


ship, along with five ministers holding membership with Cabool Church. They granted time for the Cooperative program.

The above money has been received from three District Auxiliary Conventions and eight local Woman's Auxiliaries.



THE American Bible Society has recently undertaken the regular, annual support of Bible translation, publication and distribution in 40 additional countries in Africa, Asia and the Caribbean area.

This expansion of its program was announced at a meeting of the Society's Advisory Council in New York on November 13th and 14th. The Council is composed of representatives of 56 denominations which support the Society. To include the new work, the Council approved a budget of \$5,382,000 for 1963, the highest ever adopted in the 146-year history of the Society. The amount to be raised from the churches is \$1,200,000, a hundred thousand dollars more than the goal for 1962.

Included in the total expenditures is \$500,000 which the Society hopes to raise through a World Advance Fund. The Society is placing this amount in the budget immediately, although the half-million dollars has not yet been raised. Society officials explained that the Scripture needs of the 40 additional countries is so urgent that the Society will work at a deficit in 1963, if necessary, rather than delay the work.

The first contribution, in the form of a \$10,000 check, was made at the meeting by the Missouri Synod Lutheran Church. Other denominational delegates pledged support to raise "funds for the forty."

The addition of the 40 countries will bring to a total of 104 the number in which the Society provides regular, annual support of Bible work. The additional work will be done in 25 countries in Africa, 6 in Asia and 9 in the Caribbean area. Some of the added countries are those where the American Bible Society is joining other national Bible societies in carrying on the work. Many "consist largely of peoples who are emerging from tribalism and colonialism and are as yet uncommitted in the struggle for their allegiance."

The African countries are Algeria, Morocco, Libya, Tunisia, Central Africa Republic, Chad, Ghana, Ivory Coast, Upper Volta, Niger, Kenya, Uganda, Tanganyika, Zanzibar, Nigeria, Dahomey, Togoland, Sierra Leone, Republic of Guinea, Portuguese Guinea, Gambia, Senegal, Mauritania, Mali and Spanish West Africa.

The Asian countries are Burma, Iran, Pakistan, Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos.

The Latin American countries are Guadeloupe, Martinique, Jamaica, Bahamas, Bermuda, British Honduras, British Guiana, Trinidad and Barbados.

The Council reaffirmed the traditional policy of the denominations that churches, rather than government, provide Scriptures for the men and women of the armed forces and stipulated that a portion of the emergency fund be used to provide chaplains with sufficient added Scriptures to meet the demand, which now exceeds the supply.

In its official report, the Advisory Council noted that "when the Lord Jesus Christ said, 'Thy word is truth,' He gave the touchstone by which to test the conflicting claims of our age. As the church of the early centuries met the paganism of that era with the Word of God, so we must meet the

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paganism of our day with the same inspired Word.

"In offering men the eternal Word of God," the Council declared, "we share with them the saving power which alone can redeem their lives and ours from destruction.

"The unfinished task of the church is to enable all men everywhere to hear and read the wonderful words of God in the tongues wherein they were born. The Bible may go where men cannot go, and may stay when men are forced to leave. The strategy of world evangelism in days like these must use the written word to make known the living Word.

"Increasing numbers of people, more and more of whom are able to read, are both the peril and the promise of the future. Appetites avid for material to read will be satisfied either with husks of half-truth and error, or with the Bread of Life. In this time of crisis, the God of truth calls us to make sure that providing the Word of Truth to all the world shall not be 'too little and too late.'"

Drama Presentation:

The Speech Department of the Free Will Baptist Bible College will be presenting the drama "Into Thy Kingdom" by Dorothy Clarke Wilson, at the annual Bible Conference, April 7th-11th, on the college campus. Two performances are scheduled during the Conference, one on Sunday night, April 7th, the other on Tuesday night, April 9th.

Included in the cast is one Missouri student, Eugene Workman, from the Grant Avenue Church in Springfield, Missouri. Eugene, a Junior, is the son of Mrs. Zella Nevels, of Rogersville, Missouri. His role is that of Nicodemus, the secret follower of Christ. Eugene, on the Dean's Honor Roll for the first semester, is serving as Junior Class President this year and as the Director of Campus Leagues. He also appeared in the college production of "The Rock," presented in May of 1962. He was also associated with the Speech Department at Southwest Mo. State College before transferring to Nashville.

Also included in the cast are: Joe Jones, Alabama; Wanda Watson, North Carolina; Bill McCuin, Arkansas; Brenda Wiard, Georgia; Wayne Phillips, North Carolina; Bernadine Little, Virginia; and Bascomb Evans, S. Carolina.

The play is under the direction of Mr. Darrell Fulton, a former Bible College student, and Mrs. Laura Thigpen, Speech instructor.

OUR YOUTH SPEAKS

SOME OF THE DUTIES OF CHRISTIANS

The duties of a Christian are many, but it will only be possible to discuss four in this limited space. The individual who goes under the name of Christian must be sure he is saved. How can he be sure? Here are a few of the guideposts to give the individual the assurance of his salvation. Ephesians 2:8, "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God." Titus 3:5, "Not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to His mercy He saved us, ... " Luke 13:3, "Except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish.'

The Christian is expected to have fellowship with his fellow Christians. The Lord made the human race a sociable group of beings; therefore, fellowship is in God's plan for the Christian. Hebrews 10:25, "Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is, ... " The Christian has the opportunity for fellowship in the church services and other activities of the local church. Some Christian people seek fellowship outside the church in various groups. These groups may, or may not have proper goals, but the fact remains, they will not help the Christian to grow spiritually. Yes, these groups are necessary to our society, but they should not be the Christian's main source of fellowship, nor should they take the Christian's time away from his church activities. The Christian should be well informed about the activities of his community and country, but should not partake of the worldliness such as dances, movies and etc. II Corinthians 6:17, "Wherefore come out from among them and be ye separate, saith the Lord, ..."

The Christian should study the Bible. II Timothy 2:15, "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." The Bible should be the guide of the Christian as well as the weapon. How can

an individual use his weapon or follow his guide if he is not well acquainted with them? It is impossible; therefore, it is good to have a systematic method of study. Here are a few tips for effective Bible study. A certain time should be set aside each day as Bible study time. Start the Bible study with a certain book of the Bible or a group of books such as "The General Epistles." Study a certain amount of chapters or verses each study period. Get a good text book to read as a reference book. As the Christian studies he should ask himself, "Who wrote this passage?" "To whom was it written?" "Why was it written?" "How does it apply to me individually?"

Last, but not least, the Christian should proclaim to others the gospel. Every Christian is to be a preacher or proclaimer. When someone leaves us in death; we will do our best to carry out his last wish. When Christ left us and ascended back to the Father, His last request was Acts 1:8, "But ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you, and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem and in Samaria and unto the uttermost part of the earth." If the Christian fails in this duty, no one else will do it for him.

Just a few of the Christian's duties have been presented, but there are others which must not be neglected. Some of these are: stewardship in every phase of life; prayer, partaking of the ordinances of the church, (Baptism, the Lord's Supper and washing of the saints' feet) and many others the Christian will learn as he studies the Bible.

SERMONS OF THE MONTH

"And We Came To Kadesh-Barnea"

REV. HARRY ASHER, Pastor of Overland F. W. B. Church

(Deuteronomy 1:19)

"And when we departed from Horeb, we went through all that great and terrible wilderness, which ye saw by the way of the mountain of the Am-or-ites, as the Lord our God commanded us; and we came to Ka-desh-bar-ne-a."

God's people up to this point had obeyed and followed the advice of their leader, Moses. They had already escaped Egypt, passed through the Red Sea, etc. . . . And in the opening of the Book of Numbers they appear to be all ready to enter the Promised Land.

But Such Was Not the Case....

In their wilderness journey they made seven distinct complaints:

- (1) Complained about the way.
- (2) Complained about the food.
- (3) Complained about the giants.
- (4) Complained about the desert.
- (5) Complained about the manna.
- (6) Complained about their leader.
- (7) Complained about divine judgments.

And the climax came at Kadesh-barnea.

Spies had been sent into the land of Canaan to search it out and then report back.

The Canaanites who possessed the land were the descendants of Canaan, the son of Ham. They spoke a Semitic (Jewish) language, and were called Phoenicians by the Greeks. Although they included seven distinct nations—Amorites, Hittites, Girgashites, Canaanites, Perizzites, Hivites, Jebusites. In a more restricted sense the word is applied to the tribe which "Dwelt by the sea and the coast of Jordan." (Num. 13-29)

After forty days the spies that had been sent out returned to make their report.

They said to Moses and Aaron, "We came unto the land whither thou sentest us, and surely it floweth with milk and honey; and this is the fruit of it." Upon a staff they had a cluster of grapes

that two men had to carry, also pomegranates, and figs.

BUT, we saw giants, the sons of Anak, which come of the giants, and we were as grasshoppers...

And all the people began to cry out, "Why hath the Lord brought us unto this land, to fall by the sword, were it not better for us to return to Egypt?" And they said, "Let us make a captain and return unto Egypt...."

This Definite Act Of Rebellion Made God Almighty Angry

The Lord said to Moses, "How long will this people provoke me? And how long will it be ere they believe me, for all the signs which I have shewed among them?"

The signs were many:

- (a) Deliverance from Egypt.
- (b) Crossing the Red Sea.
- (c) Journey through the Wilderness.
- (d) Water from the Rock.
- (e) Manna falling from Heaven.

All these signs and many more were signs to show them that God was with them. And God says, "Why can't they believe me?"

It seems to me that God's patience has finally worn out. This is what He said, "I will smite them with the pestilence, and disinherit them..."

And in the Bible we see that for thirty-eight years the unbelievers wandered in the desert until their carcasses fell in the wilderness.

Friends I personally believe the trouble that we are experiencing in America today stems from the fact that quite a number of years ago America came to **Kadesh-barnea** and decided to stay there instead of going on with God.

God said to the people, "I will smite you." Friends, God is displeased with America.

- (c) The Great Depression.
- (d) World War Two -
- 322,188 killed, 700,000 wounded.
- (e) Korean War.

The question in all of our minds today is, "Will we have a thurmo-Nuclear war?" I am not here to tell you that this will happen, but I will say that it could happen.

The Federal Government recently has said that Cuba had enough long-range missile power to destroy one-third of the United States of America.

And it's no wonder "that God's patience has worn out. God has said, "Remember the Sabbath Day and keep it holy."

The average American goes fishing, attends theaters, Sunday ball games, cuts the grass, washes the car, visits, watches television, or just stays at home and sleeps on Sunday!

God has said, "I beseech, you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. And be not conformed to this world."

And we drink beer, whiskey and wine, smoke cancerous cigarettes, dress indecently, etc.

God has said, "Deny yourself and pick up your cross and Follow me."
We do not.

God has said, "Pay tithes and worship me with your offerings." We do not.... (the majority doesn't.)

God has said, "Pray without ceasing." We do not.

God has said, "Go into all the world.' And we won't go into our neighborhood, much less the world.

God has said, "Be steadfast, unmoveable." And we are always backsliding.

Friends, this is "Open Rebellion Against God Almighty."

My dear Christian friends, all over this great State of Missouri, The Clock Is Ticking Towards the Showdown!

The whole world is sitting on a powder keg!

We ought to be on our knees, crying out to God for a spiritual awakening among the Free Will Baptists and all other born-again Christians everywhere.

The Word of God says, "If my people which are called by my name, shall

The Marks of Christ

Scripture: Galatians 6:17b

"For I bear in my body the marks of the Lord Jesus."

When we picture the scene at Calvary, we can see how the world left its mark upon Christ. We see the wounds in His side; also the nail prints in his hands and feet; then there are the scratches and tears made by the crown of thorns so forcibly pushed upon His head.

We also can see how the world leaves its mark upon people, especially sinners who have drifted far into the mire of sin. We see drunkenness, immorality, hatred, deceitfulness, and all the many things which speak out to all who come in contact with these individuals that the mark of Satan is upon them.

In Paul's writing to the Galatians, we see that he testifies to the fact that he bears in his body the "marks of the Lord Jesus." (Text) We as Christians should have certain definite marks upon our lives that sets us apart from the world, marking us a separate people.

We should have the mark of love. I John 4:8, "He that loveth not, knoweth not God; for God is love." Without the mark of love, we cannot fulfill the commandments of God. John 13:35, "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, If ye have love one for another." We must have brotherly love, but also we need a great love for souls. Phillip joined himself to the chariot of the eunuch because he had a love for souls and a deep desire to see people accept the One he was serving. He taught from the Word of God, because he also loved to read, study and interpret from its pages. His is a mark of Jesus, and should be found in our body.

Secondly, we should have the mark of humility. (James 4:10) "Humble yourselves in the sight of the Lord and He shall lift you up." Humbleness is truly a mark of a consecrated Christian. The very act of keeping behind the cross is in no way easy by ourselves. The Scripture says in Proverbs 3:5 to "Trust in the Lord with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding." We must learn to give God the right of way in our lives before we

can come to a place where God can really use us. We are sometimes prone to give someone or something credit for what God does, or try to take credit for some accomplishment ourselves. In Peter 5:5 we find we "should be clothed with humility, for God resisteth the proud, but giveth grace to the humble."

We also should have the mark of obedience. Christ gave us this example Himself when He spoke of the Father's will for His life. Jesus prayed for God's will to be carried out in His life, and His own will to be put aside. Then He obeyed, by going to the cross for the salvation of the lost. Peter, in the 5th chapter of Acts, made a statement that "we ought to obey God, rather than men." People are so often guilty of listening to what man has to say, rather than God; but a mark of Christ is to be obedient to the Holy Spirit.

Jesus tells us to go and teach all nations - and in giving the Great Commandment, He said to start at Jerusalem. There are so many so close to our door that need Christ. If we are to reach these, they must be able to see the marks of Jesus in our lives. All marks of Christ are so important: forgiveness, faithfulness, and fruitfulness. We couldn't possibly cover them all in this message, but they are brought about by one thing - a true repentance and a believing faith in God. So let each of us be very sure the mark we leave in our walk through life is a mark of Christ. May the Lord bless you is our prayer.

Well if not, let's do something about it.


It's our move, we can have God's wrath or we can has His mercy.

Little White Church

There is a little white country church, "standing as a light house, beaming its message to the world" and this church is the Hurryville Free Will Baptist Church.

This little mission was started by people of the Hurryville area that felt the need of a church and they labored spiritually and physically to see it grow. In 1954 the band of workers joined together and built a basement and in June 12, 1962 the work began on the new sanctuary. Mr and Mrs. Homer Cole donated the ground on which the church is built.

The charter members of the church are the Rev. and Mrs. Charles Moyers and children, Carolyn, Linda, Alton and Charles, Jr., Mrs. Loretta Moyers, Mrs. Herbert Cole and Dale, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Tesserau and Donna, Mrs. Alfred Wofford, Mrs. Grace Cole, Mrs. Eileen Cole and Gayland, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Woffard, Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Schnurr, Mrs. Maurita Watkins, and Iames E. Propst.

The new white frame building is furnished with natural oak furniture, including the pews, pulpit furniture and altar. The seating capacity is about 200. The beautiful light rose colored interior is highlighted with indirect lighting.

The little white church now has a membership of 53 and the Sunday School attendance for the past six months averaged 80. Floyd Pirtle, Henry Head, Charlie McMillian, Lawrence Berry and Hershal Moyers are the deacons. Glenwood Hargiss, Paul House, Lee Shannon and Melvin Ely are the trustees. Floyd Pirtle serves as Sunday School superintendent. The pianist is Ruth Moyers and Wanda Kluck is assistant pianist. Melvin Ely and Hershall Moyers are the song directors.

When the church was organized the Rev. Charles Moyers was pastor, assisted by the Rev. George Hibbitts. Two others, the Rev. Irvin Mills and the Rev. John Long have served as pastors. The Rev. Mills served as pastor for two and a half years and then was away for a while serving in another capacity and in July 1961, he returned to serve as church pastor, and is still pastor there.

The work on the new building was contracted by the Forsythes Lumber Company in Farmington. The women

of the church raised the money to have a 324 foot well dug to serve the church in their kitchen and other facilities.

These faithful members worshiped in the church basement for several years and the basement is completely finished and furnished. There are six Sunday School class rooms in the basement and a complete modern kitchen.

This church is the only church in Hurryville and there are over one hundred people, men, women and children in the area of the church.

The Hurryville Church is the newest Free Will Baptist church in Southeast Missouri and dedication service is planned for a future date. The church is a member of the St. Francois County Quarterly Meeting of Free Will Baptists; Free Will Baptist Missouri State Association and the National Association of Free Will Baptists.

The two oldest members of the church are Grandma Mosier and Henry Head. The youngest attending is the new baby Regina Kaye, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Underwood.

Sunday morning the call to Sunday School rings out at 9:45. The morning worship service is at 11 o'clock and the evening worship service is at 7 o'clock. The mid-week prayer service is at 7 o'clock on Wednesday evening and the church folk enjoy a Saturday evening prayer service at 7 o'clock.

Truly a lighthouse — the little white church — the Hurryville Free Will Baptist Church.

Dedication Service of Trinity Church

On January 27th, 1963, the first educational unit of the Trinity Free Will Baptist Church was dedicated. The speaker for the dedication service was the Rev. W. S. Mooneyham, Moderator of the National Association of Free Will Baptists.

The church is located on a four acre plot of land at the corner of McKelvey and Old St. Charles Road in St. Louis County. The building has a sanctuary that seats 150, seven class rooms, pastor's study, and kitchen. Folding mahogany petitions allow additional seating in the sanctuary of another 100 people.

Future plans call for a second educational unit and then a larger sanctuary. When the church plant is completed it will house educational, recreational, and worship facilities for a congregation of 700 people at a cost of approximately \$250,000.00. The church also has a 5 room parsonage at 3824 Mid View Ave.

Trinity Church was formerly Third Church, located at Geyer and Dolman in St. Louis. The church was forced to relocate when the highway department took their property for right-of-way of a new expressway. Unable to acquire suitable property in the immediate area, the congregation felt that God was leading to begin a new work in one of the suburban areas. A merger of the members living in the heart of the city was effected with a sister church, the South Side Free Will Baptist Church, and the grave responsibility of beginning the new work was started by a small number of dedicated families.

The pastor of Trinity Church is Rev. Russell B. Spurgeon.

UNFORGETABLE SUNDAY

Jackie Owens Home Missionary to Canada

On Sunday morning, October 14, we arose as usual in preparation for Sunday School and worship. During this month we were really working on getting more in Sunday School. Our aim for this particular Sunday was 50. However, to our amazement the number attending came from a surprising score.

Just as Mr. Owens had announced the first opening hymn in Sunday School, we suddenly saw and heard one of the teen-agers rise while looking out the window saying, "All those people; all those poor people." Mr. Owens said, "Are they coming to Sunday School?" You see, we could not see what was taking place from the platform, so we thought it must be a real crowd of folks coming to church. However, when we saw others jump up and the confusion among them we came down from the platform and looked to see what was going on. To our horror, we discovered that a large potato truck had gone around a very sharp corner (the church sits right on this corner) and due to faulty brakes the truck had gotten out of control and had turned completely over, thrusting from its long body 49 people, who, by the way, were Miramac Indians.

After getting the little ones out of Sunday School and into some homes nearby, we walked up the road almost directly across from the church. Even before hardly stepping out of the church we could hear screeching and screaming and just general confusion everywhere. Among these 49 people, we discovered many children and young people. They had just ended a picking season of potatoes in Limestone, Maine, and were returning to their reservation near Oromocto, New Brunswick.

Among these children was an infant nine months old; the mother, after getting to her feet, discovered that her infant was gone and then one of the

ladies heard her screaming out something in her own language, which of course, she didn't understand. It seemed from out of nowhere a man appeared (her husband), and he began in a most excited manner to dig under mattresses, luggage, and clothes. After some frantic digging he pulled out this little nine month old baby girl. She didn't have a scratch or a bruise.

After some persuasion on the part of the church attenders, we got them all inside the church. These Indians were all Roman Catholics, so we had some difficulty in getting some of them to come into the church; but after a while they came in to get warm. The doctor and ambulance was called and after waiting about an hour they arrived. The nearest doctor is about 20 miles away. Upon his arrival, he examined each one. No one was critically hurt but 25 were hospitalized. The ladies served tea, doughnuts, and cookies. Water was also passed to each one.

We had opportunity to give out some literature to many showing how they could be saved. It is our prayer that each one read the literature and that this was a time when each would have a God-given opportunity to accept His Son. This was one Sunday that will not soon be forgotten by those at Hawkin's Corner.

"And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose." Romans 8:28

Dear Bro. Hill:

Greetings in the lovely name of Christ the Lord. May His love be about you and all your family. We are very grateful to the Lord because we know that He has blessed you abundantly. Our prayer is that He shall continue to smile upon you.

I am so sorry that I had never an-

swered your so kind and friendly letter of September. During that month I was so very busy, and thought I would catch up, and I never did. It just kept getting worse and worse. We have no help other than what we train here, and that has been a full size job. School started right after your letter came, or that is, a large group of students came, and that brought us back, and we never caught up. Although I am thankful because this year, I had my wife and a former student who taught also. We like one more week for school to be out, it will be a relief, even though there will be about six ministerial students staying during the rest of the year, for special courses.

The Lord has been very good to us, Bro. Hill, in this land, we have been kept going ever since. We now have six churches, and we have started a new mission in Monterrey. Last night on prayer meeting night they had 56 souls crowded into the small lumber building we are renting. Our native pastor lives in a small room I have made of some blocks just placed one on top of the other. Bro. Antonio Lopez has his wife and small adopted child. He attends classes every day, and also takes care of the mission.

I wish you could come over some time, and bring your camera, I am sure you would enjoy yourself, and it would be real nice to see you again. Bro. Wade Jernigan was here and other fellows, also the pastor of Santa Paula, California was here, and a couple of young ladies from Florida.

I am expecting a group from Florence, Alabama, Willie Justice's church, they are to come and sing in our revival meeting which we will have at the First Church, and perhaps we will be able to go to the other churches, if they are able to stay.

We have a wonderful church started in the State of Tamaulipas, that is the next State South of Monterrey, Altamira. This work tends to be a real one. Two years ago I visited this place and while there in a few nights service we led the former Mayor of the City to Christ, Bro. Mata, then this past year, in another service, we led the Mayor that is now in office, and his wife to Christ. I visited them last month, and we purchased a lot for the church building. For the moment we have a thatch roof arbor and we have added some on to it, because the crowds are getting larger every week. We are planning a revival meeting there soon.

We had our yearly Association in September and the Lord has indeed blessed the Mexican work. Last year, the Association adopted the plan of every church tithing into the treasury, and this was the tenth per cent of all offerings. Then each Fifth Sunday's offering would go in its entirety into the same fund. I am sure that this year they will either adopt to help the school or hire a full time Missions Director. There are many States without a single Christian it it, and we have 35,000,000 souls in this land.

I am wishing you, Bro. Hill, all sorts of blessings in your work.



Missome Home Missions

There are approximately 130 Free Will Baptist Churches in the State of Missouri. Of this number about 35 are within the city limits of some city. During the past 5 years several of our country churches have died and have not been replaced by city churches.

Home Missions in Missouri has been neglected for several years by our State Association, its leaders and its people. We have failed to realize that people are just as lost in Columbia, Missouri as they are in Denver, Colorado or in Brazil. Last August your Home Mission Board decided to make an effort to get a mission program underway. Realizing that funds were inadequate they desired to do as much as possible with the money available. The Board was advised to try Seymour, Missouri, as a possible site for a church. This proved to be a mistake. The people in that city are filled with animosity toward Free Will Baptists. This caused by years of feuding and fussing among the preachers and churches in that area.

In November, the Jim McAllister's were employed to start a church in Marshall, Missouri. Marshall is a city of 10,000 people in central Missouri, 90 miles from any Free Will Baptist church. A city in an area forever left out of our plans as Free Will Baptists. A hall was rented and services began. The average Sunday School attendance was 18 in November, 19 in December, 24 in January and 31 in February.

The amazing part of all this is that attendance actually grew during this cold winter (coldest in several decades) when most churches were experiencing a decline in attendance. On January 10, the church was organized with 16 charter members. This church, though small, is doing what many of our larger churches in Missouri do not do. Support the cooperative plan. 3 lovely lots have been purchased by the church (on the installment plan) on the north side of town, a beautiful residental area. They have hopes to very soon start a building program. This church will be the springboard into the many other cities in Central Missouri. The McAllisters are through in Marshall. A pastor, Rev. James Elmore of Slocomb, Alabama has been called to serve this congregation.

Someone said, "A mission program is pre-mature in missions." 2000 years

ago Jesus said it wasn't. As many of our country churches face the inevitable, that of closing the doors because their congregations have moved away. May we as a state face our responsibility better than we have in the past. What is our responsibility? A church in every city and if this cannot be accomplished, at least a church in every county. The Missouri Missions Department is in the process of starting missions in other cities. If they receive adequate funds they will be able soon to start churches in many other cities across our state. God help us to act as quick as we talk!
