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FELLOWSHIP FREE WILL BAPTISTS BURN MORTGAGE

Sunday morning, January 5, the Fellowship Free Will Baptist Church on Buckley Street, Flat River, had a "mortgage burning" as the church debt was paid.

The morning service included a responsive reading for the dedication of the church, with the church pastor, the Rev. James Earl Raper, leading, and the Church responding. The prayer of dedication was also by the pastor.

Frank Johnson, chairman of the Trustee Board, lighted the match to the mortgage, which was held by Marion Sherrill, chairman of the Deacon Board. The pastor, and members of the Trustee and Deacon Boards participated in the ceremony. The members of the Trustee Board are Marion Sherrill, Gerald Getz, Bill Turley, Bill Curcham, Robert Dodd, Tom Ward and Darrell Ragsdale. The members of the Trustee Board are Alonzo Baker, Frank Johnson, Marvin Milburn, Harold Wilfong, Vernon Horton, Tom Williams and Bob Bess.

The church trio, Wanda Ragsdale, Frances Ward and Doris Raper sang "Without Him I Could Do Nothing," accompanied at the piano by Sylvia Brooks. Following the morning service, a fellowship dinner was enjoyed in the church basement.

In 1946, under the leadership of the Rev. Melvin Bingham of Tulsa, Oklahoma, a few families of Free Will Baptist people met in the old Buckley Hall, 603 Buckley Street, and this group agreed to go into the organization of a church. Mr. Bingham served as pastor of the church for several months and the Rev. Sylvester Hand of Fredericktown was called to serve the church as pastor.

Easter Sunday of 1947, the Rev. Damon C. Dodd, who with his family had just returned from the Cuban Mission field, preached at the Fellowship Church and later conducted a revival. At the termination of the revival the church extended him a call to the pastoral care of the church and he accepted. Plans were soon underway for a basement building and were carried through. All during those days there were revivals and many days of prayer.

September 30, 1947, work was begun on the parsonage and the pastor and family moved in November 19. The first regular service was in the basement January 18, 1947.

Easter Sunday of 1949, the people moved into the new church auditorium. A revival began on the night of April 17 and the first candidates were baptized in the church's baptistry. Paul J. Clay was the first to be baptized.

Mr. Dodd resigned the pastorate on January 1, 1950, to accept a position with the Denominational Administrative staff in Nashville, Tennessee. The Rev. Mark Lewis (now deceased), was elected to the pastorate.

The Rev. Rolla Smith served as pastor of the church approximately seven years, 1952 through 1959. The Rev. Elro Driggers served as pastor from 1959 through 1960.

The present pastor, the Rev. James Earl Raper accepted the pastorate of the church in 1961.

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Now when they saw the boldness of Peter and John, and perceived that they were unlearned and ignorant men, they marvelled; and they took knowledge of them that they had been with Jesus." Acts 4:13.

"They marvelled." It seems that the early church had this same effect on every one. The world marvelled at this miraculour power they possessed; their gentleness; great bravery; the simple longing for unity with God and their complete unconcern for worldly fame or fortune. The attitude of the world toward the early church can be summed up by saying "They marvelled." And what a glorious statement "they took knowledge of them that they had been with Jesus." When the apostles were cast into prison "The angel of the Lord by night opened the prison doors, and brought them forth, and said, Go, stand and speak to the people all the words of this life. "Here is the mission of the church. Go, Stand and Speak the words of the eternal life.

I speak as a church member, not as a minister; and of the local congregation, not of the denomination; when I say that I expect my church to have certain qualities, and to offer my certain assurances if I am to be a member of that organization. I know that my church will be only what I make it, it will rise no higher than I lift it, and will give me only what I am willing to receive from it; but I insist that as a regular attending and supporting member, I have the right to expect my church to offer me the opportunity to serve my Lord to the utmost of my ability and desire.

In the next few minutes I hope to call to your mind four things that I feel will cause the world to marvel at the Church where I attend. As these are brought to your mind please remember that they are merely qualities that will better enable us to carry out the mission of the Church.

First, I want my church to be alive. The church of the Lord Jesus Christ is not cisk nor is it corrupt as many are saying. The true Church of Christ is holy, reverent, healthy and spiritual. But although the church is healthy it very probably is asleep, yes even to the point of causing the world to think it is dead. Jesus brings life. He said "I come that you might have life." If we are to bring from spiritual death to glorious life those that are in sin, we must show some life ourselves. Life is a wonderful thing, and those who really enjoy life are enthusiastic about each new day and each opportunity for an adventure. I would that my Church would show more enthusiasm when it worships, and when it witnesses. No one wants to be around a corpse, no body enjoys going to a funeral. Lets show the world that the church has the abundant life and cause them to come to our church and receive food that will make them optimistic about tomorrow.

Second, I want my church to be alert. An alert people is an informed people. Hundreds were killed on Pearl Harbor because they were not informed of the danger of attack; a few weeks ago over 1000 people were destroyed in Italy when a dam broke, hurling millions of tons of water down upon them. They were not informed of the dangers so they were not alert to the need for inspection and caution. An alert church is one that is informed of the dangers of sin and of the need for advancement. An alert church is one that is aware of the biblical teachings concerning the awfulness of hell, and the joys of heaven. We need to be alert to the destruction that awaits those who do not accept Christ as Savior, both for those who have heard and refused to heed, and for those who have never heard that Christ holds us responsible for our failures to extend the Gospel for the salvation of others.

Third, the church must be aggressive. Satan is aggressive, he is working overtime promoting every scheme possible to destroy souls; Catholicism is aggressive, from a small minority group in the american colonies they have grown to be four times larger than the largest protestant church in America; Communism is possibly the most aggressive force in the world to day, its chain of slavery has captivated one-half the world's population and continues to reach for more. In the midst of the most aggressive attack by the devil in history against the Church of Christ the people of God need to aggressively advertise, promote, emphasize and to boldly inform the world of the absolute necessity of accepting Christ and living daily for Him. We need to aggressively attack the elements of sin in our society, and renounce sin in every form. There is a line drawn today between the liberal and the conservative church, and if you will look closely you will find a keen line drawn between the aggressively attack the elements of sin in our society, and renounce sin in every form. There is a line drown today between the liberal and the conservative church, and if you will look closely you will find a keen line drown between the aggressive, progressive church and the stagnant dying church. The growing church is attacking sin and offering a solution to this worlds problem. Yes, it will be called fanatic, but it will cause the world to marvel at its growth and rejoice at the salvation that it offers. Lets stop hiding our churches, our bibles and our witness. Let us boldly proclaim Jesus Christ as Lord of Lords and King of Kings.

Fourth, I want my church to accomplish. The bible clearly teaches that the church is to evangelize, to teach, to train and to spread the word. I want my church to accomplish its mission. It must support missions, have a well organized sunday school, well trained teachers and enthusiastic leaders. I demand that it be evangelistic, that souls are saved at the alters, new converts must unite with my church and follow the Lord in baptism. My church must train its members for christian service and then give them a job to do. While the Church is teaching, training, and evangelizing, it must also be growing. I insist that my church be a thriving progressive church.

Yes, I expect my church to be alive, alert, aggressive and accomplishing its mission. When I stop and consider though I suppose I am just about the same as everyone else. Every member of my church expects the same from the church, but what are we doing to make our church the kind we desire it to be. After all, to a sleeping man everything is dead; to an uninformed person, everyone is ignorant; the stagnant pond refers to the aggressive, flowing river as a showoff; and the failure

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always has a ulterior reason for the successful mans accomplishment. I say that today each of us needs to cry out "O wretched man that I am" and commit our energy, talent, ambition, money, and will to Christ and His Church. Let us look on the Fields, take up our cross and follow Jesus, be faithful unto death. 1 Cor. 4:2 states "Moreover it is required in stewards that a man be found faithful". Faithfulness on my part will assure success in our labors for Christ.



Greetings in the name of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Please forgive us for being so late this month with the letter. We have been so very busy we just have not had time before.

On February 7, 1964, we had our first graduation of the Bible Institute. We had five boys and 2 girls to graduate. This was truly a happy time for us. As we

begin to see fruits of 4 years of labor. Our hearts rejoiced as we saw them off to their fields of labor. Some on the bus, others on the train. As we saw them go we see Free Will Baptist reaching into new parts of this country. We ask you too, to remember them in prayer, as they meet the problems of the field.

Also on February 9, Arminda, the girl who has stayed with us for the past 4 years was married, she married the pastor in "El Canelito". Then we had the problem of getting them settled in their work. We took them there on February 12. The work is amazing in this mountain area. My heart rejoiced and was thrilled on Wednesday night as I saw the little church filled with people. There wasn't room for another person. All the children sat on the floor, the older people sat on the few benches, and the young people stood up. They are a wonderful people. They love the Lord with all their hearts. The women of the church there have bought 1,000 adobes for the church, the church has purchased 2,000. Our Woman's Aux. here in Monterrey has donated \$1,000.00 pesos or \$80.00 dollars for the church. So, soon they will have a larger place to worship. Also remember this work in prayer and the pastor and Arminda, that they will be able to see the church grow and propser in the Lord.

We have begin another Mission. It is in the mountains. It is in Penuelo, a village about 10 miles from El Canelito. The mountains are full of people who have never heard the gospel. They are a hungry people, ready for the gospel, the time is so short. Sometimes I wonder how many we will be able to reach before He comes.

We have also begin construction on the

new school property. As we have told you before, the church in North Belmont, N.C. sent money for a cottage. So we have begun this cottage. That is all the money we have to begin with. But we have faith in God that when this cottage is built there will be money for another one. This is a great prayer request we have at present. Please make this a matter of prayer. If we are to have school this fall, we must have the buildings.

We wish to take this opportunity to thank you for everything you have done for the work here in Mexico. We have been on the field 5 years and 3 months. Time has passed swiftly. As I think back over these past years my eyes are filled with joy as I think of the many blessings God has bestowed upon us and the work here. As I see my 3 children running and playing I see one of the greatest blessings of my life. To us (of course) they are the most beautiful children in the world. Danny now 5 years old, is beginning to ask all sorts of questions. Like "how come I wasn't born in the states?" As I take him in my arms, and hold him close I have tried to explain to him how God in His love and mercy gave him to us. Again as I see the church filled on Sunday morning, I remember when everyone of them was saved. As I hear our choir sing "Amazing Grace" my heart is again thrilled. As I go to the mountains or to the coast and visit the other Free Will Baptist works, I again see fruits of Missions. All the pastors have been saved under our ministry. You too, have labored here with us, in prayer and financially. If you had not sent the money, we could not have worked. You have been so wonderful, we have no words to express our ap-







THE CONGREGATION of First Free Will Baptist Church, Joplin, Missouri, voted a Resolution and Trust Agreement on January 6, 1964, authorizing the church to issue bonds in accordance with the plan suggested by Executive Church Bonds, Inc., Nashville, Tennessee.

The church was organized in January, 1953 with sixteen charter members. They purchased property at the corner of 18th Street and Virginia Avenue, where a new auditorium was erected in 1957. The church has had a steady growth over the past ten years with a present membership of about one hundred. Last year the annual budget was \$10,000.00, with a weekly income of about \$135.00. The Congregation has outgrown the present facilities and have purchased property at Connecticut and 23rd where new worship and educational facilities will be constructed.

It is the opinion of Executive Church Bonds, Inc., that the church is conducting its business on a sound financial basis and that these bonds constitute a valid, legally issued obligation of the church, secured by its full faith and credit.

The church has agreed with the issuing agent, through a Resolution and Trust Agreement on file to deposit weekly into a special sinking fund account in the First National Bank of Joplin, Joplin, Missouri, the sum of money required to pay the interest and principal as the same becomes due.

TIPS FOR SUCCESSFUL SUNDAY SCHOOL TEACHERS

It is one thing to be a Sunday School teacher and quite another to be an effective, successful soul winning Sunday School teacher. Successful teachers are more in demand than ever before. Effective Sunday Schools grow more rapidly because they insist on spirit-filled, well-trained teachers and leaders.

No Sunday School is really a "School" unless it has teaching teachers and learning pupils. Trained teachers are important. They are more successful. They do a better job.

Of all people who should study, the teacher heads the list. He cannot-be a good teacher unless he is a constant learner. When he ceases to learn, he ceases to teach. Unless the teacher himself studies, the teacher cannot inspire others to study. If pupils are to drink "fresh water", the teacher must tap new reservoirs of teaching materials, teaching methods, and teaching aids. Most important he must maintain a close personal relationship with the Lord Jesus Chirst through prayer and diligent daily study of God's Word.

Sunday School teachers who are well prepared can teach with confidence and authority. Much heed then, should be given to lesson preparation. I often hear the question, "When should I begin to prepare my Sunday School lesson?" Some of course always wait until Saturday night or Sunday morning. This certainly is not the way of the successful Sunday School teacher. An unprepared teacher cannot hold the interest of his class because he does not have enough information to attract the attention of the scholar. A teacher who has not devoted much time in preparation never deceives the members of his class no matter how young they may be. An empty water pitcher cannot satisfy the thirsty soul; neither can empty clouds give spiritual rain. If the teacher has not filled his own soul with the truth, his disciples will go away empty. "Study to show thyself approved "

As one digs into the golden treasures of truth hidden away in the Bible, lights of blessings will fire his soul, kindling his enthusiasm so that he will expectantly look forward to sharing these gems with his class the next Sunday. Immediately his teaching will lose dullness and gain a sharp edge through personal blessing.

So the teacher should begin to study

his next Sunday's lesson at least a week ahead of time. I would suggest to begin on Sunday afternoon previous to the Sunday the lesson is to be taught. The process of preparation includes five steps.

First, the teacher must kneel and pray for Holy Spirit guidance and revelation as he searches the Scriptures. Only as God reveals the truth will the Bible be understood. The carnal man cannot comprehend the things of God; they are revealed only by the Spirit of God.

The second step, is the initial acquaintance with the Scripture portion to be studied and taught. Read it through many times. Then use your Sunday School quarterly to gain the basic interpretation of the text.

It now becomes important to learn the Biblical background of the lesson. If your lesson text contains only portions of a chapter, be sure to read the entire book and learn the context of the lesson. A text without a context becomes a pretext. Learn the Biblical background of your lesson.

Next in order, search into the historical background of the lesson. Use all the materials available. Such as commentaries, etc.

Finally, be sure that you understand the meaning of every word and sentence in the lesson. Search out the meaning of each work until it is familiar. After you have thoroughly studied your lesson and have become familiar with all the truth related to it, your next task is planning your method of presentation.

There are various methods of teaching which are particularly useful for reaching special age groups. The lecture method

Dear Bro. Hill:

I have been wanting to write to you for some time, but somehow failed to do it.

I have been receiving the "Gem" for quite a few months. I do not know who sent it, but I am very grateful, and wish to say thank you to the one who did it. I enjoy reading the F.W.B. Church magazines and keep up with all the news.

You probably read where I have been retired. It was upon my request, for I am over the usual age limit, and I feel that I can do more for the Lord here in Ohio than I have been doing in Miami.

I arrived home December 19th. I am waiting for an apartment in Wayne Hills in Portsmouth, Ohio, which gives a good reduction on rent to low salaried people. It is a nice place to live and is not far from our little F.W.B. Church which is not very big, and can use all the help it can get. I have felt that the Lord would have me go there.

I probably won't take regular work, for I don't want to be tied down to one place. I am hoping that I can visit some of the churches and help to stimulate interest in

missions.

I hope to have a greater prayer ministry. I hope to be able to keep in contact to the different needs.

I felt badly at leaving all my Cuban friends, but I felt also that God was leading me here, and that I was not making a mistake in doing so.

I write regularly to our Mexican pastor in Nogales, Mexico and I pray for the work there. I regretted it very deeply when I was taken away from there. I had planned to spend most of my time in Mexico, but live in Arizona. It is a comfort to know that the pastor, who was the first convert under my ministry there, is now giving his entire time preaching the gospel not only once or twice a week, but every day. He says my letters help him so much, and I am glad that I can be of some help. I'll try and keep my Spanish from being rusty through my Spanish correspondence.

Home Mission is going to give me half of the salary I received. Bro. Willis said we would need to keep this need before the people. I told him that I would have to have extra also, for I can't live on the \$60, for I need to have a place to live, and with food so dear, and I have to have medicine, and other expenses, but I am trusting the Lord for all of that.

In my more than 27 years of mission life He has never failed me once, and I know He never will for He has promised

to do it and His promise can not be broken.

I started this letter in order to have my address changed and didn't know I was going to write all of this, but I suppose that is my failing. Long letters with lots of details, so I hope you will make all of

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this a matter of prayer.

No more for now and the Lord bless and keep you is my prayer.

may at times be used for adults. The success of the question and answer method depends upon the ability of the teacher to guide the pupil and mainly stay on the subject. Children enjoy the storytelling method; so do adults. Whatever method you may decide to use vary it from Sunday to Sunday. Variety will assist you in holding the interest of your pupil.

<u>Carefully select good illustrations to</u> <u>spice up the teaching of your lesson.</u> Be sure they are appropriate and that they actually illustrate. An illustration is a window to let the light shine in. Use these to interpret the Scriptures into everyday life.

Know the purpose of the lesson. Have that purpose as your one goal and drive home all related facts like darts at a target, until the point is indelibly impressed upon the minds of your pupils.

Be sure to present salvation every Sunday. Invite your pupils to accept Christ as their Saviour. It behooves us to repeat again and again the true Bible plan of the new birth in order to counteract false teaching on this important subject. Remember your main objective is the salvation of your scholar. Win him to Christ.

Remember if you are properly prepared, you will enjoy teaching. You will look forward to each Sunday morning; and the more information you have to impart the more anxious you will be for Sunday morning to come!
