is the sustaining principle that maintains this relationship with God. The first chapter of Colossians tells about a time when we shall be presented "holy and unblameable and unreproveable in his sight: If...." There can be no mistake about Col. 1:23 "If ye continue in the faith grounded and settled, and be not moved away from the hope of the gospel, ' How we need to realize how important it is for the Christian to stay close to God. We are living in a day of compromise. Our attitudes toward questionable practices must still be directed by the Word of God, to abstain from the appearances of evil.

The just who live by faith can expect trials and tribulations in this present world. In this day of apostacy and falling away, when the devil is going about like a roaring lion, seeking whom he might devour, the true child of God will be tried and tested.

I Peter 1:7 gives the hope to the tried child of God. "That the trial of your faith, being much more precious than of gold that perisheth, though it be tried with fire, might be found unto praise and honour and glory at the appearing of Jesus Christ." and James 1:12 "Blessed is the man that endureth temptation: for when he is tried, he shall receive the crown of life, which the Lord hath promised to them that love him."



FREE WILL BAPTIST HOME MISSION WORK IN NEW BRUNSWICK, CANADA

Canada is a very large place, 3,845, 144 square miles and its population 18, 000,000 and is a full autonomy member of the British Commonwealth of Nations. Ontario and Quebec are the most thickly populated and the most highly industralized. In 1951 the Roman Catholics had 43% of the population of Canada and today 1962 they are well over the 50% mark. Quebec, which is the second largest province is about 98% Roman Catholic French speaking. New Brunswick is nearly 50% French speaking and over 50% Roman Catholic.

Free Will Baptists have a great call to the mission field of Canada. "The harvest truly is plentious, but the laborers are few; pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth labourers into his harvest" (Matthew 9:37,38).

God has burdened our hearts to step into the open door He has made for us in New Brunswick, Canada. We have never felt more sure of our call to His place of service for us. He has not only given us an abiding conviction, but He has given us outward results. In the short while the church has been reopened seven souls have been saved and many Christians have been provided with a place to worship. During the month of September we averaged 41 in Sunday School with about 50 in Worship Services.

It was after much prayer and preparation that we moved into New Brunswick to take up our work. The church here has never had a resident pastor and by moving into the community it has given the people real encouragement. There are very few churches here that have a full church program. Most all churches share their pastor with other churches. We feel this is the reason many of the churches have lost interest and are closed.

The people are very hospitable and we are adjusting ourselves to the wood fires. We cook some and do all our heating with the stove and heater. We are trusting we will be able to keep warm when it gets cold.

There is a great interest among the youth in Young People's Meetings, so we have organized our League for those between the ages of 8 to 18. We meet at Hawkin's Corner on Wednesday evening with an average of 15 and then in a community 14 miles from here known as Cloverdale, the League meets on Friday evening with an average of 20. The League at Hawkin's Corner is sponsoring a Youth Revival the last week in October. We are trusting the Lord for many souls. Pray with us that many of our Young People will be saved.

Continue to pray for us that God's Will might be done in our lives and that Christ might be glorified. Pray that God will keep us in good health as Jackie is not too strong at this time.

"THE REOPENING OF A CLOSED CHURCH"

Milliville, New Brunswick, Canada

As Jackie, the children and I were travelling north of Fredericton, New Brunswick, Canada, to a friend's home in Bath, N. B., we came to a little community known as Hawkin's Corner. Knowing there were many Free Will Baptist Churches in this area at one time, I thought we would stop and inquire about the church. I noticed a man painting the church and so I asked what denominational affiliation the church had and he said, "None. it is just a Union Baptist Church, but they are not having church here now." I asked him if they were having Sunday School and he said "No, and if I wanted more information to go to see Mrs. Connars, a lady who was active in the church." Upon arriving at Mrs. Connars, we found no one at home, but as we were about to leave she came across the field from her garden. She invited us in and we told her who we were and after calling another lady on the phone and after visiting in a few more homes, we discovered a real desire to see the church reopened. We asked them to call a special meeting Wednesday night and if they wanted to have a service Sunday we could come back and hold one. After we had prayed with them we went on to our friend's, The Reverend Phillip Giberson.

News from

Waipahu, Hawaii



Our Dear Friends,

Please read every word of this letter because it is an urgent S. O. S. Never in my life have I been faced with such a momentous task as this one that has recently been thrust upon me. As all of you know we have been conducting services in the basement of our very small and inadquate house for over three years. We have made Sunday School rooms under our floor, in our garage and every available place. We have been constantly searching for a reasonable and suitable place to have a church and there is absolutely none to be found. We have tried to find some land, but as I have previously informed you land is unreasonably high-about \$2.00 to \$4.00 per square foot.

A few days ago I located a tract of land of 77,778 Sq. Ft. (approximately 13/4 acres) which is about one half block from the Waipahu Elementary School and four blocks from the high school. There are about twenty-five eight unit Apartment Buildings about two blocks away and the place is flanked on three sides by about eight hundred to a thousand new houses that have been built within the past two years. After much prayer I made an offer of \$60,000.00 (sixty thousand dollars) to the Okazaki Realty Company, and believing that God was able to do it through you I promised to pay \$10,000.00 by November 1, and the remainder of the \$50,000.00

After many days of looking for a place to rent we finally gave up. Places were scarce and the rent was so high. We were made to see our real need of having our own building. We contacted the Executive Church Bonds' office and the church voted to float a \$30,000.00 bond program. This was a big undertaking for such a small group, but we placed our faith and trust in the Lord and He has wonderfully supplied our needs.

We had the dedication of our new church on July 8, 1962. The auditorium will seat approximately 250. By using the overflow we can seat approximately 300. We have seven classrooms, nursery, pastor's study, and Sunday School office.

We now have 54 members and have a record attendance of 98. We have several more awaiting baptism and we trust will become members soon. The Lord has richly blessed us with some fine young couples and real workers for the Lord. We have had two young men to announce their call to the ministry and one more to start to college in Grand Rapids this fall to prepare for some special work for the Lord.

We thank God for His wonderful blessings and leadership in this work. We feel that the Wolverine Association of Michigan should be commended for their support of this work. We also want to thank the many churches we have heard from by cards and other correspondence. It lets us know that this work is being remembered by churches all over the United States. Please continue to pray for us.

Abundantly Above All That Ye Ask

dred fifty miles across the Cascades to plant another church in the Great Northwest. Having arrived Saturday afternoon, the first Sunday morning service consisted of John, Leah Mae, Joe, Mary Susan, Sammy and Leah Ruth Postlewaite.

Immediately, the Lord opened the door for a place of worship and a church and parsonage were leased for a period of six months with an option to buy. The first public services were conducted the third Sunday in November with fifteen people present. Services continued until the latter part of March at which time Reverend Virgle Florence from California was contacted to hold revival meetings.

On April first, the church was officially organized with twelve charter members. The organizational committee consisted of Reverends John J. Postlewaite, Virgle Florence, W. L. Easterly, and Doyle F. Goldy.

The new group voted to purchase the property and building in which they were worshipping at a total cost of \$13,850.00. This was accomplished through a \$20,000.00 bond issue from Executive Bonds, Inc. of Nashville, Tennessee. Reverend Bob Hill spent a week with the church in May directing the program. The building has a seating capacity of two hundred, a baptistry and dressing rooms, seven class rooms, pastor's study, and a kitchen, all of which are heated cen-

trally. The parsonage is a six room house including a full size basement. They are located in a residential area close to the business district.

The group has since secured an additional lot for parking at a cost of \$2500.00. This leaves a reserve in the original bond issue of \$3500.00 for future expansion. To completely pay for the property, we must sell \$3300.00 worth of bonds by January first. Certainly God has done exceedingly abundantly above all that we could ask or think in this area of our work.

Since its beginning, the church has also enjoyed the continual blessings of the Lord, with several conversions and baptisms. Others are now awaiting baptism. A few months ago, it looked impossible to start a church here. The darkest time is before the dawn, and God did the impossible. We now have a membership of twenty nine, with a Sunday School enrollment of forty. The average attendance in all services is approximately thirty-five, with the record attendance forty-two for a Sunday morning service. The Vancouver Church is the first and only Free Will Baptist Church in this vast area, the closest one being about one hundred ten miles to the west at Garibaldi, Oregon.

Many of you desire to know of our needs as well as our blessings. Our greatest need, of course, is the con-(Continued on page 14)

Most Americans at sometime in their lives have heard of the Hudson's Bay Company. Perhaps you remember from your history lessons that one of the Company's strongholds was Fort Vancouver on the Columbia River approximately ninety miles from the Pacific Ocean. This small settlement grew into a town with a population of 32,750, on the south edge of a county with a population of 94,809. Across the Columbia River is the city of Portland with a population of 372,676. This is a large area with many different denominations and even religions. Even though there are many churches, there are statistics that are almost staggering. Only thirty per cent of the Clark County residents and twenty-nine of the North Portland residents are church affiliated, according to the recent statistical report from the local minister's association. This includes all faiths.

Feeling a burden for the lost souls in this needy area, the John Postlewaite family, home missionaries to the Northwest, left the Wenatchee Valley in the early part of November, 1961. They had labored for five years in the establishment of the First Free Will Baptist Church of East Wenatchee. They traveled three hun-



Plans were discussed to buy decorative plates with a picture of the church and the history of the church on these plates as a money raising project.


We planned a baby shower for our missionary in Uruguay, Glenda Fulcher. Each woman will donate the price of her gift as personal items cannot be sent.

Free Will Baptist Parsonage in Vancouver, Washington

WHY? GOD SHOWED US LATER.

Our family moved into the Vancouver, Washington area last November, our task was to organize another Free Will Baptist Church. It looked like a very difficult one in a town where we were complete strangers to all but two people. Our denomination was also almost unheard of, but we knew God led us here.

Our first service was in our home with only our own family present. We sang the song "I Know Whom I Have Believed," studied God's Word, and prayed that God would show us what to do in this new area.

We soon found a vacant church and parsonage which was for sale and in a favorable location. Three interested persons signed a six month lease on the property, with option to buy. Services were begun immediately. There were sixteen people present at our first Sunday morning service. Our crowds did not increase rapidly. At times we felt discouraged, but something would happen each time to increase our faith. Even at the end of our six month lease period, we still could not see many results from our labor. However, after a revival meeting and seeing the faith of a few, we organized the church and voted to purchase the property.

God began to bless our church in odd and various ways. Souls were saved, one was an older man who had lived in sin many years. Young people have dedicated their lives to His service. Backslidden people have renewed their vows with God and started serving Him anew. One lady who was not living as close to Him as she felt she should bowed at an altar of prayer on Sunday night and asked forgiveness for her sins, and in two short weeks had gone out to meet her Saviour, prepared. Seven people have been baptized, others are waiting baptism. God has performed miracles here, not in large numbers but in the lives of a few people.

Our church membership is now 30. Our Sunday School attendance is in the 40's. We purchased our property through the Executive Bond Program, and God has blessed marvelously in the selling of Bonds.

Yes, we have been here a year, and in the eyes of the world our accomplishments have been very few, but these souls that have found Christ, those that the church will reach in the future, are answer enough to the question, "Why are we here?"

by the end of 1963. To our unexplainable joy they accepted our bid. Now if you had any idea of how difficult it is to get land for a church you would rejoice with us. The cost of this property seems high to you but when you consider that we are getting it, not for \$3.00, nor for \$2.00, and even \$1.00, but approximately 77c per square foot it seems too good to be true.

I know that I have put myself and Free Will Baptists out on the proverbial limb but I believe we can do it through Him (Philippians 4:13). I wonder how many individuals and churches will if necessary borrow from the bank \$500.00 to \$1000.00 and send it in for this urgent need. We are not asking you to build us a church, put carpets on the floor or make us comfortable, but we must have your help now or we shall never have a church in Hawaii. This is a God given opportunity-An open door. It would cost each member of a church with a membership of 100 only three cents a day for one year to raise \$1080.00less than the price of a pack of gum, 1/3 of a coke or pepsi, three cigarettes, etc. I don't say this with any doubt about the final outcome but if this venture fails I think that we just as well forget about a church in Hawaii.

I never want to have to tell another child "You can't come to Daily Vacation Bible School because we don't have room for you." Please will you go out on this limb with us?

4. That we pay our proportionate part of our Minutes.



NEW HOPE CHURCH

On August 26th., 'Rev. James McAllister resigned as pastor of the New Hope F. W. B. Church of Kansas City, Kansas, to become director of Missions for the Missouri Free Will Baptists.

His resignation is effective Oct 29th, at which time he will assume his new office.

Mr. McAllister founded the New Hope Church with 17 charter members on Sept. 7, 1957. Under his leadership the church became one of the outstanding churches in this area. During the five years of his pastorate, a new church plant was constructed. The church, located on a two acre plot of land in Northern Johnson County Kansas, is in a large residential area just outside of Kansas City, Kansas. The property, valued at \$50,000, has an auditorium seating 180; a baptistry; 12 classrooms; a nursery; 4 restrooms; a kitchen; pastor's study; dining hall; assembly room; and 2 large parking lots. The church has voted to construct a three bedroom parsonage at a later date.

During his pastorate 130 people have united with the church, 152 have accepted Christ as Saviour, 86 have been baptized. Two churches have been organized from this body with full cooperation of the church. The Sunday School averages well over 100 with an enrollment of 200. The Sunday School is departmentalized with 13 classes and 3 departments. The Church supports all phases of the denominational program through cooperative giving and special offerings.

Rev. McAllister is a member of the Evangelical Ministers Fellowship of Kansas City; Moderator of the East Kansas Association; Assistant Moderator of the Kansas State Association; and served as treasurer of the Missouri State Home Missions Board until his resignation from said board.

The McAllisters will be moving to Marshall, Mo., to begin work in November.

Report from Colorado

HOME MISSIONARY

For a long time it had grieved my heart that Free Will Baptists did not have a church in the largest city between the Mississippi River and the West coast—nor was there one in the entire state of Colorado. So I made application with the National Home Mission Board to go to Denver to establish a church.

Our itinerate to raise our support was a major factor in the success of the work here. We not only enlisted prayer support, but we also secured a list of names of Free Will Baptists who had moved to Denver from various places.

We arrived in Denver Feb. 10, 1961, and after finding a place to live, we began to look for a place to hold services. Prices were high, but we prayed, and God provided a place. It was a small, but a nice room which was used as a ballet studio through the week. This made us shun to use it for our services, but since we could find nothing else within our financial ability, we rented it. But God met with us there, and every single service we met in that dance studio souls were saved.

We contacted the names of the prospects we had, told them when our first service would be, and prayed that God would bring the people out. We set the first Sunday in March for our first service. We were anxiously anticipating the service, but when we arose that morning our hearts sank because about 6 inches of snow had fallen during the night. On the way to church Pat said, "I'll not be discouraged if not one single person comes."

We swept the snow off the walks, opened the door, and waited for the people to come. God answered our prayers and 48 people gathered for that service. My, how the Lord opened heaven that morning. Five souls were saved!

The people began to come and they are still coming. From the dance studio we moved to a lunch room in a fair grounds, and from there to a Seventh-Day Adventist church building several miles away toward the center of Denver. We grew there until we had to rent an apartment next door to the church for Sunday School rooms.

During this time our people were giving generously of their money and saved \$6,000, for a down payment on property. For weeks we looked at property, but found that such high prices (\$15,000 per acre) made it impossible for us to build a new church. However, God always opens up a way. We found a solid brick church, in Denver, easily accessible from all over town, with Sunday School facilities, for \$31,500. We paid our \$6,000 down and will have payments of \$200 per month. The church is located at the corner of Arkansas and Vine Streets. The building will seat 200 and has full basement.

We moved into this building the first Sunday in October, and are presently in a revival with Rev. Bill Ketchum from Tulsa, Oklahoma. God is blessing and souls have been saved. For the month of September we averaged 108 in Sunday School, and feel that the move into our new building will help our growth also.

Our church is a missionary church and has supported missions from its beginning. But we also believe that we should start some missions, too. So we are praying about Colorado Springs, a city of 100,000 people just 65 miles from Denver. We are praying and God is answering prayer. We have found a family who has opened its home for services and who will support a Free Will Baptist church there. So as soon as our revival is over we plan to canvass the city and begin services. If you know any Free Will Baptists there or in any other town in Colorado, please send us their names and addresses.

What has been done here can be done in any city where a Free Will Baptist church is not in existence. Help us to pray that preachers will get these western states on their hearts and will come to establish churches for the salvation of lost souls.

After that, we had a few present each Sunday. The Lord only expects faithfulness from His servants.

In August, we found a place in which to worship. It was a large log house located 13 miles from town. The rent and upkeep had to come from our salary (\$300 per month). We did house to house visitation around the church. We had some very faithful attenders until the weather grew very cold. The heat in our building was inadequate. Then when the tempera-

ture dipped to 62 below zero, the oil line became frozen. We gave the place up because it was no longer useable.

The next month and half we continued to visit and be a witness for the lord. It was a time of trying and testing for us. Darkness reigned in Fairbanks. We had no real daylight for over a month. Then the weather moderated a bit, to an average of 30 below zero, and the Lord answered our prayers concerning a place to meet. This was a Hall located on First Avenue in town. There was only one family, Bro. and Sis. Macon Mercer and their two pre-school age children who would be a part of our town church. Thirteen miles with these road conditions can mean an hour's drive so we understood why those living close to the old church felt that they could not make it into town. Slowly we began to build our congregation. Then two military families left Fairbanks. The people here are so transitory that you begin to feel that you start all over again every few months. It is our prayer that those who pass through the portals of our church will find Christ and have Jesus precious to their souls, no matter how short a time they are with us.

When the Spring opened up, we decided to gather in the neighborhood children for a Bible Club. We soon had Indians, Eskimos and White children enrolled. They still meet every Wednesday and we desire your prayers for these young people.

The first week in June we had a great blessing from the Lord. Two Free Will Baptist Bible College young ladies arrived to spend a month with us. They were a great help. Joy Rice and Rudene Kennedy were consecrated and willing to work for the Lord. We did house to house visitation in preparation for our Daily Vacation Bible School. When the week of Bible School was over, we had enrolled 52 children. It was a great blessing to teach children about the Christ who loves them.

For several months now, Alice and Buddy Simmons have been a great blessing to us. They are a military couple stationed at Fort Wainwright. Buddy is the Adult Sunday School teacher and our deacon. Alice assists me at the Bible Club each Wednesday and teaches the Beginners Sunday School class each Sunday.

One day at the end of Bible Club, the Indian children began to tell us that they were coming to our church the next Sunday. We had met in their home for Bible Club for months and this was a real break-through for us. The natives are very shy and it takes a while to show them that you are their friend. Now we have faithful attenders in the family, Mr. and Mrs. Walker and their four children. The Lord blesses in his own time.

We have several coming who are backslidden Christians and some who have never been saved. There is one boy who comes with his wife and two children nearly every Sunday who is under conviction. We desire prayer for him. We also desire prayer for those who have been spoken to time after time about regular church attendance. This is a wicked city and Satan has many strong holds. A person who does not stay close to the Lord and fellowship with Christian people is easy prey to Satan's devices.

One Sunday morning in late summer, a stranger entered our place of worship and introduced himself as Bill Cook. After services we took him home with us for the afternoon. We found to our delight that his wife was soon to come to Fairbanks. Now, both Helen and Bill serve the Lord faithfully. Bill is Sunday School Superintentent and Helen is church clerk and Pianist.

We organized into a church September 16, 1962 with 12 charter members. Bro. Bob Breeden, an ordained Free Will Baptist minister from Anchorage, Alaska, preached for us. In the Sunday night service, Bro. Buddy Simmons was ordained as deacon. This was a sweet service. There were tears shed as we gave Bro. and Sis. Simmons the right hand of Christian fellowship and pledged ourselves to stand by them.

Our need is funds to make a downpayment on property. We need a shield of prayer daily for our work. We believe God's people will stand behind us.

Mob Attacks Protestant Group In Brazil

Springfield, Mo. (MNS)-Legal action is pending against Jesuit priests who led a mob attack on Assemblies of God missionaries and national believers in Carmo do Rio Claro, Brazil, according to a report received at the denomination's headquarters here. While laying the cornerstone for a new church, the group was attacked by a mob of approximately 2,000 people led by five Jesuit priests. Many were injured, including the Rev. John Lemos, director of a Bible institute near Sao Paulo, and six national pastors. Approximately 80 persons were forced to flee the city after being severely beaten, the report states.

The home of one Assemblies of God pastor was ransacked. Sleeping children were thrown to the floor and furniture was tossed into the street and demolished. Local police had to be called to break up the mob.

Korean Orphan Choir On Tour

Pasadena, Calif. (MNS)-The 34member World Vision Korean Orphan Choir from Seoul, Korea, has embarked on a concert tour of 15 nations in Asia, Europe and North America. Presenting the choir is Dr. Bob Pierce, president of World Vision, Inc., an interdenominational missionary service organization with headquarters here. Concerts are planned in Japan, Formosa, Hong Kong, the Philippines, India, Afghanistan, Iran, Israel, France, Germany, Netherlands, Norway, England, Canada and the United States. The choir will begin a coast-to-coast tour of North America on November 29 when they arrive in New York.

The young singers (24) girls, 10 boys-ages 8 to 12) were selected from more than 14,000 orphans in 151 orphanages of South Korea which are sponsored by World Vision. The director, Professor Soo Chul Chang, chose each child in private audition. Mr. Chang, Professor of Music at the Union Christian College, Seoul, studied at the Moody Bible Institute, Chicago, and at the Chicago Conservatory of Music.

Traveling with the choir will be eight adults, including dietitian, nurse and interpreters. The children represent 17,871 other orphans in 16 nations cared for fully by World Vision. The larger purpose of the tour is to point up the needs of orphanages and destitute children the world over.
