

THE PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY'S CORNER

Pastor John Long and Mine La Motte Church was host to Madison County Quarterly meeting, January 10 & 11. Each of their churches represented by letter and delegates. Rev. Bob Jones delivered the Friday evening message, and Rev. Ronnie Graham the noon message Saturday, with soul stirring services each time. Time was given during the afternoon session for our Missouri promotional program. I was also privileged to bring the 11 A.M. message Sunday.

Friday evening, January 24th St. Louis District Bible Bowl and Youth rally was held with Trinity Free Will Baptist Church at Bridgeton, Missouri. This was the final round in the Bible bowl contest. The trophy was won by the Trinity team.

Pastor Albert McFarland, South Side Free Will Baptist Church, hosted the St. Louis Quarterly Meeting Saturday, January 25th. Rev. R. B. Spurgeon delivered the principal sermon with each church represented and a large delegation.

Time was given for our Missouri State cooperative program with a unanimous decision to send all future cooperative monies to Missouti State Headquarters, 3100 Mt. Pleasant Street.

Commendations to all Free Will Baptist participating in 1963 cooperative plan of giving through Missouri State Association which shows 10% increase over previous years. Our per cent going to seven phases of the National Association of Free Will Baptist, was \$11,665.12, which places MISSOURI STATE ASSOCIATION second to the top giver through this plan.

We also exceeded our 1963 suggested quota of \$7000. for National Home Missions, giving \$8,056.58. However we fell under the \$21,500. suggested quota for Foreign Missions, actually giving \$17,909.83; thus under \$3,590.17.

You will observe from January cooperative receipt report, we are entering 1964 with wonderful response. This is the best since the cooperative plan was adopted. Forty churches are contributing. I sincerely solicit the scores of un-commited churches in Missouri to adopt this good plan which is really a world wide ministry,

beginning with our local church.

REPORT FROM ALASKA

Thurmon Murphy, Wallace Hayes, Dixie Myers, and I left Nashville by airplane at 12:25 P.M., flying 6,000 feet in the air, on June 1, 1963. We arrived in Anchorage, Alaska at 8:15 P.M. their time on June 1, 1963. The Whaleys and friends met us at the airport and after getting our luggage they drove us to their home. A reception party was awaiting us with cookies and punch. Shortly thereafter, we were shown to our rooms to get a good nights rest for Services the next morning.

The next morning we got up and went into the next room which was the church for Sunday School. (The parsonage is annexed to the Church building). I even sang in the choir which shocked my fellow travelers, but Millie insisted. Just before the message we were asked to give a personal test imony on our impression of Alaska when we first arrived. The Lord really blessed us throughout the service.

During the first week we were all there. Rev. Don White brought the messages in a Revival at the Church. He was with the Interdenominational World Literature Crusade. He has worked in Alaska for five years in trying to reach the people with the Gospel. He was a real inspiration to us throughout the week, through his sermons, and fellowship. Throughout the week we went from door to door inviting people to come to the services, and leaving brochures for those who weren't at home. We paired off in twos each time that we went out, and everytime I was paired off with Vernon. Well, I had nothing against Vernon, except at the time he had laringitis and I had to do all the talking. One good thing about it was that he was a good knocker, especially since it was so cold and damp outside. Rev. White also showed us films of his work in Latin America and each night we listened to a greeting from one of the pastors or laymen from Latin America to us.

Friday, June 6, 1963, Rev. White flew Dixie and I to Fairbanks, Alaska, in his airplane. We enjoyed seeing the beautiful scenery from the airplane, especially Mt. McKinley. The trip was wonderful smooth flying, except at Windy Pass.

There was no one to meet us at Fairbanks as Mrs. Godwin didn't know what time we would be here and we didn't know ourselves. After calling Mrs. Godwin and being assured that she was coming after us and that we wouldn't be stranded, Rev. White went back in order to get back in time for services that night. Within a few minutes Mrs. Godwin came with the sweet-

est little baby we ever saw. Dixie and I had a wonderful time playing with her and I think we spoiled her some.

We had 107 enrolled in our Vacation Bible School with an average of 80 in attendance. The Lord really blessed us tremendously as they had only 52 at the most last year. The Lord presented us with a bus and we hauled 60 pupils in it every day. We could not have had that many without it. We would have had to made at least 4 trips each with the 4 cars that we had for transportation. Besides the bus there were two cars picking up children. We were packed into the building like a can of sardines but we all learned some from God's word anyway. My intermediates met in the lobby of the building and had only sitting room and many interruptions because of the many doors to various rooms, but God saw us through it and blessed us to no end.

During the last two weeks of our stay there we conducted two Bible Clubs in the Godwin's home and Steadman's home. We planned some follow-up work but it was never carried out. Dixie and I were disappointed that we didn't get accomplished the work that we had planned to do, but we do pray that our efforts were not in vain.

On July 10, 1963 Thurmon and Wallace arrived in Fairbanks, tired and hungry from their 12 hour ride on the train from Anchorage. No real work was accomplished during their weekend stay except for some preaching and teaching in the church on one Sunday and Sunday night service. Dixie and I stayed with her Uncle Fred while the boys were at Godwins'.

During the same weekend, the Whaleys, all five of them, arrive for fellowship and Sunday services. A place for sleep was furnished for all of us by the people of the church. Bro. Whaley brought a good sermon the next morning, and following the service we had dinner at the church; thus, strengthening the bonds of fellowship among the church people. That night was College Night, with each former or present student giving their testimony; and concluding with a special in song by Millie and Vernon, and services and services.

Car trouble on the way back to Anchorage caused a lot of disturbance - one ran out of gas and the other broke down, but we all arrived home safely by 6:00 A.M. Thus, the Lord is faithful who hath promised.

We loved it at the Whaleys, and even I was tempted to stay for a year, with Millie pulling hard for me with her earnest prayers in regard to it. We were kept busy visiting, teaching in Bible Clubs, and filling in at various places. Dixie



and I especially enjoyed going with Mrs. Whaley on personal witnessing. Here is where real experience counts with real prayer and concern for their souls. My heart was stirred deeply as I watched Mrs. Whaley at work. She loves this work better than anything, but she has to do her chores and home; and oh the much needed answering of mail. What about the bills, feeding the family, teaching classes, preaching sermons, going on visitations, and oh, so many other things they do for God. Are we behind them in our prayers as we should be? THE COST OF LIVING IS UNBELIEVING.

The people in the church were very nice to us inviting us to dinners and showing their appreciation to us in many ways. We enjoyed the fellowship with them tremendously.

There is so much more I want to say, but I will give Dixie the rest of the space to tell you of the needs in Alaska and the great Challenge there for us all.

COOPERATIVE PLAN GIVING IS UP IN 1963

NASHVILLE, TENN. - Giving to denominational ministries through the Cooperative Plan of Support increased by \$5,997.04 in 1963 as compared to 1962. Total giving was \$63,072.56. In 1962 it was \$57,075.52.

Twelve states showed an increase in their giving through this plan. They are Alabama, California, Georgia, Illinois, Iowa, Kentucky, Missouri, New Hampshire, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Tenn-

NASHVILLE, TENN. - The National Free Will Baptist League Board met here on December 30-31, 1963 to discuss further the development of the youth program. All board members were present as well as representatives from the Woman's National Auxiliary Convention and pastors of Free Will Baptist Churches. \$105,955.92 FOR HOME MISSIONS IN 1963

NASHVILLE, TENN. - The following nine states exceeded their quotas in National Home Missions giving in 1963 -Alabama, Georgia, Kansas, Michigan, Missouri, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia. Tennessee led all states in total giving, with Oklahoma a close second. Total giving was \$105,955.92, which is an increase of \$13,351.03 over last year, but \$4,044.08 short of the budget. Nine states gave less for National Home Missions in 1963 than they gave in 1962.

"But this one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before," For this I know that there is "MORE FOR '64" for those who love and serve the Lord. He who "commits his way unto the Lord" will often be led to wonder at the strangeness of the path. There is no saying where the next steps will take him; they may lead into darkness quite beyond the power of human ken, and into depths where voices cannot be heard, and the only voice that reaches the ear will be the voice of Him who says "Take no thought for to-morrow," for "Lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world." Happy is he who can walk every step with his faith directed to a present God, and his eye look-

II. THE YEAR OF '64 MAY BRING NEW PERPLEXITIES, Therefore we should seek afresh the Divine Guidance, "that ye may know the way by which we have not passed this way heretofore." Just as there will be new duties and new responsibilities, there will also be some new perplexities. Many in the year of '64 will suffer financially, socially, physically, and even spiritually. But this one thing I know, God will not allow us to suffer more than we are able to bear. God asks us to go nowhere, suffer nothing, and do nothing in which He is not willing to bear with us. If God be with us, that is salvation, the very rocks will have water for our thirst, the skies, manna for our hunger, the torrent, a path for our feet, and even the walled cities will fail to lend to our adversaries any sufficient defence, and we can say boldly as the Great Apostle Paul of Old, I" can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me," for "We know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose (Phil. 4:13; Rom. 8:28), therefore we are ready to do "More For '64".

III. THE YEAR OF '64 WILL BRING NEW TEMPTATIONS, and therefore it calls on us to "Watch and pray", lest we will fall into the hands of the prey. As we get older, we are apt to grow into a careless feeling of security. Men virtually say, "I have stood, I do stand, therefore I may grow careless and fall", if I fail to watch and pray. So I plead, that we all Watch and Pray, for "men ought always to pray, and not to faint". "Watch and pray that we enter not into temptation", that we may be able to do "More For '64".

IV. THE YEAR OF '64 MAY RE-VEAL A NEW LIFE AND A FRESH IN-HERITANCE, therefore we should be prepared. Our cold river may also have to be crossed, or it may be the glorious return of our Lord, but what ever it may

be, shall we find on the other side the New Jerusalem, and one of the many mansions ready for us? Shall we find waiting for us our loved ones who have already departed to be with Christ? Shall we hear the Saviour say, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant, thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord" (Matt. 25:21). Whether life or death, let us begin this year of '64 and live each day for the Lord, that our lives will be one continuous Prayer and Praise. when the morn of eternity dawns, and the shadows of earth flee away, we shall join in singing the song of Moses and the Lamb, and then who may mourn - May say, WE DID MORE FOR '64.

THE WAY TO REPENTANCE

You might ask this question to many people. Are you a Christian? What kind of an answer will you get? A MESSAGE AND A CHALLENGE TO FREE WILL BAPTIST OF MISSOURI

For a number of years now we, of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptist, have been talking of a project for our youth. In our talk we have expressed a desire for a youth encampment. With this encampment to be a place for religious training, and recreation for the youth that we love so very much. I am overjoyed with the privilege to announce the beginning of such a vision being realized. However, I regret that all the people of the state were unable to be at the State Association on Sept. 13th, 1945. The reason for my regret is that you surely did miss a wonderful outpouring of the blessings of the Lord. I will be able to explain to you, through the Gem, the plan, but I will be utterly unable to explain to you what we experienced from the Lord on that day. By His presence being so visible we deem that His divine approval was stamped on the plan. The plan is as follows:

A recommendation was brought to the body by the business Committee, that the State Association elect a Committee of three to serve with the President of the State Sunday School Convention, and the President of the State League Convention thus forming a Committee of five to formulate plans for a youth encampment. That this committee be given the authority to purchase a site, construct buildings, hire instructors, and make every necessary

plan for the opening of the camp. The recommendations was passed unanimously NOT A VOTE WAS CAST AGAINST IT.

The committee that was elected consists of Rev. O. T. Allred, Moderator of the State Association; Rev. Mark Lewis, President of the State Sunday School Convention; Rev. Kermit Esther, President of the State League Convention; Rev. C. B. Dees, Editor-Mgr. Free Will Baptist Gem; and Rev. Noel Greenway Pastor Carterville Free Will Baptist Church. This Committee was given, by vote of the body, the official title of, "Missouri State Free Will Baptist Youth Encampment Board." Then amidst all the shouts, and praise of the delegated body to the Lord for His wonderful goodness; pledges for the support of the cause poured in. And amounted to well over \$2,000.00 with \$670.00 of this amount being given in before the session closed. It was stated by some one on the grounds that, "This is one of the very few times that I have seen Free Will Baptist shout while giving money." But, to you who did not see the expression of love for the youth, and hear the shouts, I repeat, "You missed a real blessing."

After all this, the Board met and organized with the following officers, Rev. O. T. Allred, Chairman; Rev. C. B. Dees, Assistant Chairman; Rev. Mark Lewis, Secretary-Treasurer. The Board decided that we would like very much to have all the pledges in our hands before March 1st, 1946. Then we can truly

begin to do things for the Lord.

We are asking for pledges and donations from all who desire to be a part of this great work of saving our youth. We ask, especially, for the whole hearted support of Pastors, S. S. Superintendents, League Presidents, S. S. and League workers in General, and, to be sure, that field covers about all our church field; and surely we know that the Woman's Auxiliary will do its part for the cause. The time has come, "LET US RISE UP AND BUILD A YOUTH CAMP." Make all checks payable to Rev. Mark Lewis, and for your peace of mind I am to be bonded for the full amount of the money collected. Which bond will be announced in a later Statement to the Gem.

As for me, this move and plan is very close to my soul. I am well aware of the fact that our youth of today will be the church, and citizens of tomorrow, and I am persuaded to believe that, "As we train them today, they will live tomorrow." I can now just close my eyes and see your children, and my children sitting at the feet of some competent teachers, and instructors learning to serve the Lord; and to be big in soul, and turning out to be one of the most loyal generations of Free

Will Baptist that ever has existed. Won't you join in with us in our dreams by joining in with us in giving to this all worthy cause. Here is a suggestion: "If some of you happen to be behind in your giving to the Lord this would be a good place to get caught up. Just make your check or money order payable to Rev. Mark Lewis, put it in an envelope and address it Rev. Mark Lewis, then Pray God to lead the Board in its operation, and all will be well.

Now Christians, the message is, "WE HAVE STARTED."

The Challenge is, "WILL WE FINISH THAT WHICH WE HAVE STARTED."

The answer is, "BY THE GRACE OF GOD WE WILL."

SOME RESOLUTIONS PASSED BY NATIONAL ASSOCIATION By Rev. E. C. Morris

Since it will be sometime yet before the Minutes of the National Association will be out, and since many will not obtain a copy when they are distributed because of the limited supply, it is thought best to submit some of the most general recommendations and resolutions for publication in our Church papers, therefore, we are asking for space now in which to inform the readers of a partial report of the Resolution Committee herewith:

"It is called to our attention that some associations and other organizations constituting this body fail to send a proper letter. We urge that each delegate or representative here-after make diligent effort to obtain the letter from their respective bodies, so that the Clerk can make proper record of representation."

"We urge our churches everywhere to support all the institutions and program of this Association, and earnestly beg each pastor to acquaint himself with these, that he may properly present them to his churches."

"That, inasmuch as the Free Will Baptist Bible College is launching an expansion program, and which will require at least \$100,000 for its goal, we urgently recommend that each state and district association strive to attain the quota as has been recommended by the National Association, as soon as possible."

Tuesday afternoon during the discussion of the topics the fervor of some of the people was stirred as was never before in regards to the youth camp, and the Bombarang was when a man said I'll pledge Fifty and I don't know what would have been the outcome of this service had we continued, but the suggestion was made that the League petition the State Association to buy or build a suitable camp ground, which suggestion was accepted by the League Convention, and the League continued with the remainder of the program.



MEETING THE CHALLENGE

JANUARY, 1964

Dear Friends:

Greetings once again in the lovely name of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. We trust this new year shall bring many blessings to you.

First we want to thank each of you who have so wonderfully responded to the need for the school property. As of January 1, we have received \$905.25. We feel by January 31 the other \$700.00 will have come in. May God richly bless each of you who have perhaps sacrificed for this need

Now we want to tell you something of the plans for development. As we told you last month the land cost \$3,200.00. We have the property we now use for the boys dormitories up for sale. When we sell this property we will finish paying off the land. Now what we need is buildings. Our plans for this year are to build cabins for dormitories. We plan to build 4 cabins for the girls and 4 for the boys. 6 students will sleep in one cabin. This will give us space for 48 students. We also plan to build a kitchen, dining hall, class rooms, an office and a small house. The house is for the couple who will be in charge of the students. Of course we will have to expand each year, these are the bare necessities. We can build a cabin for \$300.00. Now if you, your church, association or state meeting would like to take this as a project we will name the cabin any name you choose. For instance the North Belmont church in North Carolina have sent \$325.00 for a cabin. They want it named the NORTH BEL-MONT CABIN. This cabin will serve two purposes. We will use during school for the students, then in the summer when any one from North Belmont comes for vacation they will have their cabin to stay in. Although you need not feel you must send \$300.00 to have a part in this need, any amount will be appreciated. Every dollar helps, there are many buildings needed besides the cabins.

The total cost for the above mentioned buildings will be \$5,000.00. Our Mexican convention has put \$500.00 toward the buildig program. All the students (boys) are staying during the summer months to work. They will receive no pay, only their food and what used clothing we can give them. Also many of the men from the farms have offered to come in and donate from one to three weeks of work. They have no money, but they can work.

We ask you to earnestly pray about what

you can do to help with the buildings. We must have everything ready by September when school begins. As we mentioned above we are selling the property we now use for the school, NOT THE W.N.A.C. BUILDING. The small property we bought when we first come here. Those of you who have visited here know which one it is.

We will have our first graduation service February 21. We have 7 students who have completed 3 years of training. Our first year we had 8 students, we still have 7 of them with us. We praise the Lord for these fine young men and women who have been so eager to study and prepare themselves to take the message to others. It has been a struggle for all of us. The school has come a long way in these last 3 years. We are looking forward to even greater things in the years ahead, when we will have proper facilities to take care of the students, more trained teachers, and more experience. Remember the students in prayer as each of them go to tell others the good news.

To each of you who sent cards of greeting during the holidays "THANKS". It is impossible for us to write each of you personally, but we do appreciate your kind words of encouragement. We also use the cards during Vacation Bible school with plaster paris to make pictures for the children.

This year brings more work for us than any year since we have been here. In closing we ask you to remember us in prayer, that God will give us physical strength. Our bodies are tired and sometimes it seems we can't take on another thing to do, but the buildings must be built, and to save money Arthur will have

to do the construction. That is be in charge, and do the finish work. We surely do need your prayers.
