Missouri State Youth Camp started Sunday night with souls saved in the very first service.



"Then one of the twelve, called Judas Iscariot, went unto the chief priest, and said unto them, What will ye give me, and I will deliver him unto you? And they covenanted with him for thirty pieces of silver." Matthew 26:14-15.

Let us consider our "values" or the things of most importance to us. What is the most important thing in our life today? What is the most important thing in my life? What do I value most?

How do we value Christ in our lives? In the foregoing scripture we see Judas valued Christ only by the amount of silver he would receive for delivering him into the hands of the chief priest, that they might do away with him.

Many people today are trading their birthright, as it were, for a morsel of meat. We are trading for a portion of this worlds goods. Trading Christ for the things of this world. What value or what importance do we place upon our car, our home, our family, our position, OUR CHRIST?

In Matt. 6:33 Christ is saying to us,—"But rather seek ye first the Kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things shall be added unto you."

The value or importance we place upon the different things of life will either motivate us for Christ or for evil. Sometimes we allow our minds to be entangled with the cares of the substance of this world and we forget God and our need to serve him. We value our substance above Christ.

During the lives of Abram and Lot as they journeyed together they lived peaceable together until their possessions increased. We find the increase of their possessions became the cause of their separation. Their herds increased until the land would not support them, and this caused a quarrel between the herdsmen. Abram, desiring to have no strife, asked Lot to separate from him and take his choice of the land. Lot raised his eyes and looked upon the fertile and well watered plains and lusted after them. Lot was, as many people are today, he could only see July, 1964

and visualize what they were worth in rich green pasture and could not see the evil. He did not evaluate the effect it would have in the life of his family. Lot made his choice – a choice which would later cause him trouble and heartache. He pitched his tent toward the cities of Sodom and Gomorrah, two wicked cities of the plain which were raging with wickedness.

I fear what the future holds in store for the family because too many of us are pitching our tents toward the things of the world. We are allowing our possessions and the care of them to be of first importance or of most value to us.

Many times we wonder why the Church is not more successful in it's mission in the world. We wonder why more people are not concerned about the salvation of their souls, why people are not interested in attending church services. Could it be because of the values in our lives or the things we are placing the most importance upon before the world Can I be delaying the success of the Church? Can we be delaying the success for Christ? We find the instructions for victory are contained in God's Word. Eph. 6:11-18 "Put on the whole armour of God that ye may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil. For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places. Wherefore take unto you the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to stand in the evil day, and having done all to stand. Stand therefore, having your loins girt about with truth, and having on the breastplate of righteousness; And your feet shod with the preparation of the gospel of peace; above all, taking the shield of faith, wherewith ye shall be able to quench all the firey darts of the wicked. And take the helmet of salvation and the sword of the spirit, which is the word of God: Praying always with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit, and watching thereunto with all perseverance and supplication for all saints."

Concerning the importance of our individual lives in God's service, let us remember the occasion when the army of Israel had been victorous at Jericho and moved on to battle Ai. God had commanded that everything be destroyed except the silver, gold, the vessels of brass and iron, and they were consecrated unto the Lord, and were to be turned into the treasury of the Lord. We find that Achan coveted some of the silver, and the gold, and a Babylonia garment and took it and hid them in his tent. Achan valued the garment, the gold, and the silver; and in doing so, delayed the success of the army of Israel. Let us be very careful as we evaluate the different things of life today, that we may not delay the success of the Church. If we will value the things of God, and remove the accursed thing from the camp, we can move forward even in this day. If we will move sin out of our lives and out of the camp we will be victorous over satan. With the accursed thing removed, we will see more people working, see God's cause moving forward in our land today, and see more people come to the saving knowledge of Christ.

Dear friend, are you a christian? If you are not, won't you come to him now? It is not God's Will that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance. Won't you give Christ the most important place in your life? Christ is anxiously waiting, ready to accept those that come to him. The decision is ours to accept Christ or to reject him.

If you are a Christian, are you doing the things you feel that God really wants you to do? Is he pleased with the things you say? Is Christ pleased with your support of his cause? Is Christ pleased with your stand against the forces of evil? Let me admonish you to take an inventory of your VALUES, the things you consider most important in your life.

May re re-evaluate the things of life that our lives may be in accord with the Will of God.

SHAWNEE, OKLAHOMA TO HOST NATIONAL CONVENTION Dates: July 8 - 17, 1952

Scene of the history making sessions of the national conventions of Free Will Baptists, July 8-17, will be the municipal auditorium at Shawnee, Oklahoma. The denomination will mark the 225th anniversary of its founding in North America at the conventions, Reverend Damon C. Dodd, national promotional secretary, has announced.

"The first Free Will Baptist organization was in Perquamine County, North Carolina, in 1727, under the leadership of Rev. Paul Palmer. Today the national organization embraces 3,500 churches in 25 states and numbers 400,000 members," he said.

"Highway billboards, featuring the theme, 1225 Years of Spiritual Service to America, are being prepared for posting on Oklahoma highways leading into Shawnæ," Rev. W. S. Mooneyham, state executive-secretary, said.

Much preparation has already been made for the ten-day session, which will include the Fifth Nationwide League Conference, the Sunday School Convention, Woman's Auxiliary Convention, and the National Association.

The auditorium in Shawnee, which will seat 2,700, is expected to be filled for at least two of the services. Near capacity crowds are expected for the other sessions.

The conventions will officially open Tuesday evening, July 8, when the League Conference will get underway. The keynote for this part of the conventions will be "Christ, Our Authority," Rev. C. F. Bowen, League Board secretary, has revealed.

The program will provide a four-period study course, with subjects on methods and materials of League work, he said. Page 4

The simultaneous conferences will be held for four forty-five minute periods as follows:

(1) Duties of Officers. All presidents, vice presidents and secretaries will meet in this group. They will study duties pretaining to their posts.

(2) Better Programs. Group captains, pianists, song directors and Bible quiz leaders will meet in this conference to study the "how" of more interesting programs.

(3) The Business-Like Way. This class is designed for general directors, general secretaries, pastors, treasurers and those interested in district unions.

(4) Leading the Children. This session is for Story Hour superintendents, and leaders. Ideas for flannel board lessons will be given, and games enjoyed.

Certificates will be awarded to the leaguers doing acceptable work in the conference, Mr. Bowen said.

The Sunday School convention will follow on Friday and Saturday, using as it's theme, "Building Lives in the Sunday School." Special speakers include Rev. Robert Swanson and Miss Ruth Streblow, both with Scripture Press in Chicago.

Two films, "Doorways to Decision" and "Stars in Your Crown" will be shown during the convention. There will also be two workshop sessions for teachers and workers.

The Woman's Auxiliary Convention and the business meetings of the National Association will be held the second week.

The keynote of the Sixteenth Annual Session of the National Association will be "Exalting Christ," and the association will feature, besides denominational leaders, Oklahoma's Senator Mike Monroney who will give an analysis of the world situation as it relates to the Church.

One of the highlights of the convention will be a mass evangelistic rally on Sunday evening, July 13. Preparatory to this service, a house-to-house invitational crusade will be conducted by volunteer

workers. Rev. D. C. Dodd will be the speaker for this service.

Rev. Edward E. Morris, Oklahoma City pastor, is moderator of the National Association.

A pamphlet listing travel schedules and housing accommodations is being prepared and a copy may be had by writing Rev.W. S. Mooneyham, Executive Secretary, Box 38, Sulphur, Oklahoma.

HIGH-LIGHTS OF THE 1943 SESSION

The 1943 Session of the National Association of Free Will Baptists convened in the East Nashville Free Will Baptist Church, Nashville, Tenn., July 12-15, according to schedule. About the usual number of constituent bodies were represented either by ordained authority or laity representation. One general body petitioned for membership in the National Association which was graciously granted.

This session of the National Association may well be characterized by the words "profitable" and "progressive." The very harmonious session was a beautiful manifestation of the co-operative ability of Free Will Baptists. The coming from the East, West, North, and South to assemble together each year has created an understanding of one another as a basis of fellowship in Christ among Free Will Baptists. This is profitable because it leads to progress in the Cause of Christ represented by the denomination.

The report of the National Executive Secretary, herewith published, shows an increase in the support of enterprises in the whole denomination of more than 100% over last year. It is to be remembered, here, that last year was a 100% increase over the year before, and that the year before was a 100% increase over the year before that. It is predicted by those who have their fingers on the pulse of the de-

nomination that an increase of 60% to 100% in the support of the whole program may well be expected this year. Free Will Baptists are learning the value of co-operative effort on a basis of fellowship in Christ.

The Foreign Mission department zoomed like a skyrocket during the past year. The high-lights of this work is that Miss Barnard is going back to India and other missionaries are prepared and ready to see foreign service, and a Bible School is authorized to be established in Cuba. The Board of Foreign Missions asked for \$2,000 for this cause and the National Association jumped beyond these bounds and appropriated \$5,000. For further information regarding the foreign mission cause sponsored by Free Will Baptists, see the "Missionary Department" of this issue of The Gem.

The department of Christian Education did not submit anything for publicity in this issue of The Gem. However, the Bible College is growing, and the National Association authorized the Trustees of the College to proceed with negotiations necessary to purchase a \$14,000 property across the street from the college which is to be utilized in the enlargement of the school work.

The cause of Superannuation came to the front with a very acceptable plan of protective service to young ministers, shared 50-50 by the ministers protected, against the future day of their disability and retirement. A constitution and by-laws which govern the course of action in this plan were adopted, and are published in the "Protective and Benevolent Superannuation" department of this issue of The Gem, together with an approved constitution for adoption by the state and district associations which sets up the plan of benevolent service to the aged and retired ministers. The whole plan is most ideal and worthy of ardent support.

The Executive department was authorized to establish its office in Nashville, Tenn. with a full-time Executive Secretary. Rev. Henry Melvin was elected to this office, but his resignation created a vacancy which was necessarily filled by the Executive Committee of the General Board in the election of Rev. Robert B. Crawford. An article devoted to this publicity will be published in next issue.

All the departments of the denominational work is on firm, reliable ground and is going forward in a dynamic ministry worthy of the name with the expression of the Home Mission department which is, incidentally, on the wrong foot for progressive movement. Its ideal is perfect, but its working plans are imperfect. It is the high hopes that proper plans may be inaugurated which will turn the Home Mis-July, 1964

sion department loose for the noble ministry for which it was constituted.

The worship services during the association were outstanding. Dr. Bob Jones, founder and president of Bob Jones College in Tennessee; Rev. L. R. Ennis, retiring Executive Secretary; and Rev. T. H. Willey, missionary to Cuba preached very inspiring messages.

HIGH LIGHTS OF THE NATIONAL **ASSOCIATION**

The National Association of Free Will Baptists recently held in Pocahantas, Ark. was a grand success from every viewpoint. Something like eighteen or nineteen states were represented, and one new state was received at this time, namely, the state of California. It was indeed a busy week from early morning till late at night, having closed out on Thursday night.

The Pocahontas Church and pastor did a most wonderful job of entertaining. Every one was amply provided for, and it seemed every one had a wonderful good time.

A number of new officers were elected this time in most every department of the work. The Moderator and Clerk, Rev. L. C. Johnson and Rev. E. C. Morris, declined to serve longer and therefore necessitated the election of some new officers to these positions. Rev. Floyd B. Cherry was elected Moderator, and Rev. Clarence Bowen, Clerk.

The Woman's Auxiliary enjoyed a splendid session Monday night through Tuesday. Mrs. Willey from Cuba spoke to them on Tuesday morning and an offering for foreign missions was received to the amount of \$171.00. The Auxiliary made few changes in its officials for the coming year.

The Committee on revision of the Free Will Baptist Treatise which committee was appointed last year made their report and after discussion was adopted by an overwhelming majority. Very little change was made in the treatise. About the only change made concerning our doctrinal statement was relative to the matter of judgement. Where the Treatise had been reading "future judgement" it will now read "final judgement". Personally, we are very happy for this change. It is more in keeping with the teaching of the Bible than as before. No changes of importance were made concerning our church and associational government. Just gramatical correction, sentence construction, etc. The brethern constituting this committee did a faithful job.

Wednesday night was missionary night. The annual report of the Foreign Mission Board was read and adopted, Rev. Kenneth

Turner showed pictures from both Cuba and India, Rev. Raymond Riggs gave a brief report of the graduation exercise held at the Cuban School in April, which service was attended by Rev. Riggs, Miss Barbara Willey gave a brief testimony, Miss Bessie Yeley brought a short message, and Mrs. Willey brought the principle message of the evening. All who spoke were very interesting and the pictures were enjoyed. After Mrs. Willey's heart reaching message, an appeal was made which was responded to by a large number of our young people manifesting their definite interest in the missionary program. This was followed by the hand of fellowship being given Rev. and Mrs. Dan Cronk and Miss Zalene Lloyd who are soon to depart for India. As the hand of fellowship was extended, an offering was laid on the table amounting to \$214.69 making a total of almost \$400.00 during the National setting. This service rates among the best of our missionary services through the years. I sat in the service and wished that it might be possible for every Free Will Baptist in the denomination to be present. Could you have been present, you would have decided that Free Will Baptists are on the march as concerning the great work of missions. Thursday night was Bible College night.

The report of the Business Manager was read and adopted. The choir loft was filled with college students and graduates. They presented a wonderful musical program, the College President gave an interesting message setting forth the aims and purposes of the institution, Rev. J. L. Welch brought a brief and pointed message and following this some new plans pertaining to the expansion of our Bible College were placed before the body of which plans we here give a brief outline as follows: Where our College is located at present time is positively no room for expansion. An adjoining vacant lot we had hoped to own sometime is now being occupied by Jewish people on which lot is being erected a Jewish Synagogue. Jews are settling in that community rapidly and as a result property can be sold for far more than we gave for it. At the same time there is a 62 acre tract of land out on 70 highway just five miles from the heart of Nashville on which tract of land stands a number of large, commodious, and desirable buildings. This tract can be purchased reasonably. It was proposed to sell the present property and buy this 62 acre tract which will give all the room we will need for years and years to come. The National Association then and there voted to concur with the College Board of Trustees in this move and following this vote there was raised immediately in cash and pledges an amount exceeding \$4,600.00. This was

A Modern Form of Piracy

It has been 250 years since Blackbeard terrorized the coastline of the Carolinas. His acts of piracy still send chills up the spine of adventuresome youngsters.

About forty miles from Blackbeard's Ocracoke Island is the little fishing village of Davis. This community has been chosen for the next attack by the Connectional leaders. They have sued the congregation of Davis Original Free Will Baptist Church. They intend to turn the property over to a

dissatisfied minority faction.

When will they quit? When will these misguided men who kidnapped the North Carolina Free Will Baptist movement from the National Association be satisfied with their divisive achievements? These leaders first brought reproach upon the denomination by splitting the Edgemont Church

in Durham and dragging this congregation into court in 1961. Since then they have blazed a trail of threat and intimidation from Durham to Davis. Along the way they have piled up a record of malicious achievements including splitting the State Convention away from the denomination in March of 1962.

This latest action should surprise no careful observer. Last September, when the State Convention met in Raleigh, they set up a campaign chest. It was to contain the financial ammunition for their war against local autonomy. This treasury was given the innocent title "Heritage Foundation." A five-man committee was elected to help the district conferences which wanted to file suit. It is not surprising then that this disgruntled faction at Davis and the Eastern Conference has filed suit, since they have the financial backing of the powerful machine which runs the State Convention. No doubt this is just another result of one of those closed-door, smokefilled, motel room meetings.

The basic issue involved in this dispute is: "Can a local church decide whether it wants to be a member of the National Association?" If a local congregation cannot decide this then democracy has gone down the drain. The Connectional advocates should drop the word FREE from their title-FREE WILL BAPTISTS. Their churches are no longer free.

Even in the face of all this some folk are so naive as to say "There is no difference

between the congregational and connectional church government."

Oh well, some people probably thought Blackbeard was just another playful young sea captain.

When we hear of Brother T.O.Terry and the congregation at Davis being sued, what should we do? Many will be tempted to breathe a sigh of relief and say, "Well, I'm glad it isn't me." Such people are kin to Cain who shrugged his shoulders and said, "Am I my brother's keeper?" The WITNESS believes that every interested reader should write Brother Terry and the Davis Original Free Will Baptist Church. We should stand firm with these brethern who are being molested in their attempt to stay in the main stream of the denomination.

Finally, it is hoped that those of the State Convention who are pushing this modern form of piracy will quit and let us all get on with the unfinished task of world evangelism.

PAPERS SERVED ON DAVIS CHURCH

The Eastern Conference of Free Will Baptists and a dissatisfied minority has sued the Davis Original Free Will Baptist Church.

A hearing has been set for June 8 in the Carteret County Superior Court.

The desires of the disgruntled faction is to take the church property from the majority because they voted to remain affiliated with the National Association. The Eastern Conference joined the North Carolina State Convention in pulling out of the National Association two years ago.

The thirty-page document which was filed with the judge asks that the Davis Church be declared still a member of the Eastern Conference and therefore under the jurisdiction of that body. This action would authorize the Conference to give the property to the faction which withdrew from the Davis Church two years ago. (The church joined with other congregations wishing membership in the National Association).

The lawsuit also demands that the Rev. T. O. Terry be excluded from the pulpit. It further wishes to restrain him from claiming to be an Original Free Will Baptist minister in North Carolina. He is now a minister in good standing with the National Association of Original Free Will Baptists and its affiliated bodies.

A legal observer has remarked that this is possibly a test case to see whether a Free Will Baptist Church is free to stay in the National body when a state group pulls out.

GROUNDBREAKING SERVICE HELD FOR NEW FREE WILL BAPTIST HEADQUARTERS BUILDING

Groundbreaking services were held Sunday, June 21, at 3:00 p.m. for the new \$175,000.00 headquarters building to be erected by the National Association of Free Will Baptists, according to an announcement by Rev. Billy A. Melvin, Executive Secretary of the organization. Four and one-half acres at 1134 Murfreesboro Road is the site of the new building.

Participating in the services were Rev. Rolla Smith, pastor of the Donelson Free Will Baptist Church and President of the Metropolitan Free Will Baptist Ministers Association; Rev. Henry Melvin, pastor of the East Nashville Free Will Baptist Church and Chairman of the National Church Training Service Department; Rev. John L. In addition there will be space for a retail book store, conference rooms, shipping and storage. Office space for the past eleven years has been located at 3801 Richland Avenue. Construction will begin immediately.

The National Association of Free Will Baptists has a constituency of approximately 250,000 from 2,500 churches located in 40 states. Work overseas is maintained in Africe, Brazil, Uruguay, Cuba, Mexico, Central America and Japan.

WHY?

HOME MISSIONS

By HOMER E. WILLIS

The churches of Canada and the United States have in recent years furnished much of the missionary personnel of the world. However, with each of these nations fast becoming "extreme mission" fields themselves, we must now begin to think in serious terms of evangelism at home as a means of preserving that which we have been sending out. There are 314,000 churches of all denominations in America, with a survey showing that only 20% of these are listed as evangelical. Therefore, at best we have only a small number of Bible preaching churches (one out of five) in America to reach the ever increasing population--now approximately 18,000,000 in the U.S.A. and 20,000,000 in Canada. We keep in mind that people of other nations are interested in "major mission fields of the world but who is interested in "pagan" America?

Of 2,000 institutes of higher learning founded in America by the church, now only 50 to 75 of these make any pretense at being Christian. We have produced not only a generation of papans, but a generation of educated pagans in America.

In the United States, we have 5,500,-000 Jews, more than any other nation in the world; we have 19,000,000 Negroes, more than some of the new nations in Africa; we have 5,000,000 Indians, only 7% of whom are Protestants; we have 5,-000,000 Mexicans, one-fourth of the world's total, and thousands of other races. Of the Jews in America, most have never heard the gospel, and most of the Latin Americans are unreached by the Protestant Church.

Three of the large cities in the United States have approximately 50% "foreignborn" population. Fifty-four per cent of the state of Hawaii are Buddhist, and only three or four per cent are Protestant. Buddhism is gaining ground throughout the other states. The most elaborate churches being built by Buddhists, Mohammedans, Mormons, Roman Catholics, and those of other religions. With 37% of the American people Roman Catholic, there is a great opportunity for mission work here in our own land. Unless we increase our mission work at home, there will come a day when the freedom to preach which we now enjoy July, 1964

will be taken from us. That day may be near at hand.

In America one-half of the entire population lives in, or near, fourteen cities; therefore, we must evangelize in the large cities. In New York City there are more than 8,000,000 people. Of this number 3,000,000 are Jews; 2,000,000 are Negroes; and at least 1,000,000 are Puerto Ricans.

People are moving from rural areas to the cities. In 1865, five out of one hundred people in America lived in town. In 1918 fifty out of one hundred people lived in town. Today, two out of three live in a large city.

In New York City last year 300 churches closed, in Chicago 150 churches closed, and in Cleveland 110 closed. This is happening all over North America. The large cities are mission fields of unusual opportunity. New England is a great mission field with 80,000 souls, in just one section, totally unreached with the gospel. Yes, Home Missions, Evangelism, and Church Extension are vital to all our work as never before.

Two-thirds of all the people in the world belong to the colored race-one-third to the white race. Many of the colored races are living in America and waiting in America to hear the gospel. The Negro in America has now reached middle, and even top class status in some cases, but is unreached with the gospel in most instances. At any given time, there are thousands of of foreign students in our colleges and unviversities. This is a home mission field of no small proportion.

How can we say that all the world is pagan except the U.S.A. when in one city of 8,000,000 population, there are 4,-000,000 nonchurched, only 10% Protestant, and possible 2% born again. Also let's face it--we could have no missionaries in the other parts of the world if we did not have home bases. We could not have institutes of learning, orphanages, or any other work without local churches. Just as the pastor is God's key man on earth, so is the local church God's headquarters here on earth. My brief is that the Home Missions program is vital and basic to all our work. Home missionaries and new churches started by the Home

Mission Board are fast becoming our best sources of finance for a world-wide program of evangelism, and are also furnishing new man power for the Kingdom work. Check your reports. See what the new churches in Washington, Colorado, Iowa, Alaska, Hawaii, New Hampshire, Washington, D.C., and others are doing in this respect.

With 25% of all the people who were ever in this world now living, our day carries greater responsibility than ever before. With more foreign-born among us than ever before (102 different language groups in Chicago alone), with more influence and power used by the Roman Catholic Church, with modernism and liberalism continuing its inroads, with communism increasing, with America slipping faster and faster into heathenism, we must promote more evangelistic efforts, establish more churches, go into more benighted areas, and extend our Bible believing churches into all the cities of America. Go, my friend, go! If the board can send you, well. If not, go anyway! Time is not waiting! America is a mission field! We need more churches. You can start a church with twelve tithers. What if you do have to work forty hours per week? Others have and are. Go where there are people, not just the nice places. Preach the gospel pure and simple. The average man only understands 850 words (a college graduage should understand 1800 words). Speak to the average. Depend more on agonizing than organizing. Remember also that socializing is not evangelizing.

Find God's will. Hurry. Get to the field and stay there. Communities are changing overnight. We need to start churches everywhere. Yes, where there are Catholics. Yes, where there are Jews. Yes, in downtown areas. All need the gospel, and all communities should have a Free Will Baptist Church. One out of every three families will move this year. Most of them to a city or to a larger city than the one where they now live. Will they find a Free Will Baptist Church where they move?

More strong local churches is one of the greatest needs today in the Free Will Baptist denomination. We have a weak home front trying to support a world-wide min-



DELEGATES for the NATIONAL ASSOCIATION

AGAIN THIS YEAR, local churches belonging to the highest denominational body in their state may send delegates to the National Association. The procedure for registering a delegate is a simple one. Elect one during a church business session and, if possible, pay all or part of his expenses to Kansas City, Missouri. Fill out a credential form appearing in the "GEM" and have it signed by the pastor or church clerk. This signed credential form and the \$10.00 registration fee authorizes the delegate to represent his church with full privileges of a voting delegate.

It is important to note that delegates representing state associations also must have officially signed credentials to register as a delegate. Each state is allowed five delegates-at-large, but their registration is paid through state clerks when the state letter is mailed. Where there is no state association, Article IV of the Constitution should be consulted to learn basis or representation.

No one called you General, But no finer could be had, To me you were the greatest, Because you were MY DAD.


