

I believe sincerely that the majority of our women are concerned and realize that the Woman's Auxiliary purpose is to help the church, teach and support missions.


These auxiliary pages are not for self praise and self seekers, but that the activities of others may challenge us to greater service for God.

Sunday School Visitation

Anyone who has attended a Sunday school class at Christmas time has heard, if at no other time in his life, the story of Jesus' birth. Indeed, the sole purpose of our Sunday schools is to teach about the coming of Christ and His salvation. The Sunday school does not exist to plan socials or to organize membership drives; it does not exist merely to meet at an appointed place each Sunday morning either, with the same members present week after week—although some of our Sunday schools seem to have been limited to just this function for as long as we can remember.

The Sunday school exists for the same reason that the angels were sent to Judean shepherds; for the same reason that Christ went to the multitudes; for the same reason that He sent out His disciples two by two; for the same reason that Helater commanded His followers to make disciples of all men, teaching them all that He had commanded.

If we study the methods of Jesus, which should surely be our own, we will observe that He did not teach regularly in one place only to those who came to hear Him. Instead, He went to the people: to the joyful, celebrating a marriage; to the sorrowful, mourning a deceased relative; to the concerned, lamenting a fatal illness of a friend. He went to sinners, to despised tax officials, to "inferior" Samaritans, to the lame and the blind and the diseased and the poor as well as to the wealthy and the socially prominent. He went not only to the synagogues where people worshiped, but also to homes where people lived, to the sea shore where people worked. In short, wherever people were, there Christ was.

We have heard much about people coming to Christ and about people coming to church, but one of the basic tenents of Christianity that distinguishes it from other religions is that man does not seek God; it is God who seeks man. Was it not for this purpose that Christ came into the world?

If our Sunday schools are to adopt the methods as well as the spirit of Jesus, then we must go to the people who are not





now attending our churches, for our purpose is to proclaim the gospel where, as someone has said, it really is news. We are to tell those who walk in darkness in the land of the shadow of death that a greatlight has shined; we are to tell those whose wearisome burdens are heavy that there is One whose yoke is easy and whose burden is light; we are to tell those who have sinned and come short of the glory of God that the Lamb of God takes away the sin of the world.

Exactly how can a Sunday school organize an effective visitation program? There are various plans, of course, all of which will "work" if we keep our real purpose in mind and pursue it prayerfully.

(1) No Sunday school should be without an adequate records system. Every member should actually be enrolled, with his name, address, and other pertinent information on an enrollment card (available from our denominational Sunday School Department). Every visitor should be given the opportunity to enroll on his very first visit to the Sunday school. (2) The class secretary should keep an accurate record of attendance. Class attendance record books and individual six-point re-

port blanks are available for just this purpose. (3) Each class secretary (or teacher) should submit a weekly list of absentees to the pastor or general superintendent. A simple form for reporting absentees can be prepared by each church. (4) The teacher or secretary should contact each absentee for the first and second absence, but when a member has been absent for three consecutive weeks, the pastor or the general superintendent should contact him personally. (The absentee form should contain a column for "No. of Sundays absent.")

These steps will help to retain the current members, but an even greater effort should be made to reach the unenrolled. Again there are several plans that are effective, but they all involve an active visitation program with one night set aside (preferably each week) for actual visits. (1) A visitation board may be installed, on which are hung prospect cards arranged by age or school grade. New names may be obtained for these prospect cards from visitors' cards (every visitor should be asked to complete such a card, in every class), from religious census findings (if your church has never conducted one, begin planning now for a spring census), or from personal contacts made by any church member. (2) One night each week should be designated as visitation night-if no other time is available, visits can be made after prayer meeting. On visitation night, couples (preferably husband and wife) should get prospect cards from the visitation board and visit the prospects. (3) After their visits are made—they should be "disciple visits" too—they should write the results on the reverse of each prospect card, along with the date of the visit, and return the cards to a peg marked "return" as soon as possible. The pastor will then be able to see the results and know what follow-up work may be necessary.

Try these methods to proclaim the good tidings of great joy—and to enlarge your Sunday school and promote its effectiveness.


Mrs. Eunice Edwards is teacher of the class. The devotionals were led by Elaine Spradlin, president of the class.

HISTORY OF THE MISSOURI STATE ASSOCIATION

from its first session

in 1914 to 1934

AS TAKEN FROM PROCEEDINGS OF ANNUAL SESSIONS

Bro. C. E. Mann of Queen City, Missouri has been kind enough to furnish an Introduction and the First Session Proceedings.

Dear Brother Brown:

Complying with your request for a statement regarding things leading unto, and the organization of the Missouri State Meeting of Free Will Baptist, I submit the following:

INTRODUCTION

During the early part of my Christian life, and ministerial work, it was my pleasure to have for my spiritual advisor, Rev. G. S. Latimer, now of Washington. Kans., but at that time pastor of churches in the Northeast Missouri Yearly Meeting. At one time Rev. Latimer was clerk of the old Missouri State Meeting. From him I learned much of the work and results accomplished under this organization. It was my privilege to attend the last session of this conference and, being a boy, I failed to give it the attention and thought I should, therefore I was handicapped some years later when I sought to bring about the organization of the present state work.

In the winter of 1905 I met Rev. T. C. Ferguson at the Schuvier County Quarterly Meeting and from him learned of the work in Northwest Missouri, Central Western Missouri and Southeastern Kansas. This was during my second year in the ministry. With a desire to know more of our Missouri work, I began a campaign of correspondence, but for several years was unable to gather the information desired, or the co-operation hoped for.

During the fall of 1912 I assisted Rev. W. H. McKown of Carlow, Mo. in a revival meeting, and later he assisted me in a revival at our home church. While associated together we began to lay plans for uniting our Free Will Baptist work in Missouri. As a result of our plans, and at the close of the revival, I began corresponding with ministers and clerks of

the different associations I knew of. Letters were sent to Elders W. H. Mc-Kown, T. C. Ferguson, J. J. Wood, R. W. Waterman, S. B. Lewis, and G. S. Latimer, also Mr. Jerry Ahart, clerk of Northwest Missouri Association. i also visited in person, Elders P. H. Veach, W. D. McFarland, James Shoop, C. A. Phillips, W. B. Fadley, and several others in the interest of an organization. I made two trips into the Northwest Missouri Association, sat in council with the Northwest Misscuri Association executive board, and visited a number of other meetings in order to determine the wishes of the people. Rev. Waterman of the Laclede County Association was the only one corresponded with who failed to answer my letters, and Rev. T. C. Ferguson was the only one offering objections. But upon being elected moderator at the second session of the State Meeting at Hannon, Missouri, he put forth his best efforts for the enlargement of the work, and for several years was a tireless worker, sacrificing both time and means for advancement of the cause.

After over a year's correspondence, and traveling, we succeeded in getting the question submitted to the Northeast and Northwest Missouri Associations, the Central Western and Southeastern Kansas Association, and the St. François County Quarterly Meeting, resulting in a call meeting to be held with the Philadelphia church, near Pattonsburg, Missouri, beginning November 25, 1924.

> PROCEEDINGS OF THE 1914 SESSION

The meeting called to meet with the

Philadelphia church, near Pattonsburg, Missouri on November 25, 1914, for the purpose of organizing a state conference of Free Will Baptist, assembled at 7:30 p.m. on the appointed date.

Rev. C. E. Mann, chairman of the Northeast Missouri Association, was elected to deliver the introductory sermon and address of welcome. The Scripture

selected was Psalms 122:1.

_____ THURSDAY MORNING

A quorum not being present, praise and prayer services were conducted until 11 o'clock, at which time the Gospel message was brought by Rev. C. E. Mann.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

A quorum being present the conference was called to order by Rev. C. E. Mann, and the object of the meeting outlined. Upon nominations Rev. W. H. McKown was elected moderator and C. E. Mann clerk. The afternoon was spent in discussing the feasibility of an organization. Rev. W. H. McKown was selected to bring the Gospel message Thursday night, and Rev. S. B. Lewis to bring the Gospel message Friday morning at 11 o'clock.

Business was suspended until Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The messages brought by Rev. McKown and Rev. Lewis were very instructive and helpful and broadened our field of information of the work accomplished by the old State Conference, of which both ministers had been members.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON

Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock, the house was called to order by the clerk. The chairman then read a lesson from Isaiah 12th chapter, after which we were led in prayer by James Hardin of the Northeast Missouri Association.

IX. We recommend that we adopt the Land Rush in Hawaii as our state project for 1963-64, setting for our goal the amount of \$1,000.00.

X. We recommend that we accept Mrs. Oletha Parsons' resignation, and elect Mrs. Ava Hellerd to fill the unexpired term of office.

XI. We recommend that we accept Mrs. Grover Terry's resignation and elect Mrs. Theroed Edwards to fill her unexpired term of office.

XII. We recommend that Mrs. Teddy Davis be elected as editor of the Woman's page of the Free Will Baptist Gem.

GIVING TO NATIONAL HOME MISSIONS EXCEEDS \$100,000.00

Nashville - "A goal that seemed so far in the future a few years ago has now become areality." These words were spoken by Homer E. Willis, Director-Treasurer of the National Home Mission Board, when informed by the bookkeeper that receipts this calendar year have exceeded the one hundred thousand dollar mark. This is an increase of something near \$10,000.00 over giving for the last calendar year and more than double that given in 1958. For the past years, receipts to this department of work have averaged an increase of more than \$10,-000,00 annually.

Mr. Willis also gave a personal word of testimony - "I was elected to the Board of Home Missions in 1952 and the following year our receipts were \$8,397.35. I am thankful that we have had a steady and consistent increase each year since that time. Our people have been wonderful in their response; the members of the board have been kind and considerate in all their actions; our missionaries and office help have been faithful. The Lord has added his blessings time and time again.

"It has taken twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, fifty-two weeks a year of continued work and planning - but the satisfaction of seeing our church extended into Alaska, Canada, Hawaii, Old Mexico, and many cities and states in the mainland U.S.A. has been a great reward. I have traveled in all fifty states, much of Canada, and Mexico in the interest of the work. I have visited as many, or more, Free Will Baptist churches than any one among us. I am thankful that I have had this privilege."

We have now begun a National Home Mission program - let us not be satisfied - but press on to a greater work in the years ahead.

This is a special issue of "MEETING THE CHALLENGE". You will notice this picture, this is the road that leads to the newly purchased property for the school here in Monterrey. This is Arthur, myself, and some of the students in the picture. The property is located about 7 miles from Monterrey on the highway to Mexico City. It is one and one-half city blocks from the highway. It is 3 acres. The property cost \$3,200.00. We

bought this like we have done everything else, we bought it on faith. We borrowed \$400.00 to pay the first part of the down payment. Now we must have \$1,600.00 by January 31, 1964.

This is the entrance to the property. We have named it "THE INSTITUTE OF GOLD". The gates are iron, and the property is completly fenced in with 5 strands of new wire. It also has a cesspool. The time has come when we must move the school out of town. We have no place to throw the dirty water, and we have no room for new students. We only took 7 new students this year because of lack of space. We have been praying that God would provide us with a place, and we feel God led us to this property.

This is the building that is on the property. We will increase the size and have a beautiful tabernacle for our yearly convention, youth camps, etc. It has a thatch roof, these are very typical in Mexico. The size is about 21 x 35 ft. It has a bathroom attached on the end of the building. You will also notice the well. It is equipped with 2 electric pumps. It has 4 meters of water that never runs dry.

This property is located in a small village by the name of Rancho De Uro. The population of this village is about 1,000. They have a school, one store, and a mill, (this is to grind the corn for the tortillias). The people of the village seem to be thrilled at the prospects of having an evangelical school in the village.

As you will notice in these pictures the view is beautiful. It is surrounded by mountains. The property faces the north. On the west side there are mountains, on the east side there are mountains, and on the south there are mountains. Driving down the highway 85 to Mexico City you can plainly see the property. Around the edge of the property runs a small creek, the water is very clear and runs all the time.

We have tried to explain as best we can the property. We wish it were possible for each of you to see it. Maybe someday you will come for a visit, and see just how God has blessed all of our combined efforts for the work here in Mexico.

Now we are asking you first of all to pray. After you have prayed, then obey. We are only asking you to do what God would have you to do. We feel sure if we could visit your church personally you would do something for the need at this time. Please keep in mind we must have \$1,600.00 by January 31,1964. We realize we have taken a big step. To try to raise this much money in 6 weeks, but we have faith in God and in you, our Free Will Baptist, that it can and will be done.

As we told you, we borrowed the first \$400.00. Now, what will you do to help? Send all offerings to National Home Missions, 3801 Richland Ave., Nashville, Tenn. Be sure to clearly earmark your offering "Billows School Fund".

This season of the year brings to our hearts and minds the great gift God gave to all the world, when He gave His Son for the sins of man. Since we will not be sending any cards this year, we want to take this opportunity to wish each of YOU a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. May God bless all of our combined efforts for world wide missions in the coming year. Truly the harvest is white, and the time seems to be so short. We must work all we can while it is day, for the night cometh when no man can work.

Designated as the First Free Will Baptist Church of Canada, the church is located at Mill-ville, New Brunswick, Canada. The establishment and subsequent organization

of this church has been spearheaded by home missionary Mack Owens who has been ministering in the northeast for a period of four years. Another preaching point has been established at Cloverdale.

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NEW SPANISH MAGAZINE LAUNCHED

NASHVILLE, TENNESSEE - The first Free Will Baptist magazine in Spanish to be used on an international scale has just been released by the Board of Foreign Missions.

The new magazine, called Impacto, is edited by Jerry Ballard and Benito Rodriquez. It is a 24-page, 8 1/2 x 11, two-color quarterly magazine with a Bible study format. It is the only magazine of its kind in Spanish.

A basic feature of the magazine is a 13 part study on a selected book of the Bible. The first series of studies is on the Book of Romans. Additional articles revealing the power of God at work through His Word are included.

The magazine will be used on all Free Will Baptist Spanish-speaking fields and has stimulated interest from other missionary agencies. A Portuguese version for use in Brazil is scheduled for release during late 1964.

Impacto is evangelistically orientated to meet the literature need in opening new works. The 13-study series in each issue is adaptable to personal Bible study, Bible study groups and formal Sunday school use.

Jerry Ballard, director of publications for the Foreign Missions Board, says that the publication is a major step in the board's efforts to give missionaries effective tools for evangelization. Samples of the magazine are available from the Foreign Missions Board on request.

SERMON

Has This Nation Changed Gods?

(Note: This message was delivered on Sunday morning, December 8, 1963, on the Free Will Baptist church program presented each Sunday at 8:45 a.m. by the Pocahontas, Arkansas FWB church. The pastor is a former Missouri pastor, Rev. Ben Scott.)

From Jeremiah 2 and 11 we read: "Hath a nation changed their gods, which are yet no gods? but My people have changed their glory for that which doth not profit." This morning I'd have you consider with me this question: "Has this nation changed her gods?" Have we traded the Almighty God of our fathers for an idol of gold, pleasure, prosperity? If the evidence gathered would prove that we have changed gods, then I think our hearts might well be filled with fear - for who of us could deny that this nation was born, nourished, and has been preserved by the help of God Almighty, our Creator?

The prophet Jeremiah was speaking to a highly favored people, the chosen people of God. As a people they had left the land of bondage and oppression and had found under God freedom and liberty. But here is the extent of their quilt; God said, "And I brought you into a plentiful country, to eat the fruit thereof and the goodness thereof; but when ye entered, ye defiled My land, and made Mine heritage an abomination." I think there is a striking parallel between the people of Israel and the people of America. Both were delivered from bondage and oppression, and both were guided on their way by the unfailing hand of God. And both were brought into a land of plenty - even of abundance. But like as they of old had defiled their good land and had blasphemed the name of the Holy God our nation today stands in shame and reproach because we, too, have defiled this good land. One generation after another sees a continuing breakdown of our moral and spiritual fibre. An honest, open-minded look around us will reveal that we have changed our gods. God is not the author of the confused and bewildered state in which we find ourselves. God is not the author of selfishness, bigotry, social injustice, and racial strife. I think we need among

us today a re-birth of plain old-fashioned patriotic pride; we need a revival of pure and undefiled and unadulterated religion. Christianity, if experienced in the heart and committed to practice, will erase social injustice, will remove seeds and germs of hate and malice, and will produce a proper love and sense of respect for our fellowmen; even for those who disagree with us.

For the sake of survival itself America needs to wake up! We are much farther down the road to judgment than we think! I'd like to give you a statement recently released by J. Edgar Hoover, director of the FBI. And friends, this is not the opinion of some fanatic preacher who got disturbed and had to preach something. This is the statement of a man who has had his hand on the nation's moral pulse for years. And here is what Mr. Hoover says, and I quote: "It is high time that Americans take a closer look at what is happening to the nation's moral standards. We do not have the courage to stand in conflict with the mad rush for material wealth, indulgence, and social prestige." He goes on to say, "We are condoners and appeasers of a practice which we dis-

trust and disapprove. Many persons are so preoccupied with selfishness and greed they no longer know - nor care for that matter - where honor stops and dishonor commences. But the danger does not stop at immorality alone," Hoover said. "Some theorists suggest our moral standards be scrapped for a less restrictive code by which our moral derelictions can be justified." And Mr. Hoover concludes his statement by saying, "If the destruction of our great nation itself were the goal of these advocates, they could not devise a better means to achieve it." As I go back to our point of beginning and raise the question, "Has a nation changed their gods?" I must conclude that evidently J. Edgar Hoover thinks so.

Not long ago while scanning over one of our daily newspapers I caught the following headline: D.C. HIGHEST IN DRINK-ING, and a following paragraph reads like this: "The District of Columbia does have a higher rate of consumption of hard liquor than any state. In 1962, 6.55 gallons of distilled spirits were sold for every resident of Washington, D.C. Nevada, where they lap it up in Las Vegas, was next on the list with 3.98 gallons per capita." Friends, think with me for a moment. We live in so-called Christian America, and yet our nation's capitol sets the pace in consumption of hard liquor. And in the light of this fact it should not be surprising to know that our nation's capitol also leads all the cities of the country in rate of illigitimate births. If ever there was a time when our country ought to blush with shame and humble ourselves in sack-cloth and ashes, this is the day!

I believe the church and the ministry need to make some changes. We have listened to the song of the psychologists who have passed the whole mess off as being a result of social maladjustment but the Bible calls it sin, and the Bible says, "Be sure your sin will find you out!" And then the Bible proceeds to give proof that this is true.

The sin of the old world was found out once, and God destroyed all that were outside the ark. The sin of a city was found out once, and we read of it in the book of Daniel. It goes like this: "Belshazzar the King made a great feast to a thousand of his lords, and drank wine before the thousand. Belshazzar, while he tasted the wine, commanded to bring the golden and silver vessels which his father Nebuchadnezzar had taken out of the temple of the house of God which was at Jerusalem; and the king, and his princes, his wives, and his concubines drank in them. They drank wine, and praised the gods of gold, and of silver, of brass, of iron, of wood, and of stone. Here was a world empire about to fall; a mighty kingdom was about to crumble! The hand-writing which spelled doom was upon the wall; and when the king, in his drunken stupor, saw the part of the hand that wrote his countenance was changed; we read, "And his thoughts troubled him, so that the joints of his loins were loosed, and his knees smote one against another." Belshazzar had throwed his last party; for the last time he had defied the moral and spiritual laws of God. He had suddenly come to the end of the line; and like it or not He must leave the throne and see his kingdom crumble. And that same night there came the armies of the Medes and Persians and they took the city and divided the kingdom. The king was slain, and mighty Babylon had fallen and the story sounds so much like the picture I presented a few moments ago of our own

nation's capitol - a treadmill of wine, women, and song.

Jeremiah said in his day, "Be astonished, O heavens, at this, and be horribly afraid, saith the Lord." May God help us that we shall be shaken from our spirit of indifference and complacency. I hope that your soul will be stirred this moment, and that you, as an individual, if your heart is not right with God, will seek out a place of prayer; and on your knees before God, repent of your sins, turn to Christ with all your heart, and go down the road of life with the knowledge that your soul has been cleansed by the blood of Christ and that all is well.

The Bible says, "Blessed is that nation whose God is the Lord." And the Bible says, "Righteousness exalteth a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people." And the Bible says, "The horse is prepared against the day of battle; but safety is of the Lord." The calibre of our weapons is not nearly as important as the calibre of our men!

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SCOTTISH BAPTISTS VOTE TO REMAIN OUT OF WCC

GLASGOW, SCOTLAND (CNS) - By a 316-59 vote, the annual assembly of the Baptist Union of Scotland decided to continue the denomination's "disaffiliation" with the World Council of Churches.

The Scottish Baptists broke away from WCC in 1955. The Rev. A. W. Speirs of Edinburgh argued that ecumenical con-

versations could not be carried on "at the national level" while the denomination refuses "to do so at the international level." But his motion was turned down by the delegates.

"The unity which Christ purposes for his people is neither external nor organizational – but spiritual, and this unity the Christian community already has in Christ," the committee recommendation declared.

Interviewer: What type of programs are provided?

President: These programs are designed to promote and educate students in missions. This is done through films, testimonies, and qualified speakers.

President: Students can pray for missions more effectively and can present missions in their local church better. It will also open their hearts to the convicting power of the Holy Spirit. Ignorance is one of the greatest hindrances to missions, but knowledge is the greatest fire.

Interviewer: What are some of the functions of this organization?

President: It sponsors Missionary Prayer Band each day at 1:00 p.m., sends Christmas gifts to our missionaries, supports a Korean orphan through World Vision, tithes offerings received to home and foreign missions, and provides missionary emphasis on campus.

ATHEIST CHALLENGES TAX EXEMPT STATUS OF CHURCH PROPERTY

BALTIMORE, MD. (CNS) - Mrs. Madalyn Murray has filed a suit in Superior Court here challenging the tax exemption of church-owned property. Mrs. Murray, a professed atheist whose suit in the U.S. Supreme Court ruled out required prayer and Bible reading in the public schools, asked the court to declare the tax-exemption unconstitutional.

She argues that the exemption places a financial burden on her since property taxes for individuals, according to her suit, would be reduced by one to five per cent if the churches were made to pay.

She further contends the practice denies taxpayers due process of law under the Fourteenth Amendment and it violates the principle of church-state separation.

Mrs. Murray has been given a tract of land in Kansas for the development of a center for atheism. She promises to protest the use of nuns in the public schools in some communities in Kansas on the same principle as she challenged prayer and Bible reading.
