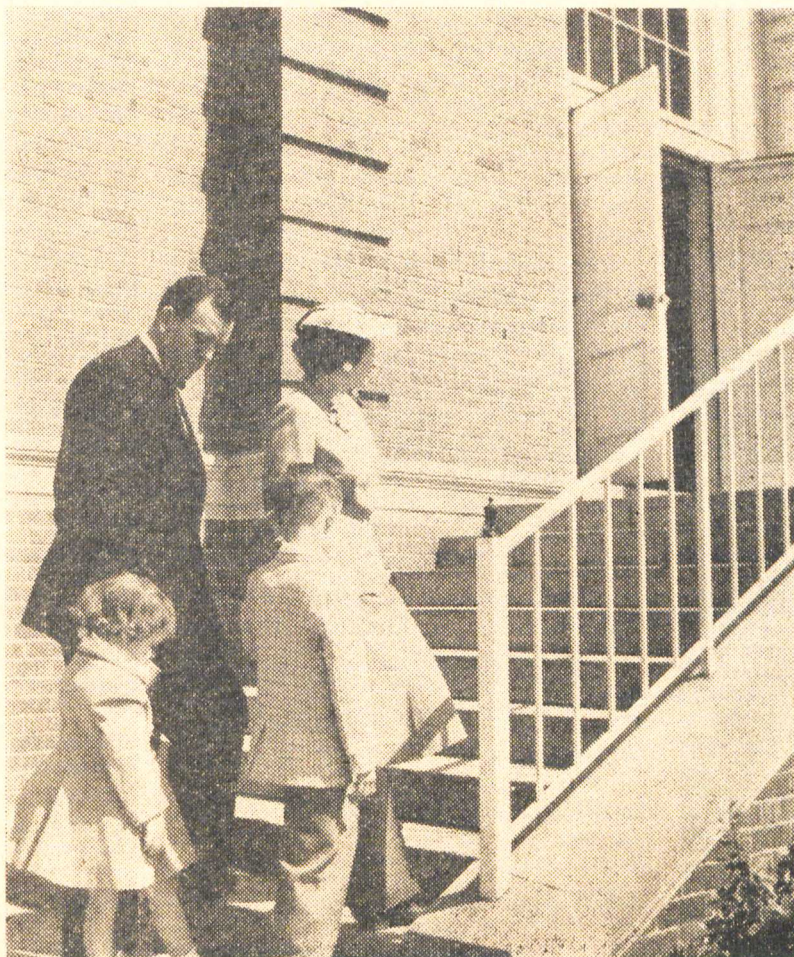

SERMON OF THE MONTH

Have Faith In God

Mark 11:22

One of the greatest needs of the hour in which we live is for every individual to have faith in God; in a world that is threatened with utter destruction by nuclear war; by communism a godless liberty destroying force that is spreading over the world like a great epidemic of fatal disease; Roman Catholicism reaching for control of the world; modernism movement that claims to know God yet denies the power of God; where is there safety, how can we escape the deadly destruction of all these forces? Thanks be unto God, there is a way, I John 5:4 the latter part of the verse and this is the victory that overcometh the world even our faith.

To have faith in God is first to believe that He is. There can be no dealing with an invisible God unless there is absolute faith that He exists; the power, and work of God is revealed in the heavens above us, Psalm 19:1-3. God revealed His wisdom to man through the prophets of old by inspiring them to write of things hundreds of years in the future. More than 80% of the prophecies recorded in the Old Testament have been fulfilled. No wonder we read in II Peter 1:19, "We have a more sure word of prophecy, whereunto ye do well that ye take heed, as unto a light that shineth in a dark place." But God has revealed Himself to us through His Son. In John 14:19, Jesus said, "He that hath seen me hath seen the Father." In Christ God not only revealed His power, and wisdom but His love which is greater than man can conceive, much less explain.

We cannot be saved without faith, Eph. 2:8, "For by grace are ye saved through faith, and that not of yourselves it is the gift of God:" When men disbelieve the record God gave of His Son they make God out a liar. I John 5:10.

Man without faith in God is like a ship at sea without chart, compass, or destination, tossed about with the raging waves;

Faith in God comes by hearing. Rom. 10:17. Men do not call upon that which they do not believe, and they can not believe in that which they have not heard about, and the Word of God is the message we are to give the world that they may believe, and believing they may be saved.

Perhaps there has not a generation lived on the earth when the devil has tried harder to shake men's faith than in this generation. Even ministers (so called) who deny the authority of the Word of God, live licentious lives and think God will not bring every work into judgment with every secret thing. Eccl. 12:14.

Christ recognized the faith of the woman who pressed her way through the throng to touch the hem of His garment, Matt. 9:22 saying unto her, "Thy faith hath made thee whole."

Also in Matt. 9:29 Christ said unto the blind man, "According unto thy faith be it unto thee." And unto the woman who anointed the feet of Jesus as He sat at meat in the home of the Pharisee, He said, "Thy faith hath saved thee, go in peace."

In Hebrews 11:6 we find this statement, "Without faith it is impossible to please God for he that cometh to God must believe that He is and that He is a rewarder of them that diligently seek Him." Saving faith is not only knowing about God: believing that He is; but believing that He is a rewarder of them that diligently seek Him, for salvation, sustaining grace, power to witness, strength to continue steadfast unto the end, but trusting Him yielding all unto Him, body and soul, and possessions. As it requires faith to be saved, accept Christ as our personal

Saviour as we came to Him humbly repenting of our sins, turning from sin turning unto Him, then by faith accepting pardon, forgiveness for every sin of our past life.

It also requires faith to live a yielded, consecrated, devoted Christian life. By faith we comply with Romans 12:1, yielding our bodies a living sacrifice wholly acceptable unto God.

By faith we find joy in the service of God, for Christ said, John 4:34, "My meat is to do the will of Him that sent me and to finish His work."

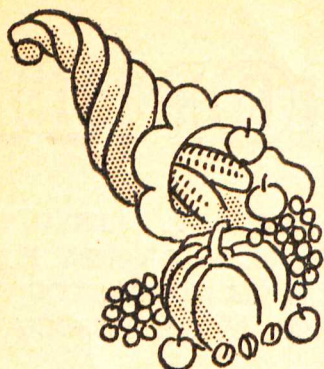
Also Heb. 6:10, "For God is not unrighteous to forget your work of faith, and labor of love." An active faith will produce works. In James 2:17 we read, "Even so faith if it hath not works is dead being alone." Also we are admonished in James 1:22 to be doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving ourselves.

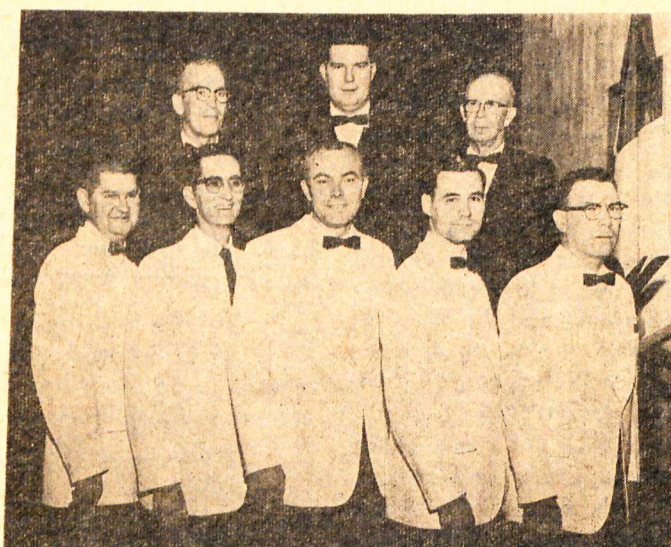
Also Christ said unto those Jews which believed on Him, "If ye continue in my words then are ye my disciples indeed." John 8:31.

Dear Mission Workers:

The time has gone by so quickly and here I am again to tell you some more about Missions up here in North Mo.

We have visited seven places since we last reported. Our Jewell church near Kirksville is without a pastor, and we made this our second stop and continued there for several days. We had three conversions and the church was blessed in a spiritual way. They have a good prayer meeting every Tuesday night. Bro. Johnnie Adkins and others come out and do their best, but these dear ones need an old time revival, so help us pray that God will give it, and have services for full time.

Our next place was Connelssville. We were practically rained out here, just had a few each night. This is another place that needs our prayers. We have an afternoon Sunday School each Sunday. Bro. Johnnie Adkins comes out from Kirksville, or sends someone to superintend it.

The third place we visited was Shibley's Point. This is a Mission point. Bro. George Miller has charge and has a splendid congregation to preach to. We will go back there Friday afternoon and organize a Mission band.

We next visited our dear old Bethel church where we had revival meetings 19 years ago. We found a fine group of young people at Bethel and all we had to do was to change the name from "Young People's Union" to "Free Will Baptist League" and take them into our convention. We found our dear women ready for a Mission, and we organized with ten members. All are getting their uniforms. We planned while here to have an all day service the first Sunday in December for the Mission Workers and League Workers.

Bro. Miller is also pastor at Bethel and is doing a good work.

Our next visit was with our Green Grove church. They have a fine band of faithful women. All we had to do was to encourage them, and they are getting their uniforms and getting ready for the first Sunday in Dec. This church has no pastor; join us in praying for them to get one soon.

We next came to Low Ground. They have no pastor, but a little band of women are still holding on, but haven't met for some time. They are to meet this afternoon and reinstate themselves, and get to work. We had good crowds both nights and do pray that a real revival will break out at Low Ground.

We went from Low Ground back to Kirksville and got Bro. Geo. Miller and family and went to Martin's Town for Saturday night and Sunday. We had splendid services, and Bro. Willard Byrd our field worker in this Association met us here, and with the assistance of Bro. Miller, he organized a splendid League with 21 members. The church here has just been revived and I am sure our women will call for a mission later.

wipe the name of Jesus Christ out of our public institutions."

Mr. Riggs also scored "efforts to expunge the words 'under God' from the pledge of allegiance."

The trend set by the U. S. Supreme Court on prayer, he said, may carry over into private schools.

"The next step is to outlaw the name of Christian in all Christian and parochial schools which enjoy a tax exempt basis," he declared.

Mr. Riggs addressed more than 2,000 delegates at the morning session.

In the evening meeting, the Rev. Joseph Ange, pastor of the Central Free Will Baptist Church, Royal Oak, and chairman of the convention steering committee, said that over one billion of the world's population haven't heard the Christian gospel. Mr. Ange said missionaries must reach these people.

"We must evangelize or fossilize," he said.

Earlier in the day, board elections were held, and the Rev. Guy Owen, pastor of Philadelphia Free Will Baptist Church, Connors and Longview, was named to the general board.

The Rev. Billy A. Melvin, executive secretary, detailed progress on publishing a hymnal for the denomination; establishment of a new service and completion of a Directory of Free Will Baptist Churches."

He also said denominational giving has shown a steady increase over the last four years.

THE EDITOR'S COLUMN

OUR YOUTH SPEAKS

REPORT ON YOUTH CAMP SESSIONS FOR 1963

"Wonderful," "I've enjoyed it the most," "I can hardly wait until Youth Camp time next year" — these and many other similar remarks were made by those who attended Youth Camp this year. This is indicative that our young people love the Free Will Baptist Youth Camp. Perhaps this is the reason we had two record-breakers this year. There were **261 enrolled for the Pre-Teen Session and 201 enrolled for the Teen Session.**

Let's note some of the highlights of the sessions held this year and see what is being done to help shape and mold the lives of our young people that they might be faithful servants of the Master.

The first service in the morning is chapel. A devotional thought is given by one of the students or one of the camp workers. Then, God's blessings are invoked on the Camp. The campers feel that, when God is met early in the morning His presence and guidance can be felt throughout the day.

Next, comes the class sessions. The subjects this year were "What Free Will Baptists Believe," "Free Will Baptist Heritage," "The Importance of Visual Aids in Teaching" (a biblical lesson was taught by the use of visual aids) and Camp Bible School for the lower age group of the Pre-Teens. The father of a pre-teen stated, after talking with his child who attended this year's session, "My child knows more about Free Will Baptists than I, and I have been a Free Will Baptist for several years." This speaks well for our class sessions.

In the afternoon the campers enjoy a time of recreation and singspiration. Surely God is pleased for us to develop physically as well as spiritually.

The day goes by in a hurry — it's 7:15 — time for cabin prayer meeting. This is a time when hearts are prepared for the evening Evangelistic Service. Often times decisions are made for Christ in these prayer meetings. At the Pre-Teen Session, six boys made decisions for Christ in a prayer meeting service.

It's 7:45 and time for the Evangelistic Service. What a wonderful feeling — sitting in the open tabernacle

singing praises to the Lord in song and being drawn into His presence in prayer. It would be well if every Free Will Baptist in Missouri could attend at least one of these services.

God has been preparing hearts — now it is time for the preacher to give God's message. The message goes forth in power — the invitation is given. A young man walks down the aisle and kneels at the altar — a young lady walks down the aisle and kneels at the altar. Others move out under the conviction of the Holy Spirit. Ministers and Christian workers begin counseling with the ones at the altar — prayers are offered boldly to the Throne of Grace and souls are saved; praise God souls are saved.

This year forty-four decisions were made at the Youth Camp Sessions. Also a young lady made a commitment of her life to Christ for a special kind of Christian service. These things happened this year. But this is experienced each year at Youth Camp. Approximately 800 decisions have been made for Christ at Youth Camp. From this group several are now serving as ministers and missionaries. Surely we can say along with David "The Lord hath done great things for us whereof we are glad."

The Lord has also blessed with material blessings. The Youth Camp Board undertook the project of installing a new well and pump this year. The total cost of the project is \$1170.14. Thus far \$937.83 has been received. This leaves a balance of \$232.31. Inasmuch as several have not responded to this who have said they will (we are depending on these for this needed money) it is anticipated enough money will be received in the near future to pay the balance. The Youth Camp Christian Corps has rendered a very beneficial service in helping to raise the needed money for the well. May the Lord bless these young people in a special way. A complete list of the churches and auxiliaries that have given and the amount given will be shown in the near future.

In thinking of the way the Lord has blessed the Youth Camp this year, in past years and in anticipation of future blessings surely it would be well to say with the Psalmist "O come let us sing unto the Lord; let us make a joyful noise to the rock of our salvation. Let

us come before his presence with thanksgiving, and make a joyful noise unto him with psalms. For the Lord is a great God, and a King above all gods." (Psalms 95:1-3)

WHAT YOUTH CAMP MEANT TO ME

WHAT VOCATION SHALL I CHOOSE?

Eph. 4:1, 14, 15; I therefore, the prisoner of the Lord, beseech you that ye walk worthy of the vocation wherewith ye are called.

That we henceforth be no more children, tossed to and fro, and carried about with every wind of doctrine, by the sleight of men, and cunning craftiness, whereby they lie in wait to deceive;

But speaking the truth in love, may grow up into him in all things, which is the head, even Christ.

Today there is great emphasis on the question of what vocation to choose. A great deal is being done in the field of vocational guidance for young people. Many colleges and

universities as well as high school guidance counselors are giving tests which bring out the personality traits and interests of the teen-agers. They feel by doing this they can get the young person to put his finger on the occupation he wishes to achieve. Then some teen-agers have no choice. They find it hard to secure a job after graduating from high school or college, and they are happy to take anything they can get.

Every young person, before choosing his vocation, should analyze himself. Only you know yourself. Decide whether you have the "ambition" and "desire" to advance your education, or if you are satisfied with your high school education. Decide which type of work you prefer. Do I prefer working with my hands, or my head? Do I like to work with people, or by myself? Do I object to being told what to do and like to be my own boss?

Then you must take your skills into consideration. Can I write fluently? Can I speak before people well? Am I interested and talented in art? These are just a few examples since each of us has our individual talents.

The first step in choosing your vocation is answering this question, "What do I like to do best?" What you are interested in and what you can do the best in is probably what you can do most successfully.

During the past decade it has become increasingly true that young people must be prepared to create jobs rather than merely to look for them. You cannot sit back and expect someone to bring an opportunity to you. If employment agencies have turned you away, before you get too discouraged try doing something that you like to do and create your own job. Jesus told Simon Peter, when he was having a poor catch of fish one day, to "launch out into the deep." When Simon did that, his results were amazing.

Just to assure yourself of a good vocation, specialized training is unbeatable. There are no short cuts to a genuine education. **Anyone** that tries can receive a good education. This challenge is up to **you** as the individual. No one else can do it for you. What vocation are **YOU** about to choose? Be sure it is one that will bring glory to God.

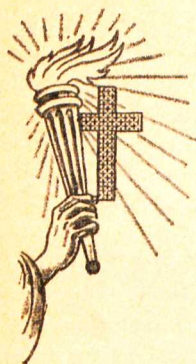
Even with three churches giving to the Cooperative Plan for the first time the receipts for June were below normal.
